## SERB CROWN PRINCE SCORNS PEACE TALK

### FRENCH "LOAN OF VICTORY" IS HUGE SUCCESS—GORIZIA ON FIRE AND DOOMED

#### SERBIAN PRINCE SCORNS PEACE TALK OF HUNS

Von Mackensen Offers Separate Peace to Serbia—Crown Prince Replies Like a Man—The French Still Gaining.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Nov. 26.—It is officially confirmed that the German general, Von Mackensen, offered a separate peace to the Serbian Crown Prince. The proposition was that Serbia was to lose a strip of the northeastern part of Serbia and all Macedonia.

Not Considered.

The Crown Prince replied that Serbia could never consider peace while a foreign foe remained on Serbian soil.

French Still Succeeding.

The French continue their successful drive against the Bulgarians, relieving tremendously the pressure on the Serbs.

#### ALEX. LUCAS AWARDED DAMAGES FOR LIBEL

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, Nov. 26.—In the suit for libel brought by Alex. Lucas, M. L. A., against Moses Cotsworth and the Ministerial Union, the jury returned an unanimous verdict in favor of the plaintiff, with \$200 damages and costs.

#### Submarine Report.

Ottawa, Nov. 26.—The report of Sir Charles Davidson on the purchase of the submarines in British Columbia is ready. It is understood that it completely exonerates Sir Richard McBride.

#### MONTREAL LIBERALS CLAIM TRUCE VIOLATED

Reports in the Montreal press disclose the fact that the St. Louis (Liberal) Club, which for several weeks has been urging active organization for the next federal election, has been holding meetings at which a more belligerent stand than usual was taken in regard to federal politics.

The Conservatives were charged with violating the party political truce which was established shortly after the outbreak of the war, and which the Liberals had kept faithfully. It was pointed out that members of the government had been going about the country discussing matters of interest to their own party, and consequently the Liberals could not be blamed for discussing the failings of the party in power.

Matters were shaping for the return to power of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. "If reciprocity were up again before the electorate," said one speaker, "we would win on that question before all others. It is true that Sir Wilfrid Laurier lost on that question, but he was greater in defeat than were his opponents in victory."

Mr. S. W. Jacobs said that there was corruption in the provinces, wherever the Conservative party ruled.

Mr. Charles Query claimed that the supporters and members of the government had violated the truce agreement all along the line, and that during a short session \$150,000,000 would be voted on the pretext of carrying on the war, but it would actually be devoted to the promotion of scandals and the corruption of the electorate.

#### SHELL-SWEPT GORIZIA HAS NO CITIZENS

City Expected to Fall in Forty-eight Hours—Fires Have Broken Out—People Have Fled.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Nov. 26.—Reports of the fall of Gorizia were premature, but the Italian artillery has swept the enemy's positions for several days with terrible effect, and it is predicted that the city will fall into the hands of the Italians within forty-eight hours.

#### City on Fire.

Aviators report that the city is on fire in many places, and that it has been practically denuded of citizens.

The fall of Gorizia will open up the way for an offensive towards Trieste and Vienna.

#### HOSPITAL BOARD MET LAST NIGHT

The board of directors of the hospital met in the city hall last night. The question of renewing expiring fire insurance policies came up for discussion and was referred to the finance committee with power to act.

The matron reported that Miss Fraser, one of the probationers, had contracted typhoid fever, and would require leave of absence for probably six months. It was decided to add another probationer to the staff, as, by the time Miss Fraser is able to resume her duties, several of the probationers will have completed their course.

#### YOUTH MISSING

Pat Fenton, a youth of 22, left Seymour Inlet for Hardy Bay on October 21st in the 30-foot power boat Bertha, and has not been heard of since. Anyone finding trace of the boat should communicate with the city police of Prince Rupert.

#### THIRTEEN ARE KILLED BY TEN MINUTES' GALE

Arkansas Tornado Does Damage in Short Time—Chilean Bark Wrecked off Vancouver Island.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 26.—A tornado swept over this town last night doing a great deal of damage. Thirteen people are dead and twenty injured. The storm lasted but ten minutes.

#### Bark Wrecked.

Tacoma, Nov. 26.—The Chilean bark Carlmapu has been lost with all hands off the west coast of Vancouver Island. The vessel was driven ashore in a terrific gale from the northwest, one mile east of Gowland rock, and pounded to pieces after hanging there for several hours.

At considerable risk, the C. P. R. steamer Princess Maquinna attempted to go to the rescue, but, owing to the tremendous sea running inshore, was unable to approach. The crew of the Chilean vessel, numbering 25, were swept off the deck and drowned within sight of the men on the Maquinna. The Carlmapu was an iron ship of 1,447 tons.

The Maquinna lost her anchor and a lot of deck gear when she entered the breakers to the rescue of the bark.

#### FRISCO POLICE CORPORAL SHOT DEAD BY BANDIT

San Francisco, Nov. 26.—Police Corporal Cook was shot dead last night in a revolver duel with bandits at the Claremont Cafe. One bandit was killed, but three others escaped.

A trail of blood leading into the Presidio forest shows that one of the escaping thugs was wounded in the fight.

#### BULGARIAN OFFICERS BRANDED AS DESERTERS

Austrian Headquarters, Nov. 25 The Bulgarian war ministry publishes the names of twelve Bulgarian officers now serving with the Russian army who are branded as deserters. The list includes General Radko Dimitrieff, former ambassador to Russia; Major-general Srafew, Captain Luzkanooj and First Lieutenant Torkof, who challenged Pierre Loti, the French author, to a duel after the Balkan war because of Loti's criticism of the Bulgarian army.

#### PARIS POURS OUT BILLIONS FOR WAR LOAN

"Loan of Victory" Breaks all Loan Records—Sinking of Cruiser Frauenloeb is Now Confirmed.

Paris, Nov. 26.—The subscriptions to France's new "Loan of Victory" are coming in rapidly and in large amounts. The success of the issue is far exceeding expectations.

Yesterday, Paris alone subscribed over twenty-five billion francs, equal to about \$5,000,000,000. The Bank of France subscription of fifteen million francs is the largest in history.

#### Frauenloeb Sunk.

Copenhagen, Nov. 26.—The report of the torpedoing of the German armored cruiser Frauenloeb by a submarine in the Baltic has been confirmed. She was sent below at practically the same spot at which her sister ship, the Uudine, met disaster last week.

**OBITUARY IN ADVANCE**

After the two long obituary editorials in the Journal yesterday, Sir Richard McBride had better pack his grip and book his passage for London. Each article vied with the is extremely sad to think that the noble knight who looked so fit and well on the front page of the Daily News on Wednesday, should now be reported to be in such feeble health.

The articles reminded one of the system of wishing people to death, which used to be a regular custom in the Hawaii Islands. When a man wanted someone out of the way, he notified the party that his death was looked forward to, and that nothing could save him. Mr. Kanaki, or whoever the victim might be, at once made up his mind that it was futile to try to live under such adverse conditions, straightway took to bed; refused all food, and in due course passed peacefully away. To have death wished on you by an enemy is bad enough, but to have the operation carried out by a friend is rather unkind. Sir Richard has not yet consented to his removal to London, therefore the Journal articles must be taken as something in the nature of a gentle hint.

Politically speaking, Sir Richard's health has been very precarious for many months, and the political health of the province has been correspondingly feeble. Bob Rogers, the official political health specialist, who was called in recently, has probably advised that the removal of Sir Dick to London is the only operation which has a chance of success. So far as British Columbia is concerned this slight operation will be as

effective as the application of sticking plaster to a cancer. What is needed, and what the people will demand, is a thorough operation which will cut out from the heart of the province the cancer of Bowserism which has been eating into the vitals of the country for years.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

Sir Richard McBride is now on a par with Mark Twain, in that he has had his obituary notice published before death, but he cannot get off Mark's joke that "it was grossly exaggerated."

A funeral in Scotland used to be a great celebration, and a story is told of a prospective widow who made extensive preparations for a big dinner when her ailing spouse passed away. The old man wanted to know why so much whisky, etc., was being brought in, and, on being told that it was for his funeral, he became wroth and got up; invited in his friends; demolished the whisky supply and absolutely refused to die. It will be rather awkward if Sir Dick plays some such trick, in spite of his bad health.

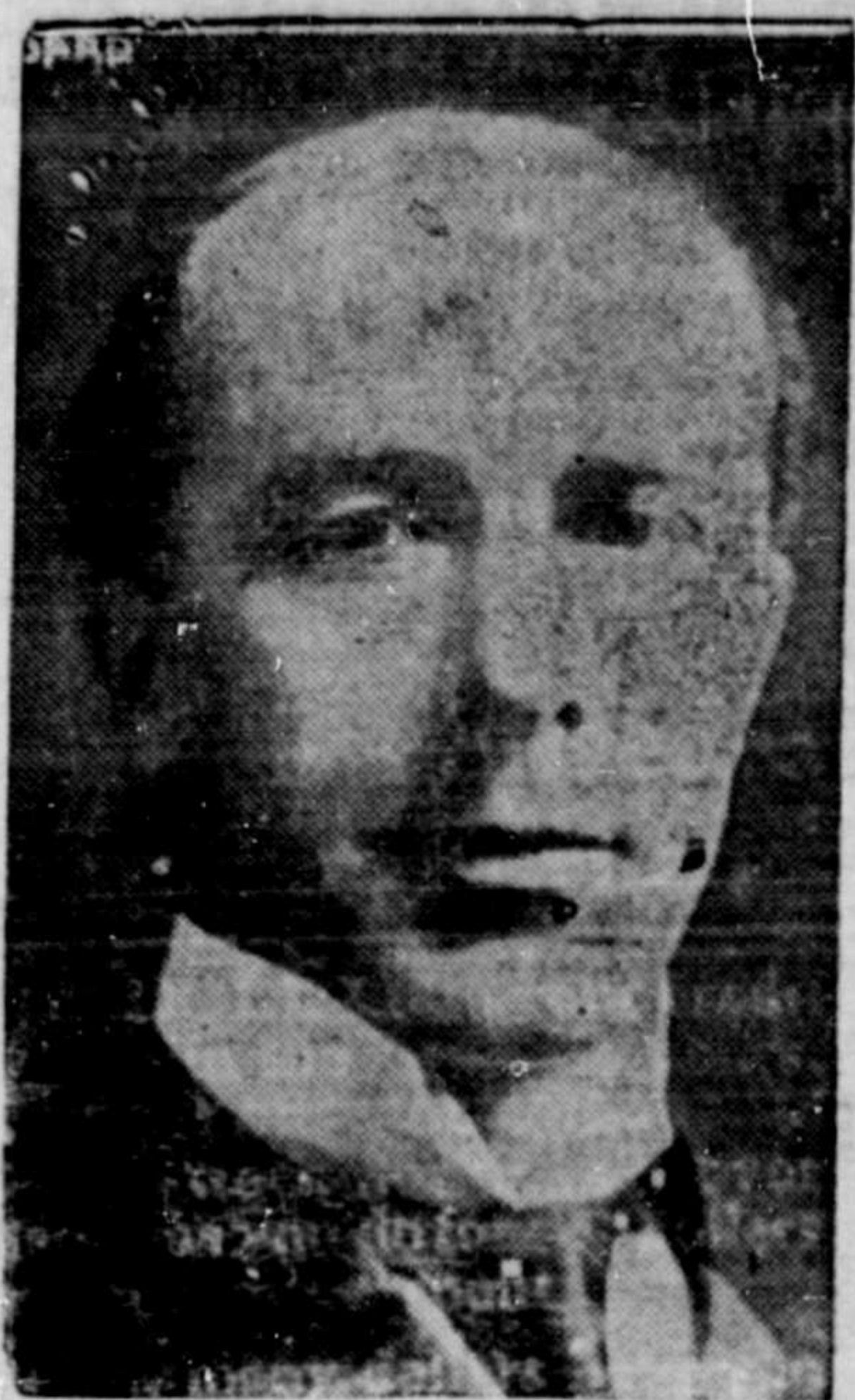

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
