GENERAL JOFFRE TO COMMAND ALL TROOPS

GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS AND KITCHENER FOR BALKANS—GREAT WORK BY SERBS

HEROIC WORK BY 6,000 SERBS AT BABUNA PASS

Six Thousand Serbs Drive Back 20,000 Bulgarians at Bayonet Point—Bread Riot at Dusseldorf, in Germany.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Milan, Nov. 15.—The following is an extract from a graphic description of the recent fighting in Babuna Pass: "The Serbians, who numbered only six thousand, fell back before twenty thousand Bulgarians to a point where the road narrows near Adipasa at an elevation of 2,000 feet.

"After drawing the Bulgarians to this narrow defile, they fell upon them with the bayonet, driving them beyond Kotziak with enormous losses."

Bread Riots.

Amsterdam, Nov. 15.—There have been fierce bread riots in Dusseldorf, as a result of the high prices prevailing for food. Crowds of women raided the markets and stores using stones and potatoes as missiles. The police had difficulty in quelling the riots, being obliged to charge the crowds.

CHRISTMAS PARTY FOR NORWAY AND SWEDEN

Ernest Carlson, A. F. and A. Pearson and Ed. Martenson left this morning to spend Xmas in Sweden, while J. Holten accompanies them on similar mission to Norway. They sail from New York on the Bergensfjord on November 27th. In these troublous times the Scandinavian-American liners take the far northern route across the Atlantic heading well towards Iceland as they approach the British Isles, in order to keep out of the way of submarines.

A large party of friends was at the train to wish them bon voyage.

ALLIES ARE ADVANCING ON BALKAN FRONT

Serbs Still Holding Babuna Pass—At Veles Bulgarians asked For an Armistice—Bulgar Losses were Heavy.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Saloniki, Nov. 15.—The French and British continue to advance along the whole line, while the Serbians are still holding the Babuna Pass and the Katchanik defile.

There is great uneasiness amongst the population of Monastir owing to the large Bulgarian force on the Perlepe front in the vicinity of Babuna.

Heavy Losses.

The Serbian Legation at Paris announces that the Bulgarians at Veles suffered such heavy losses at the hands of the Franco-British forces that they requested an armistice in order to bury their dead. It is expected that Veles will fall to the French and British.

(It was reported last week from another source that Veles had fallen to the Allies.)

CITY OF SEATTLE IS TO BE DRYDOCKED

The Admiral Farragut, with Consulting Engineer Alison, of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company, on board, arrived in port about 8:15 last night. Mr. Alison made an examination of the City of Seattle as far as possible and was satisfied that the bulkheads would hold firm and that the ship might proceed on her voyage north without the slightest danger. However, it has been decided to put her in the drydock this afternoon in order that a further examination of the injuries to her stem and forward plates may be made.

The Admiral Farragut left at 8:15 this morning for the north with the passengers off the Seattle and the mails, express, and perishable freight.

THE HISTORIC RIVER DANUBE AGAIN FIGURES PROMINENTLY

GERMAN GUNBOATS MAY BE TAKEN FROM ANTWERP TO THE DANUBE WITHOUT FACING ENEMY CRAFT—DANUBE HAS BEEN THE SCENE OF MANY ENCOUNTERS IN THE PAST

British gunners in Serbia have been having a merry time sinking Austrian monitors on the Danube, and we need not be surprised if one of these days we hear of them doing the same to German boats, for it is quite on the books that if the Kaiser has any small gunboats to spare he may send them down southeast to assist the attack on Serbia.

But how, it may well be asked, are German boats to reach the Danube from the North Sea ports when we hold the channel, the Straits of Gibraltar, the Mediterranean, the Aegean, and the entrance to the Dardanelles, and when Russia is supreme in the Black Sea? How in face of all that are the German gunboats to struggle round to the Danube? The fact is they could go from Antwerp to the Black Sea without meeting a single hostile ship, for, unless they are of heavy draught, they could steam right across Europe—up the Rhine, through some canals, then down the Danube.

It sounds incredible, but it is quite possible, and more, for it was actually done a few weeks before the outbreak of the war. Messrs. Yarrow built a couple of small motor engine river monitors for the Roumanian government, and these craft instead of going out to the east by the ocean route were sent to Antwerp, thence

ascend the Rhine for about three hundred miles, then cut across country away up in the heart of Germany to the Danube, which stream bore them down to their destination.

It is truly a mighty stream, this great Danube. Second only to the Volga amongst European streams, it touches (with its tributaries) in the course of its 1,750 miles length, half the countries of Europe. Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Hungary, Montenegro, Serbia, Bulgaria, Roumania, and Russia, all help to swell its mighty flood, and all of these, with the exception of Montenegro and Switzerland, which send down tributaries, are actually coursed by the stream itself. In the old days, before she underwent the shrinking process that followed the Balkan War, Turkey also contributed its quota to the river. Truly it is an international stream.

In early days, indeed, it was essentially an international stream, for as it is the only great river in Europe flowing from west to east, its course naturally became a sort of highway along which successive barbaric hordes from the east penetrated to the centre of Europe. It was up the course of the Danube that the Huns, the Avars, the Slavs, the Magyars, and the Turks all marched in turn when they came out of the east

JOFFRE WILL COMMAND ALL ALLIED TROOPS

Grand Duke Nicholas and Lord Kitchener Will Operate in The Balkans—Zeppelin Taken by Russians.

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Nov. 15.—The Herald announces that it has received information from the Russian Consulate to the effect that General Joffre will be given supreme command of all troops on all fronts.

Th report also states that the Grand Duke Nicholas and Lord Kitchener are to operate against the enemy from different sides of the Balkan States.

London, Nov. 15.—A Zeppelin, which had been damaged by Russian gunfire, was forced to land near Grodno, the crew being captured. The Zeppelin was largely destroyed by the fire.

bent on conquest and slaughter; whilst the route down stream was that followed by the Franks under Charlemagne, the Bavarians, and the Crusaders proceeding to the east.

In more recent times, too, its banks were the scenes of many bloody battles during the Napoleonic wars—Ulm, Austerlitz, Aspern, Wagram, Eckmuhl, Albech, Elchingen were all fought out on the banks of the river or its feeders, and the "Iser, rolling rapidly" of Thomas Campbell's vivid battle poem "Hohenlinden," is likewise a tributary.

Dividing Line Between Nations.

A remarkable feature of the river is that practically its entire lower reaches are in the nature of dividing lines and defences for the various countries it encounters between the plain of Hungary and the Black Sea. With its tributaries, the Drina and the Save, it completely encircles the top of Serbia from Austria and Roumania, whilst a small tributary runs along the Serbo-Bulgarian frontier. For the next three hundred miles it separates Bulgars from Roumanians, and for the last seventy miles or so keeps Russia and Roumania apart.

But that is not all. Its tributaries take after the parent stream. The Drina is the boundary line between Bosnia and Austria-Hungary, the Save between Serbia and Bosnia; in its middle reaches the March and the Leitha separate Austria from Hungary, and the Enns keeps Upper and Lower Austria apart; whilst nearer its source the Inn and the Salzach runs between Austria and Bavaria, and the Iller marks the line of cleavage between Bavaria and Wurtemberg.

Finally, to return to the lower reaches again, its last great tributary, the Pruth, for some three hundred miles has Russia on one side and Roumania on the other.

Consequently the river controls about half the frontiers of south-

GERMANS TAKE MOVIES OF THE SINKING LINER

Rome, Nov. 15.—Latest reports of the sinking of the Italian liner Ancona gave 299 saved out of a total of passengers and crew of 507.

Pasquale Laurino, an American, was struck down by shell fire while waving an American flag.

The Italian public demands that the navy take precautions similar to those employed by the British to rid the Mediterranean of the enemy's submarines.

BETTER TERMS

The Daily News did not "discover" that the per capita expenditure of the McBride government is far in excess of any other province, not excepting the Roblinized Manitoba, for the fact has been abundantly clear for several years, in fact, for the year ending March 31st, 1913, the cost worked out at \$34.18, while Manitoba, which of course ranked next, was \$10.50.

The Journal lays all the blame on the Liberals and on the topography of the province. It would be interesting to know if the Tory organ places under the head of topography the \$35,000 to the Matson press; \$80,000 for a few hours "work" to Bowser's friend Read; \$45,000 graft on the Songhees Reserve deal to J. S. H. Matson; the cost of getting and keeping support in every hole and corner of the province and a host of other items which can be conveniently included as "miscellaneous." The latter should naturally come under some such head as "vote-ography," if we may be permitted to invent a term for something which cannot be adequately described in ordinary language.

The Journal innocently states that the Liberal government when in power refused to help out British Columbia with anything in the way of better terms. Had the Tory organ indulged in a few moments' reflection, it would not have mentioned better terms, as the expression immediately brings to mind the fact that a Better Terms Commission has been in vogue for some time, and that R. E. Gosner drew down something like \$4,000 for services on this commission last year, though the commission has so far done nothing.

It is also interesting to note that, though the Borden government has been in power for four years, nothing has been done to help British Columbia in its financial plunging. The News admits that the Laurier government did nothing in the matter, but the Journal must also admit that the Borden administration has taken four years to accomplish the same result. The Journal says "British Columbia carries on a great deal of work as a province that would be relegated to local governing bodies in other provinces," but this is no reason why this work should not be provided for regularly instead of allowing the province to go so far in the hole. It might also have said that the McBride government carries on a great deal of work which no other province and no local governing body should ever be allowed to do, and live.

eastern Europe. Scarcely a State in that part of the world can go to war without crossing the Danube or some of its tributaries.

On the Danube in 1877.

In the Russo-Turkish War of 1877-78 the Danube figured prominently; indeed it was one of the most sensitive lines of the whole campaign. At that time the river formed the boundary between Roumania and Turkey, for then there was no Bulgaria—it was, as a matter of fact, out of this campaign that modern Bulgaria arose—and as the Roumanians gave the Russian armies permission to march across their country, the line of the Danube was naturally the first defence of the Turk.

It is not improbable that this lower portion of the Danube may again experience the clash of hostile armies as it did when Russian fought Turk in that campaign which produced the fighting at Plevna and the Shipka Pass, for if Russia's method of coming to the assistance of Serbia is overland via Roumania, her operations will be much the same as in 1877. If so, we may look for a repetition of those famous artillery duels between Widin and Kalafat, and Rustchuk and Gieurgievo, whilst the famous old Turkish fortified quadrilateral Rustchuk, Silistria (both on the Danube), Varna, and Shumla may again come into play.

Rustchuk, which was one of the places where the Russian armies crossed the Danube in 1877, was practically wiped out by the Russian artillery, and Silistria (farther down the river), which was invested by the Russians, was also subject to severe bombardments. It, however, was fortunate in possessing a huge subterranean cavern in which the citizens took refuge from the fire of the guns.

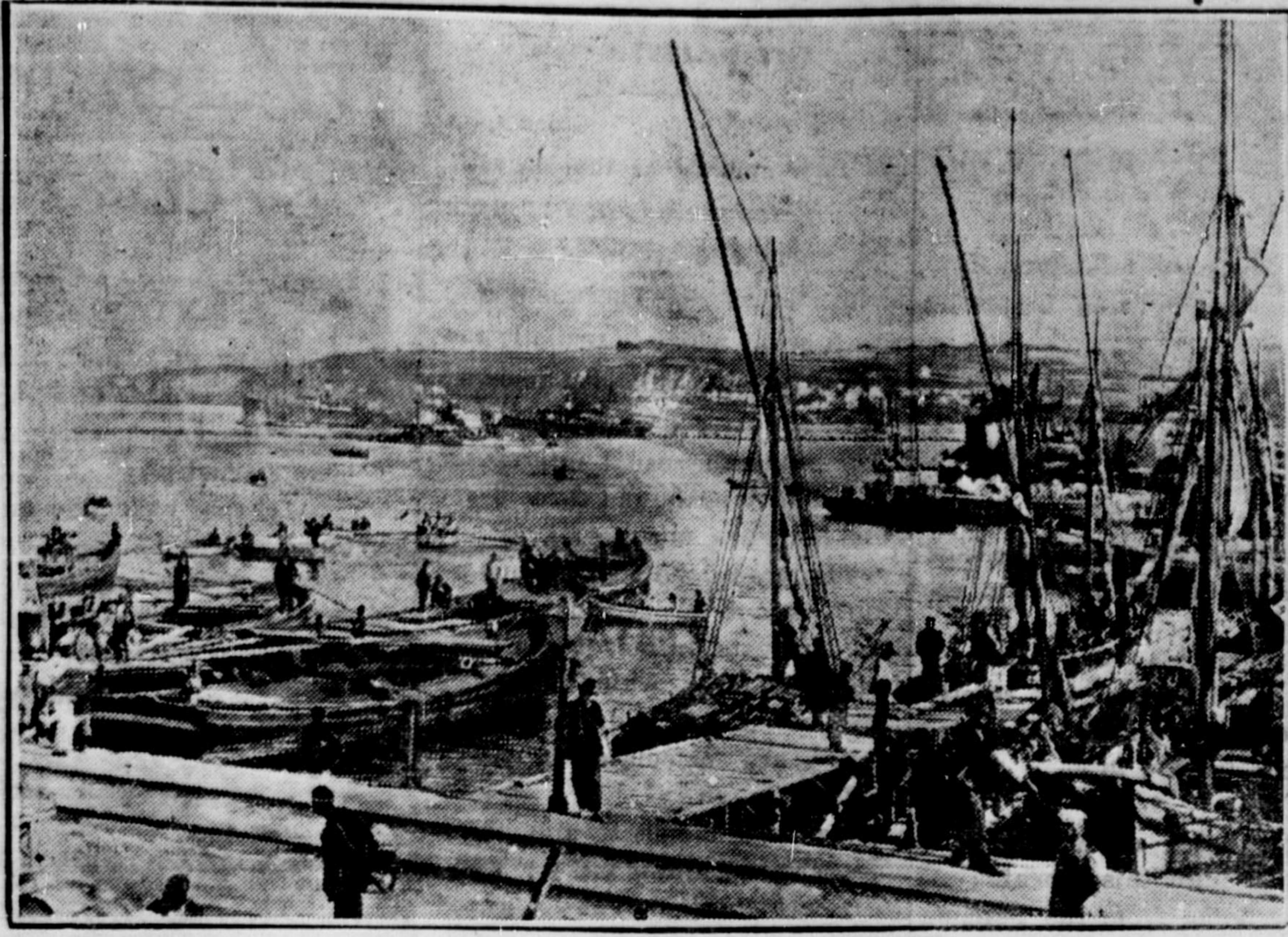

waters of the lower Danube, the
river seeing a great deal of tor-
pedo work in particular. In those
days, however, the torpedo was
not the devilish tin fish it is today,
able to propel itself over a long
range and blow up a warship. It
was then known as the spar tor-

pedo, and as the name implies,
was merely a charge of explosives
held out at the end of a spar.
The method of attack was for the
attacking boat to approach, if
possible, the side of the ship
which was to be attacked, dip the
torpedo spar so that the charge
of explosives was placed against
the side of the intended victim
under the waterline, then explode
the charge by means of percus-
sion or electricity. This primitive
method, it may be recalled, was
unsuccessfully attempted by a
German ship off the Cameroons
last September against the Brit-
ish warships Cumberland and
Dwarf.

This was the kind of game
which the Turks and Russians
played on the Danube some forty
years ago. Amongst the Russian
officers who distinguished them-
selves in the work were Lieut.
Makaroff, the same who, as Rus-
sian naval commander at Port
Arthur, went down with his flag-
ship, the Petropavlovsk, sunk by
a mine during the Russo-Japanese
war, and Lieut. Rojdestvenski, the
ill-fated loser of the battle of Tsu-
shima.

The Russian torpedo boats
made many attacks on the Turk-
ish fleet, and although the for-
tunes of these combats varied
greatly, the Russians had the
better of the exchanges if any-
thing, particularly in view of the
fact that they were dealing with
an entirely new weapon.

The present campaign has al-
ready seen some river fighting on
the Danube, and as Austria, Rou-
mania, Bulgaria, and Russia all
possess river gunboats and mon-
itors, there may be a lot of skir-
mishing on the stream in the
next few weeks. It is rather elo-
quent of the wide-spread rami-
fications of the navy that a British
naval officer in Serbia should
have gained the D. S. O. for sink-
ing an Austrian monitor on the
Danube some months ago.—Ed-
inburgh Dispatch.

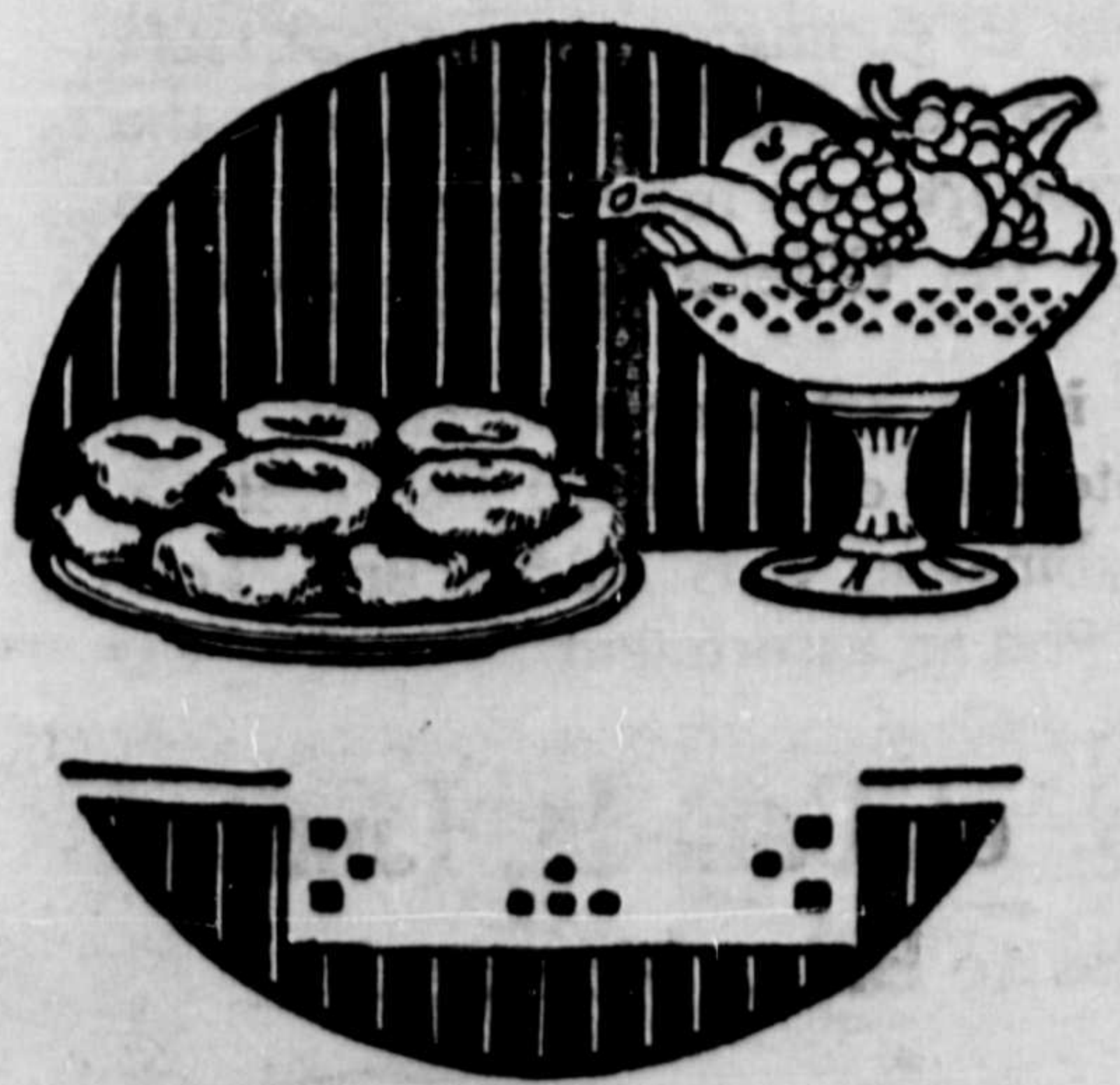

be cared for by the Government and your pay continued
until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an
allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of
your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die
while on Active Service? The Government will provide an
adequate pension, that will enable the family to live com-
fortably until the children are old enough to look after them-
selves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be
her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

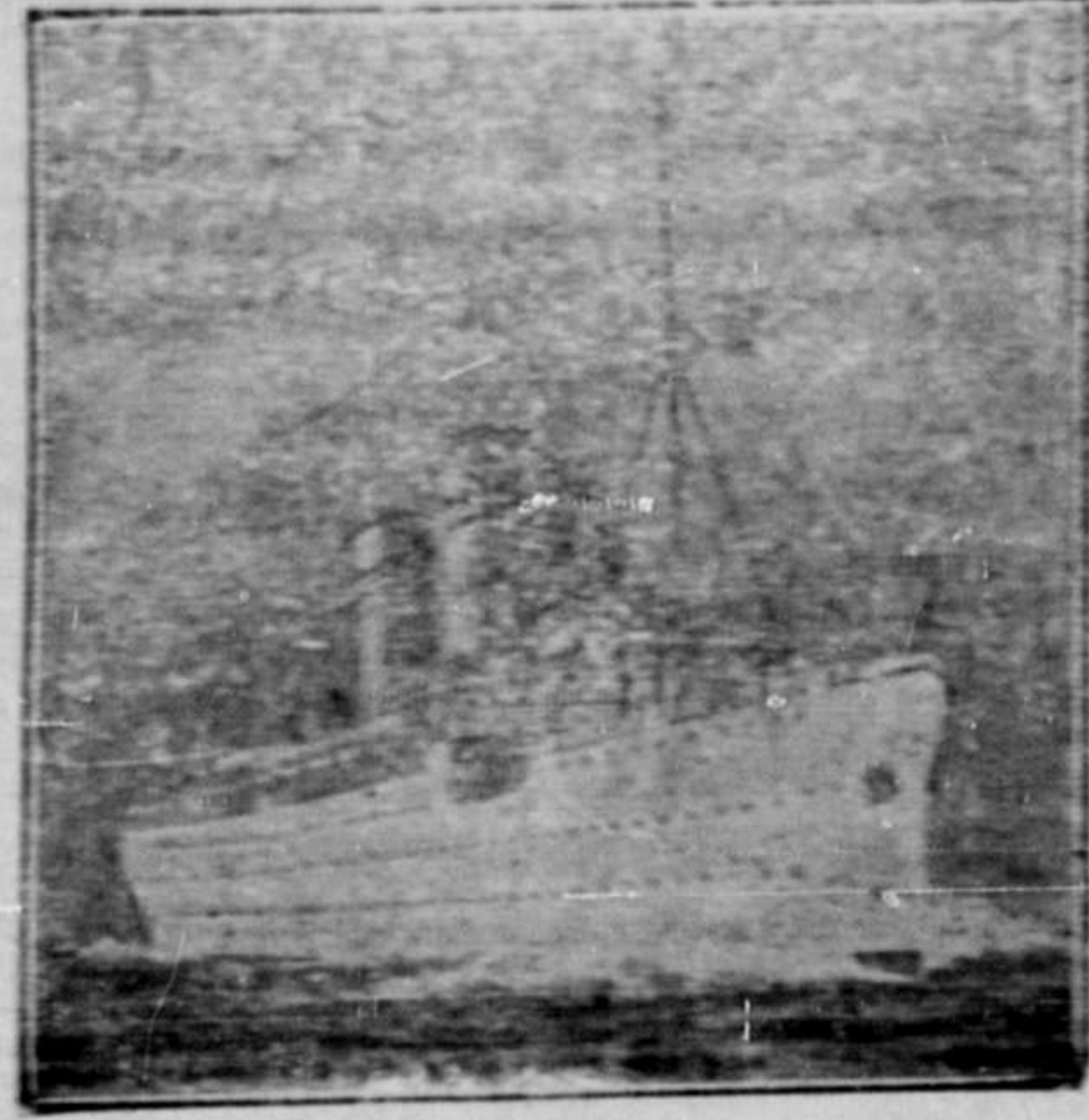

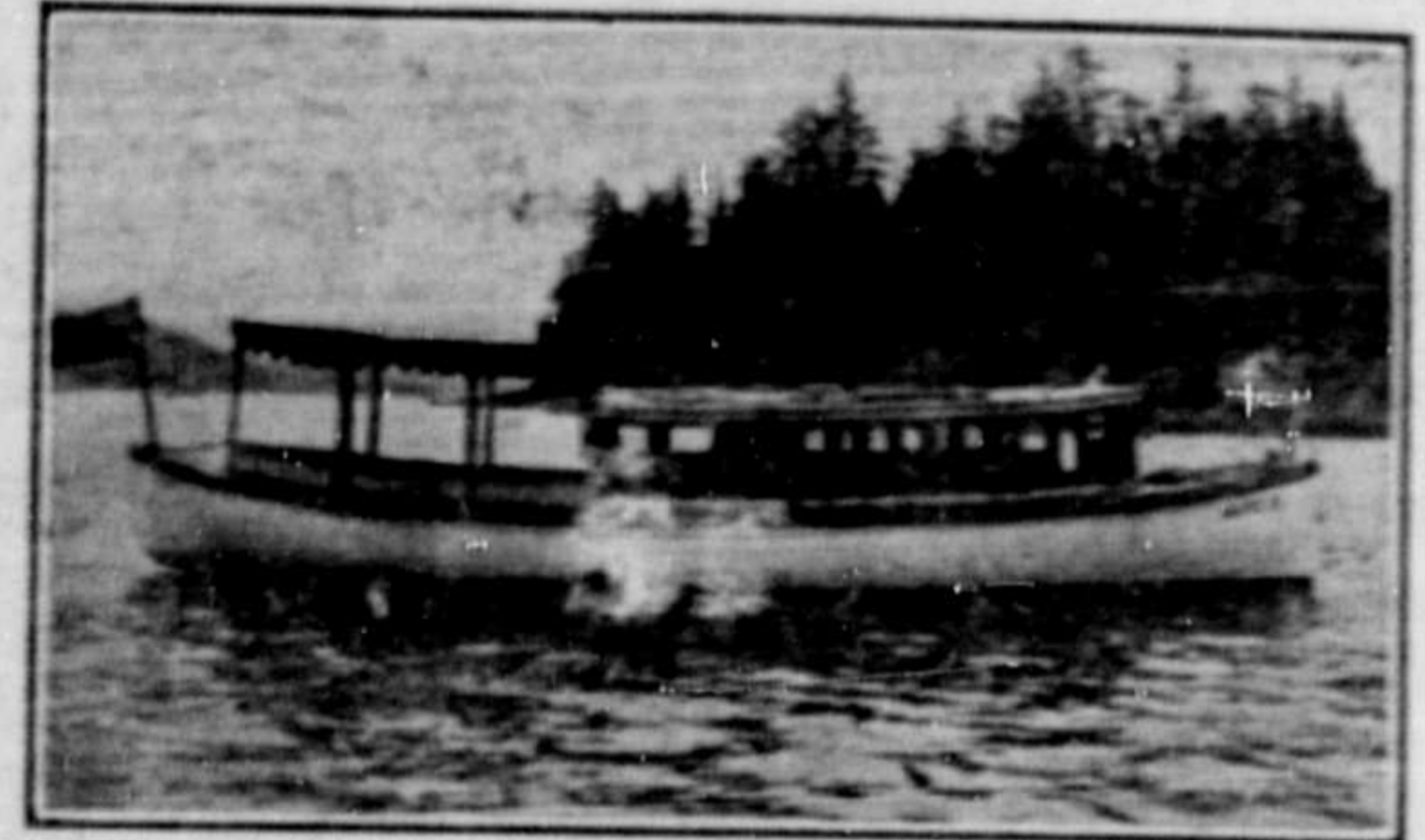
