## NAVAL ACTIVITY ALONG NORWEGIAN COAST

### RUSSIANS HAVE SURROUNDED ERZERUM--ZEPPELIN DEALS OUT DEATH IN PARIS

#### ERZERUM FORT BOMBARDED BY THE RUSSIANS

Authorities Flee on Approach of Army--Russians Advancing Along the Tigris--May Join the British.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, Jan. 31.--The Russians have inflicted a fresh defeat on the Turks in the Caucasus, and have now surrounded the fortress and the town of Erzerum.

The Turkish authorities fled at the approach of the Russian army, whose artillery is now bombarding the fortress.

**Along the Tigris.**  
A Russian column is advancing along the valley of the River Tigris. The Turks are now fortifying Angora and Siwas, which are respectively 215 and 425 miles east of Constantinople.

The Russians are moving in three directions with the object of effecting a junction with the British expeditionary forces.

#### ALASKAN PORT HAS A VERY CHILLY EXPERIENCE

F. G. Dawson, who has just returned from a business trip to the north, reports that vessels arriving in Alaskan ports have the appearance of fantastic icebergs, so thickly coated are they with ice and snow. Juneau is having it 16 to 18 below zero, accompanied by a sixty-mile gale at times. Many of the store windows are boarded up, the glass having been shattered by the wind, while many householders have been frozen out of their homes and have had to take refuge in the hotels. Evidently Prince Rupert has had it comparatively mild after all.

#### 24 KILLED WHEN AIRSHIP DROPS BOMBS ON PARIS

Zepppelin Raid Under Cover of Fog Takes Paris by Surprise--Sub-Lieutenant Chases Enemy off.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, Jan. 31.--A Zepppelin attacked Paris during a fog on Saturday night, killing twenty-four and injuring twenty-seven people. The airship was first discovered by its dropping a flare to give the pilot the location of the city.

A French sub-lieutenant, who then sighted the Zepppelin in the air, gave chase and pursued it for fifty minutes at a distance of only one hundred feet. He managed to strike the Zepppelin many times, but failed to bring the monster down.

#### EASTERN CANADA MUCH BE-KNIGHTED

Ottawa, Jan. 29.--The present year of grace starts with one hundred and twenty knights scattered throughout the length and breadth of Canada. Although they have not been violently employed so far there is reason to believe that the military authorities look upon them as our first line of defence and would not hesitate to mobilize them in case of real danger such as an invasion by the Esquimaux.

Looking over the list in the Parliamentary Guide one is struck with the fact that fully fifty per cent. of the knights are concentrated in Ottawa, Montreal and Toronto and fully seventy-five per cent. in Eastern Canada. Thus the bulk of the force is within easy reach. Ottawa has the largest number of any single city in Canada, and this no doubt was also done with a military purpose. It is not without significance that Major General Sam recently became a knight himself and thus got into direct touch with this gallant company. When the fighting is over and Sir Sam leads our heroes on to Berlin he will be found riding at the head of a select brigade of knights and honorary colonels. In view of the glory it stores the shierred ranks of knights and honorary colonels are constantly filling up and will soon be in bottle array.

When the first contingent left Quebec Major Gen. Sam stood on the King's Wharf and waved them farewell. "Good bye boys," he shouted, "God be with you. I can't go." He left them in the hands of the Almighty as the next best. But the knights and the honorary colonels he will take charge of himself.

As a Knight of the Bath--mostly electric--Sir Sam has a soft spot in his head for this order, but he shows no partiality. Knights of St. Michael and St. George, Knights of Pythias, Knights of Columbus, Ten Knights in a Bar Room--they all get a square deal from Sam. Rumor has it that he is urging the gov-

San Diego, Cal., Jan. 31.--Eighteen bodies of the victims of the bursting of the dam in the lower Otay Valley have been recovered.

It is feared that many have been carried out to sea by the force of the rush of thirteen billion gallons of water which had been pent up in the reservoir.

At Cuyamaca, on Sunday a dam burst, releasing three billion gallons and fears are expressed that there has been serious loss of life and much damage done to property.

#### FRENCH MAKE MITYLENE AN AIRSHIP BASE

Greek Fortress Believed to be German Submarine Supply Base--French Land on Mitylene.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, Jan. 31.--Following the action by the Allies in taking possession of the Greek fortress at the entrance to the Gulf of Saloniki, which was suspected of being a German submarine supply base, French troops have landed on the Island of Mitylene.

Mitylene will become the headquarters for a flotilla of French aeroplanes which will make daily reconnaissances of the coast of Asia Minor.

**THE NATIONALISTS**

Now why should sober-minded Conservatives make such a howl about Col. Lavergne's treasonable vaporings especially when they approved without protest the Borden government's rewards of office to other Nationalists as anti-British and as treasonable in their talk as he? Indeed it may happen with him as it has happened with the others: the measure of his treason may prove to be the measure of his fitness for cabinet appointment, or for the Speaker's chair or for a seat on the Bench.

The plain fact is that, up to the present time, Lavergne, with all his wild words, has not been quite so offensive in his anti-British talk as were the half-dozen Nationalists who have been set in the seats of the mighty. Indeed he has this superior merit in that he has been consistent in his treason, while some of the others changed their political coats, but not their political character, and so, while Nationalists in their hearts, rejoice in the leaves and fishes of ultra-loyal Conservative office. Lavergne of late years has not been slack in his devotion to Nationalism as it is in Quebec, but in tireless zeal and in extravagant talk he was equalled if not outdone by Nantel and Blondin and Pelletier and Patenaude and Sevigny. He is still at his old job—their old job. They, every man with his tongue in his cheek, have been made "Hon." in name by the very government to which these sober-minded Orange-loyalists in Ontario gave their implicit allegiance. Is it not, therefore, condemnation of themselves when these straight-going Conservatives condemn the utterances from Lavergne which their party leaders in the gov-

ernment condoned and honored in Lavergne's associates?

Of course the pap-fed organs of cabinet ministers are not free agents. They must dance when their masters play. Their attitude to this whole miserable Nationalism movement depends wholly on what uses cabinet ministers like Messrs. Cochrane and Rogers and Reid and near-ministers like Sir Herbert Ames, think they can make the Nationalists serve. Usually it is deemed politically prudent to denounce the Nationalists in Ontario, but in Quebec the government gives them offices of high honor and high salaries.

Years ago Bourassa and Lavergne called themselves Liberals, but when they betrayed Liberalism and revealed the horns and hoofs of narrow anti-British Nationalism they were given short shrift, and never once did Sir Wilfrid Laurier allow them to play fast and loose with Canada's fundamental political principles. No one of these treason-talkers is allowed either to pretend to be a Liberal or to carry the honor badge of a Liberal office. Had Premier Borden repudiated the alliances made with Bourassa and the Nationalists by Hon. Frank Cochrane, Sir Herbert Ames, and others among his lieutenants, the impudence now flaunting itself in Quebec would have been castigated out of the way long ago. The humiliation of today is the natural out-growth of the Conservative-Nationalist alliance of 1911. That noisome brood of cross-breed chickens are not yet all home to roost.—Toronto Globe.

favorite resort for knight hawks, half a dozen of whom may generally be seen hanging around for crumbs.

Ottawa affords every convenience for knights who want to keep fit. The parliamentary library devotes a special section to their clothes, telling how to fold them neatly, how to ward off moths, and how to prevent dress swords from rusting by using them to comb the hair. Other books instruct the novice knight how to wear his coat, where to pin his medals, and when to leave his collar off. It appears that some days are Collar Days with the knights and some days are not, the latter probably when heavy work is to be done. Curiously enough no knight has been seen within the purlieus of Parliament without his collar and no doubt the absence of this aid to hauteur would be considered eccentric. In the Mother Country radical knights may sometimes appear in public without their collars as a matter of principle, but in Canada it is held to be bad form.

In days of old when a knight dressed for action he called in the plumber who charged him sixty cents an hour, and his time going and coming. But that expensive and inconvenient period is long gone by and nowadays when a knight would don his war paint he sends for the ladies tailor and the man milliner to button him up and tell him whether his feathers are on straight. Ottawa has a large number of these useful artificers and their bills are said to be fairly reasonable.

Another form of entertainment for knights is said to be the Round Table which is held at the residence of one of the leading

The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

**PRINCE GEORGE HAS**  
**A SPLENDID RECORD**

One of the best long-distance records made by a coasting steamer goes to the credit of this famous three-stacker. Capt. Donald, her master, has compiled a report on the ship's steaming during 1915, and it shows that she logged a total distance of 75,069 miles. Her actual steaming time was 204 days, 12 hours and 23 minutes, making her average speed 15.29 knots an hour. This is a truly remarkable performance for a coasting steamer. Early in the year she was laid up for some time, undergoing a general overhaul. In the spring the George started out on the regular semi-weekly schedule to Prince Rupert with her sister ship the Prince Rupert. In July the company inaugurated the tri-weekly service, and this kept the big ships moving at a fast pace. In about five months the George logged over 40,000 miles. The G. T. P. steamers maintain their schedules with the regularity of express trains—Victoria Colonist.
