GREEK TROOPS ARE DETERMINED TO FIGHT

CENTRAL POWERS PLANNING ATTACK ON SALONIKI--RUSSIANS STILL SUCCESSFUL

GREEK TROOPS ARE STRAINING AT THE LEASH

Movement on Saloniki will be led by Von Mackenzen—Greek Soldiers Demand A Fight.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 7.—The invasion of Greece by the Central Powers is about to begin, and General Von Mackenzen is moving against Saloniki.

The Bulgarians have resumed their concentration on the Greek border, and a squadron of Austrian aviators has arrived at Monastir.

German Prestige Declining.

Athens reports that Germany's prestige in Greece is declining. The Greeks are determined to resist the threatened entry of the Turks and Bulgarians into Greek territory.

Greeks Tull of Fight.

The Greek commanders have notified the war office that it will be impossible to hold their men from attacking the Turks and Bulgarians. Greek soldiers at Kavala threaten to mutiny, and are demanding that they be allowed to fight or disband.

TURKISH ARMY ASSEMBLED ON GREEK BORDER

Turks led by German Preparing for Raid on Greece—British Submarine Sunk—Derby Scheme Extended.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Jan. 7.—A Turkish army of 150,000 men is now on the Greek frontier under Perref Pasha, a German leader. It is expected that the Turks will attack the Allies in Greece from the northeast while the Bulgarians and Germans attack from the north and west.

British Submarine Sunk.

London, Jan. 7.—A British submarine sank off the island of Texel on the Dutch coast on Thursday. The Dutch cruiser Noord Brabant rescued the crew and landed them at Helder, in the north of Holland.

Derby Scheme Continued.

The Rupert Hotel wire says that Lord Derby's scheme is to be continued for six weeks longer to give the single men who have not yet volunteered an opportunity to come in.

VON RINTELEN FINANCED NEW MEXICAN SCRAP

Investigation in New York Discloses Far-reaching German Plan to Raise Trouble For Uncle Sam.

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Jan. 7.—The money furnished by the German government to Von Rintelen, who's under arrest here for conspiracy, was used to finance the new revolution in Mexico, according to a report from the federal authorities. The new revolt was carried out under General Blanquet, former minister of war for General Huerta.

Further Investigation.

The federal grand jury began its investigation today. It has been discovered that heavy funds were deposited by Von Rintelen in banks along the Mexican border. The authorities will produce the men who received the funds.

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

S. D. Macdonald presided over an attendance of about sixty at the open meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night. After outlining the policy of the council, including an eight-hour day; the protection of the city franchises, and the encouragement of the city market, he called upon Ald. Casey to address the meeting.

After dwelling upon the social revolution going on in Europe, as a result of the war, Mr. Casey said that one of his chief aims in the council was to promote the welfare of the city market. Apart from a few business men who felt the competition, the people were satisfied with the market.

In financial matters, he was in favor of the serial bond system and was opposed to any increase being made in the city's indebtedness. With regard to day labor he explained that the reason why he supported the contract system with regard to the Digby water scheme was that it was a choice between a contract or nothing. He still believed that the work should have been done by contract, provided the 45 cent wage clause was inserted. He strongly supported the plan of publicly owned utilities and thought every attention should be paid to the schools, even if at a heavier levy.

With regard to the mayoralty, he said that Mr. Newton had been the first in the council to insist that wages be increased from 37 1/2 cents to 45 cents per hour, and had stayed with it ever since. He pointed out that Mr. McCaffery was a member of the only council which had deviated from this rate, since its inception.

In conclusion, he complimented the Trades and Labor Council on the good work they had done in bringing Parker Williams to this city, on which occasion he gave the Conservative regime the grilling it deserved. In bringing Mr.

HUN EGYPTIAN CAMPAIGN HAS BEEN CHECKED

Russian Offensive Continues on Bessarabian Front—German Reinforcements Have Arrived.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 7.—The Russian successes in Bessarabia continue. Teutonic reinforcements have arrived and the battle continues with greater intensity. During the last four days the losses on both sides numbered eighty thousand.

Egyptian Campaign Checked.

The great offensive by the Russians in Bessarabia has checked the German campaign for an invasion of Egypt.

Kaiser's Illness.

The Rupert Hotel bulletin contains a report from Berlin which denies that the Kaiser is seriously ill. He is reported to be suffering from minor complaints only.

BRITISH TRADES FAIR

In view of the great success attending the British Industries Fair, at the Agricultural Hall, London, last year, the Imperial Board of Trade has decided to hold a second fair along the same lines at the Victoria and Albert Museum, Kensington, London, on February 21st, 1916, the fair being open for 12 days.

The object of the fair is to extend to British manufacturers the same advantages as have been derived by continental manufacturers from the trade fairs held in their respective countries. Buyers from the United Kingdom and all parts of the world are invited to the fair, and, as it is intended for the trade only (the general public not being admitted), buyers will have an exceptional opportunity of transacting their business in a minimum time.

Manufacturers only will be allowed to exhibit, and their exhibits will be strictly confined to goods of their own make. The trades exhibiting will be toys, glassware, fancy goods, printing, stationery, and earthenware and china.

Admission to the fair will be by invitation of His Majesty's Board of Trade only, and will be restricted to bona fide buyers for United Kingdom and overseas markets. Buyers from the Dominion of Canada visiting the United Kingdom during the course of the fair, i.e. February 21st to March 4th, and interested in the above trades, should not fail to communicate immediately on arrival in the United Kingdom with, The Director, British Industries Fair, 32 Cheapside, London, E. C. It will also be to their advantage to notify the office of H. M. Trade Commissioner, 3 Beaver Hall Sq., Montreal, giving particulars as to the firms they

represent.

This fair is a splendid effort to bring the various parts of the Empire more closely together in regard to manufactures. In the past, business between the various parts of the Empire has been allowed to grow along haphazard lines with little attempt at a concerted effort on the part of buyers and manufacturers to meet. The lines to be exhibited in London on this occasion have been largely supplied by Germany in past years, and, as this supply is certain to be very uncertain in the future, the efforts put forth by the Imperial Board of Trade will be thoroughly appreciated, and taken advantage of, by buyers throughout the Dominion of Canada.

serial bond plan as opposed to the sinking fund.

J. J. Anderson said he was a strong believer in municipal ownership and the rate of 45 cents an hour. He thought the city should encourage the bringing in of industries, but that all concerns coming in should be bound down to the 45 cents an hour agreement. He endorsed the serial bond system.

Mayor Newton said he had always wondered why he so steadily received the support of labor, while the labor men had never asked him to pledge himself to anything. He supposed they recognised loyalty.

He warned them strongly against allowing anyone to get into power who would not protect the public utilities. Though they owned them now, they might have them taken away from them again as in Vancouver, and as was now threatening in Edmonton.

He accused the 1913 council of trying to lead the people into parting with their power franchise after he had in 1912 resisted the approaches of the corporation. He again warned them of what might happen in the future. He went on to explain how the treasury certificates had been renewed and how his visit to Montreal had helped out the financing of the city. Of the \$36,000 promised by the bank at that time, they had required to borrow only \$5,000 and that for the space of seven weeks.

He said that the treasurer was preparing a financial statement which amazed even himself, showing that the city is in better financial condition than almost any city in Canada, having a surplus for the year of \$25,000.

In conclusion, he said he was proud to be allied with any organization, labor or otherwise, which stood for straightforward, honest dealing.

George Kerr intimated that he would not be able to run this year, and thanked the council for their support in the past.

A collection was taken to help defray the expenses of the campaign. Another open meeting will be held next Tuesday.

The mode of nomination of candidates shall be as follows:

The candidates shall be nominated in writing; the writing shall be subscribed by two voters of the Municipality as proposer and seconder, and shall be delivered to the Returning Officer at any time between the date of this notice and 2 p. m. of the day of the nomination; the said writing may be in the form numbered five in the schedule of the Municipal Elections Act, and shall state the names, residence, and occupation of each person proposed to identify such candidate; and in the event of a poll being necessary, such poll will be opened on the 13th day of January, 1916, in the Council Chamber at the City Hall, Fulton Street, from the hour of 9 a. m. to the hour of 7 p. m., of which every person is hereby requested to take notice and govern himself accordingly.

Qualification for Mayor.
The persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as the Mayor of any city shall be any person who is a male British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, not disqualified under any law, and has for the six months next preceding the day of nomination been the registered owner in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the city of assessed value, on the last municipal assessment roll of One Thousand Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who is otherwise duly qualified as a Municipal Voter.

Qualification for Alderman.
Persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as Aldermen of a City shall be such persons as are male British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years, and who are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination the registered owners, in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the City of the assessed value on the last Municipal Assessment Roll of Five Hundred Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who are otherwise duly qualified as Municipal Voters.

School Trustees.
I am notified by the Secretary of the School Board that it will be necessary to hold an election for two trustees to serve for a term of two years, to take the place of Messrs. P. W. Anderson and Dr. W. T. Kergin, whose terms have expired, also for a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. A. Kirkpatrick, to serve for a term of one year. It will therefore be necessary that nominations be handed to the Returning Officer at the place and time as in the case of Mayor and Aldermen provided by Statute as set out above.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for a term of more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof;

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

(6) To provide that securities to be issued under the following bylaws, under none of which any securities have as yet been issued, Annuity Instalment or Serial bonds may be issued and such bonds to be for the term here set forth, namely:

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund;

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

There is one bond of unity in the city, in that all are in favor of serial bonds as compared to sinking fund bonds.

It is rumored that Jimmie Russell, who went to the front with the first contingent, is on a fair way for a commission.

Mitchell & Currie have received a contract to erect a warehouse for the Imperial Oil Company at their wharf at Hays Cove.

Prince Rupert Nautical Academy scored another success yesterday, when D. J. Russell passed his examination for captain's certificate.

J. G. Stirrat, who arrived from Vancouver yesterday, has secured a contract for the removal of the ledge of rock in front of the slip at the drydock.

George Kerr said last night that the \$5,000 worth of telephone wire which is lying around the city could be sold today for \$9,000. Why not sell it for \$9,000 and buy a supply when it is needed at normal prices, George?

In the Letter Box

Mr. Editor:—I see Mayor Newton is again seeking election on the lines of "Impartiality, practicability and economy." I claim he has been a miserable failure in all three. An instance of his impartiality is the appointment of the deputy returning officers. There are two from the Sons of England, two from the Sons of Scotland, and one Socialist, and only one of the five is a ratepayer. Some of them would not know an Indian if he came to vote. At that, all five are working more or less, and many of the real old-timers here are right up against it and away behind in their taxes. I met one a few days ago who had spent his last cent before Christmas at the grocery store. He is a strong, able-bodied man with a record of eight years in Prince Rupert and 30 years in B. C. He has been trying for two months to get a little work from the city. If he had been a foreigner or owed a big grocery bill, he would have no trouble.

As for economy, Mayor Newton cannot name a city in Canada of double the population where there is so much money spent or wasted, both in salaries and in material which is littered all over the city. Bylaws passed long ago and taxes collected for work never begun, like the Morse Creek bridge. The city hall staff could be largely reduced, as well as salaries, if we had a capable executive. If they can get aldermen in Toronto and Vancouver for \$300 a year, there ought to be enough civic pride here, at a time when everyone is making sacrifices, to get a city council to act for one year without salary. There is no trouble to get capable men to serve on the board of trade or agricultural association without salary.

The Federal and Provincial governments have set the city a good example, and I hope the voters, in marking their ballots at this election, will skip any man who looks young and husky enough to wear the King's uniform.
