SUSPECTED THUG IS SHOT AT VANCOUVER

 Vancouver, Oct. 30.—W. M. Fortune, a suspected thug, was shot in the back by Detective Im-lah during a chase along Powell St. early this morning. Fortune is believed to have been an accomplice of Griffith Sergeant, who committed a murderous attack on two Japanese on Powell St., with intent to rob them. One of the Japs had \$400 in his belt.
 Fortune broke away after being arrested and refused to stop when ordered. Sergeant was arrested by Constable Irwin.

FRENCH TROOPS CAPTURE STRUMITZA AND ADVANCE

BULGARIANS LOSE HEAVILY AND FRENCH PENETRATE INTO BULGARIA TWENTY MILES—SERBIANS IN A BAD PLIGHT—NISH THREATENED—RUSSIAN ARMY EMBARKS

(Special to The Daily News.)
 London, Oct. 30.—The French, after three days fighting, have occupied Strumitza, and have advanced into Bulgarian territory for a distance of twenty miles. The Bulgarians lost heavily in the encounter.

Nish Threatened.

The position of Serbia is becoming more desperate daily, and Nish is threatened by the Bulgarians.

The Germans are opening a way to the great Serbian arsenal at Kraguyevatz. The Serbians are retreating in a westerly direction along the Bulgarian front.

Russians Embarking.

Copenhagen, Oct. 30.—A large Russian army has embarked at Odessa for the Bulgarian ports in the Black Sea. It is conveyed by a strong naval squadron.

SAD DOUBLE FATALITY NEAR SKEENA CITY

An extremely sad accident occurred just before noon yesterday on the G. T. P. at mile 43, in which W. D. Tippens, train agent, and J. Herstig, engineer, lost their lives. Mr. Tippens was agent on the way freight, which pulled out of Prince Rupert about 8:30 yesterday morning. The fish special, which left later, was due to pass the freight at Kwinitza, about two and a half miles from where the accident occurred. Owing to something having gone wrong, the freight had stopped and someone sent to flag the special. The warning, however, was too late to save contact, although the special was able to slow down considerably. The caboose of the freight, from which Mr. Tippens was about to alight, was smashed, and the engine of the special turned over on the embankment towards the river. Mr. Tippens was killed instantly, while Mr. Herstig sustained such injuries that he died shortly after the accident.

General Superintendent Mehan, on learning of the accident, immediately despatched a special with medical aid. The bodies were brought to town on the special just ahead of the passenger last night. All the circumstances are being thoroughly investigated by the company.

GERMAN FORCE LURED TO DESTRUCTION BY RUSSIANS

SPECTACULAR FIGHT ON ISLAND IN RIVER DVINA—GERMAN FORCE PRACTICALLY WIPED OUT—THE GERMAN POSITION CRITICAL—HESPERIAN WAS SUNK BY TORPEDO

London, Oct. 30.—The Russians annihilated a German force in a spectacular fight on the Island of Dalen, in the River Dvina, south of Riga. The Russians lured the Germans to occupying the island and then started a bombardment from both sides of the river. The river was choked with German corpses. The German force was practically wiped out.

THE KING INJURED

It will be the sincere hope of every Briton that the short despatch relating to the accident to King George stated fully the extent of the King's injuries and that, in the course of a few days, he will again be fit and well. Britain's sailor King is taking as active a part in the war as his position will permit, while his heir is right in the heart of the fighting on the western front. King George is the idol of the navy, and is just as popular with "Tommy Atkins" as he is with Jack. On the sea, in the trenches, and in every corner of Great Britain and her dominions there will be anxious waiting for a fuller report of the accident coupled with the hope that we know the worst.

THE BALKANS

There is a decidedly more encouraging tone about the despatches coming from the Balkan front. The arrival of another big force of French troops with a hundred big guns should put new heart into the Serbians, who have done well to hold the Austro-Germans to an advance of a comparatively few miles in the north.

The most important news from the near east is that of the Russian attack on Varna in the Black Sea. If Russian troops can be landed at this point, they will be able to draw a large Bulgarian force around them and thus relieve the situation in Serbia to a tremendous extent. Another important point is the proximity of Varna to the Roumanian frontier. If the Russians carry out a successful attack and effect a landing, there is a likelihood of Roumania plucking up courage and joining the Allies.

Roumania has a strong force

along the Bulgarian border which would prove a deciding factor in the struggle. There can be little doubt that Roumania is simply awaiting the right moment to decide how she is going to act, and it is just possible that the Russian fleet will provide her with an excellent opportunity to jump in.

THE GERMAN SWISS

I have known Switzerland for twenty-four years. I have been through the country twice since the war began and have just returned from a long visit to the principal towns in German and French Switzerland. In the course of this journey I had unique opportunities of judging the various currents in Swiss opinion. I am convinced that the situation is more complex than English people imagine, and that the sympathies of the Swiss do not altogether coincide with the lingual boundaries. One thing is certain. French and Italian Switzerland are much less divided in sentiment than their German speaking compatriots.

French and Italian Switzerland are unanimous in their passionate support of the allied cause. Of this there is no manner of doubt. The French Swiss not only want to win, they want Germany to be beaten and to be decisively beaten. In German Switzerland I never heard a single expression of dislike for the French. In French Switzerland the Germans are about as popular as they are in Paris. In some cases the French Swiss have extended their dislike for anything German to their German-speaking compatriots.

The German Swiss are of a different stock to the Prussian, and their whole tradition of democratic independence is ul-



THE HISTORY OF THE FAMOUS KRUPP

To the genius Krupp Germany owes its military power today. Just over a century ago, Friedrich Krupp, the founder of Germany's greatest arsenal, started a little factory on a small piece of ground at Altenessen, a suburb of Essen. Krupp possessed one great asset; he knew the secret of making crucible steel. It is the irony of circumstances however, that this secret was actually discovered by an Englishman, and it was only a few days ago that Professor John Oliver Arnold said that when shortly before the war he was dining with the manager of Krupp's, the latter boasted that they were making steel ingots weighing 110 tons for guns by the crucible process evolved 175 years ago by Benjamin Huntsman. It is some satisfaction to learn, however, that, according to the Professor, Germans cannot produce Sheffield white crucible steel, the process of making which is a secret handed down from father to son in Sheffield, and that in the North of England we are making ingots weighing 150 tons, while our 12,000-ton presses are capable

KING GIVES HIS HOUSE TO CANADIAN

London, Oct. 29.—His Majesty the King having heard that the Canadian Red Cross were looking for a house in the vicinity of London as a convalescent home, last week commanded the Lord Chamberlain to offer for this object the house and grounds known as Upper Lodge, at Bushey Park, about ten miles from London. General Carlton Jones accepted the offer on behalf of the Canadian Medical Service. The house will be taken over immediately, and will be furnished and equipped by the Red Cross under the superintendence of Colonel Hodgetts, the staff to be drawn from the Canadian Medical Corps.

(Continued From Page Two.) of squeezing out armor-plate like cheese.

At first Friederich Krupp did not profit much by copying Huntsman's secret. Fortune frowned on him. He lacked capital, while quarrels and lawsuits with his partners reduced him to poverty, and he ultimately died in 1826, at the age of forty, leaving a bundle of debts and a factory which consisted of little more than a couple of sheds, in which work was at

a standstill, as a legacy to his wife and children.

Friederich Krupp's widow, however, was a woman of energy and initiative, and with her son Alfred, who was then fourteen years of age, she developed the business with such excellent results that within four years the factory was beginning to gain quite a big reputation.

Genius of the Firm.

And as he grew up Alfred Krupp became the genius of the firm. It was he who in the works at Essen produced the first gun—a three-pounder made of crucible steel—in 1847. Until then, according to Mr. H. Robertson Murray, in his interesting book on Krupp's (Holden and Hardingham), with cast iron and bronze, the limit of big armaments had been practically reached. Crucible steel, however, opened a new vista, and the casting of that three-pounder was the real beginning of the great rise of Krupp, and Essen, which at the time Friederich Krupp established himself there was only a little country town of less than 4,000 inhabitants, grew and grew until it became one of the most important cities in Europe, with a population of

300,000, while the little factory developed until it extended over an area of 500 acres.

The fame of Krupp was first brought to the notice of the world during the Franco-German war, for to the power of the Krupp guns was mainly attributed the failure of the French artillery, the Krupp gun being of crucible steel, which gave it many advantages over the French guns of cast iron and bronze.—Ex.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

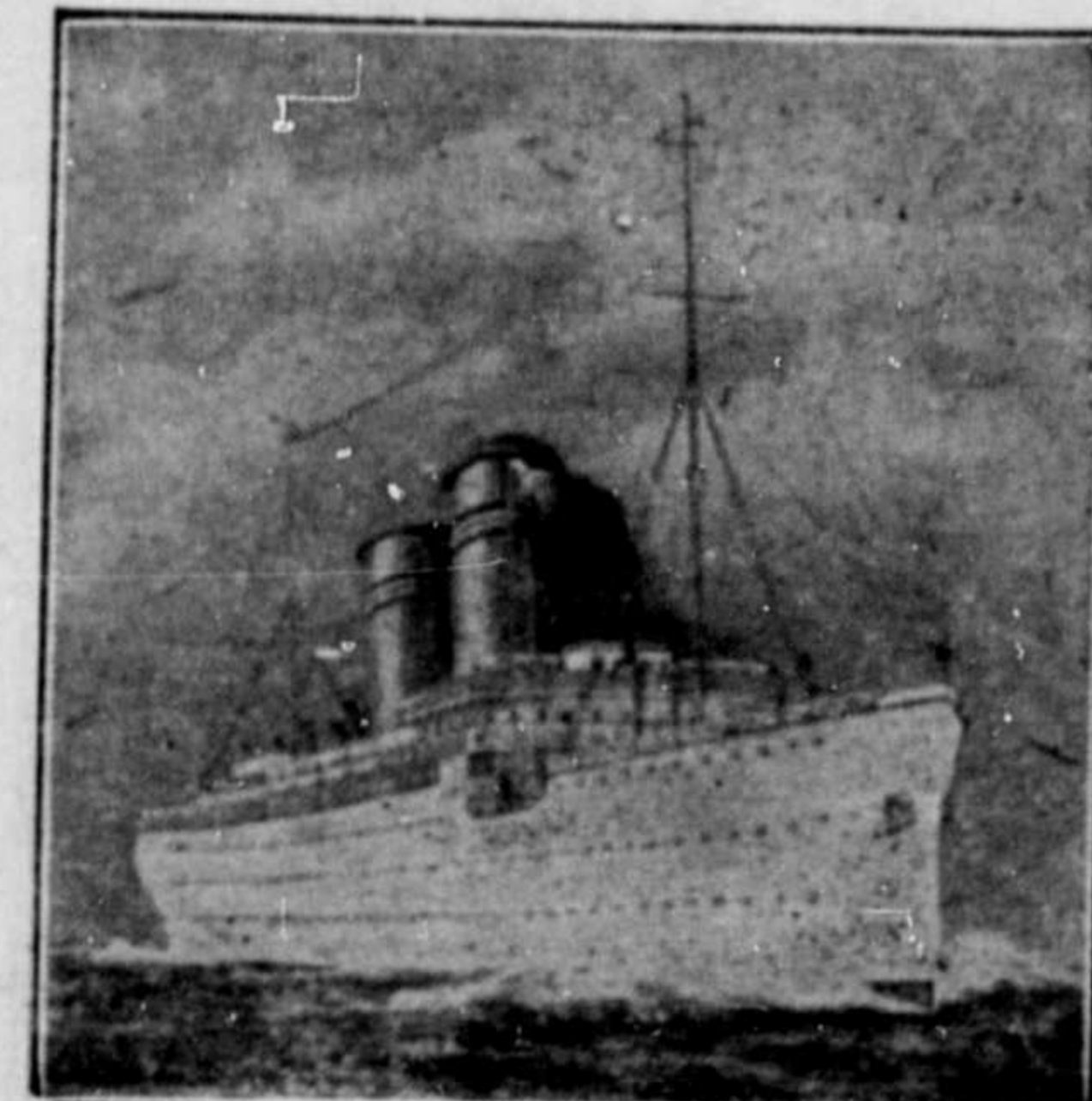
- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
