THE BALKAN SITUATION LOOKING BRIGHTER

GREEK PARLIAMENT HAS DISSOLVED -- RUSSIAN TROOPS LAND IN ROUMANIA

RUSSIAN FORCES LANDED ON ROUMANIAN TERRITORY

RUSSIANS ASCENDED THE DANUBE AND LANDED MEN AND GUNS NEAR SILISTRIA—FRENCH DEFEAT BULGARIANS NEAR VELES—CONFLICTING REPORTS REGARDING SERBS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 12.—Bucharest announces that the Russians have ascended the river Danube from the Black Sea and have landed a small force of men and guns near Silistria on Roumanian territory, thirty miles east of the Bulgarian frontier.

French Success.
Milan, Nov. 12.—The French have inflicted a severe defeat on the Bulgarians near Veles, following a successful cavalry raid.

Montenegrins Busy.
The Montenegrins on the Sanjak front have scored a victory over the Austrians, taking prisoners and guns.

CITY OF SEATTLE WAS STRANDED THIS MORNING

The City of Seattle, northbound, went on the rocks at the mouth of Granville Channel at 5:50 this morning. She had twenty passengers on board and about 800 tons of cargo. The passengers and nineteen of the crew were brought in this afternoon on the fishing schooner Albatross, in care of the purser of the disabled vessel, and are now at the Central Hotel. Everyone got safely away from the stranded steamer, in fact nobody even got a wetting.

High tide was at 5:19 this morning so that the vessel struck at practically full tide. The afternoon tide is one of 19 feet, 2 ins. as against 18 feet, 7 ins. this morning, and there is just a possibility that she may be floated, if part of the cargo can be unloaded. The C. P. R. steamer Princess May is standing by her. Meantime the agents here have been asked to send out a tug and two lighters. When the passengers left the vessel was not making water at any point.

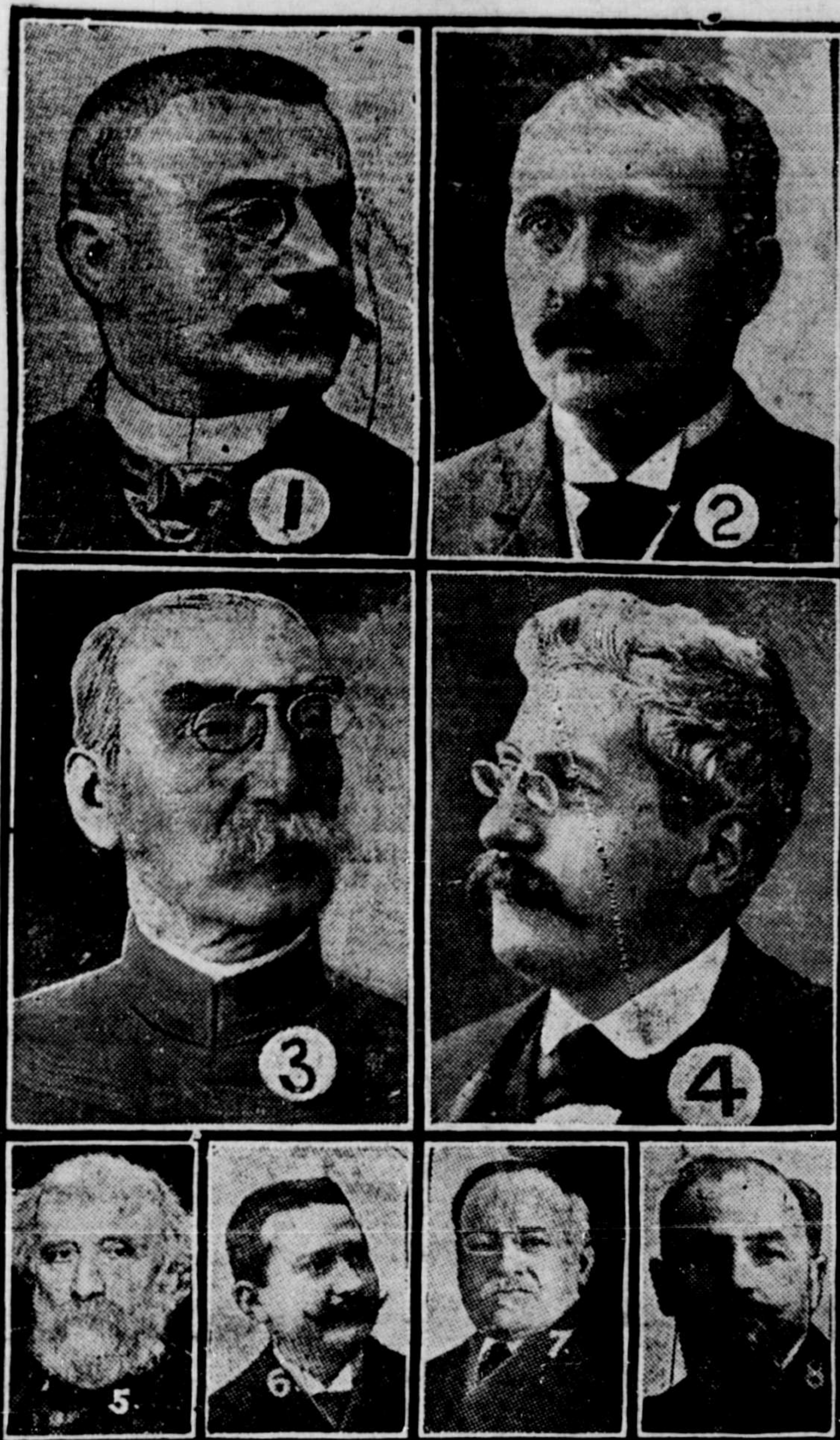
A YOUNG AVIATOR GETS A MUD BATH

Oakland, Cal., Nov. 11.—Narrowly escaping death when his biplane carried him head first into the mud of Alameda creek from a height of 500 feet, Harold B. Smith, an Oakland boy trying for a pilot's license preparatory to offering his services to the British army, was severely injured today.

The machine turned a complete somersault, striking its driver in the back and plunging him head first and shoulder deep into the sticky marsh. Heroic measures were necessary at the hospital to free his mouth and nostrils from the tightly packed clay.

Smith, who has a brother with the British army aviation corps, said that he would make another try as soon as he recovers.

Other ministers include Ribot (5), finance minister; Doumergue (6), minister of colonies; Cambon (7), general secretary; Bourgeois (8), without portfolio.

RUSSIANS TAKE THOUSANDS OF GERMAN PRISONERS DAILY

PETROGRAD ANNOUNCES SERIES OF SUCCESSES IN COURLAND AND GALICIA—SPIRITED ARTILLERY WORK ON THE WESTERN FRONT—GERMAN BATTERIES ARE SILENCED

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Nov. 12.—Petrograd announces a series of successes by the Russians in Courland and in Galicia. It is stated that thousands of German prisoners are being taken daily on both of those fronts.

Western Front.

Paris, Nov. 12.—After a day's silence along the entire front, cannonading has been particularly intense on both sides around Loos and in the regions of Chalon, La Fosse and Souchez.

After a great artillery battle in Artois, the German batteries were silenced.

Mine Work.

To the south of Somme, near Faye, the explosion of one of our mines shattered the galleries and blew up the German post in front of Beauvraignes. Small mines in the same region blew up an enemy mine which was being charged.

At Les Eparges another mine destroyed a German trench, which we immediately occupied after a desperate encounter with the enemy.

GREEK CHAMBER DISSOLVED—GENERAL ELECTION ANNOUNCED

ALL GREEKS FOR MILITARY SERVICE; ROUMANIA AND GREECE MAY JOIN ALLIES SOON—SERBS WILL FIGHT TO THE END—GERMAN PEOPLE ARE PUT ON SHORT RATIONS

London, Nov. 12.—The Greek Chamber of Deputies has dissolved and a general election will be held on December 19th. The Greek general staff has put all citizens into military service.

Good News.

The opinion is expressed that, if the Russians can land an army of 200,000 men in the Balkans, both Roumania and Greece will join the Allies.

False German Rumors.

The Serbian legation has issued a note denying the German rumors that the Serbs are suing for peace. The note states that the Serbs have great supplies of munitions and that they will never make peace until the Allies win.

Short Rations.

All Germany has today been put upon short rations by order of the government.

The American schooner Constance brought in 70,000 pounds of halibut this morning and the Atlantic 15,000.

KING ALBERT'S DAY

On November 15th the Belgian people are celebrating their noble King's birthday. The people of the Empire are providing food that day for 3,000,000 destitute Belgians, and Canadians are invited to assist. The banks of Prince Rupert are receiving sums of 25 cents and up towards this Belgian celebration fund, and the fact that it is to be devoted to providing food for the Belgians is sufficient to assure a substantial sum being subscribed.

RICH GOLD STRIKE AT SURF INLET MINE

The superintendent of the Surf Inlet mine is closer than the proverbial clam when it comes to discussing the development of the ore bodies of that property, but F. M. Wells, a mining engineer, who did much of the early exploration work at Surf Inlet, has told the Vancouver Province that gold ore to the value of \$100 per ton has been encountered by the Tonnapah-Belmont Company at a vertical depth of 1,000 feet.

The development company has driven a tunnel more than 3,000 feet into the mountain on Princess Royal Island. This tunnel has followed the ore body for some distance and a large body of high grade gold bearing quartz has been encountered. This being at a depth of over 1,000 feet below the surface creates a situation without a parallel in the annals of gold mining in Canada. The ore is of the same character as that exposed in the upper workings, but of a much higher grade.

\$32.30 PER HEAD

The Canadian Year Book published recently in Ottawa gives some interesting figures regarding the per capita expenditure of the various provinces. Needless to say, British Columbia heads the list and even Manitoba, under the profligate Roblin administration, is a very far distant second.

For the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1914, the cost per head of running the province of British Columbia was \$32.30 while that of Manitoba was \$10.52. Alberta comes next with a cost of \$9.04; Saskatchewan, 7.47; Prince Edward Island, 4.75, and the others all around the \$4 mark.

Even in Manitoba, the revenue comes within a few cents of the per capita expenditure, but in British Columbia expenditure tops revenue by about \$11 per head. Doubtless the McBride government had a glorious run for the money, but where do the people of British Columbia come in? They come in now, and will stay in for a good many years trying to wipe out this huge adverse balance, which in round figures now amounts to about \$10,000,000. This sum must be produced by the toilers of this province, and that is why the Tory press is so insistent in urging the people to start producing. They naturally omit to dwell on the point that the increased production is necessary to pay the debts piled up by a real estate government. It is useless to tell the people that they will have the fruits of their toil to spend. The money is spent, and only a searching housecleaning by a new people's parliament will reveal where much of this vast sum has gone.

Much of it of course was spent in machine oil, which has

been so liberally distributed in every district for years past. In other words, the people of this province were handsomely taxed for the privilege of permitting the McBride government to play ducks and drakes with the province. The people now realize that they cannot afford to indulge in this expensive game any longer. They will get rid of the gambling gang and their machinery, but unfortunately their debts will have to be met. Gambling debts are usually described as "debts of honor," but the term can hardly be truthfully applied to the mountain of debt which has been piled up at Victoria.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Germans west of Riga must have become rather chilly in the neighborhood of their pedal extremities.

McBride must have had rather a dry time entertaining those prohibitionists yesterday.

The old naval game of keelhauling should be brought to life again for the entertainment of German and Austrian submarine crews who shell women and children.

The Victoria Colonist says we are suffering from a "superfluity of politics." A glance at almost any old page of the public accounts reveals the fact that the Colonist has no cause to kick.

The "shell" game was known and practiced in British Columbia years before the shell committee was ever thought of.

Rumor has it that Sir Richard McBride is wondering if the Earl of New Westminster would be an appropriate title for an agent-general to pack along with him.

CANADA'S HANDICAP IN PROVIDING AGAINST FIRE

The direct fire loss of Canada for the past five years has averaged \$23,722,246 per year, and of this amount at least seventy-five per cent. is the immediate result of personal carelessness.

To this vast sum must be added the cost of equipment and upkeep of fire departments, a proportion of the cost and expense of waterworks systems, and the money paid as premiums to insurance companies in excess of the amount returned to the policy holders as indemnity for losses. This latter charge amounted, for the five years 1910-14, to \$52,968,061.

The above charges total approximately forty-five million dollars per annum, or a tax of over six dollars on every man, woman and child in Canada.

Canada's census returns give an average of five members to a family, with a consequent average family assessment of thirty dollars to cover the fire charge.

Canada's fire loss per capita is at least five times greater than that of any European country. The Canadian employer, in competing for business in the world's markets, must meet, among others, the additional charge for fire loss, fire protection and fire insurance, before he can compete with his European competitors on an even basis.

Canadians must unite to take effective measures to reduce this tax. Business men and employees alike dependent upon Canadian industry, should take precautions against the enormous fire loss lest, through this extra cost of production, their industries be unable to meet foreign competition and to furnish employment for their capital and labor.—Conservation Bulletin.

JOHNNY O'LEARY TO MEET FREDDIE WELSH

Winnipeg, Nov. 11.—Articles have been signed for a contest for the world's lightweight championship between Freddie Welsh, present titleholder, and Johnny O'Leary, of Vancouver, lightweight champion of Canada, to take place here on Nov. 15. The bout will be a 12-round affair.

Promoter Lewis Smith, who handled the O'Leary-Drouillard bout last month, which O'Leary won in easy fashion, was successful in interesting a number of the leading business men in this city in the title bout and easily raised the guarantee Welsh's manager, Harry Pollok, demanded before signing articles. A record crowd is expected, there being nearly 12,000 soldiers here for their winter quarters, and Welsh is a favorite here.

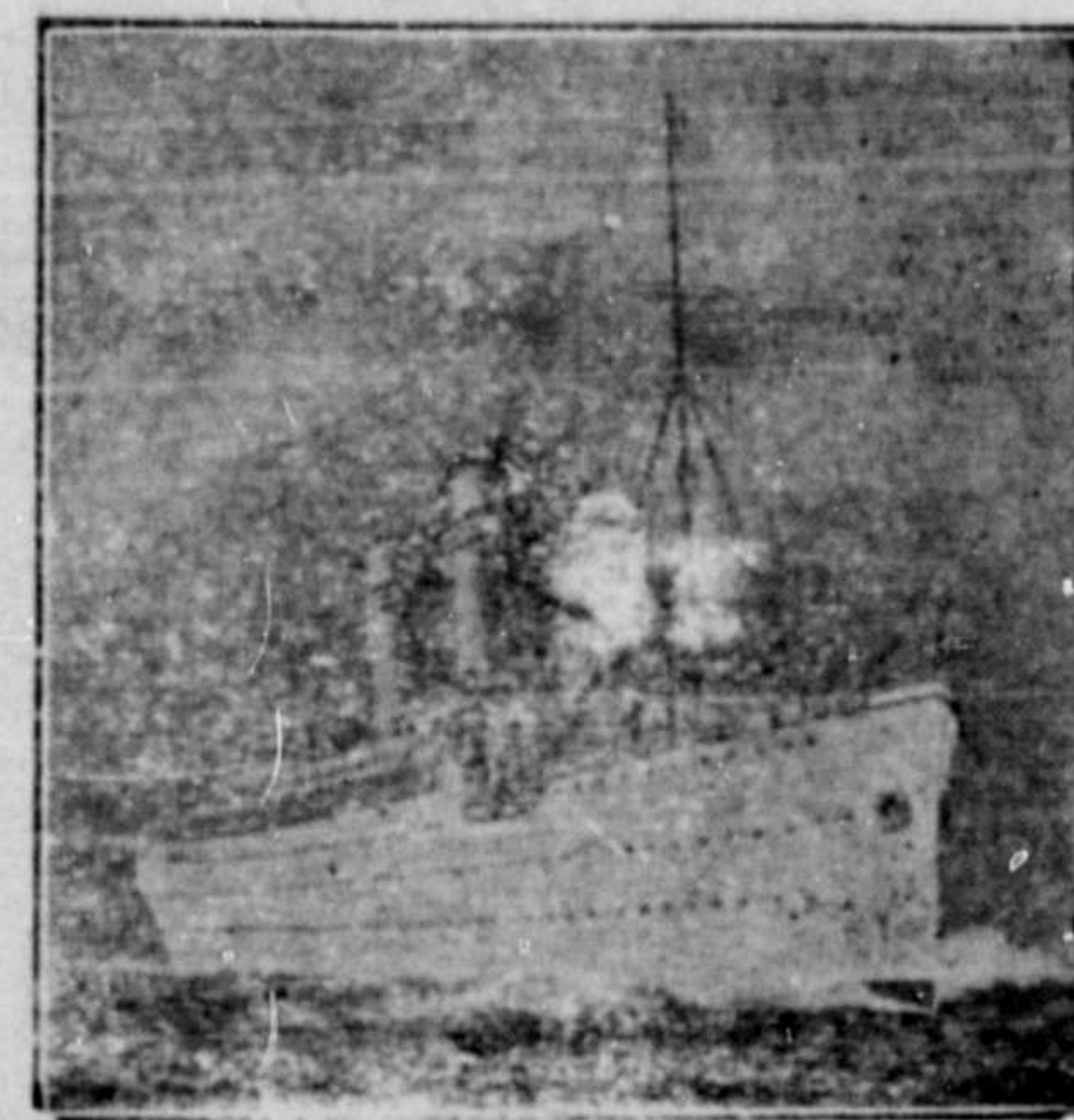
