## PRINCE RUPERT MAY HAVE SHIPBUILDING

### REPORT THAT VARNA HAS FALLEN TO RUSSIANS—MILLION MORE MEN WANTED

#### LUMBER SHIPS MAY BE BUILT AT PR. RUPERT

**B. C. Manufacturers Forming a Stock Company to Build 20 Lumber Carriers on This Coast.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Dec. 22.—The B. C. Manufacturers' Association is calling a meeting to devise plans for the building of twenty ships for the carrying of British Columbia lumber.

It is proposed that the ships be built at Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert.

A joint stock company is forming to carry out the project and \$1,000 was subscribed last night.

Some time ago a committee of the B. C. Manufacturers' Association was appointed to make arrangements for some definite plan along this line. The idea of the committee is to build wooden ships and that a steel and iron industry will ultimately develop.

The lumbermen are loaded up with orders, but, as in all parts of the world, bottoms are not to be had, and ship-owners are making unheard of profits.

#### BRITAIN CALLS FOR A MILLION MORE SOLDIERS

**House of Commons Votes that the Army be Increased to Four Million Men—Germans Lose Heavily.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 22.—In the House of Commons last night a vote to increase the British army by another million men, making its strength four millions, was passed.

Staff changes which have been made indicate that there will be closer co-operation between the Allies on the western front.

**Germans Lose Heavily.**

On the western front, the Germans lost heavily in an attempt to occupy the craters caused by mines near Armentieres.

The French carried the German defence works near Hartmans-Weilerkopf, taking 1,200 prisoners.

**Artillery Actions.**

There have been violent artillery actions along the Yser front, our guns completely destroying the German defences along the Yser canal near Dixmude. The enemy's cantonments at Essen were destroyed by our shells.

#### PARKER WILLIAMS SCORES GOVERNMENT

Mr. Parker Williams, M. L. A., spoke last Sunday night in Vancouver Labor Temple under the auspices of the People's Forum. His address was a slashing attack on the methods of the government during the past few years, and was closely followed by a good-sized audience.

**B. C. Worst in Dominion.**

Mr. Williams, during the course of a lengthy speech, said working class conditions are worse in British Columbia than in any other part of the Dominion. White miners have been forced to leave the province and they were crowded out of their positions by Chinamen. British Columbia is the only part of the British Empire where Chinese are permitted to work underground. So negligent has been the government, the speaker said, that thousands have gone from the province, and this province suffers as does no other province or part of the continent. Not to the war nor to anything but maladministration of the government can present conditions be charged. The boundary country through the influence of A. C. Flumerfelt, a man who is slated for a cabinet position, has been made a miniature Balkan States, Mr. Williams asserted, and a man with a good Anglo-Saxon name cannot get a situation.

**Men Workless Everywhere.**

In every corner of the province there are men absolutely dependent on the two months or so of work the government gives. The government is the largest single employer of labor, and the largest purchaser, and with the lowest type of patronage ever designated. All legislation has been remodelled to rob the individual and place all power and right in the hands of the government.

**Labor Legislation Obsolete.**

During the past ten or twelve years there has been progress on all parts of the continent on labor lines except in B. C. Protective legislation to make life easier from day to day, there has been none. Ten years ago B. C. stood foremost in this respect, but the last ten years has added nothing

#### SERB STABBED BY AUSTRIAN IN VANCOUVER

**Toast to the Allies leads to Stab in the Back—Police Hope to Make Arrest—Wound May be Fatal.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Dec. 22.—Mike Lavenich, a Serbian aged 35, has been stabbed in the back by an Austrian on Hastings Street. The wound, which is a foot long, may prove to be fatal.

The police are searching for his assailant and confident that they will be able to effect his arrest. Lavenich and some friends, while in the Bodega Hotel, drank a toast to the Allies. An Austrian who was present threw down his glass, left the bar, and hid in a doorway. When Lavenich passed the Austrian rushed at him with a knife, inflicting a wound in the back and disappeared in the crowd.

#### CALLOUSNESS OF THE GERMAN CROWN PRINCE

On several occasions while in India the Crown Prince of Germany's hand had to be stayed to save a beater who was in dangerous proximity to the quarry, and in one of these instances it is recorded (says a writer in the London Magazine) that he shrugged and asked impatiently why a "damned coolie" should be allowed to spoil the sport of the person for whom the hunt was held.

More cruelly callous still was the remark he made to a Maharajah whose guest he was, and who was with him in the howdah when a beater started to enter a dense clump of jungle grass in which a wounded panther had taken refuge. A native officer shouted a warning to the man from the howdah of the next elephant, whereupon the prince turned to the Maharajah in impatient protest.

"Tell him to let the chap go on, your Highness," he said. "It is not every day that one can see a man mauled by a leopard!"—Ex.

#### KRUPP'S WORKS DESTROYED BY BRITISH AIRMEN

**Krupp Works near Constantinople Wrecked—German Ships Sunk by Submarines—Russians Advance.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, Dec. 22.—A Danish correspondent at Constantinople reports that Krupp's gun and munition works outside of Constantinople have been destroyed by British airmen.

**Submarine Success.**

London, Dec. 22.—British submarines in the Sea of Marmora have sunk the German steamer Leres and other smaller craft carrying war supplies.

**Unofficial Report.**

Unofficial reports from the eastern theatre of war state that Varna has fallen to the Russians and that the Russian army has now landed on Bulgarian territory.

**Advance in Persia.**

The Russian army of the Caucasus has advanced into the interior of Persia, occupying the town of Kum.

**Reserves for Saloniki.**

Berlin, Dec. 22.—The British reserve troops have been withdrawn from Lemnos and other islands in the eastern Mediterranean to the Allies' headquarters at Saloniki.

**Serbian Treasure Moved.**

Marseilles, Dec. 22.—Eighteen million francs, constituting the Serbian treasury, has arrived here for deposit in the Franco-Serbian Bank.

**GERMANY'S OUTLOOK**

Several comparisons of the financial policies of Germany and Great Britain have been made in these columns. That of Germany bears the marks of recklessness and improvidence. None of the money required for the war has been raised by increased taxation, and each successive loan means fresh inflation of the currency which shows itself in a steady rise in prices. The more this procedure is persisted in the more will prices rise, and as Lord Incheape pointed out in London last week in his inaugural address as president of the Institute of Bankers, all official attempts to fix maximum prices, though they may be successful for a time in regard to individual commodities, will be powerless to meet the situation. The task of redeeming the securities and retiring the notes will be left for an exhausted and defeated nation to face after the conclusion of peace. The British government has resisted all attempts to unsound methods.

Finance and economics are playing a very important part in this war, and in favor of the Allies. Every week Germany's position becomes worse. Now and again, despite the rigid censorship existing around the German empire like a steel wall, we hear echoes of the complaints which must be becoming numerous in the Fatherland. Maximilian Harden, editor of Die Zukunft, of Berlin, in the latest issue of his newspaper, received in London, for instance, tells his countrymen that they must expect a war of exhaustion. He ridicules the German talk about Swedish intervention and the idea that Russia will conclude a separate peace. He says he considers it no sign of strength

that the German government steadily refuses to disclose "its war aims," and blames the government for making "too much noise" about food regulations.—Monetary Times.

**OUR FISH TRADE**

The following is an extract from an article in the Monetary Times on the Pacific coast fishing industry:

"The latest fishery statistics are contained in the provincial report for the year ending March 31st, 1915. It shows that British Columbia during the twelve months preceding leads all provinces, and her production of fish forms nearly half the total for all Canada. A feature of development is the growing importance of Prince Rupert as a fishery centre. With the opening of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, shipments may be made direct, and as a result nearly all the companies operating out of Seattle have established themselves in the northern city. Fish shipments out of Prince Rupert are large and steadily increasing."

**SOLDIERS' STERILIZERS**

Our soldiers at the front are provided with a powder which, when thrown into water, instantly sterilizes the microbes in it, and also gives it a pleasant flavor. The men carry this powder in a pocket medicine case, which contains, as well cubes for turtle cup, remedies in the form of gelatine squares, and other necessities for those who have to "fend" for themselves for days together.—Tit Bits.

**ALLIES' PLANS FOR THE FUTURE OF EUROPE**

A correspondent to the Chicago Herald, who has been in close touch with the leading European diplomats, gives the following as the Allies' plans for the future arrangement of Europe.

(1) The war shall be continued until Germany and Austria are forced to accept whatever terms are given them, and each of the four great powers is pledged to continue the war until it is abandoned by the unanimous consent of the four.

**Allies to Dictate Terms.**

(2) There shall be no arbitration by Holland, America or other neutral powers, but the four Allies shall dictate the terms of peace.

(3) There shall be three classes of nations established in Europe. Class "A" shall consist of Great Britain, Russia, France and Italy. Class "B" shall consist of Belgium, Holland, Serbia, Spain, Portugal, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Switzerland, Roumania, Greece and Bulgaria. Class "C" shall consist of Bohemia, Poland, Bavaria, Croatia, Hungary, and the other minor states into which, by racial affinities, the German and Austrian empires shall be split.

**To Guarantee Peace.**

Class "A" states shall guarantee the peace of Europe. Class "B" states shall be entirely independent, but disputes between them must be arbitrated by the Class "A" states.

Class "C" states shall be independent, but have no soldiers of their own, except for police duties and shall make no international treaties, either commercial or postal.

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof;

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund;

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

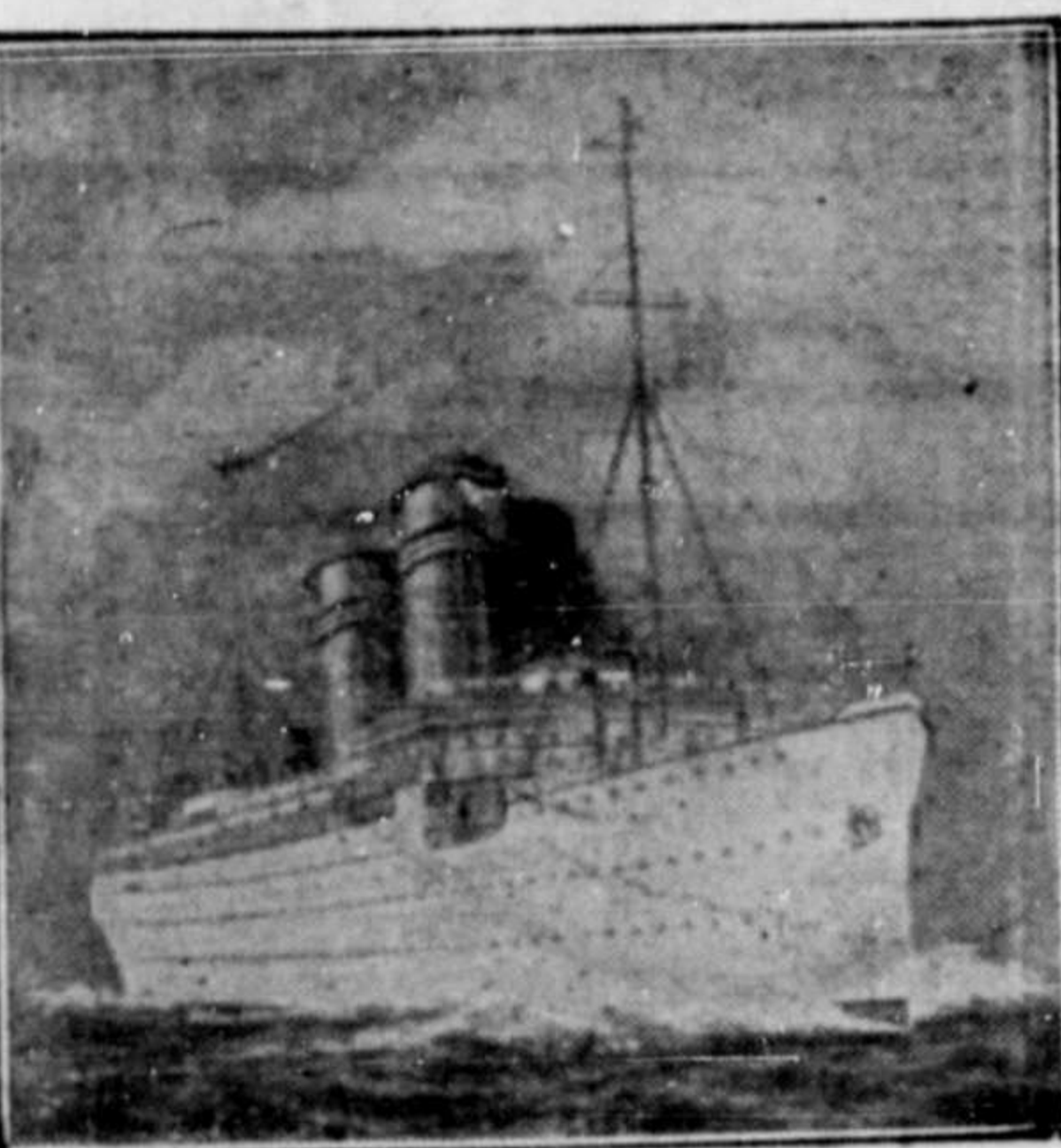

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

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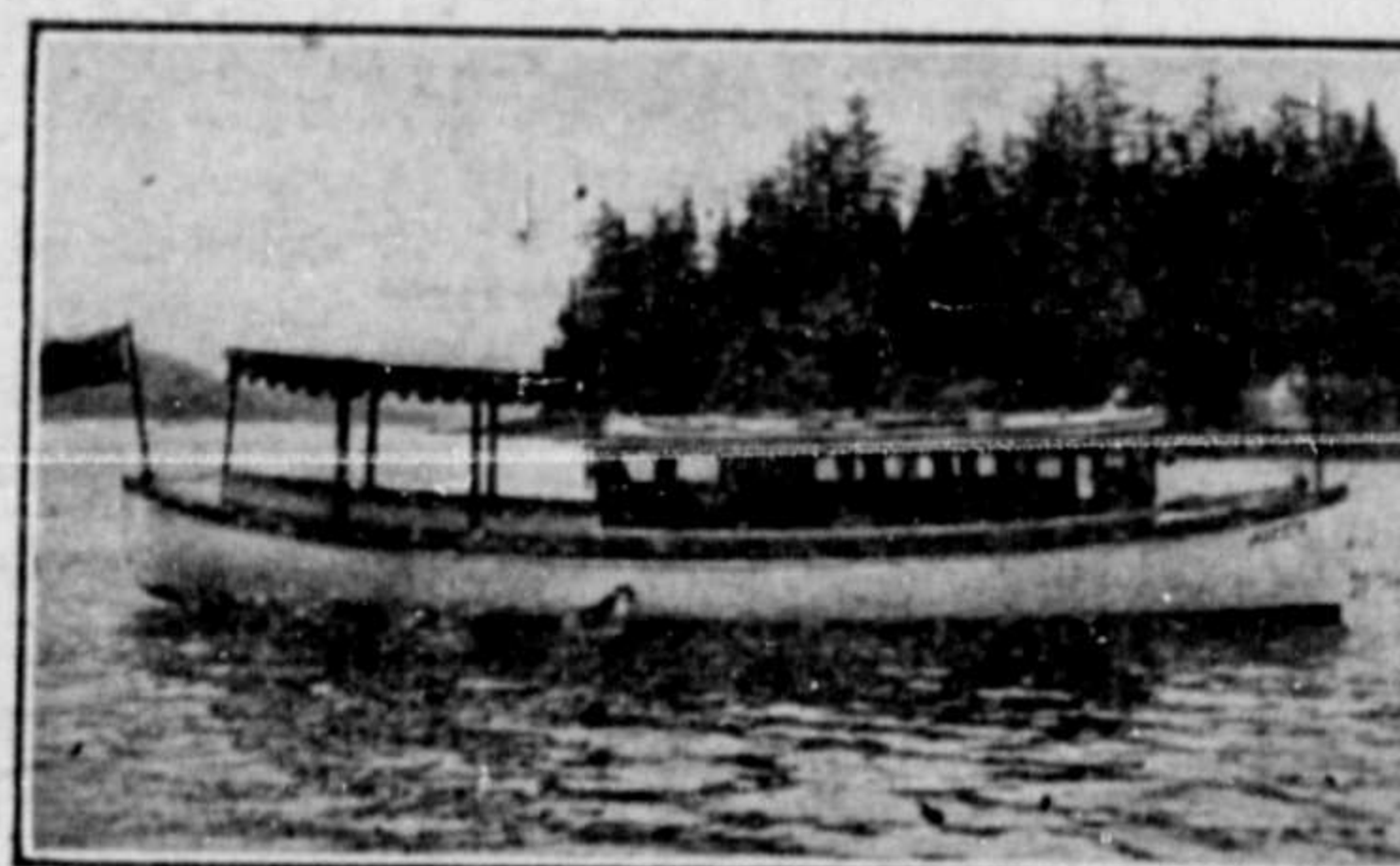
