SERBIAN VICTORY HAS CLEARED SITUATION—NEW GREEK PREMIER MAY RESIGN

SERB VICTORY HAS RELIEVED THE PRESSURE

Monastir May be Saved—Franco-British Forces May Join Serbs—Offensive is on in Dardanelles.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 23.—The latest news from the Balkans revives the hope that Monastir may be able to hold out and that the Franco-British forces may be able to effect a junction with the Serbians at this point.

Railroad Safe.

The Serbian victory near Nish, reported yesterday, delays indefinitely the opening of the railroad between Germany and Constantinople.

There is now little fear of an attack in the rear by the Greeks should the Serbians be compelled to retreat on to Greek soil.

The Dardanelles.

Berlin reports that the Allies have resumed their violent offensive against the Turkish positions in the Dardanelles.

Blockade Denied.

The British Foreign Office denies the report that Greek ships are being held up or that a blockade is now in force.

PROPOSED ALTERATION IN CITY FINANCING

The city solicitor brought down at the council meeting last night, a draft of the private bill which it is proposed to bring before the provincial house next session.

The matter was laid over for a week.

He said that the city treasurer is drawing up an exhaustive report on the serial bond system, showing how it will save the city \$1,800,000.

Ald. Montgomery said he believed the immediate cost would amount to a considerable amount annually and suggested that a plebiscite be taken.

Ald. Edge said that they had better consider the matter before discussing it, as the matter required careful study.

Ald. Beveridge said he understood that the additional cost on a \$10,000 property would only be 15 cents. The matter will come up next Monday.

LUCAS LIBEL CASE BEING HEARD TODAY

Victoria, Nov. 23.—Hon. W. J. Bowser, who is a witness today in the libel suit brought by Alexander Lucas, M. L. A., against the Ministerial Association because of statements contained in "The Crisis in B. C.," testified that Mr. Lucas honorably resigned his position in the house and was not discharged as alleged.

The statement was in connection with the alleged falsification of the report of the royal commission on agriculture. It stated that "Commissioner Alex. Lucas, M. L. A., who was formerly provincial assessor for the Nelson district, until compelled to resign by the civil service commission in December, 1909, on account of neglect of his duties, and a "timber deal" by which he pocketed about \$10,000."

CITY TO PURCHASE GOVERNMENT BONDS

A letter was read at the city council last night from a firm of stock brokers asking that they may be allowed to apply for a portion of the Dominion of Canada war loan for this city.

A report from the treasurer showed that the city has the sum of \$4,800 on hand, which could be applied in this way and recommended that application be made through the Bank of Montreal for bonds to that amount.

Ald. Montgomery asked how much money in sinking funds, bearing 3 1-2 per cent. could be invested at 5.80 per cent.

The mayor said that there was something like \$200,000 in sinking funds. He said that the treasurer and city solicitor were considering a plan to convert this amount into annuity or serial bonds. He was assured by the city treasurer that \$4,800 was all that the city could devote to the purchase of the government bonds.

Ald. Beveridge, seconded by Ald. Montgomery, moved that the \$4,800 be invested in the Dominion government war loan bonds. This carried unanimously.

GERMAN MINE SUNK GERMAN DREADNOUGHT

Germany's Latest Dreadnought is Sunk in Baltic—33 Men lost—New Concessions Offered to Roumania.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rotterdam, Nov. 23.—The Markgraf, Germany's newest dreadnought, struck a mine in the Baltic on Friday and sank. The entire crew except 33 men were saved.

The Markgraf was Germany's reply to the launching by Britain of the "Queen Elizabeth," dreadnought, which proved so successful in the bombardment of the Dardanelles. She carried guns of 15-inch calibre and was sent to the Baltic with the intention of shelling Riga at long range.

Offers to Roumania.

London, Nov. 23.—The Central Powers are offering further concessions to Roumania on condition that she preserves her attitude of neutrality in the struggle.

FREE WATER FOR FISHING BOATS RECOMMENDED

The fisheries committee reported to the council last night regarding the granting of free water to fishing boats using the government wharf. The committee recommended that the city supply free water.

The city clerk read a letter from the deputy minister of public works at Victoria, acknowledging receipt of the petition from the fishing concerns, which had been sent to Victoria. The letter stated that the board of works department had arranged to grant free dockage over a frontage of 125 feet, but that the other requests could not be granted meantime.

Ald. Montgomery said that he had heard that the provincial government was taking an enormous profit on the water which it supplied to the fishermen.

Ald. Montgomery, seconded by Ald. Casey, moved that the water committee take up the matter of retailing water at the government wharf.

Ald. Edge said that they might as well investigate the retailing of water by the G. T. P.

Ald. Montgomery said he did not believe that the city should be at the expense of putting in a water supply and have the government make a big profit out of it.

The city solicitor said that it was purely a matter of business. He pointed out that the parties retailing had the cost of distribution.

Ald. Montgomery said that, when the present contract expired, the city should dictate selling prices in order that the consumers might be protected.

GREEK PRIME MINISTER MAY QUIT ANY TIME

British Action Causing Dissention in Greek Cabinet—Greeks Are Afraid of a Blockade.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Nov. 23.—The resignation of the Greek premier, M. Skouloudis, is expected momentarily, owing to difficulties arising between Greece and Great Britain.

Minister Protests.

M. Rhalis, minister of justice, has made a protest against the action of Britain. He says that Britain is trying to force Greece into the war before there is a British rifle in Serbia, or before it has been proved that an effort by Greece would not be a useless sacrifice.

Afraid of Blockade.

Greece is more afraid of a blockade by the Allies than the guns of the fleet, as there is only two weeks' food supply in the country, says a Times correspondent.

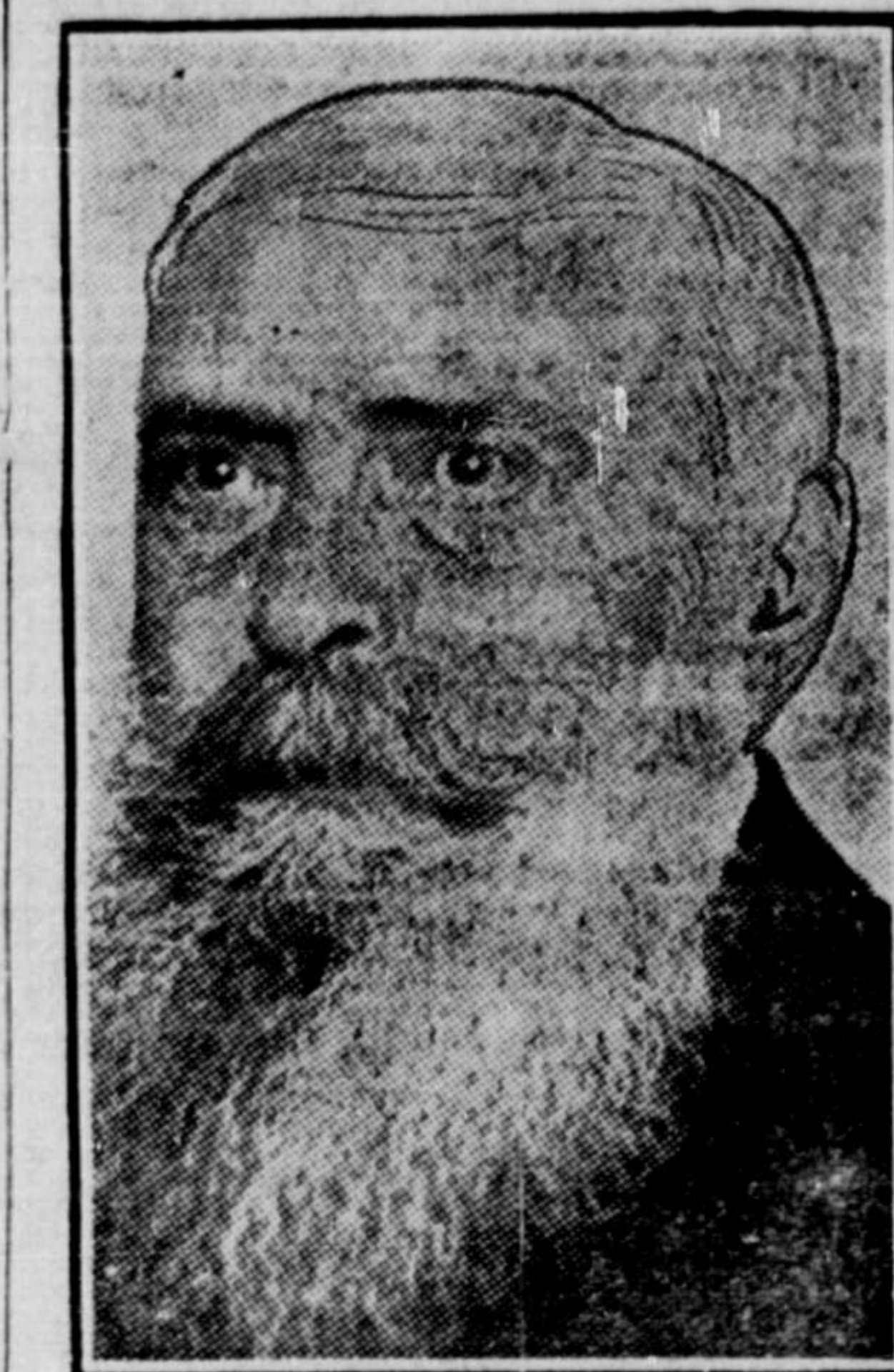

MARRIED V. SINGLE DISCUSSED AT LENGTH

A petition from the International Union of Steam and Stationary Engineers was presented to the council last night protesting against the firing of single city employees and the replacing them with married men, probably brought in from the outside.

Ald. Montgomery said that he thought the petition reasonable, but that the city had no intention of bringing in married men from the outside. There were men with women and children depending upon them in this city, who should be given an opportunity to earn a livelihood. He had no intention of suggesting that married men be brought in.

Ald. Beveridge said that it was never the intention of the motion to discharge all the single men. It was simply a case of giving the married men in the city a chance. He thought that any single man who would draw pay while an efficient married man had to leave his family and go to the front, was a poor specimen. He thought that the proper place for such a petition was the pastepaper basket, and that any union which put forward such a petition was unworthy of the name of union.

A report of the single men employed in the various departments was brought down, in which it was shown that three of these supported their mothers and two others had failed to pass for active service.

Ald. Montgomery objected to the inference that the object of the motion was to drive men to the front. He had no idea of compelling along this line.

Ald. Beveridge said that when he stated that there were many single employees who should be at the front, he did not mean that the city should force them to go (Continued on Page Two)

FIVE CORDITE MAGAZINES GO UP IN SMOKE

Enemy Active Around Parry Sound Powder Mills No Men Were Injured—Guard Now Mounted.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Parry Sound, Ont., Nov. 23.—The magazines of the Canadian Explosives Limited, and Nobel's Limited, were blown up seven miles from here last night.

Five buildings containing cordite were destroyed simultaneously. The buildings were spread over an area of three miles.

Enemy Work.

It is believed that the explosion was the work of enemies of Great Britain. A staff of eight hundred men had left off work two hours before the explosion occurred. The factories are fortunately uninjured. A guard of 150 soldiers has been mounted over the works now.

SAILORS WANT GEORGE FRIZZELL FOR MAYOR

At the general meeting of the Shipmasters' and Officers' Association held last evening, with the president, Captain O'Brien, in the chair, several matters were discussed. Pilotage, lighthouses, the drydock and matters of general interest along the waterfront were brought up. The question of endorsing candidates for next year's council was also discussed, and it was unanimously resolved to endorse George Frizzell for mayor.

Two new members were enrolled, while one member was struck off the roll for contravention of rules. Meetings will now be held every Monday at 7:30 p. m.

THAT POSTOFFICE SITE

George B. Hull, on behalf of the Dominion government, has requested permission from the board of works to open up Third Avenue for a distance of 350 feet to allow of the water in the post-office site being taken off by gravity. The board of works has agreed, on condition that precautions are taken against sand, etc., getting into the sewer.

The court of revision of the city voters' list is fixed for Friday, December 10th, at 2:30 p. m. The mayor and Ald. Edge and Beveridge will act.

The council passed a resolution of sympathy with Alderman and Mrs. Casey in their recent sad bereavement.

THE WAR LOAN
 The \$50,000,000 of Canadian Government bonds at 97½ bearing interest at 5 per cent, payable half-yearly, are a very attractive investment to those who are looking for something sure and safe. The fact that the proceeds are to be used purely for war purposes makes the issue attractive from a patriotic standpoint, in that investors are aiding the country to carry on the war, while, at the same time, they are making a sound investment. The man who purchases these bonds is doing something for his country just as surely as the man who is subscribing to the various patriotic funds. The bonds will be issued in denominations of \$100, \$500 and \$1,000. It is just possible that they would have been attractive to a larger number of the smaller investors had they been issued in smaller denominations, as were those of the Imperial government, but nevertheless the issue should be largely oversubscribed. They will be listed on the Montreal and Toronto Stock Exchanges.

TALKING ABOUT HOGS
 The Toronto Telegram, illustrating the failure of Canada's banks to recognize the great opportunities provided in the munition industry for business, says that "orders from the Shell Committee carried little or no weight with the banks. A Canadian manufacturer secured a contract for a certain article of war supplies. The price of the article was \$3.80. The manufacturer's cost was 75 cents. The overhead charge was 50 cents. The margin of profit on each article was \$2.55. Yet the banks would not carry this manufacturer until he had received returns

from contracts given by the Shell Committee."
 Glorious chance! Cost of goods \$1.25; profit \$2.55, or a little more than 200 per cent. And more glorious still, the British taxpayer footed the bill. Our dear motherland did the bleeding. Talking about hogs, does The Telegram know many more like the man who in time of war regarded the chance to gouge a 200 per cent. profit from his beloved country as a great opportunity lost because of the shortsightedness of the banks?—Toronto Globe.

NOTES AND COMMENTS
 The provincial government is simply doing its duty in filling staff vacancies with men who have served their country. If it is necessary to hand out bouquets to a government for doing the obvious thing, the Conservatives are to be congratulated.

The Vancouver Province says: "It is a pity that Lavergne is only an honorary colonel. If he were a really truly colonel, there might be some way of punishing him for desertion in the face of the enemy or something like that." The latest quarterly military list, published in Ottawa, gives this gentleman full rank as lieutenant colonel of the 61st Regiment de Montagny, so that he is a "really truly colonel" after all. What are the Tories going to do about it?

The Victoria Colonist is bemoaning the fact that the McBride government has never received fair criticism. The Colonist need not worry now, as the funeral will leave nothing to be desired.

The Colonist addresses an editorial to Mr. Pessimist in which it points out that things are no worse in British Columbia than

there. They could please themselves about that. The mayor suggested that Ald. Beveridge and Ald. Montgomery, who had brought in the motion, should say what was to be done. Ald. Montgomery said he was prepared to be one of a committee to consider the question.

Ald. Beveridge said he would be pleased to do the same. He proposed asking married men to apply for certain positions and, if a big number came in, he would suggest putting the names in a hat.

Ald. Nicol asked "what about men returning from the front?" Ald. Beveridge said they would get jobs wherever possible.

Ald. Casey warned the council not to get too excited over the matter. There would be plenty of married men and returned soldiers out of work and the matter should be dealt with as opportunity crops up. One reason why he opposed the spending of \$800 for a kitchen, which would probably have been scrapped anyhow, was that he felt the money could be employed in relieving the returned men. He was thoroughly in sympathy with the employment of married men wherever possible, but he did not believe in rushing and firing single men here, there and everywhere, simply

because they were single. Wage earners have faced starvation two weeks ahead of them for years, and it is nothing new to them. He suggested that married men in want be asked to apply to the council for work, and the various departments could then consider the matter.

Ald. Beveridge pointed out that such cities as Vancouver were getting excited over the same question, and he saw no harm in Prince Rupert doing the same.

Ald. Montgomery said that Ald. Casey's plan was to sit tight and do nothing. He considered that the question had to be met and dealt with and that foresight must be exercised. There was no use of waiting until the matter became too large.

Ald. Edge said that he could not see how the council could act on this report. He thought the names in the various departments should be placed before the various committees, and that they bring in reports. He moved that the names be handed over to the various committees.

Ald. Nicol said that the various committees had already taken up (Continued on Page Three.)

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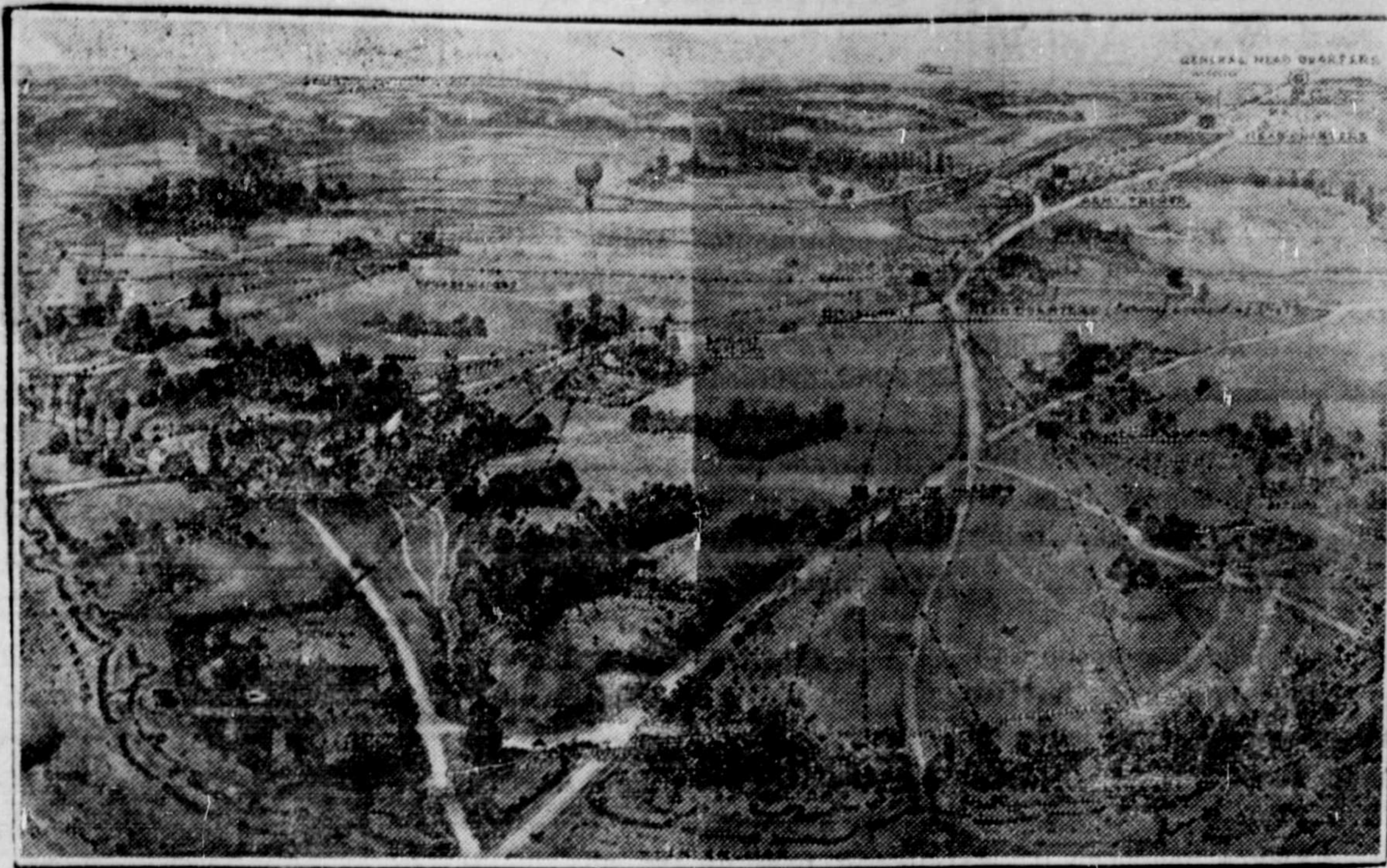

the matter and had been acting right along on the principle laid down in the motion.

The mayor suggested that the mover and seconder of the motion be a committee to decide who were to get their places. He thought these men were the proper parties to carry the matter through.

Ald. Beveridge said he certainly would like to be one of such a committee.

Ald. Nicol wanted to know if a returned soldier would come before a married man.

Ald. Casey said the motion was perfectly plain. It was simply a question of replacing single men with married men. It was a case of saying to so and so "you have been here long enough, you must let so and so have your place." He was in sympathy with the married men, but the responsibility of depriving any man of the means of livelihood was one he did not care for.

Ald. Edge repeated that the matter should be left to the committee and made a motion to that effect. He was out of sympathy with this playing to the gallery.

Ald. Beveridge resented the remark about playing to the gallery and Ald. Montgomery remarked that taking up this question was more liable to get a man unfavorably rather than otherwise.

Eventually the motion was defeated, Ald. Nicol, Casey and Edge voting against it and Ald. Montgomery and Beveridge for.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
