## GERMANS WILL PURSUE ALLIES INTO GREECE

### FRENCH ENGINEER DIES HEROICALLY — RUSSIANS SINK TURKISH GUNBOATS

#### ZEP. AND CREW DESTROYED BY RUSSIAN GUNS

Two Turkish Gunboats Sunk in Black Sea—Austria Angry At America's Note Re Ancona.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Dec. 14.—Russian artillery has destroyed a Zeppelin near Dvinsk. The gunfire set the Zeppelin ablaze and the crew was cremated in the burning debris.

#### Turk Gunboats Sunk.

The Turkish gunboats Boruk and Reis, both of the Malatia type, have been sunk in the Black Sea by three Russian torpedo boats.

#### Austria Angry.

London, Dec. 14.—Austria is angered because of the receipt of a note from America demanding the disavowal of the sinking of the Ancona, coupled with a request for the punishment of the commander of the submarine and reparation to the families of all Americans who were killed in the disaster.

#### BRAVE FRENCH ENGINEER DIES HEROIC DEATH

Frenchman Deliberately Goes to Death Along With Six Turk Officers—Minnesota off Frisco.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Saloniki, Dec. 14.—The French submarine Turquoise, which was captured by the Turks and placed on exhibition at Constantinople, has been sunk with the loss of six Turkish officers.

A French engineer was summoned to explain the mechanism of the submarine to the Turkish officers. While these gentlemen were on board, he started the machinery, dived, and all were lost.

#### Minnesota off Frisco.

San Francisco, Dec. 14.—The liner Minnesota is off the Golden Gate. The crew must remain on board until the investigation by the authorities has been completed.

#### JUDGMENT AGAINST HARRISON, GAMBLE & CO.

The civil case of the Port Edward Townsite Company, Ltd., and the B. C. Trust Corporation, Ltd., v. Harrison, Gamble Company and Samuel Harrison, was concluded yesterday, Alex. M. Manson appearing for the plaintiffs and W. E. Fisher for the defendants.

C. B. Peterson, of this city, and D. S. Hood of the B. C. Trust Corporation, were examined as to the state of affairs. A lengthy statement drawn up by Mr. Peterson, showed how payments made to the defendants in April, 1913, and subsequent months, had not been reported to the corporation until November, 1914. Mr. Hood testified as to the collections coming along apparently regularly up to November, 1914, after which time no satisfactory report was forthcoming.

The plaintiffs held that collections were held back to cover monies spent in advertising the townsite, and that, if returns of arrears of commissions were made, it would be shown that the plaintiffs owed the defendants a considerable sum.

Alex. M. Manson brought out clearly that defendants had not lived up to the terms of their contract and that the sum of \$12,594.01 was owing to plaintiffs.

His Lordship gave judgment for the plaintiffs for \$12,594.01 with interest at 5 per cent. from November 15th, 1914.

Vancouver, Dec. 14.—Mrs. Minnie Wood, wife of the gardener of the late W. R. Arnold, managing director of the Dominion Trust, was arrested on charges of wholesale shop-lifting.

Her husband, who is held by the police, had been out of work for several months, but had \$514 in his pockets when arrested.

#### GERMANS WILL PURSUE ALLIES ON GREEK SOIL

Both Sides Bidding for Support of Constantine — Germany Demands Explanation From Greece.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 14.—The Central Powers have served notice on Greece of their intention to pursue the Anglo-French troops through Greece to the sea, unless the Allies are disarmed by the Greeks.

#### Pressure on Constantine.

The Allies are secure at their base. Both sides are bringing pressure to bear on King Constantine in order to induce him to join them in the war.

#### Blockade Continues.

The economic blockade of Greece by the Allied fleet continues. Germany demands an explanation of the reason why such facilities have been given to the Entente Powers.

#### COUNCIL DISAPPROVES OF PATRIOTIC LEVY

The resolution passed by the canvassing committee of the Patriotic Fund at their meeting on Saturday, and which appeared in The Daily News yesterday, was brought before the city council last night.

A letter from T. D. Pattullo was read, pointing out that it was the duty of the government to provide sufficient means for the sustenance of the dependents of soldiers. He described the policy of levying a tax rate to cover any such fund as unsound in principle.

George R. Naden appeared before the council to present the views of the minority of the Patriotic committee, as he wished to assure the council that the resolution was not an unanimous affair. He pointed out that the duty of providing for the dependents of soldiers is a national matter and not the affair of any community. The sanction of parliament had been given for the voluntary contribution of an additional amount to that allowed to dependents. He held that any sum raised by taxation would cease to be a voluntary contribution.

From the standpoint of the property holder, he held that it was a mistake to suggest placing an additional tax upon property at a time when property values were coming down. He pointed out that many of the outside property holders had purchased their land at high speculative values, and that they were taxed at an inflated value, and that if the tax were increased to meet such an emergency as this, they would be liable to dispute the assessment and would probably have little difficulty in having their contention upheld, as the assessment of nearly \$2,000,000 might, on present values, be reduced to about

#### GERMAN BARON FACES CHARGE OF CONSPIRACY

Plots to Destroy Puget Sound Shipping—Accused Connected With Plans to Cause Explosions.

(Special to The Daily News.)

San Francisco, Dec. 14.—Baron Wilhelm Von Brincken, attache to the German Consulate, and C. G. Crowley, a detective, along with Mrs. Margaret Cornell, a secret agent of Crowley's, have been indicted by a grand jury on a charge of conspiracy to destroy commerce and of using the United States mails to incite to arson, assassination and murder.

German plots to destroy shipping in Puget Sound ports have been revealed, while there is evidence connecting accused with plots to cause forty explosions.

New York, Dec. 14.—The heaviest snowstorm experienced for years has left New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and New England from six to fifteen inches deep in snow. Railroads and telegraphic communication have been disorganized.

held a million. He also pointed out that placing say, one mill extra to cover such a fund would scare away the outside property holder, and even the getting of permission to do this would have a like effect. **HORSE BUYING**

When the war broke out Mr. James Robinson Fallis, member for the county of Peel in the Legislative Assembly, made an early visit to the Militia department at Ottawa, and obtained from it a letter of recommendation to the government inspectors of horses in the county of Peel. Armed with this document, he formed a partnership with a Mr. Jones, and the firm was so successful in its operations that Mr. Fallis was able to swear to Sir Chas. Davidson that every one of the three hundred and sixty-two horses purchased in Peel county for the first contingent was bought from him or his firm. On his own admission, his profits were less than three thousand dollars, while his partner swore they were about three thousand, five hundred.

Mr. Fallis was blantly frank in his description of the way in which he secured such profits, and he was outspokenly defiant to the commission when in reply to a mildly implied censure from Sir Charles Davidson, he said he "had a perfect right" to do as he did, and added that "it was his business, and it was legitimate business." His method of procedure was to drag-net all the available horses in the county into Brampton, get the government officials to inspect them, then buy them from the owners, then sell them at an advanced price to the government. "The government wanted the horses and had to have them quick," said Mr. Fallis. "But the horses were right there, and the government could have purchased them direct from the farmers," objected Sir Charles. "Once they were passed we purchased them," said Mr. Fallis. "So the farmers got less and the government paid more for them as

a result of your intervention," commented Sir Charles. "My business is the live stock business; I had a perfect right to do what I did; it was legitimate business," reiterated Mr. Fallis. Sir Charles will probably express a different opinion in his report to the government.

The question now is, what can be done to expel from public life a man whose opinion of his own business methods, deliberately and publicly avowed on oath before a special tribunal, stamps him as unfit to occupy a seat among Ontario's legislators? If Mr. Fallis were a member of the House of Commons he would be required by the Premier to resign his seat, as Mr. Garland and Mr. Foster had to do. The Legislative Assembly cannot do less than expell Mr. Fallis if he persists in his determination to keep his seat. If Premier Hearst does not move in this matter some other member should and probably will do so.—Toronto Globe.

**Re Serial Bonds.**

To the editor:—Ratepayers arouse yourselves! The wolf is at the door! A scheme is submitted to you to approve of in a few short weeks, that has taken the clear, unaddled brains of the city treasurer and city solicitor one whole year to compile. The scheme is similar to the sale of your hydro-electric franchise in 1913.

It is my desire to treat this subject in as fair and clear a manner as my limited intelligence of the subject will permit, in the interest of the ratepayer and the best interest of the city. To begin with, I am strongly of the opinion that, when a new financial scheme of such mammoth, vital importance to the property holders of the city is undertaken, the character of the promoters should be a question of the first importance. I do not mean the moral character neither do I mean to cast any reflection upon any citizen or individual. What I do mean is, that the financial success of promoters in handling their own private affairs should be accepted as an evidence of their wisdom in propounding measures for a whole community.

Hence, in my opinion, the necessity for a strong, intelligent committee, that have made a success in handling their own affairs in large financial undertakings, should at least be taken into confidence in any such scheme, the pros and cons discussed, and they report their findings before any rash step be taken, or a community be ill-advised and requested to cast their ballots for or

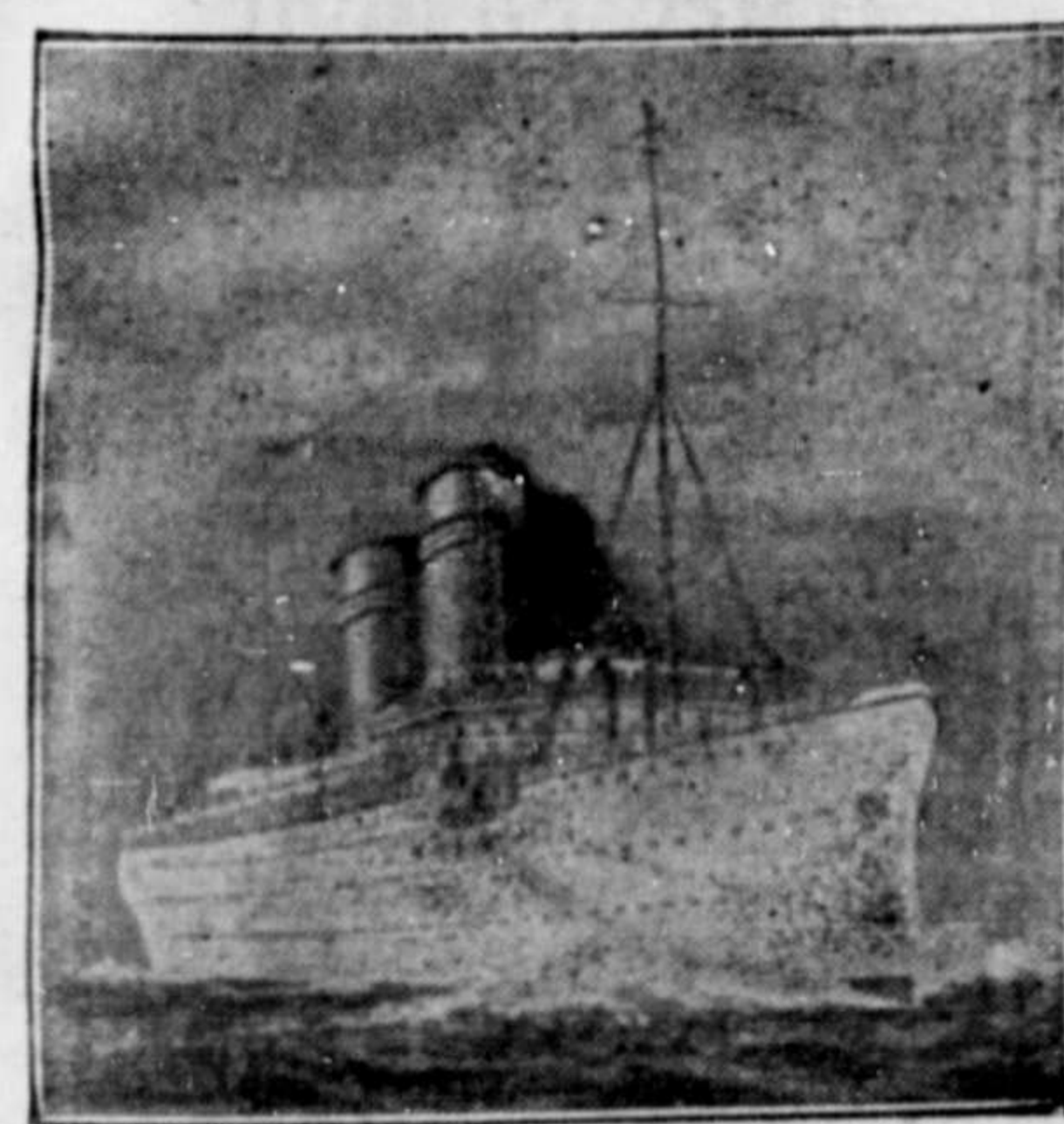

### RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

#### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

thought that the government should start some kind of a soldiers' compensation fund to provide for dependents and wounded soldiers, who were unfit to follow their former vocations. He thought it a mistake to think of taxing a commodity like real estate which had suffered from the war, while the profits of some of the big corporations had run to about 50 per cent. on their capital from war contracts. He was in favor of some scheme of taxing such profits to provide for the soldiers and their dependents.

Ald. Beveridge was strongly opposed to taxing property for this purpose. Ald. Nicol thought that if the patriotic committee was getting in the money they should do nothing in the matter meantime.

The mayor thought the council should cease their efforts in simply refusing to endorse the resolution. He understood that the collection just started was a big success, and that the matter would be solved by voluntary contribution.

Mr. Naden intimated that he and a friend had collected \$575 in two hours that afternoon. The motion of Ald. Montgomery carried.

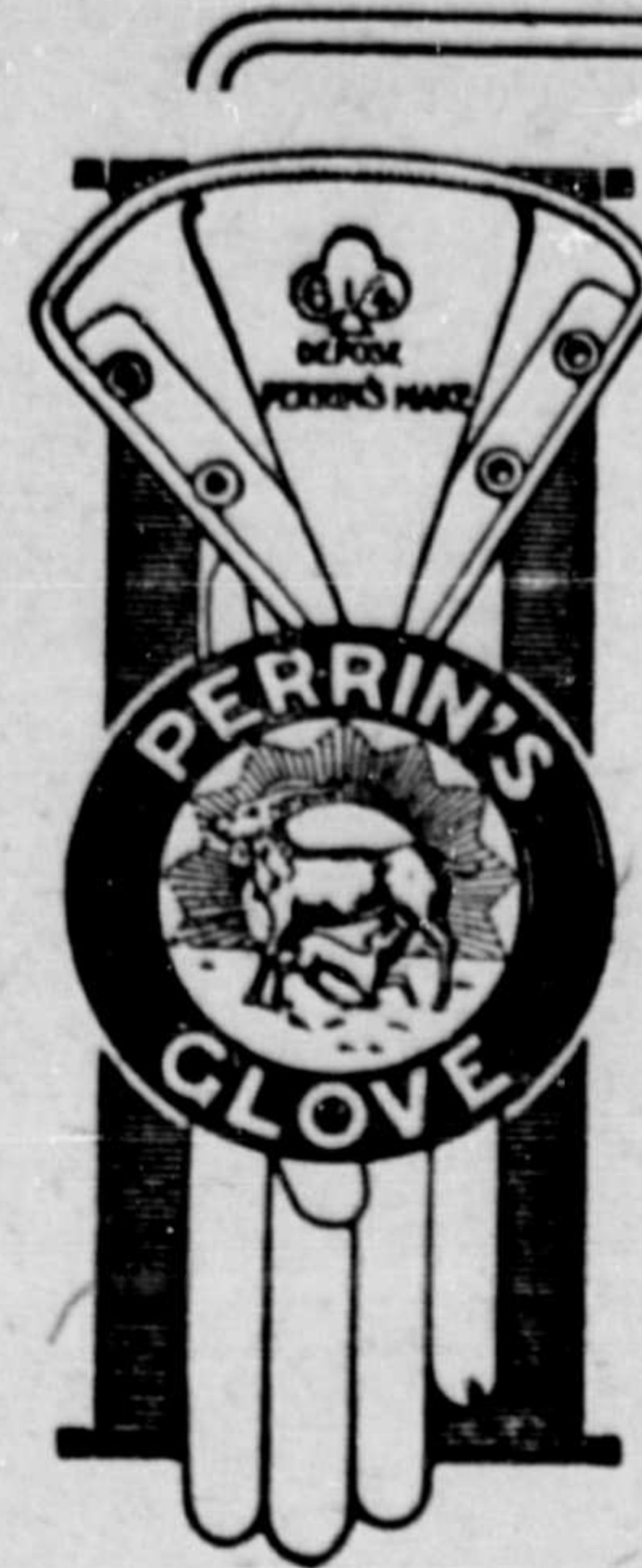
