AMERICAN RAILROADS MEET G.T.P. RATES

SHIPBUILDING PLANT FOR PORTLAND --- CONCERT PROHIBITED IN VANCOUVER

G.T.P. FORCES U.S. COMPANIES TO REDUCE RATES

United States Railroad and Steamship Companies Agree to Reduce Rates From Alaska.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Seattle, Feb. 19.—The trans-continental railroads, having their terminals here, announced today that through fares from Alaskan points to the east have been reduced by \$14 to meet the competition over the Grand Trunk Pacific via Prince Rupert.

The railroad companies and steamship lines have agreed to absorb the reduction proportionately.

The officials of these companies have met several times in Seattle during the last two weeks to try and arrive at some arrangement by which the competition of the G. T. P. might be met, but, until today, the railroad companies would not agree to accepting a proportionate share of the reduction.

WAR PRISONERS BENEFIT BALL WAS BIG SUCCESS

The ball in the auditorium last night in aid of the Canadians who are prisoners of war in Germany was a huge success from every standpoint. The large building was profusely decorated with the flags of the Allies and a liberal supply of bunting, while the Stars and Stripes was draped along with the flag of Canada and the Union Jack, which was quite appropriate since the people of the great republic to the south are doing magnificent work for our wounded and prisoners, as well as for the people of Belgium, Serbia and Armenia.

There must have been well over 500 people present and all had a good time. The music was an outstanding feature in a splendid entertainment. Under the leadership of Mr. Balagno, the orchestra did great work, proof of which was given in the fact that practically everyone stayed until early morning. Many must have come to look on but stayed to dance, so enticing was the music. The other members of the orchestra were: Mr. Harvey, violin; Mr. Zelaski, piccolo; Mr. Fred. Renworth, flute; Corporal Collier, of the 11th Irish Fusiliers, cornet; and Mr. Harry Lascelle, the drums. The orchestra gave their services gratuitously, and the piano used was kindly given for the occasion by Walker's Music Store.

Mr. Marren had the floor in first-class condition, which added not a little to the enjoyment of the dance. The Grand March was headed by Piper James Sturgeon, the wail of the pipes being heard to great advantage in the large building.

PORTLAND WILL HAVE HUGE SHIP-BUILDING PLANT

Orders Booked for two Large Steel Vessels—Enemy Plot is Foiled by Vancouver Police.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Portland, Ore., Feb. 19.—The building of a million and a half shipbuilding plant for the construction of steel steamships has been announced.

The Willamette and Northwestern Steel Works are behind the project. Orders are on hand for the building of two 8,800-ton vessels just as soon as the plant is completed. It is expected that the dock construction work will employ fifteen hundred men.

Plot in Vancouver.

Vancouver, Feb. 19.—At South Vancouver last night, a concert which had been arranged by the children of soldiers and sailors in aid of the Patriotic Fund, was prohibited by the police, who had received word that there was a plot to blow up the Kalenberg Hall while the concert was in progress.

CITY OFFICIALS HAVE GONE TO VICTORIA

City Solicitor Fred Peters and City Treasurer E. D. Johnson left for Victoria on the Prince Rupert this morning to confer with the officials of the attorney-general's department regarding the drafting of the private bill, which is to be brought down at the next session of the house, sanctioning the change in the basis of the city's indebtedness to the serial bond system.

Arrangements have been made with the premier for a conference on Monday. Mayor McCaffery, on taking office, learned that there was a difference of opinion between the city solicitor and the attorney-general regarding the form which the bill was to take, and immediately took action in the matter and it is confidently believed that in a few days the measure will be in shape for early consideration in the house.

Mayor McCaffery is very anxious to have the matter thoroughly in hand at the earliest possible moment as the sooner an effort is made to place the new bonds the greater chance is there of a successful outcome to the negotiations.

SLIGHT FIRE

About 3:30 yesterday afternoon a fire alarm was turned in from the warehouse of the Brackman-Ker Company on First Avenue. Both engines were quickly on the scene and in a very few minutes the outbreak was quelled.

PRINCIPAL BRADY'S ADDRESS ON PAARDEBURG

Sunday is Paardeburg Day, a day that is always observed by the I. O. D. E. and this year Mr. Brady kindly consented to give an address to the high school pupils yesterday afternoon. Several members of the Queen Mary Chapter of the I. O. D. E. were present, and were given a cordial welcome by Mr. Brady, after which the pupils, under Miss McLennaghan's guidance, sang "O Canada." In his address Mr. Brady gave a stirring account of the events leading up to the battle of Paardeburg and the birth of the great spirit of Imperialism which today binds the Colonies and the Motherland so closely together, for at Paardeburg the Canadians received their first great baptism of fire and wrote their names large in Imperial history. Mr. Brady finished his address by an eloquent appeal to the young people present to remember the sacrifices their countrymen made in South Africa and are making today, and in their own patriotism to be worthy of them.

All present then sang the spirited song "We'll never let the Old Flag Fall" and "God Save the King," and after a few words of thanks and appreciation from the Regent, Mrs. Du Vernet, the very interesting and inspiring afternoon was closed.

KAISER'S FIFTH PRINCE IS MUCH ANNOYED

Prince Oscar, Wounded by Shell Splinters, Orders Bombardment of Russian Positions.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Feb. 19.—Prince Oscar, the fifth son of the Kaiser, was wounded by splinters of shell in the head and thigh while inspecting the German troops in front of the Russian positions in the Minsk district. The prince was so infuriated that he immediately ordered a bombardment of the Russian positions.

Hun Activity in the West.

Amsterdam, Feb. 19.—There have been great movements of German troops in southern and central Belgium all week.

Holland announces an embargo upon the exportation of fruit into Germany and Sweden has announced the prohibition of the export of coffee into Germany.

The German press has announced that the Allies are preparing to occupy more Greek ports.

Captain Jack Nichols, formerly captain of the Granby gas boat fleet, went south on the Prince Rupert this morning, accompanied by his bride. Captain Nichols is one of the youngest captains on register on the coast.

Mrs. Nichols was formerly Miss Mona Henry, one of the most popular young ladies in the smelter town. The young couple were married quietly at Anyox on Thursday evening and were the recipients of many handsome presents. Captain Nichols has gone south to take up an appointment at Vancouver Harbor.

WEDDING BELLS

Miss Pearl Johnson, formerly of Prince Rupert, was married to Mr. Fred Lade, oil burner operator in the steam auxiliary plant of the Granby Company, at Anyox last Wednesday evening. The ceremony took place at the home of Mr. Hugh A. McDonald, brother-in-law of the bridegroom. Miss Johnson is sister-in-law of Mr. M. M. Wells, inspector of foreign ore at Granby. The young couple will make their home in the smelter town.

RUSSIANS ARE CHASING TURKS IN SNOWSTORM

Erzerum Forts Filled with Dead Turks—Russians Capture Many Motor Cars and Field Guns.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Feb. 19.—The Russians are pursuing the fleeing Turks south of Erzerum in a snowstorm. The full story of the capture of the great Turkish fortress will make thrilling reading.

When the Russians took possession, the forts were filled with Turkish dead. The number of guns counted to date exceeds two hundred. In addition to large captures of field artillery, the Russians took possession of several dozens of motor cars fitted with wireless apparatus along with pontoon bridge parts.

The fortress is situated one mile above sea level and dominates the whole district. The Russians dragged their artillery up on to the adjacent heights and conducted a separate attack with the bayonet.

The forts of Gudek and Delanges, which are twenty miles outside of Erzerum, were the first to capitulate, opening up the way for an attack upon the inner forts. The Russians are now repairing the damage done by their artillery against any possible large attempt to recapture the position.

MINING REPORT

The suggestion of Alderman Casey that the exhaustive report on the mineral resources of Northern British Columbia, prepared by Mr. A. C. Garde, should be printed in pamphlet form for the information of development companies throughout the world is certainly along the right lines.

The report was drawn up with a view to urging upon the authorities the wisdom of installing a copper refinery at this point, and, as Alderman McClymont pointed out, the probability is that it will not attain this object. Nevertheless, the report in itself is a great asset to the city and district. It is sound in every detail and is free from all speculative estimates and is just the sort of material development men would ask for in considering properties in the north.

Two thousand copies of the pamphlet could be printed at an outlay of \$100 and that sum would undoubtedly be returned many times over if Alderman Casey's proposal is acted upon. Enquiries are reaching Prince Rupert by every mail from all quarters of Canada and the United States and many of the enquirers are men with a knowledge of mining. The first necessity of this mining district is development and when that has been done it will be time enough to discuss the refinery proposition. That the publishing of this report will aid development seems certain.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

If the electors of Vancouver allow the Bowser machine to put one over on them on the 26th, they will deserve the kind of government which will follow.

The Tories are depending upon the power of the dollar and L. D. Taylor to carry Tisdall to victory next week.

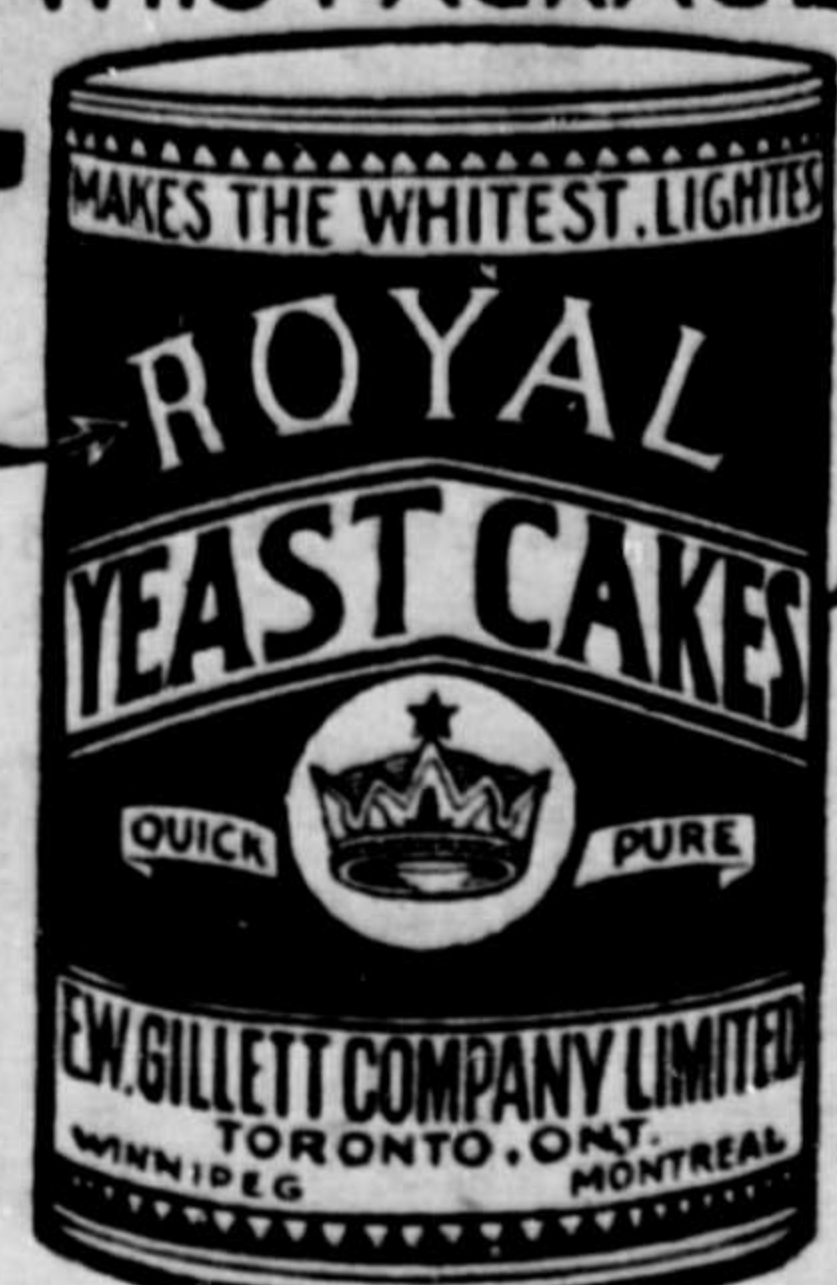

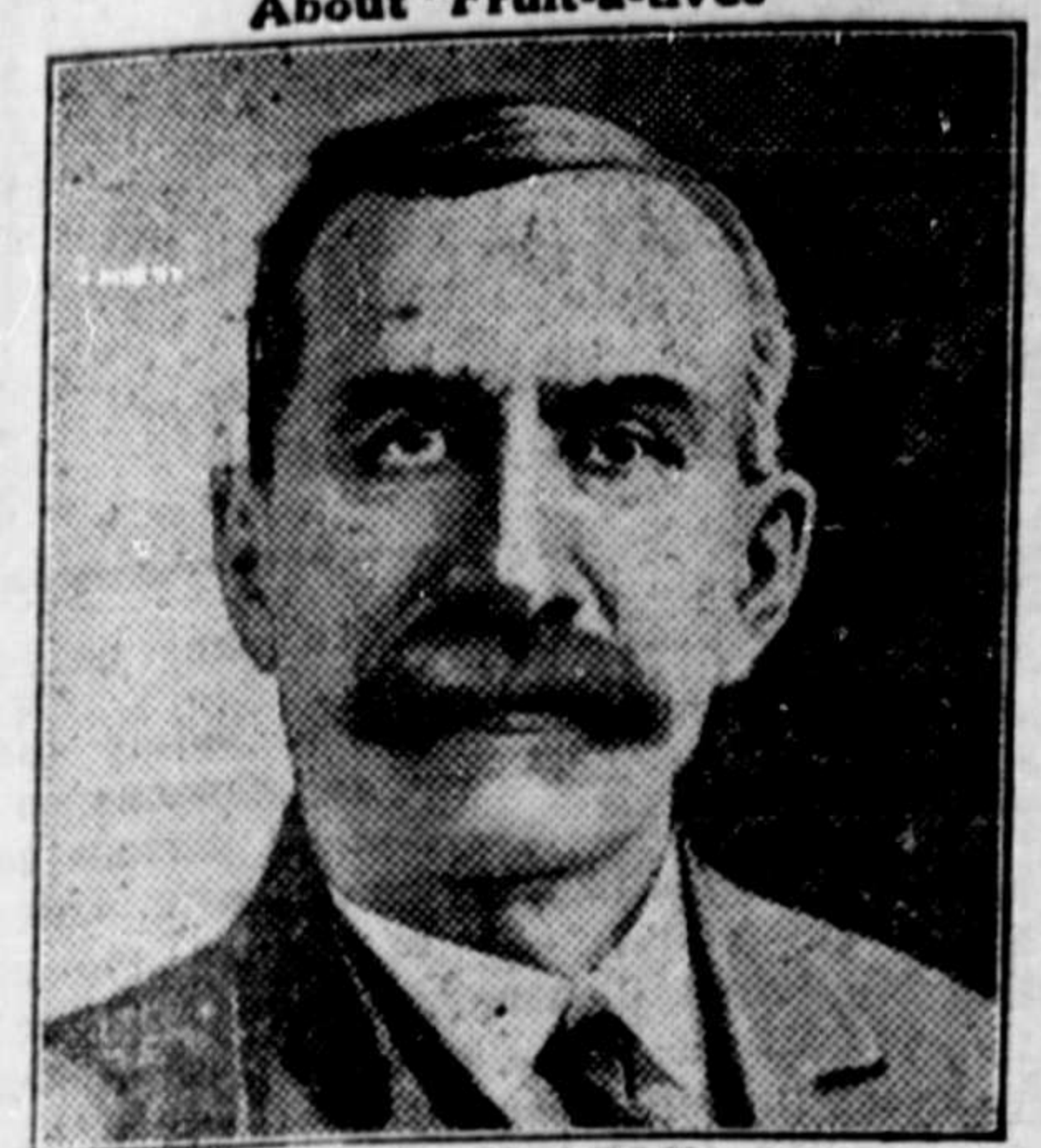

It will take some time to get in all the returns, but it is expected that over \$300 will be available with which to provide food and comforts for the boys who are imprisoned in Germany.

STEAMER ZAPORA ENCOUNTERED ICEBERG

Seattle, Feb. 16.—In a damaged condition as a result of a collision with a large iceberg off Cape Spencer, Alaska, the fishing steam schooner Zapora, of the Booth Fisheries Company fleet, is expected here tonight. News of the Zapora's plight was received today by wireless from Sitka, where the vessel called while steaming south. The Zapora struck the berg while steaming at full speed at night. The Zapora, a vessel of 289 tons gross, has a cargo of 160,000 pounds of fish. She is in command of Captain T. C. Selness.

- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

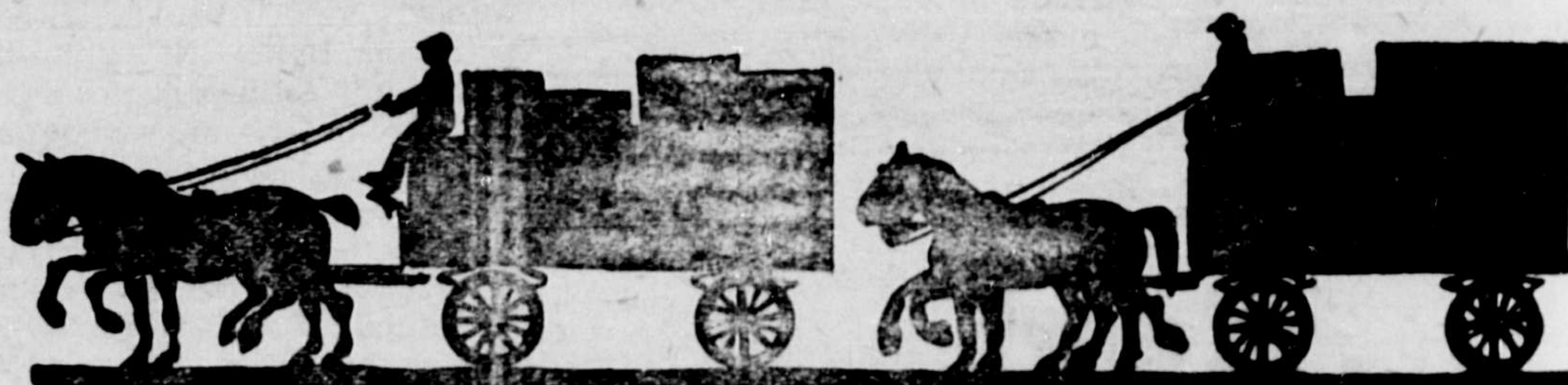

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

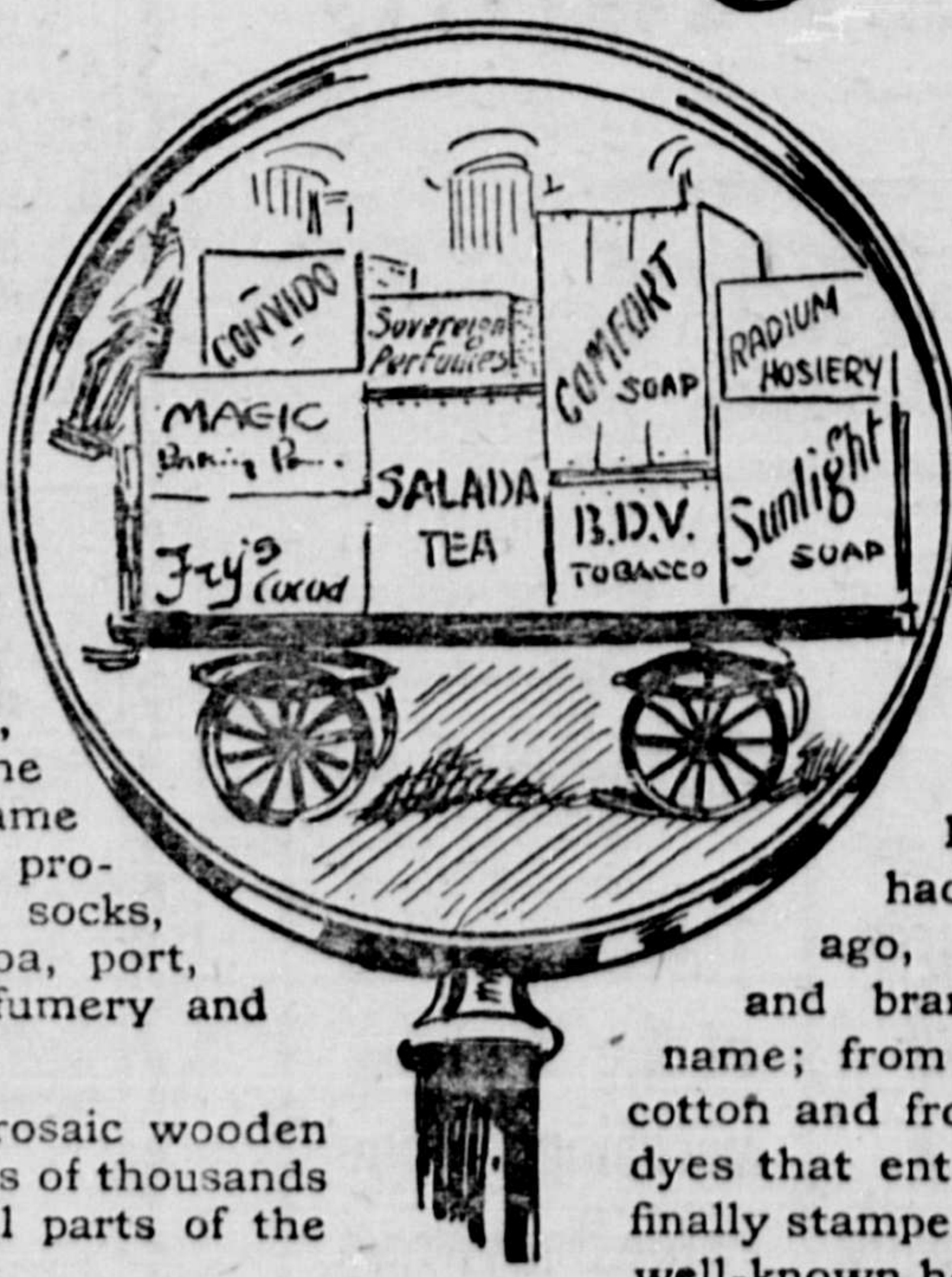
There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
