GREEK SITUATION SHOWS BIG IMPROVEMENT

ALLIES BUILDING BARRACKS AT SALONIKI -- JAP BIG GUNS ARRIVE AT ODESSA

SITUATION IN GREECE LOOKS MORE HOPEFUL

Allies to Build Power Plant and Barracks at Saloniki—Compensation to Greece After War.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 25.—As a result of the interview between Lord Kitchener and King Constantine, the Greek situation has been settled to the satisfaction of the Allies.

Greece has agreed that the Allies are to have free use of Macedonia as their headquarters, while the Allies have promised that Greece will have compensation for the concession, after the war.

Blockade Lifted.
The blockade, which had been placed upon Greek shipping, has been lifted.

The Allies are already building a power plant and enormous barracks, with army workshops, at Saloniki.

JAPS LANDING HEAVY GUNS AT ODESSA DAILY

Russians Have Big Army Ready To Leave—Italians Take Five More Austrian Fortresses.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, Nov. 25.—Berlin has been informed that Japan is making heavy guns for the Russians and that shipments of these big Japanese guns are arriving at Odessa daily.

250,000 Men.
A Russian army of 250,000 men is expected to leave Odessa soon for Bulgaria.

Further Italian Gains.
Rome, Nov. 25.—The Italian forces continue to make progress against the Austrians on the Isonzo front, and five fortresses in the Gorizia district have now fallen.

James Mitchell showed himself to be a ready and witty speaker, while Douglas Stork showed that he is a "chip off the old block." MARGUERITE CLARK AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

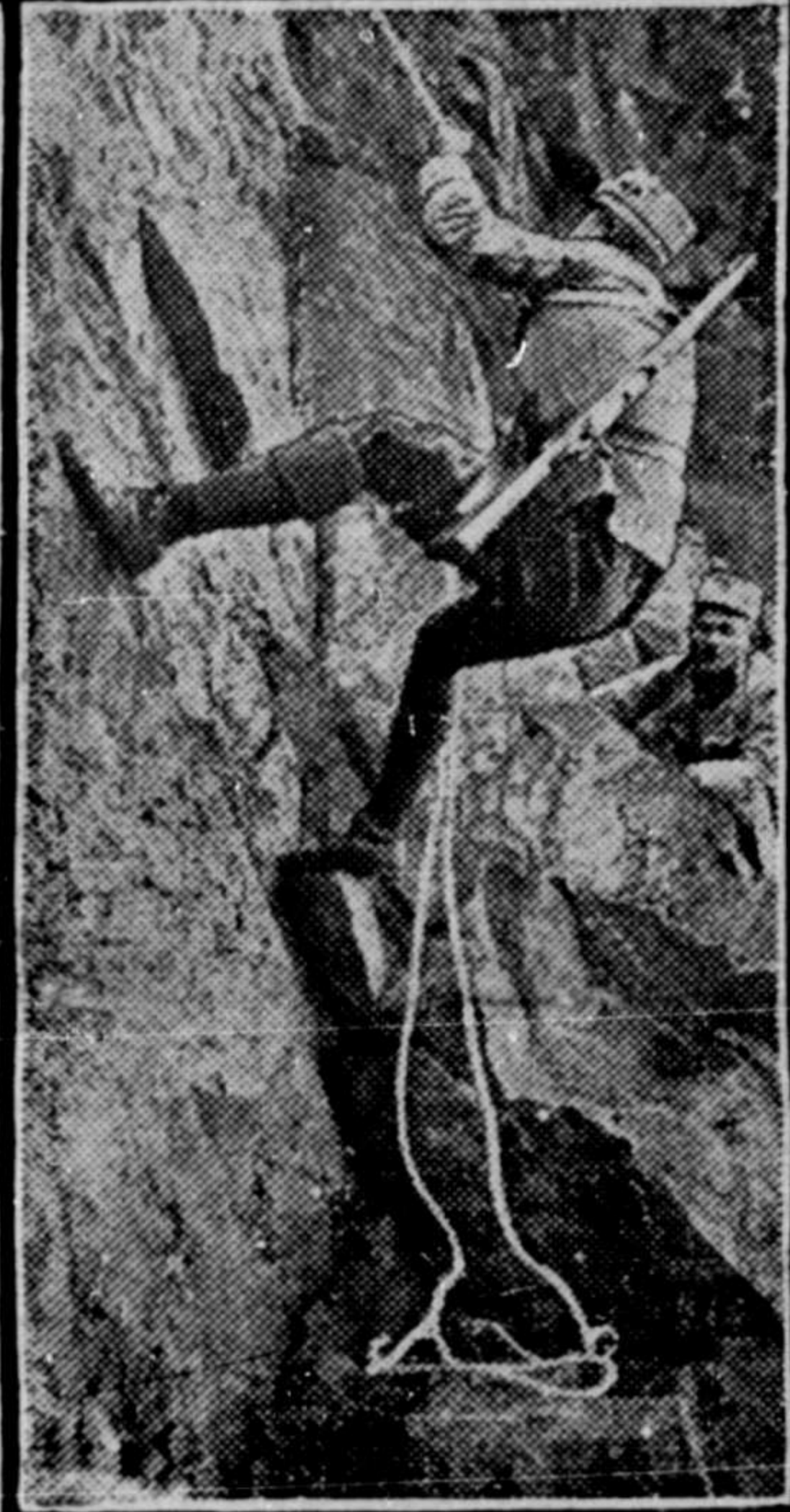

HUNS HAVING CHILLY TIME IN THE NORTH

Austrian Regiment driven through The Ice on Styr River—Germans in Galicia Defending.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Nov. 25.—The Germans in Galicia are now entirely on the defensive. Taking advantage of a snowstorm, Russian warships in the Baltic shelled the German positions at Courland.

Austrians Annihilated.
An Austrian regiment which started to cross the ice on the Styr River was completely annihilated. After the troops got out upon the ice, the Russian heavy artillery started dropping shells upon the river, with the result that the ice was smashed up and the whole Austrian regiment went under and all were drowned.

FLOTILLA OF SUBMARINES HAS ENTERED THE BALTIC

Copenhagen, Nov. 24.—The passage of a large flotilla of British submarines, variously estimated at from 10 to 25, into the Baltic, is given here as an explanation of the recent naval activity in the Cattegat, where both German and British destroyer flotillas have been sighted.

According to current reports, a powerful British squadron convoyed the submarines to the entrance of the Cattegat at the Skaw, the northern-most point of the Jutland coast. The large ships stopped here, while the destroyers convoyed the submarines as far as Elsinore, at the narrowest part of the sound whence the submarines alone proceeded into the Baltic.

GOVERNMENT HAY PURCHASER ARRESTED

Regina, Nov. 25.—According to word received here G. A. Mitchell, the man whose name was particularly prominent recently at the Sir Charles Davidson inquiry at this point into war contracts, has been placed under arrest by the Mounted Police at Burdette, Alta., a point between Medicine Hat and Lethbridge.

A warrant for his arrest, it is understood, had been issued for some time and yesterday the arrest was effected.

Mitchell was the man who purchased eight cars of hay for the remount department here which, evidence showed, never existed in fact, and whose dealings with the remount department throughout have been thrown open to suspicion.

ONE LONE HUN SHIP ESCAPED THE BLOCKADE

Evidence of Conspiracy Piling up Against Germans in the States—Blockade was Effective.

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Nov. 25.—At the hearing today of the suit against many well known German-Americans for conspiracy, evidence was given that the directors of the Hamburg-American Steamship line chartered sixteen steamers, after war had been declared, to replenish the greatly reduced German mercantile fleet at a cost of \$2,000,000.

Captain Falkenburg stated that his steamer, the Berwind, was the only one which succeeded in reaching the Germans, the other fifteen being captured by the British.

The Berwind was loaded with coal bought from the Berwind Coal Company, and Mr. Berwind declined to clear the ship under false manifests, and a German named Kulenkampf was called in to do the work.

It is also alleged that three steamers were chartered at San Francisco to take supplies to the German cruisers Leipzig and Dresden which were then in the Pacific.

LONDON GLOBE HAS RESUMED PUBLICATION

London, Nov. 24.—The Globe, which was suppressed by the police for insisting Earl Kitchener had resigned, notwithstanding the warning of the official press bureau, resumed publication on Monday. It contained correspondence between the proprietors and government authorities concerning the suspension, closing with an apology from the Globe and withdrawal of its "regrettable misjudgment."

HAS SIR RICHARD BEEN UNHORSED?

From British Columbia comes the statement, as yet without official confirmation, that Sir Richard McBride is about to resign the premiership and take the post of agent-general of the province in London in succession to the Hon J. H. Turner, who has occupied it since 1891 and is about to retire. It has been generally known for some time that Sir Richard McBride has lost his grip of the Conservative party and of the political situation on the Pacific coast, and that the real head of the administration is Hon. W. J. Bowser, the attorney-general, who in the federal election of 1908 became known in the east as Mr. Bow-wow-sir, because of his pugnacity.

It is hoped that under Mr. Bowser's premiership the warring elements in the Conservative party will be reunited, and that the era of exploitation will come to an end. The breach between the premier and Mr. Bowser was due to Sir Richard McBride's insistence upon a continuation of the policy of guaranteeing railway bonds for extension into the Peace River country and throughout northern British Columbia. The province has backed the Canadian Northern to such an extent that if they were to default in their bond interest the people of British Columbia would have to face an expenditure of millions of dollars annually or make a confession of insolvency.

When Sir Richard McBride early in the year proposed to increase still further the obligations of the province the majority of the members of the Legislature revolted and turned to Mr. Bowser as a safer

leader than Sir Richard, who was handshaking the province along the road to ruin. The natural wealth of British Columbia is very great. Nowhere else on earth have half a million of people such plenitude of minerals, forests, and fisheries. This wealth, however, is largely undeveloped and not immediately available for the payment of either public or private obligations. Economy, therefore, has become necessary, and that is something not to be hoped for under the easy-come-easy-go rule of Sir Richard McBride. The people may decide that Mr. Bowser also is too much committed to the McBride policies to strike out a new line, and that the best thing to do would be to entrust the affairs of British Columbia to Liberal leaders such as Mr. Brewster, Mr. M. A. Macdonald, president of the Provincial Liberal Association, and Mr. Ralph Smith, who for years have been urging reform on definite lines, particularly in the direction of preventing the alienation of the land of British Columbia to speculators who are holding it out of use.—Toronto Globe.

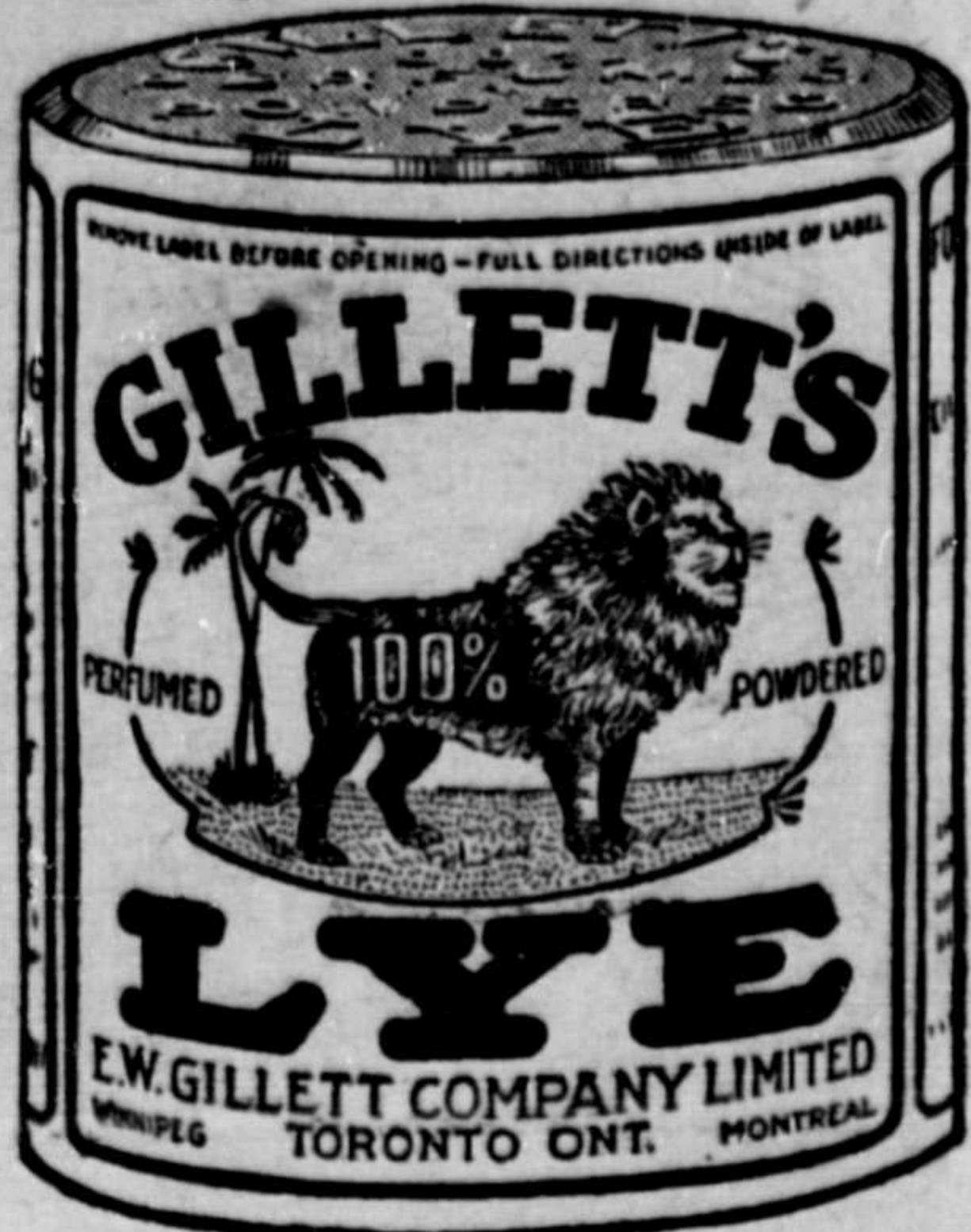

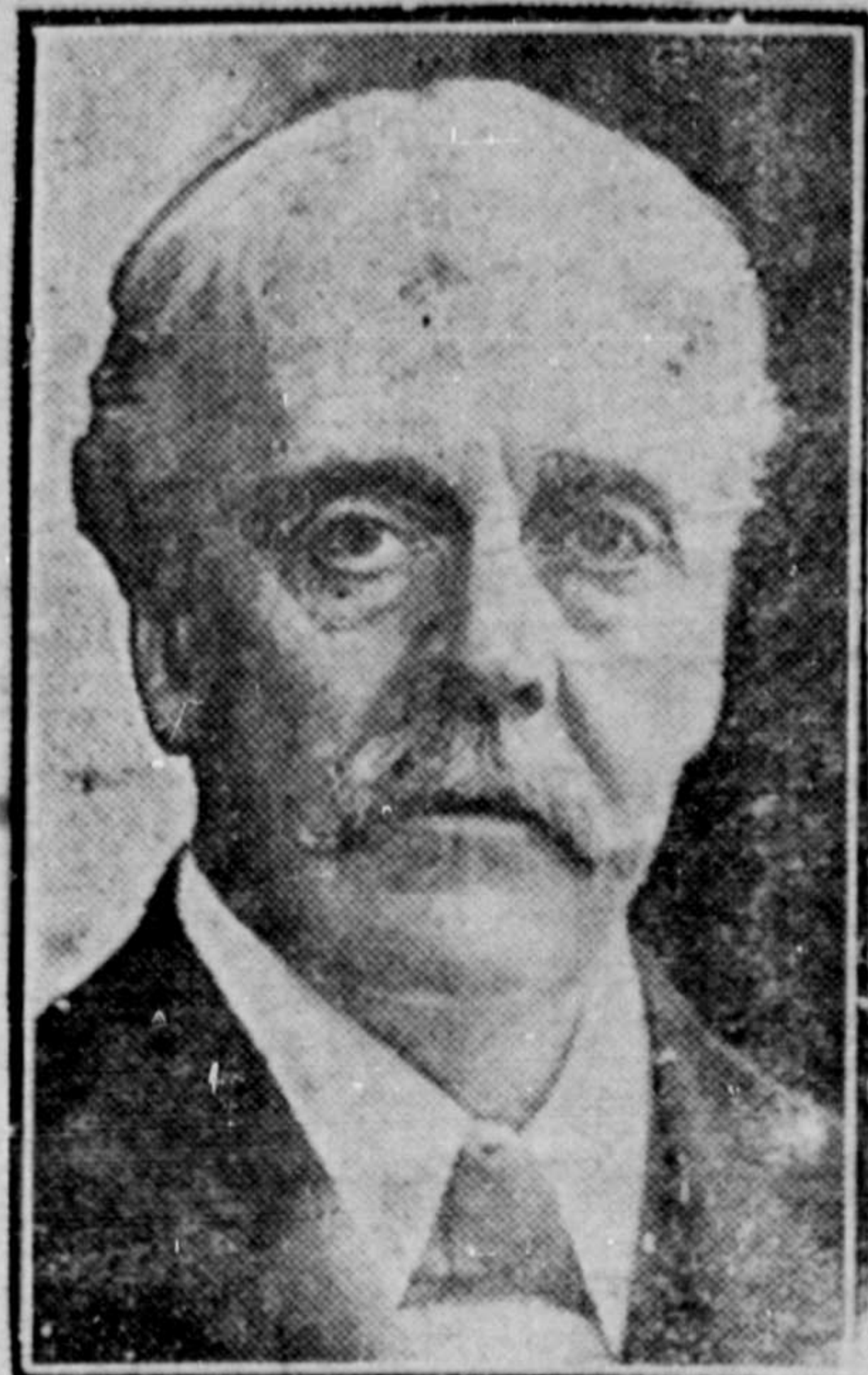


BACK BADGES FOR THE BRITISH ARMY OFFICERS

The colored badge which many officers are now wearing in the centre of their back, just below the fold of the collar of the tunic, is to enable the men to easily recognize their officer on the field of battle. The badge, which is usually V-shaped, about two ins. deep and one and a half ins. across the top, and composed of ribbons similar to the regimental colors or the facings of the full-dress uniform, is only worn by officers home on leave from the front or just about to go out.

The fact that British officers lead their men, and do not drive them as the Germans do, and the fact that officers get rid of all distinguishing marks as soon as possible after reaching the war zone, made this badge a necessity, and it has the advantage of lending no aid whatever to the sniper.

Officers of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers, when on active service, will have to sacrifice their cherished "flash"—five pieces of black ribbon which hang from the collar between the shoulders, to make way for this distinguishing badge. This "flash" in the same way as the sailor's collar, was worn in the days when infantry regiments wore their hair in a plait, heavily greased and powdered, to prevent the greased queue from spoiling the uniform. says the "Star," and when long hair and wigs disappeared from the army, an order, dated November 28th, 1834, was issued granting permission to officers of the Royal Welsh Fusiliers to retain the "flash" as "a peculiarity whereby to mark the dress of that distinguished regiment."—Ex.

THE GLORIOUS END OF THE PRINCESS PATS

At 11:30 at night the battalion was relieved by the King's Royal Rifle corps. The relieving unit helped in the last sorrowful duty of burying those of their dead who lay in the support and communicating trenches. Those who had fallen in the fire trenches needed no grave, for the obliteration of their shelter had afforded a decent burial. Behind the damaged trenches, by the light of the German flares, and amid the unceasing rattle of musketry, relievers and relieved combined in the last service which one soldier can render another. Beside the open graves, with heads uncovered, all that was left of the regiment stood while Lieut. Niven, holding the colors of Princess Patricia, battered, bloody, but still intact, tightly in his hand, recalled all he could remember of the Church of England service for the dead.

Then, led by Lieut. Papineau, they marched back, 150 strong, to re-serve trenches.

On May 13 the regiment was in bivouac at the rear. The news arrived that the Rifle brigade, their old and trusty comrades in arms, was being desperately pressed. Asked to go to the relief the Princess Patricias formed a composite battalion with the King's Royal Rifle corps, and successfully made the last exertion which was asked of them at this period of the war.

Such is the history of the Princess Patricia light infantry. Few, indeed, are left of the men who met in Lansdowne park to receive the regimental colors, but those who survive, and the friends of those who have died, may draw solace from the thought that never in the history of arms have soldiers more valiantly sustained the gift and trust of a lady.—London Times.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

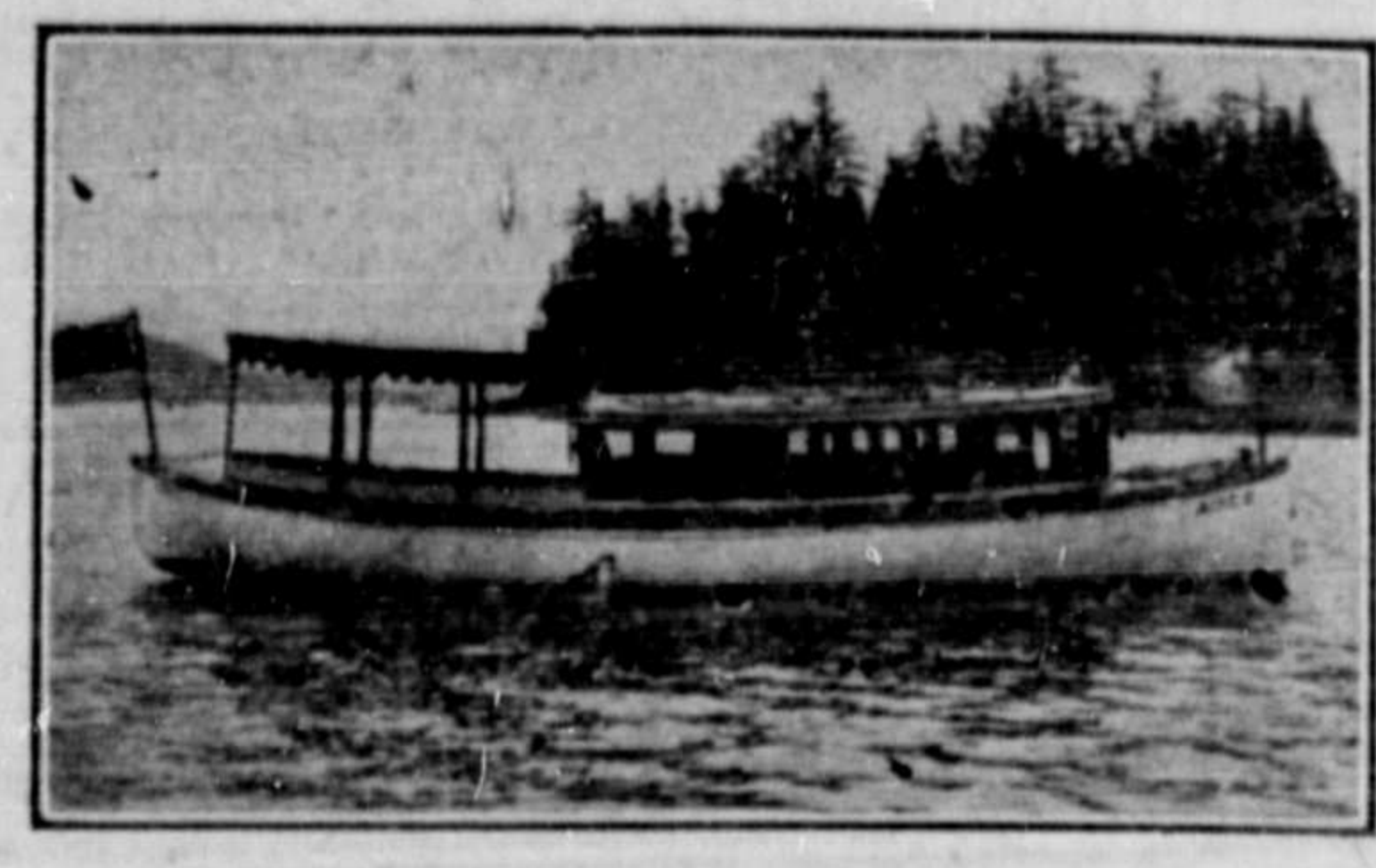

MASS OF EVIDENCE IS MOUNTAIN HIGH

New York, Nov. 24.—All the evidence gathered by agents of the United States government here bearing on plots to prevent war munitions from reaching the entente allies, will be submitted to the federal grand jury within a short time, probably this week.

The mass of evidence contained is described by Federal officers as "mountain high." It is the result of more than a year's work. It involves scores of persons operating, it is charged, as an organization, the direction of which was in the hands of a few men.

It is asserted that directors of the alleged conspiracies controlled a German fund of \$40,000,000. The evidence now virtually ready for the consideration of the grand jury is understood to cover the whole field of foreign criminal activity in America in the traffic in fraudulent passports, plots to blow up steamships carrying war munitions to the Allies, fires and explosions in munition plants, efforts to foment strikes in those plants, attempts to make Teutonic workers go on strike and efforts to buy control of the munition plants.
