TWENTY-THREE ALDERMANIC CANDIDATES

CABINET MINISTERS TO RESPECTIVE ROLES

Ottawa, January 7.—The new year sees the cabinet ministers definitely assigned to their respective roles. Premier Borden is the heavy father, Finance Minister White is the leading juvenile, Sir Sam is the Man on Horseback, Sir George Foster is wise old Ulysses with a touch of Nestor and a dash of Cassandra, while the Honorable Bob has what they call a thinking part, which means that he is supposed to say little but to think deeply over what occurred in Manitoba. This is a part that suits his mood and he needs little prompting. Arthur Meighen is understudy to the whole company.

The Premier seems to do his share when he emits a distant rumble in the presence of the Canadian Club of New York or Boston on his way to and from the hot springs in Virginia where he goes to warm his feet. Meanwhile the important announcement falls to Finance Minister White who distributes the sunshine in his heart among the electors. In a cabinet of elderly gentlemen Mr. White passes as young and he gets a young man's work to do. He speaks not only for himself but for all his colleagues who remain silent and act as a background.

The finance minister's role is invincible cheerfulness. Keep 'em smiling—that's his cue, and he does it very well indeed. In the seventeen months the Empire has been at war not one doleful word has escaped his lips. According to the finance minister this country is getting along as well as could be expected and a good deal better. His message is that Canada has had an unprecedented wheat crop, that the foreign trade conditions are prodigious, the customs returns buoyant, the special war taxes fruitful, borrowings not too difficult, and general prosperity on the upgrade. All of which is a consummation devoutly to be wished and most encouraging if the statements are taken at their face value. The finance minister has never been downhearted at any stage of the game, being convinced that the financial precautions which he took at the outbreak of the war, and which were based on the wisdom of the ages sifted through the business intellect of Tom White were all that could be desired. It is true that he set aside the advice of a number of bankers and money kings—but who is running this show anyway, the

McCAFFERY'S ATTITUDE

Perhaps the most remarkable feature of the mayoralty campaign is M. P. McCaffery's attitude of calm, complacent confidence in the people. Without any unnecessary fuss, or hollering as to what he will do if elected, or threats as to what he will do if not elected, he smilingly awaits the verdict of the ratepayers. He is satisfied that his qualifications for the position are well known and apparent to all. He seems to say, "though as a matter of fact he actually says very little about it, 'the people know me thoroughly, and they also know my opponent. Let them make their choice.'"

He knows that his chief work will be in cleaning up what has been badly done, or left undone, in the past. His one promise is that he will devote all his energy and foresight to the affairs of Prince Rupert. His ability to handle these affairs is thoroughly known to all, and little more need be said. He is not out clamoring to be appointed to a job, but has come forward at the request of many wholehearted citizens, to do his duty as a citizen. Everyone knows that that duty will be well and faithfully done.

MONEY POWER

The financial world is agreed that the outcome of the war depends upon staying power, and staying power simply means finance. Money, or its equivalent, is to a nation at war what a full supply of good red blood is to an athlete in a contest. Money is, in fact, the life-blood of a nation at war, while men, munitions, ships, etc., are the muscles. Without a steady supply of the former, the latter cannot be kept up to fighting pitch.

Authorities are satisfied that in this great contest of staying power, the advantage lies most with the Allies, because of the financial power of Britain. Britain is splendidly fortified by her great navy, and wonderfully served by her wonderful army, but her real fortifications at the outbreak of the war consisted of money in her banks to the amount of \$6,000,000,000; investments abroad of \$200,000,000, and investments at home of \$200,000,000,000. Such figures, to the lay mind, are staggering. We hear much of the sinews of war, but the blood which feeds these sinews is the really important thing.

In speaking of finances, it is interesting to trace the origin of banking, for Britain's great banking system is largely responsible for the existence of the British Empire. Up to the 14th century, the people of Britain were tied to the soil by a feudal system, which knew no money, the tenant paying his rent to the Lord of the Manor by giving his labor; service, or produce. About the end of the 14th century, money came into existence, and, with it, a tremendous step forward in social progress.

For two centuries, people did not grasp the importance of money. In fact, it disappeared almost as fast as it was issued,

a sock; an old shoe, or a strong box being the usual receptacle for it. Every house had its hidden hoard, big or little. Practically the only form of investment, if it can be called such, was the putting of money into gold plate, which may or may not have been the origin of the "gold brick" idea. This gold plate buying brought into existence a large number of dealers in precious metals, with the result that the goldsmiths became the most influential class in the country. A growing tendency to deposit money with the goldsmiths led to these gentlemen becoming money-lenders. Dealing in money became more important as a business, and ultimately many goldsmiths went entirely into what was really a crude form of banking. The government set a maximum rate of interest, which dropped from 40 per cent. to 5 per cent. in two centuries, until the usury laws were repealed in 1824, after which people made the best bargain they could.

During the Cromwellian commonwealth there was a big influx of Jews from the continent to England, bringing with them a standard of finance and knowledge of exchange hitherto unknown in Britain. Those Jews inaugurated a financial connection with the continent which gradually evolved a centralising of a money market in London which led to the founding, in 1694, of the Bank of England. Prior to the formation of this bank, the government had done its borrowing from private individuals as best it could. A great continental war gave the bank an opportunity of displaying its power, and, then, as now, it saved the situation, and from that day to this the Bank of England has done the government's banking, though not a

government bank.

During the Napoleonic wars it carried Britain to triumph, enabling her to take the leading place in commerce and making London the financial centre of the world. Other banks sprung up, many of which developed into larger concerns than the Bank of England, but the "old lady of Threadneedle Street" remained the pivot around which the others moved.

When this colossal struggle broke out, it found the financial forces of Britain centralised in London. There was no preconceived idea of concentration, the movement being simply a matter of evolution, the experience of the past paving the way for the future, as in everything else. The crisis found this huge network of financial arteries ready to meet the situation, with a tremendous power of drawing new strength from every corner of the globe. Germany also had a great banking system spreading throughout the world, but Britain and her Allies, early in the war, cut the Teuton arteries and the German Empire today is bleeding to death.

is Mr. White's privilege to be cheerful and to make no bones of saying so just as it is Sir George Foster's duty to remind the voters that those who play pay the piper.

It was the irony of fate that wished the role of official croaker on Sir George. The minister of trade and commerce had become mellow with advancing age and philosophy. He was looking back at life over his shoulder and was in a position to say, as he did, a plague on both your parties. He could afford to look on while his colleagues gouged each other's eyes out and say "let the little darlings play." That was his attitude—one of genial detachment from political strife. Having attained peace himself he cultivated a serene indulgence toward those who still mingled in the conflict. Far from the maddening crowd, a minister of trade and commerce, with nothing to do but travel for his body's health and his soul's comfort, he beamed on this hard world like a beautiful sunset—that is if you can imagine a sunset that talks through its nose and wears chin-whiskers. At all events there was a benediction in his manner and it suited him well. Whenever anybody started trouble at Ottawa, Sir George took the wings of the morning to the uttermost parts of the earth whence he returned, once the row was over, bearing with him a reciprocity treaty by which Australia traded boomerangs for our Christmas trees or some useful gift like that. Such was Sir George's lot for

three years, sometimes bagman, anon yogi, wrapt in beautitudes. Then the war came and jolted him out of his nirvana.

Somebody had to remind the people of their responsibilities. Somebody had to tell them to sit tight and save money and make provision against the taxes which

NOMINATION NOTICE

Public notice is hereby given to the Electors of the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, that I require the presence of the said electors at the City Clerk's office, City Hall, on Monday, the 10th day of January, 1916, at 12 o'clock noon for the purpose of electing persons to represent them in the Municipal Council as Mayor and Aldermen.

The mode of nomination of candidates shall be as follows:

The candidates shall be nominated in writing; the writing shall be subscribed by two voters of the Municipality as proposer and seconder, and shall be delivered to the Returning Officer at any time between the date of this notice and 2 p. m. of the day of the nomination; the said writing may be in the form numbered five in the schedule of the Municipal Elections Act, and shall state the names, residence, and occupation or description of each person proposed in such manner as sufficiently to identify such candidate; and in the event of a poll being necessary, such poll will be opened on the 13th day of January, 1916, in the Council Chamber at the City Hall, Fulton Street, from the hour of 9 a. m. to the hour of 7 p. m., of which every person is hereby requested to take notice and govern himself accordingly.

Qualification for Mayor.

The persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as the Mayor of any city shall be any person who is a male British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, not disqualified under any law, and has for the six months next preceding the day of nomination been the registered owner in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the city of assessed value, on the last municipal assessment roll of One Thousand Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who is otherwise duly qualified as a Municipal Voter.

Qualification for Alderman.

Persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as Aldermen of a City shall be such persons as are male British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years, and who are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination the registered owners, in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the City of the assessed value on the last Municipal Assessment Roll of Five Hundred Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who are otherwise duly qualified as Municipal Voters.

School Trustees.

I am notified by the Secretary of the School Board that it will be necessary to hold an election for two trustees to serve for a term of two years, to take the place of Messrs. P. W. Anderson and Dr. W. T. Kergin, whose terms have expired, also for a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. A. Kirkpatrick, to serve for a term of one year. It will therefore be necessary that nominations be handed to the Returning Officer at the place and time as in the case of Mayor and Aldermen provided by Statute as set out above.

In city school districts of the first, second or third class, any person being a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, and having been for the six months next preceding the date of nomination the Registered Owner in the Land Registry Office of land or real property in the city school district of the assessed value on the last Municipal Assessment roll of Five Hundred Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and being otherwise qualified to vote at an election of school trustees in such city school district.

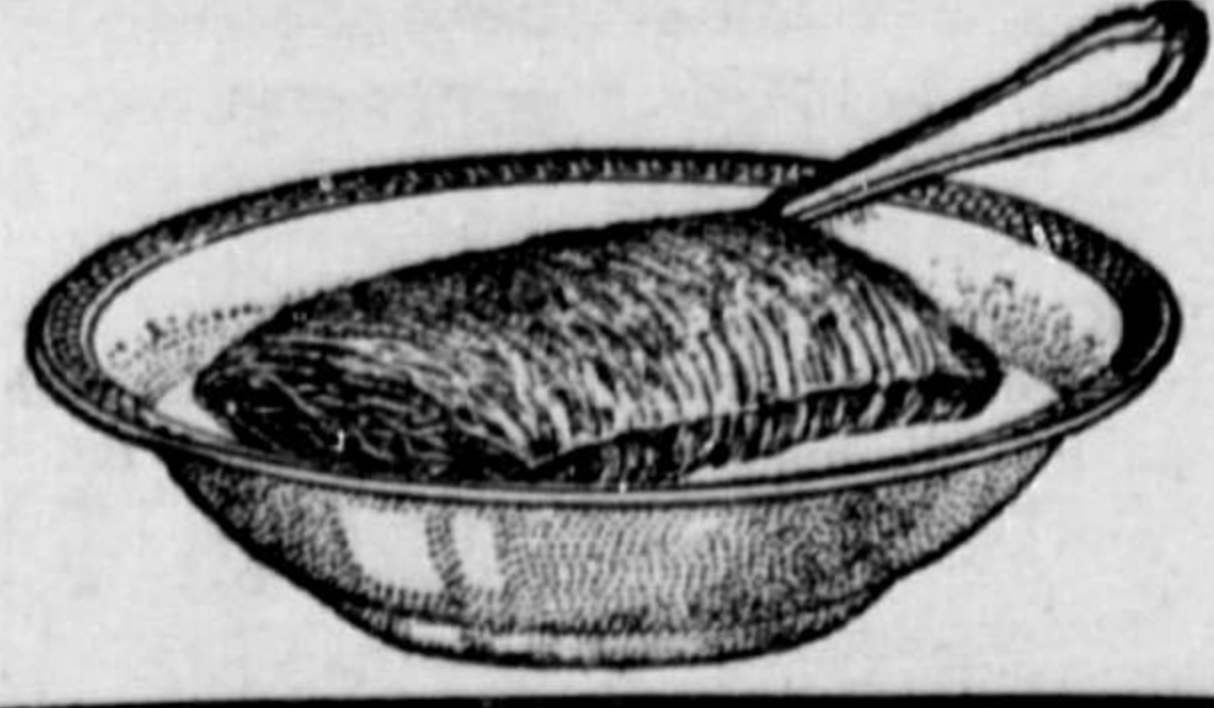

next general election is over. Somebody had to tell them that the worst was yet to come as it did behoove the finance minister to dash his bright gospel with dark forebodings this sad duty fell to Sir George who was elected to do it by the unanimous choice of his comrades in the cabinet. Sir George's smiling mask did not deceive them. They had seen him at work in council, or rather not at work, and they sensed what he felt at not being finance minister. They surmised that he had a fountain of melancholy to draw on and they proceeded to tap it. This is why Sir George is the one appointed to try it on the dog—he can put real emotion into his words. Sir George's job is to feel the people out. He may not like his job, but his colleagues feel that it is good for him not only because it brings him in touch again with human frailty but as a sort of punishment for his previous detachment from party politics. Penance, as it were.

Thus it happens that Sir George is the first to breathe conscription to a people four thousand miles distant from the war. It was a breath, that was all—it did not meet with a popular response, so Sir George ceased breathing in that direction. His latest task is to forecast a probable domestic loan of \$300,000,000 for war purposes—a large order which will find Canada not only ready but willing to take that but perhaps another rich blessing at five per cent. The fact that Sir George is chosen to break it to us gently does not necessarily stamp it as bad news. If we must borrow it is perhaps best that we borrow from ourselves, thus drawing two profits—the five per cent. and the self-reliance.—H. F. Gadsby.

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates, and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund;

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

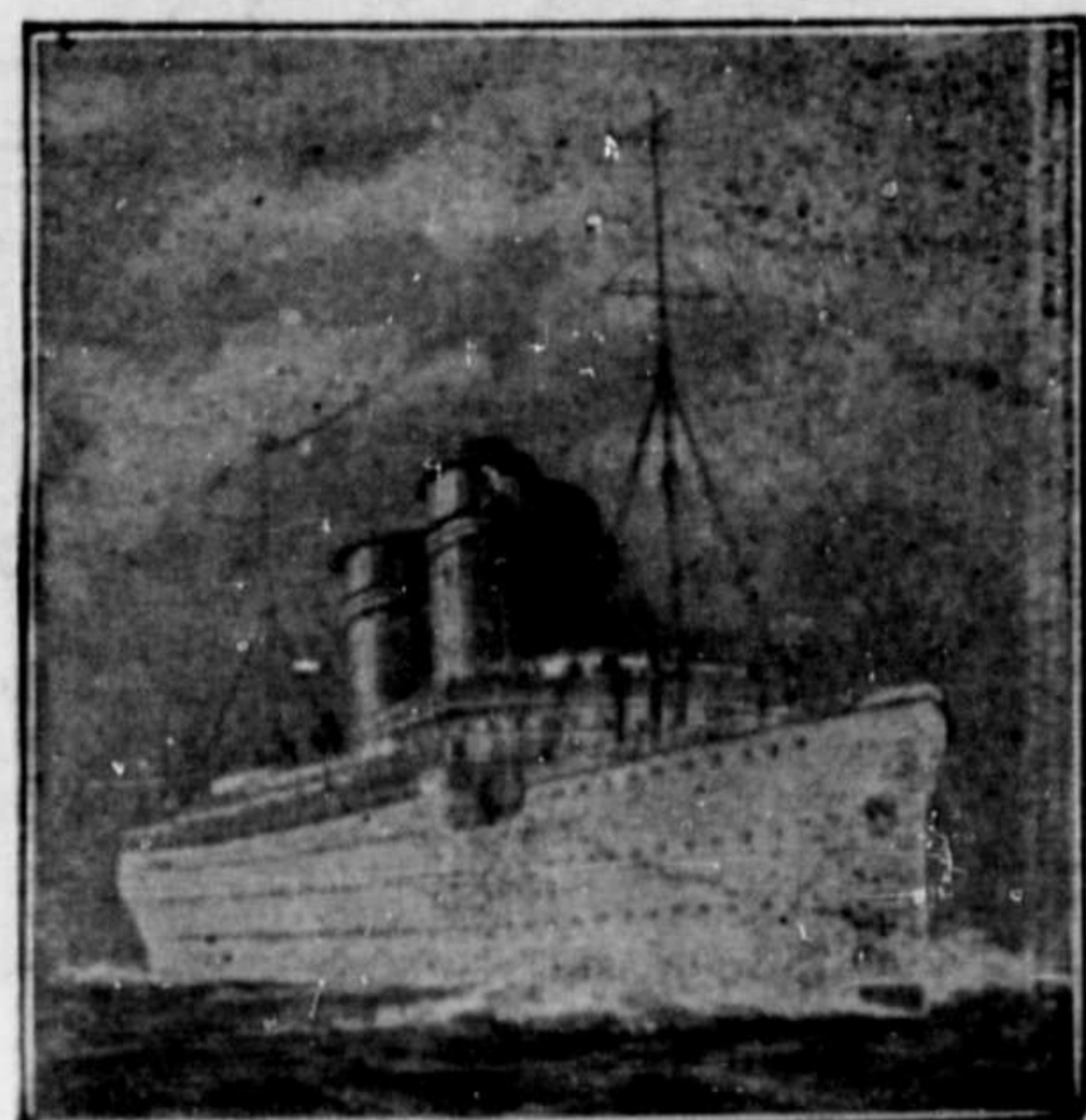

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
