TERRIBLE TALE OF TURKISH ATROCITIES

AMERICAN MISSIONARY OILED AND BURNED--B. C. MOTOR-BOAT MEN WANTED

TERRIBLE TALE OF BARBARISM FROM ARMENIA

American Missionary Covered with Oil and Burned by the Turks—Medical Missionary Escapes to Russia.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Feb. 8.—Jacob Sardis, an American Methodist medical missionary, has arrived here after escaping from the Kurds in Urumiah, in Persian Armenia. He tells a terrible tale of the atrocities practised by the Kurds and Turks upon Christians.

American Burned.

He tells how Dr. Simon, an American missionary who was captured by the Turks in the village of Supurghan on refusing to embrace Mohammedanism, was covered with oil. On his still refusing to declare himself a Mohammedan, he was set on fire. As he ran away screaming, because of the excruciating pain, he was shot down and hacked with swords.

It was also decided that brass memorial tablets be placed in the club in memory of the late Don Moore and the late R. I. B. Whar-ton, who had given their lives for the Empire in the present war.

ZIBASSA'S OIL CARRYING CAPACITY IS DOUBLED

The Zibassa, Captain Parsons, of the Cold Storage Company, left for the banks last night after having undergone a thorough overhaul, having been in port since December 22nd.

Her oil fuel carrying capacity has been doubled so that she will be able to remain at sea for twenty-five to thirty days at a stretch. She formerly carried 1,500 gallons and now has capacity for 3,100. The new tanks were made by J. G. Steen, of this city.

DAUGHTERS OF EMPIRE HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Queen Mary Chapter of the I. O. D. E. was held in the Hays Block yesterday afternoon, Mrs. Du Vernet presiding over a good attendance of ladies.

Miss Davies, in presenting the sixth annual report of the chapter stated that fifty-five new members had been enrolled during the year. Owing to the increased amount of work devolving upon the office-bearers, it was decided to appoint ten councillors and the scheme had proved highly successful. After dwelling on the entertainments organised for the various Empire holidays, the secretary outlined the work undertaken on behalf of the Red Cross Society, prior to the formation of a branch of that body in the city.

Miss Ellett, acting treasurer, presented the financial report for the year which showed collections for the various activities of the chapter, amounting to \$2,089.86. Mrs. McMullin read the report of the wool committee, which showed a vast amount of useful work done in providing comforts for the men at the front.

Mrs. Ritchie and Mrs. McNeill reported on the results of the various dances and concerts held during the year.

Mrs. Du Vernet, in her address to the chapter, pointed out that the Empire is going through the most trying time in its history, and that it is a privilege to live during such a time, when a new era is opening up. She dwelt on the motto of the chapter, "To help on things needful, and to think imperially."

In outlining the history of the I. O. D. E., which had its origin during the time of the South African war, the regent said that the moment the present war broke out, the Daughters of the Empire set to work to help along the cause. The women of Canada joined in the work of helping the Red Cross and in a very short time the sum of \$282,857.70 was raised.

HEAVY GUNS ARE ACTIVE ON THE WESTERN FRONT

French Batteries Cause big Explosion and Fire near Arras—Russians take Hun Trenches on the Riga Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 8.—General artillery fighting continues on the western front, with the Germans trying to find the weak spots in the Allied defences.

The French batteries east of Arras caused a great explosion, which was followed by a great fire, within the German lines near Challerange in the Champagne district.

The British are bombarding the German trenches near the Ypres-Roulers railway, while the French are bombarding the German positions at Steenstratte, in Belgium.

Russian Success

Petrograd, Feb. 8.—During recent fighting our troops occupied the German trenches in the Riga sector.

Russian Munitions Output

Paris, Feb. 8.—The Russian minister Polinoff, in an interview, states that Russia's troubles with her munitioners is over. The industries responsible for the supply of munitions have now been organised so that they will be able to maintain an adequate output.

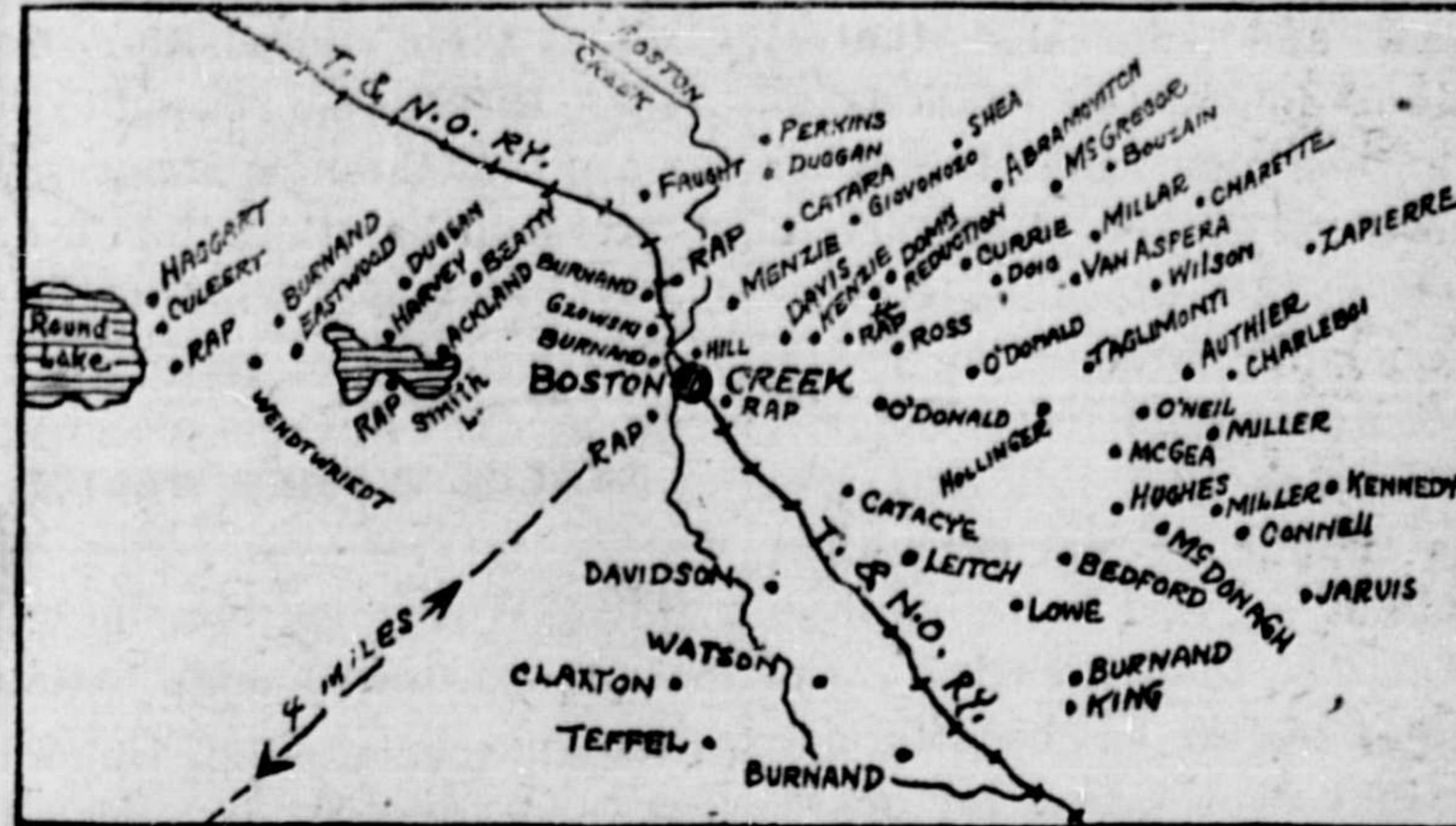
On the motion of Mrs. H. R. Grant, seconded by Mrs. Ritchie, the various reports were adopted.

FIRE FIGHTING UNDER DIFFICULTIES IN SOUTH

Vancouver, Feb. 8.—The thaw is increasing the transportation difficulties in the southern cities, and the railroads are preparing for floods and freshets.

Three fire-halls responded last night to an alarm of fire turned in from the residence of Mr. Frank Harrison, Eaton Street, Hastings Park. Two engines were stalled, and the third reached the scene of the outbreak after having made a deviation of a mile and a half to find a road that was passable. The house had burned to the ground before the fire engine arrived.

FURTHER REDUCTIONS IN CIVIC EXPENDITURE

A recommendation was made to the council last night by the finance committee that the position of city clerk be done away with and the duties assumed by the city solicitor, and that the salaries of the fire chief and city engineer be reduced to \$140 per month, the changes to take effect thirty days from date.

The mayor said that these changes formed part of the scheme of retrenchment.

Ald. Nelson, seconded by Ald. Montgomery, moved the adoption of the report.

Ald. Casey said that the impression would be given to the public that the salary of one man was being saved. He challenged any member of the finance committee to state that this would be done. He believed that it would simply open up the way for the hiring of a stenographer at \$100 per month. He felt that the report should have contained a recommendation to this effect. He pointed out that Mr. Woods had been city clerk since incorporation and had always performed his duties well. He moved an amendment that Mr. Woods be appointed stenographer at \$100 per month.

The mayor pointed out that under the new plan, the staff would be controlled by Mr. Johnson, who would hire all the help. He assured Ald. Casey that Mr. Woods would be given every consideration.

Ald. Nelson said it was not a case of lopping off heads, but simply the carrying out of retrenchment which was necessary. The combining of the positions of city clerk and city solicitor was quite a usual procedure, even in much larger cities.

Ald. Montgomery said that some such plan had been proposed twice last year, and he felt satisfied that it would prove satisfactory.

Ald. Barrie, in seconding Ald. Casey's amendment, said that the city solicitor could not successfully combine the two.

Six voted for the motion and two for the amendment.

B. C. MOTOR-BOAT MEN WANTED TO DESTROY SUBS.

New Fast Submarine Destroyers are Ready—Unique Opportunity for Service—Townshend Waits at Kut.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Feb. 8.—The Royal Navy is now enrolling British Columbia motor-boat men to enlist for service on the new thirty-knot submarine destroyers in the Mediterranean and in the North Sea. The craft are sixty feet long; are of 900 horse-power, and carry one gun and a crew of twelve men. The boats work in fours chasing the submarines.

Mesopotamia Expedition.

London, Feb. 8.—It is officially announced from Delhi, India, that General Townshend is holding the town of Kut-El-Amara, as the position is very valuable because of its strategic importance.

The general will await the arrival of General Aymer's relief force, which is expected to arrive when the rainy season floods subside.

STRIKING INDIAN DRAMA AT MAJESTIC THEATRE

A drama of India, entitled "The Flashlight," is the chief feature of a splendid show at the Majestic tonight. It is the story of the escape of a white girl from the clutches of "Chan the Tiger," an Indian prince. The scenes are remarkably beautiful and strikingly realistic. The hero who carries out the rescue is a young photographer who has been hired to take a picture of the harem.

The white girl warns him that his life will be taken as no man who has looked on the ladies of the harem may live. They are aided in their flight by a nimble hunchback, and there is a regular little war and considerable bloodshed before they reach safety.

DEVELOPMENT

That the Grand Trunk Pacific is doing all it can to foster trade for the port of Prince Rupert is evidenced by the report which came from Vancouver yesterday to the effect that the G. T. P. steamers will extend their northern route to Alaskan ports this summer.

Captain Nicholson and Geo. A. McNicholl made a tour of the northern coast last fall and no doubt the new departure is in part due to their efforts. Alaska is approaching a new era of prosperity with the opening up of the railroad from Seward in to the Matanuska coal fields, while Juneau is showing largely increased mining activity, one big concern there putting in a new forty stamp mill as part of a \$4,000,000 development.

It is only logical that Prince Rupert, being the terminal of the farthest north transcontinental railroad, should look to the north for a large part of its carrying trade. The eyes of the whole American continent are today turned upon Alaska and northern British Columbia, and there is bound to be a big awakening in this wonderful northern country within a very short time. That Prince Rupert will figure prominently in that development is certain. Traffic, like everything else, takes the line of least resistance and the geographical position of this port places it in position for a large share of what is coming.

PROVINCIAL FINANCE

As the new financial adviser of the Bowser government, A. C. Flumerfeldt, felt in duty bound to dwell upon the finances of the province in his recent speech before the Victoria Conservatives. He took the safe course of dealing only

with generalities. Details regarding the financial management of this province are rather awkward things for a budding cabinet minister to handle. He pointed out that British Columbia had always slumped its expenditure under the one head, and suggested that it should follow the methods of the Dominion and the other provinces in separating current from capital expenditure.

Looking through the public accounts issued from Victoria, it appears that this will give the auditor a great amount of trouble, at least if he indulges in details, though such a manner of dealing has been foreign to that department for years. For instance, it would be a knotty problem to decide whether the \$45,000 which J. S. H. Matson refused to account for in regard to the Songhees reserve deal, came under the head of current or capital expenditure. At first glance, it would appear to have been spent on capital account, but when one dips into the episode it becomes apparent that this sum was really devoted to current expenses. The \$80,000 which Bowser's friend Read so quickly "earned" in connection with the Kitsilano deal is another matter which would cause a little diversity of opinion. All that is known definitely at present is the fact that Read got the money, and that he kept the money, at least all that his colleague did not get a share of. This reserve was illegally purchased and Ottawa has to go to the trouble of informing the attorney-general that he had acted illegally, therefore the money was spent illegally. However, that is a detail which will not give Bowser and his friends a moment's serious thought, though Mr. Flumerfeldt may have some



difficulty in placing the sum under the right head.

If Mr. Flumerfeldt devotes his undivided attention to sifting out the items which come under the vague but useful head of "miscellaneous" in the public accounts, he will probably be conferring a boon upon the province. Miscellaneous items usually amount to about \$3,000,000 in the public accounts, and it would be well if the public knew a little more about their composition. However, there is no reason to suppose that the new finance minister will be other than a good boy, who will do the will of Bowser like the rest.

BERLIN WOMEN POLICE

The "Watch on the Spree" is the title bestowed on a battalion of female special police which has been formed in Berlin. The duty of these women, who have been chosen for their muscular development mainly from the ranks of music-hall acrobats in various North German towns, will be, as the Berlin papers put it, "to deal with the numerous enemy and neutral ducks (spies) that fly over the city, and, if possible, to destroy them."—Ex.

10,000 MILES OF TRENCHES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia at its next session on behalf of the City of Prince Rupert for an Act containing provisions which are shortly stated as follows:—

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for a term of more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund.

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

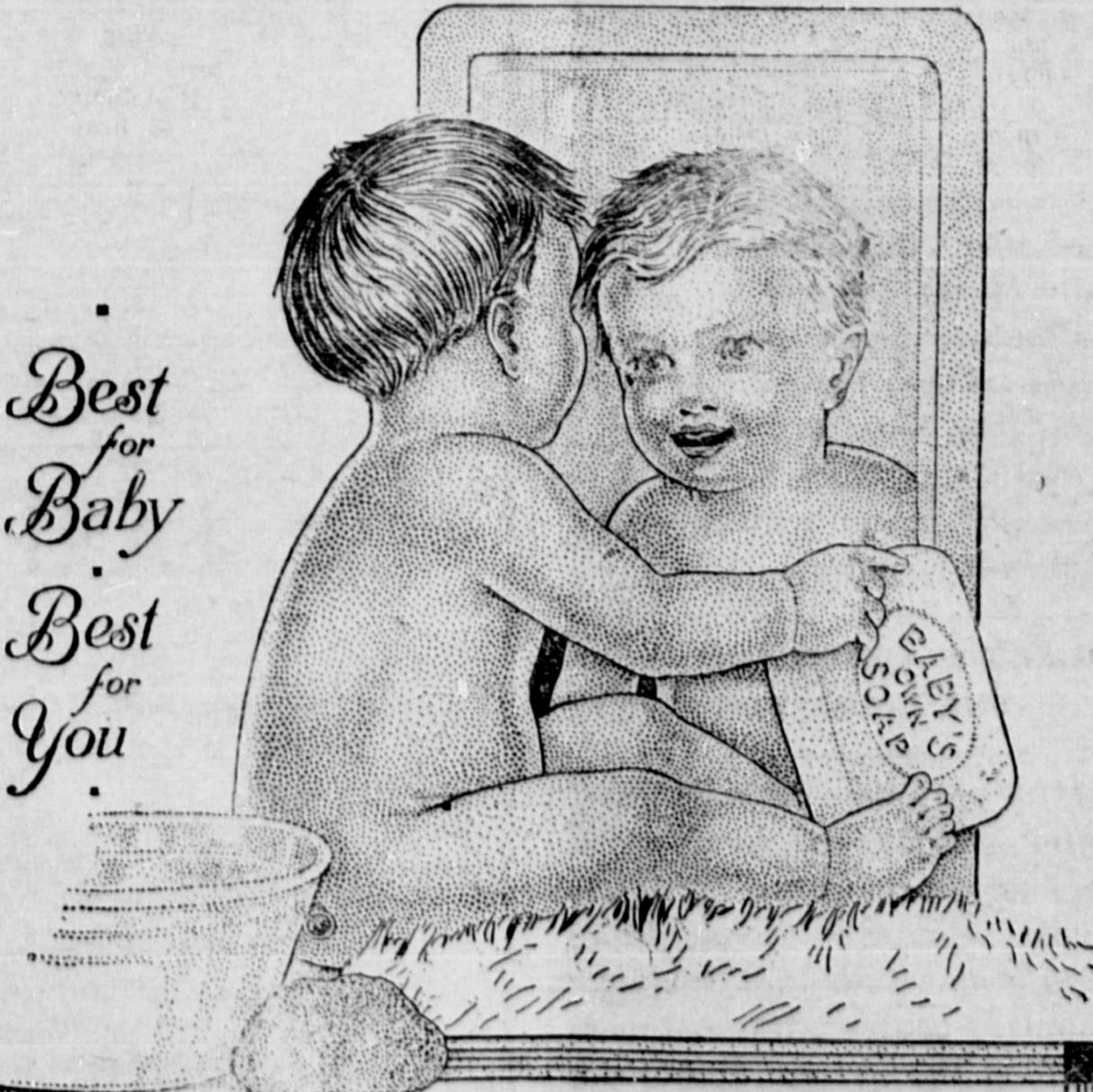
RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

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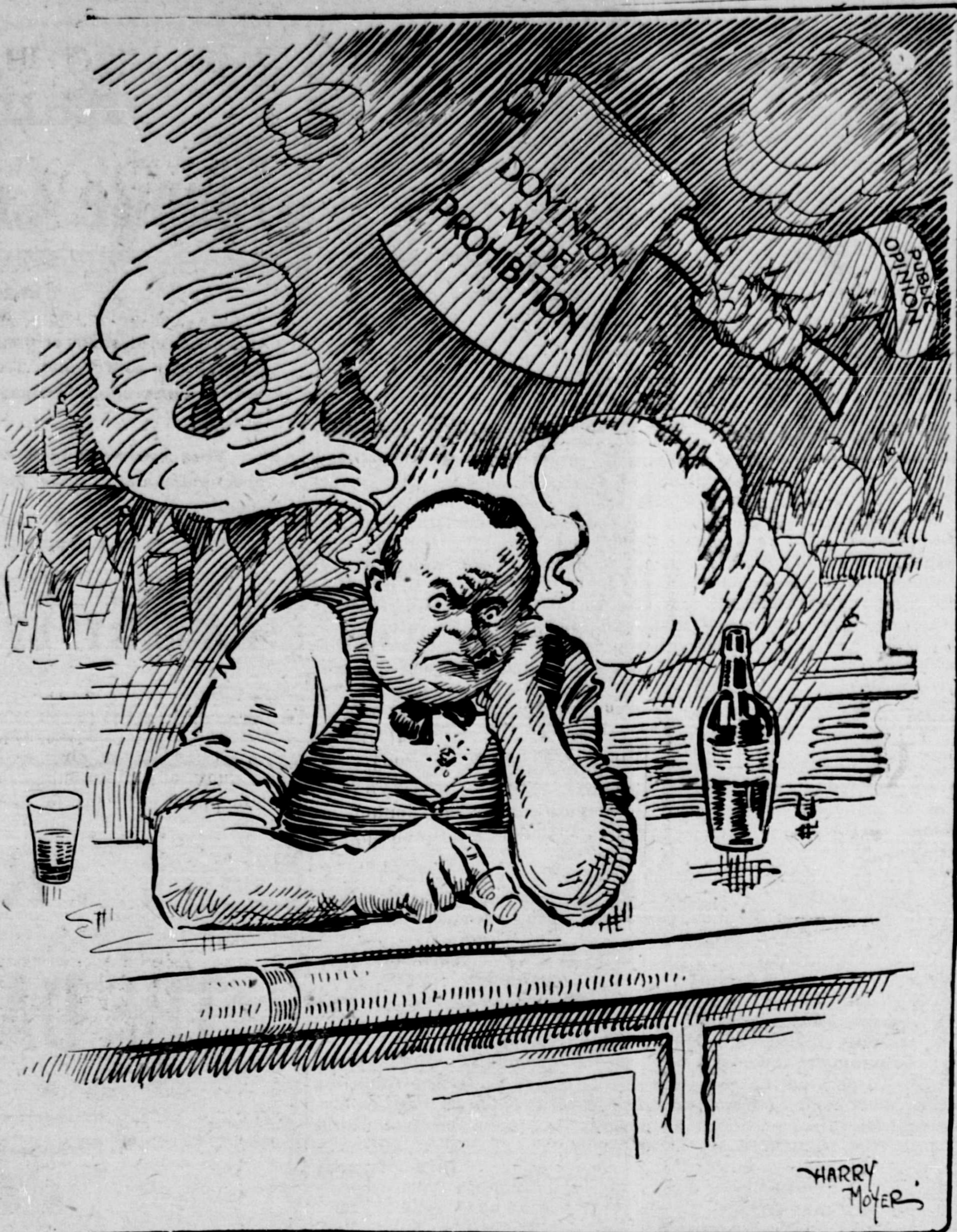

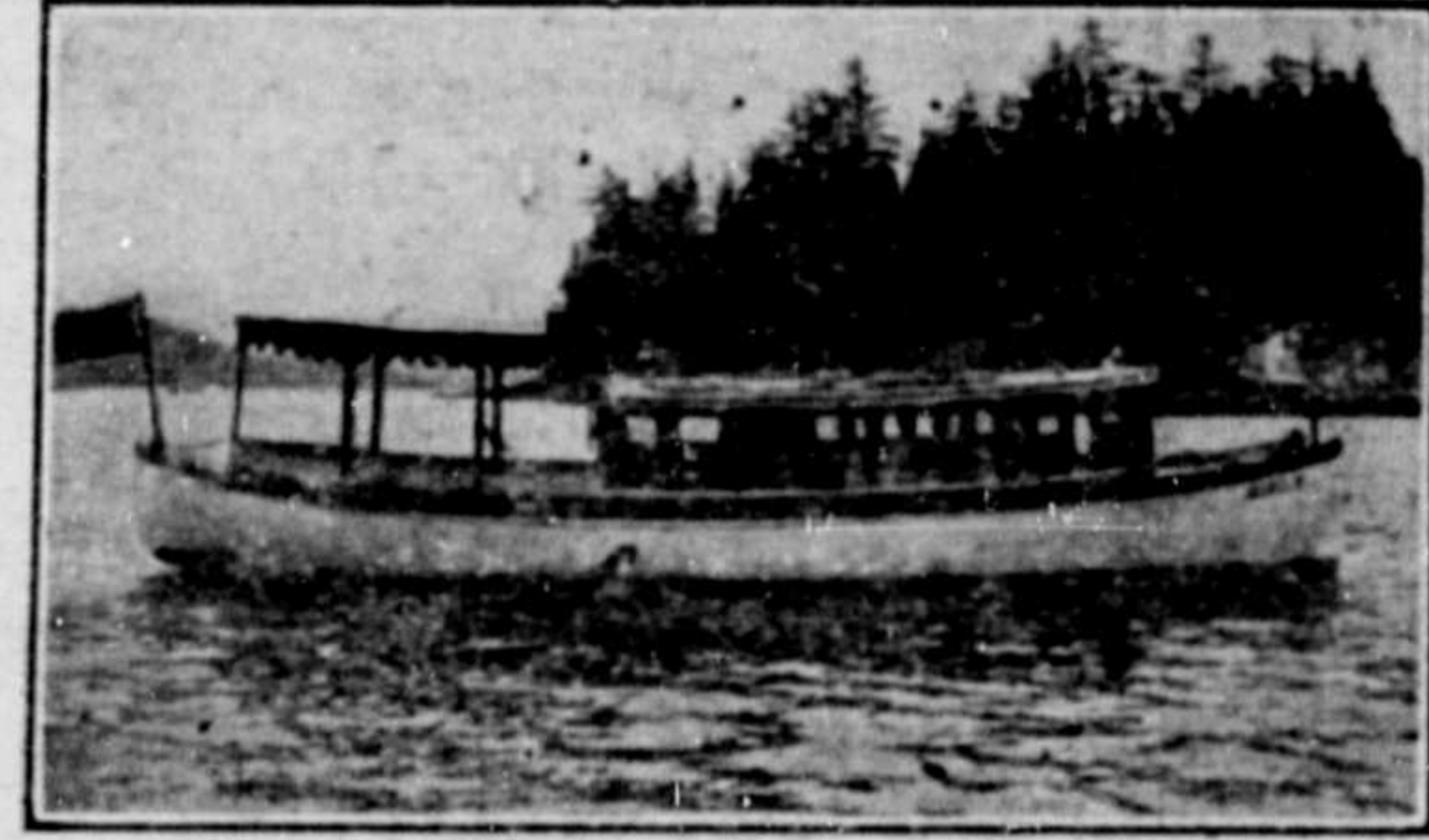

YOU'VE met at least one of those few good old souls, who are constantly getting the worst of it when shopping, who don't believe in advertising. A hundred disappointing and instructive experiences have failed to teach him their plain lesson.

When he bought his first watch he was beguiled into buying one without a known name or a trustworthy guarantee. That watch—a poor timekeeper—cost him dearly by reason of missed appointments and missed trains, and for frequent repairs. Yet he paid the price of a good watch.

It is the same story with regard to his underwear, his shoes, and his fountain pen.

This good old soul's case is not unique. Many of us, if the truth be confessed, resemble him; we allow ourselves to be sold merchandise with an unknown brand or trade mark instead of buying merchandise which is well known to us through the medium of advertising. In slang language, we get "stung" pretty often.
