THE GERMAN CHANCELLOR DISCUSSES PEACE

RUSSIANS CAPTURE GERMAN STAFF--FRENCH GUNS EFFECTIVE IN THE BALKANS

PEACE TERMS FROM THE HUN POINT OF VIEW

Diplomatic Speech by German Chancellor in Reichstag—Hun Dignity and Safety Are Essential.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Dec. 9.—"If our enemies make peace proposals compatible with Germany's dignity and safety then we shall always be ready to discuss them," said Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg, in a speech in the Reichstag today.

He says the war can be terminated only by a peace giving a certitude that war will not return, but it would be folly for Germany to propose peace while her enemies enlarge upon the guilt and ignorance of her statesmen, to the confusion of public opinion.

Germany is conscious of her military successes and declines to accept any responsibility for the continuation of the war with its world-wide misery, and cannot be charged with fighting with the aim of making further conquests.

EVIDENCE FOR CROWN IN MURDER CASE TAKEN

Dr. McNeil testified as to the making of a post-mortem examination on the body of John Pitman. There was a wound on the left side of the face, extending from the middle of the cheek down over the left lower jaw bone and over the neck to within a half inch of the breast bone; a small wound which might have been caused by a sharp instrument, and a small wound on the top of the breast bone. The external and internal jugular veins were severed. The left pleural cavity was opened. There were two small wounds on the lobe of the left lung, which looked as if they had been caused by a sharp instrument. The left pleural cavity was full of clotted blood.

A man receiving such a wound might possibly run 400 or 500 yards. It was difficult to state any definite distance. One blow could have caused the wound. There was nothing to indicate that Pitman was unhealthy.

Dr. McNeil was handed a cleaver, which he examined. "The wound on the face must have been caused by a very sharp instrument. The cleaver might have done it, but I am inclined to think the wound was caused by a sharper instrument."

Joshua Robinson, whose evidence was interpreted by Rev. W. E. Collison, was next called. His evidence was almost exactly the same as that of John Wesley, reported yesterday. He saw no blow struck. He saw a white man running from the restaurant, but did not know Pitman by sight.

Constables Saint and Lee were recalled and examined with regard to distances, time, etc.

This closed the evidence for the Crown.

EVIDENCE FOR DEFENCE IN JAP MURDER CASE

Mrs. Kameda, wife of Shimyu Kameda, was the first witness called for the defence in the Port Essington murder case this morning. Before the oath was taken, Mr. Patmore cross-questioned witness as to her belief in the bible and in a Supreme Being. She answered that she did, and the oath was duly taken.

Witness said that she lived over the restaurant, and on the night of July 30th, a big noise downstairs woke her up. She came down to the back door without her shoes on, and looked into the restaurant and saw people fighting. She called for her husband, but he was not there. She was scared and ran up-stairs to her husband's room and opened the window.

Looking out, she saw Nagano and a short white man holding each other. Nagano had a cleaver in his hand. Ohara was clinched with a large man. She did not see a lame man. Ohara had a knife in his hand. She saw everything quite clearly because of the light from the cafe.

The tall man tried to come down the steps, collided with Nagano, and started to run down the street. Before the tall man ran away, she saw Ohara stab him with a knife. Witness described how the blow was struck. Nagano and the short man were struggling, Nagano holding a cleaver. Nagano had no other weapon. Immediately after the tall man and Nagano collided at the foot of the steps, she noticed the blood on Nagano's clothes.

Mrs. Kameda underwent a searching cross examination at the hands of Mr. Fisher and Mr. Patmore and was still on the stand when the court rose for luncheon.

ENTENTE GUNS PLAYED HAVOC WITH BULGARS

Bulgar Attacks Fail and French Artillery Riddles Enemy in Balkans—Serbians are Re-equipped.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Dec. 9.—There was severe fighting on the French Balkan front yesterday. The Bulgarian attacks on the Allied lines failed to make any impression and the accurate fire of the Entente artillery decimated the ranks of the Bulgarians. The Bulgarian forces are concentrating in the Strumitza region.

Serbians Re-equipped.

Official Serbian advices state that 220,000 Serbian troops retired over the border into Albania. The French and British governments are sending along supplies for the immediate re-equipment of the Serbian armies and these supplies are now reaching Albania.

GERMAN STAFF CAPTURED BY THE RUSSIANS

Russian Scouts Making Daring Raids at Night—German Depot on Western Front is Blown up.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Dec. 9.—The entire staff of the 82nd German army division has been captured by Russian scouts and brought into the Russian lines. Their capture was the result of a daring night raid on the part of the Russians.

Western Front.

Paris, Dec. 9.—The French artillery in the Champagne district has exploded a German ammunition depot near Sainte Souplet.

Artillery actions also took place in the sectors of Loos and Givenchy and at Artois. Allied aeroplane scouts state that the fire of the Entente guns was very effective.

Aeroplane Success.

One of our aeroplanes gave chase to a German plane at a height of 3,000 metres and opened fire on the German, setting the aeroplane on fire. The German plane exploded and two passengers fell within our lines.

BOY INJURED AT BORDEN ST. SCHOOL

Just after the Borden Street School opened this afternoon a boy named MacPherson fell and knocked his head against a radiator, sustaining such injuries that a doctor was called in and the boy rushed to the hospital in an auto. The full extent of the injuries had not been made known on going to press, but it is understood that the head injury is severe.

ANNUITY BONDS

After eighteen months of careful study and investigation the city treasurer has placed before the council a scheme for the altering of the basis upon which the indebtedness of the city is carried. The report runs to thirty-two pages and is as concise and clear as any such report could be. Each bylaw is analysed and a comparison made between the cost of carrying it under the old sinking fund and under the proposed serial bond or annuity instalment plan. It is a matter of some difficulty to describe the scheme comprehensively in a short article, but by taking one bylaw as an example it may be possible to give some idea as to how it works out.

Taking bylaw 97, covering section one grading, the debt of which is \$600,000, under the annuity instalment system the debt, principal and interest, would be wiped out in thirty years by annual payments of \$39,030.86, \$30,000 of which would cover the first year's interest on a basis of 5 per cent. while \$9,030.86 would go to reduce the debt owing. At the end of the second year, payment of the same sum allows \$9,482.40 to go to reducing the debt, while it requires the balance of \$29,548.46 to cover the interest, and so on, the payment each year allowing a larger proportion of the debt to be wiped out as the sum on which interest is to be paid is reduced, until at the end of the thirtieth year, \$37,172.25 of the amount cleans up the debt of \$600,000, while it requires only \$1,858.61 to cover the interest on the small balance which was left at the end of the previous year.

Under the old plan of piling up a sinking fund, without reducing the debt during the

period of fifty years, the total interest at the rate of 5 per cent would be \$1,500,000, while under the annuity instalment system of clearing off a proportion of the debt each year, and wiping out the debt entirely in thirty years, the total interest would amount to \$570,925.80.

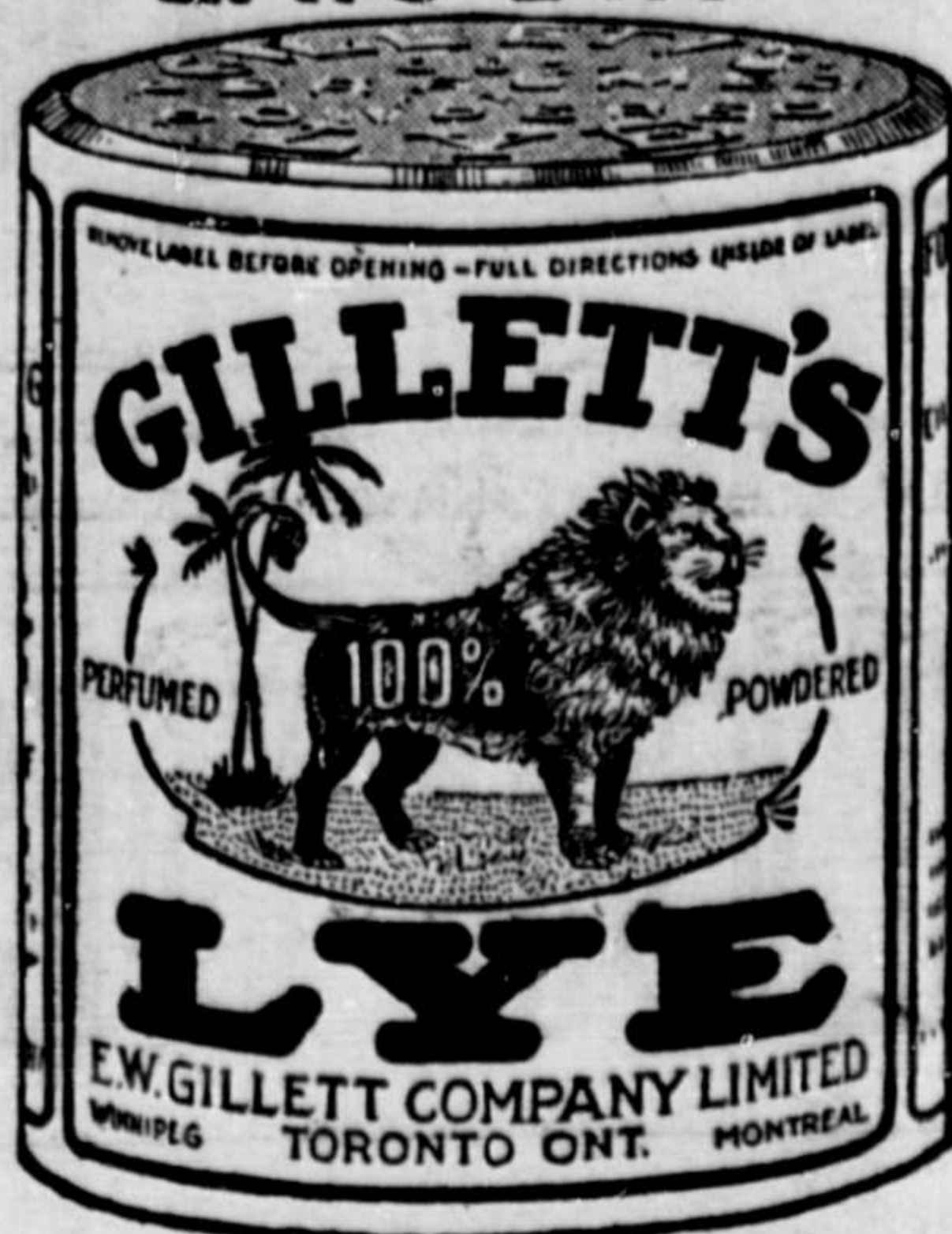
It will thus be clearly seen that from a dollars and cents point of view the new plan is immeasurably superior to the old. From a credit standpoint, the great benefit is that the municipality is keeping its indebtedness at a reasonable level as the city develops. With serial bonds running from ten to thirty years, new ventures can be financed and the bonds dove-tailed in such a way as to keep the total debt around the same level, while, under the old system, the city's indebtedness keeps on growing until it assumes alarming proportions in the eyes of a prospective bond purchaser, even though much of that indebtedness may be more apparent than real.

Under the new system, a bond purchaser can tell at a glance exactly what the actual indebtedness of the city is, while he is assured of the refund of a certain proportion of his capital each year. Naturally, he has this sum for re-investment, and he is much more likely to re-invest it in bonds of a similar calibre, rather than in the old type where, though he draws his interest regularly, his capital is more or less tied up.

It will thus be seen that the annuity system automatically releases capital which in all probability will again be placed at the disposal of the city.

Space forbids any further enlargement on the question, but the full details will be gone into at a later date. Suffice it to say that, today, such cities

as Calgary and Vancouver are so tied up with a load of indebtedness under the sinking fund plan, that they have had to resort to the expensive and troublesome method of financing on short term notes, while such progressive cities as New York and Boston have resorted to the serial system with the greatest success, finding that such bonds meet a much more receptive market.

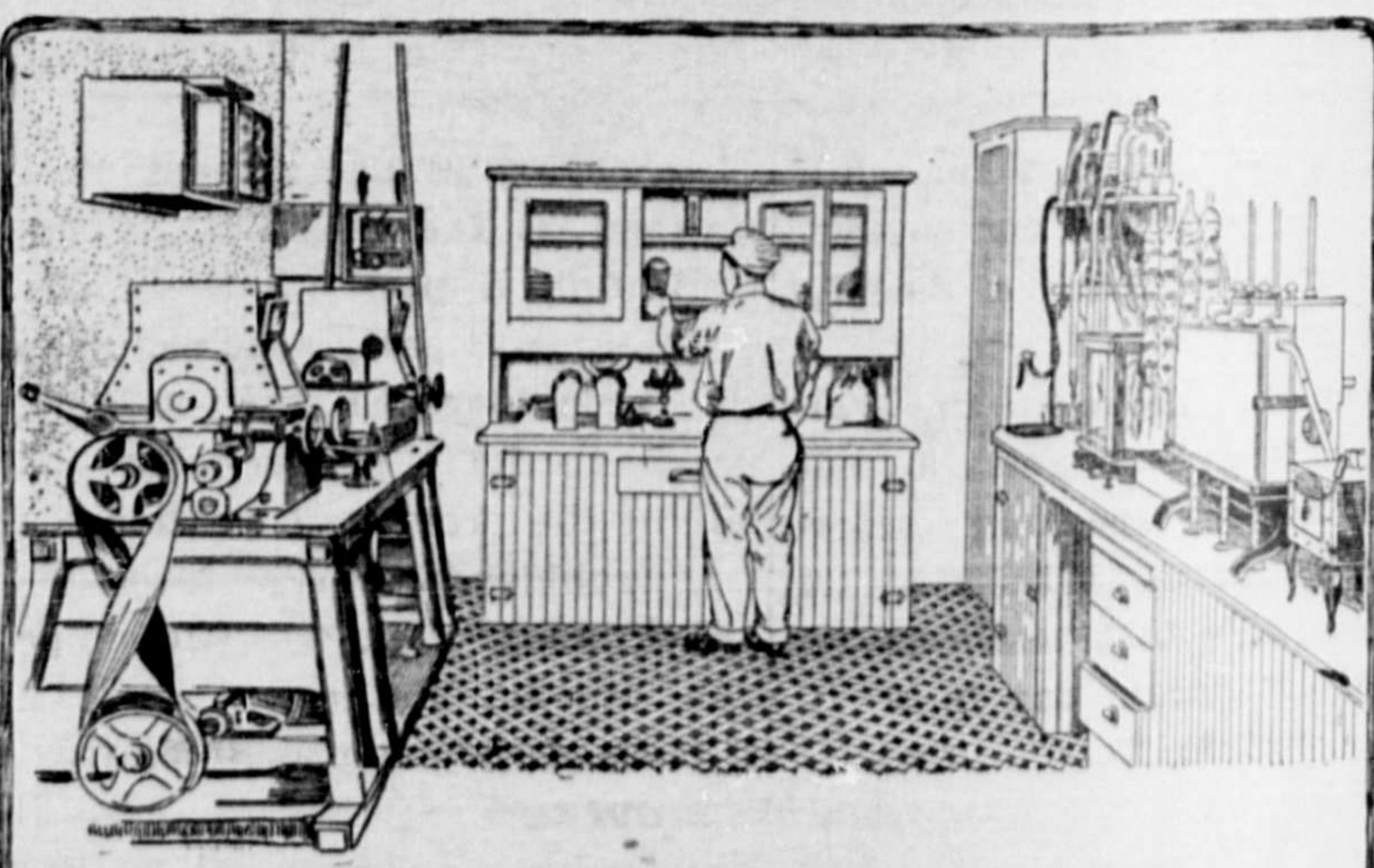

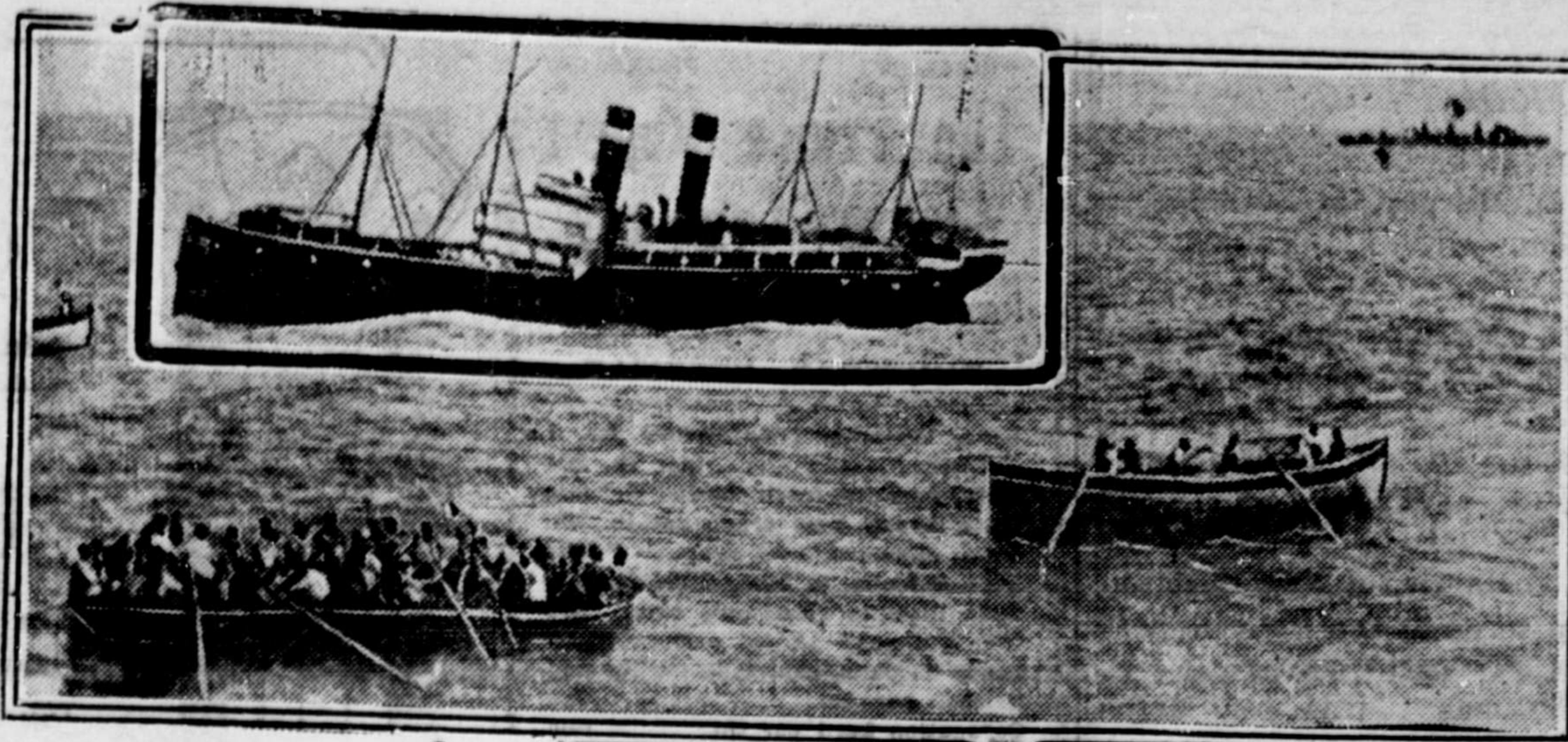

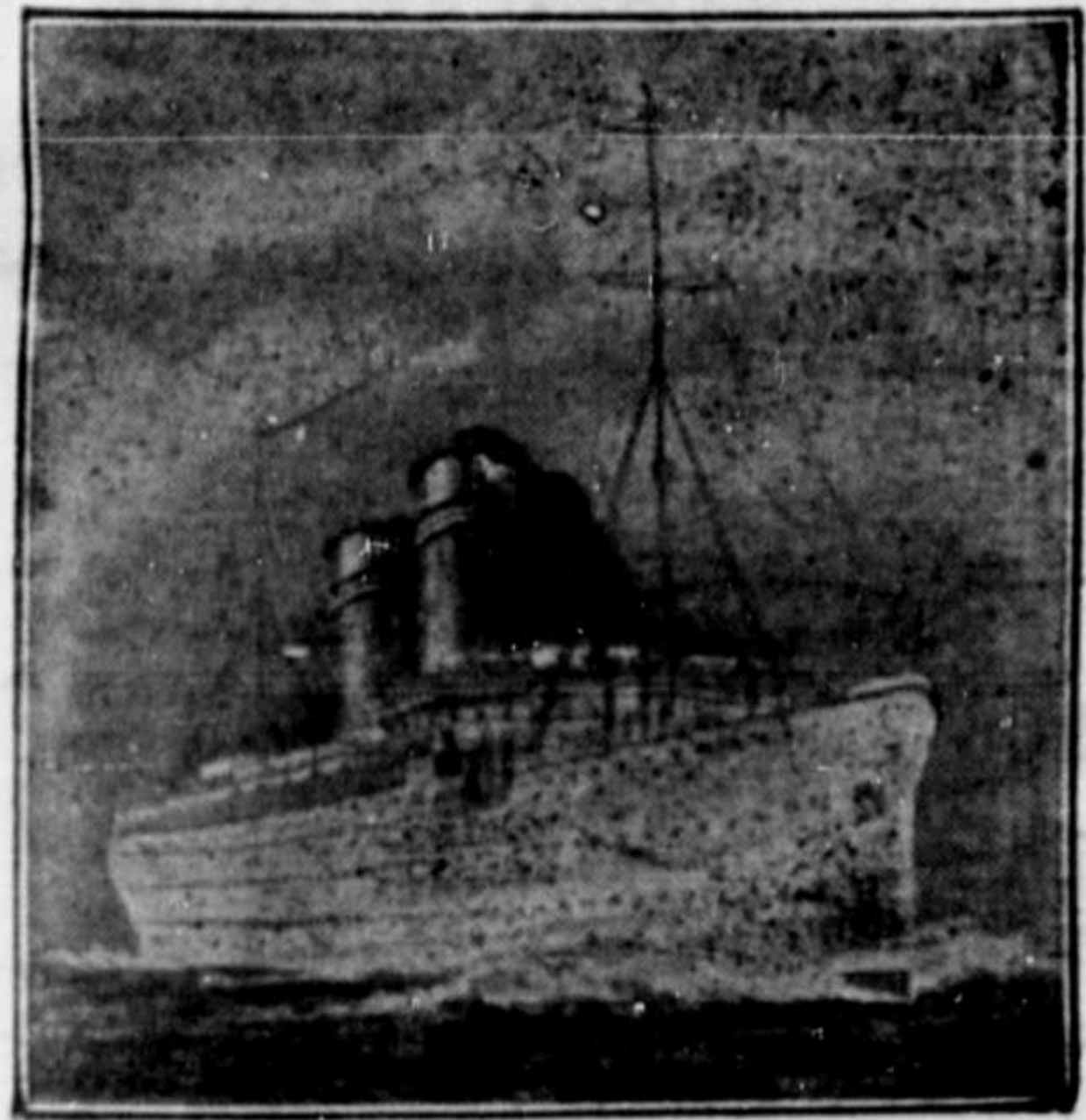

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
