THE BALKAN SITUATION CAUSING ANXIETY

ALLIED FORCES RETREATING IN GOOD ORDER—GERMANS EVACUATING LEMBERG

ALLIED FORCE IS RETREATING WITHOUT LOSS

Artillery Doing Good Work—The Central Forces Greatly Out-number Those of the Entente Allies.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Dec. 11.—The latest news from the Balkans is to the effect that the Allies are falling back in good order without sustaining loss. The Allied artillery is inflicting damage on the pursuing enemy.

Report Denied.
The report that the Germans under Von Gallwitz had occupied Givgeli near the Greek frontier, has been officially denied.

Allied Force Inadequate.
It is conceded that the present forces of the Allies are inadequate to cope with the forces of the Central powers, which, by Premier Rhadoslavoff, are numbered at a million men.

CORONER'S JURY FINDS IMPROVEMENTS NEEDED

The inquest into the death of Garnet MacPherson was held yesterday afternoon. The jury was: J. Y. Rochester, (foreman), F. J. Bowness, George Hill, Martin O'Reilly, Max Heilbronner, D. J. Corley. The verdict was as follows:

"We, the undersigned jurors, appointed by J. H. McMullin, coroner, to enquire into the cause of the death of Garnet MacPherson, find that the deceased came to his death by accidentally falling from the balustrade on the second floor of the Borden Street School, on the afternoon of the 9th of December, 1915.

"And we condemn, in as strong a manner as possible, the existing conditions at the Borden Street School in being a menace to the safety and welfare of the school children, and we ask that the following changes be made immediately:

1. All stair rails and balustrades be fitted with a steel wire screen of sufficient height, not less than two feet, so that children can not climb or slide on the balustrade.
2. That the fire escapes at both ends of the school building be replaced by iron fire escapes.
3. That all outside rails and grounds pertaining to the school that are a menace to the children, be protected.
4. That a telephone for emergency purposes only, be installed in a suitable place in this building.
5. That a stretcher be procured

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GREECE MUST YIELD OR FACE ALLIED FORCE

French Minister Confers With Greek King Today—Nation Afraid of the Bulgarian Menace.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Dec. 11.—The attitude of Greece is the object of comment and suspicion. The refusal by Greece of the demands of the Allies means war. The Greek nation is torn at the prospect of the Bulgarian menace.

Greek Report.
Athens, Dec. 11.—The Greek government has arranged to demobilize the army, and it is expected that a decree to this effect will be issued shortly.

The French minister is in conference with King Constantine today. The ministers of the Entente powers have urged immediate action on the part of Greece with regard to the facilities demanded by the Allies at Saloniki.

NAGANO AND OHARA GIVEN TEN YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

MR. JUSTICE MACDONALD DELIVERS IMPRESSIVE SPEECH IN PASSING SENTENCE—BOTH ARE GIVEN THREE YEARS ON CHARGES OF ATTEMPTED MURDER

After considering the evidence in the Port Essington murder case for about four hours yesterday afternoon, the jury asked Mr. Justice Macdonald to read them part of Pierce's evidence. After doing this, His Lordship again dealt with the difference between murder and manslaughter.

At 4:38 p. m. the jury returned and the foreman, George P. McColl, intimated to the court that the verdict was one of manslaughter against both of the accused.

Ohara was then charged with having assaulted Murphy, with intent to do him grievous bodily harm. To this charge, he pleaded guilty.

Nagano was then charged with committing a similar assault on Angus. He also pleaded guilty. His Lordship intimated that he would pronounce sentence at 8 p. m.

At eight o'clock the court room was packed, the proceedings evidently rivalling the picture shows in interest. After His Lordship had taken the bench, accompanied by His Honor Judge Young, T. B. Shoebottom, counsel for Nagano, made a plea for leniency on account of the youth of accused, and because of the fact that he had been in no trouble before. He pointed out that the term already spent in jail had had a great effect upon him.

On behalf of Ohara, L. W. Patmore urged that the bench deal leniently in view of the fact that he had told the court his story

without any attempt to shield himself in any particular.

His Lordship then addressed the prisoners as follows:

"Nagano and Ohara, you have received a fair trial. You were charged with the serious crime of murder, but the jury took the view that your crime consisted only of manslaughter. In other words, there were extenuating circumstances which reduced the graver crime to the lesser one.

As far as the killing of John Pitman is concerned, I am quite satisfied that the jury was correct in finding you both implicated. There is little that can be said in your favor as far as your conduct was concerned upon the evening in question. You did not control your temper and gave full vent to your passion to the extent of inflicting death upon a man who came to your restaurant peaceably that evening.

"He and his friends were without weapons of defence; you had at your disposal knives, which you used, and I feel quite satisfied that you both had knives. The provocation that saved you from the more serious offence being found against you was one that you might have met by simply brandishing your knives and ordering Angus, Pitman and Murphy out of the cafe. You gave these men, however, not a chance of escape, but followed them ruthlessly through the door and out on the public street.

"You, Ohara, stabbed Murphy, reckless whether you killed him

PACIFIC COAL SHARES CASE NEARING END

Dr. Young says Shares were a Voluntary Gift—Valuable Jewels Stolen from Chicago Institute

(Special to The Daily News.) Victoria, Dec. 11.—Hon. Dr. Young, the final witness in the Pacific Coast Coal case, says that he met Arbuthnot in 1883. In 1906, Mr. Arbuthnot promised to give Young a share in his next good thing, as an act of friendship.

In 1914, Arbuthnot called upon him with the present of \$105,000 worth of bonds as a voluntary gift. Young returned the bonds and asked Arbuthnot to act as trustee. The decision of Mr. Justice Clement is expected soon. Valuable Jewels Stolen.

Chicago, Dec. 11.—Eluding the three watchmen, a thief entered the Art Institute last night and decamped with jewels valued at \$50,000. They were the gift of Verne W. Noyes to the institute in memory of his wife.

CHRISTMAS PRESENT?

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LIEBKNECHT IN TROUBLE WITH HUN OFFICIALS

Leading Berlin Paper Suspended—Germans are Evacuating Lemberg—Big Rally Of Recruits.

(Special to The Daily News.) Paris, Dec. 11.—German military authorities are taking proceedings against Dr. Karl Liebknecht, the German Socialist leader, owing to his political utterances.

Paper Suspended.
The authorities have also suppressed the Morgen Post, the leading Conservative paper in Berlin, for advocating that no peace proposals be considered unless Germany retains all the new territory occupied by Germany during the war.

Germans Leave Lemberg.
Petrograd, Dec. 11.—The Germans are evacuating Lemberg, the capital of Galicia.

Rush of Recruits.
London, Dec. 11.—There has been an enormous rush of "last minute" men at the recruiting offices. Voluntary recruiting ends today. Lines of recruits formed up as early as five o'clock this morning, hundreds of yards long.

KAMEDA RELEASED ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE

S. Kameda, the Port Essington merchant who was charged with committing an assault, with intent, was tried yesterday afternoon. The jury was: J. A. Murray (foreman), H. S. Nickerson, G. Smith, F. E. Clapp, H. Letourneau, E. C. La Trace, Weston Coyney, E. J. Large, M. McLeod, J. G. Johns, F. R. C. Brown, and James Hunter.

John Wesley, Robert Angus, Harry Murphy and H. Berryman gave evidence for the Crown.

Mr. Peters did not call any evidence for the defence.

The jury returned a verdict on the count of assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm.

In the evening, His Lordship pointed out that the penalty was three years, but, in view of the good character of the accused and the fact that he had been in jail for five months with a much more serious charge hanging over his head, he would be released on suspended sentence.

or not and then, being grabbed by Pitman to save himself, you, Nagano, helped your friend and inflicted a mortal blow and then, not satisfied with that, you reeked your spirit of revenge on Angus and inflicted on him a blow which might have caused his death.

"If this occurrence had taken place in the western States, some one perchance of the white people thus attacked would have had some weapon to defend themselves, but, in our country, the carrying of weapons is frowned upon and not pursued, I am glad to say.

I can add little further except to again repeat that the vengeance that was in Ohara's mind was carried to the extent even of kicking poor Murphy when he was on the ground. It is the duty of a court, when inflicting punishment if possible to extend mercy, but, if I were to allow sympathy and mercy to prevail to such an extent that you were to be allowed to simply serve your sentence after a few years only in the penitentiary, it would be putting a premium on those who might see fit to allow their temper and passion to thus gain sway and do to death a fellow citizen.

"You sent John Pitman to his death that night without a word of warning, a man, as far as we know, respectable in the community and, at any rate, his life was as dear to him as yours is to you. I might, and have the power, to send you for the balance of your days to imprisonment so that no more would you be a menace to

the community, but I do not deem it necessary or advisable to go that length. I can see very little difference between the two of you. Nagano seems to have got control of himself quicker than Ohara. He was completely out of control, and, according to his own admission, ready to kill any one of those who had been inside the cafe that night. But his candid admission, under oath, of that state of feeling compensates in some measure for the difference between himself and Nagano.

"Nagano, it is said by his counsel, has felt keenly the position in which he has been placed, upon this charge of murder, but he saw fit to add to his crime, in order if possible, to protect himself, the crime of perjury. In my opinion, his story was false and the story of Ohara was essentially the

MORE ROBBERY

The following extract from the evidence given before the Davidson commission on war purchases in Peel County is perhaps the most startling yet disclosed in this graft-ridden Dominion. James R. Fallis, M. P. P. for Peel, admitted having purchased horses from the farmers and resold them to the government buyers at a profit.

This is from the Toronto Globe:

Three striking revelations characterized the investigation of Sir Charles Davidson into Canadian war purchases, which proceeded in Peel County.

An old lame mare, foaled in 1899, and sold by her owner when she was fifteen years old for \$40, part of the proceeds being "taken out in pigs," was sold to the Dominion government for military purposes last year, on the outbreak of war, for \$165.

The white legs and white nose of an otherwise black horse were "doctored," "dyed" or "painted" black, owing to the military regulations against the purchase of light-colored animals, and the "transformed" animal sold to the government.

Mr. James R. Fallis, M. P. P. for Peel, testified that he purchased horses from farmers after the animals had passed the government inspection and resold them to the government making private profit. "So the farmers got less and the government paid more for your intervention?" said Sir Charles Davidson, addressing Mr. Fallis.

The amazing part of the whole business, and the part which damns Canada and Canadian politicians in the eyes of Britain, France and the other Allied countries, is that

throughout the Dominion, these war contract grafters do not seem to realize the extent of their crimes. They seem to adopt the attitude that any scheme to filch money from the public purse is justifiable, so long as the crime is not exposed. The exposure is the only flaw.

The Germans who are firing munitions plants and wheat elevators in the States are doing so from a patriotic standpoint, and are, therefore, much less blameworthy than the traitors who are bleeding their country in the hour of her peril. The Germans in America are being punished, but the "patriots" who are stealing from their own people have, so far, escaped, with the exception of the man who stole the hay, and who had not sense enough to get away, though he had ample opportunity to do so.

The men who have stolen from the Empire at this time, in the way of grafting on war contracts, should be mounted on the aged and infirm horses which they have sold to the government at huge prices; fitted with the bum boots which were supplied to the troops; supplied with a pair of the window-glass binoculars, and armed with one of Sir Sam Hughes' stenographer's combined spades and bullet shields and placed, with no other weapon, in the front of the firing line. This might prove an effective deterrent to the thugs who are posing as politicians in Canada at the present time.

truth. I have expressed myself somewhat at length so that you may appreciate, if possible, the gravity of the offence. Now you will be confined in the penitentiary for a period and, during that time, try and come to the conclusion that it is necessary to keep control of your temper and, more especially, not to resort to deadly weapons for the purpose of resenting provocation or insult. The sentence of the courts, for the offence for which you have been found guilty, that you be confined in the penitentiary for the space of ten years. Also you have pleaded guilty, you, Ohara, to a charge of attempted murder. You are sentenced to the penitentiary for that crime, and I am making the punishment light because you have pleaded guilty. The term of your sentence is three years, to run concurrently with that previously imposed for manslaughter.

"You, Nagano, have also pleaded guilty to a similar charge and a similar sentence is passed upon you, namely, three years in the penitentiary. Remove the prisoners."

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.
QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$4.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
