GERMAN PLOT TO WRECK MILITARY TRAINS

THREE ZEPPELINS DESTROYED -- BULGARIANS KEEPING AT A SAFE DISTANCE

GERMAN PLOT TO WRECK CANADIAN PACIFIC

Extensive Plans of German Spies in the South—Canadian Military Trains to Be Destroyed.

(Special to The Daily News.)
San Francisco, Dec. 15.—That Vancouver was the chief objective in a big German plot to blow up military trains, tunnels and bridges is exposed in the affidavit of Johannes Von Koolbergen, in the proceedings here against Baron Von Brincken, G. C. Crowley and Mrs. Cornell, on charges of conspiracy.

Von Koolbergen swears that he was employed by Franz Bepp, the German Consul at San Francisco, and Von Brincken last April to blow up a military train while it passed over a bridge or was going through a tunnel between Vancouver and Revelstoke. For this job he was offered \$3,000. He was supplied with maps and full instructions.

Von Koolbergen, who is a German-Canadian, informed the C. P. R. authorities at Vancouver and came to Vancouver and arranged with Superintendent Peters and the military authorities that his story of the plot appear in the Vancouver Province on May 10th.

It was also arranged by Von Brincken that witness would bring about a cave-in of the tunnel in the Selkirks, for which job he was paid \$1,750, Von Brincken keeping \$250 for himself.

Koolbergen has the money and papers in Von Brincken's handwriting in his possession. The payment of cash was made after an interview in the office of Consul Bepp.

Von Koolbergen is well known in Vancouver and Calgary. He will be a witness at the trial of the conspirators in San Francisco. Other witnesses will show that the destruction of the Hercules Powder plant and the Aetna Explosive Works was carried out by instructions from the accused.

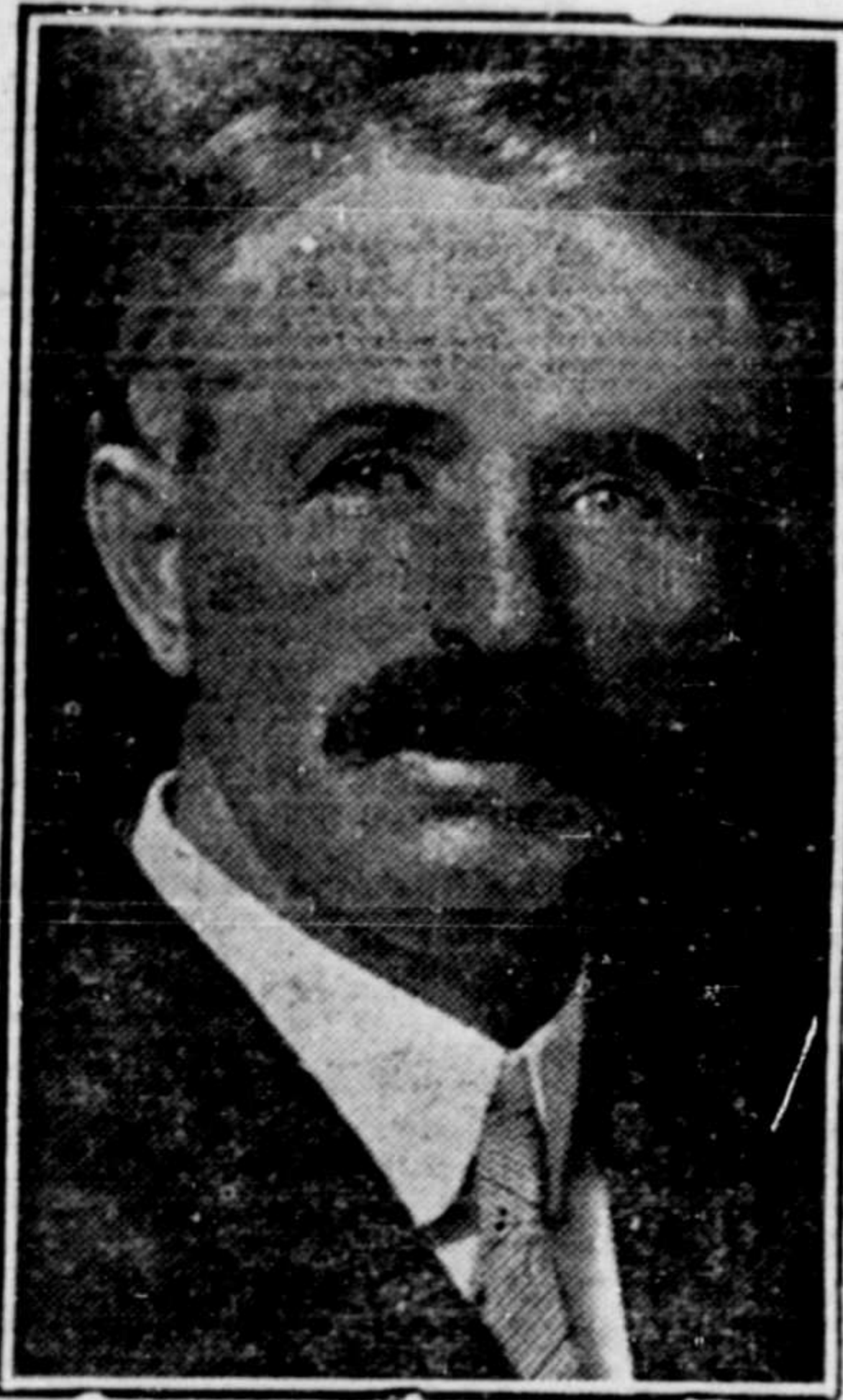

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

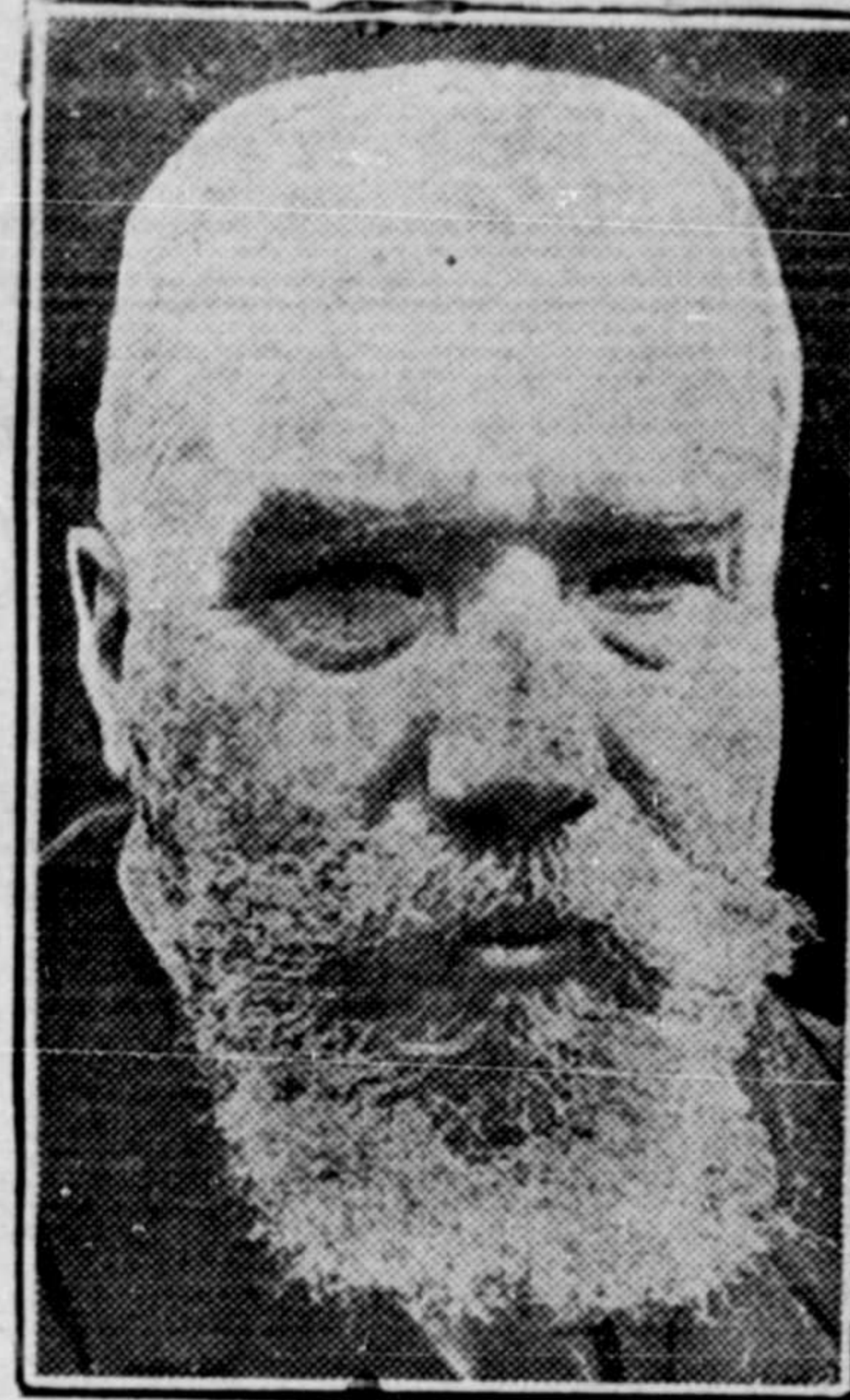

Where the brave Canadians have fallen in France and in Belgium and their bodies consigned to hastily-made graves, to mark the spot and to make their names immortal in French and Belgian history, their surviving comrades of these bloody battles planted seeds of the Canadian maple, and to commemorate this Captain Harwood Steele, a nephew of the General "Steve" Steele, known to so many people of Prince Rupert, publishes the following lines in "Canada," the illustrated weekly published in London.

BULGARS SHOW THEIR REGARD FOR BAYONETS

Allies Saved Ammunition in Their Retreat in Deep Snow—Loss Was Slight—More Men At Saloniki.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Dec. 15.—The Greek government denies that the Bulgarians are on the Greek frontier.

The Franco-British forces saved all their ammunition in their retreat, which took place in deep snow and with only small losses.

Bulgarians Keeping Away.

The efforts of the enemy to cut the Allies' lines of communication failed. Since Monday, when the Irish regiments played such havoc with the bayonet, the Bulgarians have shown no desire to come to close quarters.

Greeks Leaving Saloniki.

The Allied front extends for twenty-five miles north of Saloniki. Saloniki harbor is crowded with transports bringing in troops and supplies for the Allies. The Greek troops are now leaving the district.

Three Zeppelins Gone.

Copenhagen, Dec. 15.—Three Zeppelins have been destroyed by accidents in Germany during the month of November. The Z-18 was lost at Tondern, in Schleswig-Holstein; the Z-28 wrecked near Hamburg, and an unknown machine was destroyed at Bitterfeld.

PATRIOTIC FUND

In the discussion on the Patriotic Fund at the city council Monday night, Alderman Casey took the right line when he said that this fund was something with a degree of permanence which demanded more than voluntary contribution, which, at the best, is only an uncertain thing. He pointed out that the producers of copper, shells and munitions generally are making millions out of the war, and that those who are benefitting so tremendously from the misfortunes of the nation should be called upon to provide funds to take care of those who are suffering.

The people of Canada generally, and of Prince Rupert particularly, have done wonders in the way of subscribing to the various funds, without a murmur. No one grudges what they can spare to the dependents of those who are offering all they possess in the struggle, and doubtless the men who are making millions from the war are helping with the rest, but the fund should be relieved of any uncertainty and put upon a basis of permanency and certainty. It is only fair that those who are making millions in shell contracts, etc., should be called upon, by taxation of profits, to provide for those who are making the sacrifices. Such a tax should be retroactive or it would fail largely in its object. The millions which have been made, and not only the millions which will be made, should be taxed.

It is gratifying to find that there has been a most hearty response to the request for subscriptions in this city and, in the meantime, the Patriotic Fund will be comparatively healthy. However, Ald. Casey's idea included a most important

matter, which is not being taken care of as it should: Provision for returned wounded soldiers. A fund raised from the taxation of war profits could be utilized to help provide for the men who have been temporarily or permanently disabled as a result of the war.

It is not a question of charity. In presenting a sum of money to a man who has dived into the harbor and rescued a fellow being, there would be no such question, and the cases are very similar. The man who has offered his life for his country, and has been rendered unfit as a consequence, can never be looked upon as a fit object for charity, any more than the pension which goes with the Victoria Cross can be looked upon as a granting of charity. The whole question is one of the partial liquidation of a debt, and a debt which can never be paid in full.

GERMAN SOLDIERS COMMIT SUICIDE

Petrograd, Dec. 14.—Another epidemic of suicide is reported among the German forces in the vicinity of Dvinsk, by prisoners captured in that region, according to the Birzbeviya Vedomosty, an afternoon daily paper. Nine officers, including the commander of a battalion, are said to have ended their lives within a period of twelve days. Cold and hardships of the campaign are alleged to be the cause.

Vladimir and Volinsk are being hurriedly fortified with trenches for a radius of seven miles, apparently in anticipation of a Russian offensive.

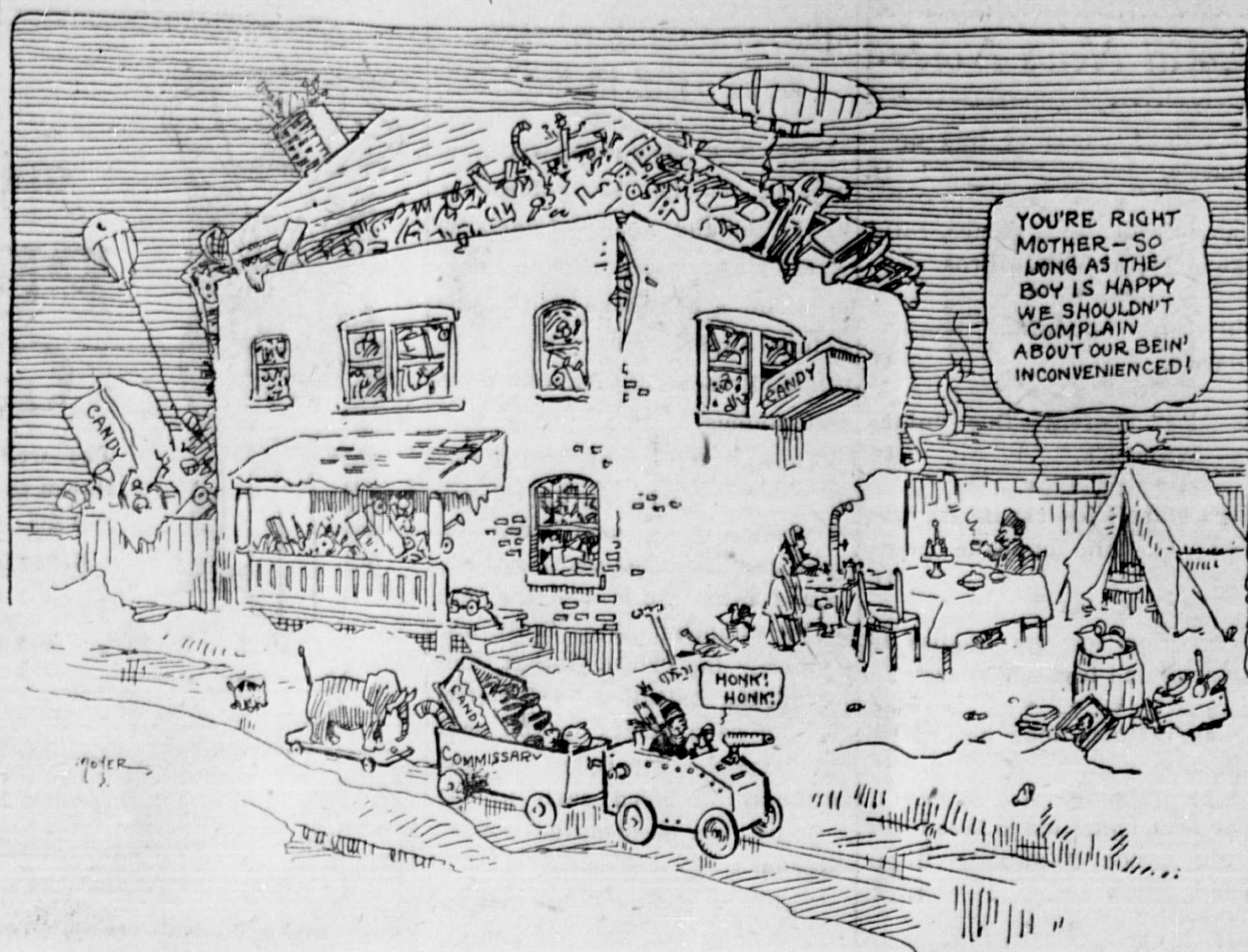

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for a term of more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
