RUMANIA READY TO OPPOSE BULGARIANS

GERMAN RAIDER SUNK SIX BRITISH TRADERS—ALLIED AEROPLANES RAID GHENT

BRITISH LINER WAS CAPTURED BY HUN RAIDER

Disguised German Raider Sunk Six British Traders—Crews Taken Prisoners—America Perturbed.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Norfolk, Va., Feb. 2.—Later information makes it clear that the capture of the Elder-Dempster liner Appam was effected by the German raider Mowe Essel, a vessel of 500 tons and heavily armed.

Disguised as a tramp steamer, and flying the British flag, she exchanged salutes with the Appam when that vessel was 200 miles north of Madeira, the largest of the Canary Islands.

On getting to close quarters, the Mowe Essel dropped the false canvas covering her fore-castle, revealing guns trained on the liner. She had on board the crews of the British steamers Trader, Cordridge, Ariadne, Dtomonby, Farringford and Clan McTavish, which had been sunk by the Mowe Essel.

The Clan McTavish, of the famous Clan Line of Glasgow, Scotland, put up a stiff fight before finally sinking. The Appam did not sight a single British or French warship during the whole voyage.

Washington Perturbed.
Washington is perturbed over the international complications which the harboring of the captured vessel at Norfolk involves.

Britain claims that the vessel was illegally captured and demands that it be released, or, if it is held as an auxiliary warship, that the Appam be forced to put to sea after re-fitting. All vessels have been warned to keep an outlook for a German submarine which is suspected of accompanying the Appam.

TRAFFIC DISORGANISED BY SNOWFALL IN SOUTH

Vancouver, Feb. 2.—Three feet of snow fell in Vancouver last night, while there was a heavy gale blowing in Victoria, accompanied by a fall of five feet of snow.

Street-car traffic has been tied up by a very heavy fall in Seattle, while the traffic is blocked between Bellingham and Kalem. No news can be got through to Onward Ho, which is evidently isolated as a result of the worst storm ever experienced in the state of Washington.

HOSPITAL BOARD HOLDS ITS ANNUAL MEETING.

The postponed annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Hospital Association was held in the police court on Monday night, Alderman Nelson being called away from the city council meeting to make a quorum. In intimating his retirement from the presidency, O. H. Nelson made reference to the pleasant associations connected with service on the board. During the year just passed, it had been necessary to economise and the directors had worked so well along that line that there was a deficit of only \$665 as against \$4,700 last year.

He then called upon George W. Morrow to take the chair.

Mr. Morrow, in referring to the good work done, said that the strictest economy in the operation of the hospital was still necessary. He went into the main features of the year's work of the institution, showing that affairs had been handled splendidly.

The annual reports were presented and adopted.

The following directors were elected for the year: G. W. Morrow, W. P. Lynch, Olier Besner, J. H. Thompson, and M. M. Stephens. These gentlemen, along with Ald. McClymont and Casey and the two provincial government representatives, constitute the board for the year.

BAFFLING DETECTIVE STORY AT WESTHOLME THEATRE

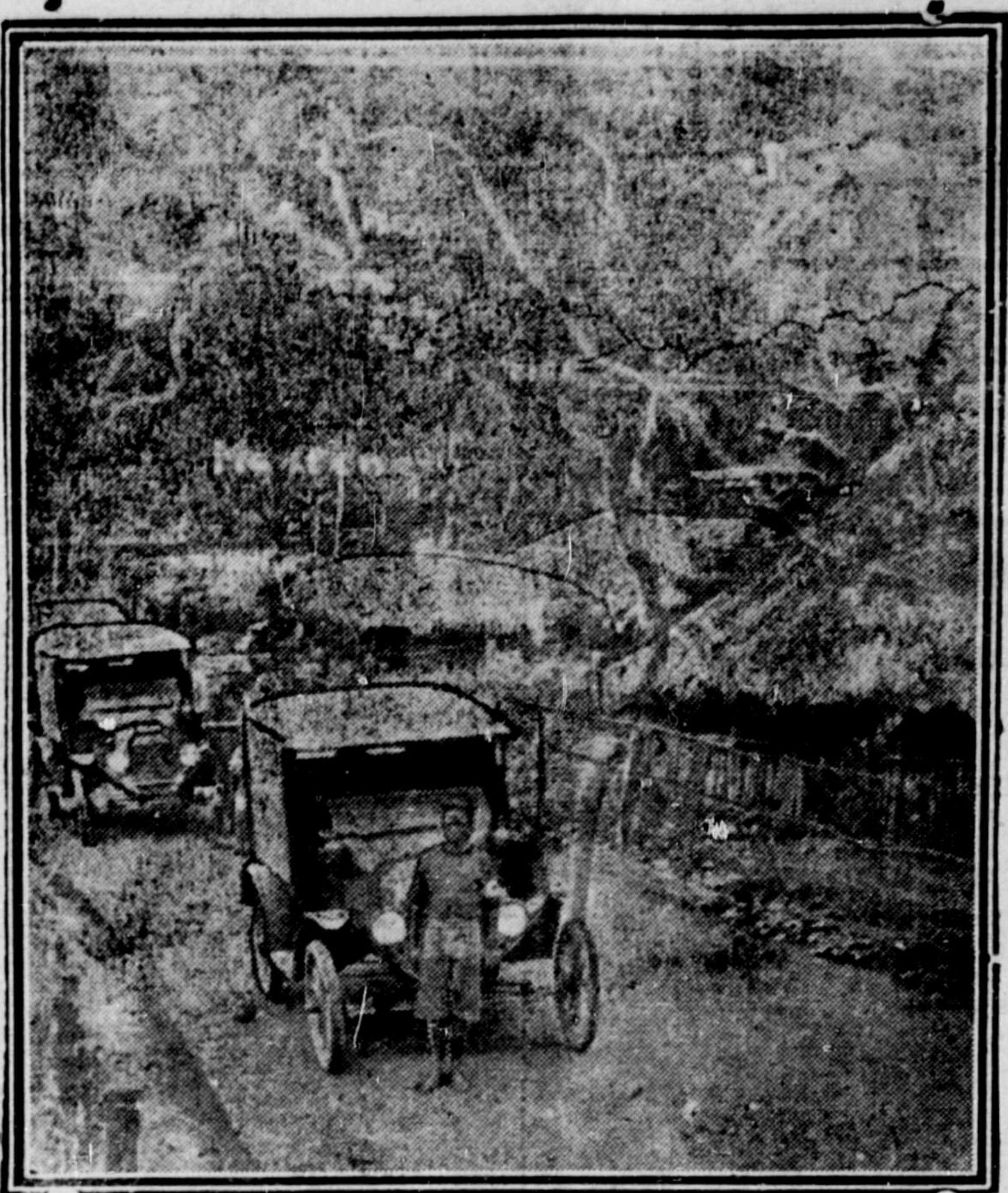
"The Clue," in which Blanche Sweet makes another great hit, is a detective story of the most intricate and baffling description, which is certain to delight all who love to solve mysteries.

MAQUINNA IS ASHORE IN SEYMOUR NARROWS

The C. P. R. steamer Princess Maquinna, which left Prince Rupert for Vancouver on Sunday night, has gone ashore on Maud Island, in Seymour Narrows. She is now beached and is not making water. The mishap occurred during a blinding snowstorm on Monday.

The salvage steamer, Salvor, from Esquimalt, and the C. P. R. tug, Nitinat, formerly the William Jolliffe, have gone to her assistance. There were no Prince Rupert people on board, all the passengers from the north being from outside points.

COPPER PROPERTY DEVELOPED AT KITIMAT

W. Porteous Sloan, who passed through Prince Rupert a few weeks ago on his way to Kitimat, has now returned to Vancouver. Mr. Sloan, along with James McLennan, located a valuable copper property some seven years ago at Miskatlah Bay and reports that the work there is proceeding satisfactorily, two shifts of twelve men being at work on the tunnel, which is now half completed.

There are three claims in the group, known as the Drum Lummon, Ibis and I. X. L. and a company, called The Drum Lummon Copper Mines, Ltd., has been incorporated to handle the development. The company will ship more men shortly from the south and it is confidently expected that the mine will soon become a shipper of ore.

RECORD COPPER OUTPUT

According to statistics for 1915 the last year has been a record one for British Columbia in the production of copper and zinc. The Hidden Creek property of the Granby Company was the largest producer of copper in the province, its output for the year being 22,000,000 pounds of the precious metal.

RUMANIA READY TO JOIN FORCES WITH THE ALLIES

Anti-Bulgarian Alliance Favored—Rumanian Army on the Frontier—Allied Air Raid on Ghent.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Feb. 2.—Rumania is ready to form an anti-Bulgarian alliance. Four-fifths of the Rumanian army is under arms and is concentrated on the Bulgarian-Roumanian frontiers.

Allied Air Raid

Amsterdam, Feb. 2.—Twenty-seven Allied aeroplanes are attacking Ghent, which is a German distributing point in Belgium.

One of the Zeppelins which recently raided Paris was forced to descend at Laen as a result of deadly fire from a French aeroplane.

Zeppelin over Holland

London, Feb. 2.—A Zeppelin was sighted off Ameland, in the Dutch Netherlands. Coast guards bombarded the airship, firing fifty shots, causing the Zeppelin to disappear northwards.

Fifty-four Killed

Fifty-four were killed and sixty seven injured in a Zeppelin raid on England on Monday night.

Bombs were dropped on several towns, and in the rural districts of Derbyshire, Leicestershire, Lincolnshire and Staffordshire. There was also some damage done to property.

VEGETABLES GROWN INSIDE ARCTIC CIRCLE

A letter received in Seward, Alaska, from Nolan, on the Koyukuk river, eighty miles north of the Arctic circle and the most northerly camp in Alaska tells of a record agricultural production in that region last summer. Mrs. J. H. Flower, postmistress at Nolan, raised a ton of cabbage, 500 lbs. of potatoes, 300 lbs. of carrots and two tubs full of tomatoes. The tomatoes, which were raised in a hothouse, sold at 50 cents each.

VITAL STATISTICS

The health officer reported to the council Monday night that the births for November and December totalled 34 and deaths 5. Three indigent sick were sent to the hospital.

THE CITY MARKET

The city market, which for the past five months has been run at a monthly loss to the ratepayers of \$75, has now been put upon a commission basis, a charge of 7 1-2 per cent. commission to shippers on all goods sold being the only money earned by the clerk. In order that the market may have every chance to keep on hand a full supply of all lines of produce, the bylaw permits the receipt of goods for sale from the provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. While one of the chief aims of the market is to encourage the local producer to sell produce here, it is felt that by giving this wide area for the receipt of shipments, the consumer will have a wider variety and a better and more regular supply of produce.

The bylaw calls for a \$2,000 bond from the clerk and also that the whole business shall be under the close supervision of the city treasurer and the purchasing agent, the treasurer making all disbursements to the consignors. While the books will be kept by the clerk, he will be obliged to furnish the treasurer with fully detailed statements of all transactions.

The fact that his earnings depend entirely on the amount of business done will tend towards urging the market clerk to devote every energy to the conducting of the business, though, in making this remark we cast no reflection upon the efforts of the late salaried clerk, as that gentleman undoubtedly devoted his best ability to the welfare of the market, as he saw it.

It must be candidly admitted that the market, up to the present, has been a failure. In its first phase, on a commission

basis, it failed through bad management. Under the salary plan, it failed financially because it could not carry the expense of a salaried official. It is sincerely hoped that, on the commission basis and with an extended field from which to draw supplies, it will at least prove a live concern. The new bylaw provides for the ample safeguarding of the interests of the shipper, while it also provides an opportunity for the producer, or any company of producers, to send an agent to the market to sell. The one essential feature of the market—the giving to the consumer an opportunity to purchase the fruits of the soil at almost first cost—is still preserved, and, under careful, progressive control, the market should now be stronger than ever it has been in the past.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The new mayor and council are already demonstrating that they have the interests of the city thoroughly at heart, and that the public utilities are to be safeguarded in every possible manner. The lessening of the operating expenses of the light and power plant is the first step towards the retrenchment which the citizens as a whole have been clamoring for, while it puts the plant on a better business basis.

Mayor McCaffery says that he intends to reduce the annual cost of operating the city by \$10,000. He is amply fulfilling his promise to conduct the city's business as he would a private firm's.

The reduction of the remuneration to the mayor and aldermen met with general approval, the only objection taken being that some thought it did not go far enough. Alderman McClymont

SOCIALIST CANDIDATE GETS FIFTEEN MONTHS

John Reid, Socialist candidate for the Alberta legislature for the district of Red Deer, has been sentenced to fifteen months in jail, having been found guilty of sedition.

In speeches from the public platform last year, Reid excused German atrocities, saying that the British were just as bad. He also advised people neither to enlist nor to give to the Patriotic Fund.

Reid is a native of Scotland and is a veteran of the Boer war, and is not unknown in Prince Rupert having lectured on Socialism in this city about two years ago.

WOMEN AS MOTOR CAR DRIVERS.—That the women are capable of handling automobiles, both in the way of driving and executing repairs, is proved by the members of the Women's Volunteer Ambulance Corps in England, an organization which conveys wounded "Tommies" to the hospitals and takes them for joy rides when they are convalescing.

FORMER NEWS EDITOR IS GAZETTED CAPTAIN

P. P. Acland, who was editor of The Daily News about two years ago, has been gazetted captain at the front, his promotion having been made in the trenches.

Captain Acland left for Europe with the Toronto Highlanders in the first contingent. Acland, formerly editor of the Canadian Magazine and now deputy minister of labor in the Borden government.

- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
