## BETHLEHEM PLANT IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

### ITALIAN LINER TORPEDOED — 300 LIVES LOST — ALLIED SUCCESS IN SERBIA

#### SPECTACULAR FIRE DESTROYS BETHLEHEM STEEL CO.'S PLANT

SPARK IN OIL CAUSES OUTBREAK — FIRE BRIGADES OF FIVE TOWNS FIGHT FLAMES — PLANT AND GUNS VALUED AT SEVERAL MILLIONS — WORKMEN NARROWLY ESCAPE

(Special to The Daily News.)

Bethlehem, Pa., Nov. 10.—Early this morning fire destroyed the new machine shop of the Bethlehem Steel Company, Limited. The fire started through a spark falling into a pool of oil. The flames spread with startling rapidity and soon enveloped the whole building. There were 800 men on night work at the time and many of them had narrow escapes from death.

The building was 700 feet long, 250 ft. wide and was four storeys high. The shop was given over entirely to the manufacture of guns. The guns under construction were valued at several millions, while there were over a thousand machines, lathes and drilling machines worth several millions more. The fire departments of five adjacent towns were called in to help fight the fire.

#### THE BISMARK OF BALKAN DIPLOMACY

M. Venizelos, ex-premier of Greece, is known as the "Bismarck of Balkan Diplomacy." He is a widower of fifty-one years of age and has two sons. He is really a Cretan, his father having been expelled from Crete by the Turks.

In the Cretan revolt of 1896 Venizelos donned the Cretan costume and top-boots, and joined the fray, displaying great military prowess. On one occasion, at a Cretan village meeting, a resolution was passed to kill Venizelos. Hearing of it he went to the villagers, explained his aims and then revealed his identity, with the result that the would-be assassins accorded him a vote of confidence. Such is the power of the man.

A barrister by profession, Venizelos first became premier of Greece ten years ago. He has remade Greece. He reformed the navy and army, founded the Balkan League, and has always been a friend and admirer of Great Britain.—Ex.

#### TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

At the Trades and Labor Council meeting last evening the question arose as to the placing of candidates in the field at the forthcoming municipal elections. The legislative committee was instructed to arrange the preliminaries of the campaign and report at the next regular meeting.

The keenest interest is being taken in the work of the Trades Council by the delegates attending, resulting in many questions being brought forward of interest to labor generally.

Credentials were received from C. W. Embleton as delegate for the Bartenders' Union. L. W. Riley was appointed financial secretary.

#### OBITUARY

Deceased was a Bulgarian and was brought to the hospital on October 18th. The funeral will take place from Hayner's Chapel to Fairview Cemetery tomorrow at 3 p. m.

#### ITALIAN — AMERICAN LINER ANCONA IS LATEST VICTIM

OVER 300 LIVES LOST—WOMEN AND CHILDREN MURDERED—TWO GERMAN SUBMARINES SUNK—A BRITISH DESTROYER WRECKED—GERMAN COLLIER SUNK IN THE BALTIC

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Nov. 10.—The Italian-American liner Ancona was torpedoed by an Austrian submarine shortly after leaving Naples for New York. She had 482 passengers on board and a crew of 160. The loss of life is estimated at over 300, including many women and children.

The vessel had been engaged in the Atlantic trade for the past six years and was a steamer of 8,200 tons and 482 feet long. She had never carried munitions, but last trip carried 1,250 Italian reservists from New York to Naples. The Ancona rescued the crew

of the Italian steamer Santa Anna when that vessel took fire in mid-Atlantic last September.

#### German Submarines Sunk.

London, Nov. 10.—A telegram from Algieras, via Madrid, states that a British cruiser has sunk two German submarines in the Straits of Gibraltar.

#### British Destroyer Lost.

The British destroyer Louis has been wrecked in the Mediterranean. No lives were lost.

#### German Collier Gone.

The German collier Cordelia, with 2,000 tons of coal on board, has been torpedoed in the Baltic Sea.

#### FRENCH LEFT WING JOINS FORCES WITH THE SERBIANS

FRENCH DRIVE BULGARIAN ARTILLERY FROM POSITION—THE ALLIES HAVE NOW UNBROKEN LINE TO THE BULGARIAN FRONTIER—300,000 FRESH TROOPS —FRENCH RE-CAPTURE VELES

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 10.—The French left wing has stormed the Bulgarian artillery from its position on Wesen Height commanding Babuna Pass, and has formed a junction with the Serbians, thus completing an unbroken Allied line to the Bulgarian frontier.

The Anglo-French advance from Strumitza is progressing very favorably.

#### RAILROAD DEVELOPMENT IN NORTHERN RUSSIA

It is announced that a railroad from Petrograd to Ekaterina, a port in the Arctic which is free from ice throughout the year, will be open for war traffic at the beginning of November. This new line has been built under the direction of American engineers. An army of 10,000 men, mostly prisoners, have been employed upon it. The terminus on the edge of the Arctic is Ekaterina, on the northern coast of the Gulf of Kola, where large docks and sheds have been constructed. This new railway, with double lines, is 1,220 miles long, and has been built in six months. Boats unlikely to reach Archangel will be able to go to Ekaterina at all seasons.—World Wide.

#### 300,000 Fresh Troops.

Berlin reports that 300,000 Allied troops have been landed at Saloniki.

#### Veles Re-taken.

French forces have re-captured the town of Veles from the Bulgarians.

#### HARDY TRIBESMEN TO AID RUSSIANS

According to Petrograd reports large forces of Kirgiz tribesmen, if not a whole army, are likely to appear in the field after they receive the necessary training.

The Kirgiz population is approximately 12,000,000, and the Russian military authorities are strongly in favor of utilising this hardy material.

The Kirgiz are a people who occupy territory in Russian Turkestan, and speak a Turkish language. They are nomadic, their principal occupation being the rearing of sheep, goats, horses and camels. In the past they have been active allies of the Russians and are fearless fighters.

## RUMORED CHANGES

Rumor is sending Sir Richard McBride back to London, and, though the old dame is proverbially untruthful, she is probably pretty near the truth on this occasion. It is well known that the rupture between Sir Dick and Mr. Bowser, which of course never existed, has never been patched up. Mr. Bowser will be premier.

The same source supplies the information that Thomas Taylor, the minister of public works, and Dr. H. E. Young, minister of education, are to be squeezed out of the cabinet. Why these gentlemen should be asked to retire is not quite clear, as they have not been guilty of any greater offences than the rest of their brethren. Of course the minister of education was caught with some coal stains on his fingers recently, but that only went to show how gifted the gentleman is.

The most doubtful part of the despatch is that which states that Messrs A. C. Flummerfelt, Lorne Campbell and C. E. Tisdall will be called upon to fill the vacancies in the cabinet. This is entirely contrary to Bowser's usual plan of action. Even with the premiership added the Hon. W. J. would feel quite at home with a few extra cabinet positions tacked on to the three or four—or is it five—which he holds already. Cabinet positions are no burden to the illustrious Bill. He thrives on them.

If new men are to be introduced into the cabinet, where does our friend William Manson come in? Surely he is entitled to some consideration, and certainly he would make a cabinet minister after Bowser's own heart. We feel certain he would be a good boy and behave himself and do exactly as he

was told. In fact it would be the next best thing to Bowser holding the portfolio himself. Dame rumor, who started all this trouble, insists that William Manson sat on the fence in the Bowser-McBride squabble as long as he conveniently could, and, when he had to move, came down very gingerly on the McBride side of the fence and got his feet stuck in the mud and couldn't get back again before he was spotted. It is claimed that William got his feet wet and that the circulation in them has not reached normal yet. However, cold feet will be quite fashionable in Victoria soon.

## PLUM PUDDING

The boys at the front must have plum pudding for Christmas, and the ladies of Chapter Hill 60 of the I. O. D. E. are going to see that they get it, and get it straight from Prince Rupert. Every girl in Prince Rupert must get busy right away and prepare plum pudding, put up in tins containing enough for one soldier. The I. O. D. E. are preparing a great Christmas box for the boys and contributions will be received at the Board of Trade rooms, Second Avenue, on Friday first from noon until 6 p.m.

Though plum puddings come first on the list there are hosts of other things which the boys will be delighted to receive. Besides notepaper, pencils, and playing cards, there is a steady demand for mouth organs, chewing gum, chocolate and all kinds of home-made candies. This will be the first Christmas which Prince Rupert boys have spent in the trenches and the girls are determined that it will be as jolly and home-like as a plentiful supply of Christmas dainties can make it. ## PLUM PUDDINGS FOR RUPERT BOYS

At the fortnightly meeting of Chapter Hill 60 of the I. O. D. E. it was decided that members should interest themselves in providing Christmas gifts for the Prince Rupert soldiers at the front.

A plum pudding and candy shower will be held by the girls' chapter in the Board of Trade rooms, Second Ave., on Friday, November 12th, from 12 noon until 6 p. m.

The girls of the chapter are anxious that every girl in Prince Rupert should help to fill the box with good cheer for our boys. The I. O. D. E. recommend the following recipe for plum pudding for the front: 1 1-2 lb. raisins, 1 lb. sultana raisins, 1 3-4 lbs. currants, 2 lbs. brown sugar, 2 lbs. bread crumbs, 2 lbs. finely chopped suet, 1 lb. figs, 6 oz. mixed cand. peel, grated rind of two lemons, 1 oz. nutmeg, 1 oz. cinnamon, 8 table-spoons of brandy, little bitter almonds, and 16 eggs.

Stone and cut raisins and mix all ingredients together, put in tins and boil or steam for three hours. Brandy is not necessary and the same amount of any other fruit juice will do as well. Any other tried recipe would do as well as the above.

Puddings should be cooked in tins small enough for one person. A 12-oz. baking powder tin is a good average size, but any tin with a good, tight cover will answer the purpose. The puddings must be handed in in the tins in which they are cooked. A great variety of things may be sent. The following are desirable: home-made candy, chocolate, gum, mouth-organs, notepaper, playing cards, pencils, soap, etc. Anyone desiring further information regarding Xmas gifts phone Red 333.

## COUNT ZEPPELIN MADE FIRST FLIGHT IN U. S.

Count Ferdinand von Zeppelin, the airship inventor, has admitted that he was the "Count Steiner" who experimented with balloon flight in St. Paul, Minnesota, in 1863. His first aerial trip, he now admits, was made on August 9, 1863, at St. Paul, and it was while he was sailing aloft on that initial trip that the possibilities of aerial navigation and aerial warfare fixed themselves in his mind. He returned to Germany and spent his life and fortune trying to accomplish the task of overcoming the forces of gravitation, winds and weather.

Zeppelin met with many difficulties before he was able to ascend into the clouds, but on August 9th, with no less a distinguished guest than the daughter of the governor, he made his successful flight. Alexander Ramsey, the war governor of Minnesota, was to have journeyed up with him, but was too busy that day. So that little Marion Ramsey was his substitute. Miss Ramsey is now Mrs. C. E. Furness, of St. Paul, and she recalls the balloon ascension.

"I can remember making the flight," she says, "but did not realize until now that the pilot was Count von Zeppelin. I enjoyed my trip and was glad that mother was not there to stop me from going up."

frontier town, and gas was a scarce article. The balloon he used was owned by an army officer, who was experimenting with it as a captive balloon. Zeppelin's determination finally secured enough gas to give the buoyancy for a flight. The thrill of adventure was in his veins, for the count was then only twenty-five years old. While sailing over the forests and lakes, he conceived the idea of the dirigible, the application of power to directing the movements of gas airships. Instead of drifting with the breezes he believed it possible to follow a course, if the proper power machine could be procured. Later on, when the gas engine was perfected, the count was able to secure the needed power, and in his half-century of experimenting since his flight at St. Paul he has demonstrated his theories to be entirely practical.

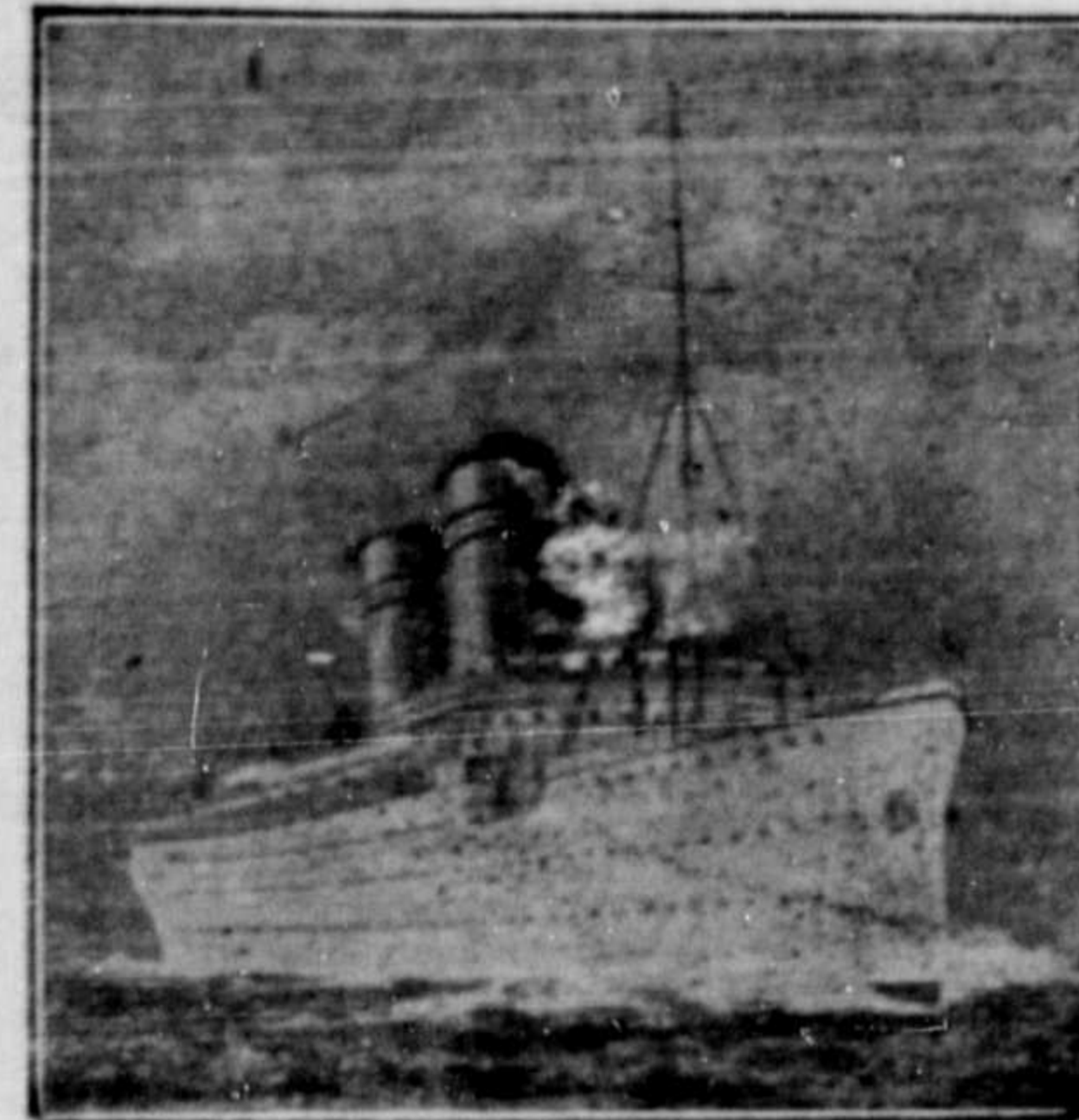
