ABYSSINIAN ARMY OFFERED TO THE ALLIES

DERBY RECRUITS CALLED UPON--PRESIDENT WILSON BUSY ON WEDDING DAY

200,000 MEN ARE OFFERED BY ABYSSINIA

Emperor Liddj Jeassu Offers a Fully-Equipped Army to the Allies—Ford Party For Norway.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 18.—Emperor Liddj Jeassu, of Abyssinia, has offered to provide the Allies with 200,000 Abyssinian troops equipped for the field.

This Abyssinian army could reach Suez in four days and could be in Mesopotamia in five days.

Ford Peace Ship.

The Ford peace ship, which had been detained at Kirkwall, in the Orkney Islands, for two days, has now been released and is under way for Christiania in Norway.

Ford has abandoned his plan to try to end the way by Christmas, and is trying to restore peace from aboard his ship.

RECRUITS ARE CALLED UNDER DERBY SCHEME

All Single Men over Nineteen are Called up—Married Men and Youths of Eighteen Are on Reserve.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 18.—Four classes of recruits under the Earl of Derby's scheme were called out today. All single men of nineteen years of age and upwards have been called upon for service, while the first-class, those of eighteen years of age, have been placed upon the reserve along with the eligible married men.

An Austrian submarine struck a mine off Cattaro yesterday and sank with all hands. Cattaro is an important Austrian base and fortress on the Adriatic.

HOT GERMAN RETORT FOR PRESIDENT WILSON

Berlin, Dec. 14, via London, Dec. 15.—The Local Anzeiger, discussing today a brief dispatch received here concerning President Wilson's recent speech at Columbus, Ohio, says Germany also is not desirous of a patched-up peace.

The newspaper also discusses the question of mediation, and expresses doubt whether there would be an opening for the United States as a mediator.

"If a mediator is wanted at all," says the Anzeiger, "only states could be considered which not only have shown true neutrality, but also such a measure of neutral calmness and dignity as might inspire some confidence in their unselfishness and freedom from prejudice."

"How matters stand in this respect with President Wilson and his country is adequately shown by the latest pronouncements—like the President's message and the Ancona note. President Wilson can be considered neither as an official nor a spiritual mediator by the Central Powers, and must content himself, so far as they are concerned, with hindering the conclusion of peace a while longer by the continued toleration of shipments of arms and ammunition by his countrymen."

"Perhaps this intention is the real motive for his whole attitude. In that case we must beg all the more urgently that he give himself no anxiety about patching up peace, but to leave this business to our armies."

TORONTO WILL TAKE CENSUS OF YOUNG MEN

Toronto, Dec. 17.—The police commissioners yesterday endorsed the plan proposed by Major Leroid, of the recruiting depot, to have a census taken in Toronto of all men of military age. The major will confer with the chief of police as to the procedure.

GERMANS HAD ARRANGED TO BLOW UP CANAL

More German Secret Service Men Arrested in New York—Had Planned to Destroy Welland Canal.

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Dec. 18.—Paul Koenig, head of the secret service of the Hamburg-American Line, and Richard Emil Lyendecker, have been arrested by the department of justice on a charge of conspiracy to blow up the Welland Canal.

The conspiracy was arranged at Buffalo. Accused engaged agents at Niagara Falls to blow up the waterway with nitro-glycerine.

Bank Clerk Arrested.

Frederick Schleindi, a clerk in the National City Bank, has been arrested. The police found cablegrams stolen from the bank in his possession. The bank is one of the financial agents for the Allies.

Busy Wedding Day.

Washington, Dec. 18.—President Wilson, on his wedding day, is working upon a second note to Austria in reply to Austria's refusal to disavow the sinking of the Ancona.

Diplomatic relations are described as being very grave and near to breaking point.

It is reported that two American bankers at Gorizia have been shot by the Austrians and their wealth confiscated, owing to the stoppage of the paying of bills.

MANY KILLED WHEN SPOKANE BRIDGE DROPS

Street-car Pinned Under Water by Steel Beam—Water and Gas Supply Cut off—Rescue Work Difficult.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Spokane, Wn., Dec. 18.—When the Astor Street bridge across the Spokane river collapsed this morning, a street-car fell into the river. A steel beam from the bridge pinned the car beneath the water, making rescue work almost impossible. In the car seven were killed and ten injured.

The entire bridge went down, taking with it the pipes which supply water and gas to the northeast section of the city. The police and firemen are working hard to rescue bodies which are visible under the water. Many have been killed, but the exact number is unknown.

PLAYING POLITICS

Judging by the articles which are appearing regularly in the Tory press, the Conservatives are much more concerned about staying in power than they are about conducting the business of the country. Not many weeks ago, the Rogers press in the east was clamoring for an election; today the Tories think that an election would be detrimental to the best interests of the Dominion. It appears to be very clear that, as usual, the Tories are getting the welfare of the country mixed up with the welfare of the Tory party. The two are not synonymous.

The Tories would avoid an election at the present time; in that desire they are met by the Liberals. The Tories want only to consider war measures; so do the Liberals. The Liberals are determined to do nothing to embarrass the government so long as it attends strictly to business, that business being the carrying on of the war. The present government has still ten months of life, during which time it is very probable that the actual fighting will be over. Let the Borden administration go ahead with its business, and try for a time to forget politics and political advantages to be gained because of the war.

If the Tories try to use the war as an excuse to foist themselves upon the country for an extended period, it is only reasonable that the Liberals must consider the advisability of allowing them to do such a thing. The interests of the country are much more important to the Liberals than merely party interests, as Sir Wilfrid Laurier has nobly shown since the outbreak of the war. If a gang of political opportunists, headed by Bob Rogers, tries to

play politics with the same callousness with which the war contractors have played grab, it is the duty of a loyal opposition to protest. Let the government attend strictly to war business, and there will be no need to appeal to the country.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Now that there is so much doubt about Sir Dick having that job in London, he had better withdraw his resignation, pending developments. After withdrawing a dissolution notice, such a trifle should not cause him any trouble.

Sir Richard McBride is beginning to think that "it is better to be sure than sorry."

Even if there is a special act of parliament giving J. H. Turner the Agent-Generalship for life, that fact will not worry Bowser Bill very much. He has a delightful disregard for any acts except his own.

The new Bowser cabinet will not worry the Mackenzie-Mann outfit. Flumerfelt will see to that part of the business.

The Tories do not want a Federal election. They think it would be much nicer, and decidedly more comfortable, to re-elect themselves, as it were, without consulting the people. What have the people got to do with it anyhow?

If Sir Richard can't land that job in London, they had better make him Commander-in-Chief of the 102nd Battalion.

After refusing to countenance a Workmen's Compensation Act for years, Bowser is going to bring one down. Why all the hurry, Bill?

there is much that I would like to write, but here one is circumscribed. To know all that the British navy is doing against the Germans is one thing; to put it into cold print, another. There are many things to know which would inspire the nation, but also it might warn the Germans.

We have resurrected the "monitor"—a light draught craft of the old days, drawing so little water that she is capable of going pretty well anywhere and hitting hard when she gets there.

A Visible Invasion.

How many monitors we have built is an official secret, and their armament (despite surmise) is likewise. It is enough to say that sooner or later they will be the doom of Germany, once we have soldiers enough to follow along any road that they may make.

The road will be a sea road, and it will have been made by the British navy. Once made, the invasion of Germany will no longer be an invisible one.

There are other things, too, of which I dare not speak. We are all of us out to kill the enemy—it is not wise to say how. There is yet another "how."

For 1,000 years the British navy has kept our shores inviolate.

It is not going to fail us now. In saying that I betray no secrets. Would I could say more as to how we have subjected Germany to an invisible invasion. But my pen is tied. I can only say that, in the midst of all the muddle and disaster there have been on land, the British navy has been the British navy. And that expresses all.—Sunday Dispatch.

A STRIKING PARALLEL

The condition of England was so far peculiar that by means of her insular situation, she enjoyed a happy exemption from war upon her own territories: whilst by her triumphant fleets she was enabled to carry on an intercourse with every part of the world whence she was not excluded by force of arms. By means of this commercial monopoly, and a much increased demand for many articles required by the wants of the war itself, she long felt little other pressure than that of augmented taxation, which seemed counterbalanced by the increase of the public revenues.—Annual Register, 1816.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia at its next session on behalf of the City of Prince Rupert for an Act containing provisions which are shortly stated as follows:—

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for a term of more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. 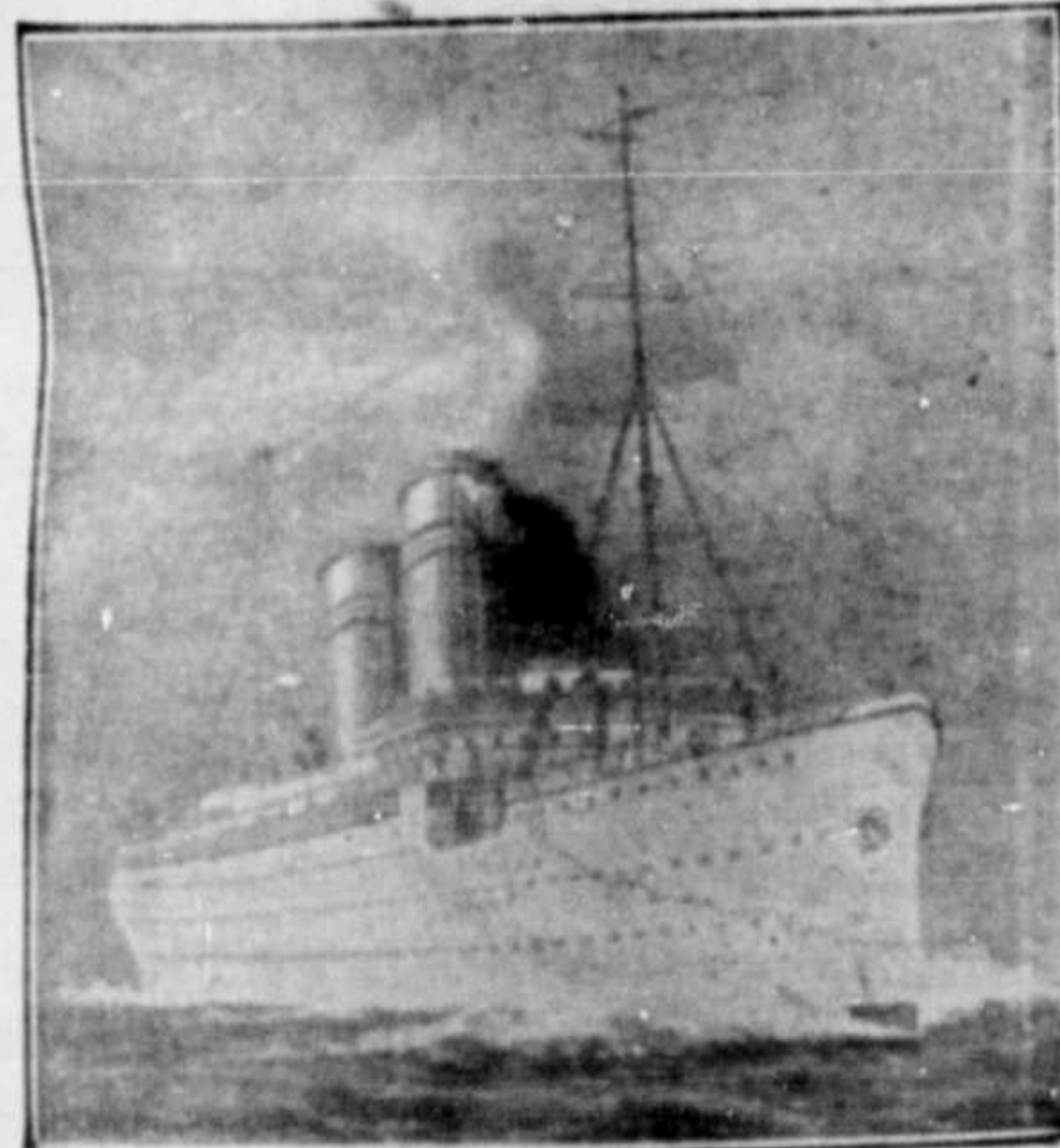

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
