## HEAVY FIGHTING AROUND SERBIAN CAPITAL

### FRENCH TROOPS NOW IN SERBIA -- RUSSIANS HAVE SCORED MINOR VICTORIES

#### AUSTRO-GERMAN ATTACK ON THE SERBIAN CAPITAL

**ENEMY REPULSED WITH HEAVY LOSSES AT THE SAVE—GERMANS ENTER BELGRADE ACROSS THE TISZA—THE FRENCH TROOPS IN SERBIA—BULGARIANS MAKE PROTEST**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Oct. 9.—An official report from Nish states that the advance guard of the Austro-German army has crossed the river Tisza at Belgrade. Part of the Serbian capital has been taken and part destroyed.

The division which tried to enter the city across the river Save was repulsed with enormous losses. Heavy fighting continues.

**French in Serbia.**  
Athens, Oct. 9.—The French troops, which were landed at Salonika, are now in Serbia forming a base at Gievegal near the Greek frontier. The British troops are close behind and it is expected that all the Allied troops will be on Serbian soil on Tuesday.

**Bulgarian Protest.**  
Bulgaria has made a strong protest against Greece permitting

the landing of the Allied troops, stating that it threatens the friendly relations at present existing between Bulgaria and Greece.

The Bulgarians are reported to be at Kusaneldt preparing to make a raid on the Salonika-Nish railroad in order to prevent the Allies from reaching the Serbian front.

**Consul's Message**  
London, Oct. 9.—M. Angloff, Bulgarian consul here, has sent the following telegram to Premier Rhadoslavoff: "If the reported alliance of Bulgaria with her eternal enemies, the persecutors against the liberators, is true, I protest and tender my resignation to the Consul General."

**Bulgarian Deserters.**  
There have been four thousand desertions from the Bulgarian army since mobilization began.

#### LABORERS DEBARRED FROM ENTERING CANADA

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Ottawa, Oct. 9.—An order-in-council has been passed, in view of existing labor conditions in the Dominion, to the effect that no laborer or artisan will be admitted to Canada from October 1, 1915, to March 31, 1916.

#### STEAMER MARIPOSA HAS BEEN WRECKED

Capt. Mackenzie of the Prince Rupert reported this morning having passed the Mariposa, of Seattle, on the rocks about a mile below Old Bella Bella. She was high and dry forward, with her afterdeck awash. Her lifeboats were drawn up on the beach.

The Mariposa is owned by the Alaska Steamship Company, and left Seattle for the north on Wednesday with one hundred passengers on board. The passengers and crew reached the shore safely in the lifeboats and were picked up by a passing steamer. The ship is liable to become a total wreck.

E. L. Jatenaude, M. P. for La Prairie, has been appointed minister of inland revenues. Hon. Louis Coderre, who has been secretary of state since 1913, has retired and will succeed Hon. L. P. Pelletier as judge of the superior court of Quebec.

Hon. P. E. Blondin is promoted from the position of minister of inland revenue to that of secretary of state in succession to Mr. Coderre.

#### PRESIDENT WILSON VIEWS WORLD'S SERIES

Philadelphia, Oct. 9.—President Wilson, who is a keen baseball fan, witnessed the second game of the world's series between Philadelphia and Boston today. The president and his party viewed the game from a box near the centre of the grandstand. This is the first occasion on which the chief executive of the nation has attended a world's series contest.

Boston defeated Philadelphia by 2 runs to 1, making one victory each on the series.

#### HARRY LAUDER'S SON HAS EARNED CAPTAINCY

Harry Lauder's son has been promoted to the rank of captain. Shortly after the outbreak of war Mr. John Lauder obtained a commission as second lieutenant in the 8th Battalion A. & S. Highlanders. He proceeded to the front on the completion of his training, and was wounded at Festubert.

After recovering from his wounds he went back to the trenches, but was taken ill and invalided home.—Edinburgh Dispatch.

#### MINOR RUSSIAN VICTORIES—MANY PRISONERS CAPTURED

**NEARLY FOUR THOUSAND MEN AND A NUMBER OF MACHINE GUNS TAKEN—VIOLENT GERMAN ATTACKS AT LOOS REPULSED—A GERMAN TRANSPORT SUNK IN BALTIC**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Petrograd, October 9.—An official report records a number of victories for the Russians on the eastern front. Northeast of Kli-van, 1,800 prisoners and a number of machine guns have been captured.

Between Dudno and Lutsk 1,500 men, 19 officers, 5 machine guns and one searchlight have been taken.

On the left bank of the Ikwa, 600 prisoners and three mortars have been captured.

**Western Front.**  
Paris, Oct. 9.—Violent German attacks on Loos have been repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy.

The French have gained a foot-

hold in the fortified works of La Trapeze, taking 200 prisoners, bomb throwers and machine guns.

**Hun Transport Sunk.**  
London, Oct. 9.—A British submarine in the Baltic has sunk a German transport by gun fire near the German coast.

**Steamers Sunk.**  
The steamers, Silver Ash, of 3,700 tons, and the Scawby, of 3,600 tons, have been torpedoed.

#### NEW GOVERNORS

It has been officially announced at Ottawa that Dr. R. G. Brett, of Banff, will be appointed lieutenant-governor of Alberta, and R. S. Lake, ex-M. P. for Qu' Appelle, will be lieutenant-governor of Saskatchewan.

#### \$244.50 COLLECTED IN FINES IN SEPTEMBER

Chief Vickers' report for the month of September, presented to the police commission yesterday, showed that 42 cases were before the court during the month. There were 36 convictions, 5 cases were dismissed and one is still pending.

Fines to the amount of \$244.50 were collected. This is a considerable increase over the amount collected in August. Two \$50 fines for selling liquor to Indians helped to bring up the total. The operating expenses for the month were \$792.

**BENEVOLENT NEUTRALITY**

The decision of Greece to declare a "benevolent neutrality" towards the entente powers is the latest development in Balkan diplomacy. It looks like a case of trying to run with the hares and hunt with the hounds. If Greece is neutral, it seems clear that the Allied troops which have been landed in Salonika should be interned. If the qualifying of the neutrality by the insertion of the word "benevolent" means that the Allied troops now in Greece are to be allowed to proceed to the defence of Serbia, the Kaiser will be apt to regard a "benevolent neutrality" toward the entente powers as an act of war against Germany and Austria.

**SOUTH AFRICAN SITUATION**

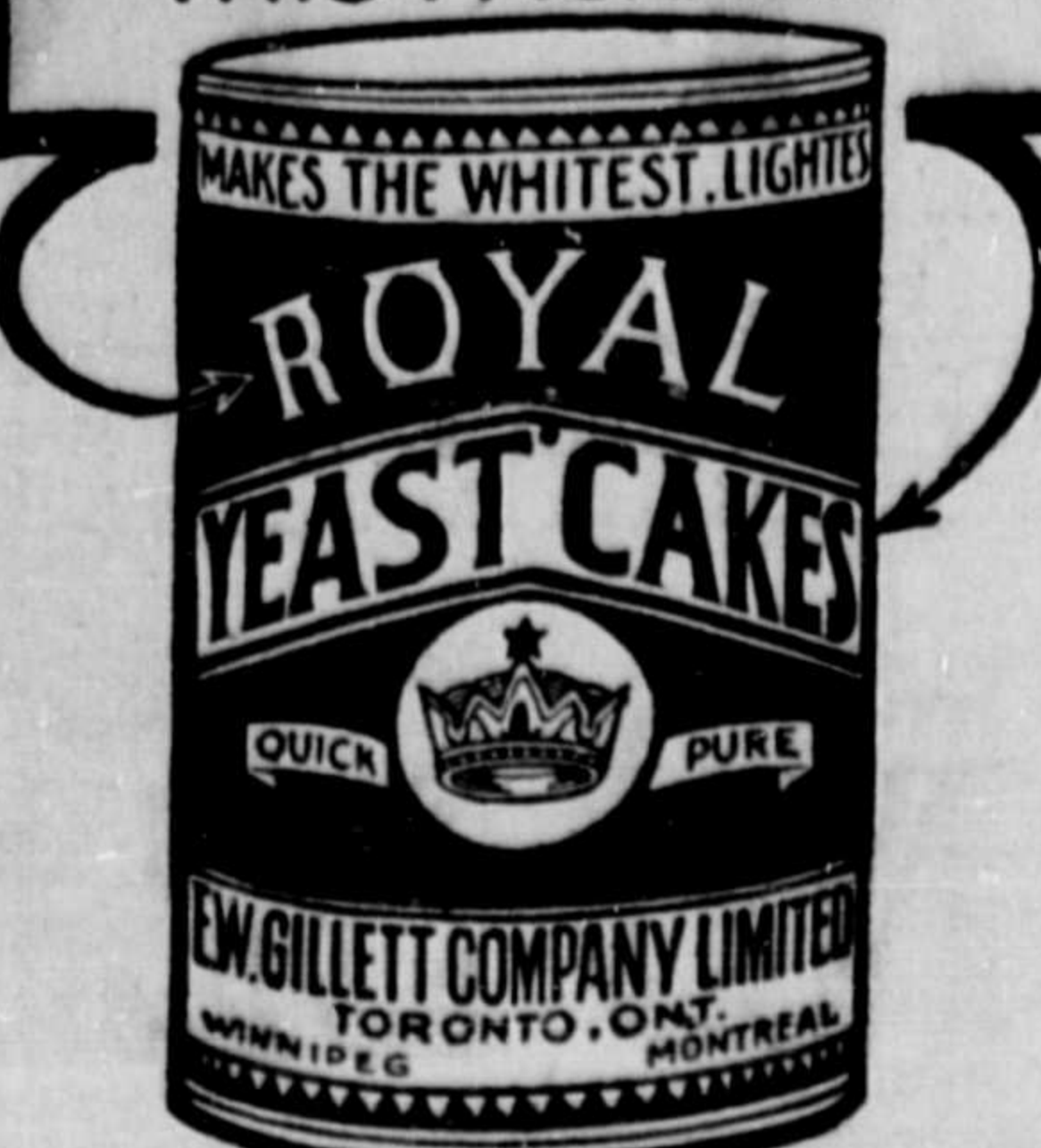
"The British government is to us a foreign government." In these words General Hertzog, leader of the Nationalist party in the South African Union, stated his position and that of his followers at a recent meeting in Pretoria. The Nationalists are raising in the election to be held in mid-October the question of the future relations of South Africa to the Empire. General Hertzog asserts that it is clearly the intention immediately after the war to form a federal government for the Empire, with its seat in London. He intends to fight Federal Imperialism to the utmost, and as a first step proposes to unhorse General Botha, who is appealing as premier for a renewal of his lease of power.

The campaign is of an exceptionally bitter nature. Behind Hertzog stand all the elements which gave either open or secret support to the rebellion of Maritz, a rebellion that had for its avowed object the setting up of an independent nation in South Africa in which the Dutch would be dominant. To Hertzog's Cave of Adullam all the discontented are flocking, and he expresses sympathy with all their grievances. The rebellion, he declares, was due in the first place to nothing

else than neglect and contempt of the feelings and traditions of the people, and the fact that no account had been taken of those thin, invisible bonds that bound them to the past. He had no hesitation, he declared, in espousing their cause, rebels or no rebels. From these statements it is quite manifest that if Hertzog wins and the Nationalists come to power the government of the South African Union will take no interest in the great struggle now going on in Europe, and will do nothing toward equipping or despatching the South African contingent for which recruiting is now in progress.

General Botha's position is equally clear. He stands for a self-governing South Africa within the Empire, for a union in which Briton and Boer shall have equal rights, and in which parties shall not be formed on racial lines. He asserts that the rebellion was engineered by the governor of German Southwest Africa for the benefit of Germany, with the knowledge and consent of the Kaiser. The intention was to make South Africa a great German dominion. One of the most interesting discoveries made in German Southwest Africa was a map showing the redistribution of the world after "the peace of Rome, 1914." This map indicates the whole of Africa south of the Equator as a great German Empire, with a very small portion marked "Boer Reservation." The German Emperor, in answer to a letter from the governor of German Southwest Africa, had written: "I will not only acknowledge the independence of South Africa, but I will even guarantee it, provided the rebellion is started immediately." This was doubtless another "scrap of paper" intended to be torn up and repudiated at a more convenient season, and Botha mentioned it merely to prove that the Boers who followed Maritz because they wanted an independent South Africa were really being used to promote Germany's settled policy of conquering South Africa for herself. General Botha declared that because of the German plot to possess the Union it was impossible to return

Southwest Africa to the Germans, and he proposed that it should be colonized and held as part of the Union.

Botha the Empire builder and Hertzog the Boer reactionary stand out as the two great figures in the election. The forces of Botha are undoubtedly weakened by the hostility of organized labor. Trades unionists have neither forgotten nor forgiven the deportation of their leaders during the labor troubles shortly before the outbreak of war, and they are contesting practically all the urban seats. They may divide the vote of the British electorate in not a few urban seats so that a Nationalist may slip in between the candidate of the South African party—which is the official name of the Botha ministry's supporters—and the Labor representatives. Hertzog's strength lies mainly in the Orange Free State among the back veldt Boers, but there Botha is conducting a vigorous campaign and contesting every seat. The reactionaries may unhorse him, but even were he to be driven from power he would still remain the greatest of South Africans—a tower of strength against racialism in the politics of the Union.—Toronto Globe.

## INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT MACHINE GUNS

Against machine guns the rifle-man is helpless, a military expert remarked recently; and he was right. Actual tests of machine guns have shown them to be superior to picked marksmen. At a test in this country some time ago, forty-two first-class shots were pitted against one Maxim, each side firing one minute at a target representing infantry in line, at a distance which was unknown, but which was actually 1,000 yards. These were the results: forty-two men, 408 rounds, 62 hits; machine gun 228 rounds, 69 hits; although the Maxim spent some time in getting the range.

can discharge 600 rounds a minute.

In the British army at the beginning of the war the number of machine guns was two to each battalion or cavalry regiment. In the German army there was an extraordinary development of the machine gun sections shortly before the war. Indeed, the enemy is stated to have taken the field with 50,000 of these weapons, so that each German battalion must have had ten, if not more, which gave them an enormous advantage above the Allies at the outset.—Ex.
