#### JAPAN READY TO ASSIST IN THE BALKANS

Baron Ishito Says a Large Army Could be Sent—Japan Arming Russia—Italians Are Advancing.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Nov. 4.—Baron Ishito, the Japanese minister in Paris, announces that Japan is ready and willing to send an army to assist the Allies in the Balkans. He says that, if it is necessary, Japan will send a very strong army.

##### Arming Russia.

Baron Ishito also pointed out that the Japanese are at the present time arming the Russian army.

##### Italian Success.

Rome, Nov. 24.—Further advances have been made by the Italian forces in their attack on Gorizia.

It is announced that they have now captured Catavio Height.

##### Western Front.

Paris, Nov. 24.—Fog is retarding artillery action on this front. The enemy's artillery attempted to destroy our trenches at Colincourt, and our positions between the Aisne and Argonne, but our batteries quickly silenced them.

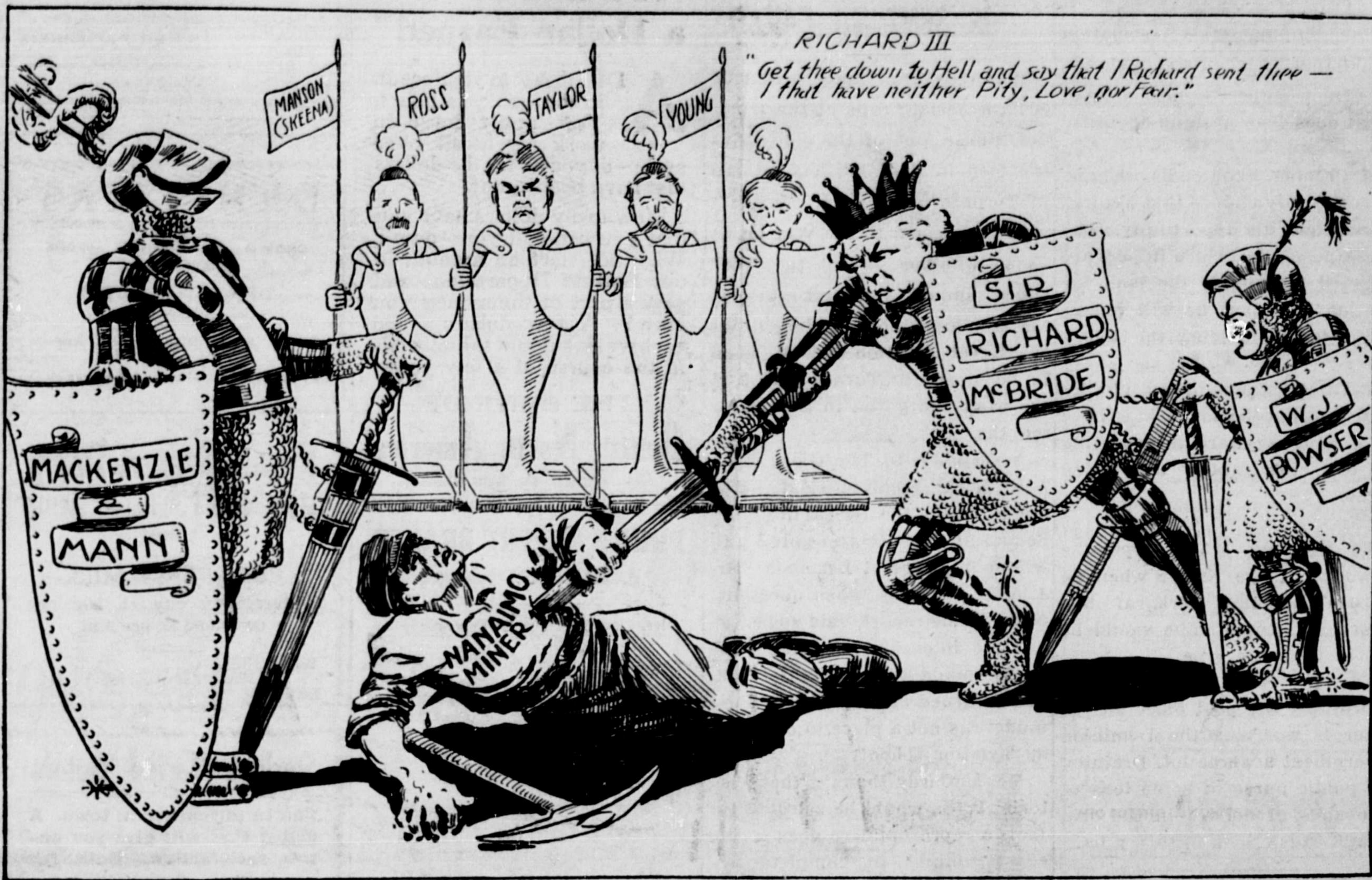

#### GERMANY GETS ANXIOUS OVER RUSSIAN MOVE

Berlin Reports Enormous Russian Army at Odessa—Asquith Says Surprises are in Store.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 24.—Berlin announces that Russia is assembling an enormous army at Odessa for the campaign in the Balkans. The fear is expressed that Roumania will allow the Russian troops to cross her territory into Bulgaria.

##### Asquith's Message.

Paris, Nov. 24.—Paris journals are speculating as to the meaning of Premier Asquith's message to Serbia. It reads, "France and England are preparing surprises in the Balkans."

It is stated that France and Britain are sending an army of 600,000 men to the Balkans.

#### TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

At the meeting to the Trades and Labor Council last night, it was reported that pork, raised by Chinamen, had been offered for sale at the city market. In the absence of verification, the matter was left to a committee to be investigated.

The relationship of the Trades and Labor Council and the city council was discussed and it was decided to give the representatives of labor on the municipal council an opportunity of addressing the labor men on the year's work. The question of the employment of married men instead of single by the city was also freely discussed, but no decision was reached as to making representations on the subject.

On a request being made to the council it was decided to assist "Curley" Smith to obtain compensation, he having met with an accident while engaged on construction work on the G. T. P.

##### INDIAN AGENT FROM BELLA COOLA HERE

I. Fougner, Indian agent at Bella Coola, arrived on the Charles Todd last night after a three weeks' trip up the coast, in which he experienced exceedingly rough weather. Mr. Fougner is on business for the Indian commission and has instructions to proceed direct to Victoria with his report immediately he has completed his round. He came in here for a supply of fuel.

#### AMERICA LOOKING FOR NEW HALIBUT GROUNDS

An interesting article, describing the efforts of the United States government to discover new halibut banks in the south, appears in the News-Advertiser of Saturday. The only discovery of any account was the bank off the Columbia river mentioned in The Daily News last May, and which was only of service to the fishermen for a few weeks. As warmer weather came along, the fish at this part of the coast became "mushy" and the fishermen again moved into northern waters. From the fact that the American Bureau of Fisheries' steamer Albatross, which carried out investigations last summer, has been commissioned to continue the work next year, it is evident that the United States government is satisfied that the halibut fishing industry depends chiefly on the location of the fish, and not on artificial means of fostering the traffic.

The closing part of the article is of interest to Prince Rupert people, as it is probably entirely fresh news to them:

##### Prince Rupert Suffers.

"The discovery of this new bank worked some injury to Prince Rupert as a halibut receiving station, but helped Vancouver and Seattle greatly because last spring the Vancouver and Seattle boats were getting ready to start on long trips to Behring Sea, when suddenly the tables were turned, and the Prince Rupert boats had to make an equally long trip down the coast to get the best fishing. So to some degree the future of Vancouver as the headquarters of a lucrative fishing industry depends on the efforts of the Albatross."

#### GERMAN NAVAL ATTACHE BUSY IN THE STATES

Hamburg—American Manager Sent Out Coaling Fleet—Huge Tidal Wave Sweeps Coast Town.

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Nov. 24.—Government witnesses prove that Karl Buentz, the managing director of the Hamburg-American Steamship line, and three associates sent out a fleet of ships from New York and San Francisco to supply coal to German warships, at the outbreak of the war. It is stated that \$750,000, out of a fund of \$40,000,000, was spent under the personal direction of Captain Boyed, a German Naval attache.

##### Huge Tidal Wave.

Portland, Oregon, Nov. 24.—A huge tidal wave swept through the town of Bar View, situated at the entrance of the Columbia river, this morning. It demolished several of the up-town buildings and swept away the life-saving station.

#### BULGARS ARE WAITING FOR HUN ADVANCE

Bulgars Again Defeated by the Serbs—Fate of Monastir in Balance—Greek Assurances.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 24.—The Bulgarians have again been defeated in southern Serbia. The advance of the Austro-German forces is not so rapid as has been indicated in Berlin despatches.

##### Fate of Monastir.

The fate of Monastir is still hanging in the balance. It is believed that the Bulgarians are waiting for the Germans to take the city in order to avoid Greek susceptibility.

##### Greek Assurances.

Athens, Nov. 24.—The Entente ministers today received assurances from the Greek cabinet that Greece will neither intern nor disarm any Allied troops which may enter Grecian territory.

It is reported that Lord Kitchener informed the Greek officials that Britain would have 4,000,000 men in the field by next March, and, in addition would be in position to provision and arm 6,000,000 more Russians.

#### FRENCH GOVERNMENT TO FAVOR WOUNDED

Paris, Nov. 23.—The chamber of deputies today adopted a bill giving preference in the government service to men mutilated or disabled in the war. This preference extends to every branch of the civil service and not merely to one half of the places, as had been ordered under a ministerial decree. Amendments to the measure were accepted giving the preference among the mutilated or disabled, to those who were the fathers of the largest families. Another amendment voted unanimously was that places should be reserved also for disabled soldiers in monopolies subsidized by the state.

**THAT POST OFFICE SITE**

The Dominion government has got tired of pumping the water out of the expensive hole in the ground on Third Avenue, in which they sunk so much of the people's money, to the enrichment of a few needy and trusty friends. There is now an application before the city board of works for permission to open up Third Avenue for a distance of 350 feet to allow of a connection being made with the sewer, in order that the water may be drained off by gravity. It has cost a nice little sum to keep the lake in the post office site at a reasonable level, but that sum is a piece of small change compared with the cost of the water which was pumped into the deal by the "patriotic" gentlemen who wished it on a long-suffering public.

Long before the war was ever dreamed of, the popular Conservative method of replenishing the coffers of party supporters was to buy something from them. The war only changed the channel through which the supply flowed. Since the war broke out, the graft has run to contracts at exorbitant prices to men whose sole knowledge of the work was reckoned at so much per cent., but, before the war, the same method of distributing public funds for party purposes was just as popular, though at that time it took the form of drill hall and post office sites.

The war method has been found to be more lucrative and not quite so conspicuous. The people hear of a 200 per cent. graft on army supplies and forget about it, but when a lake remains on a main city thoroughfare it is apt to remind the public that this spot marks

the grave of many thousands of dollars which are gone never to return. The government is now expending a further considerable sum to take away the idea that the fortunes of the people were drowned at this place.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

**LEADER OF FLYING MEN IS SENT TO CANADA**

Relieved from duty with the British Aerial Corps at the front, Col. Burke, one of the oldest flying men in England, has arrived in Toronto to personally investigate and report to the War Office as to whether or not the War Office should undertake to pay the transportation of students at the Royal Aviation School, soon to be moved to Toronto, so that the work can go on in the winter months.

A despatch to The Globe from New York received last night stated that the Royal Aviation School of Toronto was going into winter quarters at Bermuda. Mr. J. A. D. McCurdy, when questioned as to the report, said such was not the intention. He had gone to Bermuda to investigate, and had returned convinced that Bermuda was not a place to establish an aviation school.

Mr. McCurdy thought that Victoria, B. C., would be selected; in fact, a representative goes to the coast tonight to complete arrangements. Information as to suitable aviation fields had already been secured.

Mr. McCurdy said he is prepared to move his school anywhere at his own expense, but the wishes of the students must be taken into consideration. Already the British government had been asked to pay the transportation expenses of students, and it was to advise the War Office upon this matter that Col. Burke was sent to Canada. There are 200 students ready for instruction. Some 75 have already graduated.

It will be remembered that Controller J. E. Thompson took up the case of the aviation students, and interviewed Hon. J. D. Hazen, a cablegram being despatched to the War Office requesting payment of transportation expenses of the Students.—Toronto Globe.

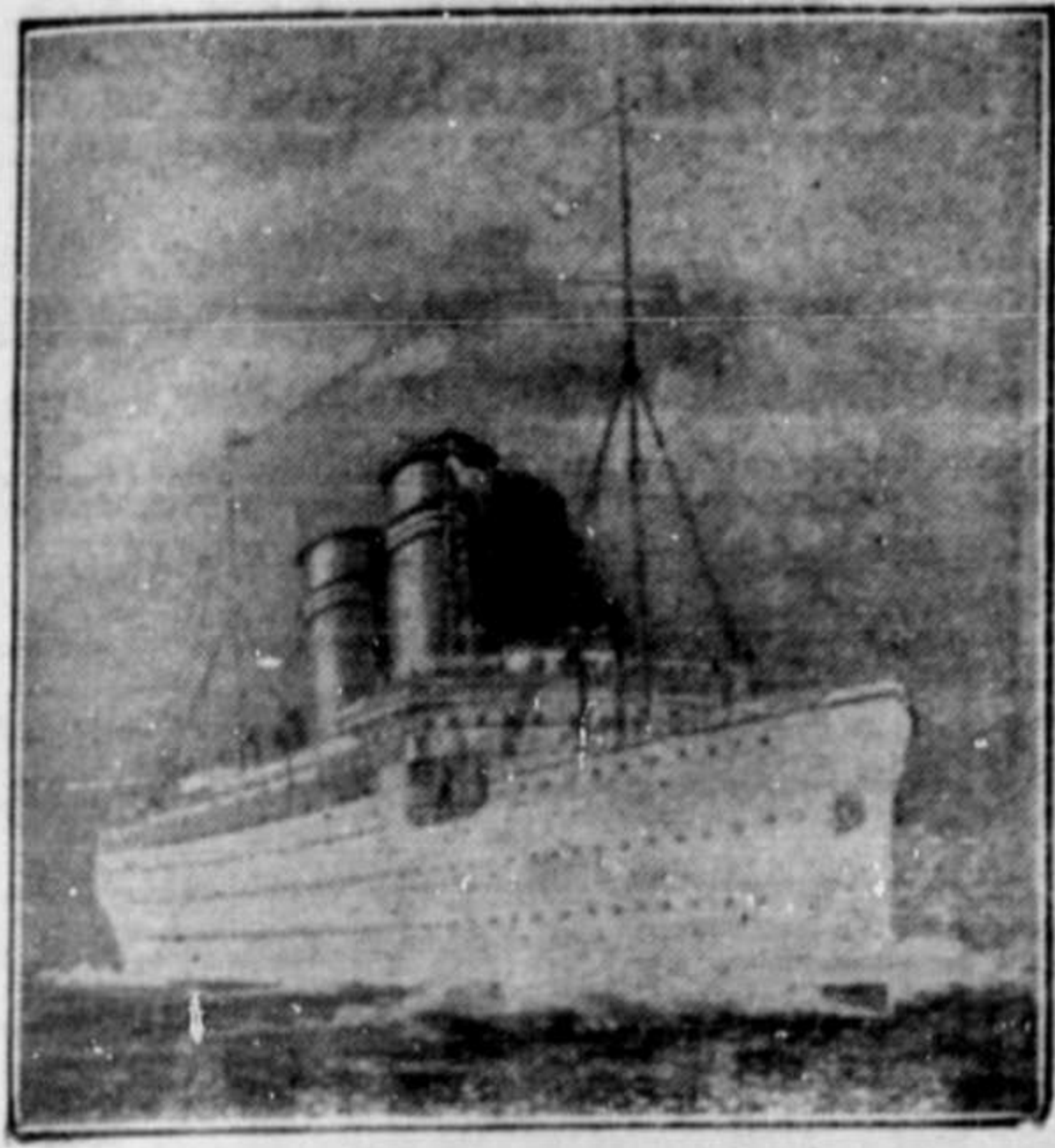

## Your King and Country Need You

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

## BOOKER T. WASHINGTON HAS PASSED AWAY

A week ago Booker T. Washington, the able leader of the negro race, died at Tuskegee, Ala., from bright's disease and arterio sclerosis.

He was the founder of the Tuskegee Institute, and was born a slave near Hale's Ford, Va., in 1858. He was educated at the Hampton Industrial Institute at Hampton, Va., and the Wayland Seminary, Washington, D. C. He became an instructor in the Hampton Institute and later a teacher in the public schools of West Virginia.

The practical education of the negro was the life-work of Booker Washington, and through his efforts large numbers of negroes have been educated and turned into useful citizens. Andrew Carnegie, in making a gift to the Tuskegee Institute founded by Mr. Washington, said that the history of the United States would include two Washingtons—one white and one black.

Mr. Washington earned a great deal of money from his lectures and writings and practically every dollar was devoted to the welfare of the negro race. He spoke all over the U. S., Canada and several European countries. "The Story of My Life" and "Up from Slavery" are two of his most successful books. Mr. Washington was the first negro to be invited to dinner at the White House. Roosevelt's invitation at that time caused a big storm of protest.
