TURKISH FORCES ROUTED BY THE RUSSIANS

GERMANS REPULSED ON RIGA FRONT—MONTENEGRO AND AUSTRIA RESUME WAR

TURKS ROUTED BY RUSSIANS IN THE CAUCASUS

Several Turkish Units Annihilated—Retreat Resembles Complete Route—Germans Repulsed On River Dvina.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Jan. 20.—The Turkish forces in the Caucasus have been routed on a sixty-six mile front by the Russians in the Lake Tortum region.

The retreat resembles a complete rout, and several Turkish units have been annihilated. The enemy is retreating towards Erzerum.

Germans Repulsed.

On the Riga-Dvinsk front, the Germans attempted to land on the River Dvina below Freiderichstadt, but were repulsed. The Germans used gas in their attack. Safety First.

London, Jan. 20.—The German General Somar has issued an order to his troops in Russia to take all the supplies they need and confiscate the rest without delay. He said, "We are in an enemy country and humanitarian considerations have no value. There is more safety in taking than in giving."

FIRST MEETING OF NEW SCHOOL BOARD

The newly constituted Board of School Trustees met yesterday afternoon, all the members being present. The meeting was called to order by O. H. Nelson, last year's chairman, who proposed that Dr. Kergin be elected chairman for the year. This was seconded by George D. Tite, and carried unanimously.

A. H. McPherson appeared before the board suggesting some changes which he thought necessary at Seal Cove school.

The board decided to have the building inspector and the fire chief report upon any changes deemed necessary in any of the schools. Accounts were passed and school organization for the year discussed.

Inspector Lord and the principals will be asked to confer with the board regarding the school accommodation.

SERIOUS SHOOTING ACCIDENT YESTERDAY

A very serious shooting accident occurred yesterday at Cloyah Bay, when Charles Gustafson, who was out shooting with a companion, accidentally shot himself in the lower part of the body. He was carried by his companion to a rowboat and brought to the city about 3 p. m., after having suffered severely from exposure and pain for several hours.

The injured man, who lived with an uncle at 353 Ninth Ave., West, is now in a precarious condition at the general hospital. Fortunately he is physically robust, and hopes are entertained for his recovery.

ANOTHER COMPANY WILL BORE FOR OIL

Everett H. Lea, one of the pioneer oil operators of Graham Island, has returned from a visit to Portland and Seattle with the encouraging information that another company is to commence drilling on Graham Island probably early in the summer, a syndicate of Americans having acquired leases. Mr. Lea was called into consultation as being one of the best posted men on the oil prospects of the west coast of Graham Island, and he took along the log of the pioneer well which shows the different stratas through which the drill passed.

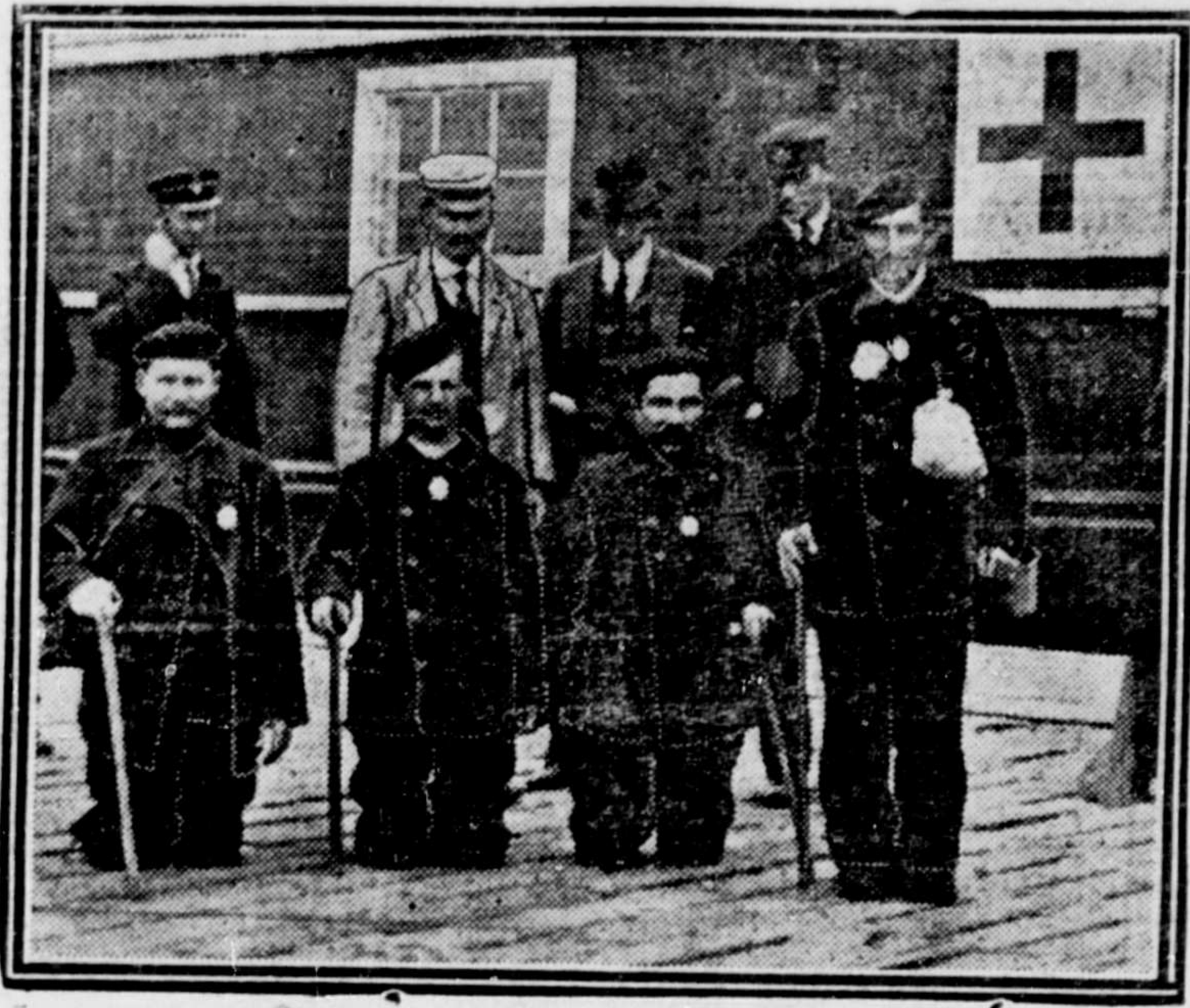
While in Portland, Mr. Lea met J. W. Couvert, oil expert, who first reported on the west coast and he said the log of the well was just as he had expected and there were excellent chances of proving out as he predicted four years ago. There was as good a chance on the west coast of Graham Island he told Mr. Lea, as any prospective field he had ever seen. C. D. Emmonds, another engineer interested in Graham Island, is also in Portland and he too was enthusiastic over Mr. Lea's report. Some members of the Portland syndicate are expected to be here in a few weeks on their way north.

In Seattle Mr. Lea met several oil men, including an eminent geologist, who, when he saw the log of the Graham Island well and the green shale occurring at 1,500-foot depth, said if it was soft shale it was similar to the occurrence in proven fields. This was a very satisfying statement to men here who are interested in the Graham Island oil fields. Supt. McCaig reports the green shale was so soft as to ooze into the hole. Mr. Lea said that another company he has in course of formation will be ready to register in about thirty days—Vancouver Sun.

BRITISH NAVY CONTROLS ENTIRE GERMAN COAST

Washington, Jan. 20.—United States naval experts declare that the naval situation is completely under the control of Britain's fleet. Britain has the ships to carry out an actual blockade of the entire German coast and no redistribution would be required. Provisions have been made for an addition of 50,000 men to the British navy.

Powerful Planes.

London, Jan. 20.—Germany's new powerful aeroplanes are said to out-engine and out-power the British planes. Berlin reports the destruction of thirteen British trains by one of those new machines.

AUSTRIANS AND MONTENEGRINS AGAIN FIGHTING

King Nicholas Remains with his Men—Constantine of Greece Complains—Escaped Runs Retaken.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Jan. 20.—Fighting between Austria and Montenegro has been resumed, the Montenegrin generals having refused to surrender. King Nicholas remains with his army to organize their defences.

Constantine Complains.

Paris, Jan. 20.—It is asserted by the press that King Constantine of Greece, in a new interview, made angry complaints against the Allies. He said that, while the Allies occupy a dozen different points in Greece, it is cant for them to talk about the German violation of Belgium and Luxembourg.

Prisoners Recaptured.

Amherst, N.S., Jan. 20.—Twelve German prisoners who escaped across the border by means of a tunnel 150 feet long, have all been recaptured.

Holland Independent.

London, Jan. 20.—The floods in Holland grow. The Dutch government, in a statement, requests that foreign sympathisers do not open relief funds.

MUNITIONS GRAFT

The speech on the methods of the shell committee, by Hon. Wm. Pugsley, seems to have caused quite a sensation in Ottawa. Why it should have done so is rather hard to understand, since it has long been clear that a merry game was going on amongst the contractors and the awarders of the contracts who, for some reason or another, were entitled to a share of the good things, but it was left to the really top-notch artists in the business to handle the munitions. Even the rake-off in the automobile business has to take a back seat when the \$300,000,000 of munitions contracts is brought along.

D. A. Thomas was sent over to Canada to find out where the exorbitant profits were going, and there is no doubt he managed to bring things down to a fairly honest basis. Being a discreet man, he did not make public in Britain what he had discovered in Canada, but doubtless the members of the British cabinet are thoroughly conversant with the way in which Britain was soaked, just for friendship's sake. How the British cabinet ministers must admire Canadian methods, taking the work of the shell committee as an example.

Yesterday, Mr. Pugsley's speech would be quoted in Britain, and the British people will be anxious to know exactly who the miscreants were who reckoned that the Empire's extremity was their opportunity to get rich quick. It is only fair that they should know, as, otherwise, the stigma will be attached for generations to every Canadian and to everything Canadian. The Canadian soldiers have earned a magnificent reputation on the battlefields of France and Fland-

ers, while a section of the men who remained at home have spent their time and energies in plundering the mother country. These men should, in the interests of Canada and of common honesty, be held up to the public gaze that men may know them. Every Canadian worthy of the name should rise against the men who have brought dishonor to the fair name of Canada.

If any member of the Canadian Parliament has been in any way whatever connected with this business, he should be sent to the penitentiary, if the law allows that course. Reading a man out of a political party is not sufficient punishment for an offence like this. If it cannot be termed treason, it is at least treachery of the meanest description. It must make the blood of every man in the British Isles boil to think that he and his family have been practicing the strictest economy in their personal expenditure, with a view to releasing as much capital as possible for the purchase of war munitions, while men in Canada have raked in millions of that hard earned money simply by signing a contract form. Unless this matter is cleared up, and cleared up thoroughly, Canada will stand disgraced before Britain, India, South Africa, New Zealand and Australia for all time.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The reports regarding the Montenegrin episode are still conflicting, but it seems clear that Austria has gained the upper hand there, either by fair means or foul.

The evacuation of Lutska was the brightest news in yesterday's despatches. The Russians are



evidently regaining the ground lost last year.

The Entente emissaries are blamed for stirring up a revolution in Greece. It will be interesting to watch for the distribution of the blame when the German people start something around Berlin.

Pugsley must have been in his element shelling the shell committee.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia at its next session on behalf of the City of Prince Rupert for an Act containing provisions which are shortly stated as follows:—

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

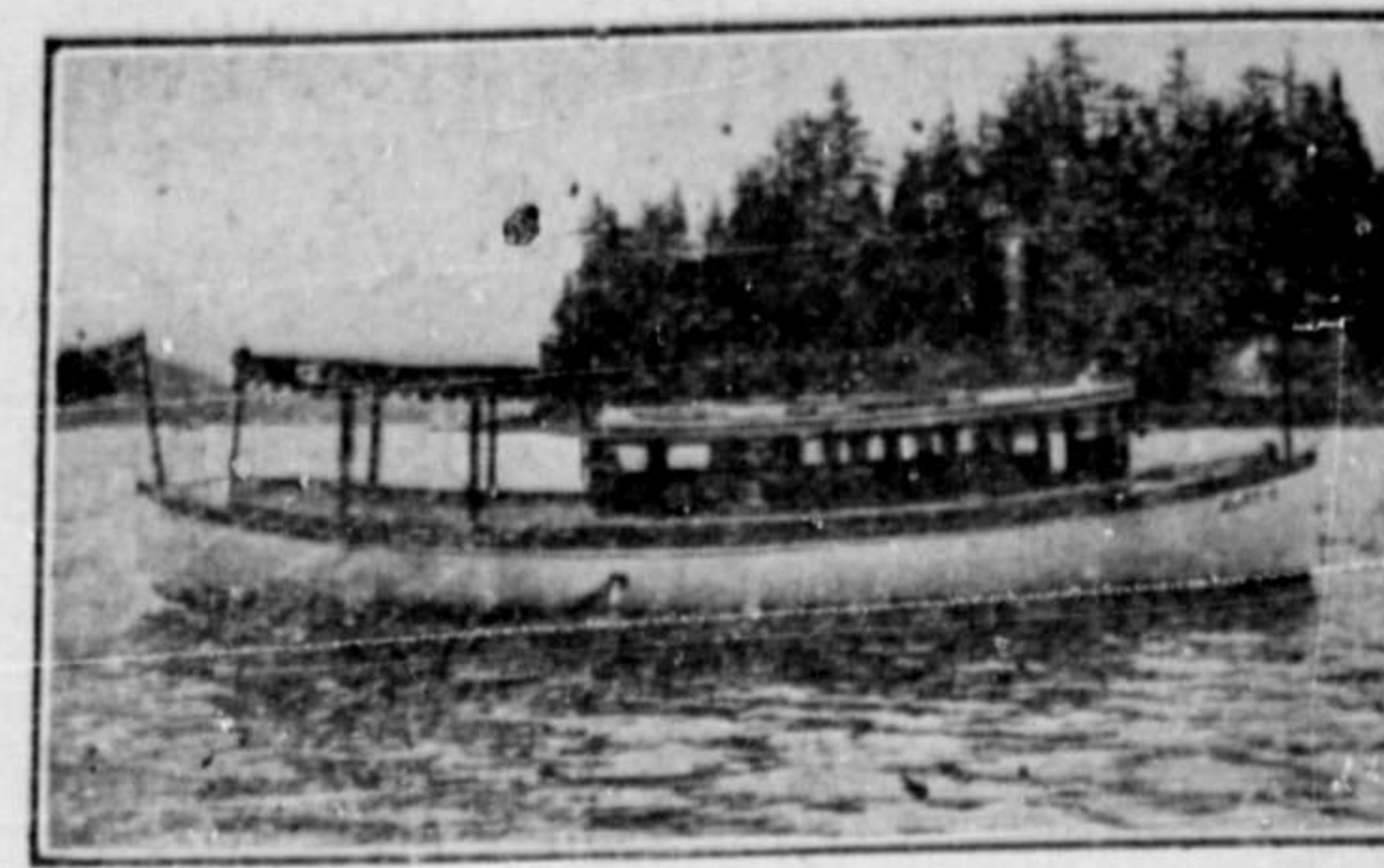
