TURNER GETS GOOD EXAMPLE OF BOWSERISM

J. H. TURNER SAYS HE HOLDS AGENT-GENERALSHIP FOR LIFE BY SPECIAL ACT

LONDON GETS GOOD SAMPLE OF BOWSERISM

Turner Says he Holds Agent-Generalship for Life by a Special Act of Parliament.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 17.—There was surprise here on the receipt of the news by cable that Sir Richard McBride had resigned and would take the Agent-Generalship of British Columbia.

J. H. Turner, who was interviewed shortly after the receipt of the cable, said that he had received a cablegram stating that Sir Richard would arrive in London at the end of January.

Job for Life.

The Agent-General said that they would likely be able to come to some arrangement concerning the Agent-Generalship. J. H. Turner claims that he was appointed to the post for life by special act of parliament.

LIBERALS WILL CONTEST ALL BY-ELECTIONS

Convention will be Called to Select Candidates—Bowser Plans to Subsidise Lumber Carrying Trade.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Dec. 17.—At a conference here last night, the Liberal leaders decided to call a convention to select candidates to contest all by-elections.

It is expected that the by-elections will be held during the last week of January. The house will probably meet on February 20th, when a six weeks' session will be held, after which a general election will be announced to take place in the first week of May.

Bowser's Program.

It is expected that Bowser will offer to shorten the hours during which liquor can be sold in the province; will propose to guarantee bonds to provide a fleet of lumber carriers, and will bring down a Workmen's Compensation Act.

"JAIL THE GRAFTERS" SAYS N. W. ROWELL, M. P.

"Jail the grafters, unseat the profiting parliamentarians, eliminate the profiteers, conserve our resources, create British credit in Canada, commandeer the best brains of both political parties and of all the business and commercial interests in Canada, give the British taxpayer a square deal, let each Canadian make his or her own sacrifice and show the rest of the Empire and the world that Canada is not in this war for material gain, but for the cause of freedom and democracy." That is how N. W. Rowell, leader of the Ontario opposition, denounced the Canadian war contractors "who have done so much to destroy Canada's reputation for honest and decent dealing with Britain and her sister Dominions," in a recent speech at Woodstock, Ont.

He said: "If there is one thing in Canada against which we must protest with all the emphasis possible, it is the graft in connection with the purchase and handling of war supplies. Is there anything more iniquitous and discreditable than men making ill-gotten gains out of the blood and sacrifice of our men? The attorney-general of this province should take notice that if any man places himself within the criminal law in this respect justice will not be done until that man is punished to the hilt of the criminal law. (Applause.) In France and Russia they put the grafters in jail. Such men in this country should be jailed when found guilty."

Remarkable operation on returned Soldier.—Picture shows an X-ray of Pte. Arthur Gibbon's leg and a photo of Col. Dr. Richardson, who is trying to mend it at the Toronto General Hospital. Pte. Gibbons was taken prisoner at St. Julien. A bullet smashed his right thigh bone and severed the nerve tissue. Pieces of metal are disclosed by the X-ray at various points. It is questioned whether German doctors made any effort to reset the bone, as one leg is shorter than the other. Dr. Richardson is operating and expects to give Gibbons a good leg again.

SYNTHETIC RUBBER IS INVENTED IN GERMANY

Berlin, Dec. 16.—Automobile tires of artificial rubber are now being made in Germany, the Overseas News Agency says. In his address to the reichstag last week, Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg said German inventors had discovered a method of producing synthetic rubber.

"The Frankfurter Zeitung now announces that at almost the same hour that the chancellor's statement was made," the news agency says, "a factory succeeded in working this rubber into tires which will wear for a year."

GREEK TROOPS ARE WITHDRAWN FROM SALONIKI

40,000 Bulgarian and German Prisoners have Arrived at Marseilles—Allies lose Guns and Men.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Dec. 17.—Following the withdrawal of the Greek troops from Saloniki to the Serbian border, the headquarters of the Greek army have been transferred to Kozhani, 55 miles southeast of Monastir.

Only a regiment of engineers and one of artillery remains at Saloniki.

Recent Losses.

During the Franco-British retirement from Gieveli, the Bulgarians captured two French guns two batteries of British artillery and two hundred British prisoners.

40,000 Prisoners.

Seven hundred and fifty German and Bulgarian officers and 40,000 soldiers, captured during the recent fighting in Serbia, have arrived at Marseilles on their way to a concentration camp.

GRUESOME MEMENTO OF TURKISH VICTORY

There have been many tragic episodes in the history of Nish, the capital of Serbia, which has been occupied by the Bulgarians. In the fifteenth century the Turks captured the city, and for 300 hundred years it remained in their possession, although there were brief periods when the Austrians held it. Then, in 1809, the Serbians, who had recovered most of their country from the Turks, besieged Nish, but were defeated with great loss. The Turks, to celebrate their victory, erected a rough tower, composed alternately of lumps of rock and skulls of Serbians cemented together.

It is related that there were originally 1,200 skulls in the Tower of Nish.

For a long period it was the habit of travellers to Nish to carry off a skull as a souvenir, and this reduced their numbers. But in the Russo-Turkish War the Serbian army under the command of King Milan besieged Nish, and the fortress fell on January 10th, 1878.

The remaining skulls were then reverently buried by the Serbian troops except one, which was too deeply embedded in the plaster to be extricated. The so-called "Tower of Skulls" is now only about four feet in height, and only one skull can be seen to remind the traveller of its gloomy history.

REPORT SAYS KITCHENER IS TO BE MARRIED

Engagement to Countess of Minto Reported—Great Italian Air Attack—Belgian Relief Ship Wrecked.

London, Dec. 17.—The engagement of Lord Kitchener to the Dowager Countess of Minto, widow of the former Governor-General of Canada, is reported. They met in India, while the Earl of Minto was Viceroy and Kitchener was Commander-in-Chief of the British forces there.

Italian Air Attack.

Rome, Dec. 17.—A hundred Austrian soldiers have been killed by bombs and aerial arrows on the Isonzo front in the greatest air attack on record, in which forty-eight Italian aeroplanes took part.

Relief Ship Beached.

London, Dec. 17.—The Belgian relief committee ship Liverpool, bound from New York to Rotterdam, has been beached on the east coast of England, as the result of striking a mine.

CABINET CHANGES

The long discussed, carefully planned cabinet shuffle has at last been made public, or, as it is officially put, it "crystallized today with dramatic suddenness." Evidently Sir Richard must have gasped when he realized that he was no longer premier. Sir Richard's new position will suit him, in that it means his residing in his beloved London, but it will be rather galling for an ex-premier to take instructions from a salaried penman at Victoria.

Dr. Young, who is the other scapegoat, has had to shoulder much more than his share of the blame for some things which have happened in this boss-ridden province. The late provincial secretary simply did his duty to his party to the best of his ability, and according to the rules of the game as recognized by that party.

The move is described by the local Tory organ as "the rehabilitating of the fortunes of the Conservative party." It is interesting to have the Journal admit that the fortunes of the party required fixing. In attributing the cause of the party's ill-health to the war, it may be assumed that the Tories figure that the war brought about the Dominion Trust scandal; the Songhees reserve deal; the coal deal; the Kitsilano deal, with its \$80,000 to Bowser's friend Read; the production of the public accounts in such shape as to defy analysis, and a hundred and one other instances of Bowserism, all of which took place long before the war was ever dreamed of. The greatest crime in connection with the Dominion Trust was that such a concern was ever allowed to accept deposits, contrary to the law of

the Dominion. The crime was at the beginning and not at the end. The collapse was only the result.

The appointment of A. C. Flumerfelt assures the Mackenzie-Mann forces proper representation in the cabinet, which is just as the Tories consider it should be, since Mackenzie and Mann are of much more importance than the mere people of British Columbia. Mr. Flumerfelt, if he is elected, will be a thoroughly capable corporation representative. The same applies to Lorne Campbell, who will also be able to look after the big companies' interests, if elected.

The chief kick coming from the north is the treatment meted out to William Manson. To consign our esteemed friend William to the presidency of the council is distinctly unkind. This is the kind of treatment which was handed Carter-Cotton when the Tories wanted rid of him, and the same dose was administered to A. E. McPhillips when he had made himself a nuisance. It is not to be inferred, however, that William has been raising any shindy around Victoria. Such a thing could never be done by Mr. Manson, but it seems that, since Dr. Young was no more in the cabinet, the north must have some kind of representation, and as William had always been a good boy, capable of saying his lessons, he would not raise a whimper if side-tracked into this job. Never mind, William, you will be relieved of it soon.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT TO "BLACKLIST" TRADERS

London, Dec. 16.—The government proposes to form a "black list" of enemy traders in neutral countries with whom British firms will be prohibited from trading, said Lord Robert Cecil, under secretary for foreign affairs in moving in the house of commons today the second reading of the bill which he presented in the house on December 8th, designed to restrict trading with possible hostile interests.

The list, he continued, would not necessarily be confined to persons of German nationality, but would include such as were by the nature of their business substantially enemy firms and could safely be cut off from British intercourse without serious injury to British trade.

The solicitor general explained that the purpose of the bill was to forge another weapon with which to cripple the enemy.

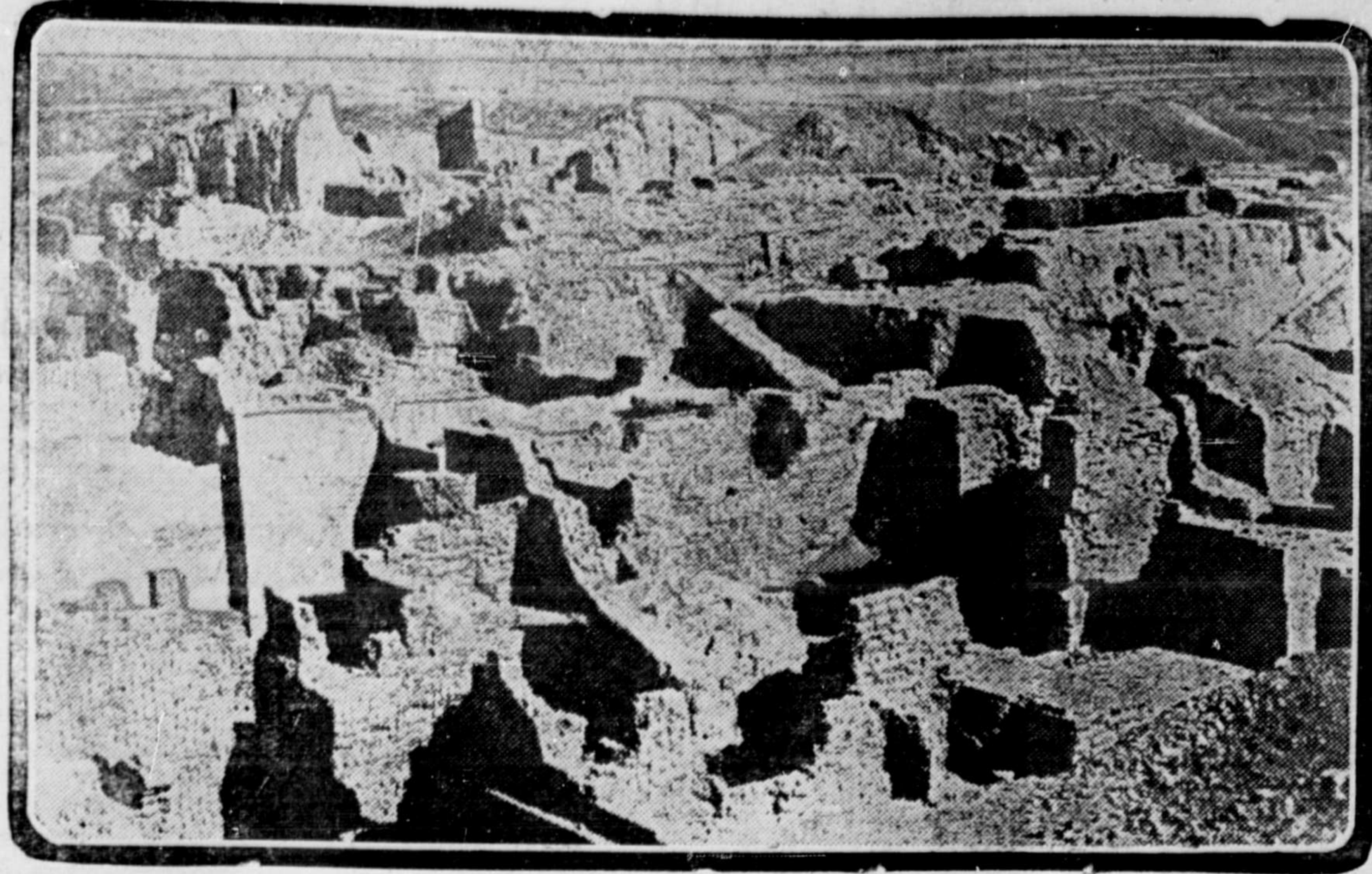

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund:

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

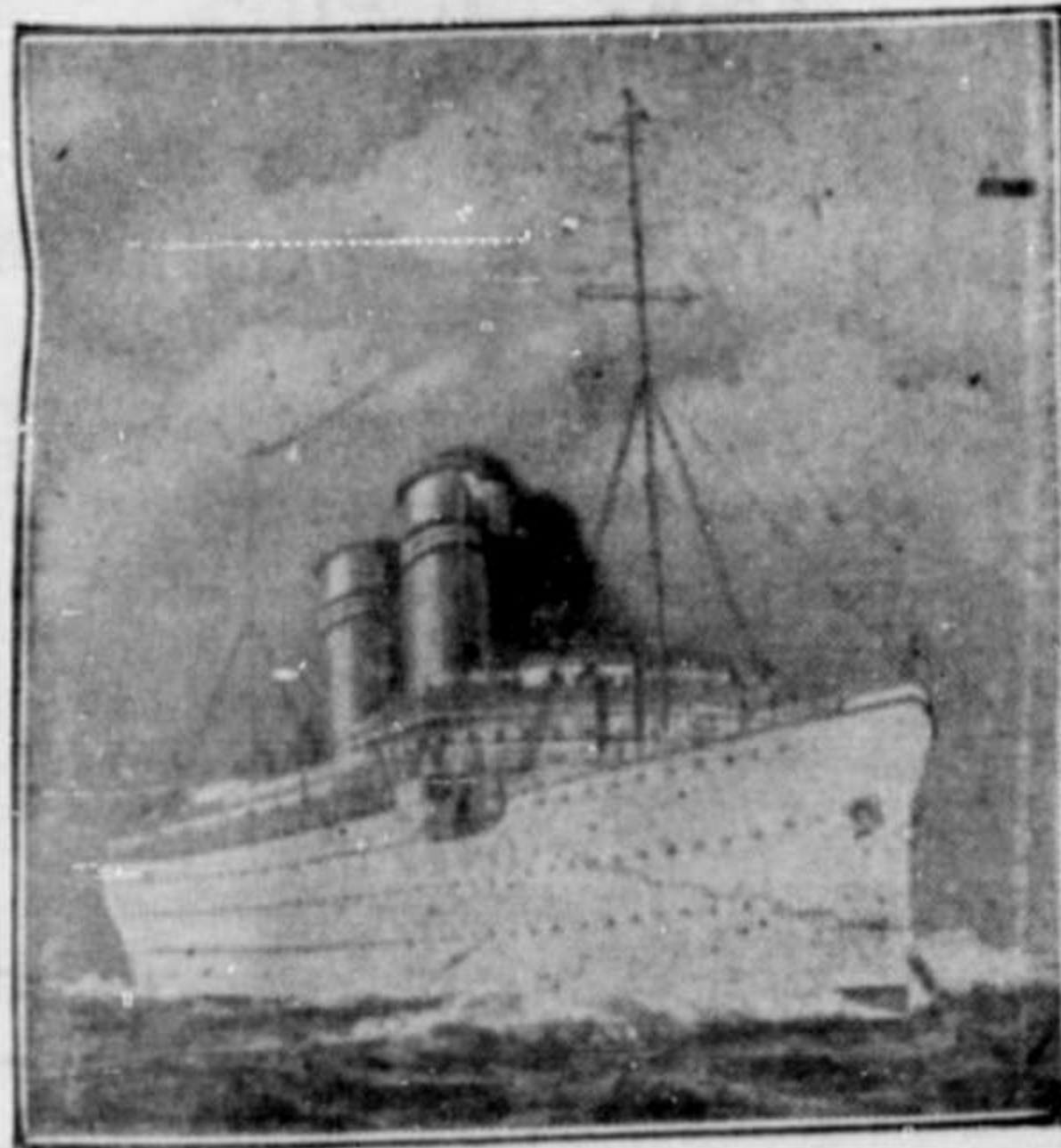

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.
QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

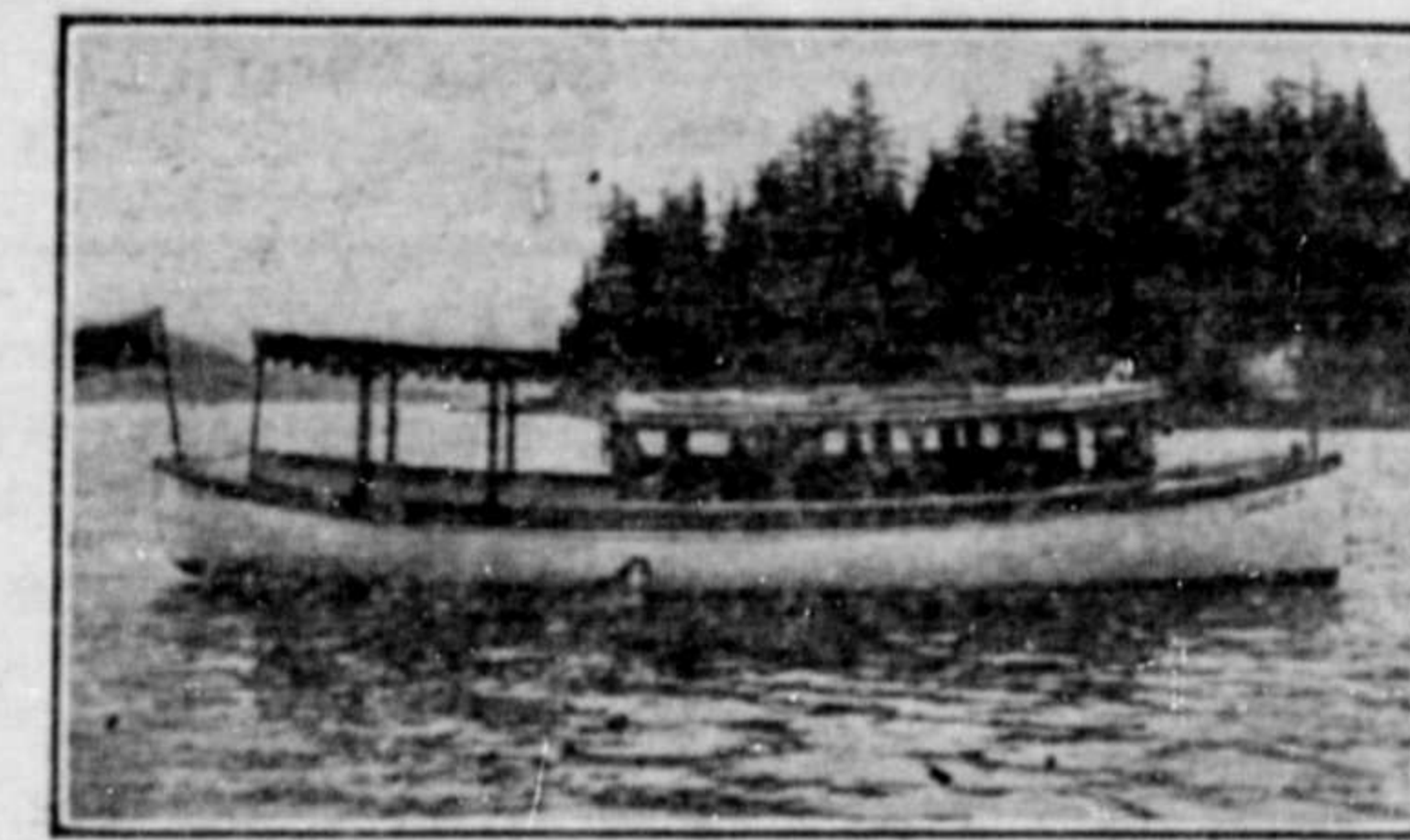
