TEUTONIC ATTACK ON SALONIKI HAS BEGUN

TERRIBLE MASSACRE BY BANDITS -- FOURTEEN KILLED IN RAILROAD WRECK

GERMANS HAVE BEGUN ATTACK NEAR SALONIKI

British Lines Being Bombarded by Huns — Bulgarians and Turks are Supporting the Flanks.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Jan. 13.—The attack by the Teutonic allies outside of the Greek port of Saloniki has begun with the bombardment of the British lines at Doiran.

The Germans are also attacking on the west front around Monastir, while the Bulgarians are diverting their attention to the Giveli-Doiran line. The Turks are fighting on the east flank.

Greek Protest.

London, Jan. 13.—The Greek government has protested against the occupation of the island of Corfu by the Allies.

British and French ships have landed food in Albania for the 150,000 Serbians who are located there.

PROPOSAL TO RECRUIT SCANDINAVIAN REGIMENT

Mr. Olof Hanson has received a telegram from the Hon. Thomas H. Johnson, minister of public works in the Manitoba government, asking for his co-operation in the formation of a Scandinavian regiment for overseas service. The idea has taken a firm hold in Winnipeg and it is hoped that the ranks will be filled out by recruits from Prince Rupert.

Mr. Hanson has informed Mr. Johnson that he considers the idea a good one and that on being placed before the Scandinavian League here had been heartily endorsed. It is suggested that permission be given to Scandinavians who are serving in other regiments to transfer to the Scandinavian regiment now forming.

THE MAYORALTY

There was quite a rush of voters to the polling booths this forenoon and McCaffery's supporters at noon were satisfied that up to that time M. P. had polled two votes to Newton's one. There is no doubt as to the final result. The only question is the majority, and E. F. Doyle is absolutely certain that it will be a record for such a small poll.

ANOTHER WOUNDED WARRIOR RETURNS

Thomas Van Dyke, who left here with the first contingent, arrived from the front on the Prince George this morning and left for the interior. At Festubert he was severely wounded in the head and face by machine gun fire, one bullet entering his left cheek and coming out at his neck, dislodging a number of teeth en route. He also received a bullet wound in the head.

He now looks fit and well, and is as happy as a king in spite of what he has gone through. Mr. Van Dyke is a son of gallant little Belgium and is justly proud of the part played by his native country in the world's war.

IMPORTANCE OF SURF INLET MINING DEAL

An article in the Vancouver Province deals with the importance of the taking over of the Surf Inlet mines by the Tonopah-Belmont Development Company. After going into details as to the capacity of the mine, the article states that the big development now going on on Princess Royal Island will increase the gold production of British Columbia by 30 per cent, or \$2,000,000 per year.

An account has been opened at the Canadian Bank of Commerce in the name of the Belgian Relief Committee and subscriptions for the relief of these worthy people are now in order. There will be no canvass made, and citizens are requested to simply walk into the bank and deposit what they can afford. The object needs no commendation here, as all are aware of the part played by gallant little Belgium in holding up the Germans in their first great raid on France. The fund is economically managed and citizens may rest assured that every dollar will do a hundred cents' worth of work in aiding those patriots. The account will be open until January 31st.

McCaffery for Mayor

MANAGER E. F. DOYLE INFORMS THE DAILY NEWS THAT M. F. McCAFFERY WILL BE RETURNED AS MAYOR TODAY BY THE LARGEST MAJORITY THAT HAS EVER BEEN OBTAINED IN THIS CITY, IN PROPORTION TO THE VOTE POLLED

Points for the Electors Today

Sam Newton once more demonstrated that he is not a fit and proper person to be mayor of this city. His one asset being personal abuse of his opponents, he gave vent to his bitterness in a column of vile insinuation and gross misrepresentation. Like the really big man that he is, in every sense of the term, Mr. McCaffery passed the episode over with a smile of contempt.

Besides appropriating to himself the credit for all the honesty that exists in the city, Newton went on to show how he had saved the city in regard to the telephone charter. Fortunately the citizens are perfectly aware of the true story of that struggle for their rights. As W. P. Lynch so ably pointed out at Mr. McCaffery's meeting last night, 80 public-spirited men, including C. W. Peek, Wm. Manson, T. D. Pattullo, G. R. Naden, W. H. Vickers, F. G. Dawson and the rest of the leading citizens of that time, subscribed the money necessary to obtain the franchise and held it until the city was incorporated. The one man who stayed out of the plan to save the city was the one and only SAM. Mr. Lynch went on to show how these gentlemen lent that money to the city for a year without a cent of interest and how they turned the franchise over to the city without a cent of profit. SAM WAS THE ONE MAN WHO TRIED TO SPOIL THE PLAN. IF NEWTON HAD BEEN LISTENED TO AT THAT TIME THE CITY WOULD NOT TODAY OWN ITS TELEPHONE SYSTEM. SAM'S MOST FLAGRANT ERROR WAS IN CONNECTING MR. McCAFFERY WITH THE SCHEME AS THAT GENTLEMAN HAD NOT THEN COME TO THE CITY.

A TERRIBLE RAILROAD DISASTER IN MANITOBA

(Special to The Daily News.)

Brandon, Jan. 13.—A C. P. R. work train with a caboose loaded with workmen was struck by an eastbound freight train last evening, when fourteen were killed outright; three were fatally injured and twelve were seriously hurt. The train was hidden by clouds of steam and mist when the accident occurred.

While the injured men were awaiting the arrival of rescuers, they were attacked by frost-bite, the thermometer being at 47 below zero. Only three of the injured men are expected to recover.

BOMBS ARE THROWN AT COUNT OKUMA OF JAPAN

Tokyo, Jan. 13.—Count Okuma had a narrow escape from assassination while returning from the Royal Palace at midnight last night, when two bombs were thrown at his automobile.

The chauffeur immediately put on speed and the bombs exploded behind the car. The assassins escaped.

ICE HOCKEY MATCH TO BE PLAYED THIS AFTERNOON

The Hazelton hockey team having wired that they will be here this afternoon, Prince Rupert's first real ice hockey game will be played at Market Place this afternoon. The members of the Athletic Association are to be congratulated on the results of their efforts to give this city a rink. It cannot, perhaps, be classed with an indoor rink, but it is wonderfully good when the uneven state of the ground is considered.

Yesterday afternoon, the boys had a work-out and many of them showed marked ability as stick-handlers. Having had so little practice, the Prince Rupert boys cannot be expected to put up a star game, but they will keep the Hazelton boys going full steam ahead throughout the game.

The team will be chosen from "Buck" Irwin, captain, C. Blyth, Harry Love, W. Crawford, C. C. Boldrick, H. Scott, L. Wilson and Holtby. All of these boys have had previous experience in the great game and a little practice should mould them into quite a smart team.

Yesterday afternoon the rink was well patronized by skaters, who were delighted with the ice provided at so much trouble by the boys. In order that it may be in shape for the game, there will be no skating today. Four large electric lights have been placed around the rink, and all that is required to make it the real thing is a band.

MASSACRE OF MINING MEN BY YAQUI INDIANS

Bandits were Supported by Villa's Officers—One Man Escapes Out of Nineteen—Fears of Further Trouble

(Special to The Daily News.)

El Paso, Jan. 13.—Thomas B. Holmes, the sole survivor of nineteen American mining men, who were massacred in Box Canyon, has arrived here. Holmes says that the train in which he was travelling was stopped by an obstruction on the tracks and the party ordered out.

Twenty bandits opened fire on the party as they alighted from the coaches, while two hundred, as a reserve force, stood by the right-of-way. Holmes ran; dived under a bush and hid in a river bottom while the party of miners was massacred.

General Pablo Lopez, a Yaqui chieftain and an ally of Villa, commanded the massacre.

Further Murders.

It is reported that ten more people, including several Englishmen and one American woman, were massacred yesterday at Madera by Villa's general Jose Rodriguez. Fearing an anti-Mexican demonstration by the hundreds of Americans who were waiting at the station for the arrival of the bodies, the police sent the death special through to the freight yards of the Santa Fe Railway. A special train with two hundred men and machine guns proceeded to the scene of the massacre at Box Canyon. The Mexicans, who had been warned, are lying in ambush.

GERMANY'S FOOD PROBLEM

While it were unwise to be misled by debates in the Reichstag, which may have been engineered for the purpose of deceiving the Allies, there seems to be strong presumptive evidence that Germany is beginning to feel the pinch of hunger and distress as a result of the effective British blockade. The naval siege of Germany has proved to be a slow process. At first the blockade was only partial, and even now is not absolute. But, following a bad harvest, Germany is at length beginning to experience the economic pressure which many think will hasten the end of the campaign. Widespread and genuine distress prevails, and the discontent to which the hard times has given rise finds expression in two directions. One section holds that in Germany there is a real shortage of food, which must eventually put a stop to military operations. To this section belongs Maximilian Harden, whose brilliant and embarrassing criticisms have led to the suppression of his newspaper. Harden declares that the German people are suffering real want. Another section holds the view that the want is not due to actual shortage of food but to unfair methods of distribution. The Socialist newspapers attribute the suffering to the rapacity and extortion of the agrarian classes. This is the view which the German government encourages, although it shrinks from any action which might alienate the loyalty of the agrarians, who are so strongly entrenched in the governing circles, and who are the main driving power behind the war. On the horns of a dilemma, the government must choose between a policy of drift and increased discontent among

the proletariat, or intervene in a manner calculated to stir the wrath of the governing classes among the agrarians.

Economic defeat has already cast its shadows across German doorsteps. Were this succeeded by internal revolution and a disavowal of their leaders by the German proletariat, peace talk might prove of some avail. But so long as the German people labor under the illusion that they have won military successes that enable them to dictate terms of peace, and that by their sacrifices they have gained the mastery, it would be folly for the Allies to sheathe the sword until the economic defeat of Germany is followed by the overthrow of her military power in Europe. The German people must be taught the lesson that a war of aggression does not pay.—Toronto Globe.

Constable Phillipson is having quite a stay here this time, and everyone is glad to see Pat.

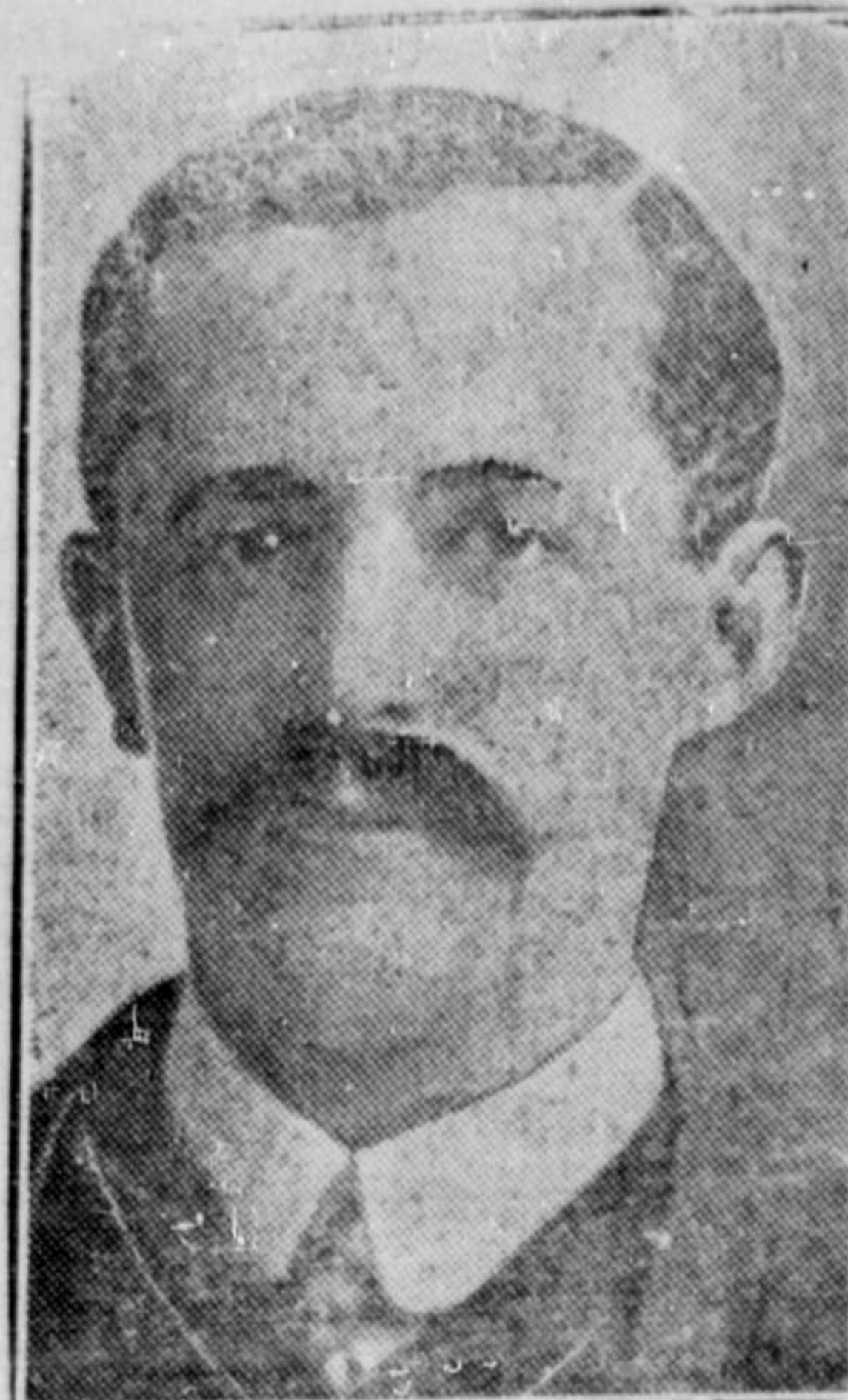
The old Naas is frozen over again with what the natives call "strong ice."

Public notice is hereby given to the Electors of the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, that I require the presence of the said electors at the City Clerk's office, City Hall, on Monday, the 10th day of January, 1916, at 12 o'clock noon for the purpose of electing persons to represent them in the Municipal Council as Mayor and Aldermen.

The mode of nomination of candidates shall be as follows:

The candidates shall be nominated in writing; the writing shall be subscribed by two voters of the Municipality as proposer and seconder, and shall be delivered to the Returning Officer at any time between the date of this notice and 2 p.m. of the day of the nomination; the said writing may be in the form numbered five in the schedule of the Municipal Elections Act, and shall state the names, residence, and occupation or description of each person proposed in such manner as sufficiently to identify such candidate; and in the event of a poll being necessary, such poll will be opened on the 13th day of January, 1916, in the Council Chamber at the City Hall, Fulton Street, from the hour of 9 a.m. to the hour of 7 p.m., of which every person is hereby requested to take notice and govern himself accordingly.

Qualification for Mayor.
The persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as Mayor of any city shall be any person who is a male British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, not disqualified under any law, and has for the six months next preceding the day of nomination been the registered owner in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the city of assessed value, on the last municipal assessment roll of One Thousand Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who is otherwise duly qualified as a Municipal Voter.

Qualification for Alderman.
Persons qualified to be nominated for and elected as Aldermen of a City shall be such persons as are male British subjects of the full age of twenty-one years, and who are not disqualified under any law, and have been for the six months next preceding the day of nomination the registered owners, in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the City of the assessed value on the last Municipal Assessment Roll of Five Hundred Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and who are otherwise duly qualified as Municipal Voters.

School Trustees.
I am notified by the Secretary of the School Board that it will be necessary to hold an election for two trustees to serve for a term of two years, to take the place of Messrs. P. W. Anderson and Dr. W. T. Kergin, whose terms have expired, also for a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. A. Kirkpatrick, to serve for a term of one year. It will therefore be necessary that nominations be handed to the Returning Officer at the place and time as in the case of Mayor and Aldermen provided by Statute as set out above.

In city school districts of the first, second or third class, any person being a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, and having been for the six months next preceding the date of nomination the Registered Owner in the Land Registry Office of land or real property in the city school district of the assessed value on the last Municipal Assessment roll of Five Hundred Dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and being otherwise qualified to vote at an election of school trustees in the said school district, shall be eligible to be elected or to serve as a school trustee in such city school district.

CANADA'S OPPORTUNITY TO ASSIST BELGIUM

There are many Canadians, able bodied and willing to do something for the cause of Britain and her Allies, yet who have not been able to see their way clear to going to the front to actually fight the battles against Germany. M. P. McCaffery Realizes Task Ahead

To the Editor of The Daily News,

Dear Sir:—In a published letter from Mayor Newton to the Electors of the City of Prince Rupert, I note the following: "The big problem which will confront the next council will be the refloatation of the Treasury Certificate issue."

With reference to this statement, I wish to state that if elected, I will spare no efforts to provide for a favorable disposition of these certificates, and the ratepayers of the City of Prince Rupert can rest assured that I will be absolutely certain as to whether the money is costing them six, eight, or ten per cent.
