GERMANS HAVE EVACUATED CZERNOWITZ

VON MACKENZEN WITHDRAWN FROM SERBIA--HUGHES WANTS 21 NEW DIVISIONS

CZERNOWITZ IS EVACUATED BY GERMAN FORCE

Russians Capture Many Prisoners in Bukowina—Mackenzen Called from Serbia to Stop Russians.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 5.—The Teutonic forces have evacuated Czernowitz, in Bukowina, following the occupation of the heights by the Russians. The Russians have taken a large number of German prisoners.

Von Mackenzen to Command.

General Von Mackenzen has been withdrawn from Serbia to take command of the Teutonic forces on the Bessarabian frontier.

10,000 Prisoners.

Rome, Jan. 5.—Ten thousand Bulgarian prisoners, who have been turned over to Italy by Serbia, will be concentrated in Avezzano, the zone which was devastated by the terrible earthquake last spring. They will be employed by the Italian government in rebuilding the wrecked cities.

Kaiser Speechless.

Paris, Jan. 5.—The Matin affirms that the German emperor is suffering from cancer of the throat and that he is no longer able to speak.

SIR SAM WANTS TWENTY-ONE NEW DIVISIONS

Canada will Furnish an Army of 500,000 Men—British Columbia to provide 36,000.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Toronto, Jan. 5.—Major-Gen. Sir Sam Hughes, at a banquet here last night, announced that 21 new divisions will be raised in Canada.

British Columbia will furnish 2, Alberta 2, Manitoba and Saskatchewan 3, Toronto 5, Eastern Ontario 2, Western Ontario 2, Quebec 3, and the eastern provinces 2. Each division will consist of 18,000 men.

At present, Canada has two divisions at the front; four in Great Britain awaiting the call to the trenches, and two in Canada completely trained and ready to sail. By the end of this month Canada will have 250,000 men in uniform and will, in addition, have 100,000 men manufacturing munitions.

DISASTROUS FIRE IN PRINCE GEORGE

A disastrous fire wiped out several buildings in the east end of Prince George last night. It is believed that three lives were lost, but full details are not yet to hand.

BATTALION OF JAPS FORMING IN VANCOUVER

Fifty-five Little Brown Men Joined Yesterday—Big Patriotic Effort—Head-on Collision.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Jan. 5.—A start has been made here in recruiting a Japanese battalion. Fifty-five men passed the doctor yesterday afternoon, all of whom were trained soldiers and naturalized Canadian citizens.

Patriotic Fund.

The Vancouver committee of the Patriotic fund will start a campaign on January 16th, which will continue until the 29th, to raise the sum of \$400,000.

Head-on Collision.

Moose Jaw, Jan. 5.—A head-on collision took place last night at ten o'clock, in a blizzard, between C. P. R. No. 53, the Regina-Moose Jaw local, and the tri-city express.

The fireman of the tri-city express is missing and it is feared that he is under the wreck. The mail car was smashed to match-wood. Several of the passengers are being treated at the hospital here.

B. C. TELEPHONE CO. WANT DOMINION CHARTER

A letter from the solicitors of the B. C. Telephone Co. was read at the council Monday night notifying the city that this company intends to apply for a Dominion charter in the name of the Western Canada Telephone Company. The letter pointed out that, as it is now possible to communicate by phone with the Atlantic coast, a provincial charter does not cover the company's field of operations.

The city solicitor advised that the city clerk be instructed to reply that Prince Rupert strongly objected to a private bill being passed granting such a charter unless it contained a clause safeguarding the rights of Prince Rupert. He also advised that notice be sent to Mr. Clements that he should see that such a saving clause be inserted in the bill.

Mr. Peters pointed out that under such a charter the company might get power to introduce its system into this city, and the fact that they had found it necessary to notify the city implied something of the sort. He pointed out that Prince Rupert was the first city in B. C. to have the power to put in its own telephone system and the right must be jealously guarded.

Ald. Kerr, seconded by Ald. Dybhavn, moved that action be taken along the line suggested by the city solicitor.

Ald. Casey agreed with this so far as it went, but thought they should go further. He felt that the government should not grant such a charter to any corporation.

ULSTER WANTS COMPULSION IN IRELAND ALSO

Unionists Declare that Exclusion of Ireland is an Insult and a Humiliation—Grey Answers Germany.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 5.—Ulster Unionists, at a meeting last night, presided over by Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster Unionist leader, declared that the exclusion of Ireland from compulsory service is an insult and humiliation to a patriotic population.

Premier Asquith will introduce a modified measure of conscription in the House of Commons today.

Grey Replies to Germany.

Sir Edward Grey has answered the complaint of Germany, made through the American Embassy, regarding the destruction off the coast of Ireland of a German submarine crew by the British auxiliary steamer Baralong. Sir Edward refers to the various German outrages and offers to submit such incidents, including the Baralong case, to an impartial tribunal composed of, say, officers of the United States navy.

THE MAYORALTY

Since S. M. Newton has announced himself as a candidate for the mayoralty for 1916, there seems to be every prospect of a contest, M. P. McCaffery having announced himself as a candidate some time ago. The election of a mayor is one of the most important duties of any community, and, on this occasion, the citizens of Prince Rupert are called upon to say who is to lead the city's legislation in one of the most momentous years of its history.

Prince Rupert, like every other city in the Dominion, is suffering from the blight of war, and the financial roadway ahead is admittedly rough and thorny. New work, other than what is absolutely necessary, is out of the question, and the chief troubles of the mayor and aldermen will consist of the handling of existing indebtedness. The London financial market is practically closed to the world, and Prince Rupert must look to Canada and the United States for financial accommodation.

With commendable zeal, the city treasurer and the city solicitor have paved the way for the transformation of the basis of the city's indebtedness into serial or annuity bonds, which are much more acceptable on this continent than the old sinking fund bonds. Once the citizens have passed an opinion on this measure, the real work of the mayor and aldermen will begin, in the placing of the new bonds advantageously. The situation calls for a leader of sound financial knowledge to co-operate with the city officials, and it is the duty of the citizens to themselves to select that leader. A city, like a province, or a Dominion, gets exactly the kind of government it deserves and asks for, and the

citizens of Prince Rupert must accept full responsibility for the men they place in power. No question of political affiliation is of the slightest importance in this connection, compared with the selection of the proper leader.

To citizens of Prince Rupert, the welfare of the city must come first and stay first. The first duty of all citizens is to the city. This may appear to be rather a selfish doctrine, but, in municipal matters, it is pre-eminently sound. Forget entirely party politics, with its petty bickerings and miserable little triumphs, and select the man who is thought to be best to hold the reins over the rough road ahead.

KITCHENER

The British race sees in Kitchener an epitome of their own blood and breed. The British character is built of the hard stuff that stands the blows of adversity and misfortune. It sticks and sticks and sticks until it comes out on top. This is Kitchener. He may lack imagination. He may be unable to deliver glowing speeches. He may be quite incapable of explaining himself or defending himself. He may make mistakes but the British race trusts him because his character is British through and through.

He has never flattered. He has never blithered about a short war or an early victory. Instead of talking he has toiled. Whatever he has set his hand to he has done. Other men vacillate between optimism and pessimism. Kitchener marches grimly forward, with no bugles, no drums, no flowers. And the people watch the squabbles of lesser men with their eyes fixed on the big man in the background with his fearless glance and his terrible silence.—Ex.

CLAIM FOR REDUCTION OF SEWER ASSESSMENT

A letter protesting against an unjust sewer tax on lots 42 and 43, Taylor and Borden Streets, by Thomas Trotire, was read at the council Monday night. Mr. Trotier pointed out that he was assessed on an 80-foot frontage, while Mr. Patmore and Mr. Woods, owning similar lots were assessed on 50 feet, while his property was actually covered by a smaller proportion of the pipe.

Mr. Peters stated that it was too late now to open up the matter as the court of revision, held in 1914, had received no complaint from Mr. Trotier. He held that to open up such a matter now would lead to chaos.

Ald. Montgomery said he was surprised at the statement of the solicitor. He held that, if an injustice had been done and the facts as stated by Mr. Trotier seemed to point that way, the matter should be gone into and set right.

The mayor said that the assessment was made according to the city engineer's figures and no complaint being made, they were accepted as correct.

Ald. Kerr said he felt that something should be done.

Ald. Montgomery, seconded by Ald. Beveridge, moved that the matter be referred to the assessor for adjustment.

Ald. Dybhavn said the whole discussion was out of order as they were dealing with something on which they had no data from the officials, concerned.

Ald. Maitland said it did not require a lawyer to see that there was something wrong. The city engineer was paid \$300 per month to conduct the business and if he made a mistake, the fault was not M. Trotier's.

Ald. Dybhavn moved an amendment that the matter be referred to the city engineer, the city solicitor and treasurer for a report. The motion to refer it to the assessor carried.

The candidates shall be nominated in writing; the writing shall be subscribed by two voters of the Municipality as proposer and seconder, and shall be delivered to the Returning Officer at any time between the date of this notice and 2 p.m. of the day of the nomination; the said writing may be in the form numbered five in the schedule of the Municipal Elections Act, and shall state the names, residence, and occupation or description of each person proposed in such manner as sufficiently to identify such candidate; and in the event of a poll being necessary, such poll will be opened on the 13th day of January, 1916, in the Council Chamber at the City Hall, Fulton Street, from the hour of 9 a.m. to the hour of 7 p.m., of which every person is hereby requested to take notice and govern himself accordingly.

Qualification for Mayor.
 The persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as the Mayor of any city shall be any person who is a male British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, not disqualified under any law, and has for the six months next preceding the day of nomination been the registered owner in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the city of assessed value, on the last municipal assessment roll of One Thousand Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who is otherwise duly qualified as a Municipal Voter.

Qualification for Alderman.
 Persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as Aldermen of a City shall be such persons as are male British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years, and who are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination the registered owners, in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the City of the assessed value on the last Municipal Assessment Roll of Five Hundred Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who are otherwise duly qualified as Municipal Voters.

School Trustees.
 I am notified by the Secretary of the School Board that it will be necessary to hold an election for two trustees to serve for a term of two years, to take the place of Messrs. P. W. Anderson and Dr. W. T. Kergin, whose terms have expired, also for a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. A. Kirkpatrick, to serve for a term of one year. 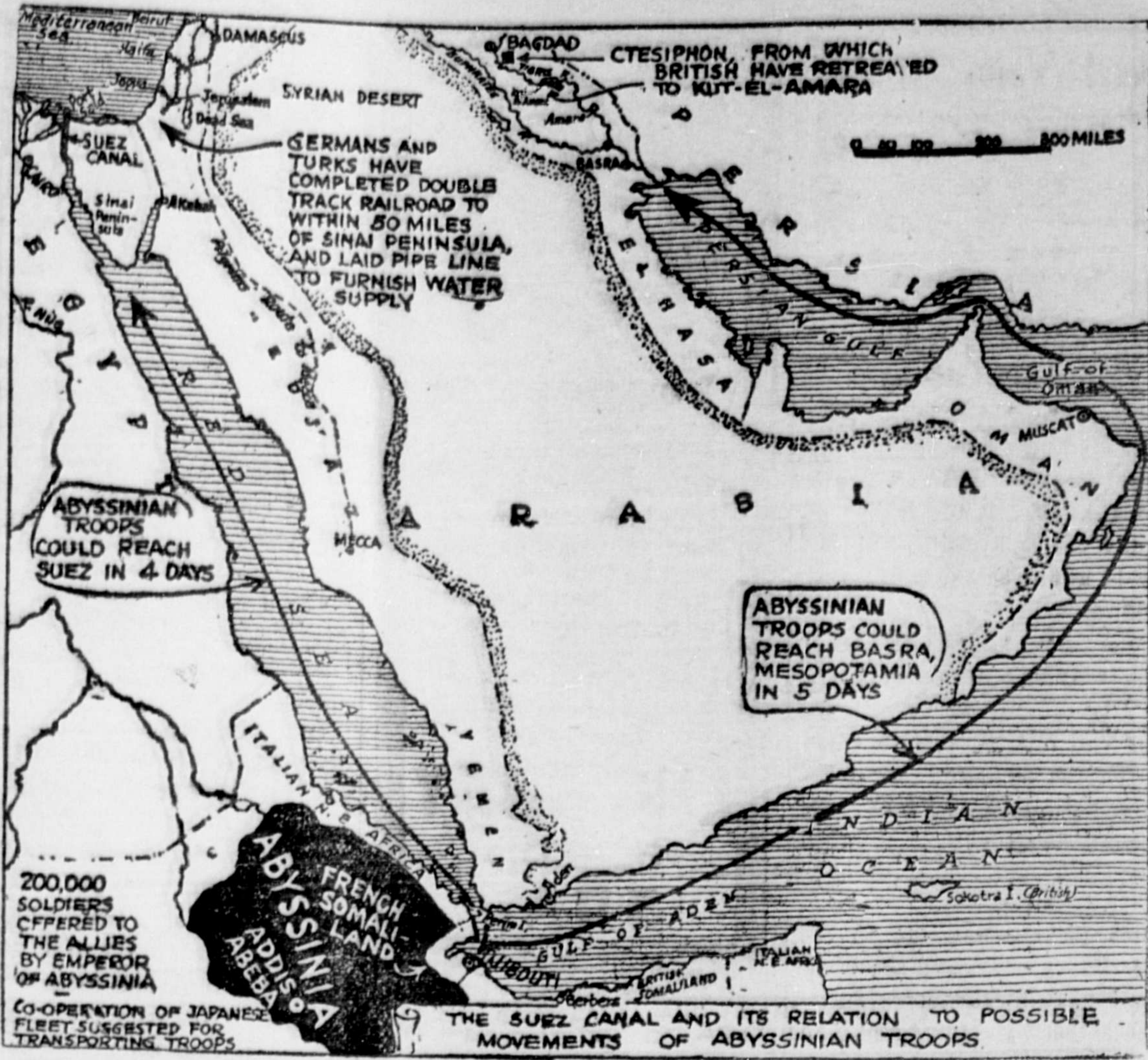

WAR TAX RESOLUTION

The resolution of Ald. Gasey and Montgomery along the line of taxing war profits and minerals used in the manufacture of munitions was placed before the council Monday night. It calls for a tax of 50 per cent. on all munitions profits exceeding 5 per cent. and an additional royalty of 1 per cent. on copper, gold and silver. Copies of the resolution will be sent to the Dominion and British Columbia premiers and to the various municipalities in the province. The resolution was adopted unanimously.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof:
(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

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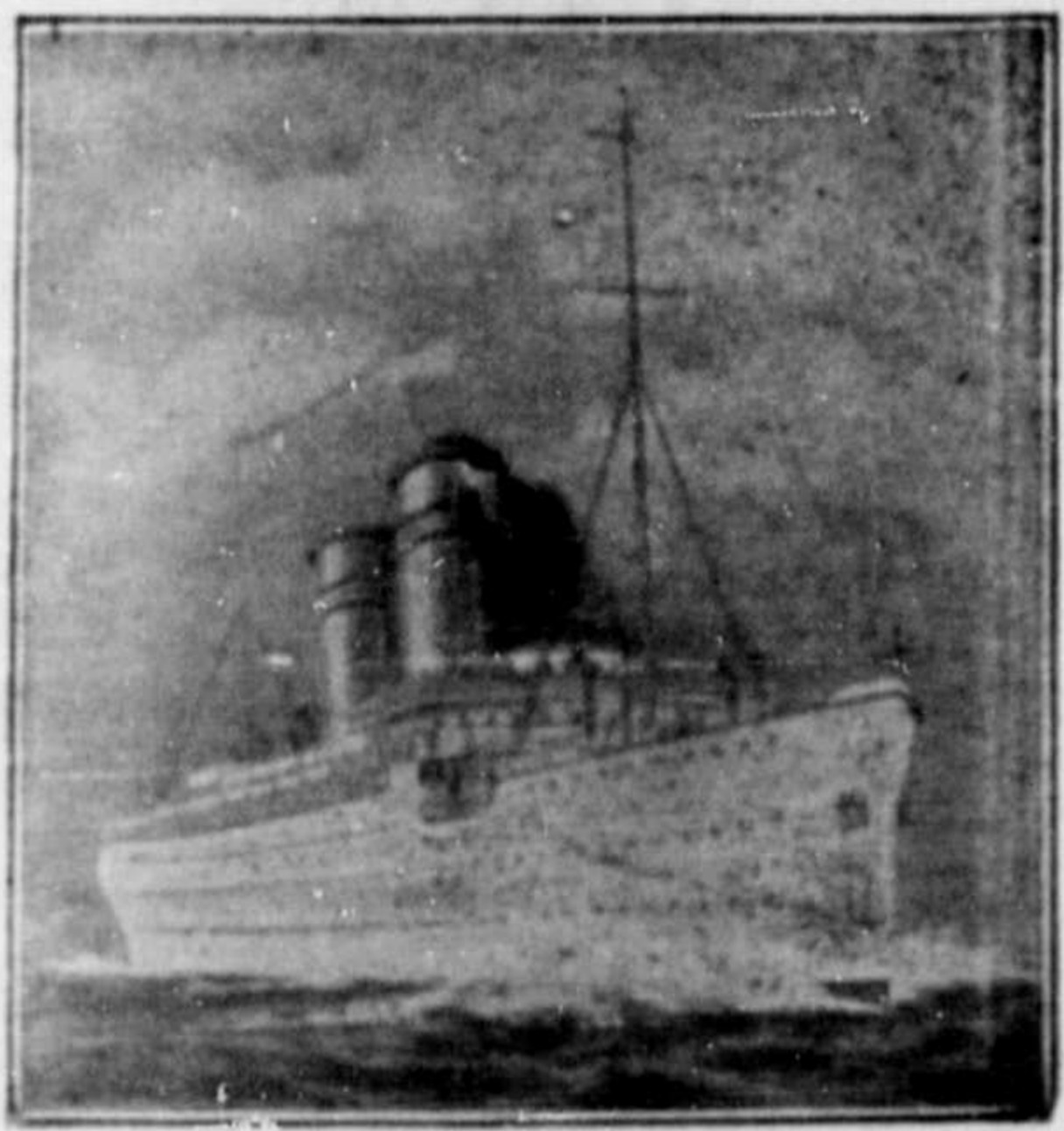

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

In the Letter Box

To the Editor:

Sir:—As many are inquiring about the Alberta Liquor Act in view of the coming plebiscite in this province, I should like to explain that this act does NOT prohibit the sale of liquor for medicinal, mechanical, scientific, and sacramental purposes, but allows government vendors, who receive a fixed salary with no profits or commissions to sell liquor for such purposes under definite restrictions, such as a doctor's prescription, nor does it prohibit an individual householder to have in his own house and for private use a limited amount of liquor, but it DOES prohibit within the province all sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, and so abolishes the bar-room and does away with the treating system.

The chief point of difference between the Alberta Liquor Act and the Saskatchewan Liquor Act is this: in Saskatchewan to bring about a great reform more gradually a certain number of dispensaries under strict government control are allowed to sell liquor as a beverage in the larger centres, but the people of these municipalities are given the local option to close these government dispensaries by vote, if they wish to do so. In several cases this has lately been done.

While there may be many of us in British Columbia who would prefer the Saskatchewan system as more moderate, in the plebiscite to be submitted to our people there should be no confusing of the main issue. Details should be left for future consideration.

No matter how great the personal sacrifice may be for the sake of the public good in these days of stress and strain, bearing in mind that: *Salus populi suprema lex*, let us rise up throughout this province in overwhelming numbers and "Banish the Bar."

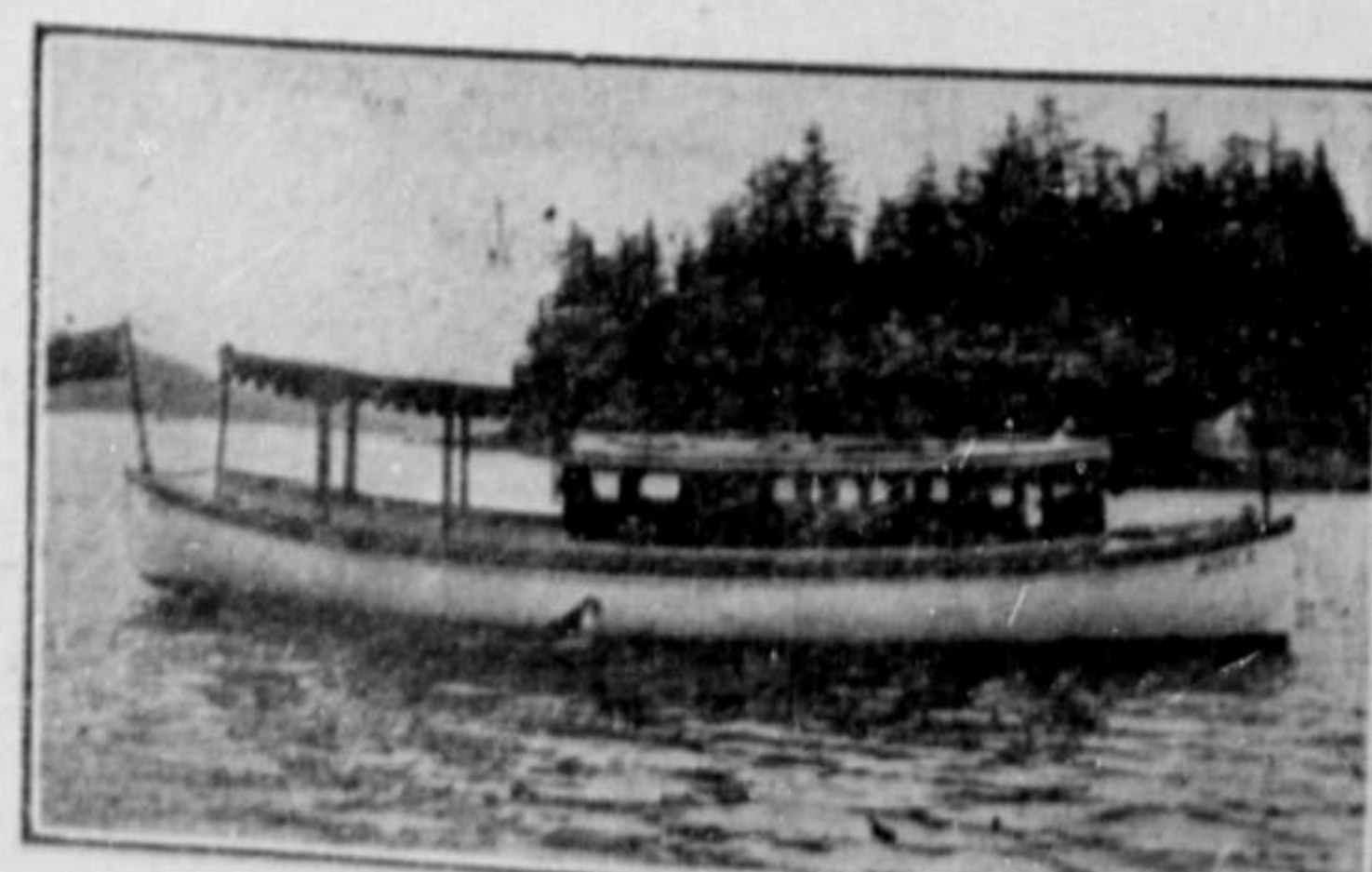
