## OTTAWA SCENE OF SECOND GERMAN PLOT

### B. B. LAW, M. P. FOR YARMOUTH, N. S., PERISHED IN PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS FIRE

#### OTTAWA SCENE OF SECOND OUT-BREAK OF FIRE

**Clothing Factory Guttled—Eight Men Narrowly Escape—Believed Part of Chain of German Plots.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Feb. 5.—A second incendiary outbreak occurred this morning, when the factory of the Grant, Holden, Graham Company, in Ottawa, which was engaged in the manufacture of tarpaulins and clothing for the militia.

Eight employees, who were trapped in the burning building, had very narrow escapes.

**Military Precautions.**

Military commanders throughout Canada have been warned to protect all public buildings, as it is believed that Ottawa is the first link in a chain system of incendiary plots in Canada.

#### SONS OF ENGLAND ENTERTAIN ST. ANDREW'S BOYS

Members of St. Andrew's Society were guests of the Sons of England last evening in the K. of P. Hall at a whist tournament and social evening. Speeches were made by Stephen King, president of the Sons of England, and S. D. Macdonald, president of St. Andrew's Society, in which both gentlemen dwelt upon the friendship which existed between the two associations.

In the whist tournament, the St. Andrew's boys were winners by 1,377 points to 1,307, James Lee being the highest scorer for the Scotchmen with 92, while Messrs. Reith and Freeman tied for the top place in the English ranks with 90 each.

A most enjoyable evening was spent in songs and instrumental music, Messrs. Jones, Clapperton, Murray, McColl, Dowther, Darton, Eviatt and Slocum rendering solos, while Messrs. Jones and Clapperton also delighted the audience with their inimitable rendering of several duets. Recitations were given by Mr. Silversides. An orchestra composed of Messrs. Lee, McKay, McMeekin, Valentine and Davies did splendid service during the evening.

#### PRIVY COUNCIL DECIDES LAND TAXATION CASE

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 5.—The Privy Council upholds the right of the British Columbia government to enforce the collection of twelve years' taxation on 600,000 acres of land held by the Columbian and Western Railroad.

The land was taken over by the railroad from the Heinze estate, the latter at one time being taken care of by Bowser, Lead & Wallbridge. The Columbian and Western have filed suit against the Heinze estate claiming that the lands were to be free from taxation.

#### INTERESTING LETTER FROM MRS. H. A. PHILPOTT

Word has just reached town from Captain H. A. Philpott, formerly of Prince Rupert and now holding a captain's commission in an English regiment. He states that all is quiet at his section of the western front, but that everything is ready to the last button to withstand any German attempt at an advance.

Mrs. Philpott reports that Capt. Philpott has been made town-major "somewhere in France," a position usually held by a full major. He is a military magistrate whose word is law, in regard to passports; extra leave, etc.

Captain Philpott has gained flesh and never felt fitter than at present. He has been highly commended by his general for the high standard of efficiency attained in his camp, it being regarded as a model bivouac. He has earned quite a reputation as an organizer, and all round has won his spurs as a soldier.

#### THE PRESENT WAR IN BIBLE PROPHECY

(By Mrs. H. R. Grant)

The following is the address delivered by Mrs. Hugh R. Grant at the last meeting of the Fortnightly Club, and which proved so interesting as to warrant reproduction here.

The question of the Anglo-Saxon race being the lost ten tribes has held the attention of interested Bible students for a long period of time. The present war has brought it more forcibly before the British public. Our subject, "The Present War in Bible Prophecy," deals so much with the future relationship of Great Britain to the war that it would be well to refresh our minds with a few of the foundation truths of the Anglo-Israel question.

That British and all Anglo-Saxon races, including the United States, are God's ancient people of Israel; that they are today fulfilling the prophecies concerning Israel, and are enjoying the blessings promised Israel.

That they have hitherto been a hidden people, not knowing their own identity. (Deut. 32-26; Isa. 8-17).

#### YARMOUTH M. P. PERISHED IN OTTAWA FIRE

**Seven Persons Dead—Fire Chief Heard Five Explosions—Two Germans Arrested at Windsor on Suspicion.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Feb. 5.—The deaths in connection with the fire at the Parliament buildings now number seven, the list including the names of Deputy Clerk Laplante and Mr. B. B. Law, M. P. for Yarmouth, N. S.

A thorough enquiry into the causes of the fire is to be held. The inquest will take place on Thursday, February 17th.

#### Five Explosions.

Fire Chief Graham states that he distinctly heard five explosions. There is a suspicion that the fire extinguishers placed in the building had been tampered with, having been filled with inflammable oil, as the flames increased in volume on reaching them.

#### Two Arrests.

Charles Stroney, and a pianist named Madam Edwina, aged 28 have been arrested on suspicion of being connected with the disaster, while leaving for the United States. They are of German origin. Stroney had photographs of the Parliament buildings in his possession. They were arrested in Windsor, Ont.

#### REAL WARFARE AT MAJESTIC THEATRE

The Majestic was packed last night to see the six reels of pictures actually taken on the fields of France and Flanders. There are many striking pictures of General Joffre and of King Albert of Belgium.

The scenes, which were filmed by permission of the military authorities, are chiefly of the early days of the war. There are many thrilling sights. Regiments of cavalry sweep past in magnificent style, while battalions of artillery rumble along, trailing the huge French 75s.

The trench scenes give a vivid idea of how the soldiers live from day to day, while the airship pictures are wonderful. Huge dirigibles glide along at close range and every scene is full of action and the reality of war. One reel is devoted to the Colonial troops and includes splendid views of the Canadian Highlanders, including a Vancouver regiment. This series should be a big incentive to recruiting besides being intensely interesting as an entertainment.

#### SCOTTISH NURSES ROUGH IT IN SERBIA

Nurse Jenetta P. Morris, of Ardrossan, Scotland, a niece of George P. McColl, of this city, has recently returned home after spending seven weeks on the Serbian front as a member of a Scottish Red Cross unit.

Nurse Morris left for Serbia last fall and passed through Serbia from the south towards Belgrade during the German attack. She was frequently within range of the enemy's guns as while passing through Nish and other centres the towns were being shelled by the Germans.

She found the Serbians in a terrible plight, many of them suffering from old wounds which had never been attended to. Repeatedly the Scottish nurses had to flee before the advancing Huns, travelling in open trucks along with the wounded and the refugees. At one point in the month of November, when the Germans were very close to them, it was debated whether they should try to reach Montenegro or surrender. They decided on flight, and, in company with an ever-growing and starving horde of poor Serbians they set out for the mountains.

Arriving at Ipeec on November 23rd, the nurses were provided with ponies on which to cross the mountains. As they left Ipeec, snow began to fall heavily and from that point on they had terrible experiences. The ponies were pack animals and were in poor condition, while the route was extremely trying. The mountains rise to 8,000 feet and the trail led in many places along the face of a precipice.

In the mountain hotels, they could rarely get even standing room and had to spend many cold nights in the open, under the most miserable conditions. It was a case of keeping going from daylight until dark, day after day, on poor rations in intense cold. Nurse Morris' pony could not keep its feet and was continually falling. In some passes, it was a case of sliding down, trusting to luck. The ponies had to be dragged down the icy slopes, in some cases on their sides.

One of the party took off her shoes and could not put them on again, continuing the journey without them. The others slept in their wet clothes night after night for weeks and struggled along on bread and tea for food, reaching Scutari thoroughly exhausted. Nurse Morris reached home via Brindisi, none the worse for her trying experience.

Hugh McMillan, of the Government Telegraph service, left for Vancouver on the Prince Rupert this morning, en route for Ottawa, where he will enlist in the Canadian Signal Battalion for overseas service.

#### PANIC FOLLOWS RUMORS IN THE BERLIN BOURSE

**Fear of Break in Relations with United States—Zeppelin L-19 Gone—Heavy Artillery Duel on Western Front.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 5.—There is a panic on the Berlin Bourse today, following a rumor that a diplomatic break is imminent between Germany and the United States over the Lusitania controversy.

#### Zeppelin Gone

Naval vessels which were sent out to look for the wrecked Zeppelin L-19, which was reported to be in the North Sea by the captain of the trawler King Stephen, report that there is no trace of the airship. The vessels made a thorough search and it is believed that the Zeppelin has foundered, taking her crew with her.

#### Artillery Fighting

From Belgium to the Vosges Mountains, a heavy artillery duel is raging, coupled with grenade fighting and sapping operations.

The British are shelling the German trenches on the River Ancre and at Somme. Our trenches northwest of Ypres are being heavily shelled by the enemy.

#### Austrian Reinforcements

Rome, Feb. 5.—Austrian reinforcements are leaving for Saloniki.

**WAR BROUGHT HOME**

In the destruction of the Parliament buildings at Ottawa the people of Canada have ample demonstration of the kind of enemy we are fighting. In German eyes nothing is sacred, except what happens to be German. From the outset, Germany has waged war against women and children and non-combatants generally, and Canada has had this fact brought home in the dastardly outrage at Ottawa.

From a German standpoint, it is a most unfortunate occurrence as there are so many Germans in our midst, against whom there is bound to be a re-awakening of the spirit of revenge which held sway in many communities after the sinking of the Lusitania. Canadians, like all other people, are only human, and there is certain to be a display of animosity towards everyone and everything German. It is to be hoped, for the sake of the good name of Canada, that nothing lawless and unworthy of the British reputation for fairplay is done, but the only way to safeguard against such happenings is for the authorities in Canada to take the aliens from belligerent countries under their close control.

In Britain and the other belligerent countries this has been done, and, in Germany, Britishers who have been interned have been set to work for the benefit of the Germans. It is not proposed that these men should be set to do work which will interfere with wage-earners in Canada, but they could be put to do work which otherwise would not be done for years, such as clearing land in the interior of British Columbia.

This disaster should also have a wonderful effect on such

men as Colonel Lavergne, who have held that Canada is not at war with Germany. They have now had a practical demonstration of the fact that Germany is at war with Canada, and that should be sufficient to bring them round to a more loyal frame of mind. Germany is not only at war with Canada, but is carrying on a campaign against the women of Canada and industrial Canada. Men are needed, and are certain to come along in increasing numbers, in this latest example of "kultur" will be a great recruiting stimulus, and the most graceful thing Col. Lavergne can now do is to proceed to Europe at the head of his regiment.

The report from the Providence Journal that the United States Department of Justice had been notified by the German Embassy of the coming Canadian exploit is ridiculous in the extreme, as an admission by that Embassy that it had been mixed up in the war against munitions plants would immediately lead to the breaking off of diplomatic relations between the two countries. There is little doubt that Von Bernstorff is no infant in conducting Germany's campaign on this continent, but he would not be foolish enough to admit a fact which the United States has never been able to prove.

**SILVER STANDARD MINE SHIPPING ORE**

 was to extend for "seven times" (or 1,500 years; a time is a cycle of 360 years) Leviticus 26-18, 21, 24, 28.) after which, in 1799, the British people began the work God had appointed Israel to do. (Israel went into captivity 721 B.C.)

That the terms of Judah's punishment ran out in 1914, the year this war began. (Judah went into captivity 606 B. C.)

That the prophetic dates and cycles can only be made to apply to Israel and Judah, and circumstances attending their historical development.

advised to turn to the Lord. (Isa. 18, Zeck. 14-9).

That during the war or immediately after it, we (as the prophetic Tarsish) must take all the Jews who have thrown themselves upon us for protection back to the Holy Land. given to kingdoms and to ascertain the names we must turn to history. "Thou (Nebuchadnezzar) art the head of gold," the Babalonian kingdom first, and that another kingdom—no name mentioned—but we know from history it was the Medo Persian that followed the Babalonian kingdom—would arise; and then a third kingdom, history tells us, the Grecian Empire, and then a fourth kingdom, strong as iron—again no name mentioned, but we know it was the Roman empire—and then the fifth kingdom comes, which has nothing to do with the image, but is a stone cut out of the mountain without hands, and strikes the image on the feet and destroys it, and then fills the whole earth and lasts forever. This fifth kingdom is different to the other four which have passed away and were man made. This fifth kingdom is God made and is perpetual. It is never to pass away and come to naught, but is to grow to a mountain and fill the whole earth. Now this same promise of a universal empire that would last forever was made to a literal people, to Israel, so by scripture we can identify Israel with the fifth kingdom. But history tells us there is no mighty empire called Israel. The name of the great kingdom that followed Rome, this fifth kingdom, is Great Britain.

In the Apocrypha, the second book of Esdras, Esdras dreams of that which was to befall the Israelites in the last days. "Then saw I a dream and behold there came up from the sea an eagle which had twelve feathered wings and three heads," etc. After describing the growth and disappearance of these feathers, the tyranny, evil, fraud, cruelty committed by the eagle and finally the destruction of the eagle by the lion which rushed on it and called it to ac-

- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

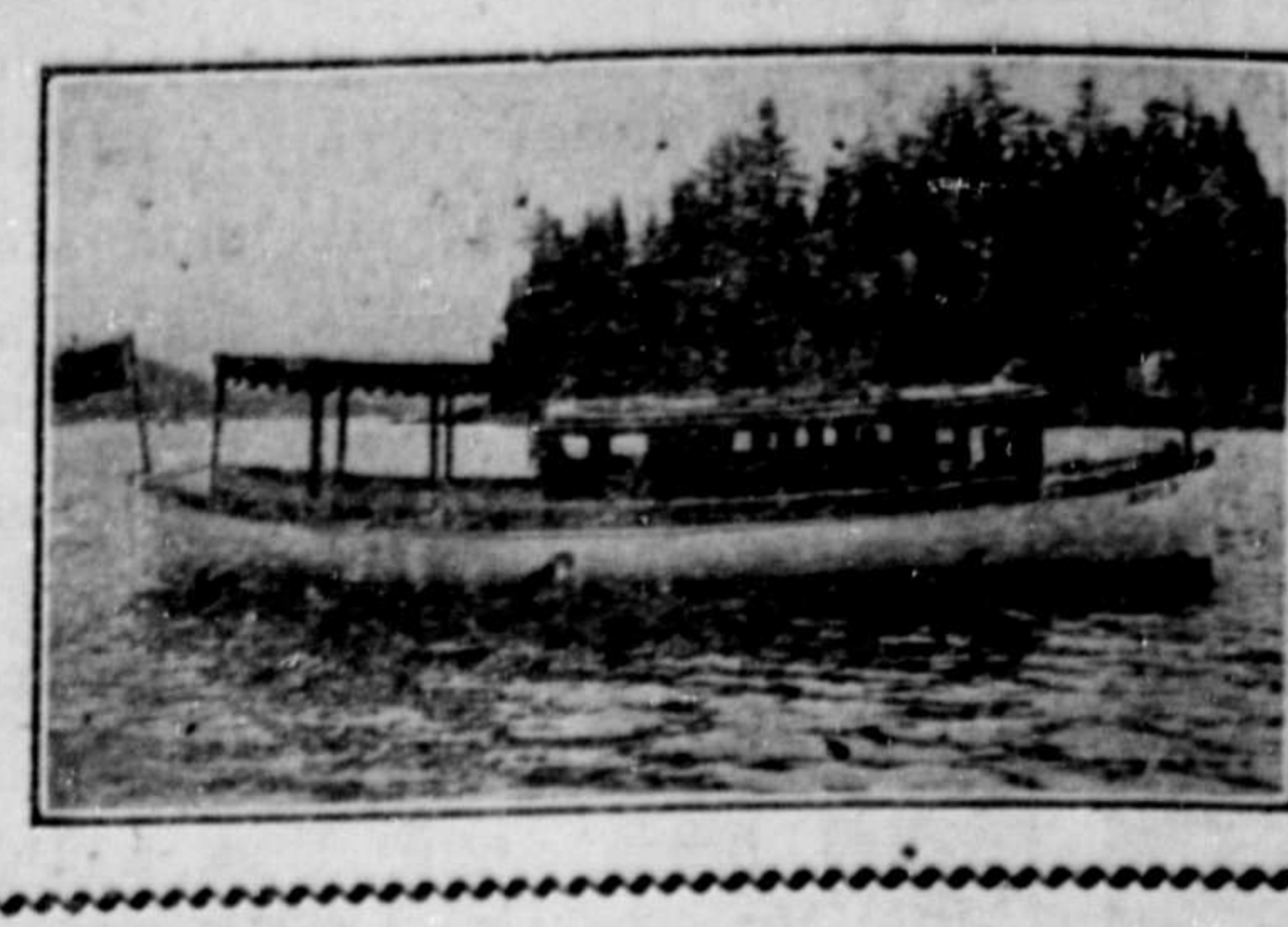

In most of these cases we have ourselves to blame, for "the road to the right" thing to buy has been made plain by advertising.

There is no good reason for passing by the known thing, soundly guaranteed, to buy a dubious article, which, quality for quality, cannot be cheaper than the known, branded article.
