TERRIFIC GALE SWEEPS PRINCE RUPERT

GOVERNMENT WHARF AND BARRACKS DAMAGED—STORE FRONTS BLOWN IN

TERRIBLE SOUTHEAST GALE SWEEPS OVER PRINCE RUPERT

GOVERNMENT WHARF SHED LOSES PART OF ROOF—IRISH FUSILIERS' BARRACKS DAMAGED—MANY STORE FRONTS BLOWN IN—SIDEWALK TORN UP ON THIRD AVENUE

What must have been a record gale visited Prince Rupert last night and early this morning, and there are traces of its work all over the city. The sidewalk at McBride and Third Avenue is torn up and scarcely a building escaped some little mishap, while several houses suffered rather severely.

The most serious damage was done to the roof of the government wharf building and to the barracks of the Irish Fusiliers, the old Premier Hotel. About half of the roof on the waterfront side of the wharf building was carried out into the bay, while the jutting out portion in the rear of the barracks was stove in. Two attic windows in Bishop Du Verne's residence were carried away, while the cornice of H. E. Peck's house was lifted off and the plank sidewalk carried in to George A. McNicholl's garden.

The little dressing room used by the skaters on the Market Place rink was flopped over, and the front of the B. C. Cafe on Eighth Street was blown out. Two sides of the tennis court, near the Exhibition Building were torn up and the roof of the little pavilion was carried well down Summit Avenue.

Store Windows Gone.

Stores in all parts of the city suffered severely, windows being broken in the C. P. R. offices,

Kaen Hardware, Orme's Drug Store, Mrs. Frizzell's millinery store, George D. Tite's furniture store, H. S. Wallace's, the empty store at the corner of Third Ave. and Seventh, while the awning had to be cut away at the Peter Pan Bakery to keep it from smashing the windows.

About ten o'clock this morning the power went off, and the phone wires to Shawatlans being out of business, it was feared that the trouble might be serious, however the "juice" flowed again about noon and all seems well. Telephone wires are down at various points and the linemen spent a lively forenoon as also did the light superintendent and the city engineer.

There must have been scores of windows broken and the glaziers will now be about as busy as the plumbers have been. The most remarkable feature of the gale was that so much of the damage was done on the lee side of buildings, while the side directly in the eye of the wind escaped. The police who were on night duty had a busy time looking after the open fronted stores, while they did what they could to prevent further mishaps.

The F. O. E. has always enjoyed a reputation for providing splendid entertainment and last evening the members excelled themselves along this line, when they celebrated their eighteenth anniversary by holding a grand masquerade in the Eagles' Hall. At eleven o'clock when the grand march took place, the hall presented one of the prettiest scenes imaginable. The ceiling was festooned with streamers of evergreens which were lighted up by the national colors in great profusion, while vari-colored little electric lights added greatly to the beauty of the ball room. SHIPYARD ACTIVITY ON PACIFIC COAST

From one end of the coast to the other shipyards are more active than at any time in their history, with many orders in hand and in sight for merchant ships, general details of which have previously been given. Particularly is this true of the different plants on San Francisco bay and Puget Sound, with the result that they are all working overtime, and this favorable condition should be maintained throughout the year. Coincident with this renewed activity in the shipyards proper, the great boiler works, machine shops, brass foundries and other establishments, which produce material or equipment necessary for such construction, are likewise sharing in the general prosperity, the whole making for a most successful year to come.

The many smaller yards on Puget Sound, which have the reputation of turning out such staunch fishing boats and smaller craft, also report an unusual amount of business, so the industry on Puget Sound this year looks better than ever before in its history.

While orders for new vessels can easily be obtained at the present time, the fact does not mean that labor is to receive an immediate benefit, simply because the great trouble confronting the manufacturers at the present time is lack of material, particularly steel, and if it is impossible to get the material the immediate boon to labor will be a great disappointment.

Shipbuilding has taken on a great activity but this fact should not be made the basis for any hysterical or ill advised move, on the part of either laboring men who might see an opportunity of starting something, or inexperienced construction men, who might imagine there is an opportunity for a great boom.

LAND SALES

In apologising for the handing over of the lands of British Columbia to the speculator, the Victoria Colonist, the professional apologist for Bowserism, says that "the great desire of all governments in new lands is to get as much as possible of the public domain into the hands of persons who will use it to the best advantage of the community." This statement is true, but it does not coincide in the slightest with the methods of disposing of the public domain followed by the Bowser government.

Perhaps the Colonist looks upon A. E. De Veaux as a person who will "use the public lands to the best advantage of the community." This gentleman controls hundreds of thousands of acres of the finest land in British Columbia, and his idea of benefitting the community thereby is to hold up the prospective settler for the biggest price per acre obtainable for land on which he, or his clients, have paid 50 cents per acre. This public benefactor offers 100,000 acres of farming land in the Naas river district at \$8.50 per acre, along with similar huge tracts in every corner of the province at similar prices.

In plain language, the Bowser bunch have allowed this man to acquire hundreds of thousands of acres of land, which should have been opened up for pre-emption, in order that he, or his friends, might reap a big profit at the expense of the genuine producer. The lands held by this one grabber would provide 2,807 settlers with 160 acres each. The development of the country is crippled because nearly three thousand settlers will not be

hoodwinked into paying a graft of \$1,080 each for the privilege of producing food for the people of this province.

The Colonist reproduces the old Tory story to the effect that pre-emptions have not been taken up where they were offered, and seeks to make this an excuse for the handing over of so many huge tracts to the speculator. The fact of the matter is that, even if there was not a single pre-emptor at the moment willing to take up land in this province, that does not justify the handing over of the choicest tracts in the province to men who have no idea in the world of breaking a single acre or of producing a cent's worth of produce.

The Colonist neatly suggests that "it is for the present administration to devise a means of meeting the conditions resulting from the policy of its predecessors." This is the most delicious item this Tory organ has got off for some time. The administration which has succeeded the McBride government is just exactly an aggregation of the very individuals who assisted in the looting of the province. The Colonist starts out by attempting to justify the looting, and concludes with the statement that some means of getting out of the jackpot must be devised. The Bowser gang are hard up against their past, a thing which no man and no government, no matter how clever or unscrupulous, can ever get away from, and they must take the consequences. The people of British Columbia know just exactly what has been done in the province, and they will take good care that such a state of matters will never be permitted to exist again.



130 MILES OF STEEL RIBBON TO EACH GUN

One of the chief sources of strength in big guns lies in the miles and miles of steel ribbon with which the tube is reinforced. This ribbon, one-sixteenth of an inch thick and about a quarter of an inch wide, is wound round the tube or core of the great cannon. On a 12-inch gun about 130 miles of the ribbon is wound, a weight of fifteen tons. The ribbon has a tensile strength of 100 tons per square inch.

From the time the ingots of steel, some of which are nearly 100 tons in weight, are taken from the steel foundry, where they are cast as octagonal masses, to when as a complete weapon, the gun is tested to prove its power and accuracy, scores of intricate processes are gone through.

After being taken from the foundry, the mass of steel is dealt with by the machine-shop, where a hole is made in each ingot in what is known as a trepanning machine. Under a hydraulic press of 10,000 tons power, it is next forged to reduce it to a tube or jacket of the required length and thickness of metal, whereupon it is passed to one of the large machine shops, there to be finished to internal and external

diameters in machines ranging up to 180 feet in length.

The tube is next reheated and tempered or hardened in oil-baths which are under the ground level and of great depth, so that the tube may be suspended vertically in a bath while the heat is steadily maintained at the required temperature by carefully-controlled gas-jets.

The tube is lowered into and lifted out of these baths by "Goliath" cranes capable of dealing with weights of 100 tons and with tubes 75 feet in length. The same plant is used in the subsequent operation of building-up by the shrinking-on process the various tubes or jackets required to form the complete gun, the outer tubes being heated before being fitted over the inner tubes, so that with the subsequent contraction due to the reduction of temperature the outer tube tightly fits the inner.

The innermost tube of all is inserted as one of the later operations, and in very accurate machines the bore is rifled in order that the shot as it leaves the gun will have the gyratory motion essential to accuracy of fire.—Ex.

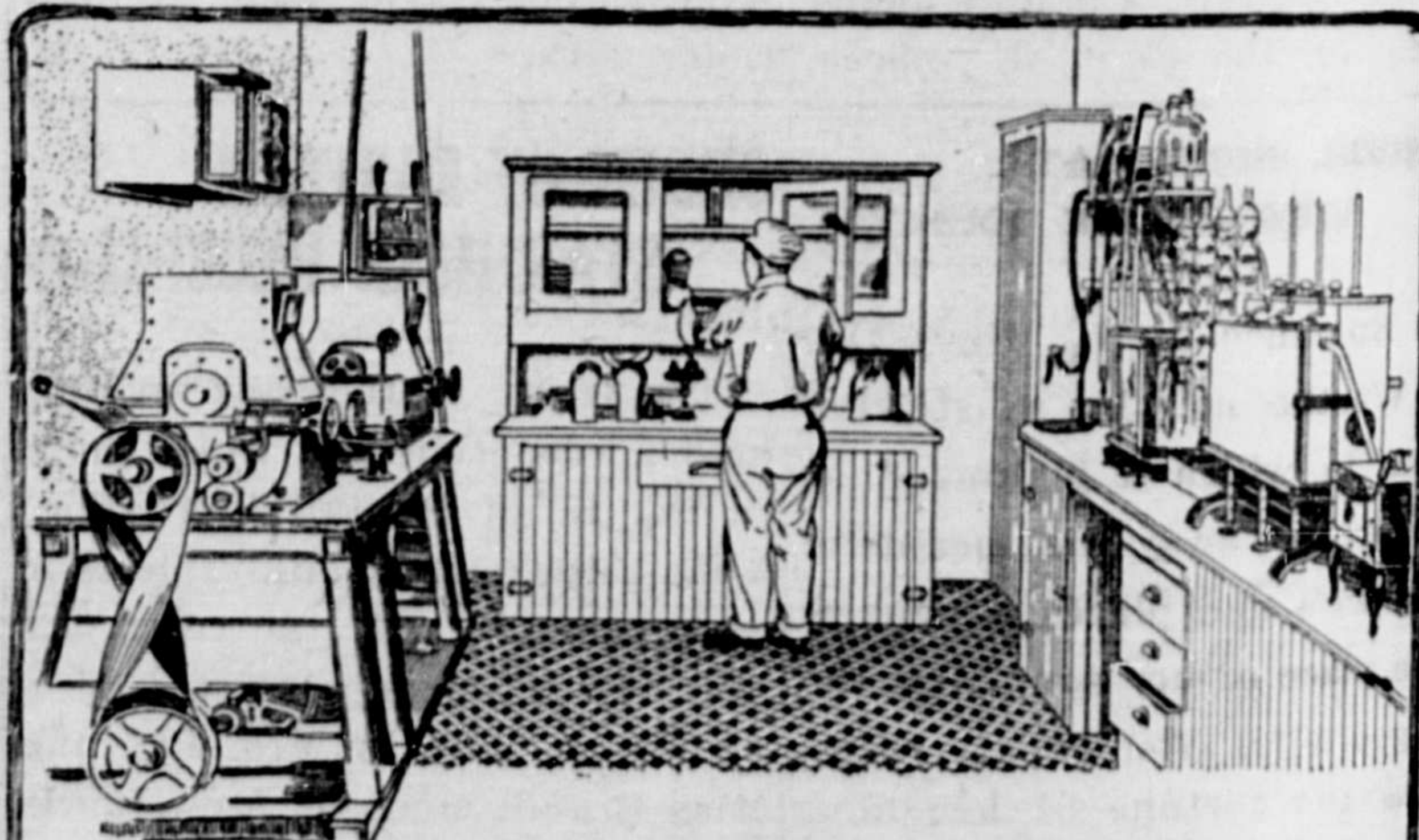

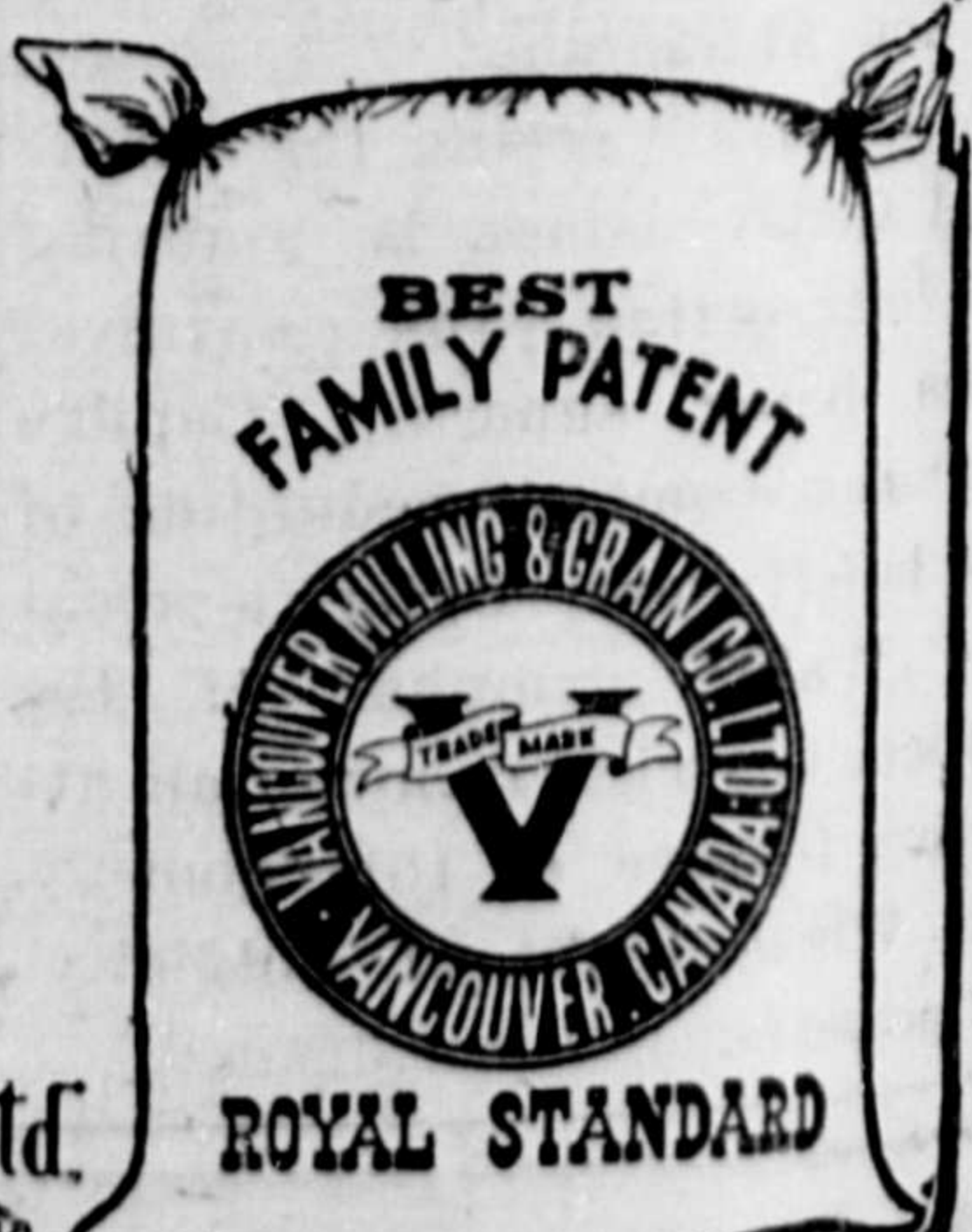

ALASKA ROAD WILL EMPLOY 1,000 MEN

Seward, Alaska, Feb. 6.—Lieut. Frederick Mears, of the Alaska engineering commission, announced today that the commission soon would have 1,000 men at work on the branch of the government's railroad extending from Anchorage to the Matanuska coal fields. Contracts are being let for clearing the right-of-way and supplies are being assembled at construction camps.

The commission already is receiving many inquiries from private shippers who desire to use the portion of the railroad already completed for shipping large amounts of freight into the interior as soon as the ice in Cook Inlet breaks up.

- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

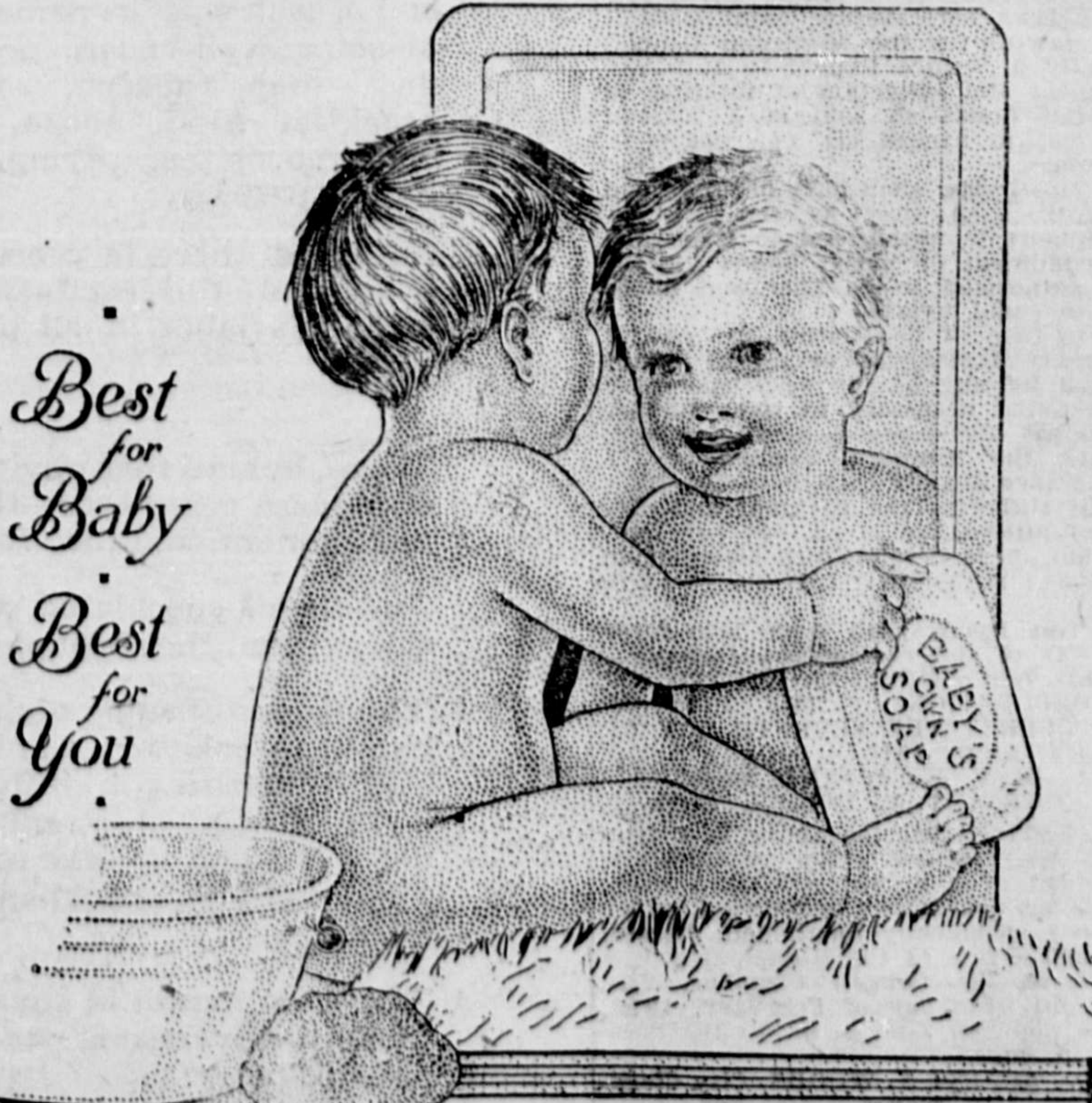

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
