REPORTED SERBIAN RETREAT FROM BABUNA PASS -- ROOSEVELT MAY FIGHT

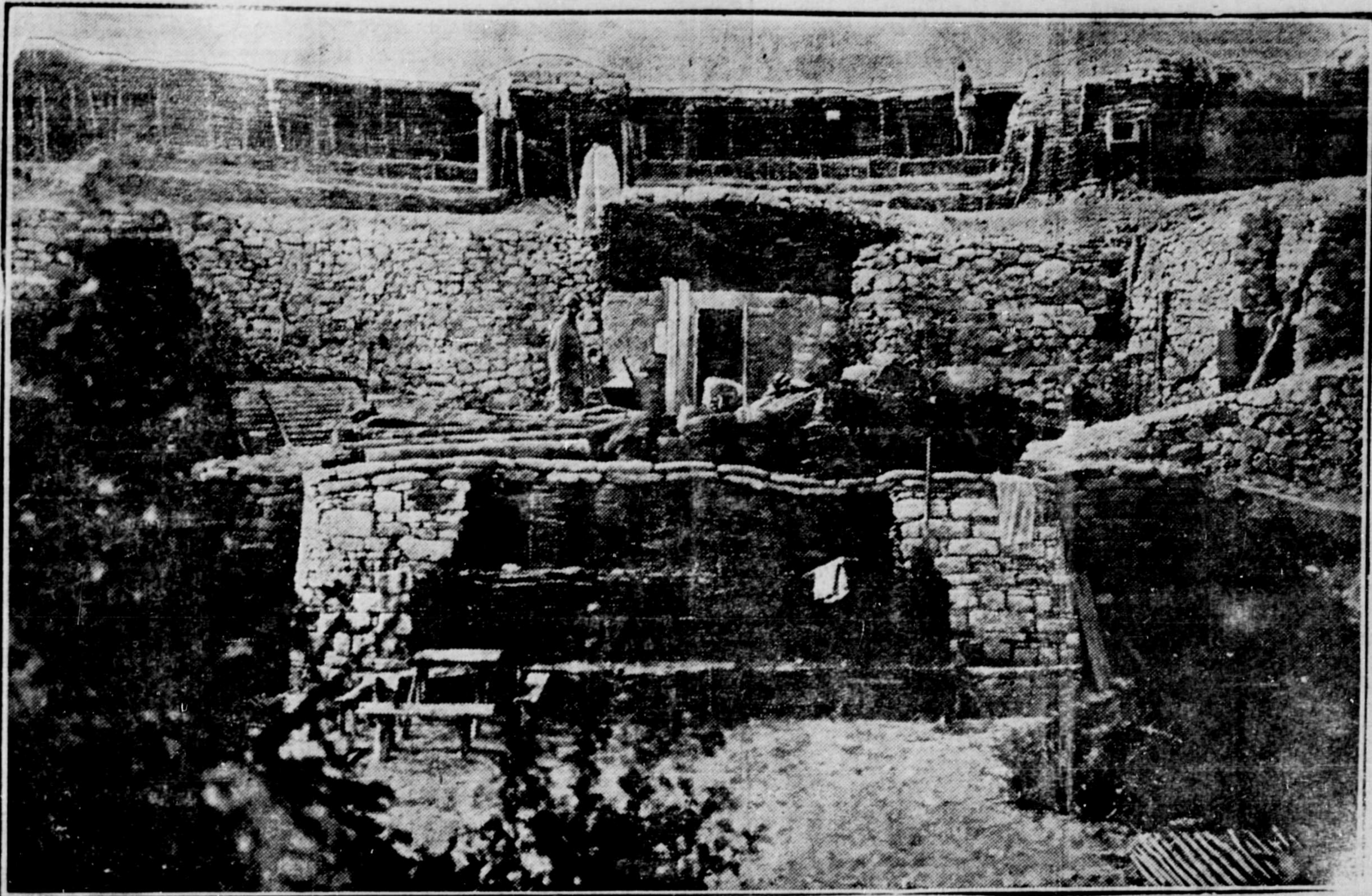
ALLIES SEND AN ULTIMATUM TO THE GREEKS

Report of Ultimatum Passed By British Censor—Serbians Are Retreating From Babuna Pass.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Copenhagen, Nov. 19.—It is reported that Great Britain and her allies have sent an ultimatum to Greece. The report is credited as it had been passed by the British censor between Athens and Copenhagen.

Reported Serbian Retreat.
Paris, Nov. 19.—An unofficial report states that the Serbians are in retreat from Babuna Pass, after killing five thousand more than their own numbers. They saved all their artillery.

It is stated that the retreat was decided upon in order to escape being surrounded by a Bulgarian enveloping movement. They are retreating towards Albania through the Monastir region.

REPORT THAT ROOSEVELT IS TO VOLUNTEER

Teddy Will Command A Canadian Division—Ranks Open to Americans—Choose Your Death in Utah.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Nov. 19.—The Free Press reports that Colonel Roosevelt may volunteer for active service with the Canadian troops, and that he will be given the command of a Canadian division, which will be open to Americans for recruiting.

The leading of a Canadian division would not abrogate his rights as an American citizen, nor would it affect his right to contest the presidency at the end of the war.

In the Letter Box

Editor Daily News:—Will you kindly allow me space to express a few thoughts and observations which I have made during the last few years?

I have on several occasions attended the meeting of our city council for the last three years or more. I have, with the rest of the ratepayers, followed closely the early developments of our city, and I have seen conditions come down to a point of practical stagnation as far as city work is concerned.

The annual reports issued by the city show that during the 8 months our first city council sat in office they had 110 regular and adjourned meetings. The council of 1911 held 80 regular and four special meetings in 12 months, in 1912, 66 regular and 4 special meetings, in 1913, 55 regular and 7 special meetings, and in 1914, 58 regular and 6 special meetings. The council of 1910 in order to pave the way had to sit till the small hours in the morning in order to get through with the work they had on hand. Our councils have also since that time experienced late sittings, which on a good many occasions were not called for by the amount of work on hand.

In my opinion the councils in the early days of the city earned their \$33 per month. As conditions are now it hardly takes half an hour per week to attend to the routine work of the council, but lacking any regular subjects to pass time over, I have witnessed occasions of discussion which, in my humble opinion, did not add much to the prestige of the council. Trivial matters which should have been attended to by heads of departments have caused long

Parisian Dressmakers Refuse to Sell to a German—Three Taubes Drop Bombs On Luneville.

Paris, Nov. 19.—The Dressmakers' Syndicate has blacklisted a German-American costumiere, named Kurzmann, who was engaged to purchase Parisian gowns for Mrs. Norman Galt, to be worn at the forthcoming presidential wedding.

Kurzmann threatens to stir up a diplomatic disturbance over the question, while the syndicate offers to present the gowns to Mrs. Galt, rather than sell them through a German.

SINGLE CIVIL SERVANTS ARE ASKED TO 'LIST

Enough Married Men to Carry on Civil Service—Anti-prohibition Petition by The Carload.

Victoria, Nov. 19.—The Provincial secretary, Dr. H. E. Young, is sending out notices to all single able-bodied employees of the British Columbia government that it is the desire of the government to see them join the forces for overseas service. The notice states that there are sufficient married employees in the government service to carry on the work of the civil service.

SLANDERING THE LIBERALS

The charge of unpreparedness for war, so persistently made by the Northcliffe agitators on both sides of the Atlantic, is the half-truth and is worse than a lie, and is equalled in effrontery only by the slanderous assertion of the Toronto News that "the Liberal party in Canada, as in England, is a party disgraced and utterly discredited." Before the British Liberals came into power, in 1905, the foundations of German aggressive policy were well and securely laid, and the opprobrium now heaped upon Mr. Asquith and his colleagues differs only slightly in degree from that which Conservative statesmen had to bear at the hands of the "professional whippersnappers" during the previous five years. Even Mr. Joseph Chamberlain did not escape the slings and arrows of the Maxses when, in 1899, he went the length of declaring for an Anglo-German alliance. The history of British foreign diplomacy in the twenty years preceding the present war represented in the main a continuity of policy by both the great parties. Prince Bernhard Von Buelow, in "Imperial Germany," makes the striking admission that:

"It is in no small degree due to the unbroken continuity of her foreign policy, handed down from century to century pursuing its aims on definite lines, independent of changes of party government, that England has won such magnificent successes in international policies. The alpha and omega of English policy has always been the attainment and maintenance of English naval supremacy."

This war provides a complete refutation of the sweeping gen-

eralities indulged in by the Northcliffe scaremongers. To hold Liberals responsible for the successes in recent years which attended German diplomacy in directions calculated to strengthen her position as a great world-power is to fly in the face of incontrovertible facts. Nor are the Maxses and the Northcliffes on more solid ground when they allege that this conflict, with all its surprises in technical warfare, could have been foreseen and provided against. Nothing in the whole course of Lord Roberts' campaign served to throw any light whatever on the actualities of war as revolutionized by German secret preparations. Had the proposals of the military critics been carried into effect the immediate result would have been an enormous outlay on methods of warfare which German military science has rendered obsolete, and a consequent waste of resources which would have seriously weakened Britain in the day of resting.

Those who delight in minimizing British efficiency in this war should read the memorandum appended to the German Navy Bill of 1900. No one can rise from a perusal of this document without a feeling of thankfulness that the efficiency of Britain as a maritime power, resting her security on naval supremacy, has brought to pass the forebodings of German statesmen:

"An unsuccessful naval war of the duration of even only a year would destroy Germany's sea trade, and would thereby bring about the most disastrous conditions, first in her economic, and then, as an immediate consequence of that, in her social life. Quite apart from the consequences of the

possible peace conditions, the destruction of our sea trade during the war could not, even at the close of it, be made good within measurable time, and would thus add to the sacrifices of the war a serious economic depression."

Germany's emergence into the regions of world-policy was a challenge to Britain at sea, as Bismarck, forty years earlier, had challenged the military powers of Europe in the furtherance of his continental policy. The efficiency in this war of the British navy—for which a Liberal government was directly responsible—is not challenged by the enemy. The British navy, in maintaining the unbroken traditions of British policy makes victory for Germany impossible.

Democracy in the hour of trial has stood the test of war and belied the false prophets. Hence the fury of the Northcliffes and the Maxses.—Toronto Globe.

CROWN PRINCE'S MOTHER-IN-LAW DISSATISFIED

The Grand Duchess of Mecklenburg, born a Grand Duchess of Russia, mother of the Crown Princess of Germany, is at present residing at Cannes, on the French Riviera. Her relations with the German Court and with her son-in-law are well known not to be of a friendly character; and Le Matin, in an article on her, states that she has formed the project of endeavoring to get her daughter to leave the Crown Prince. She has not yet succeeded, but she is not without hope. Fifteen days ago, says Le Matin, the powerful auto of the Grand Duchess took her from Cannes to the Swiss frontier. There she took the train to Innerlaken, very happy, for she was going to meet her daughter, the Crown Princess. She believed her daughter had absolutely decided to quit "un Empire maudit." But the Crown Prince had mistrusted his wife, and had taken precautions. The young mother was there, but not her two children, of whom she is very fond. She believed she would have been able to bring them with her, but they had been detained by force. It was a Princess in tears that the Grand Duchess found, and with whom she could only have a short interview. The Grand Duchess returned to her chateau in Cannes alone. But, says Le Matin, "with her ardent and fearless disposition, she does not despair. She has sworn to take away her daughter from those who have definitely compromised her happiness, and who have shaken one throne to which she was called."

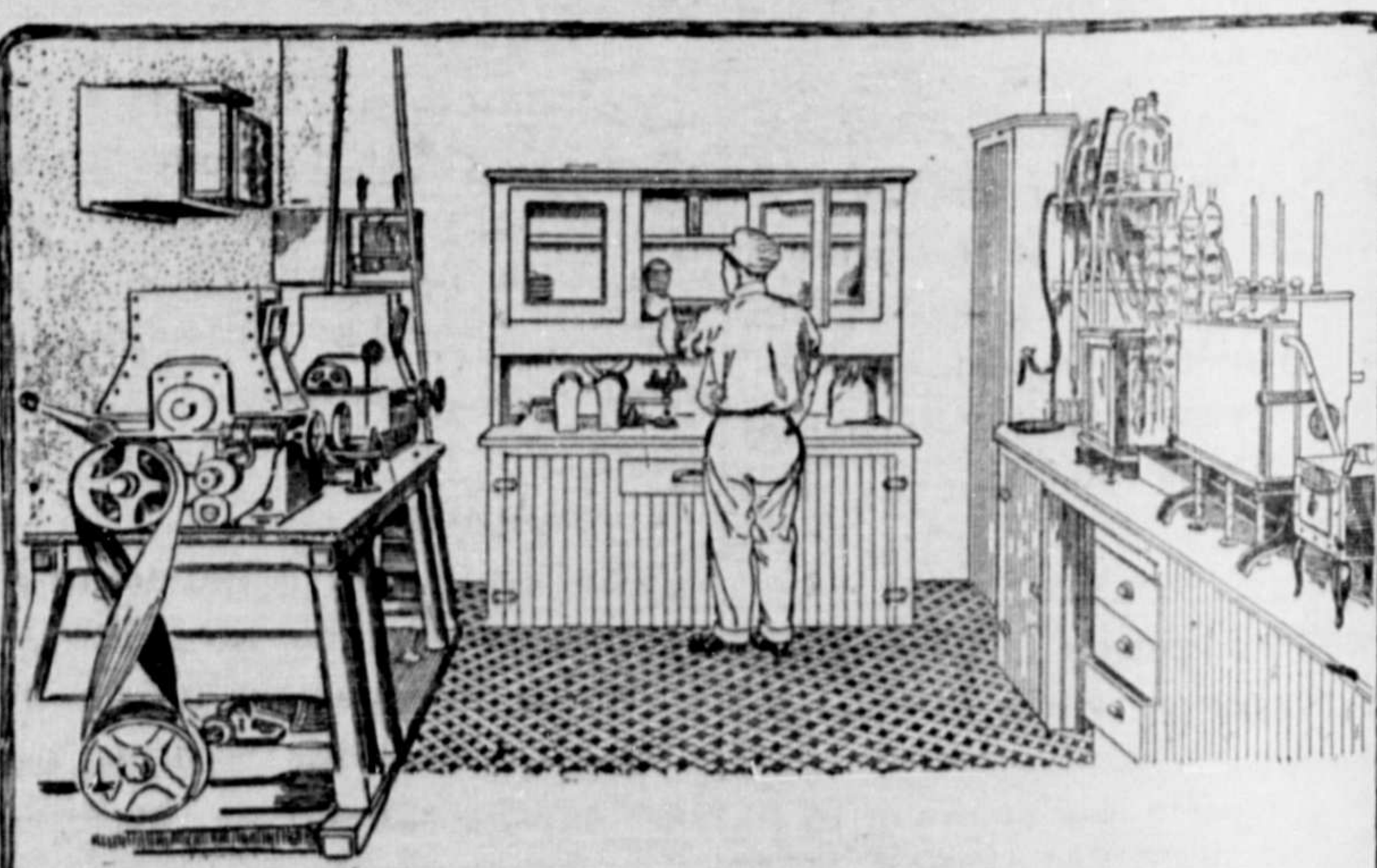

PACKING PRESENTS FOR OUR SOLDIERS

The public is urged to exercise every care in packing parcels for the troops, as careful packing is absolutely essential to ensure delivery of the parcels in good order.

Parcels sent abroad require a higher standard of packing than is necessary in the Canadian Parcel Post, and this applies with even greater force to parcels for the troops. Those which are inadequately packed run great risk of damage or loss of contents.

Thin cardboard boxes, such as shoe boxes, and thin wooden boxes should not be used, nor does a single sheet of ordinary brown paper afford sufficient protection.

The following forms of packing are recommended:

- (1) Strong double cardboard boxes, preferably those made of corrugated cardboard, and having lids which completely enclose the sides of the boxes.
- (2) Strong wooden boxes.
- (3) Several folds of stout packing paper.
- (4) Additional security is afforded by an outer covering of linen, calico or canvas, which should be securely sewn up.

The address of the parcel should be written in ink on the cover preferably in two places.

The address of the sender of parcel should also be stated in order that it may be returned if undeliverable. The contents of the parcel should be stated in writing on the cover.

In the case of parcels sent to the Mediterranean force, they should be very strongly packed. They should be as nearly round as possible, and well padded with shavings, crumpled paper, or a similar protective material. The outer covering should consist of strong linen, calico or canvas, and should be securely sewn up. The use of wooden or metal boxes with square corners is undesirable, as parcels so packed are liable to injure other parcels in transit. No perishable articles should be sent, and anything likely to become soft or sticky, such as chocolates, should be enclosed in tins. Parcels merely wrapped in paper or packed in thin cardboard boxes, such as shoe boxes, cannot be accepted.

WATER NOTICE

TAKE NOTICE that R. B. McGinnis, whose address is Alice Arm, British Columbia, will apply for a licence to take and use fifteen second feet of water out of Trout Creek, which flows westerly and drains into Kitsuult River, about 16 miles north of its outlet at Alice Arm, B. C. The water will be diverted from the stream at a point about 500 vertical feet above point of use, near its mouth, and will be used for power and mining purpose upon the land described as Wolf Group of Mining Claims. This notice was posted on the ground on the 26th day of October, 1915. A copy of this notice and an application pursuant thereto and to the "Water Act, 1914" will be filed in the office of the Water Recorder at Prince Rupert, B. C. 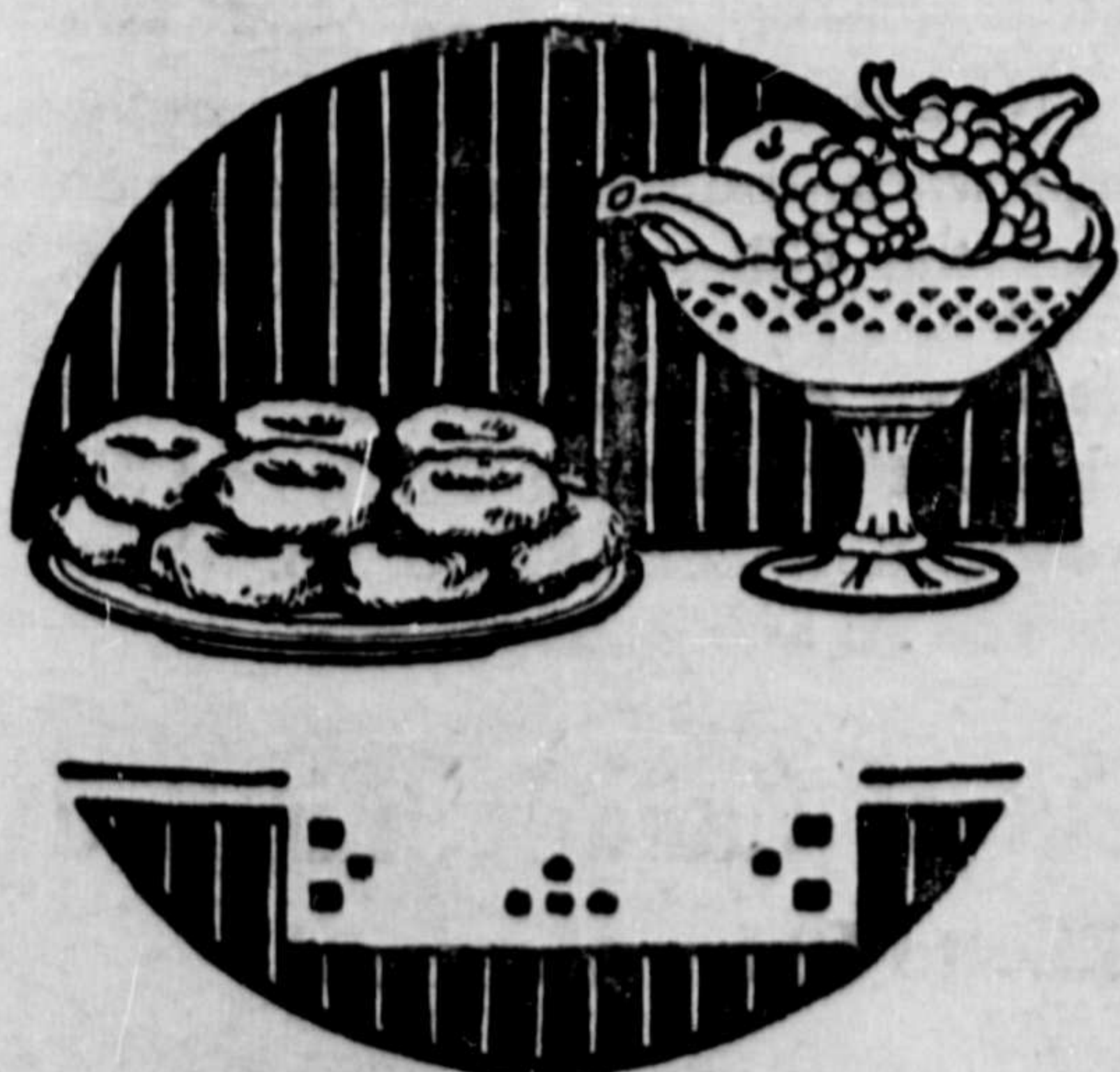

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

my surprise that at the time of offering himself for re-election a majority of the then council had promised him if re-elected he would get the \$2,000, and that if he did not get this amount he would resign, and Ald. Edge's statement on that same occasion that our present mayor was the best man for the city for the money, or words to that effect, was rather amusing to me. A large majority of the council took the stand that they wanted the \$400.

I desire the ratepayers of this city to note, that these amounts of \$2,000 for the mayor and \$400 for the aldermen are the extreme limits allowed by the statute to be paid by cities with a population of 20,000 or less. With nothing to do but merely to hold the chairs down in order to comply with the requirements of the law, does it seem reasonable with a small population as we have now, that we should pay the same indemnity as a city of 20,000? This matter should receive the serious consideration of all ratepayers for this coming election. It looks very much as though a majority of the council is there chiefly for the \$400. If this be so, in my opinion we are on a wrong track. It is a wrong principle and one demanding serious consideration. Under present conditions I am sure we have in our city public spirited men who would consider it an honor to serve on the council for the best interests and welfare of our city—probably without any pay, or in any case at a rate reduced in proportion to existing conditions. In my opinion the present amounts should at least be cut in two, thus effecting a saving on this one item of about \$2,600.

Should not this question be one worthy of serious consideration by the ratepayers at this coming election? Would it not be well to have prospective candidates for our municipal honors express themselves on this point?

We should get public spirited men into office, men who would look more to the honor than to the indemnity, and serve the community regardless of the amount of the cheque.

BYLAW 263.

A BYLAW TO SHORTEN THE HOURS DURING WHICH THE BUSINESS OF RETAIL GROCER MAY BE CARRIED ON. THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—
1. After the coming into force of this bylaw all shops in the City of Prince Rupert in which the business of retail grocer is carried on, shall be closed and remain closed at and after the following time, that is to say:—
On ordinary weekdays, namely, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, (six-thirty) 6.30 o'clock p. m.
On Saturdays to remain open as long as desired.

On days prior to public holidays, remain open as long as desired.
During ten (10) days prior to Christmas Day to remain open as long as desired.
2. Any person breaking this bylaw by keeping his shop open after the hour allowed by this bylaw shall be liable to a fine of not more than Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for each day and in default of payment of such fine to imprisonment for not exceeding thirty (30) days.
3. This bylaw is passed under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon the Municipal Council by Section 4 of the Shops Regulation Act.
4. This bylaw shall come into force on the 25th day of November, A. D. 1915, and before that date shall be published by inserting the same in one newspaper published in the City of Prince Rupert, for one day.
