Bulgars Again Defeated by the Serbs-Fate of Monastir In Balance_Greek Assurances.

London, Nov. 24.-The Bulgarans have again been defeated in southern Serbia. The advance of the Austro-German forces is not so rapid as has been indicated in Berlin despatches.

Fate of Monastir.

The fate of Monastir is still hanging in the balance. It is believed that the Bulgarians are waiting for the Germans to take the city in order to avoid Greek susceptibility.

Greek Assurances.

Athens, Nov. 24.-The Entente ministers today received assurances from the Greek cabinet that Greece will neither intern nor disarm any Allied troops which may enter Grecian territory.

It is reported that Lord Kitchener informed the Greek officials that Britain would have 4,000,000 men in the field by next March, and, in addition would be in position to provision and arm 6,-000,000 more Russians.

Western Front.

Paris, Nov. 24.-Fog is retarding artillery action on this front. The enemy's artillery attempted GERMANY to destroy our trenches at Colincourt, and our positions between the Aisne and Argonne, but our batteries quickly silenced them.
