RUSSIANS PURSUING DEMORALIZED TURKS

London, Jan. 24.—The Russians have scored another brilliant victory against the Turks and have driven them back on Erzerum. The Russians are still pursuing and the Turkish force is now quite demoralized.

Last Territory Gone

The last German territory in Africa has been captured, the Kameruns being now entirely in British hands.

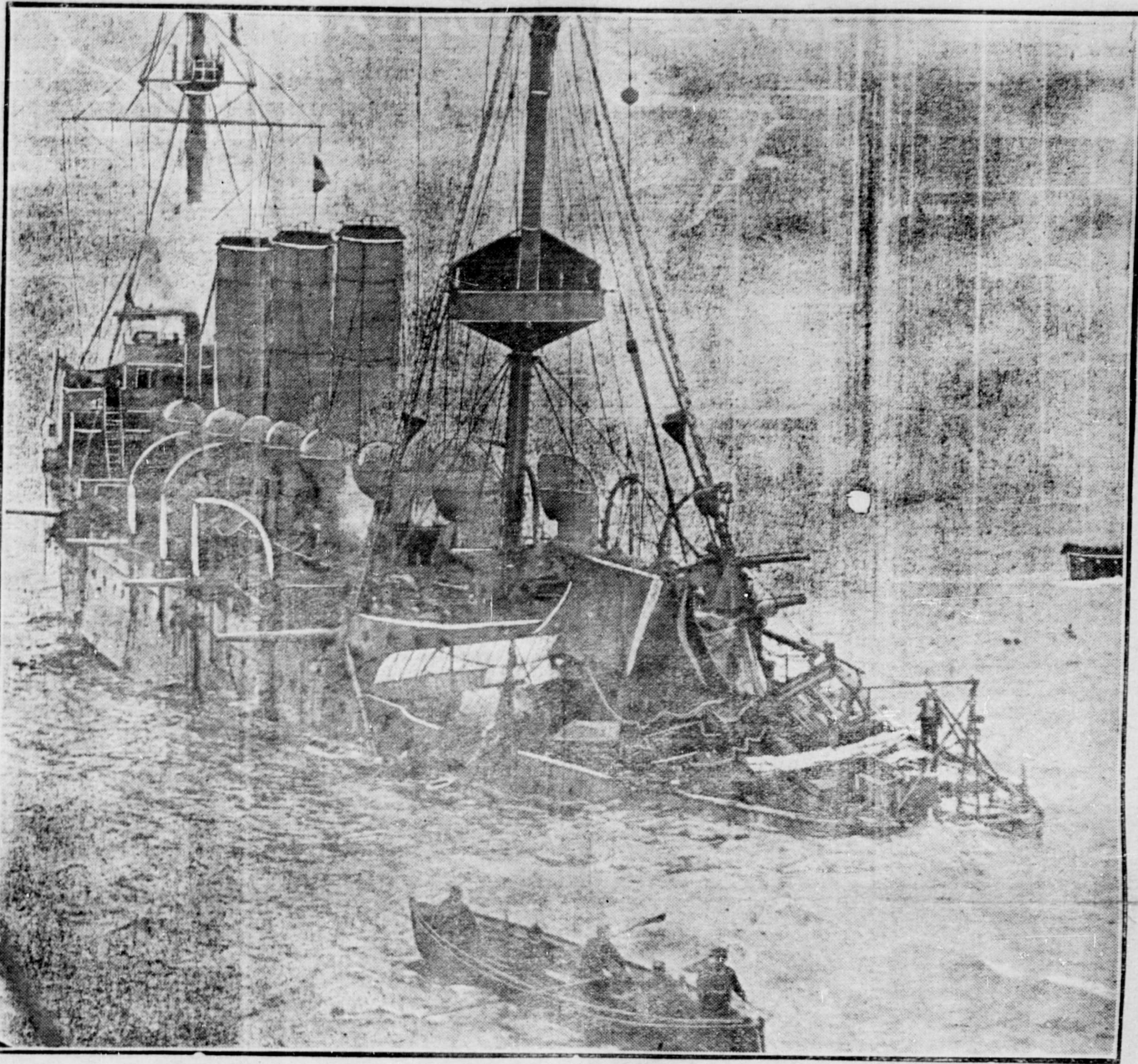

WHAT'S THE BRITISH NAVY DOING? THE LOSS OF THE GALLANT H. M. S. HERMES.
"I saw the great vessel finally give herself up to the deep. It was a weird and moving spectacle, but the all prevailing fact, as she disappeared was the Majesty of the Sea." This statement from an eye witness describes the sinking of H. M. S. Hermes, a 16-year-old light cruiser which was submarined early in the war in the English Channel, while protecting British and world's commerce. This picture has just been released by the censor and comes through our connection with the London Daily Mail picture services. In the photograph can be seen men swimming about in the water, and the nose of a comrade ship on the right, with a life boat in the fore-water. On the deck of the Hermes, aft, can be seen an officer coolly directing the work of rescue. Nearly all the officers and crew were saved, but the Captain, whose figure can be dimly seen on the bridge went down with his ship.

RECEPTION IN AID OF BELGIAN RELIEF

About \$17 was raised at a reception given by Mrs. G. R. Naden on Saturday afternoon for the Belgian Relief Fund. Mr. Naden delivered an address in which he traced the history of the Belgian people from the earliest times up to the present.

A striking feature was the presentation in life of the Belgian flag by three little girls, Flo Burritt, Doreen Grant and Margaret Kergin, who appeared in costumes of the colors of the Belgian flag—black, yellow and red. Refreshments were served during the afternoon.

The Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company has shipped 3 tons of frozen halibut and salmon to Seattle for trans-shipment to Honolulu by one of the American-Hawaiian steamers. This is the first shipment of Prince Rupert fish to the Hawaiian Islands, and, if successful, will be the forerunner of others.

VICTORIA SENATOR HAS PASSED AWAY

Hon. George Riley, one of British Columbia's senators, passed away at his home on Oak Bay Avenue, Victoria, last Wednesday.

For two years he had been in failing health, though he was able to attend last session in Ottawa.

Senator Riley was born at St. Catharines, Ont., 73 years ago and formerly represented Victoria in the House of Commons, resigning his seat to allow the late William Templeman to accept the nomination on becoming a member of the cabinet. Senator Riley was a Liberal.

What might have been a very serious fire at the Hotel Prince Rupert was quelled just in time last night about ten o'clock. How the fire originated is not quite clear, but it may have been caused by a faulty chimney. Beginning between the ceiling of the basement and the floor of the bar, the fire spread to the hall leading to the rooms on the floor above, doing considerable damage to the woodwork, carpets, etc.

Fortunately the hotel carries fire fighting appliances of its own, which were got to work immediately the outbreak occurred. The fire brigade was quickly on the scene and in short order the flames were mastered. The exact extent of the damage has not yet been estimated.

THE P. G. E.

With two new members of the Bowser cabinet in the city, one naturally expected that they would have enlightened the citizens, at the smoker on Friday night, as to what the government intends to do in regard to the affairs of the province. Of course, the occasion was a purely social affair and no political speeches were in order, that is, not really serious political speeches. These are reserved for the purely Conservative gatherings, while last night's function was an open affair, and the general public have no business whatever to have any information as to the work of the government.

The only definite statement made by either minister was that of Mr. Tisdall, to the effect that the government would see to it that the Pacific Great Eastern would be completed this year. Incidentally, he did not hazard a guess as to where the necessary \$7,000,000 are to come from, but of course that might have spoiled the social aspect of the meeting. However, the statement that the P. G. E. will be completed this year must have been extremely gratifying to the citizens of Prince Rupert, though, strange to say, William Manson is rather an unemotional gentleman, and may only have succeeded in hiding his deep sense of satisfaction from the public gaze. In fact, it was impossible to tell whether it was a thrill of delight or a stream of ice-water which trickled along William's spine, though we have a suspicion it felt like the latter.

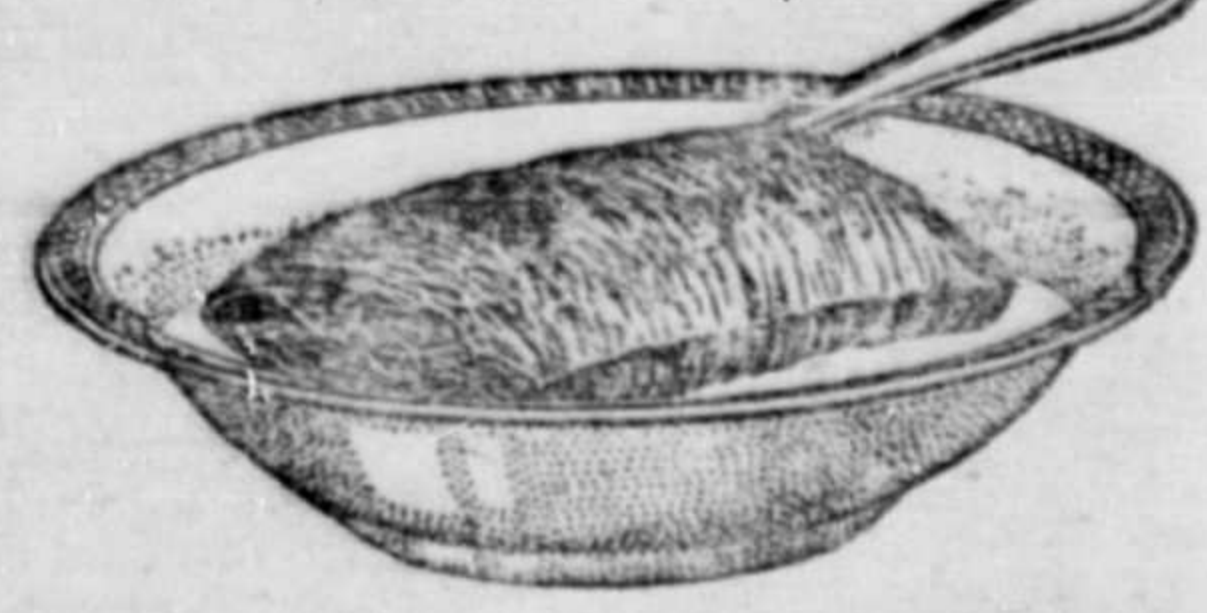
There is a fear in some quarters that Mr. Tisdall had somehow got his Prince George notes mixed up with his Prince Rupert speech, and that seems a feasible explanation of his

reckless remark. A budding statesman whose mind is completely filled with a desire to find out just whether the people want balloons, aeroplanes, hydroplanes, schooners or fishing boats, or merely jobs, cannot be expected always to keep an eye on the map, still it was rather unfortunate that he should have broached such a tender subject to a Prince Rupert audience.

Mr. Tisdall went on to dwell, in the well known Sir Richard style, on the present prosperity and still greater future prosperity of the province, at the same time inferring that the McBride government had placed the timber on the soil; the minerals in the mountains, and the fish in the sea. He also quoted figures to show that the province is not so heavily in debt as might have been supposed, considering what has been squandered. His figures will be dealt with later. His tone was still the McBride tone. You see it takes some time for a rubber stamp to take on a new impression. Bowser has already indicated that the past policies had failed; that the cause of the failure had been removed, and that the future was the thing. The past was something only to be forgotten. Mr. Tisdall still clings to the McBride style of repeater, but he will get on to the Bowser note with a little practice. The change is too new yet to have taken effect.

William Manson treated the audience to his old familiar song about seeing that this district got its share, though his partner had the temerity to hint that, in spite of the splendid condition of the province, there would not be so much of "the stuff" as formerly. William always insinuates that but for his heroic efforts, this

northern part of the province might as well be in Alaska for all that the rest of the government care. If William had such a struggle to squeeze out the little we do get, compared with what we put in, he is admitting that there is urgent need of a change at Victoria.

PRINCE RUPERT HOLDS FIRST ICE CARNIVAL

The first ice carnival in the history of Prince Rupert was held on the Market Place rink on Saturday night. Unfortunately, conditions were not of the best, the cold being intense with the thermometer somewhere around zero, and the attendance accordingly was small.

The following were the results in the various competitions:

CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia at its next session on behalf of the City of Prince Rupert for an Act containing provisions which are shortly stated as follows:—
(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.
(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.
(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.
(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.
(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208: being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund.

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$4.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

FROST-BITTEN RANCHER'S TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE

Henry Hornbeck, the rancher from north of Jasper who was so badly frozen some days ago, reached Rupert last Friday night and is now in the hospital here. His story is one of the saddest ever unfolded in the north. It seems that the unfortunate man, while out hunting, got his fingers frozen. Returning to his shack, he was unable to open his coat to get a match to light his lamp. Seeking warmth, he tumbled into bed with his clothes on, thinking that his hands would be thawed out in the morning. On waking, he found his arms frozen to the elbow.

Setting out for his nearest neighbor's place, eight miles away, in a temperature 40 below, he was overcome by the excruciating pain and became insane. A man out hunting saw him dancing around in the snow, and returned to police headquarters and reported that he had seen a drunken man in the bush. The police went out and brought the poor fellow to Jasper, where he was detained for about a day awaiting a train for Hazelton.

Here, it would appear, the unfortunate man suffered from red-tape as well as frost-bite, as he could have been landed in Edmonton in about eight hours, whereas he was taken to Hazelton, a journey of 36 hours, during which time he was tied down in the baggage car. On arriving at Hazelton, he had to be hauled for over two miles strapped on a sleigh. Now he has been transferred to Prince Rupert. It is said that the sole reason why he was not rushed across into Alberta was that he was found in British Columbia. If the letter of the law is more important than the common law of humanity, there is something seriously wrong, and, if the facts, as given to the Daily News, are correct, there is room for investigation.

BELGIAN FUND
