TURKISH BATTERIES ARE SHATTERED — ARTILLERY BATTLE IN UPPER ALSACE

FOUR TURKISH BATTERIES ARE RAZED BY FLEET

Russian Black Sea Fleet Sinks Nine Turkish Ships and Smashes Land Forts—Huns to Attack Kiev.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Feb. 15.—Petrograd reports successes by the Russian Black Sea fleet. It has razed four Turkish batteries and has sunk nine Turkish ships which were carrying supplies for the enemy. The Russians have captured the outer fort of Erzerum with guns, prisoners and supplies.

Offensive Against Kiev.
There is positive information from the eastern front that the Germans are preparing for an offensive against Kiev.

Italians Busy.
The Italian army is engaged in its first battle in the Balkans today.

The Italians are also engaging the Austrians on the heights of Durazzo and Tirano.

Germans on Defensive.
Baron Von Busch, the Rumanian minister, states that the Germans will not attack Saloniki, but will remain on the defensive.

THIRD GERMAN OFFENSIVE IN UPPER ALSACE

Artillery Battle Progresses for Two Days—Paris States Actions are Purely local and Costly.

London, Feb. 15.—With offensives under way in the Champagne and Artois districts, the Germans have now commenced their third aggressive movement in Upper Alsace. An artillery battle has been in progress in this region for the past two days.

Only Local Actions.
Paris, Feb. 15.—Official statements of frequent German attacks, while intended to give the impression of great German activity on the western front, are in reality only local actions without any consequence or value and involve a useless sacrifice of life.

The French could easily undertake similar operations but their policy is to avoid useless sacrifice of men.

To the Editor, Daily News,

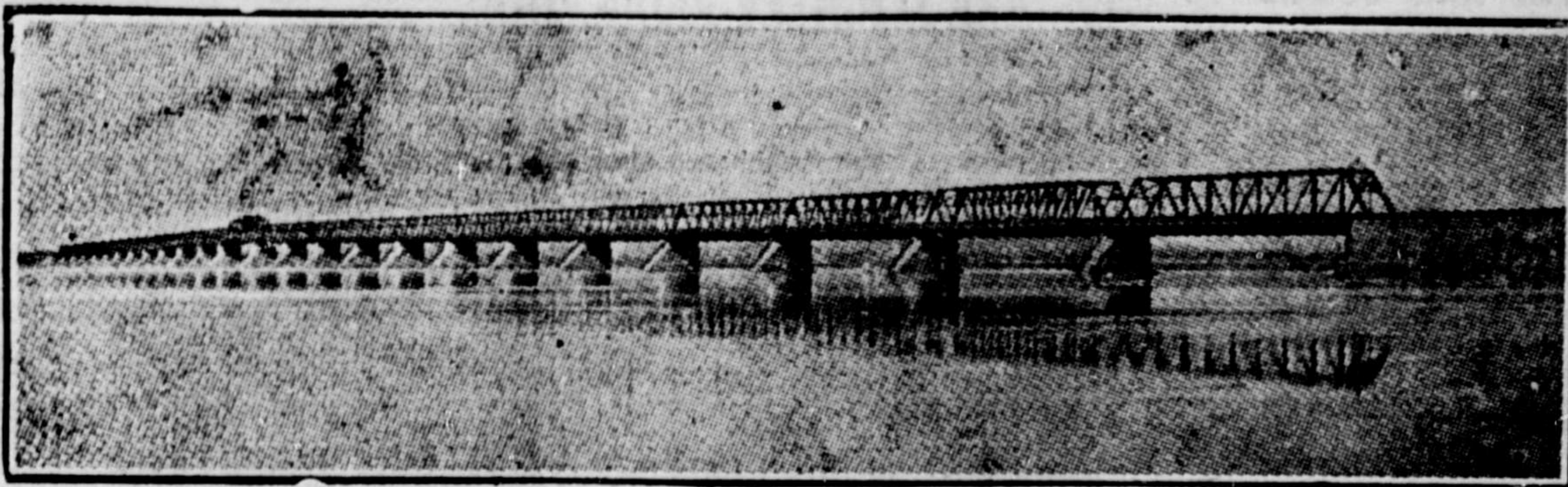

PUBLICATION OF MINING REPORT IS DISCUSSED

Ald. Casey, representing a committee of Ald. McClymont and himself, reported that he had gone carefully into a report of the mineral resources of northern B. C. drawn up by Mr. A. C. Garde and recommended that the council have the report published and that a grant of \$100 be made for that purpose.

He said that the report was minute and exhaustive and would prove to be of great use to the city in placing the mineral resources of this district before the world. Though originally drawn up with the object of having a copper refinery placed at Prince Rupert, he felt that the publication of the report would do much to advertise this district.

Ald. McClymont said he had read the report carefully and he was satisfied that it was a valuable and interesting document. He had not had a meeting with Ald. Casey, but had remarked to him on the street that the publication of the report would do little towards bringing the refinery here. He thought it would be wiser to spend money to bring the matter before the politicians. He advised the other members of the council to read the report as it was well worth study.

The mayor said that the publication of the report might do much in the way of stirring up public opinion towards the securing of the refinery for Prince Rupert.

Ald. Montgomery thought that the ideas brought forward by both Ald. Casey and Ald. McClymont had merit. He thought that the politicians should be approached first and the report published afterwards.

Ald. Casey said that the chief object in printing the report was to bring it before development companies. These companies in considering a proposition wanted an engineer's report.

Ald. Dybhavn said he believed the report was a good one and that \$100 would be well spent in bringing it before the public.

Ald. Montgomery, seconded by Ald. McClymont, moved that the matter be referred to the finance committee.

D. C. McRae said that he understood that the report really belonged to the board of trade. He suggested that if the council thought of a publicity scheme, some definite policy should be adopted.

AN EDMONTON MAN SUICIDES IN VANCOUVER

Vancouver, Feb. 15.—Herbert C. T. Kemp, aged 53, of Edmonton, committed suicide this morning by leaping from an upper window of the Castle Hotel in Vancouver. He was suffering from religious mania.

Deceased was accountant with an Edmonton insurance firm and was a Sunday school superintendent.

PRIVATE BILL

The finance committee recommended to the council last night that City Solicitor Peters proceed to Victoria in regard to the passing of the private bill covering the serial bond issue, and that Mr. Peters call in outside counsel if necessary.

The mayor explained that there was a difference of opinion between the solicitor and the provincial government with regard to the bill. He also stated that the cost of extra counsel would be submitted to the council before action was taken. On the motion of Ald. McClymont, seconded by Ald. Dybhavn, the report was adopted.

It was also decided that the voting in connection with the by-law be not proceeded with, pending a report from the city solicitor and that a notice to this effect be published in The Daily News.

ABSENT ALDERMEN

Ald. McClymont, during the discussion of the bylaw covering the indemnity for mayor and aldermen at the council last night, raised the question of the drawing of salary by an alderman while absent from the city. He moved an amendment that in such an event, the member be not paid during his absence. In the event of sickness he felt that a man should draw his pay.

Ald. Casey said he expected to go on night duty pretty soon, and, though he might be able to attend committee meetings, he might miss several council meetings.

Ald. McClymont said his reason for raising the point was that there had been a good deal of discussion over the matter in the past.

Ald. Montgomery said that the act covered the matter and he thought the public would voice its opinion when it got an opportunity. Ald. McClymont withdrew his amendment.

CONSPIRACY OF DEATH BY GANG OF ANARCHISTS

Chicago Anarchists have Scheme of Wholesale Destruction—Death List Includes Forty Bankers.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Chicago, Feb. 15.—Jean Crones, a cook, who attempted to poison two hundred guests at a banquet at the University Club last week, has been arrested.

After partaking of soup, the guests at the banquet were taken sick and doctors who were present diagnosed the sickness as ptomaine poisoning. A bishop and a judge who refused the soup, escaped the sickness. Mustard and water was administered to the poisoned guests and the prompt action of the doctors enabled them to proceed with the dinner.

An investigation reveals the fact that the poisoning was part of an anarchist conspiracy of death. Fifteen Chicago anarchists had planned to destroy the Holy Name Cathedral; the Federal Building; the People's Gas Company building and the Union League Club. The death list of the gang included the names of forty leading bankers in the United States.

THE BY-ELECTIONS

The announcement that the by-elections in Rossland and Vancouver will be held a few days before the polling in Victoria confirms the statement made by Sir Richard McBride before leaving for London, to the effect that Victoria would be won by the Liberals. Bowser evidently figures that Vancouver and Rossland are safe in the meantime, and that the announcement of victories in these two constituencies will swing things his way in Victoria. Bowser is nothing if not adroit in securing every possible advantage in the fight, and we suppose he can please himself in this as in everything else.

According to reports from Vancouver, however, he is overconfident as to the strength of Tisdall. This gentleman is relying entirely on the work of the machine, and that instrument is not nearly so potent as is supposed. M. A. Macdonald and J. S. Cowper have shot holes through Mr. Tisdall's platform until it is a tattered remnant. Tisdall's part in the Dominion Trust deal has been made thoroughly clear, and the statements made throughout the city by the Liberal candidate and his supporters in this connection have never been challenged.

The only reply made to the charges of Dr. Mackay in regard to the looting of the province is that this gentleman is disappointed because he did not get a job. Fortunately, the public know Dr. Mackay well enough to realize the utter futility of the Tories' attempt at stalling off these attacks. The sum total of the Bowserian idea of politics is contained in the word "job." Bowser has worked on the principle that every man has his price, and

that the average man's price is a job, while the bigger man wants a commission. There is a rude awakening coming to these "job" politicians along about February 26th.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Victoria Colonist is trying hard to forget the past of the Bowser government and to lead the public to believe that British Columbia is getting away to a new start with a clean slate. Unfortunately the past has to be paid for and the people will not forget that Bowser named the price.

It is reported that the Vancouver Liberals will have an efficient detective force on duty during the by-election. If what Sir Richard McBride said before leaving is true, that force will be kept pretty busy.

Bulgaria is beginning to feel very peaceful now that it notices that Rumania is showing signs of activity for the Allies.

Czar Ferdinand of Bulgaria is evidently a poor hand at guessing, else he would never have thrown in his lot with the Kaiser.

After refusing to allow Sir Richard to proceed with a general election last April, Bowser is now going to try and steal back into power for a year by three by-elections which he hopes the machine will be able to carry successfully. He will probably find that the common ordinary people want to have some say in the ruling of this province.

Bowser will find that Prussian methods are no more effective in British Columbia than they are in Europe.

POLICE SALARIES ARE SLIGHTLY REDUCED

The police commission met on Saturday afternoon, the new members, Ald. O. H. Nelson and W. D. Moxley taking their seats at the board, and Mayor McCaffery presiding.

After routine business had been disposed of, a report from the committee of the whole of the council was read, in which it recommended that one policeman be dispensed with if possible, and that salaries be reduced from \$110 to \$100; that the chief's salary be reduced by \$25, and that representations be made to reduce the salary of the police magistrate.

The mayor said that the commission had nothing to do with the latter as the salary was fixed by the government.

The city solicitor concurred in this view.

Chief Vickers thought it was not advisable to make a further reduction in the staff, as there were now only three men besides himself. With regard to the pay

reduction, the chief pointed out that the hours were long and that the officers had seen several years' service before getting their present pay.

Mr. Moxley did not like reductions, though he was not conversant with the state of the city's finances, which evidently required some retrenchment.

Ald. Nelson said that it was a case of retrenching all round. By way of evening up the standard of the firemen with that of the police, he proposed that the chief receive \$160 and the officers \$105. He felt that this would help in the aggregate saving, and would work no hardship upon anyone.

Mr. Moxley agreed to the proposal as being in line with the policy followed by the city. The motion carried.

An informal discussion followed with respect to the enforcing of the laws. The mayor said that, as he understood it, the chief would see to it that the laws were enforced, and he favored the putting into effect of all the laws.

Ald. Nelson said that he did not want to see anything in the nature of a wide open town and felt that the chief would see that the laws against gambling were enforced, as well as those relating to the closing of bars and the keeping down of blind pigs.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

A letter from Sir R. L. Borden was read at the council last night acknowledging receipt of Ald. Casey's resolution regarding the taxing of profits from making munitions and the taxing of minerals. The premier said the matter would have careful consideration.

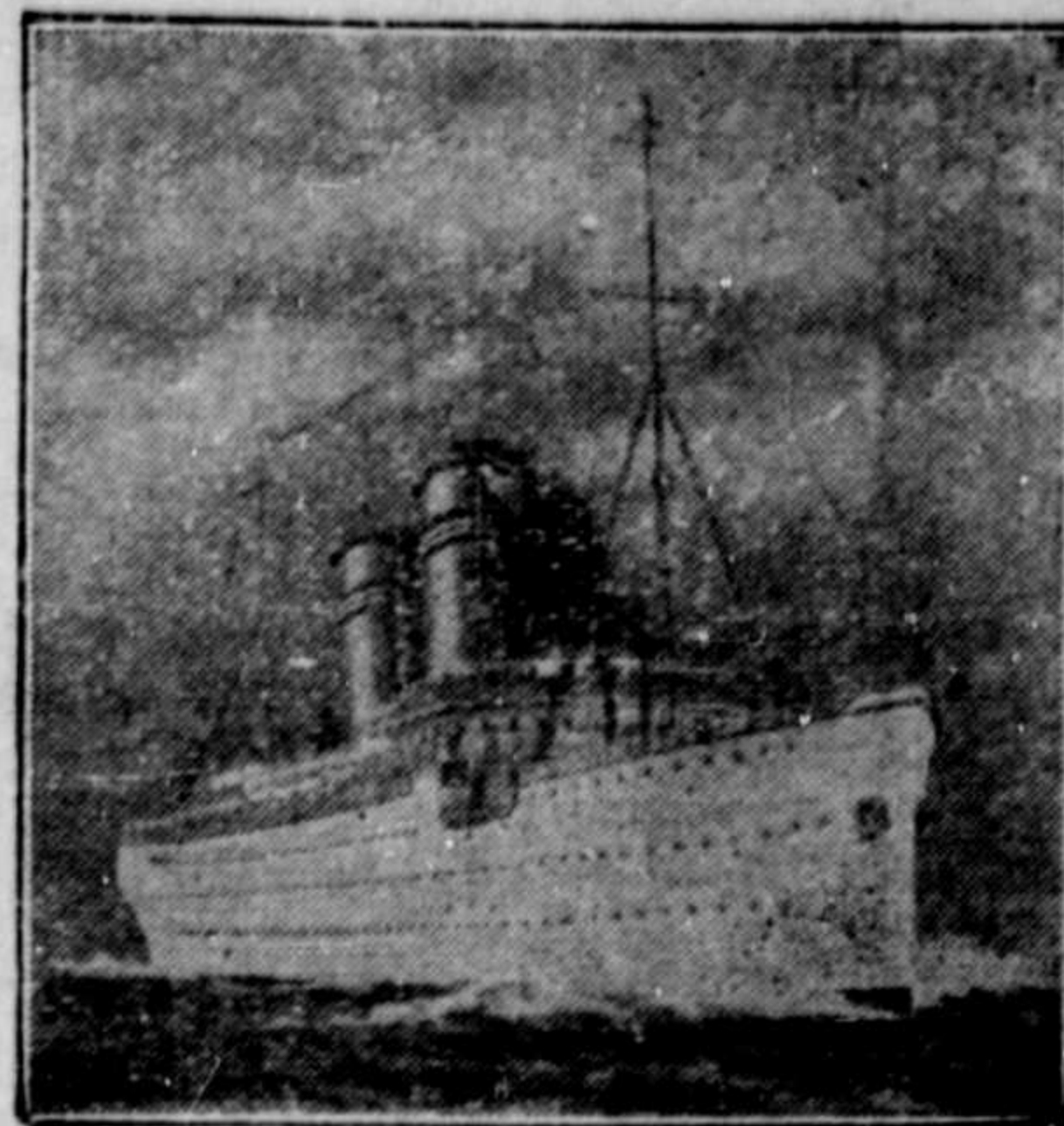

- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

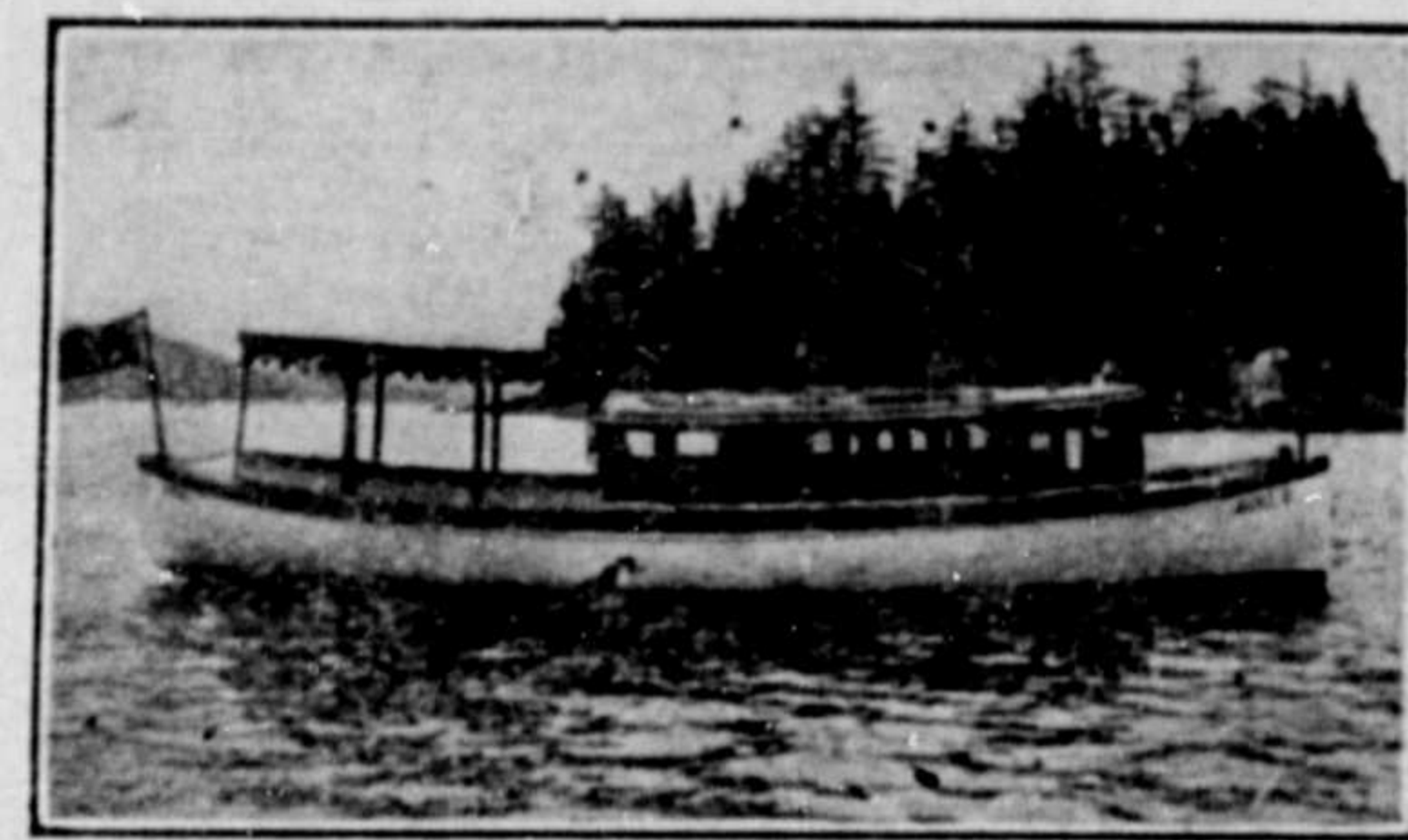

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
