VON HINDENBURG RETREATS FIFTEEN MILES

GREEK PREMIER RESIGNS--BRITISH TROOPS IN SERBIA--RUSSIANS FOR BULGARIA

FIRST BRITISH CONTINGENT NOW OPERATING IN SERBIA

FRENCH TROOPS ARRIVING AT SALONIKI DAILY—SERBIANS ARE FIGHTING STUBBORNLY IN RETREAT—ALLIES ARE BUSY IN MACEDONIA—KING PETER AT FRONT—ZAIMIS RESIGNS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Nov. 4.—The first British contingent, which arrived at Guevigli, forty-five miles northwest of Saloniki on Friday, is now in Serbia and is operating in conjunction with the French troops. French re-inforcements are arriving at Saloniki daily.

Dogged Fighting.

London, Nov. 4.—The Serbians are fighting doggedly in their retreat towards Montenegro, and the Allied forces are now making themselves felt against the Bulgarians in Macedonia. The fighting qualities of the Serbians are unimpaired.

King Peter for Front.

Amsterdam, Nov. 4.—The aged King Peter of Serbia has gone to the front to encourage his soldiers with the news that the British and French are hastening to their assistance.

Zaimis to Resign.

Paris, Nov. 4.—The Zaimis government has been defeated in the Chamber of Deputies on a vote of confidence. The Zaimis administration, which has been in power for only a few weeks, will resign.

It is expected that ex-Premier Venizelos will be asked to form a new cabinet.

Russian Plans.

London, Nov. 4.—The Russians are concentrating a large army at Reni, in Bessarabia, with the object of making a direct landing in Bulgaria.

Reni is an important point on the River Danube on the Roumanian-Bessarabian border. The army will be transported up the Danube and will enter Bulgaria, through the narrowest part of Roumania, at Silistria.

STEAMER MARIPOSA HAS BEEN REFOLOATED

Vancouver, Nov. 4.—The Alaskan steamer Mariposa, which went ashore near Bella Bella some time ago, was re-floated at high tide at 2 o'clock this morning and taken into old Bella Bella harbor for examination. It has been decided to tow her to McLaughlin Bay for repairs.

BERLIN ADMITS THAT GENERAL VON HINDENBURG HAS FAILED

ALL HOPE OF TAKING RIGA OR DVINSK ABANDONED—RUSSIAN TROOPS HAVE CAPTURED CZERNOWITZ—GERMAN SUPER-SUBMARINE NETTED—SPIRITED WORK ON WESTERN FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 4.—Berlin admits the failure of Von Hindenburg. He has been forced to retreat before the Russians for a distance of fifteen miles and has given up hope of being able to capture Riga and Dvinsk.

Czernowitz Taken.

The Russians have captured Czernowitz, the capital of Bukovina.

Super-submarine Netted.

Liverpool, Nov. 4.—A new German super-submarine, launched at Stettin two weeks ago, has been captured in a British trap in the North Sea.

It is reported that she was captured a few hours after leaving her base. She was 250 feet long and carried four heavy guns, in addition to her torpedo tubes.

Two German submarine crews

were buried near Liverpool three weeks ago.

Western Front.

Paris, Nov. 4.—There is spirited fighting with hand grenades in the vicinity of Lille, while an artillery combat is being carried on from the rear lines.

Von Buelow's Denial.

Lucerne, Nov. 4.—Prince Von Buelow, ex-Chancellor of Germany, who has arrived in Switzerland, denies that his arrival there is for the purpose of discussing peace.

G. C. Emmerson has sufficiently recovered from his wounds to be able to do clerical work in the army record office in England. He has been discharged from active service. Mr. and Mrs. Emmerson may remain in England for some time.

WELL KNOWN EASTERN PACKER IS IN THE CITY

H. Gunn, of Toronto, of Gunns, Limited, packers, arrived from the east last night.

In speaking of the cattle trade of the west, Mr. Gunn said they were already receiving from the west a considerable number of cattle and hogs, but they could take all that could be sent forward.

The prices at the present time, he claimed, were quite normal, considering conditions, and he felt, after seeing the possibilities of the west as a cattle and stock-raising country, that in the near future there should be a much greater shipment of live stock from the west to the east.

The facilities for raising of live stock in the west were immense, and with the continued demand the farmers of the west should endeavor to prepare more animals for the market. There is at the present time a considerable demand from the old country, but this demand can only be cared for with the best class of stock. He did not see in the immediate future any prospect of high prices but at the prevailing market prices live stock could be profitably raised by the farmers of both the east and the west.

SEVENTEEN CARS OF FISH WENT EAST TODAY

This morning, a fish extra of twelve cars left for the east, while there were five cars on the passenger, which left later. Seventeen cars of fish shipped by one express company in one day constitutes a record for the Pacific coast, or anywhere else.

During the last three days over half a million pounds of halibut has been landed at Prince Rupert. The month of November has started out so promisingly in this line that it will not be surprising if Prince Rupert returns top those of Seattle.

All along the waterfront the greatest activity has been, and is still being, displayed. During the rough weather of the last few weeks catches were naturally small and, when the weather moderated and fares were more easily got, the schooners and steamers made for the nearest port, which is Prince Rupert.

Prices have been high and some of the boats must have made very satisfactory returns.

Seattle will, of course, get its share of the big catches. In fact there are three schooners with large fares on their way south now. The important point is that Prince Rupert has caught the eastern market first, after the spell of bad weather, and the probability is that, by the time the south-going boats reach Seattle, prices there may be lower than those obtaining in Prince Rupert during the past few days, so that the fishermen who sold here scored all along the line.

PEACE TALK

Hilaire Belloc, the well-known war correspondent and military writer whose forecasts of the cause of the war have so far proved wonderfully correct, states that the Austro-German offensive may entirely break down within two months and that it is impossible that it can continue for more than three months. Mr. Belloc is not in the habit of guessing, but figures out results with mathematical exactitude.

The report that the German ex-chancellor is preparing peace plans for the consideration of President Wilson and King Alfonso of Spain lends color to the belief that the Prussians have had enough of it. However, this is simply more reason why the Allies should pursue the conflict with renewed energy. This war is being waged by the Allies with a view to promoting a permanent peace and such a peace is not possible so long as there is the slightest danger of the Prussian coming back at a later date with fresh battalions. The Allies have no idea of contemplating a peace settlement which would simply resolve itself into a lengthy truce, to be broken when the Kaiser's army has recuperated.

The Allies are seeking to root out from the heart of the German Empire a militarist growth which has been feeding upon the German people for forty years, with an ever increasing appetite. When this has been accomplished, which shall be as beneficial to Germany's truest welfare as it will be to the rest of Europe, there will be real talk of peace, but until the evil power of Prussian militarism has been uprooted and scattered to the winds, the

war must be continued with greater concentration and increased power by Britain and her allies.

UNFOUNDED RUMORS

There is no truth in the rumor that the reason why "The Spoilers" was censored was that the censor thought that it featured British Columbia political life, showing William Manson tied hand and foot along with thirty-seven others, while the bosses had a high old time.

There is a persistent rumor circulating to the effect that the attorney-general knows now that he blundered in stopping the election last April, but Sir Dick can't get him to admit it.

There is a report that Sir Richard McBride's election speeches will begin with "Let us forget the past, and think only of British Columbia's glorious future."

It is stated that the only trouble between Sir Richard and W. J. Bowser now is that they cannot agree as to which is to be leader of the opposition.

It is reported that William Manson is threatening to answer the open letter handed him by the Bella Coola Courier, asking for particulars regarding road superintendent's expenses and a few other little items.

KRUPPS ARE BUILDING CRUISERS FOR HOLLAND

London, Nov. 3.—A dispatch to the Express from Copenhagen says that the Krupps have obtained a contract to build two cruisers for the Dutch government. The vessels will be built at Amsterdam and Rotterdam under immediate control of German engineers.

HOW RUSSIA HAS ACTED AS PROTECTOR

Autocratic Russia has been the creator and protector of more small nations than any other government in Europe, and shown less self-interest in its work than any other nation.

Russia supported Greece in its war of independence and, with France and Great Britain, forced the Turk to recognize the independence of Greece.

Russia broke the yoke of the Turk over Roumania. Indeed, the Crimean war was precipitated by Russian interference to protect the Roumanians, when a revolt in that country had been put down and the Turks were punishing the Roumanians with their usual bitter severity. France and England united to protect Turkey at this time, but as a result of the peace following the Crimean war Roumania was given autonomy under a native prince, which subsequently ripened into actual independence.

So with Serbia and with Bulgaria, each gaining independence by aid of Russian arms and protected by Russia against the invasion of other powers.

Russia entered this war in protection of Serbia. How did the others of the small nations set up by Russia act? Roumania remains

neutral, waiting apparently to cast its strength where it will count the most, that it may acquire accessions of territory when the war closes; Bulgaria is in arms against Russia, and Greece thus far declines to extend aid to Russia or to the other powers which joined with Russia in giving independence to the Greeks. Should Russia emerge from this war victorious, is it not apt to demand for the future the rights as well as the duties of protecting the Balkans? — Seattle P. I.

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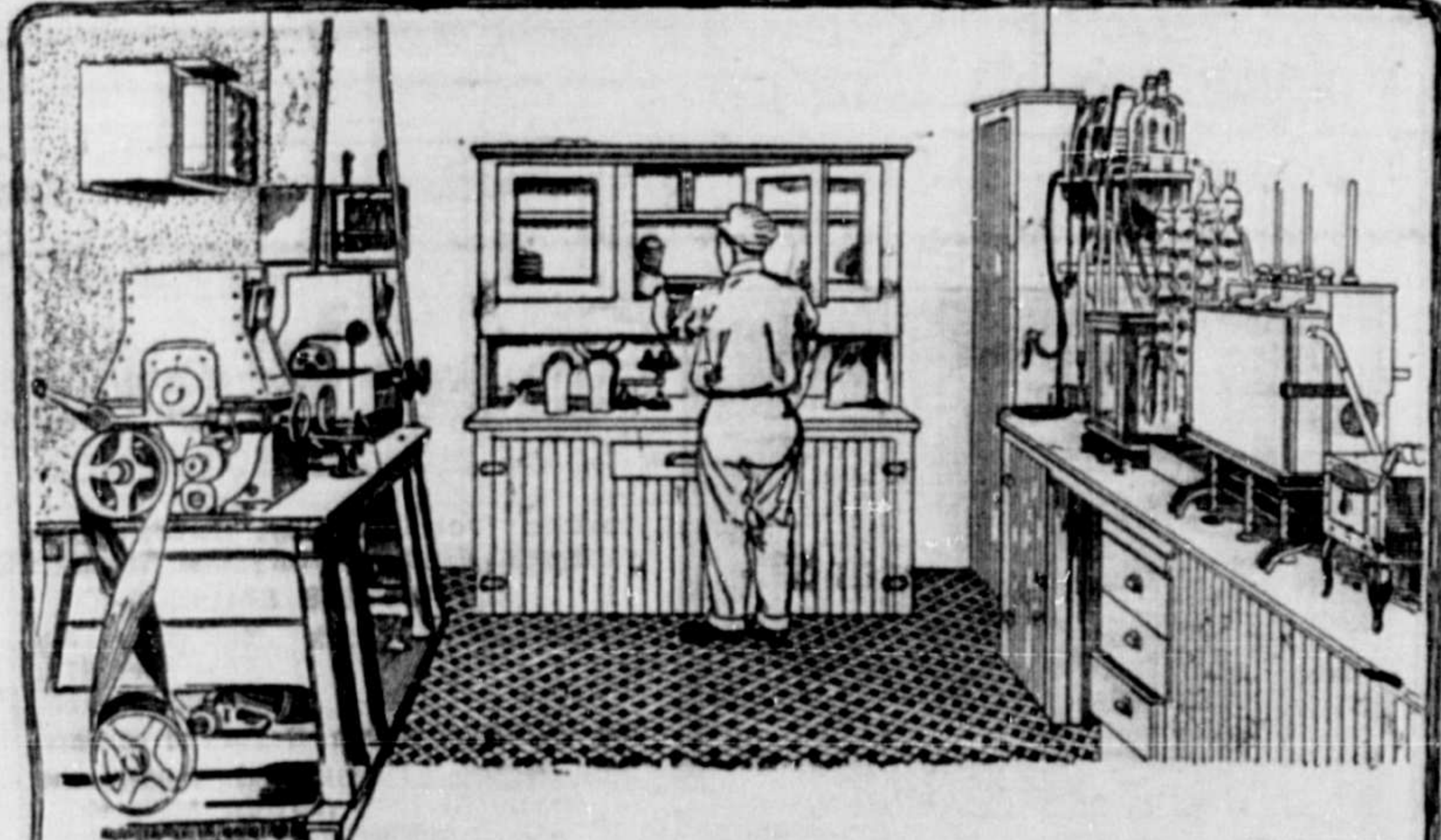

The nursing staff of the general hospital gave a jolly little dance in the Steele Block last night. About twenty-seven couples were present, and everybody had a delightful time.

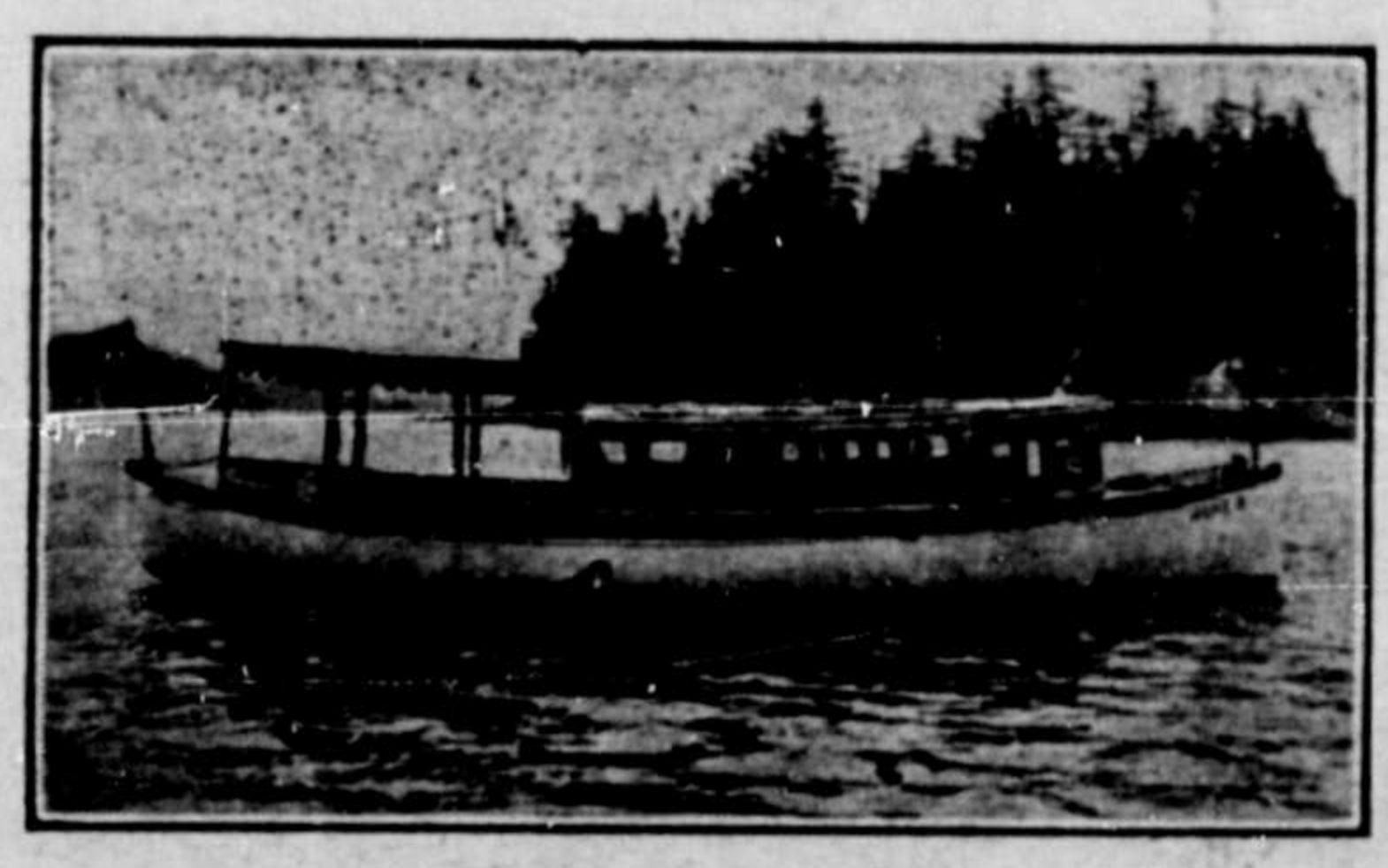

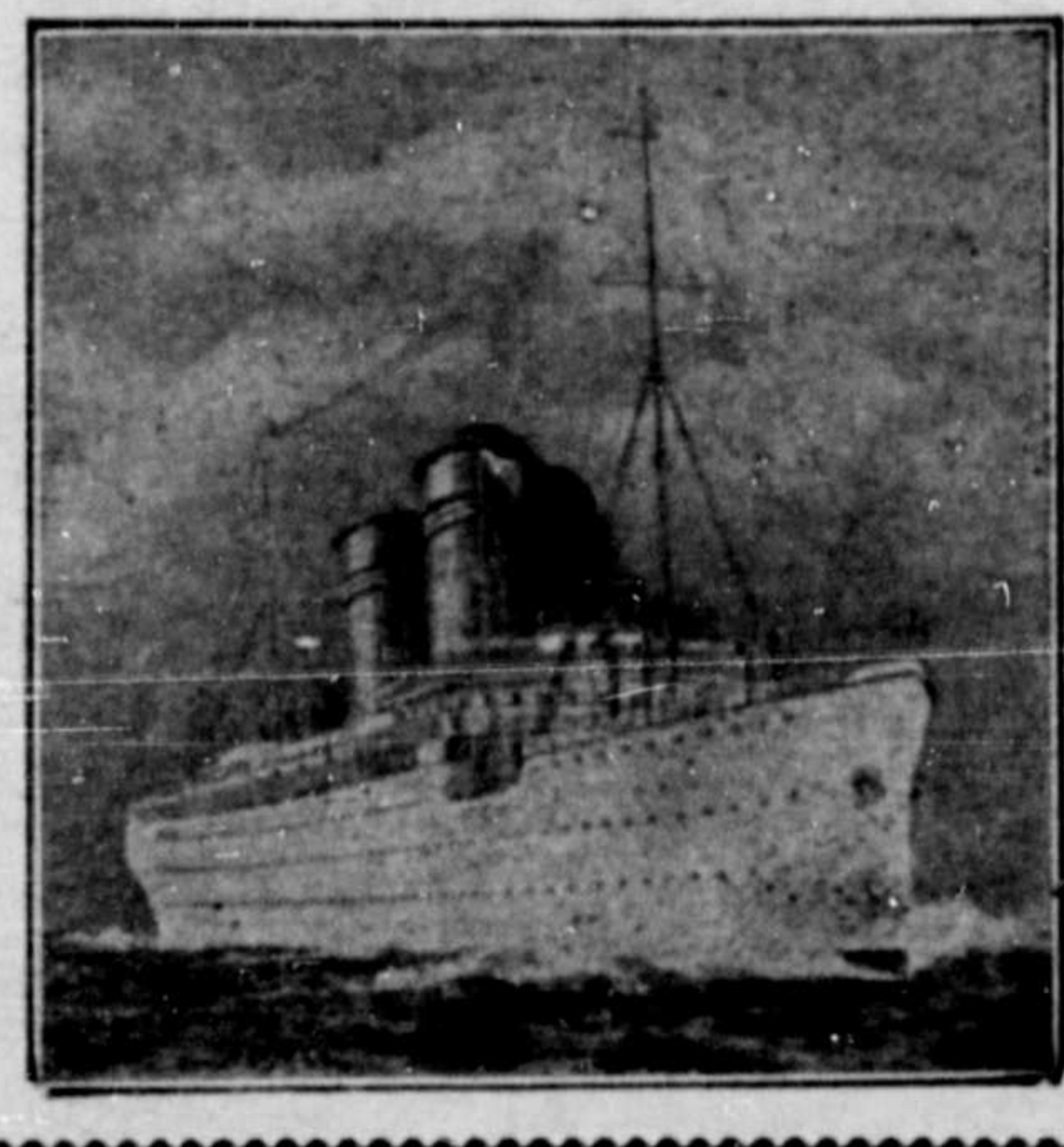
