BULGARIA AND TURKEY ENTER PROTEST

ALLIES HOLD NINETY MILE FRONT IN SERBIA -- SPY REVELATIONS IN AMERICA

BULGARS AND TURKS SORE AT ALLIED SUCCESS

Protest Against Landing Troops at Saloniki—Allied Line is Now Linked Up.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Nov. 13.—Bulgaria and Turkey have issued a protest to Greece against the number of Allied troops which have been allowed to disembark at Saloniki.

Allies' Lines Joined

The Allies' lines now join, the British being in the southeast, the French in the centre and the Serbian army in the northwest, along a battle front of ninety miles in southern Serbia.

Skirmishing is in progress, and marks the beginning of a great battle. If the Bulgar line can be pierced, it will enable the Allies to combine with the main Serbian army to resist the passage of the main Teuton army in its march across Serbia.

The entire Bulgarian force is endangered by the new scheme of operations.

SEATTLE MADE PORT UNDER HER OWN STEAM

The City of Seattle made port last night under her own steam, and with her nose showing signs of first aid treatment. Meantime, the exact extent of the damage done cannot be ascertained, but she has taken a considerable amount of water forward, and it is clear that her stem has been damaged and several plates have been sprung. About half of her cargo has been unloaded at the government wharf, in order to lighten her forward, but nothing more will be done until the arrival of officials of the Alaska Steamship Company and insurance men on the Admiral Farragut on Sunday evening.

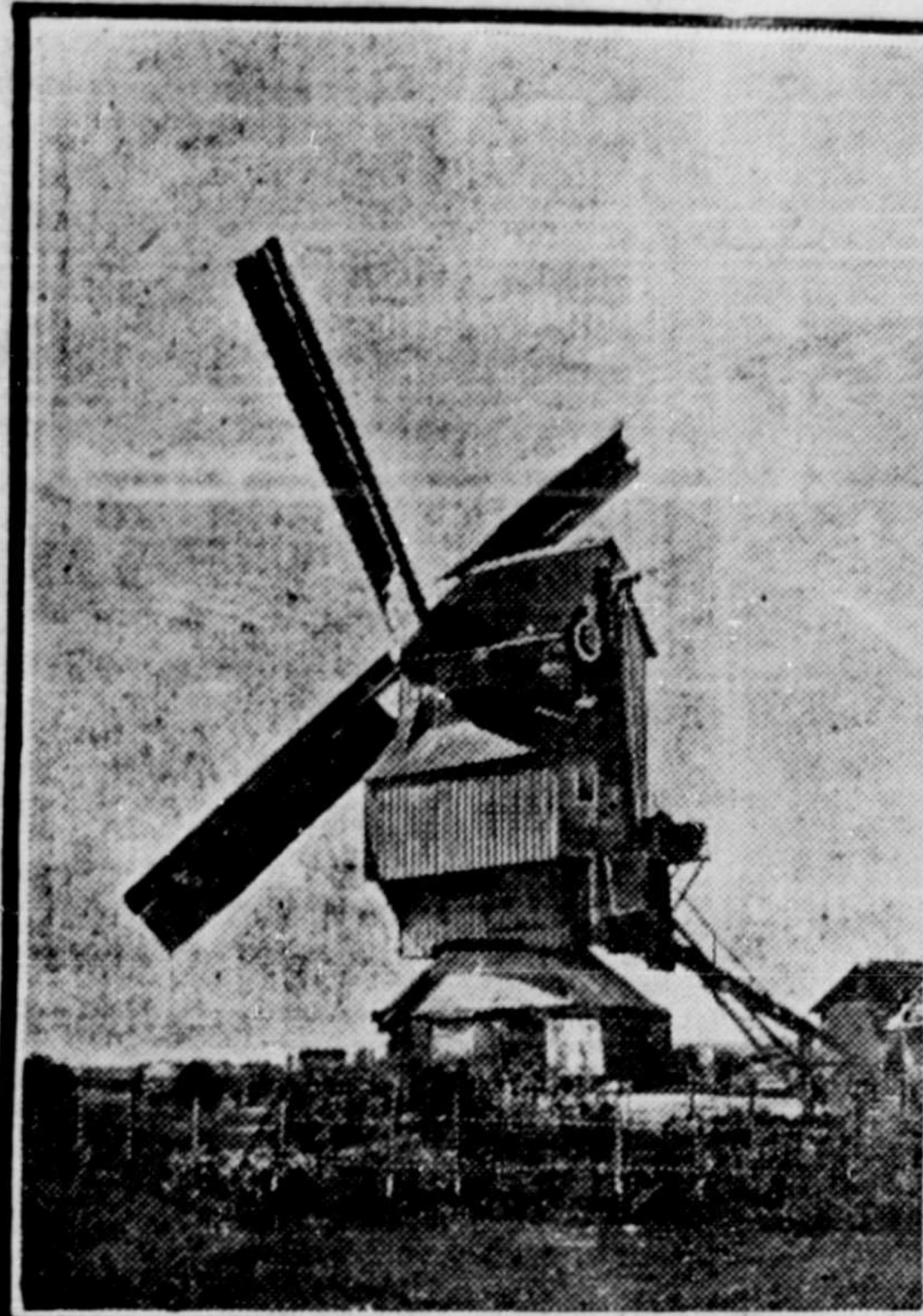
If it is found that the forward bulkheads will hold, the vessel may proceed to Seattle, but there is a possibility that she may be docked here. Captain McGillivray, her master, who was not on the bridge at the time of the mishap, has been on this run for 27 years and is one of the most capable navigators on the coast. The officers refrain from making any statement as to the cause of the accident, pending the arrival of the officials.

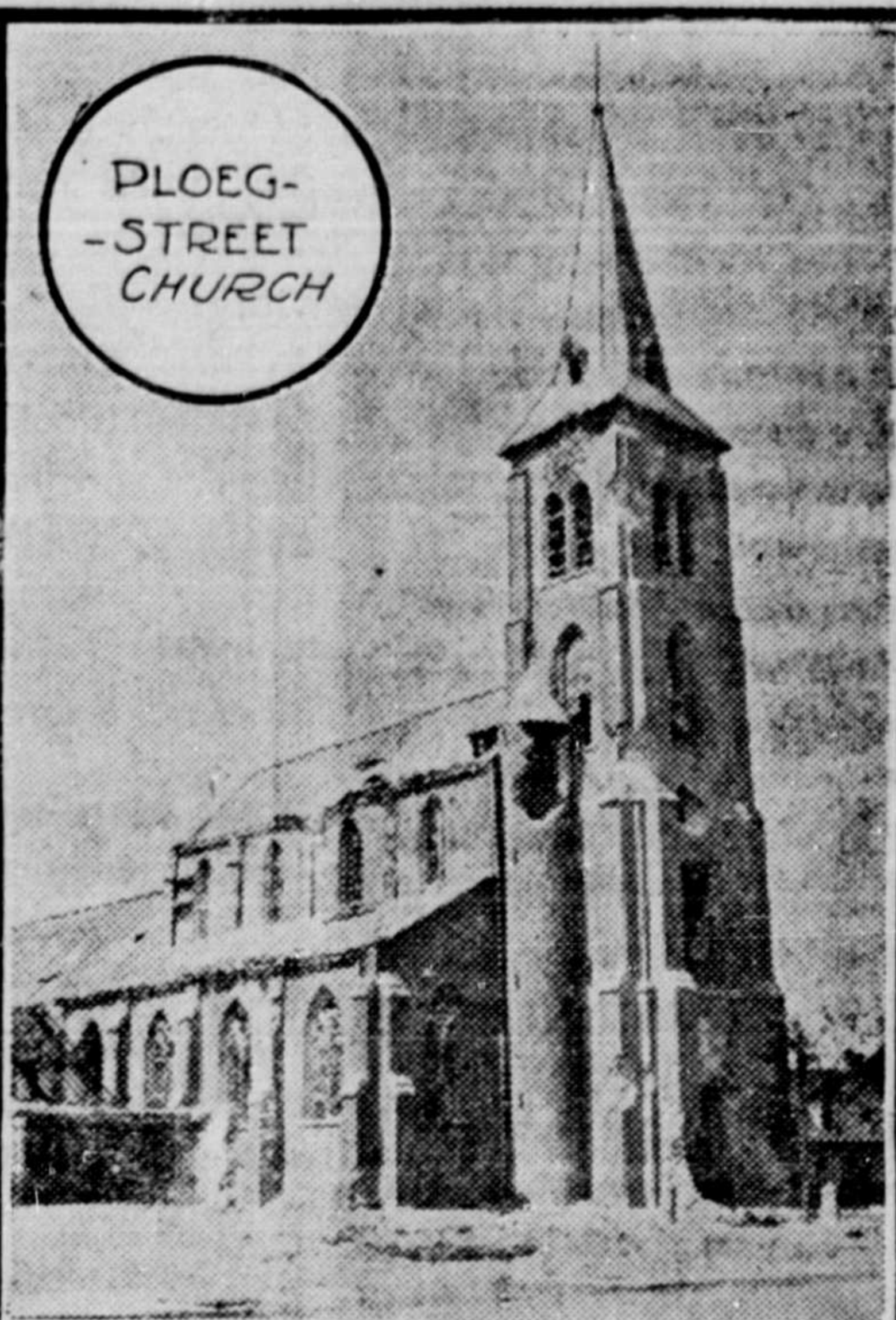

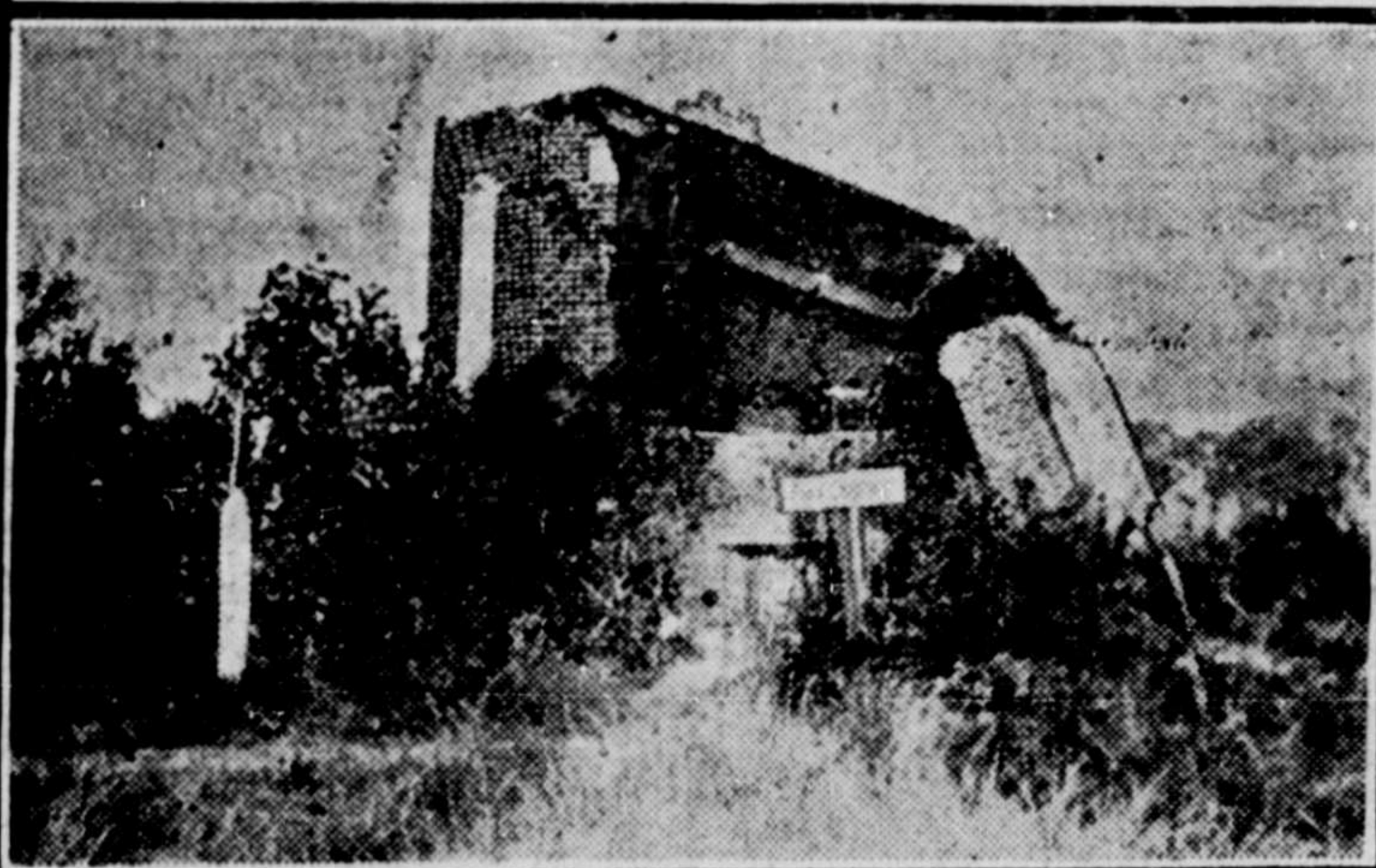
WINDMILL WHERE A SPY WAS CAUGHT.



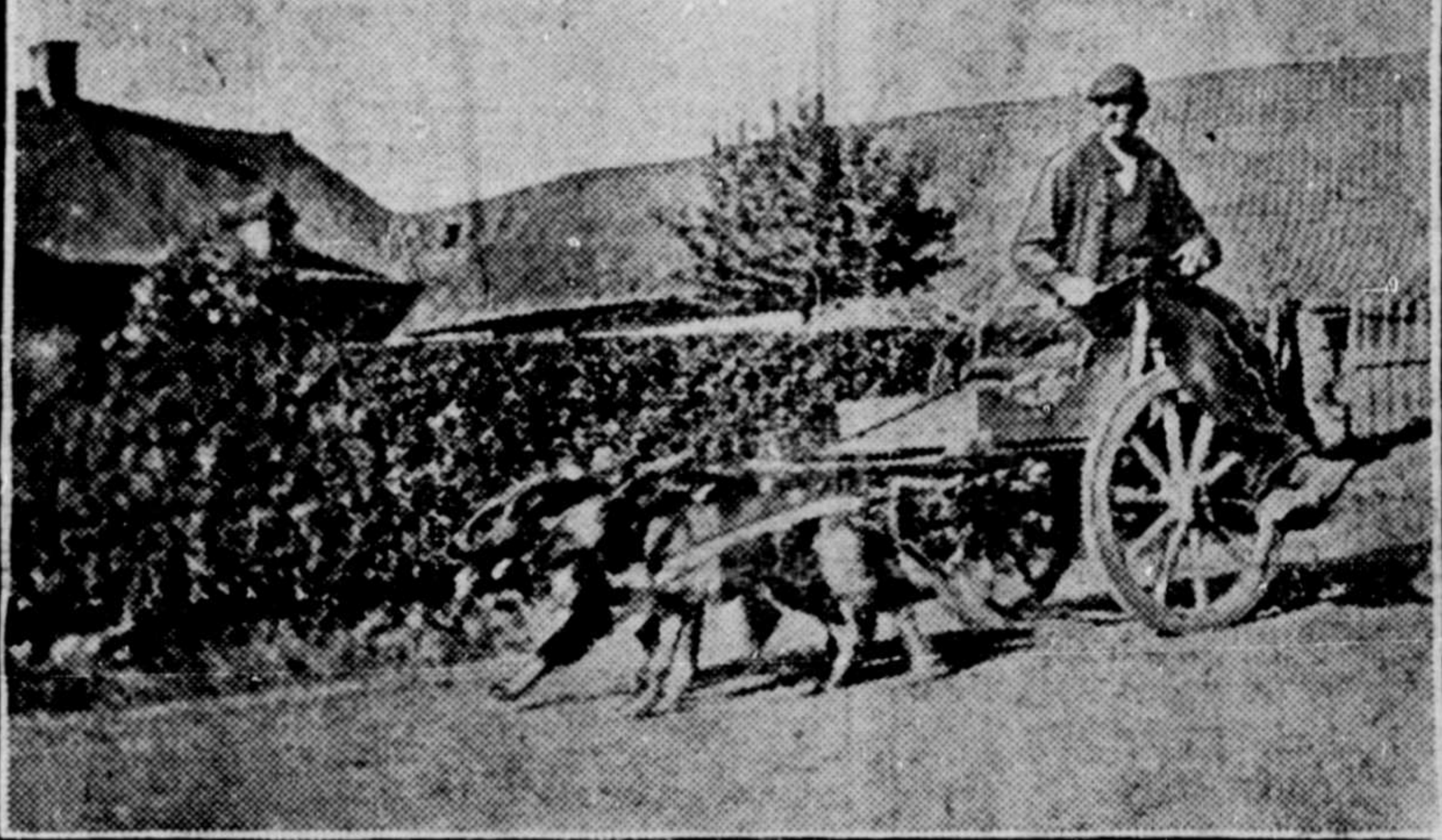

GERMAN SPIES SIMPLY SWARM IN THE STATES

Austrian Official Places Valuable Information Before United States Authorities.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Providence, R. I., Nov. 13.—Dr. Joseph Gooricar, who has been for fifteen years an official at the Austrian consulate, has resigned. In a statement to Washington, he says that the United States is honeycombed with Austrian and German spies, under Ambassador Von Bernstorff and Consul-General Von Nuber, who are engaged in a nation-wide propaganda for the creation of strikes and the committing of acts of violence at the various munitions plants.

He states that agents of the Central Powers have spent over \$30,000,000 in this class of work since the war began. The names of prominent officials in the leading American cities are included in the charge. President Wilson has ordered the department of justice to make a thorough investigation into the charges.

WINSTON CHURCHILL WILL GO TO THE FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 12.—It is officially announced that the Hon. Winston Spencer Churchill, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, will proceed to the front. Winston Churchill, who was formerly first lord of the admiralty, until the formation of the coalition cabinet, saw considerable warfare while correspondent in South Africa, being taken prisoner by the Boers, from whom he ultimately escaped.

The late cabinet minister says he prefers life at the front to well paid inactivity.

GERMAN MUNITIONS HIDDEN IN AFRICA

London, Nov. 12.—A despatch to the Times from Cape Town asserts that Henry Burton, minister of railways of the Union of South Africa, declared in a speech at Natal that huge quantities of ammunition had been discovered hidden in Damaraland, Southwest Africa.

The minister said there was sufficient ammunition to equip 60,000 men, and that the Germans had hoped to overthrow the government of the Union of South Africa with the aid of a rebellion.

TURK FORCES SINK BRITISH SUBMARINE E-20

Three Officers and Three men Taken Prisoners—Gallant Little Craft.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 13.—The British submarine E-20 has been sunk in the Dardanelles by Turkish forces. Three officers and three men have been taken prisoners.

Spectacular Fight.

Paris, Nov. 13.—An official report tells of a spectacular fight in which a small French war vessel figured as the victor. The little craft had a crew of only ten men and was surprised off the Island of Crete in the Mediterranean by a schooner carrying arms and munitions for the enemy, and with forty-eight Turks on board, eleven of them officers. The little vessel closed with its bigger opponent and captured the Turkish schooner, all the men and the entire cargo of munitions.

TOLL OF THE SEA

The schooner Constance has brought in word that the American halibut schooner Yakatat, which put in here recently with her catch, encountered very heavy weather in the north early in the week, and, in making Yakatat Bay, had two of her crew and several dories swept overboard. The men were never seen again. The skipper had a very narrow escape, being swept along the deck and rather seriously injured.

AUSTRIAN SUBMARINE CHASED ESCAPING BOATS

Passengers Killed While in Their Cabins—More Steamers Submerged.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Nov. 13.—Survivors from the liner Ancona state that the Austrian submarine kept up a cannonade while the passengers were embarking into the ship's boats. Dr. Cecil Griel, of New York, one of the survivors, states that a maid was killed whilst standing talking in her cabin. Survivors who have arrived at Tunis report that the submarine chased some of the lifeboats in the night, capsizing some of them.

Steamers Sunk.

London, Nov. 13.—The Italian steamer Fironzo, of 3,970 tons, has been sunk in the Mediterranean. Six of her passengers and fifteen of her crew are missing.

The British steamer Sir Richard Awdry, of 2,234 tons, has also been sunk.

LOCAL REGIMENT IS OFFICIALLY AUTHORIZED

An official announcement has been made by Col. A. T. Ogilvie, district officer commanding the military forces in British Columbia, that the new overseas regiment to be commanded by Major J. W. Warden has been formally authorized by the Ottawa authorities, and will be designated the 102nd (North British Columbia) Battalion. Rank as lieutenant-colonel will be assumed by Major Warden. Headquarters for the 102nd have been established at Prince Rupert.

Commissioner George Black, of the Yukon, is going to raise and command a Yukon company which will be attached to the 102nd. He is now in Ottawa completing arrangements. Commissioner Black will qualify for rank as captain.

REASSURING NEWS

The despatches from the Balkan front yesterday had a decidedly more cheering tone. The fact that the Russians have been able to ascend the Danube, as was forecasted some days ago, is reassuring, after the receipt of news that the Russian ships in Roumanian waters had been interned. It is very evident that Roumania is looking at things from a slightly different standpoint, and the proximity of a large Russian army has no doubt had considerable influence in the changing of her point of view. The gallant little Serbian army has been so long on the verge of annihilation or surrender that it begins to look as if it is enjoying a charmed existence. Milan reports grave fears for its safety, but Berlin states that it has taken to the mountain fastnesses where big guns and munitions are to be had in "colossal" quantities, and that the French and British aid to the Serbs has been enormous. Berlin is not given to issuing messages intentionally encouraging to the Allies, and, therefore, we may take it that the Serbians are still alive and fighting.

The latest Greek diplomatic move is rather hard to understand, as there are no reports of the new cabinet ever having met. It is possible that it has been defeated by Venizelos and his followers on a vote of confidence, but, if that were so, it is strange that no such report has been made public. It may be that King Constantine figures that having no parliament at all for a space of five weeks will make his life a little less risky. In any case, it is clear that all is not well with the Teuton supporters in Greece, and it is not hard to believe

that Roumania and Greece will be glad to join the Allies if they are assured that the Allies are strong enough to take care of them and their little kingdoms.

THAT FISH STORY

With truly Matsonian ingenuity the Journal attempts to read into the Daily News "fish story" editorial something which was not there. With regard to the making of party capital, the shoe is very neatly fitted on the other foot. The Tory organ, in an endeavor to make party capital, in these days when Tory party capital is a scarce commodity, took a fourth of the truth and embellished it and dressed it up in Conservative cotton wool until it began to look like something, and presented it as a news item to the public, while it carefully omitted any mention of the other three fourths.

A half truth has been described as something which the Daily News does not indulge in, and it may be presumed that a quarter truth is something worse, but what a misleading quarter truth is cannot be properly described here. The public is fortunately thoroughly conversant with the methods of the provincial government and its hand-fed press. The Daily News is actively interested in the welfare of the fishermen and in all fishing concerns connected with Prince Rupert, but it is also anxious that the public should be told the truth.

BULGAR PREMIER THREATENS GREECE

Paris, Nov. 12.—The Temps prints a dispatch from Saloniki in which Premier Radoslavoff, of Bulgaria, is quoted by the Sofia correspondent of the Pesti Hirlap of Bucharest, Hungary, as declaring: "The Grecian government now has been warned that it cannot hold the Bulgarian government responsible for the consequences of its future attitude."

The notification, the correspondent declares, followed representation made by the premier to M. Naoum, Greek minister to Bulgaria.

Premier Radoslavoff, the correspondent declares, says the facilities accorded for the disembarkation of Allied troops at Saloniki is incompatible with Greek neutrality, and has informed Minister Naoum to this effect.

GREEK AND ROUMANIAN KINGS MAY MEET SOON

London, Nov. 12.—The statement is made by the correspondent at Amsterdam of the Central News that the kings of Roumania, Greece and Bulgaria have made arrangements to meet at Bucharest. There is no confirmation of this report.

SIR SAM WILL LEAD THE MARCH TO BERLIN

Toronto, Nov. 11.—At a re-
cruiting meeting held tonight un-
der the auspices of the Empire
Club, General Sir Sam Hughes,
minister of militia, announced in
the course of his speech dealing
with the war that he proposed to
take an active part at the front,
and that when the big drive for
German territory started, he in-
tended, so far as his present
plans are, to lead the Canadian
forces on their march to Berlin,
which would start sooner than
was at present dreamed of.

The meeting was an enthu-
siastic one, and it is expected will
have a big effect in stimulating
recruiting in this city and
throughout Ontario.

FARMERS DEMAND FREE WHEAT TO THE STATES

Winnipeg, Nov. 12.—Hon. Robert
Rogers met the representa-
tives of the farmers' organization
of Alberta, Saskatchewan, Mani-
toba and Ontario today, at the
meeting of the Canadian Council
of Agriculture, and heard their
plea for the free entrance of Can-
adian wheat into the United
States.

The council passed a resolu-
tion reiterating their demand that
the government immediately take
steps to secure "free access to
the American markets for our
wheat" and expressing regret
that the "delay" in this matter

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT
OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present
throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of
the questions which are considered by those who contem-
plate entering the Service. The following is a list of perti-
nent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

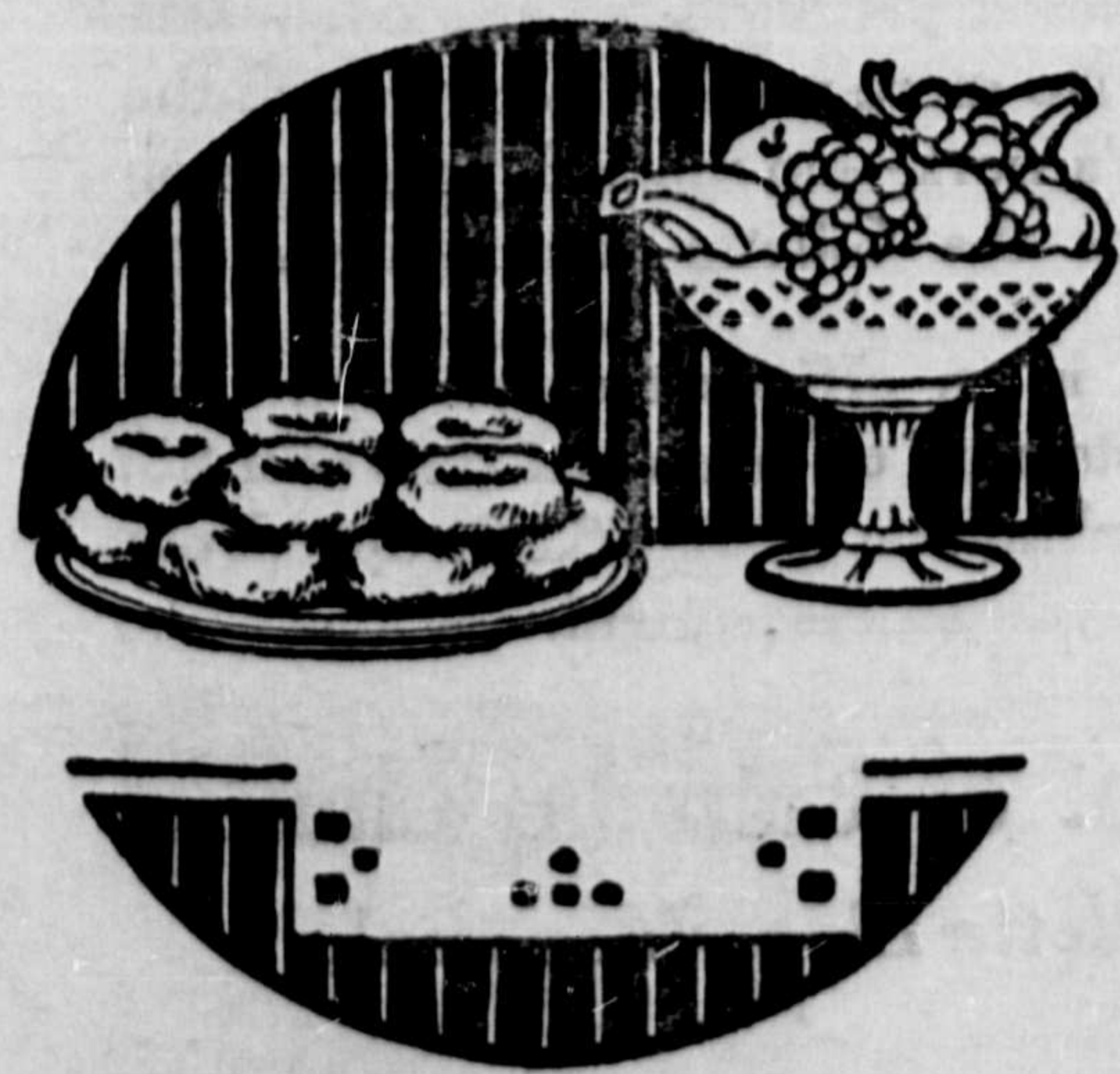
1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war
and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will
be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this
you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Govern-
ment.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every
month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20
(also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to com-
fortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund
will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will
be cared for by the Government and your pay continued
until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an
allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of
your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die
while on Active Service? The Government will provide an
adequate pension, that will enable the family to live com-
fortably until the children are old enough to look after them-
selves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be
her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.



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
