## KING NICHOLAS ACCUSED OF TREACHERY

### HON. WM. PUGSLEY MAKES SENSATIONAL CHARGES AGAINST SHELL COMMITTEE

#### GRAVE CHARGES AGAINST KING OF MONTENEGRO

Italian Press Charges Nicholas With Vile Treachery—Sold out to Kaiser Before Outbreak of War.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Jan. 19.—Charges are made by the Italian press that the Montenegrin king had sold out to the Kaiser; that he allowed the Austrians to take Kuc, and that he secretly aided the Austrians by divulging information regarding Allied ships carrying provisions to enable Austrian submarines to sink these vessels.

Quantities of supplies for the re-equipping of the Serbian and Montenegrin armies were left rotting on the quays in Albania, in order to induce the populace to believe that the Allies had deserted them. It is also charged that the Montenegrins repaired the Giakova-Scutari road to enable the Austrians to advance against the Serbians.

It is claimed that King Nicholas was in secret agreement, before the outbreak of war, to cede Lovcen to the Austrians. The defence of the mountain was only sufficient to lull the suspicions of the Allies.

Italy refused to supply Montenegro with guns and munitions because they would simply have handed them over to Austria.

#### SHELL ORDERS FARMED OUT AT HUGE PROFITS

Hon. Wm. Pugsley Makes Sensational Speech Yesterday—Shell Committee Must Face Some Very Grave Charges.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Jan. 19.—Hon. William Pugsley, minister of public works in the late Laurier government, in a speech in the house yesterday made grave charges against the shell committee, in the placing of contracts to the amount of \$300,000,000 to be paid for out of British funds.

Mr. Pugsley declares that members of the committee placed orders with their own firms at an extravagant rate of profit, and sub-let orders at immense profits. He states that a member of the Canadian Parliament acted as middleman in farming out the orders.

One manufacturer was offered a contract on condition that he agreed to pay one and a half per cent. commission to a man who was in close touch with General Bertram, chairman of the committee. The speech continues today. It has made a great sensation in the House.

#### MORE ADVERTISING FOR PRINCE RUPERT

The following clipping from the Edmonton Bulletin, taken from the Toronto Globe, which journal took it from the Winnipeg Commercial, shows how Prince Rupert is being advertised as a fishing centre. It has, therefore, appeared in three prominent papers, and is certain to have received publicity in many other places:

"The Winnipeg Commercial says that in two days late in November more than half a million pounds of fresh halibut were landed at Prince Rupert. Packed in ice and loaded in refrigerator cars, the halibut is carried by the National Transcontinental Railway on its way to the eastern cities of Canada and the United States, where it arrives in perfect condition."

#### MAIL CAR DESTROYED BY FIRE NEAR EDSON

A vague rumor reached town yesterday afternoon that part of the westbound train had been burned. It seems that, near Edson, an explosion of gas occurred in the baggage and mail car, blowing the roof off. Fortunately the two clerks escaped without injury, but the car was completely destroyed in a few minutes by fire.

The train carried a heavy mail, including quite a batch of old country matter, and the exact extent of the loss is not known. Judging from the quantity of mail which arrived at Prince Rupert, very little, if any, of the matter for the terminal city was destroyed.

Immediately fire broke out, the burning car was detached from the rest of the train, thus averting any danger of the fire spreading to the other coaches.

#### GREEK KING IN DAILY FEAR OF ASSASSINATION

Constantine's Bodyguard Doubled—French Bag Two Zeps—Germans have Evacuated Fortress of Lutsk.

Milan, Jan. 19.—Fearing assassination, King Constantine of Greece has had his bodyguard at Athens doubled, and refuses to appear at any public functions. It is reported that the Entente emissaries are trying to stir up a revolution.

#### Two Zeppelins Gone

Amsterdam, Jan. 19.—French gunners at Rheims have destroyed two Zeppelins. The wrecked aircraft fell within the German lines. Evacuating Lutsk.

Kiev, Jan. 19.—The German forces are evacuating the important fortress of Lutsk.

#### Western Front.

London, Jan. 19.—An official report states that a large portion of the enemy's parapets near Festubert has been destroyed by the exploding of a mine. The enemy suffered from our artillery fire which followed.

Between the Oise and the Aisne our batteries shattered the German trenches, and in Champagne and in Woivre our big guns have been active at several points.

#### KING NICHOLAS OF MONTENEGRO GOES TO ITALY

Peace Negotiations broken off—Montenegrin Report States That King Surrendered to Save His Country.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Jan. 19.—The French Embassy announces that all peace negotiations between Austria and Montenegro have been broken off as the Austrian conditions are unacceptable. King Nicholas is leaving for Italy.

#### Montenegrin Report.

According to a report from Cetinje, the capital of Montenegro, King Nicholas has issued a proclamation on behalf of his people, declaring the surrender of the country to the enemy. This is deemed necessary to prevent the complete ruin of the country.

For Italy, the new Austrian success has a most serious aspect, as the long narrow Italian peninsula is particularly vulnerable to an attack from the sea. It is stated that the possession of Cattaro by the Austrians is as great a menace to Italy as the taking of Calais would be to Britain.

#### SWEDEN EXPERIENCES AN EXTREMELY COLD WINTER

London, Jan. 17.—The Post's Stockholm correspondent reports Arctic conditions throughout Sweden, with a record temperature of 23 degrees below zero registered on land. Twenty steamers were frozen in at Goffe during the last few days, and ice breakers are powerless to release them. The Aland Islands have been isolated since the middle of December, and there is much suffering from the lack of food throughout Bothnia region, which is thickly covered with snow for the first time since 1888. Such a severe winter has been unknown for a century.

## ULTIMATUM TO GREECE

Just when things were beginning to look comparatively comfortable in the Near East, comes the report that Greece is likely to enter the war on the side of the Teutons. Thanks probably to the censor, there has been no warning that matters were approaching such a climax, but it is a relief to learn that, at last, there are signs of action on the part of the Entente powers in bringing Greece to the scratch.

King Constantine has gone on playing with fire long enough, and the British and French ultimatum should bring him down off the fence at one big jump. It would be quite nice to have that gentleman intimate that his soldiers will be allowed to aid the Entente Allies, but that is more than can be expected of this worthy Hohenzollern. There is no doubt as to where the sympathies of the Greek people are, as was instanced recently by the threats of mutiny on the part of several regiments which had grown tired of the stalling methods of their leaders. Whichever way his kingship decides there is a warm time in store for him now, having flirted with both sides for months past.

It is abundantly clear that, for once, Britain and her Allies have paved the way for a considerable distance ahead, and that they are quite ready for eventualities. With 400,000 men impregably entrenched on Greek soil, they have nothing to fear from the enemy. Experts have repeatedly declared that the Allied position is strong enough to withstand the attacks of a much greater force than they have at their command, so that they can await the onslaught with the utmost confidence. The fight-

ing on the western front has proven that the defending army when properly entrenched has an enormous advantage and that invariably the attacking force suffers very heavily.

The presentation of an ultimatum to Greece is further evidence of Allied preparedness. It is simply an intimation that France, Italy and Britain are ready for the fray; that Greece had better decide quickly, and that the Allies are not greatly concerned as to which side she officially supports now. The most remarkable part of the Near East operations is the silence regarding Russian movements. Weeks ago, a Russian fleet was bombarding Varna and there were reports that an army of the Czar had landed on Bulgarian soil. Possibly one of the chief reasons for the forcing of Constantine's hand by the Entente Powers is the knowledge of exactly where the Russians are, and how they are situated. We must just wait and see, since the news is so meagre, but we can afford to wait confidently.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

The report that Bulgaria and Turkey desire to open separate peace negotiations offsets the Vienna report regarding Montenegro, and the probability is that they are equally untrue.

King Constantine must be now realizing that the Allies do not care much for his benevolent neutrality.

Mayor McCaffery has already taken hold of the city's affairs in quiet, businesslike fashion.

## BELGIAN INDUSTRIES ARE SWALLOWED UP

The industrial and commercial paralysis into which Belgium has been plunged by the German invasion has put an end to all activities except one. On that one alone Belgium is dependent for such livelihood as can exist under the terrible conditions of oppression. That one great activity is the Belgian Relief Committee, a neutral organization, which is more sacred to the Germans than the Red Cross, and a part of that organization is the Belgian Relief Committee of Montreal, which is supervising the shipments from Canada of wheat and flour, the two great essentials to the starving population.

It seems almost an anomaly that such an efficient organization should spring up out of the chaos resulting from the war, but the fact remains that the Belgian Relief Committee is probably one of the best managed details of the present war. On it 2,500,000 Belgians are absolutely dependent and to it practically everyone of the balance of the seven million people are obliged to look for a part of their sustenance.

Perhaps a comparison would illustrate the situation better. The conditions are practically the same as they would be if seven-eighths of the population of Canada had to look each day to a distribution bureau for bread and all the residents of the province of Quebec were forced to get relief from a committee or starve or freeze to death.

This committee has as its working capital the generosity of the people of the world—those who, for humanity's sake, give

## COLD STORAGE PLANT WANTED FOR SEWARD

Seward, Alaska, Jan. 17.—The Chamber of Commerce is endeavoring to bring about the establishment of a cold storage plant to give small fishermen a chance to take advantage of the great halibut bank between Middleton Island and Kodiak. At present these banks are being fished by Canadian and American steam trawlers. Small boats are unable to compete, because the present cold storage facilities are too far away for them. The banks are only fifty miles distant from Seward.

One hundred thousand hair seals and sea lions, it is estimated, make their home on and about the rocks of Resurrection Bay, and feed upon vast quantities of fish. Fishermen desire the extermination of the seals, and will ask aid of the government in destroying them. The skins, seals and oil of the seals have market value, and the flesh could be converted into fertilizer.

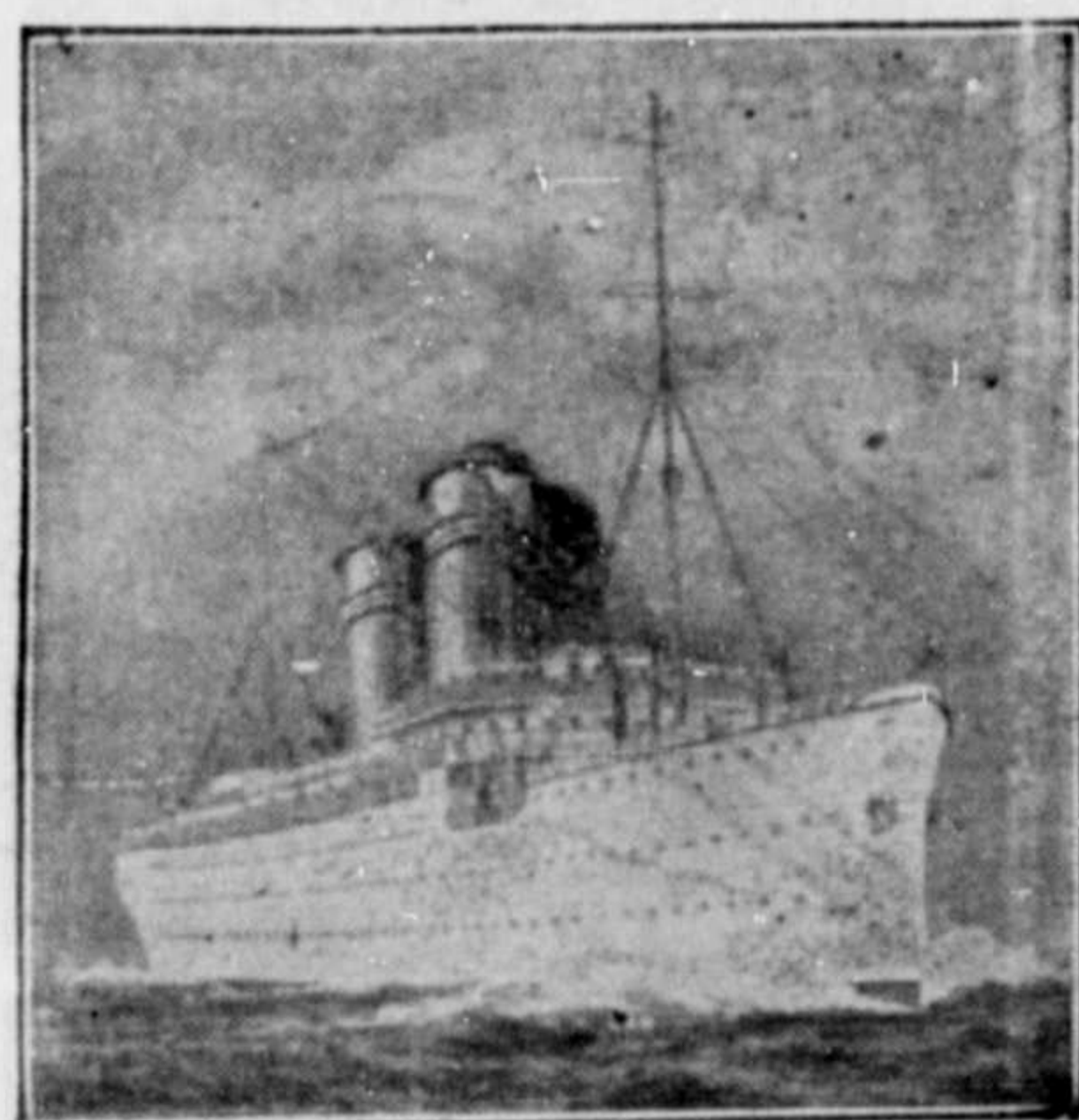

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 40 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

### CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia at its next session on behalf of the City of Prince Rupert for an Act containing provisions which are shortly stated as follows:—

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates, and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.
