BULGARIANS REPULSED ALONG ENTIRE LINE

ANTI-DYNASTY OUTBREAK IN GREECE--VENIZELOS WILL NOT FACE ELECTIONS

BULGARS ARE DEFEATED AT CERNA RIVER

Enemy Lose Heavily—Bulgarians Will retreat from Babuna Pass as Position is Now Dangerous.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Nov. 17.—General Sarraill, commander of the French army in the Balkans, announces that as a result of thirty-six hours fighting on the Cerna river in southern Serbia, thirty thousand Bulgarians were repulsed with heavy losses along the entire line. Not a single French gun was lost.

Babuna Pass.

It is reported that the Bulgarians, who have for days been trying to force a passage through Babuna Pass, have been compelled to retreat, owing to the danger of their position being turned by the Allies.

The debarkation of French and British troops at Saloniki continues without incident.

Act of War.

Investigation discloses the fact that the submarine which torpedoed the steamer Firenze was German, the crew wearing German uniforms. At first, the submarine was flying the German flag. The attack on this steamer is regarded by Italy as an act of war.

COLLECTIONS

The finance committee presented a report from the city treasurer to the city council Monday night, showing that \$118,987 of this year's taxes had been collected and that considerable sums were liable to come in under the 10 per cent. rebate arrangement. Up to date 63 1/2 per cent of the 1915 taxes had been collected. The report was adopted.

28 MINERS ARE ENTOMBED AT RAVENSDALE

Explosion caused by Gas and Dust—Rescuers Busy—Three Men Are Dead and Three Rescued.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Seattle, Nov. 17.—Twenty-eight miners are entombed in the workings of the North Western Coal Company's mine at Ravensdale, thirty-five miles southwest of here.

Coal dust mixed with gas is supposed to have caused the explosion which occurred on the 1,500 foot level. Rescuers expect to reach the entombed miners at noon today.

Three Dead.

Three men are dead and three were rescued by the use of pulmotors. The remaining 28 are believed to be dead. The men engaged in the mine were mostly foreigners.

BOB ROGERS IS HANDING OUT A FEW DRYDOCKS

Bob is There With the Promises in the South—New Foundland Awaiting Verdict On Prohibition.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, Nov. 17.—Hon. Bob Rogers is making an inspection of the Pacific coast harbor and dock facilities. He says that the war has shown the importance of having drydock facilities on the Pacific coast.

He states that the Government will spend large sums on harbor and dock improvements in the future.

Prohibition.

St. Johns, Nov. 17.—The question of prohibition in New Foundland depends entirely on the decision of the district of St. Barbe. There is a majority of 685 required to carry the "dry" platform, and it is expected that it will pass by the bare number. The returns from St. Barbe cannot be had for three days yet.

CHARLIE CHAPLIN AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

The Westholme bill tonight is composed of two star features. One is "Ambition," which is the first three-reel Chaplin to be shown here. Three thousand feet of Chaplin should produce enough laughter to lift the roof off the theatre. The other item is of an entirely different character, being a three-reel Broadway star detective drama, entitled "One Performance Only." The play is the work of Charles Brown and is produced by Eugene Mullin. It is a tale of daring daylight robbery, in which a poisoned needle and a cleverly made-up confederate play important parts. The confession of the criminal is most dramatic and spectacular.

VISIT OF INSPECTION FROM THE PROPRIETORS

One little gamin, brighter than the rest, said, "Please, sir, we've put our money into this show, and we've come to see how it's run."

They were taken in and shown all round. Afterwards it transpired that these children came from one of the poorest provided schools in the north of London, and between them had subscribed two hundred farthings to the Children's Hut-Fund of the Y. M. C. A.

HUN METHODS RESENTED BY PATRAS GREEKS

Demonstration Against Dynasty. Ex-premier Venizelos Will Not Contest Elections. Fleet at Saloniki.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Nov. 17.—Anti-dynasty demonstrations have broken out at Patras in Greece. Venizelos declares that he will not contest the elections, which are fixed for December 19th, as a protest against the methods employed by the government to over-rule the people.

Deputies With Army.

Fifty of Venizelos' deputies are now mobilized with the Greek troops and cannot leave their military districts to contest the elections.

Fleet at Saloniki.

The Allies are concentrating a large fleet at Saloniki. The French tri-color was displayed yesterday at Athens in honor of the arrival of the French minister, M. Denys Cochin.

Pro-German Report.

Bucharest, Nov. 17.—Former Premier Carp, a pro-German, in an interview says that Roumania will join Germany in December, after communications make new offers possible.

TIMELY WARNING

The article published yesterday in the London Daily Chronicle by the Hon. G. W. Masterman, certainly looks more than semi-official. Mr. Masterman has for some years been right-hand man to the Right Hon. David Lloyd George and it appears as if he had been commissioned to drop an unofficial hint to Greece and Roumania that they had better get busy, and get busy quick. Those two little countries have been kept out of the war chiefly because of the relationship existing between their crowned heads and the Hohenzollerns, but there has also doubtless been a feeling that Britain would give them a square deal anyhow, in fact would treat them liberally, whether they entered the conflict or not. The Kaiser has kept them pretty well scared with threats as to what will befall anyone who opposes him, and at the same time has made liberal promises to all who will help, generally promises of territory which is not yet, and is never likely to be, his.

The Balkan nations seem to have looked upon Britain as a kindly old grandmother who will always be generous to the weak. The sting in the tail of the Masterman article will do wonders in the way of convincing Greece and Roumania that they will only get what they fight for. Britain made a promise to Greece, and a promise which she could easily fulfill, but that was turned down. Masterman now intimates that the day of promises is past and that the time for action has arrived. The statement leading up to the intimation to Greece and Roumania is just exactly what all thinking men will expect to happen when the war is over, and it is at the

same time a calm intimation that the Allies are going to win. It is simply a final notice to Constantine and Ferdinand that they had better get on the band wagon while it is moving moderately. There is nothing of the bluster of "fearfulness" about it, but just the calm confidence of great strength.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

It is good to see Prince Rupert drydock occupied, if only for a few days.

Ottawa has found that paying civil servants salaries while on active service is expensive, and an order-in-council has been passed providing that only those whose positions do not require to be filled will be allowed to go, and their army allowance will be deducted from their salaries. There ought to be a few regiments still in the government service whose places would not require filling, judging by the number of officials required up to 1911.

If Prince Rupert does not provide much level ground for drilling soldiers, it at least presents splendid opportunities for mountain work, and, if the boys are going to the Balkans, such training might be useful.

It is reported that certain gentlemen in town were surprised and not particularly pleased, to find that Colonel Warden is a soldier and not a politician.

PACIFIC ISLANDS ARE FORMALLY ANNEXED

London, Nov. 13.—The Official Gazette announced that the Gilbert and Ellice Islands in the Pacific, which have been British protectorates since 1892, now have been formally annexed to the British Empire. This action was taken at the expressed desire of the native governments, it is stated.

Both the Gilbert and Ellice groups are in the Pacific, about 250 miles northeast of Australia. The Ellice group has been listed for years as a British possession, but the Gilbert Islands were German until last year, when an Australian expeditionary force captured them.

DISCOURTESY ENQUIRY

The finance committee reported to the council Monday night the result of their investigations regarding the complaint of discourtesy on the part of one of the staff in the treasurer's office. The committee found that there were only two members of the staff on duty at the time and that they were busy with taxpayers. The information wanted by Ald. Casey was to be had from the light department, and the official in question was obliged to leave taxpayers standing until he went upstairs to procure the information, which the alderman could have procured from the department direct himself.

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ALD. MONTGOMERY OBJECTS TO METHODS

On the warrant book for last month being brought down at the council last Monday night for approval, Ald. Montgomery objected to the council being asked to endorse accounts which they knew nothing about. He moved that they be laid on the table for one week.

Ald. Dybhavn, seconded by Ald. Edge, moved that the accounts be adopted as usual. These gentlemen pointed out that they were following a course which had been followed for years without comment, and stated that the vouchers could be examined at any time by any member of the council.

Ald. Montgomery said he knew that the method had been followed for years, but held that the aldermen should know exactly what they were adopting, which at present they did not. The accounts were Greek to him and he believed they were the same to others.

Ald. Beveridge, seconded Ald. Montgomery's motion, stating that he believed that the accounts were in order, but that the members of the council should know what was being done.

The mayor said that the accounts were brought down in the usual way and it was for the members to say what was to be done with them. Ald. Montgomery had passed them in this way for years without complaint. If there was any doubt about the accuracy of accounts he advised every member to vote for delay.

Ald. Montgomery said he did not question the accuracy of the accounts, but he wanted things done in a businesslike way. Ald. Edge withdrew his motion for the adoption of the accounts and it was decided to lay them on the table for one week.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

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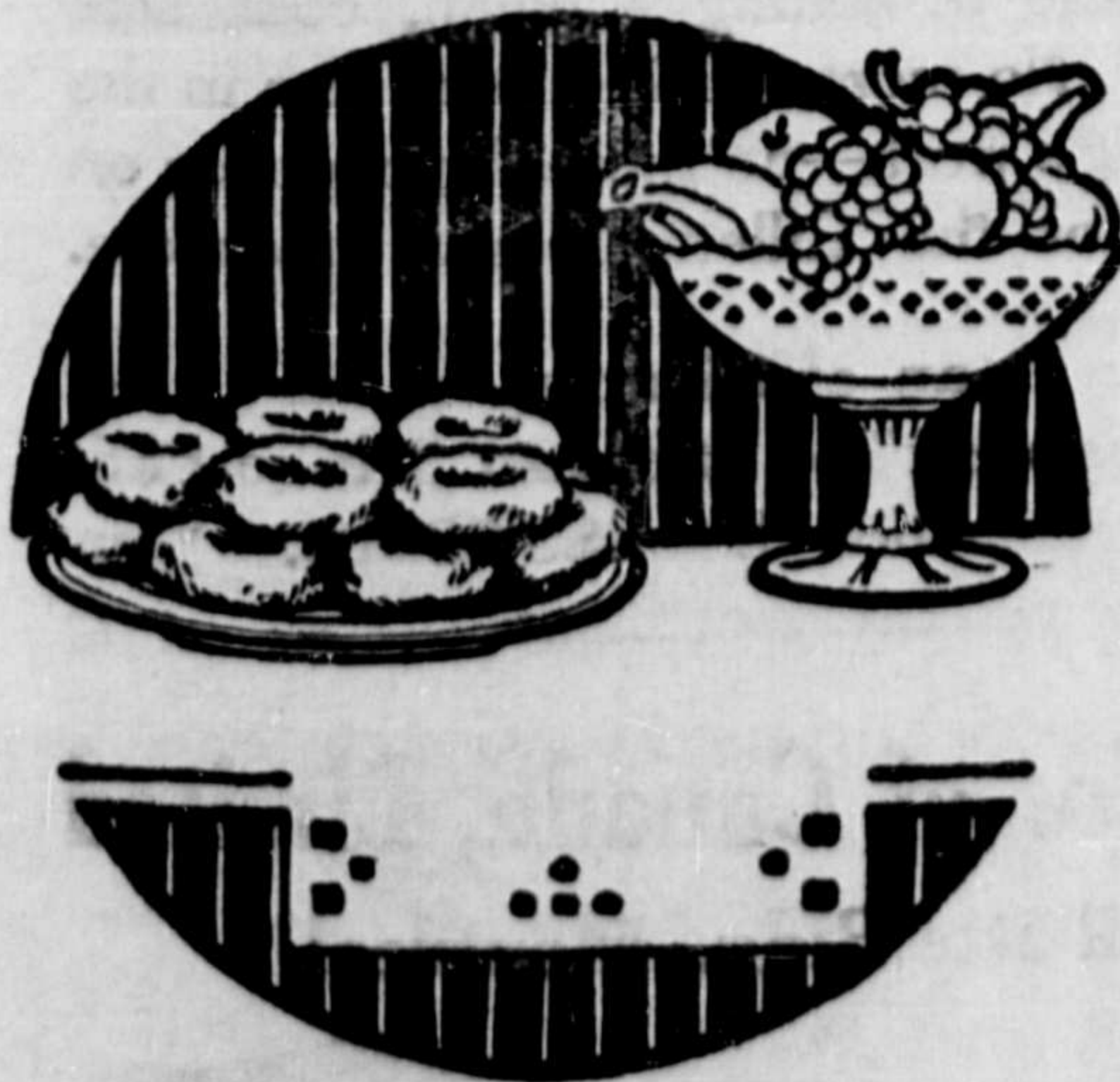

THE EMPLOYMENT OF MARRIED MEN BY CITY

At the city council Monday, Ald.
Beveridge brought down a motion
that single men employed by the
city be replaced by married men
wherever possible. He said that
he felt certain there were many
single men drawing good salaries
from the city while many married
men were idle.

The motion was seconded by
Ald. Montgomery.

Ald. Dybhavn said he did not
quite grasp the motion and want-
ed to know if being married was
to be the sole qualification for
city employment. He felt that
efficiency was the first essential.
Provided a married man was
thoroughly qualified he was cer-
tainly in favor of him as against
a single man, but he did not see
that a good man should be let go
simply because he is single.

Ald. Njeol moved that the mat-
ter be left over for a week pend-
ing a report from the various de-
partments as to the number of
single men on the payroll.

Ald. Edge held that the mem-
bers were very inconsistent as
they had hired a single man as
against a married man last week,
six voting for the single man and
two for the married.

Ald. Montgomery said that a
single man who had earned good
wages for several years should be
able to take a rest. He pointed
out that the man hired last week
supported his mother.

Ald. Beveridge said that he did
not want to alter the efficiency of
the staff, but he thought there
were single men employed who
should be at the front and there
were many efficient married men
out of work.

The mayor said that, for
months past, the departments
had always given preference to
married men, except in the fire
department, and married men did
not care for that line of work.

It was carried unanimously that
a report be brought in next week
giving a list of the single men
and their rate of wages.
