SERBS AND ITALIANS SCORE BIG VICTORIES

ITALIANS HOLD GROUND GAINED -- BULGARIANS SUSTAIN ENORMOUS LOSSES

BIG ITALIAN GAIN ON THE ISONZO FRONT

Italians Occupy Heights Northwest of Gorizia—Ground Gained Is Held—Turks Lose A Transport.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, Nov. 22.—An official statement says that the Italian troops have scored an important victory over the Austrians on the Isonzo front, and are now occupying the heights northwest of Gorizia.

Terrific Bombardment.
The Austrian fortifications were destroyed by a terrific Italian artillery bombardment which lasted from Thursday until Saturday.

Ground Gained.
The ground gained has been retained by the Italians, in spite of vigorous efforts by the Austrians to recapture it.

Turk Transport Mined.
London, Nov. 22.—An Amsterdam despatch reports that a Turkish transport has been sunk in the Sea of Marmora, resulting in the drowning of 500 soldiers. The vessel struck a mine and nearly all on board of her were drowned.

BISHOP DU VERNET HEARS FROM MAJOR PECK

In a letter to Bishop Du Vernet Major Peck writes:—"We are still having a quiet time on our front although on other fronts very severe fighting is taking place. It is hard to say when we shall be in a more active sphere, but it is not likely we will escape the fall movement as our troops are now such veterans and are so steady and reliable in action that all the British generals admire them and have the greatest confidence in them. We have without doubt the finest, bravest, most intelligent and most enthusiastic troops in the world in our Canadian divisions, and one never gets done admiring their manliness and self sacrifice and being enthusiastic about them.

We have with our division Rev. Canon Scott who says he knows you. He is a splendid man and never spares himself, but comes out in the dark, rainy nights to bury those who get killed and does not heed the weather nor stray bullets. I was walking down overland from the trenches one night recently with him when the enemy opened fire with a machine gun on the parapets and the bullets were coming over them and thick about us and we had to lie flat on the ground for a spell. However, one gets very accustomed to that sort of thing. Major Gibson has now got a commission and is well and hearty. Mr. Godenrath is well, but I hear his wife is not very well. All the other boys are well. Arthur Collison is still with our regiment. He is a fine soldier."

SERBS SCORE BIG VICTORY OVER BULGARS

Bulgarians Driven Back With Heavy Losses—Kitchener Had Satisfactory Interview With The Greek King.

Paris, Nov. 22.—The Serbians have won an important victory over the Bulgarians near Leskovtz on the Nish-Saloniki railroad, twenty-five miles south of Nish.

This news corresponds with an official Serbian despatch which states that the victory definitely secures this part of the railroad line from further attack by the enemy.

The battle lasted for several days and the Bulgarian losses were enormous.

Kitchener Sees Constantine.
Lord Kitchener, British secretary of war, and his staff had a conference at Athens with King Constantine, the Greek premier, Skouloudais, and General Donsma. It is stated that the conference was successful from an Allied standpoint.

CZAR MOVING TO BREAK THE BULGAR LINES

Russians Trying to Break Lines of Communication Between The German and the Bulgarians.

London, Nov. 22.—The Czar is moving a big army in the south in an effort to cut the communication lines between Germany and the Bulgarians. The Kaiser realizes the danger of the new Russian move and is planning to counter it.

No Halt.
There is no truth in the rumor that England was contemplating the stopping of her Saloniki expedition. An official statement says that no halt will be made.

Greek Assistance.
The Greeks will give the Allies every assurance of favorable treatment if their troops are forced on to Greek territory.

THREE HALIBUT SCHOONERS ASHORE

Fishermen have brought a report to the port that the schooners Constance and Yakatat are ashore in Icy Bay, about eighty miles north of Yakatat Bay, where the Yakatat lost two men recently. It seems that the boats were sheltering there when the wind changed and, rising to a gale, drove them ashore.

One report, which we publish elsewhere, states that the Progress had been towed into shelter with her steering gear gone, but a later report affirms that she is also ashore near the Constance and Yakatat.

There is still no word of the schooner Idaho, which has been gone for over a month. It is feared that she is lost.

TIME TAKING ITS REVENGE ON THE BORDEN GOVERNMENT

CONSERVATIVE LEADERS REMAIN SILENT REGARDING THE DISLOYALTY OF NATIONALISTS — THE QUEBEC CAMPAIGN AGAINST ARMY RECRUITING

Ottawa, November 20.—Time is taking its revenge on the Borden government. The sins of its youth are coming home to roost. Pontius Pilate, it will be remembered, could wash his hands of his troubles, but the Borden government finds it not so easy to be free of its early indiscretions.

For instance, there are the Nationalists with whom the Conservative party formed a league in 1909 to divide Quebec and defeat Laurier. The gospel of the Nationalists in 1911 was that the Naval Service Act was a thinly veiled plan of England's to drag Canadians from their homes and send them as cannon meat to the seven seas. Of course one of the objects of that act was to enable us to defend our shores and make it largely unnecessary to send Canadian armies to Europe to defend our shores from that distance, as we are doing now in Flanders, and elsewhere. But the Nationalists did not see it in that light and closed their eyes to the truth. The eyes of many are sealed to this day, in which respect their eyes resemble the mouths of their leaders at Ottawa who ceased shouting as soon as they took office.

However, there is no doubt that then as now, a few of the Nationalist leaders and most of the Nationalist followers believed what they preached. At least, one leader was sincere enough to imagine that the Conservative party would keep its promises and that the Nationalist doctrine would be represented by something more than four cabinet ministers, three of whom could be trusted to put the soft pedal on, when a cabinet portfolio was the inducement. He was in hopes that Nationalism would be an article of the party creed. When this did not turn out as Mr. Monk wished and expected, he remitted his office, resigned all honors and titles, and withdrew from public life. Thus did Mr. Monk show himself, the one faithful, true man in that rollicking band of place hunters who called themselves the Nationalist leaders.

The party arrangements in the House of Commons made room for Mr. Blondin, he who would have shot holes in the Union Jack, and as Deputy Speaker he voted with as much joyousness for three dreadnoughts to be furnished by Canada to England, as he had spoken previously on the hustings against a navy for Canada furnished by herself. It is hard to see just where the nationalism is in that vote of Mr. Blondin's, but he seemed able to reconcile it with reason and his expressed opinions, as did also Messrs. Pelletier, Nantel and Coderre who were ministers of the Crown and felt their positions keenly, even more keenly than

they did their previous convictions.

As a matter of fact the government could at all times depend on the vote of the Nationalist leaders in the cabinet. If the government had asked them to vote for a conscript army to be sent overseas to conquer China in a Canadian navy handled by pressed men they would have done so quite cheerfully. Moreover, they would have made a virtue of it by explaining that they did it from a sense of duty to their high office. Come what might the Nationalist leaders would stick to the ship of state as long as there was a dollar in the hold.

As it was with the Nationalist leaders in the House of Commons, so it came to be with the Nationalist (Continued on Page Two)

TORY SCHEMING

On Saturday, the Journal served up an article from the Victoria Colonist, which was typically Matsonian. The article, which stated that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Robert Borden had not yet been able to agree as to the extension of the life of the present parliament, went on to point out that if the Liberals did not agree to the Tory terms, they would be responsible for bringing about an election. Could anything be more ridiculous?

The Rogers press, since the debacle in Manitoba and the exposure of graft all over the country in connection with war contracts, has been loud in its demands that the life of the Borden government be extended for two years after the end of the war. The Journal accuses the Liberals of playing for time, when the Tories are deliberately playing for an extension of years. The Liberals are taking their own time to consider such a proposal, while the Tories are demanding two years of time which do not belong to them.

Why all the rush? The life of the present parliament does not end for a year yet, and in that time much may happen which will have a bearing on the situation. Meantime, the duty of all Canadians, Liberal and Tory, is to prosecute the war with all vigor. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has loyally supported the government in its efforts to cope with the war situation, though he could not bring himself to shut his eyes to the graft which was going on. Loyalty demanded that he protest strongly against the bleeding of the people by the Tory leeches.

If the Tory demands are so

ridiculous as to bring about a refusal from Sir Wilfrid, the responsibility for whatever may happen is entirely up to the Conservatives. If the Tories are more interested in providing for themselves and their friends than in conducting the business of Canada at a time when the country is embroiled in war, they must take the consequences. The situation is perfectly clear to all. The Tories want an assured extension of life for two years, and, failing that, they will take a chance on a "patriotic" election. In other words, they do not hesitate to use the war as a party weapon.

alist rank and file. For a time there was a disposition amongst seven or eight of the younger and more fiery members, headed by Mr. Sevigny, to stand up for more or less glorious principles and make a fight of it, but wiser counsels prevailed, and when a cabinet shift lifted Mr. Sevigny into the position of Deputy Speaker, the last ounce of starch was taken out of that pocket revolution.

As time went by the Nationalist leaders and followers in the House of Commons were asked to swallow one principle after another, all of which they did quite cheerfully, knowing that they were on the sunny side of the fence and that there must be a good time coming. For some the good time came, for others only promises. Fortune favored Pelletier, Nantel, Coderre, Blondin, who were cabinet ministers.

and Sevigny, who was in line for promotion. Now that Mr. Sevigny's claim to a portfolio has been brushed aside by the appointment of Mr. Patenaude, it would be interesting to learn if he is the same willing supporter of the government that he has been ever since he found the road to preferment. Meanwhile it cannot be denied that the Nationalist leaders did well for themselves in Parliament and only left that troubled arena when something more permanent offered. Messrs. Pelletier and Coderre are now judges, while Mr. Nantel is a railway commissioner. They also serve who wait till they get something better.

Latterly, for some reason or other, the Nationalists have been falling away from the government. True Mr. Blondin, as Secretary of State, sits so tight that nobody can pry him loose, and Mr. Patenaude, a Nationalist of repute and a skilled organizer in Quebec where organization is so much needed, has just been taken into the cabinet vice Coderre resigned, but things, as Sweet Little Buttercup says, are not just what they seem and skimmed milk masquerades as cream and altogether the Nationalist politicians in Parliament are not feeling as gay as they did, say a year ago. It looks, to some extent, as if the government's face were turned from them and as if they felt the chill.

It may be that or it may be that the political instinct, the sixth sense of Messrs. Pelletier, Coderre and Nantel, saw the government's finish and that they scurried for cover while the scurrying was good—it may be either of these things, but the fact remains that forehanded and foresighted Nationalist leaders are getting out from under and that the Borden government is making no attempt to stop them. What's your hurry? Here's your hat. That seems to be the attitude toward the Nationalist leaders whose relative proportions in the cabinet has recently been cut down one-fourth. Only three Nationalist cabinet ministers grow now where four grew (Continued on Page Three.)

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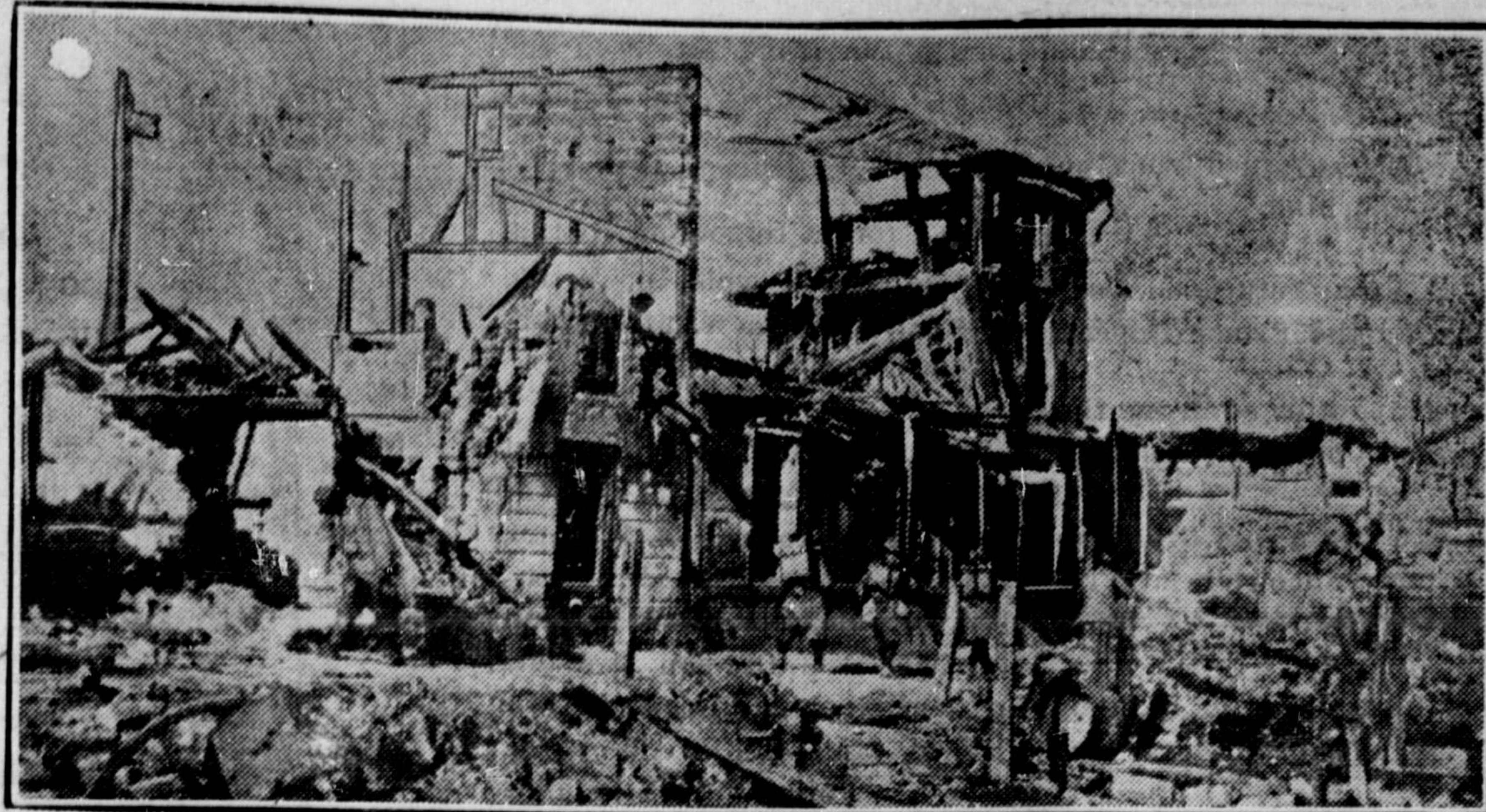

before, Mr. Casgrain, the new Postmaster General, being an old-line Conservative after Premier Borden's own heart.

Apparently what is aimed at is good riddance of a number of embarrassing associates. It transpires that though the government choked the Nationalist leaders with butter, it couldn't do the same thing with the Nationalist gospel in Quebec, where two fierce apostles still survive in the persons of Henri Bourassa and Armand Lavergne.

There is no reason to doubt

Mr. Lavergne's statement that he and Mr. Bourassa could have been cabinet ministers in the Borden government four years ago. It was the government's policy to kill all the Nationalist leaders with kindness, but Lavergne and Bourassa refused to be killed. It is not to their discredit that they put their principles above reward of office and money. These two men have sought to keep the flame alive in Quebec, but they have sought to do it openly, not clandestinely, as certain Nationalist members of the Borden cabinet are said to have done. At any rate the Nationalists' campaign against recruiting, secretly aided and comforted from within, has been very displeasing to the Borden government which decided to administer a check.

This explains Major General Sir Sam Hughes' offer to Armand Lavergne, the offer to give him command of an overseas battalion if he would take it. This offer Mr. Lavergne declined, not without adroitness. His answer was such that he left it all up to Sir Sam whether Armand Lavergne should be a martyr or not. This, by the way, is the first time Sir Sam has been called upon to play the diplomat, but as this was a coupe de theatre, he was naturally chosen to deliver the blow. Anything in the way of a blow comes easy to Sir Sam.

Meanwhile the outstanding feature is that the Borden government is not so sweet on its Nationalist allies as it once was. On occasion it even administers a rebuke, though slyly withal. When a government has a war on its back its peace affiliations may cause it a lot of trouble.—H. F. Gadsby.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
