

## BERLIN SOUGHT AMERICAN INTERVENTION

### HUNS PLAN BIG OFFENSIVE IN FLANDERS--GERMANY CONFISCATES WOOLLENS

#### BERLIN SEEKS AMERICAN AID TOWARDS PEACE

Colonel House sent to Belligerent Capitals at Instigation of Von Bernstorff, Acting for Germany.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 3.—It transpires that, under orders from Berlin, Count Von Bernstorff, German Ambassador at Washington, suggested to Secretary Lansing that he ask President Wilson to send an envoy to the capitals of the belligerent countries to secure a basis on which to frame proposals for peace.

This was the object for the recent departure for Europe of Col. E. M. House. Colonel House, since leaving Washington, has conferred with the Hon. D. Lloyd George and Hon. A. J. Balfour, representing Great Britain; Von Jagow and Von Bethmann-Hollwegg, representing Germany, and M. Aristide Briand, the French premier. He is due to arrive in London from Germany on Monday, after having an interview with the Kaiser. He will interview Premier Asquith before leaving for the United States.

#### HALIBUT SCHOONER IN

Each fishing boat which arrives in port these days carries ample evidence of the hardships encountered by the deep sea fishermen in their calling. The Seattle brought in 70,000 pounds of halibut yesterday, which was sold to the Cold Storage Company. Like all other boats making this port at present, the Seattle was thickly coated with ice.

#### GERMANS PLAN BIG OFFENSIVE ON WEST FRONT

Huns will try to Blast way through to Calais or Dunkirk—Ship Belle of France Sunk—Lascars Missing.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 3.—The Germans are planning an offensive on a large scale against the Allies' left wing in Flanders, and will attempt to blast a way through to Calais or Dunkirk.

Strong bodies of infantry, supported by enormous masses of artillery are being prepared for the attack.

#### British Ship Sunk.

The British ship Belle of France has been sunk. She had on board 239 Lascars besides Europeans. The Europeans and 220 of the Lascars have been landed, but 19 of the latter are still missing.

#### Japanese Crew Saved.

New York, Feb. 3.—The crew of the Japanese steamer Takata Maru, which collided with the Silver Shell off Cape Race yesterday, have been saved and the vessel abandoned in a sinking condition, according to a wireless to the Anchor Line offices.

#### THE SNOWY SOUTH

George A. McNicholl, who returned from the south on the Prince Rupert this morning, states that it is a pleasure to get back to a moderate climate. In Vancouver, the snow fell so rapidly that the street car service was soon disorganized, the traffic along Granville and Hastings Streets being put out of business, while the jitneys also had to quit. So deep was the snow that it took Mr. McNicholl thirty minutes to reach the wharf from his hotel in a taxi, usually a matter of a few minutes.

#### THE ICY NORTH

He states that one native, who is approaching the century, assured him that there had not been so much ice on the Naas since the year of the Crimean war.

#### ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY FAREWELL TO J. NICOL

The members of St. Andrew's Society met in the rooms last night to take farewell to John Nicol, who left this morning for Baltimore, en route for his old home in Scotland.

President S. D. Macdonald, on behalf of the society, presented Mr. Nicol with a handsome gold watch, suitably inscribed, in recognition of his services to the society since its inception. Mr. Macdonald reminded the members that Mr. Nicol was one of the few remaining charter members of the society, and that, in the early days when the association was struggling for its existence, he had done a vast amount of work in keeping it in life, having spent much time and labor in fitting up the present quarters on Second Avenue.

#### BRITISH LINER APPAM IS MOVED TO JAMES RIVER

Question of Standing of Vessel is Still Undecided—German Cruiser Passed the Blockade.

Newport News, Feb. 3.—The Elder-Dempster liner Appam, in charge of a German prize crew, has moved to James river. The passengers are proceeding to England on board one of the steamers of the Dominion Line.

The question whether the vessel is a pirate ship, a prize of war, or a warship has not yet been decided by the American naval service.

#### German Cruiser Escaped.

Norfolk, Feb. 3.—Passengers who were on board the Appam at the time of her capture, report that the German cruiser Roon, a vessel of 9,000 tons and a speed of 21 knots, was in the vicinity of the Moewe Essel when the latter ship captured the Appam.

The cruiser, which directed the operations of the Essel by wireless, is the first large German warship which has broken the North Sea blockade.

#### HALIBUT STEAMER IS FIVE DAYS OVERDUE

Fears are entertained for the safety of the halibut steam trawler Onward Ho, owned by the New England Company. This vessel was last spoken off the Alaskan coast on January 18th, when she had 180,000 pounds of halibut aboard.

She should have arrived in Vancouver four or five days ago, but there is still no word of her. It is possible that she may have taken shelter along the coast, as there were terrific gales and mountainous seas running from the 19th to the 21st.

#### GERMAN STOCKS OF WOOLLENS TO BE CONFISCATED

All Textiles Grabbed for use of Army and Navy—Snow Brings Down Cathedral Dome in Seattle.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Feb. 3.—The most far-reaching war measure yet proposed has been brought down in the Reichstag. The government will confiscate all stocks of woollens and textiles of all descriptions suitable for the use of the German army and navy.

This is one of the direct effects of the North Sea blockade, Germany having largely depended upon Britain for supplies of all kinds of woollen goods in the past.

#### Cathedral Collapses.

Seattle, Feb. 3.—The snow-storm yesterday did damage to the extent of \$75,000. The dome of St. James Cathedral collapsed under the weight of snow and fell a distance of 120 feet. It is believed that there were no fatalities.

Bellingham is isolated as a result of the storm and a blizzard is still raging there.

**RETRENCHMENT**

To make a cut in wages is not a pleasant duty for any firm or corporation to have to perform, but, at a time like the present, it is in many cases an absolute necessity. Prince Rupert, owing to the general setback which set in in Canada after the real estate boom, and which was emphasized by the outbreak of war in Europe, has not developed as was expected, though the looked for development has only been postponed. In the management of the city affairs, as in every line of endeavor, the utmost optimism prevailed and the highest wages were paid to employees. When the old steam plant of the light and power department was side tracked on the completion of the hydro-electric plant at Shawatians, the steam engineers were given work at the new plant as operators, their wages being maintained at the old level. As a matter of fact there were six steam engineers so employed.

Today, the new plant is still in its infancy and there is not sufficient industrial enterprise in the city to consume more than a fraction of the power which the plant is capable of generating. It is true that the plant has shown a profit on paper, but that includes a charge of over \$10,000 per annum for street lighting, a sum which is regarded to be in excess of what is charged in larger cities.

The new council took office in the belief that the ratepayers desired retrenchment all round, and their first step in that direction has been to reduce the operating expenses of the light and power plant. It has been asserted that the new council was not in favor of public ownership of utilities. By their present action, they are showing that they are anxious to place the public utilities on a sounder financial basis. That action is the best argument they can place before the people of their intention to safeguard the interests of the public and their utilities.

**MUSICAL SHELLS FIRED BY THE TURKS**

A wounded Australian in London tells of some quaint shells which the Turks used in the Dardanelles. They were dubbed "footballs" or "plum-puddings," and were despatched from the old-fashioned muzzle-loading guns of large calibre which were used to shell the British fleet that forced the passage of the Dardanelles a hundred years ago. They were perfectly round, and each shell had a ball attached to it by a chain, apparently to ensure convenient handling.

The average "football" weighed about 150 pounds and was made of cast iron about two inches thick. The chain attachment caused a curious singing noise as the shell passed through the air, like that of the singing of a very noisy but melodious bird. These round shells were easily visible as they came hurtling through the air and inspired no dread in the men of Anzac, whose ambition it was to obtain an unexploded specimen to decorate their dug-out.—Ex.

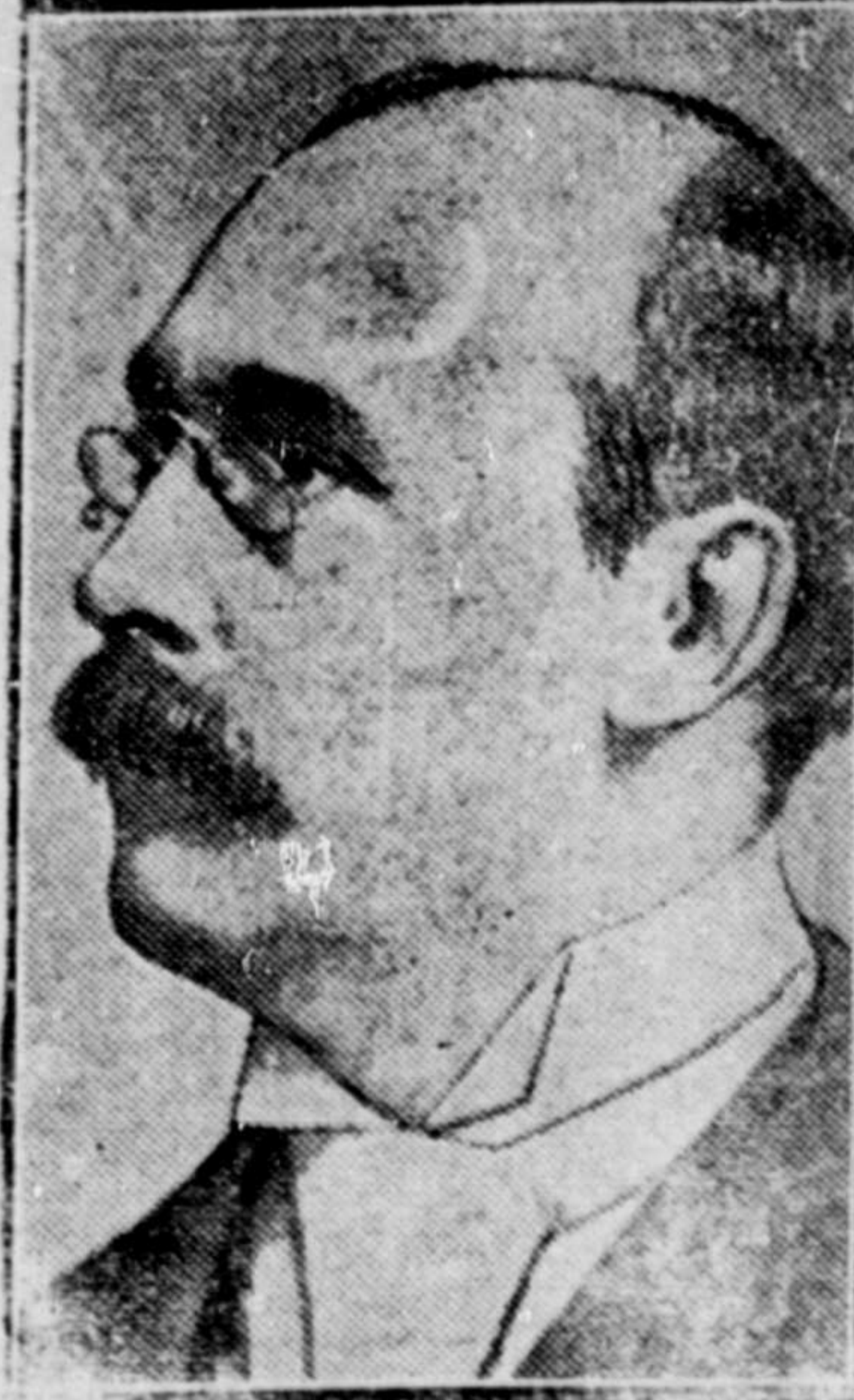

**JAP BOMB THROWERS IN THE DARDANELLES.**

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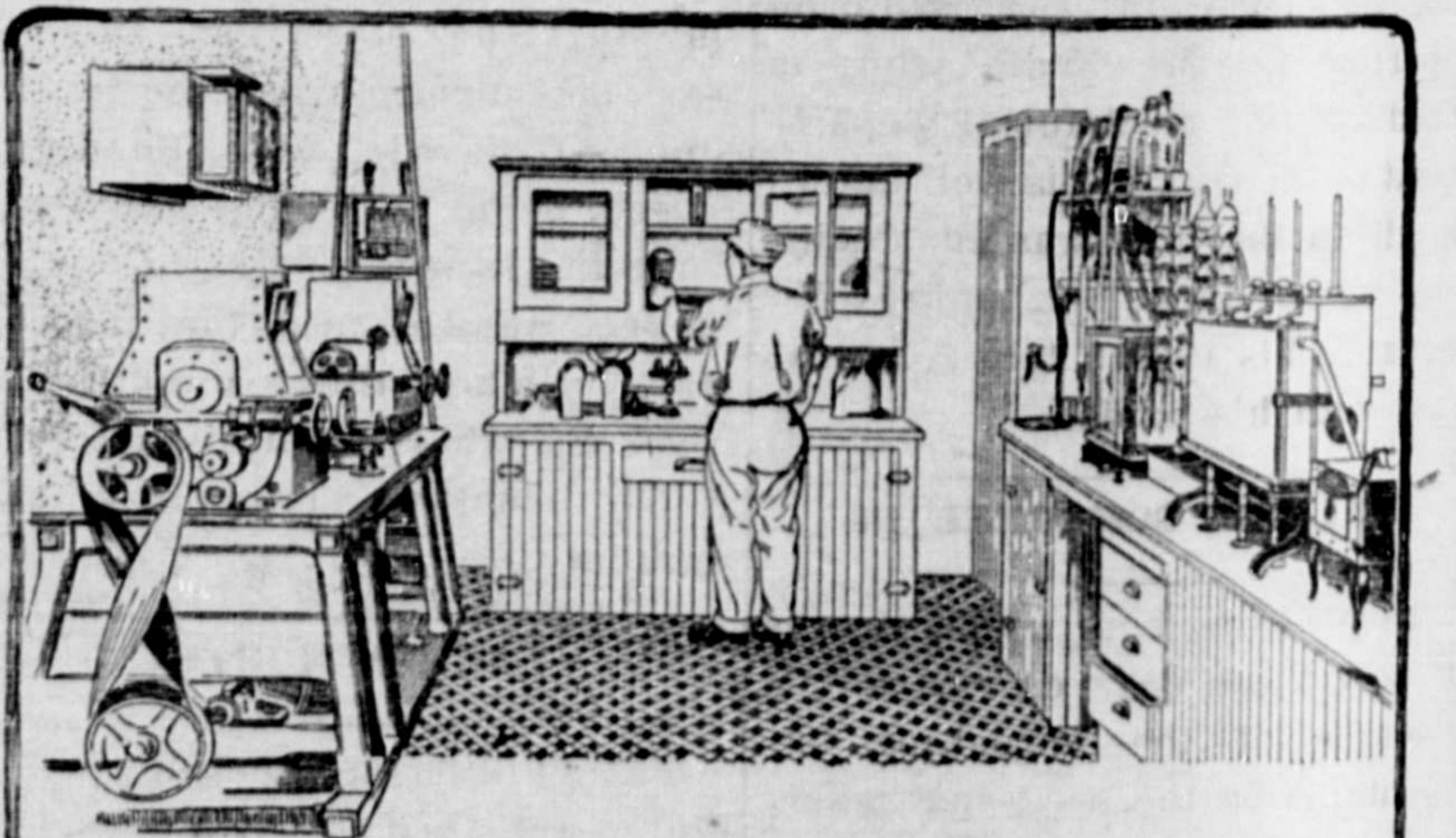

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

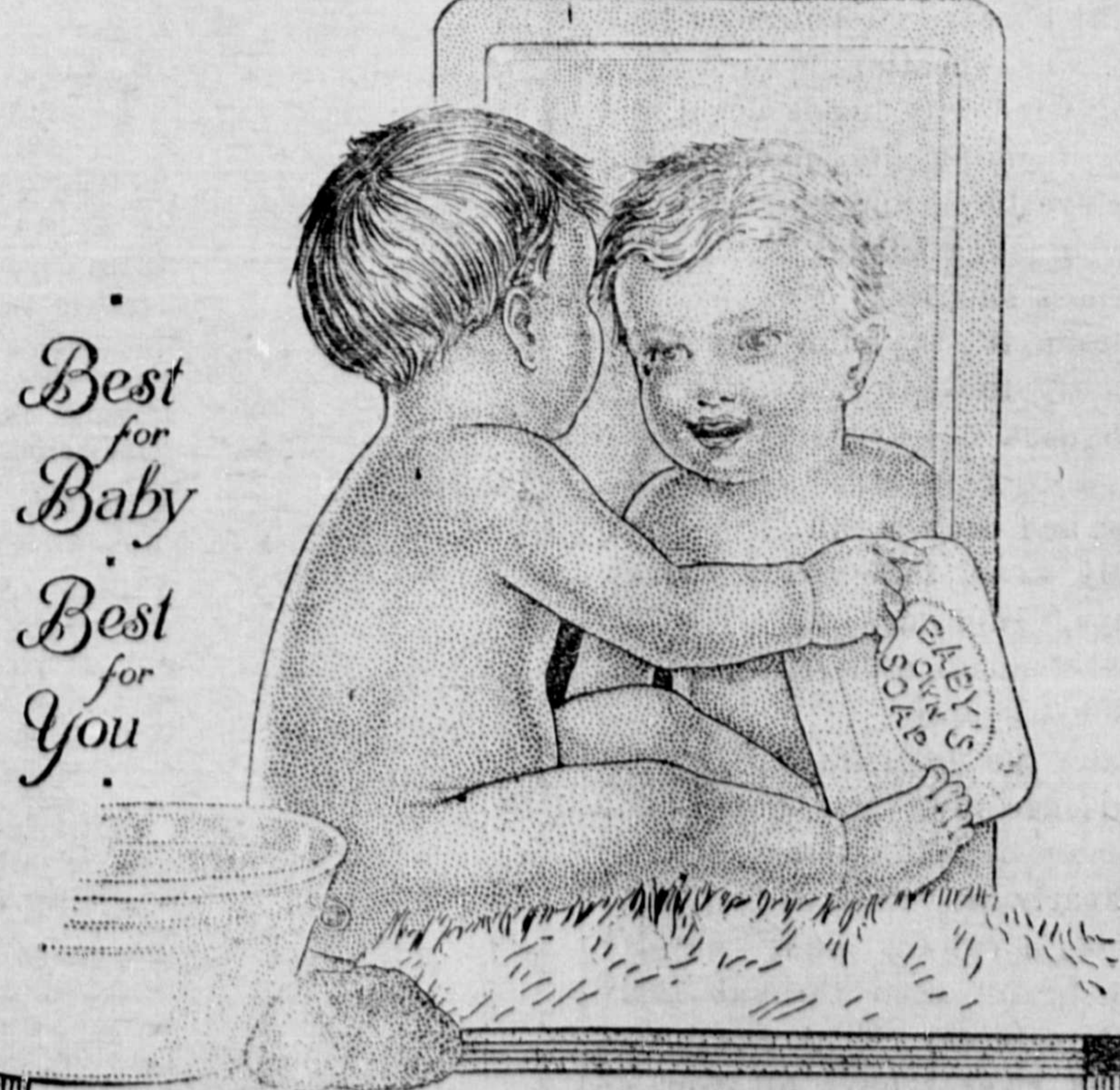
RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

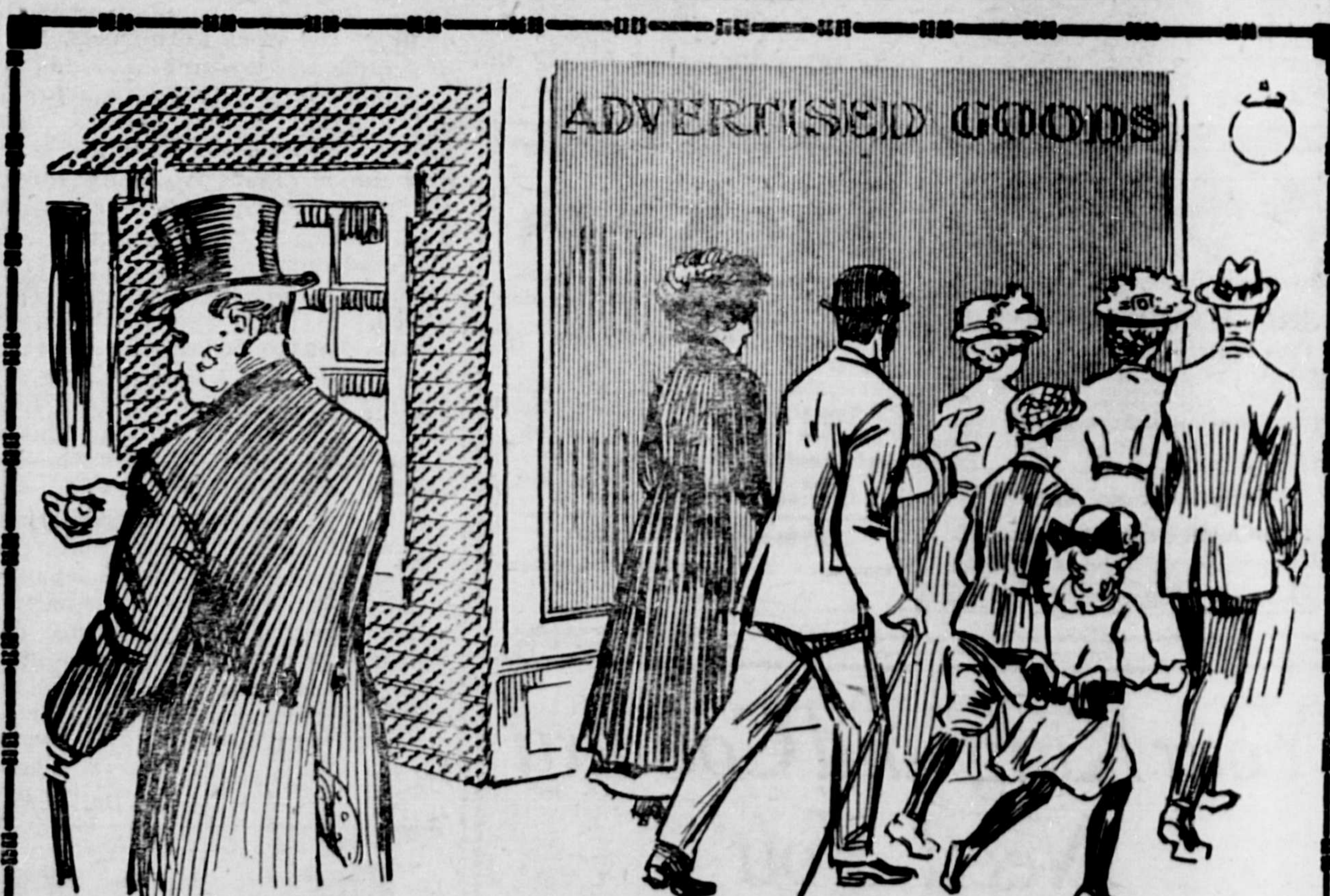
