## ALLIED AVIATORS WERE BUSY ON SUNDAY

### FIFTEEN AIR FIGHTS ON WESTERN FRONT -- KITCHENER RETURNS TO LONDON

#### FIFTEEN AIR BATTLES OVER WESTERN FRONT

**German Sub Gone—German Aerodrome and Munition Factory Are Blown Up—French Move Forward.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 30.—There is a renewal of activity on the western front. British airmen have made a successful raid on the German positions along the coast of Belgium.

##### German Submarine Gone.

A German submarine was blown in two by a neatly placed bomb off Middlekirke on Sunday.

##### Fifteen Air Fights.

There were fifteen air encounters on the western front on Sunday. Fourteen Allied aeroplanes blew up the German aerodrome at Gips, while others destroyed an ammunition factory at La Chapelle.

##### One Against Five.

One pilot engaged five enemy airmen single-handed and managed to bring down two other German aeroplanes.

##### French Advance.

The French troops at Souchez advanced after exploding mines under the trenches of the enemy.

#### MONASTIR HAS BEEN VACATED BY THE SERBS

**Serbs Still Full of Fight, Are Reorganizing—German Attack on Strumitza Has Been Abandoned.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 30.—Monastir has been evacuated. The Serbian troops accomplished their object in delaying the enemy's advance until the civil population had retired in safety.

##### Serbs Reorganizing.

The Bulgarians have utterly failed to crush the Serbs, who are far from being demoralized. They are now re-organizing their forces. There are 80,000 Serbian troops in Albania and Montenegro.

##### German Attack Abandoned.

The Austro-German attack on the Franco-British positions at Strumitza is believed to have been abandoned, with a view to making an effort to counter the Russian menace threatening by way of Roumania.

#### In the Letter Box

Prince Rupert, Nov. 27, 1915. Editor, Daily News,

Dear Sir:—I was pleased to see in a recent issue a very interesting and able letter signed "Observer," making a plea for the business men of Prince Rupert to get together and decide on candidates for the forthcoming municipal election. As I have seen nothing further on the subject, I would add my plea to his.

The herd politicians seem to be so much interested in the provincial and federal elections that they are afraid to antagonize anything that looks like support. With the present city government, the taxpayers of the city are not considered at all. I believe this is the only city in Canada where re-trenchment has been practically ignored. We have enough clerical help, superintendents, purchasing agents, etc., to staff a city with ten times the population. The two highest salaried employees at the city hall have been busy for some time with a new scheme to change the basis of the city indebtedness, which will only add to the present burden of the small population instead of making the increased population of the future pay. However, it will make more work for salaried employees at the city hall, the staff of which is at present too large for the amount of work to be done.

The same applies to the aldermen, some of whom are away prospecting or travelling half the time, while piles of timber, pipes and poles are scattered all over the townsite. I was told by a city employee that there were some 237 kegs of spikes and nearly 50,000 feet of lumber left over from the 14th Avenue work. If so, there was criminal carelessness.

#### JACK ENSCH HAS DIED OF WOUNDS

In the list of casualties published in the Province of Saturday appears the name of John P. Ensich as having died of wounds. Jack was one of the best known and most highly respected mining men in the north. He put in a long spell in the Portland Canal district and was fairly successful there. When the war broke out, Jack was in the mountains, but immediately came to the coast and joined the first Prince Rupert contingent.

Several bright, cheery letters were received in town from Jack only this week, enclosing pieces of a German aeroplane which was brought down near the Canadian lines. On hearing of his death, one Prince Rupert mother said, "he was a fine type of man, and it gave me great pleasure to see him among my boys." That is one of the highest compliments to be paid to any man.

#### COLE'S CIGAR STORE BURGLAR LAST NIGHT

When Mr. Tainpkins opened up Cole's cigar store this morning, he found that the cash register had been tampered with, and on going over to the safe, found it open and the cash gone.

He immediately phoned Mr. Cole, who stated that there was about \$80 in the safe when he left besides a cheque. The cheque is all that remains now. The burglar was thoughtful enough to leave two dimes and three nickles in the cash register, which points to his being a relative of the Vancouver hold-up man who left enough for a meal ticket, but Prince Rupert being in better shape, this thief left enough for only one meal.

It seems that the burglar had gained access to the premises through a back door into a sitting room, and then prised open the door into the shop. The police have arrested a man on suspicion of being connected with the robbery.

#### VICTORIA HAS ANOTHER TORY COAL SCANDAL

**Tory Secretary Guaranteed Payment by the Government and Charged Accordingly—Ottawa fixes Wheat Price.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, Nov. 30.—Harry Price, secretary of the Victoria Conservative Association, is on the stand today in connection with an inquiry into coal contracts for the provincial government dredgers.

He admitted that he had received a commission of fifty cents per ton on the coal supplied in 1913-14. He explained the commission by stating that he was guaranteeing payment by the government.

It is alleged that Price purchased coal at \$1.50 to \$2.00 per ton more than the contract price offered.

The books of the concern supplying the coal cannot be found, and three clerks who were in the office at the time of the alleged graft are all at the front.

##### Wheat Price Set.

Ottawa, Nov. 30.—The cabinet has decided to pay for the exported grain the prices ruling in Winnipeg when the market closed on Saturday night. The price was \$1.04 1/4 for No. 1. The cabinet will repudiate all claims by dealers for extra compensation through inability to supply on their contracts with millers.

#### JOBS FOR SOLDIERS RETURNED FROM FRONT

At the council last night, Ald. Beveridge stated that some of the papers last week had reported him as being in favor of giving a job to J. Bradbury, who had returned from the front. He found that Mr. Bradbury is a thoroughly qualified electrician and, therefore, moved that he be appointed wire inspector in the telephone department.

Ald. Nicol seconded the motion.

Ald. Dybhavn said that he had no objection to offer, except that he was totally unaware of Mr. Bradbury's qualifications, and he wanted to be thoroughly satisfied on the point before he supported the motion. All things being equal, he was ready to give him any position that cropped up. At the same time, he felt that the city's utilities should be in the hands of thoroughly qualified men and he would like to have a chance to consider Mr. Bradbury's qualifications before moving in the matter.

Ald. Nicol said that the council had been passing resolutions along this line and he thought this was an opportunity to show their sincerity. He was thoroughly satisfied as to Mr. Bradbury's qualifications.

Ald. Montgomery said that he had known Mr. Bradbury for ten years, and was thoroughly satisfied that he held the highest qualifications as an electrician.

The mayor said that the matter had been discussed in committee, but Mr. Duncan being absent, the matter was left in abeyance.

Ald. Casey said that it was all a matter of qualification. He would like to hear Mr. Duncan's opinion. He felt that if Mr. Bradbury were as good a man as the present holder of the position, he would support him. He believed that knowledge and efficiency should weigh rather than sympathy. He believed that the superintendent should be provided with the best men possible, as he was held personally responsible for the work of his department.

Ald. Beveridge said that he found that Mr. Bradbury is fully qualified to fill any position from top to bottom of the department, even to filling Mr. Duncan's place.

Ald. Edge said that if there was a job which this man could fill he should have it. He had always held the highest qualifications as an electrician.

Athens, Nov. 30.—It is reported that Bulgaria has sent an ultimatum to Greece demanding disarmament.

##### Gorizia In Flames.

Rome, Nov. 30.—Gorizia is in flames as a result of the fierce Italian bombardment, and the evacuation of the town is proceeding.

The Austrians, who had been reinforced, attempted a series of counter attacks but were driven back to their trenches.

##### Kitchener Returns.

London, Nov. 30.—Lord Kitchener returned from the east today. General Sir John French is also here.

## YOUR DIRECTORS

One of the Conservative candidates in Vancouver stated recently that "the government of this province is a matter of big business. We are all stockholders in the affair in the sense that we have invested in this province all that we possess." This statement is quite true. It is also true that directors of this big business, of which you are a stockholder, have shamelessly conducted your business for the benefit of friends instead of the welfare of the business and the stockholders.

What would you say if the managing director of a company in which you are a shareholder should come to you and say "well, old man, it cost \$16,000,000 to run your business last year and the revenue amounts to about \$10,000,000. You and the rest of the shareholders must forget all about this deficit of \$6,000,000 and dig in and produce more millions on your own account to offset the loss."

You ask for an accounting of the spending of the \$16,000,000 and it is handed to you in such a form that you are certain of one thing only....that the money was spent all right. The accounts are made up in such a way as to defy any attempt to trace many large amounts. Under the all-embracing heading of "miscellaneous" charges, there is an item of \$2,200,000; there is another of "safe and so forth" \$3,400, and so on through page after page. In fact the statement is compiled in such a way as to defy analysis.

This managing director and his associates are drawing down handsome salaries, which you and your friends have to pay. They are hired officers of the company, but they handle

the assets of the concern as if they owned them outright for all time, and at the same time act as if they owned the shareholders body and soul. They have given away to strangers and foreigners that which not only belongs to you, but to your children and your children's children. They have spent huge sums of your money in buying the support of unscrupulous shareholders, whose interest in the welfare of the company is so small, and whose business insight is so limited, that they have utterly failed to see that they have given away something of priceless value for a few dollars, or a job which they should have had anyhow.

What would you say if this managing director and his friends had the effrontery to come to you and ask to be allowed to manage your affairs for four or five years more, during which time you would have no opportunity to fire them? Could you say anything? Would you not be speechless at the very idea of men, who have landed you in the hole to the tune of \$6,000,000 in one year, coming to you and asking for a renewal of their jobs, no matter what they might promise for the future? Would you dream of giving them more than a moment's notice to quit? Would not the notice be couched in language more forcible than polite? Would not you consign them to a region reputed to very much warmer than Victoria? Even if they promised that a few of the offenders would be removed overseas, to other comfortable jobs, also at your expense, would you have your confidence restored in the remaining directors, who were no better than the discarded members?

You may, if you hold a job under these gentlemen, find an excuse, but you can never honestly find a reason.

asking the superintendent to pass judgment on a man in this way, as it put Mr. Duncan in an awkward position.

Ald. Dybhavn thought that Mr. Duncan should be heard from.

The mayor said that he thought the matter should be referred to the light committee.

Ald. Nicol felt that the council should make a move right away.

Ald. Beveridge insisted that the matter be settled at once.

Mr. Duncan said he would like to have an opportunity to compare the qualifications of the two men.

Ald. Casey said that the question came up in the last committee meeting. He said that on no consideration would he force Mr. Bradbury into a position of such importance without Mr. Duncan's consent. In a minor job it did not matter so much, but he did not propose that the city departments should take on the appearance of an old soldiers' home. We must be proud and jealous of our utilities.

Ald. Edge thought there should be co-operation between the different departments in regard to the hiring of old soldiers. With Ald. Casey he was all for efficiency.

The mayor said that the understanding at the committee meeting was that the matter be brought up at the next committee meeting with the superintendent present.

Ald. Beveridge said that he did not understand that this was so, and called upon the city clerk to refer to the minutes of the meeting.

Ald. Casey backed the mayor's statement that the matter was to be brought up again in committee with Mr. Duncan present.

Ald. Dybhavn moved an amendment that the matter be referred to the light committee and Mr. Duncan.

Ald. Montgomery, Beveridge and Nicol voted for the motion and Ald. Dybhavn, Casey and Edge for the amendment, which the mayor declared carried.

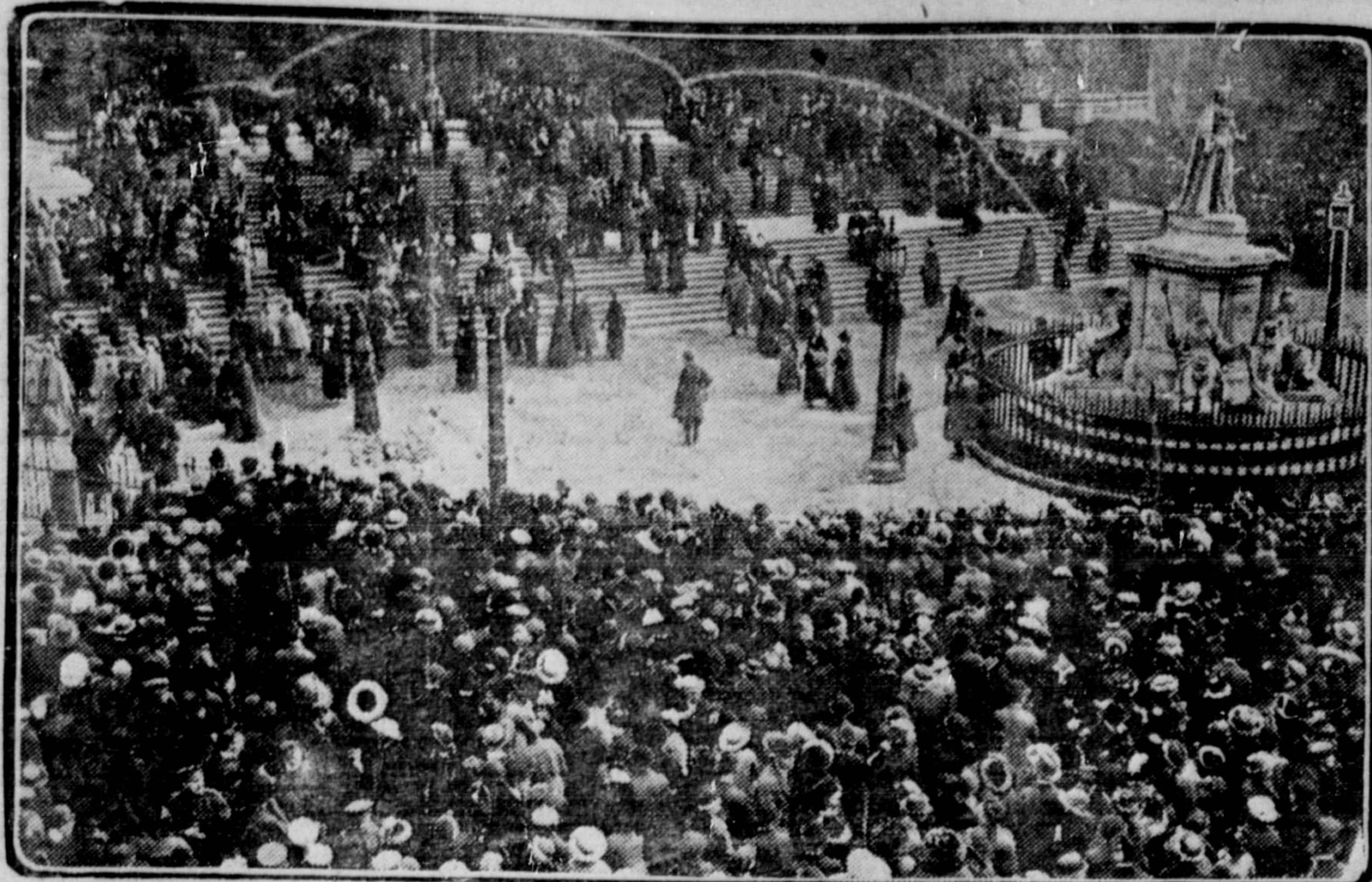

fortably until the children are old enough to look after them-  
selves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be

**QUESTION OF SERIAL BONDS WAS DISCUSSED**

The draft of the private bill to be presented at the next session of the legislature was brought down by the city solicitor at the city council last night.

Ald. Dybhayn said he was no financial or legal expert and, for his part, would be quite satisfied to have the draft bill taken as read.

Ald. Montgomery said that there were several things in it which he objected to on principle. He understood that the new scheme of financing would cost the tax payers more than the present system.

The city treasurer explained several of the knotty points and a long discussion ensued, in which Ald. Montgomery insisted that the change would cost tax payers an extra mill per annum. The city treasurer pointed out that the extra cost would later on be absorbed and that, in the long run, the taxpayers would be the gainers.

It was finally decided to discuss the matter fully at a special meeting called for Friday night, when Mr. Johnson will bring down an exhaustive report on the scheme, and the bill will be fully discussed clause by clause.
