SUBMARINE SHELLS ANCONA'S LIFEBOATS

ANOTHER GERMAN CRUISER SUNK—BRITISH TRANSPORT HAS NARROW ESCAPE

LIFEBOATS LADEN WITH WOMEN AND CHILDREN WERE SHELLED

TWENTY-FOUR AMERICANS ON BOARD ANCONA—PASSENGERS WERE CHIEFLY WOMEN AND CHILDREN—CAPTAIN WAS NOT WARNED—PANIC AMONGST THE GREEKS AND ITALIANS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Nov. 11.—Detailed reports of the sinking of the Italian American liner Ancona show that the vessel was shelled without the passengers being given a chance to escape. After the vessel went down, the life-boats, laden with passengers were also shelled. The passengers were chiefly women and children of the emigrant class.

Americans on Board.

There were twenty-four Americans on board. Naples reports that 347 out of 496 of the passengers and crew of the ill-fated liner were saved. The captain says that the submarine gave no signal to stop. The first intimation he received of the proximity

of a war vessel was the firing of shells at a range of five miles. When the shells were fired the ship was stopped.

Panic on Board.

Survivors who have arrived at Malta state that the Ancona was overhauled after a long chase. Panic ensued amongst the Greek and Italian passengers, and the excitement was added to by repeated shots from the submarine at close range.

Two More Sunk.

London, Nov. 11.—The steamer Caria has been sunk, the crew being saved. The French steamer France was torpedoed in the Mediterranean on Sunday. She was a vessel of 4,000 tons. Her crew of 75 was saved.

STRONG U. S. PROTEST AGAINST BLOCKADE

Washington, Nov. 9.—The U. S. Government in its latest note to Great Britain, made public here today, covering exhaustively British interference with neutral trade since the beginning of the European war, declares that the so-called blockade instituted by the Allies against enemy countries, on March 11, is "ineffective, illegal and indefensible." Notice is served that the United States government cannot submit to, the curtailment of its neutral rights and it cannot "with complaisance suffer further subordination of its rights and interests."

Ambassador Page, to whom the note was sent by special messenger for delivery to the London foreign office was instructed by Secretary Lansing "to impress most earnestly" upon the British government that the United States "must insist that the relations between it and His Majesty's government be governed, not by a policy of expediency, but by those established rules of international conduct to which Great Britain in the past has held the United States to account when the latter nation was a belligerent engaged in a struggle for national existence."

Declaring that the United States "unhesitatingly assumes" the task of championing the integrity of neutral rights, the note proclaims that the government will devote its energies to the task, exercising always an impartial attitude.

Canon Rix has arranged with the local banks to keep an open account to receive subscriptions towards the King Albert fund to provide food for three millions of destitute Belgians on November 15, King Albert's birthday. The sum of 25 cents will provide a splendid meal for some poor Belgian on that day, and if each person in the city subscribes a quarter, the city will have done its share in this good work. Larger sums will of course be welcomed. The Belgian people saved the situation a year ago and deserve recognition from the people of the Dominion.

LIFEBOATS SHELLED

The sinking of the Ancona with many of its passengers sent a shiver of horror around the world, but the shelling of her lifeboats, laden chiefly with defenceless women and children, must have staggered all humanity. Even though the Ancona was heading in an opposite direction to that of a laden transport, there was the possibility of Austria making the excuse that a "mistake" had been made, but the shelling of the lifeboats points to a case of sheer bloody butchery. Austria is outside of German promises to the United States, but nevertheless this latest wholesale murder should call forth something more than a protest from President Wilson.

ANOTHER GERMAN CRUISER TORPEDOED IN THE BALTIC

FRAUNLOEB SUNK OFF SWEDEN—THE GERMANS WITHDRAW FROM WEST OF RIGA—A GERMAN SUBMARINE CAPTURED IN GREEK WATERS—GREEK LOAN—BRITISH TRANSPORT ESCAPES

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, Nov. 11.—The German protected cruiser Fraunloeb, sister-ship to the cruiser Undine, which was torpedoed recently in the Baltic, has been torpedoed off the south coast of Sweden. She was a protected cruiser of 2,672 tons and carried a crew of 275 men.

Germans Swamped.

Berlin, Nov. 11.—An official report from military headquarters states that German troops have evacuated the forest district west of Riga, owing to rain having transformed that region into a swamp.

German Submarine Taken.

Paris, Nov. 11.—The Athens

paper Kairol announces that it learns from a reliable source that a British destroyer captured a German submarine in Greek waters last week, taking the whole crew prisoners.

Greek Loan.

London, Nov. 11.—A loan of \$8,000,000 to Greece by the Entente Allies is announced, along with a formal declaration of the goodwill of Greece towards the Allies.

Transport Escapes.

The outward bound transport Mersian has been attacked by gunfire from a submarine in the Mediterranean. She reached harbor safely, with 24 killed, 30 missing and 50 wounded.

MOST OF THE 48TH STILL AT SHORNCLIFFE

Constable Adams has received a letter from his brother Fred, who is a member of the 48th Battalion and one of Prince Rupert's second contingent. The majority of the boys are still at Shorncliffe and are very anxious to be on the move towards the trenches. They had a Zeppelin experience not a hundred miles away, but the censor forbids any details being given.

KING AWARDS V. C. FROM HIS SICK BED

London, Nov. 10.—The Press Bureau has issued an official report of the King's accident, as follows:

"King George was riding a strange horse when he was hurt on Thursday last. The animal reared and fell as a result of the muddy condition of the road.

"The King fell from the saddle and was pinned to the ground by the animal falling upon him. The injuries were accentuated by the necessity of conveying his Majesty to a hospital in an ambulance. The journey was one of considerable distance, and heavy rain fell all the time.

"Despite his suffering the King insisted upon investing Lance-Sergt. Oliver Brooks of the Coldstream Guards with the Victoria Cross.

"The soldier knelt upon the floor beside the bed upon which the King was lying, and thus had the medal pinned upon him. However, his Majesty was so weak even this slight exertion fatigued him, and he had to have assistance.

"After four days in a hospital the King was brought to England in a hospital ship. At Victoria Station he was met by an ambulance, which took him to Buckingham Palace. His Majesty was carried into the palace upon a stretcher, being unable to stand."

A FISH STORY

The merit of a fish story is all in the telling, and our morning contemporary yesterday excelled itself in that line. It picked out the one little grain of concession which the fishing concerns have been able to squeeze from the provincial government as a result of their petition to the minister of public works, Victoria, on September 15th, and dressed it up so beautifully that it began to look like something substantial.

The Journal says that "free dockage for fishing boats is also granted," but omits to mention that this only applies to the 125 feet at the eastern end of the wharf. The story as recounted by the Tory organ is more remarkable for what it omits than for what it says. It omits all mention of the petition signed by the Atlin Fisheries, Limited, The Rorvik Fish Company, Limited, Harry Shere for the San Juan Company, The Davidson Fish Company, Poole & Company, Limited, and W. Shrubbsall, asking that the wharfage charges on fish be reduced to 25 cents per ton; that the charge of 50 cents per ton on ice be abolished; that the charges on boxes and box lumber be abolished and that the wharfage on transhipped fish be confined to the net weight of the fish, and that these requests have not been granted. The free water supply depends upon the generosity of the city rather than upon the government, as the government is amply paid for the small quantity of water granted free to the fish companies, in the amounts paid for rent.

The government wharf is dependent on the fish trade for the bulk of its revenue, and the

whole question is a matter of business reciprocity. The wharf is just as dependent on the fishermen as the men are upon the wharf, and the attitude of the government, when the demands of the fishing trade are taken into consideration, is a near approach to a "benevolent neutrality," instead of a serious effort to cope with the disadvantages under which the fishing companies are laboring. The wharf is not suited to the handling of fish, and this entails an increased amount of labor which places the local fish handlers at a great disadvantage as compared with other ports.

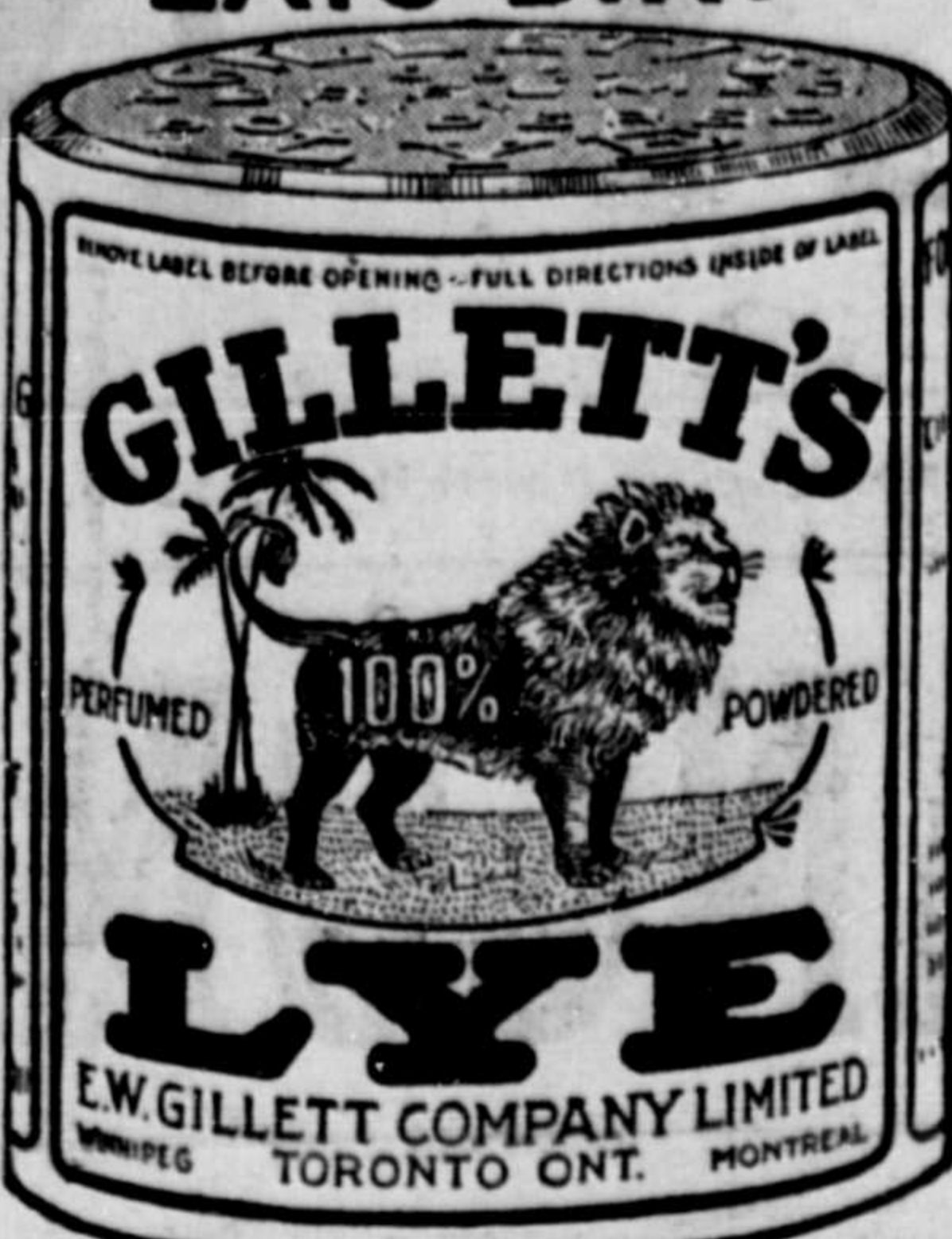
It is gratifying to find that the government has been forced to recognize that alterations in the conditions obtaining at the wharf are necessary, and there is still hope that the minister of public works may be persuaded that there is still room for great improvement before the fish handlers at this port are in a position to compete with fish handlers at other Pacific ports.

EGYPT IS PREPARING FOR GERMAN ATTACKS

Rome, Nov. 10.—The Austro-Germans are preparing a new offensive against the Suez Canal, according to an Athens despatch, to The Tribuna, which adds that the British have made gigantic preparations to meet such an eventuality. Among other things they have flooded the land along the canal, leaving the fortifications just standing out of the water, the defenders being well supplied with provisions by gunboats.

ALASKA WIRELESS SERVICE EXTENDING

Seattle, Nov. 10.—Marking the initial step in a great extension of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph company's Alaska service, John R. Irwin, superintendent of the corporation's northern division, with headquarters in Seattle, will leave the latter part of the month for Seward to select a site for a new commercial wireless station.

With the construction of the station the company will enter the commercial field in the vast Southwestern Alaska region for the first time. 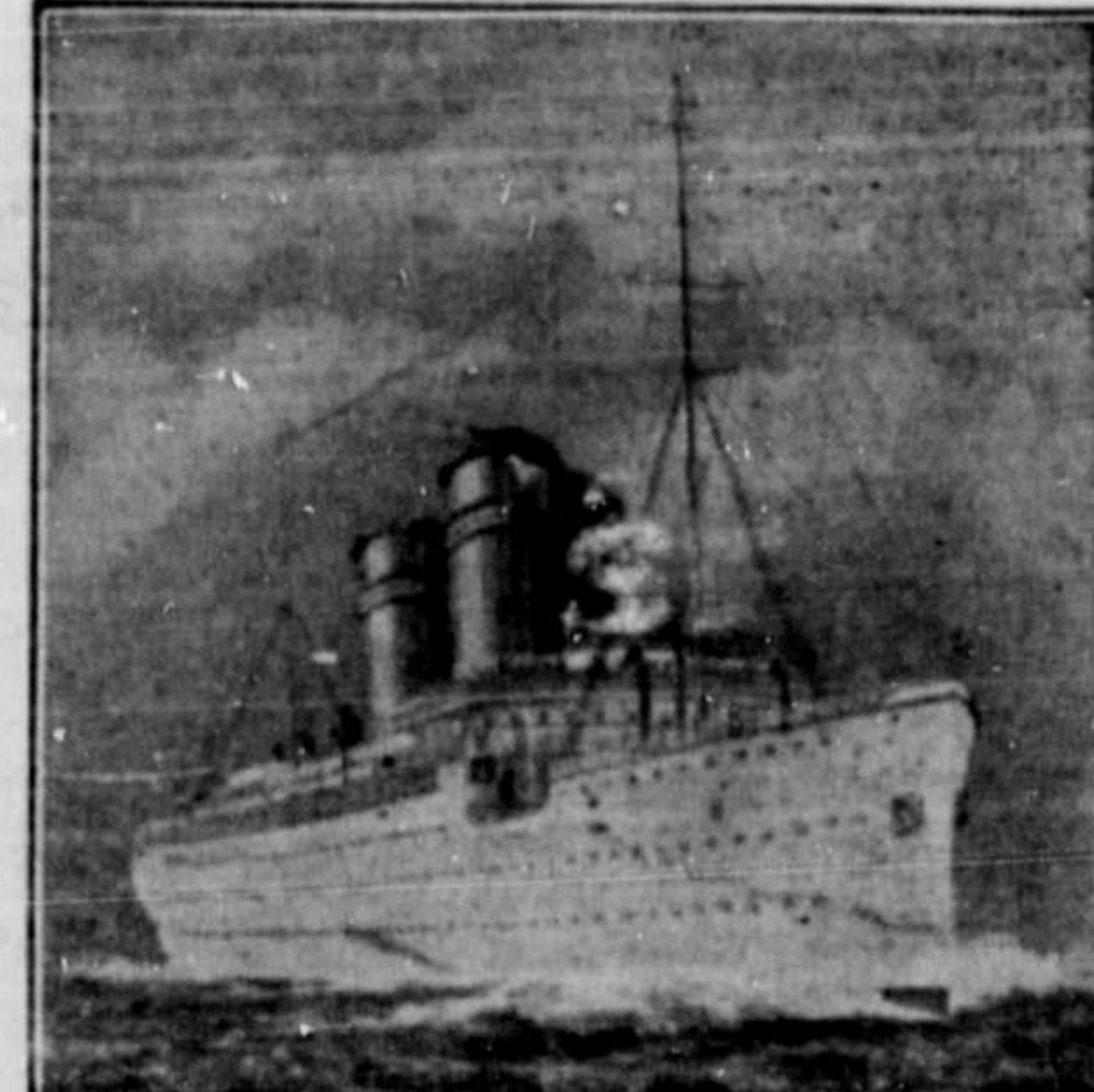
