LORD KITCHENER LEAVES FOR NEAR EAST

BULGARIANS LOSE 80,000 MEN--SOFIA WORRIED--BERLIN REPORTS FALL OF NISH

LIBERALS HAVE CROWDED AND ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING

T. D. PATTULLO DELIVERS ABLE AND STATESMANLIKE SPEECH OUTLINING LIBERAL PLATFORM--ROUSING SPEECHES

The Liberals of Prince Rupert have every reason to feel proud of the success which attended the opening of their new headquarters on Second Avenue last night. In spite of the fact that there were several other gatherings at the same time, and that sleet came down in torrents, the hall was crowded.

A. M. Manson, who presided, referred to the last Liberal meeting, which was just as crowded and full of enthusiasm as this one, when they looked for an early election on the word of the Premier that he had advised the Lieutenant-Governor that he intended to come to the people on important issues. The election was delayed to allow of the preparation of the voters' lists, but months have passed and nothing further has been said. The legislature is in a peculiar situation, and it is just a question whether, after declaring the legislature dissolved, McBride can call another session. Mr. Manson declared that McBride is afraid to come to the people since the socialists, the ministers and thinking men, such as Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper and C. M. Woodworth, are against them. In spite of the fact that the Empire is at war, he did not think it amiss that thinking men should get together and discuss the conditions under which they lived. In spite of the machine, there was grave head shaking these days at the corner of McBride and First Avenue, and every thinking man was satisfied that T. D. Pattullo would be the next representative of Prince Rupert at Victoria. He was a clean, honest business man, who allied himself with such men.

On rising to address the meeting, Mr. Pattullo received a tremendous ovation.

Mr. Pattullo in opening his speech referred to the particular duties devolving upon the Dominion and Provincial governments at this time, also the necessity of each and every individual doing his part in whatever capacity. While the supreme duty of the Dominion government was the prosecution of the war, coincident therewith careful thought must be given to economic conditions in order to safeguard both the immediate and the distant future. In this regard, upon the provincial governments as well as the Dominion, rests heavy responsibility.

While placing responsibility

upon the governments, individual responsibility must not be forgotten. The man who knowingly votes for incompetence and crookedness is hardly less guilty than the men he votes for. Every man by exercising the best moral qualities within him could do much towards improving not only moral but material conditions. There is no morality that does not observe the good old golden rule, namely, "do unto others as you would have them do unto you." The power to do certain things did not necessarily make right or wise the doing of them. In fact to do them might be grossly immoral.

The legislature at Victoria passed a vote of \$80,000 to two favorites of the government for no adequate services rendered. The fact that the legislature possessed the power of giving that vote the validity of law, did not give it the validity either of right or of morality. No doubt the Prime Minister of the Province would tell us that he was strictly conforming to the Golden Rule in making this grant, namely that he was doing unto others as he would have them do to him, but the speaker had a different viewpoint. He would call it legalized stealing. How many of the forty members supporting that transaction stopped to think of the moral obliquity involved in it? Because the power of making the laws is in your own hands, does not make right iniquities that you may carry out under this power.

The government at Victoria had lost even a semblance of a proper perspective of the fitness of things. So long had it been engaged in debauching the electorate through public works and jobs, and promises of public works and jobs, that it had itself become callous just as criminals in long practice become callous.

Speaking of every individual doing his part at this critical time, that part was valuable however humble it might be. It was not necessary that everyone should be performing some especially heroic act in the open of the public eye in order to be doing a worthy service. He had no sympathy for or commendation of the spectacular action of the prime minister of the province in buying submarines at highly fictitious values for the protection of our coasts. While it was a direct implication that the Ottawa government was derelict in its duty and a slap, too, at the British Admiralty, it was in line with the whole career of the first minister of this province whose chief concern was to appear in the limelight of popularity, to attain which end the first minister did not hesitate to desecrate the flag that has braved a thousand

years the battle and the breeze. The speaker had no respect for a man who would wrap himself up in the old flag with loud acclamations of patriotic sentiment while at that very moment he was despoiling the people both of their money and the natural resources of the province.

"I believe," said Mr. Pattullo, "that all grafters in war time ought to be shot, but I am not sure that they are deserving of a better fate in time of peace."

If the government instead of buying submarines and dealing with matters outside its jurisdiction, had done well the things within the sphere of its legitimate activity, we would not today have to witness the departure from this province of thousands of good men and their families because of the impossibility of making a living, nor would we have to suffer the knowledge that of those remaining in the province an all too large percentage are just hanging on to the ragged edge in the earnest hope that conditions may change and that in some manner more affluent circumstances may be the lot of all.

Proceeding, Mr. Pattullo said that a number of people had said to him that while they believed that what he had stated of the provincial government was true, they wanted to know what the Liberals proposed to do and what guarantee there was that the Liberals would do any better than the Conservative government. "One guarantee" said Mr. Pattullo, that they will do better is that they could not possibly be worse. Another is that the time is opportune. The public is in the mood for it and a new government will be free from entangling alliances which would prevent the present government from making any reforms even if it so desired.

"However," added Mr. Pattullo, "I shall tell you a few of the things that a new administration

London, Nov. 6.—The Morning Post states that Lord Kitchener has been entrusted with an important mission in the near east and has already departed from London.

Bulgarians Routed.

British Cavalry and French infantry have assisted the Serbians in routing the Bulgarians at Babuna Pass. The victory assures the safety of Monastir and Prilip, and may lead to the recapturing of Uskup.

Sofia Anxious.

According to an Athens despatch, the total Bulgarian losses in Serbia are established as 80,000.

There is great anxiety in Sofia because of the Serbs being able to increase their resistance on the eastern front.

No Greek Assistance.

All hope of Greek assistance has been dissipated by the news that Premier Zaimis has consented to reconstruct his cabinet, and that parliament has been dissolved.

Berlin Report.

Berlin reports that Nish has been captured and that 3,000 Serbians have been taken prisoners.

German Submarines Busy.

Paris, Nov. 6.—German submarines have again passed through the Straits of Gibraltar and on Thursday sank two French steamers and one Italian ship. One crew is missing.

Eastern Front.

Petrograd, Nov. 6.—An official despatch announces that 1,000 Austrians have been killed west of Dvinsk.

Russian warships are assisting the defence of Riga by shelling the German land positions on the Gulf of Riga.

Western Front.

Paris, Nov. 6.—Fresh German attacks upon the French base at Lacourtine have resulted in failure and heavy losses to the enemy.

British Steamer Afire.

Halifax, Nov. 6.—The British steamer Rio Lagos has arrived here on fire by an incendiary bomb. She was loaded with sugar by Austrian and German stevedores at Queenstown. She took fire when four days out. The fire has now been quelled.

A MANLY SPEECH

At the great Liberal meeting last night, T. D. Pattullo, Liberal candidate for Prince Rupert, delivered an able, statesmanlike speech. He applied the searchlight of sound common sense to the Conservative defences, and then proceeded to riddle them with deadly precision. He drew a picture of British Columbia bound, gagged and helpless, and at the mercy of a Conservative boss-rule which had squandered the timber, coal and agricultural resources of the province, while any enterprising individual who endeavored to do real development work was met at every turn by unjust licenses. So far as the ordinary individual is concerned, it has been a case of applying to Bowser, or his satellites, for permission to walk the earth and breathe the air of British Columbia.

It was a fighting speech, every word of which rang true. It was not the speech of a whimpering camp follower who will go to Victoria and beg for a share of "the stuff," but that of a MAN who will demand that justice to the people be done, not only in his own constituency, but throughout the province. It was the straightforward speech of a business man who will honestly strive to the last ounce to rescue British Columbia from the tangle of graft and corruption into which it has been flung.

Mr. Pattullo places the welfare of British Columbia and Canada far above party gain or political expediency. In outlining the Liberal platform, he did not sail up into the clouds and promise to hand down the moon. In clear, lucid terms, he dealt with the development of the resources of the province along sane, businesslike lines, providing for the sustenance of our population, as against the enrichment of the capitalist. In dealing at length with Workmen's Compensation he showed that the Liberals had for years demanded an adequate compensation act, and stated that such an act would be immediately passed by the Liberal administration, while the Conservatives are content to dangle a tentative act before the public as political bait. Mr. Pattullo showed that he had an intimate knowledge of conditions in this part of the province, and that he is just the man to assist in the wholesale house-cleaning which is long overdue.

JUGGLING

The Journal attempts some crude juggling when it tries to explain away the overpayments made to J. W. MacFarlane, the Bella Coola road and vote boss. The public accounts, from 1st April, 1913, to March 31st, 1914, distinctly show that this man received wages for 243 days at \$5.50, 122 days at \$5.50 and one month at \$155. The

Journal suggests, with Masonian ingenuity, that the amounts covered two years, but the accounts are against it, and William Manson says the accounts are correct. Wherever arrears have been paid, in other instances, the accounts state so expressly. It is up to the Journal to try some more juggling.

will endeavor to carry out," and he proceeded to deal with them.

Financial Housecleaning.

There must be a thorough investigation into the financial affairs of the province. A financial housecleaning would divulge the improper application of millions against the hundreds of thousands in Manitoba where Ministers of the Crown are now standing trial for fraud and perjury. Long since more than enough has already come to light to indicate clearly just what has been going on for years.

The credit of the province has greatly suffered through the huge railway guarantees and has suffered also through the knowledge of the outside world that the administration of affairs is in the hands of men who have been exploiting the resources of the province for personal gain.

A financial housecleaning by a new administration will do much to restore the confidence of the investing public in B. C. securities.

Develop Our Resources

Every energy must be bent towards opening up and developing our natural resources so that our population may become self-sustaining. Too much stress could not be laid upon this point. If this plan had been begun ten years ago we would not now be in the uncomfortable position in which we now find ourselves.

Timber.

In the matter of timber we have some of the finest in the world, yet for years the lumber trade has languished. Instead of mouthing nebulous nothings about the wonders of B. C., if the government had turned its serious attention in a common sense way to assisting the lumbering interests to find and retain a ready market, that business would be on a very different basis today. The representative of this district would probably say that the lumber business was now being carefully investigated by the Minister of Lands. A friend of Mr. Pattullo's had told him that he had received more than a dozen letters from the representative of this district over a period of a couple of years and each letter advised him that the subject matter was being carefully investigated.

The Liberal party favors a policy of timber for actual users only. At the present time there are large areas held for speculative purposes which cannot be made use of for years. It is a

crime to alienate the resources of the province in this manner. Mr. Bowser would no doubt say that this means that these limits will inevitably fall back into the hands of the government and that therefore, the government is ahead the governmental charges. Mr. Bowser would gloat over this prospect just as he did in connection with the unpaid-for lands upon the occasion of the evening of abuse in which he indulged in Vancouver in a vain attempt to reply to the charges made by the Ministerial Union in their pamphlet called "The Crisis." The manner in which Bowser would boastfully do up his friends, the speculators, is nothing to the manner in which his administration has done up the public of British Columbia for the past years, a process which was only made possible through the easy going acquiescence of members of the calibre of our own representative.

Many areas of timber also are held which could not properly be classed as timber because they can never be logged upon a large scale. These should be thrown open to handloggers. Also many of these are held between pre-emptions, thus scattering settlement, which is a mistake.

Agriculture.

Our agricultural areas must be developed. Conditions are usually adverse to the starting of a project due to competition from older communities, but these difficulties are gradually overcome. A carefully conceived plan of community settlement must be worked out so that instead of settlers being scattered as at present, thus rendering the maintenance of roads, schools, mail delivery, etc., impossible, all these facilities may be afforded.

The Liberal platform provides for loans to settlers upon easy terms, but there are other considerations also which enter into the problem, such as the marketing of the produce and all these things must be taken into account. If a comprehensive scheme had been begun years ago we would not now be importing the huge amount of agricultural products which we now do.

Mining.

Encouragement should be given to the mining industry. No better man lives than the genuine miner. Not the fireside miner who sits around a warm stove telling of the hills that he is going to pull down, but the good old sourdough who puts a pack on his back, treads a trailless tract and burrows into the hills, giving to the world new and untold wealth for the benefit of generations to come. Tangible assistance can be and should be given to legitimate prospects.

Fishing.

No opportunity should be overlooked to encourage this industry. It should be removed from the

field of monopoly. The Almighty did not put the fish in the sea for the special exploitation of Bowserites and the industry should be freed from unjust and irritating regulations and licences.

Removal of Unjust Licences.

We must also remove a lot of other irritating and unjust licences which are now collectable. The outside man, that is the man who works outside, can hardly move without paying a license. Fish license, gun license, loggers' license, trappers' license, and so on. Some men do a little of all these things each year, so that one can imagine what a burden it is. Unjust licenses must be removed.

Manufacturing.

With the timber, mining, agricultural and fishing industries developed, who could doubt the prosperity of this province and with the development of these industries would come the more rapid development of manufacturing industries. Every day this province is getting closer to a basis of equality with eastern centres of competition.

The Government's Duty.

The paramount duty before us is the development of our resources and in this the government must take a prominent part. We need pay very little attention to the buncomb that the government might assume too many functions of the private individual. The speaker believed that whenever the best needs and the good of the community as a whole demands governmental action, it is the duty of the government to take that action.

Apart from the development of our natural resources, Mr. Pattullo referred to many other requirements all of which he explained were part of the Liberal platform.

Coal Mines.

For instance, "Government coal mines to develop cheap fuel." The government should not hesitate to step in and regulate the operation of coal mines now existing so that the consumer might obtain coal at a reasonable price, also that those who work in the mines should have every protection of life and limb.

Workmen's Compensation Act.

The Liberal party is pledged to immediately pass an adequate Workmen's Compensation Act. The present government knowing that this had been a plank in the Liberal platform for years, appointed a commission in this matter and last session a bill was laid on the table of the legislature as a consequence of the report of that commission, but no action was taken. McKenzie and Mann took good care of that. Although the attorney-general recently lauded the perfections of this bill, he has since appointed another commission, one member of which is a member of the

ser-McBride administration. Defeat these forty members, or a majority of them and you burst up the gang that has been looting the province for years in a manner which makes the Manitoba thefts look like thirty cents.

The Liberal platform provides that, when a prisoner is liberated from jail, he shall be provided with sufficient money to take him to his home. In view of the investigation which will be held when a Liberal administration takes office, this plank in the Liberal platform will no doubt appeal to many of the Conservative leaders, especially to the attorney-general who showed sufficient foresight of coming events at the last session of the legislature as to provide a salary for the leader of the opposition.

Misrepresentations.

Mr. Pattullo went on to say that the representative for this district and his supporters had been trying very hard all year to misrepresent him before the electors throughout the district. Many of the things circulated were too petty to pay any heed to them. One matter which the representative for this district had himself mentioned he would refer to for a moment.

Public Ownership.

There is a plank in the Liberal platform which provides for the public ownership of public utilities and Mr. Manson had cited the Hydro electric system of the city of Prince Rupert as an evidence that Mr. Pattullo was not in accord with this plank in the Liberal platform. "You will remember," said Mr. Pattullo, "that at the time I was mayor of this city, we submitted two light and power proposals to the electors of the city to pass judgment upon. I took no aggressive part as to either project. I gave to the public the fullest possible information as to both proposals that was available to us and asked the public to render a decision. No intelligent man, at all events, no man of stronger intelligence than prejudice, could construe the course which I took as repugnant to the plank in the Liberal platform providing for the public ownership of public utilities. However, no matter what any man may think of my attitude upon this plank of the Liberal platform we do know this, that Mr. Manson supports body and soul the gov-

ernment which gave away all the water rights in this district, which rendered public ownership of public utilities impossible until the rights should be re-acquired by the public, and the present source of our water and power supply, Woodworth Lake, was purchased from a former president of the Conservative Association in Vancouver during the time that Mr. Manson was mayor of the city, for \$15,000. Of course a \$15,000 graft may be small compared to many that have taken place in Victoria, but if you take the thousands of similar grafts during the past dozen years and add them together you will realize why the province with all its resources and its tremendous revenues obtained from the sale of our capital assets, nevertheless, now owes some ten million dollars more than it did when the McBride administration first came into office.

Mr. Manson was having hard work to find any real argument against the candidacy of the speaker, but he was not depending upon argument. He is depending upon the power of the pap. He endeavors to make every district believe that every other

district is strongly in his favor in order to frighten them into his support. Manson's argument that it would be a bad thing to have an opposition member in the house is now being used against Manson himself, because the people are coming to the conclusion that the McBride government is doomed to defeat and that Manson would make a poor opposition member.

Mr. Pattullo said that although he was not yet member for the district—though he was getting closer to it every day—he had received advices that the raking over the coals which he had given the government for the outrageous roadwork throughout the district, had resulted in better work being done and that some improvement also had occurred in the hiring of men. The Liberal candidate, however, is properly being given the credit for this improvement.

Concluding, Mr. Pattullo said, "the fact is that it is time for a change and the people know it. Every day's delay in bringing on the election is another nail in the coffin of the government. Public sentiment at this time is too strong either to be bought off or hoodwinked and the McBride government is going, not to oblivion, because, alas, they have left too much to remember, but to a severe and stinging defeat."

Mr. Pattullo resumed his seat amidst loud and prolonged cheering.

H. L. Harris, late editor of the Bella Coola Courier, who followed Mr. Pattullo, told in a humorous strain some of the fearful and wonderful doings of the Tory machine in Bella Coola. He showed how one road superintendent figured on the payroll for one year; for 1 month @ \$155, 243 days @ \$5.50, and 122 days @ \$5.50. With no work on Sundays, this spell required a year of 451 days. He recounted in minute detail, referring to the public accounts, instance after instance of the crooked work and party favoritism carried out by R. O. Jennings and others at the instigation, or with the permission of William Manson. He cited cases where gross incompetence on the part of political bosses had squandered thousands of dollars of public money. He showed where one official, disgusted at the work which was bringing the government into disrepute in the district, protested at Victoria and was promptly fired for his pains.

He described the building of the Bella Coola jail seven feet below

the level of the river. When the river flooded it, the constable had to release his prisoners and flee. The speaker referred to Dr. Young's coal deal as the commencement of government control of coal mines. He pointed out how the government recognised different grades of British subjects. When challenged on this point, William Manson said it was to "keep the voters' list clear of the scum of southern Europe."

F. H. Mobley said he could parallel the cases quoted by Mr. Harbin with instances of his own observing all over the province from north to south. (A voice—"what about Nanaimo"). Mr. Mobley said the state of affairs which existed in Nanaimo were a disgrace to humanity.

In Atlin, he found the people thoroughly dissatisfied, and it was the same in the south. There was no possible doubt about the result of the election. In the new administration, all classes and sects must be represented in order to conduct the proper business of the province. Had a Liberal government been guilty of such work as the McBride government, he would have voted them down as he did twelve years ago. The crisis had called forth clean, honest business men who had never touched politics before, and they could not be accused of wanting into power to steal, as there was nothing left.

Fred Stork, in a short, breezy speech, reminded the audience that they were on an historical spot, for there, at the time of the Manson-Kergin election, they had warned the people against the C. N. R. deal, and of what B. C. was coming to. British Columbia had been drunk from an era of speculation, but now it was getting down to sober facts and brass tacks. At that time everybody was making money and nothing mattered; today it is a struggle to make a living. The crisis has to be faced, and north, south, east and west the McBride government is doomed. In Atlin, where he was recently with Mr. Mobley, that gentleman will be elected by a large majority, and when the Tories count the votes in Prince Rupert they will get the biggest shock they ever got.

A. M. Manson, in conclusion, said he found the interior in the same condition as other parts, and farmers were willing to cover many miles to hear Liberal speakers, as they were bound to have a change. He hoped to join Pattullo and Mobley in the House, and then there will be changes.
