GERMAN MERCHANTS PETITION FOR PEACE

TURKS COMPLETELY ROUTED BY THE RUSSIANS--ENTIRE DIVISION SURROUNDED

PEACE PETITION BY PROMINENT HUN MERCHANTS

Business Will be Ruined Unless Peace Comes Soon—General Leckie Wounded—Hun Sea-plane Raids.
(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 21.—Five hundred prominent merchants, bankers and ship owners of Hamburg, Lubbeck and Bremen have petitioned the German government to begin overtures for peace, with a view to ending the war in three months. These business men claim that unless peace is declared in that time the Hansabund will be ruined.

The Hansabund is a union of bankers, merchants and ship owners of the old Free States of Northern Germany which enjoyed special privileges at the hands of the government from the olden days. This district is the stronghold of Germany's overseas commerce.

German Raids.

London, Feb. 21.—The Germans have made two sea-plane raids on Lowestoft and Dover. Two men and one boy were killed and one marine injured. The windows of a church were blown in, but fortunately none of the congregation was injured.

General Leckie Wounded.

Ottawa, Feb. 21.—Brigadier-General Leckie, of Vancouver, commanding the Second Canadian Brigade, has been wounded.

Britain Claims Appam.

Washington, Feb. 21.—British owners of the Appam have entered suit for the recovery of the vessel. The claim that, under an old Prussian treaty, the vessel must be conveyed into harbor by a war vessel. The United States government has taken charge of the vessel.

RUSSIANS ARE PLAYING HAVOC WITH THE TURKS

Armenians Lend a Hand—Turkish Division Surrounded and Captured—Kaiser Anxious.
(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Feb. 21.—Driving the Turkish rear-guard before them, the Russian armies are inflicting great losses on the enemy. Turkish losses during the last two weeks amount to one hundred thousand men.

The Russian armies which are pursuing the fleeing Turks are now approaching Djirbekr, on the Tigris river about fifty miles from the railroad between Bagdad and Constantinople. The Armenian population is massacring the fleeing debris of the Turkish army.

Division Surrounded.

The entire thirty-fourth Ottoman division, which was marching to reinforce the Turkish army holding Erzerum, has been surrounded and captured with thirteen guns.

One Russian corps in the assault upon Erzerum captured 240 cannon.

Black Sea Activity.

A new Russian army is landing at Trebizond on the Black Sea, the Russian fleet co-operating in the attack.

Kaiser's Message.

The Kaiser has sent a message to Von Der Goltz, who is in charge of the Turkish forces, commanding that the Russian advance be checked at any cost.

Duma Convenes.

After a recess of one year, the Duma will convene tomorrow.

ARTHUR AND DICK, THE TWO BEAUTIFUL BOYS

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—When this middle-aged government started housekeeping it gave itself an interest in life by adopting two beautiful babies named Arthur and Richard. These two dimpled darlings have been such a delight to their parents that the government now seeks to extend its life a year to watch them grow. So true is it that we live in our children. Artie and Dick—for that is the way they are known around the House—are as different in disposition as sun and rain. Artie is a mild-mannered little fellow, quiet as a lamb, not a whimper out of him, always sitting on the floor and playing with his toes, but Dick is inclined to be naughty. Artie has never cost his parents a pang, but Dick keeps them guessing. Artie is a good boy and is pleased when his papa gives him a silver cup, but Dick sets up a howl if he doesn't get the whole dinner service. Paregoric peppermint water, rattles, teething rings have no effect on Dick. He cries because he likes it and when he doesn't get what he wants the whole neighborhood knows it.

Many's the night the Borden government has sat up with little Dick. Spokane, Feb. 21.—The Northern Pacific Burlington Express collided with the North Coast Limited on Sunday during a fog near South Cheney, seventeen miles west of Spokane.

The dead include Prof. Elton Fulmer, state chemist; I. J. Minnick, oil inspector, Spokane; Lee N. Conroy, passenger agent, Spokane; Benjamin L. Berkey, Portland, Ore.; Dr. John Matthews, and J. A. Payant.

All the passengers were asleep when the crash came. The injured are now being cared for in the hospital at Spokane.

TO WHAT ADVANTAGE?

Under the above caption the Victoria Colonist details many reasons why the people of Rossland should not venture to oust the Hon. Lorne Campbell in the by-election. The Bowserian sheet says that the only issue in Rossland is as to whether Mr. Campbell will be minister of mines, or whether that portfolio will remain vacant for the remainder of the session.

In the first place, neither Rossland nor any other part of the province is genuinely interested as to whether Bowser or Campbell is officially recorded as minister of mines. Bowser will in any case be the minister in fact, if not in name. In the second place, if Lorne Campbell is not returned, it will not make the slightest difference to Rossland or any other mining district in the province, insofar as the prosecution of the mining industry is concerned. Lorne Campbell is not the protector and preserver of the mineral resources of the province, but is simply the representative of the mining syndicates in the Bowser cabinet. The defeat of this representative will be a defeat for the syndicates and a victory for the people.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Journal says that the mayor has found Premier Bowser and the Hon. William Manson willing to aid in the passing of the private bill covering the serial bond issue. What did the Journal expect these gentlemen to do anyway—do everything they possibly could to put obstacles in the way?

Portland, Ore., is luckier than Prince Rupert. It not only has the prospect of a ship-building

plant, but already has orders for two steel steamers.

The railroad and steamship lines to the south are reducing their through rates from Alaskan points to meet the Grand Trunk Pacific competition, but they cannot alter the geographical position of Prince Rupert, which enables a business man to reach the east two days sooner than by the southern route.

Prince Oscar of Germany must be an irritable young Teuton when he takes offence when a Russian shell greets him, even though it does come as rather a shock.

There are still great movements of German troops on the western front. Perhaps they are practicing moving in view of what is liable to take place just when General Joffre is ready to give the word.

was presented with that silver cup I mentioned a few paragraphs ago. This gift is awarded for deportment and Artie's deportment has always been up to sample. In this case the silver cup is the solicitor-generalship with the post of Privy Councillor on the side. Although this does not entitle him to full cabinet rank and salary, it indicates that the Hon. Arthur Meighan, if he has not fully arrived, it at least rapidly approaching.

Meanwhile what about Dick? Dick was a bad actor from the start. When Dick first saw the light of Ottawa, some four years ago, he let out a yell that could be heard from the Atlantic to the Pacific. 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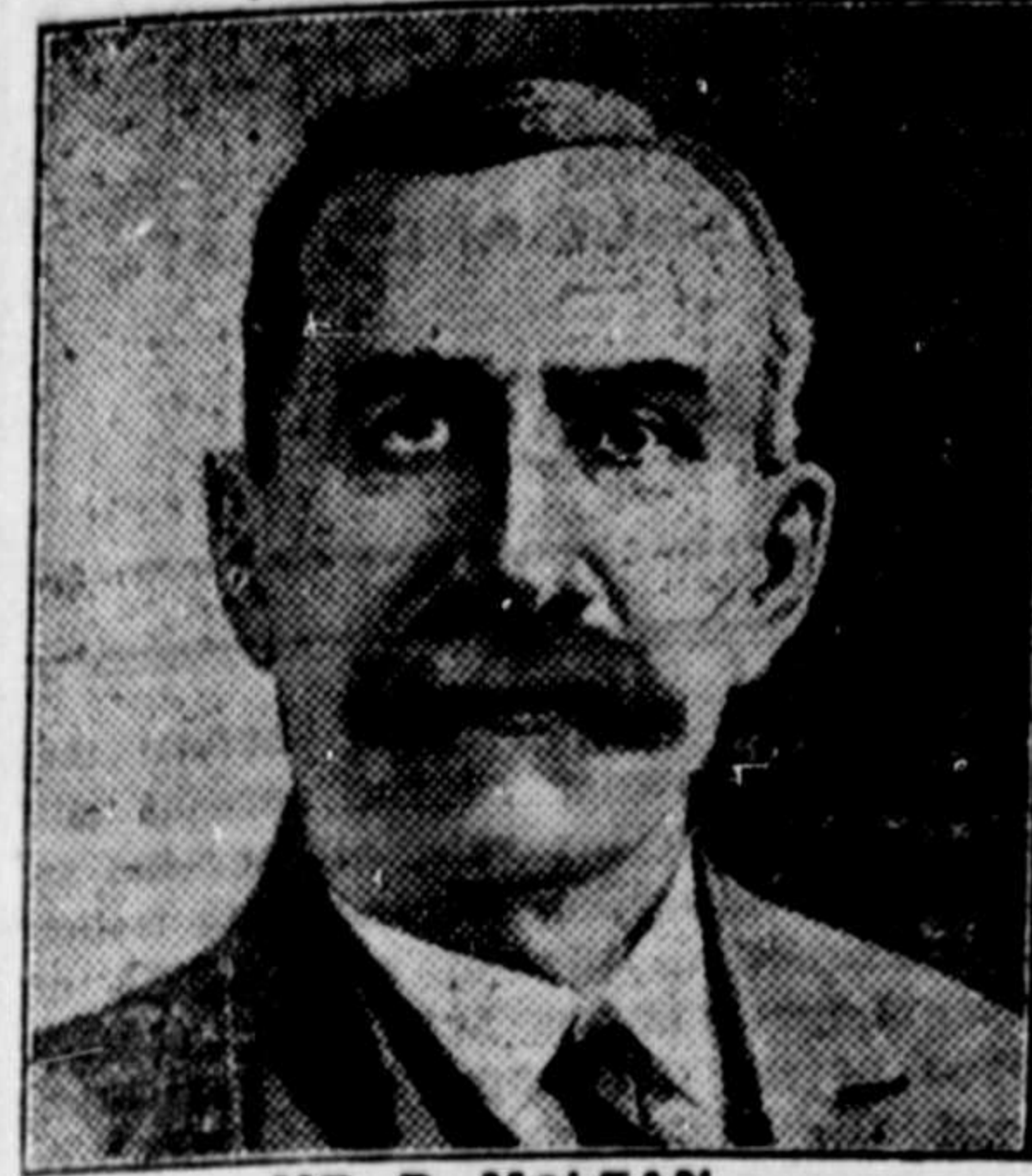

No longer is he the red-hot enfant terrible of the Conservative party. His views underwent a sea change and where he scorched before he now radiates only a pleasant heat. Although Dick saw nobody in England that he fancied more than himself, he formed a higher opinion of the Borden government by comparing it with British statesmanship. At all events he is satisfied to have the Borden government lead him by the hand.

Dick's adoptive parents intend great things for him. The other day when the premier received the cold-water people in his private room in the East Block, there was Dick on the big red sofa beside four cabinet ministers, quite one of the family. From which I infer that R. B. Bennett—that is Dick's full name—is being groomed for a cabinet job, minister of munitions or something just as good. He is all dressed up and has some place to go. I don't know just where he is going but he is on the way.—H. F. G.

CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia at its next session on behalf of the City of Prince Rupert for an Act containing provisions which are shortly stated as follows:—

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates, and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund.

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

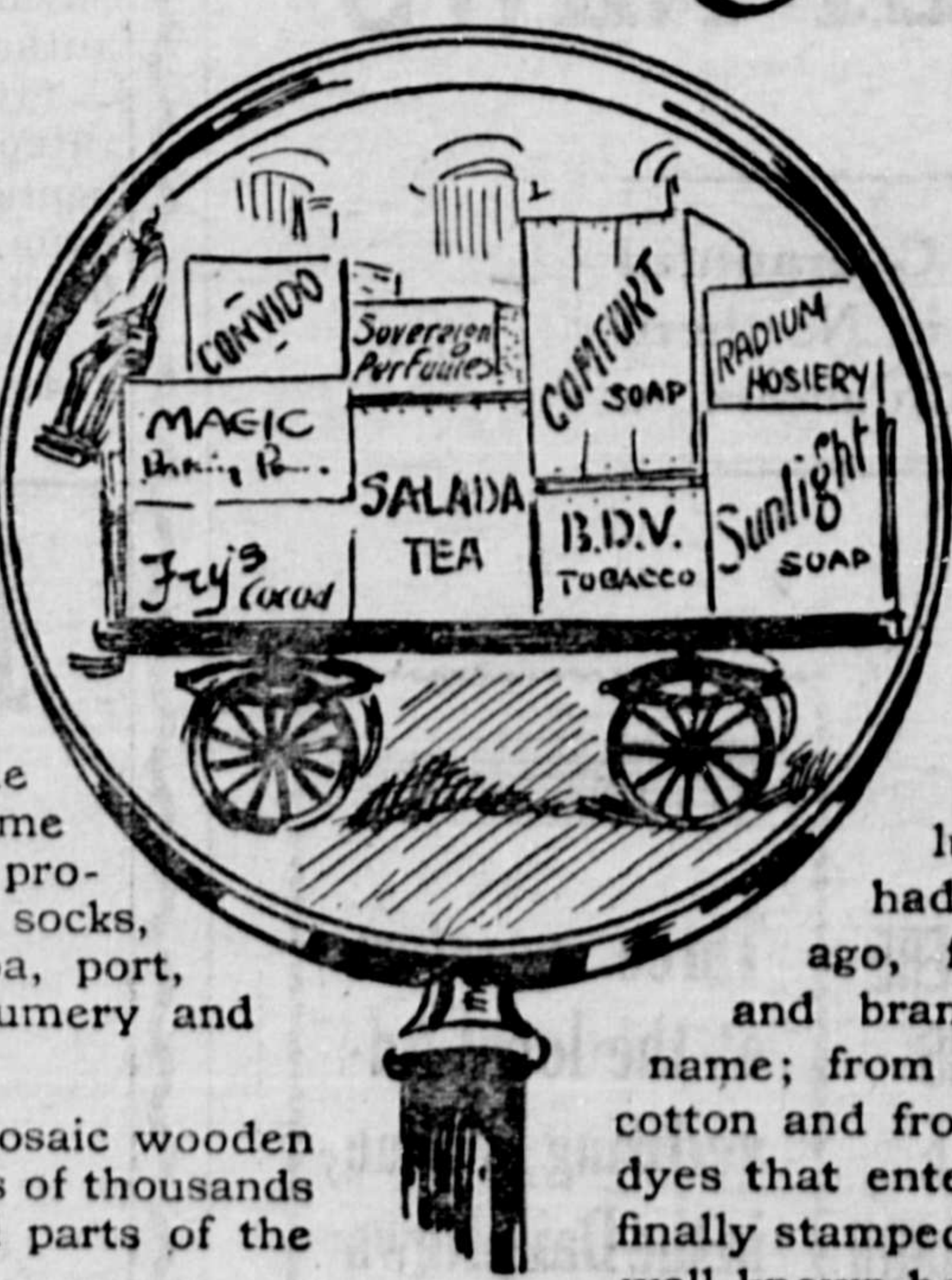
There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
