BULGARIANS SUEING FOR SEPARATE PEACE

ALL SINGLE MEN CALLED UP IN BRITAIN--FIVE GERMAN ATTACKS ARE REPULSED

RUMANIANS ARE PREPARING FOR WAR ON BULGARS

Bulgaria Makes Overtures for a Separate Peace--Rumania Completing Frontier Defences--Avlona Attacked.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 14.—A report emanating from Athens to the effect that Bulgaria is making overtures for a separate peace is confirmed in Entente official circles.

Rumanians Busy.

Rumania has prohibited the exporting of copper and leather to Bulgaria.

The Rumanian general staff is completing defence works in the Carpathian Mountains and along the River Danube. The opposition has consented to give its full support to the cabinet in its measures against the Bulgarians.

Advance on Durazzo.

Bulgarian forces now occupy the Albanian town of Fieri, sixteen miles from Avlona. It is believed that this is a separate campaign from that being carried out by the Austrians who are attacking Durazzo. Avlona is held by the Italians and Albanians.

SINGLE MEN OF MILITARY AGE ARE CALLED UP

Compulsory Military Service Bill has gone into effect--German Official Dismissed at Ottawa.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 14.—All single men of military age in England, Scotland and Wales have been ordered to join the colors. Those who were not attested under Lord Derby's scheme are called up under the Compulsory Military Service Bill.

German Dismissed.

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—August Kassella, a German, and superintendent for the Dominion Dredging, has been dismissed following an investigation into his connections.

Kassella has been warned that he must not leave Canada. He was appointed superintendent in 1911. He is now under strict surveillance by the military authorities.

HEROIC RESCUE AT THE SEAL COVE FIRE

In the recent fire at Seal Cove, in which "Kenny" Smith's store was completely wiped out before the arrival of the fire brigade, there was a display of great heroism on the part of Andrew Thompson, a carpenter in the employ of the Cold Storage Company.

Mr. Thompson arrived on the scene when the building was a mass of flames, the door of the shack was locked and Mr. Smith was asleep inside. Mr. Thompson drove in the door and made his way through the flames to where "Kenny" was sleeping and lifted him and carried him outside through the flames. Had Mr. Thompson hesitated a moment, the probability is that Mr. Smith would have been burned to death.

THE LAND QUESTION AND ITS SOLUTION

Sir—Instead of trying to make political capital out of past mistakes it is our patriotic duty to get together and endeavor to bring about a better order of things.

In a new country where the natural resources are most abundant and the population most scant it is a temptation to any government, whether Conservative or Liberal matters not, to make quick returns for revenue purposes by alienating portions of our common heritage.

A policy instituted in the pioneer stage of a country's existence is always more easily followed than radically changed. It takes time to see the far-reaching effects of any policy, especially a land policy. The trouble is that a government, whether Conservative or Liberal matters not, is always just a little "too late." A private speculator rushes in and secures the best land and then the government puts on a reserve for pre-emption.

It is a disputed point as to what constitutes the right of private ownership in land, but the most reasonable view connects this right with some beneficial use made of this land, and, therefore, the government as the representative of the people has a right to enact laws which keep this principle in view. The British Columbia pre-emption laws are based upon this principle and aim at a productive use of land, and if the conditions are strictly fulfilled the result to

BY-ELECTIONS

Victoria, Feb. 14.—It is officially announced that the by-elections in Vancouver and Rossland will be held on February 26th, with nominations two days before. The writs will be issued on Tuesday. The by-election in Victoria will be held a few days later than the others.

CAUSTIC COMMENT ON KITSILANO DEAL

The written judgments of the judges of the Supreme Court of Canada in the suit of Cole vs. Read, over the distribution of commission in the Kitsilano Reserve deal have been handed down this week.

The court, in finding that the plaintiff, Joseph Cole, a half breed Indian, residing at Mississauga, is entitled to \$20,000 of the \$40,000 share of the commission received by his solicitor, Hamilton Read, indulges in numerous caustic comments on the transaction. Mr. Justice Idington goes so far as to suggest that the attorney-general might have a case to recover from Messrs. Read and H. O. Alexander the entire amount of the \$40,000 commission they received.

After outlining the case for the parties, the chief justice holds that "Read should be held as a trustee in view of his professional relations with Cole. He would never have been brought into the transaction were it not for Cole."

Mr. Justice Idington says that any other view except that Cole had assisted to get the deal ready for completion "must imply that the lavish commission the government allowed to be included in the price was little short of scandalous, in light of the marvellous celerity and unanimity with which the Indians got through with the pow-wow and the signing of the surrender. It seems inconceivable that such an afternoon's work alone could be so handsomely compensated for, unless upon the hypothesis that much labor had preceded it."

WALL OF STEEL SURROUNDS THE GERMAN EMPIRE

Italy Prohibits Import of German and Austrian Products—American Munitions Plant Burned.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Feb. 14.—The last gap in the steel wall surrounding the German Empire has been filled up by the Italian government forbidding the import of all German and Austrian products.

It is not believed that Germany will declare war upon Italy as a result of this action. The declaration followed a conference between the Italian premier and Premier Aristide Briand of the French government.

Munitions Plant Wrecked.

Schenectady, Feb. 14.—The munitions plant of the General Electric Company has been wrecked by fire. The blaze was extinguished by the company's private fire department.

No report of the conflagration was sent in to the city police or fire authorities, and all information is being withheld.

WHARF WRECKAGE CROSSES THE HARBOR

Quite a number of people visited the government wharf yesterday to view the wrecked roof of the shed. The roofing on the water-front side of the building has been torn away from the west end along to the centre, while a portion at the east end is also stripped.

The damaged portion includes the residence of Superintendent J. R. Beatty, who had to seek quarters elsewhere. The roofing, which was carried into the harbor, can be seen strewn along the shore across the bay.

On Ninth Avenue, West, a two-storey house, which was fortunately vacant, was toppled over onto an adjoining house occupied by Mr. John Joy, tilting Mr. Joy's house over at an angle and putting the doors out of business.

GERMANS WERE DRIVEN BACK ON FIVE OCCASIONS

Heavy Hurl Losses in Sunday's Attacks in the Champagne District—Two Steamers Escape.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Feb. 14.—Five successive attacks by the Germans on the Allied positions in Champagne district were made yesterday and last night. All were driven off with heavy losses to the enemy. Three of the attacks were stopped by a curtain of artillery fire and by counter attacks by our infantry.

In the fourth attempt, the Germans penetrated the first line of trenches but were expelled by a counter attack in which many Germans were taken prisoners.

Interned Steamers Escape.

Buenos Ayres, Feb. 14.—On the pretext of exercising her engines, the interned German steamer Behnfeldt made her escape. The German steamer Turpin which was interned at Puntas Arenas in the Straits of Magellan also escaped.

STEAMER INDEPENDENT HAD STORMY VOYAGE

The halibut steamer Independent, which arrived from the banks yesterday, was one of the vessels which encountered the recent very heavy weather off the Alaskan coast. At one time, fears were entertained for her safety, but the Andrew Kelly brought in word that she was safe, having taken refuge along with her up the coast.

None of the vessels which came in over the weekend had seen any trace of the Onward Ho, which was last heard of in serious trouble with ice in the north, being then very low forward with her propeller racing. It is feared that the New England Company's steamer has foundered.

SPLIT COMMISSION

We publish on the front page of this issue, the written judgment handed down by the judges of the Supreme Court in the suit of Cole vs. Read, for recovery of \$20,000, being half of the commission received by Bowser's friend Read for putting through the Kitsilano Reserve deal, said \$40,000 being half of the total of \$80,000 paid in commission on the alleged purchase.

It has only been through proceedings taken in the courts that the people of British Columbia have become aware of the huge sums which Bowser and his friends have squandered in the past few years. The Kitsilano reserve deal is only one of many such. Had there been a lawsuit over the division of the spoils in the Songhees Reserve deal, the public might now be aware of the fate of the \$45,000 which was paid out and never accounted for.

In giving his decision in the Kitsilano case, Mr. Justice Idington said, "It seems inconceivable that such an afternoon's work alone could be so handsomely compensated for." Mr. Justice Idington is perhaps something of a stranger to Bowserian values. According to the Bowser idea, the time of a friend is worth \$800 a minute, so long as the poor public pays the bill, while the value of the lands of the province is estimated at practically nothing, so long as an esteemed friend wants the land. It is a merry game, and has but one ending.

In spite of the hard going, the rain and the "breeze" a merry party of five went sleigh riding on Saturday.

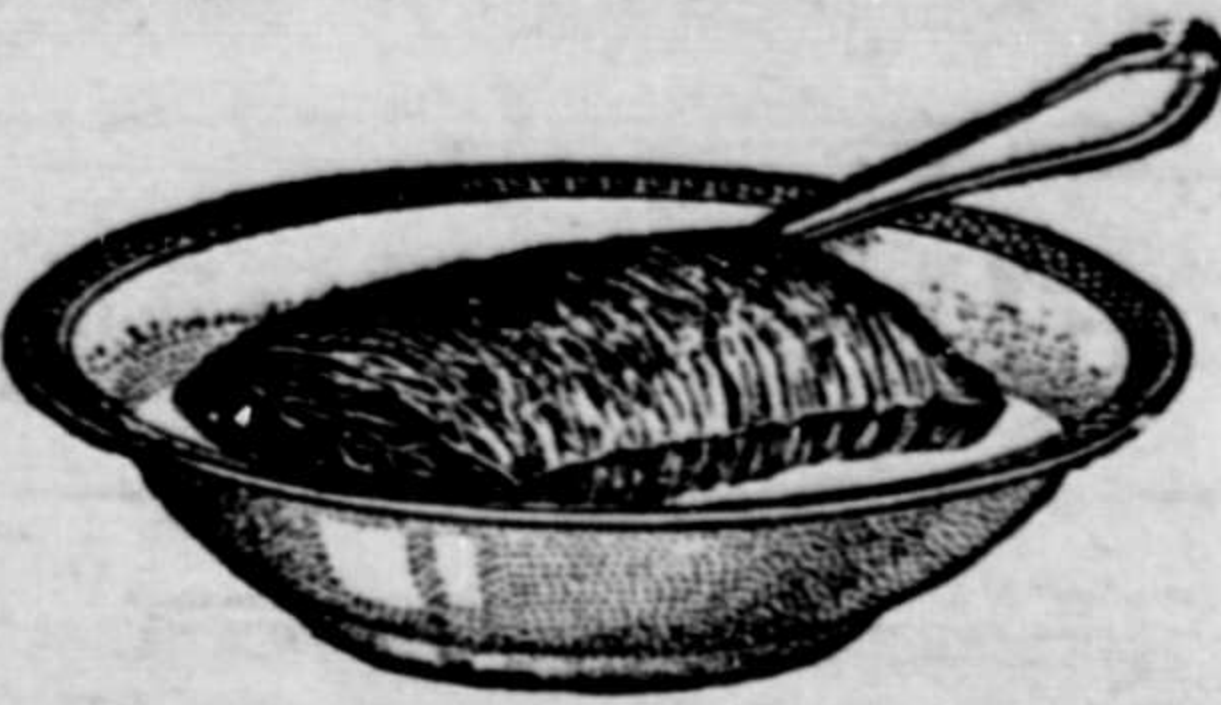
The glaziers think it is "an ill-wind that blows nobody any good."

the country is most beneficial. The British Columbia Wild Land Tax is also based upon this principle and if rigidly collected, without fear or favor, would help to solve our land problem. And what is this land problem? It is the blighting evil of the private ownership of land by absentees for the purpose of reaping the unearned increment without the slightest thought of its productive use.

The individual absentee landlord is bad enough, but as he can only hold 320 acres, and may place a tenant on this, he can be endured, but the collective ownership of land in the form of syndicates is a burden greater than our country can bear.

On the principle enunciated above the only thing which can justify the allowing of a syndicate to hold large blocks of land is a guarantee given to the government by the members of this syndicate that they will become active colonization agents and within a reasonable time will

place good settlers upon their lands for a reasonable price per acre, or else forfeit their claim to ownership. I can mention tract after tract of fertile country chiefly along the railways which have been held for years by syndicates and I have driven for miles on such lands without seeing a solitary settler's cabin.

When the war is over we shall have thousands of British soldiers wishing to settle upon small holdings in this attractive province. Let there be no repetition of the fatal blunder made over South African Scrip, which, in most cases, was sold for a trifle to the worst possible land shark. Doubtless such immigrant soldiers who will come to us seeking for land will gladly be given locations under homestead laws, but if they are placed back of uncultivated syndicate lands we shall have the iniquitous spectacle of absentee land owners fattening on the unearned increment caused by the toil of our heroes.

The coming of such a large number of immigrants into our country will have a two-fold effect, the value of land will go up and the rate of wages will go down. Our provincial government should act promptly and deal with the situation, not as a party issue but as an imperial measure. Fortunately they have an axe which they can apply to the root of the evil—I have already referred to it—the Wild Land Tax. Let the blows fall quick and fast and let our alienated lands be redeemed for productive use.

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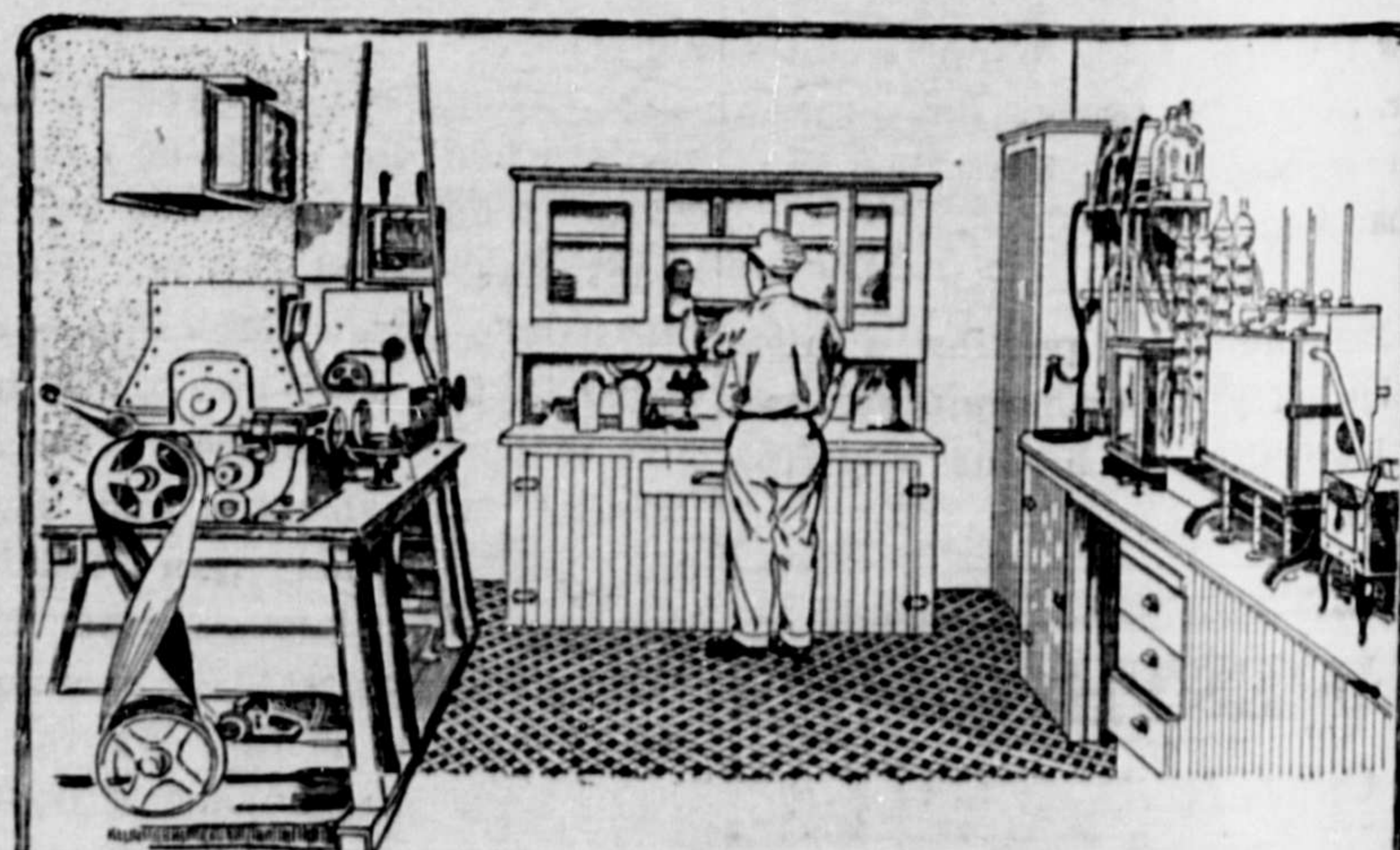

CAUSTIC COMMENT ON KITSILANO DEAL

(Continued From Page One.) the unpleasant features of the whole transaction, but I can not see how we can well do otherwise than assent to the reasoning upon which the Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Irving proceeded in the court below. If the parties hereto and Mr. Alexander, magnifying their importance, or the importance of their services, have misled the Crown by making misrepresentations to the attorney-general as to the value of their services, then it might well be that none of them is entitled to anything in law. It turns out as the result of this litigation that such a surmise is well-founded and the Crown imposed upon, the remedy lies with the attorney-general," adds Justice Idington.

Mr. Justice Anglin, in supporting the conclusions of his brother judges, says: "Read's course of conduct in this matter, having regard to his professional status and his relations to the plaintiff, was indefensible. But still more amazing, if the story told by both parties to this action be true, was the assurance said to have been given by a member of the government of British Columbia that if the twenty Indians interested in the Kitsilano Reserve could be got to give options for the acquisition of their rights in it for a payment to them of \$10,000 apiece, the government would purchase such options for \$300,000."

Mr. Justice Brodeur points out that Cole had first called upon Hon. W. J. Bowser and had been referred by him to Mr. Read, and the relations at the outset as between Cole and Read were those of solicitor and client and were never terminated.

The case was argued at Ottawa in November last by Mr. J. W. deB. Farris for Cole, and Mr. W. B. A. Ritchie, K. C., for Mr. Read.

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for a term of more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund:

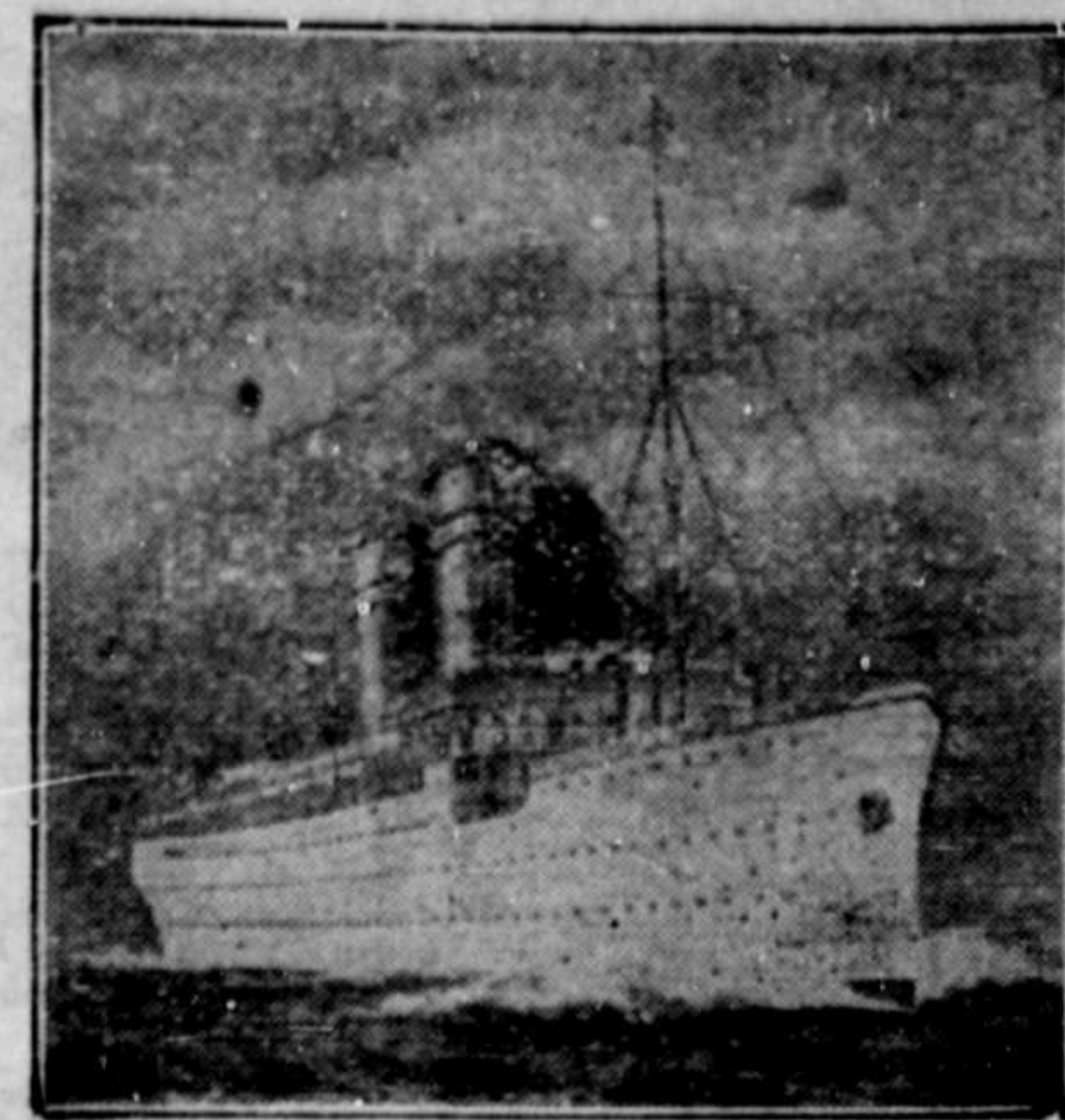
(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

The schooner Progress had 50,000 pounds; the Constitution, 50,000; the Alvilda and the Aurora 30,000 each, and the Lillian about 30,000. The latter was the only Canadian vessel of the six.

The Tale The Wagons Tell

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
