## LAST GERMAN OFFENSIVE ON WEST FRONT

### TURKS EVACUATING TREBIZOND -- GERMANS REPULSED IN RIGA AND GALICIA

#### GREAT GERMAN EFFORT ON THE WESTERN FRONT

Triple Offensive May be last Hun Attempt at Offensive—Jap Fleet Reported in the Mediterranean.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Feb. 23.—A triple German offensive is in progress in Flanders, Artois and north of Verdun. These are believed by experts to form the last great German effort to break the Allies' lines.

If they are unsuccessful, the Kaiser will be obliged to assume the defensive. This will probably prove to be the turning point in the entire war. With Germany frustrated, France, Britain and Russia will co-operate in a gigantic campaign to carry the war into Germany.

The Kaiser has arrived at Charleville, in French Argonne, where the German general staff is located.

Japs in Mediterranean.

Copenhagen, Feb. 23.—The German newspapers announce that they have received despatches from Italy stating that a Japanese fleet, accompanied by a great number of aircraft, has arrived in the Mediterranean.

#### ARNOLD CONFESSED TO TRUST AUDITOR

Vancouver, Feb. 23.—During the taking of the evidence for discovery in the Dominion Trust case, W. E. Hodges, auditor for the Dominion Trust, admits that the late W. R. Arnold confessed to him that he had committed acts for which he could be put in the penitentiary. Arnold had an appointment with the auditor at the time he met his death.

#### PRINCE RUPERT CLUB V. EMPLOYERS' LIABILITY

Judge Robertson this morning heard the case of the Prince Rupert Club Limited v. The Employers' Liability and Assurance Corporation Limited for recovery of a sum of money embezzled by the late assistant secretary.

Alex. M. Manson appeared for the defendants and Carss and Carss for the plaintiffs.

H. F. Macleod, secretary of the club, was the first witness called and was still being examined when the court adjourned for luncheon. Examined by Mr. Carss, the witness explained how the books of the club were kept and how the services of the assistant secretary had to be dispensed with.

Under cross examination by Mr. Manson, Mr. Macleod admitted that the directors had received a report from A. B. Foster, auditor for the club, in which he pointed out that the books had not been properly kept, the cash on hand being more than was accounted for in the cash book. Mr. Manson read extracts from the report showing that the directors had been advised by the auditor that the matter should be taken up with the assistant secretary. Mr. Macleod said that he was instructed by the directors to point out to the assistant that all monies collected must be carefully accounted for and that all money paid at the office of the club. The auditor's report also stated that there were no trial balances available.

Questioned by Mr. Manson, Mr. Macleod said that the Liability Company had not been advised of this report at the time.

It transpired that Mr. Foster was the agent for the Liability Company and that the directors notified him by letter of the defalcations. The case was adjourned until 2:15.

#### DOUBLE ATTRACTION AT THE MAJESTIC THEATRE

Mr. Foulkes, the well known tennis player, was secretary of the horticultural branch and has been with the department for the past five years. Mr. Robertson was assistant horticulturist on the lower mainland and Vancouver Island and is a graduate of Ontario Agricultural College.

#### J. S. COWPER CHALLENGES MINISTERS TO DEBATE

Vancouver, Feb. 23.—Premier Bowser will speak in the Orpheum Theatre on Thursday night in support of the candidature of Hon. C. E. Tisdall.

J. S. Cowper, formerly editor of the Daily News and one of the Liberal candidates at the forthcoming general election, and who is supporting M. A. Macdonald in his campaign, has challenged Premier Bowser, Hon. C. E. Tisdall and H. H. Watson to meet him in debate in the Orpheum Theatre on the question of the Dominion Trust legislation, the proceeds to be handed to the Patriotic Fund.

#### TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

At the Trades and Labor Council meeting last night, Sergeant T. R. Maitland, of the 102nd Battalion, addressed the meeting.

Mr. Maitland, who has always interested himself in labor and who represented labor on the city council for a number of years, took the opportunity of thanking the Trades and Labor Council for the support given him while in the city. He had endeavored to do his best to serve the interests of labor, assisting in the organization of different unions and in the up-keep of a fair wage. He did not accept nomination for the city council this year, on account of his enlisting in the service of his country, but, if he returned to the city, which he hoped to do, he would again assist the Trades and Labor Council in every possible way.

President S. D. Macdonald, on behalf of the Trades and Labor Council, thanked Sergeant Maitland for the able assistance he had rendered to organized labor, and, though regretting his leaving, wished him every success and a safe return.

The question of the endorsement of the bylaw to increase the rate of interest on debentures to six per cent. was raised and after considerable discussion, it was decided that no action be taken. It was felt that the city council had not furnished sufficient information, so that the public could vote intelligently on the bylaw.

The president of the Trades and Labor Council took the opportunity to compliment Mr. John Vjereck on his appointment to the license board and intimated that he hoped that in the course of his work he would be able to follow out the principles of organized labor.

#### RUSSIANS ARE STILL GAINING IN ASIA MINOR

Turks Evacuating Trebizond—Russians Approaching Rizeh—Huns Repulsed on the Riga Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 23.—The Turks are evacuating the province of Trebizond on the Black Sea and the Russian advance forces are within a day's march of Rizeh.

The Turks are fleeing from Erzerum to Rizeh in an effort to reach Trebizond and the Russians are forcing a movement to cut off the Turkish retreat.

Germans Repulsed.

Petrograd, Feb. 23.—The Russians on the Riga and Galician fronts are active. They have seized the Teuton positions at Olyko and Dubno, repulsing all the Austro-German efforts to carry out a counter attack.

Two Taubes Downed.

Near Riga two Taubes were driven to earth and the German aviators taken prisoners.

#### D. S. O. AWARDED TO WIRELESS OPERATOR

News has reached the city that H. J. Arnold, formerly at the Dominion wireless station at Ikeda, Queen Charlotte Islands, has been awarded the D. S. O. for distinguished bravery in the aviation service. Mr. Arnold is a flight sub-lieutenant and had a most thrilling experience while scouting under the enemy's fire. His commander was obliged to descend owing to the injuries to his machine and the daring aviators landed in a river, the aeroplane turning over and over. Lieut. Arnold was instrumental in saving the life of the commander, while he kept up signalling operations while the machine was dropping to earth.

**ALL THINGS NEW**

The most amusing part of the by-election campaign in Vancouver is the strenuous effort put forth by the Tory press and speakers to hail the Bowser administration as something entirely new, which will perform miracles in the way of putting the affairs of the province on a proper basis. There is nothing which has been left undone, or badly done, by the McBride-Bowser government which they are not just itching to tackle. They are simply gasping to get at this land problem and fix it so it will stay fixed. They are simply counting the hours between now and the passing of the greatest Workmen's Compensation Act which was ever framed. The Agricultural Credits Bill is ready, in fact has been ready for a considerable time, and all it needs is the money.

To go back over the files of Tory papers prior to the retirement of Sir Richard McBride is most diverting. There we find that Sir Richard was a heaven-sent administrator who had simply to touch anything and it turned to gold. He had simply to breathe his blessing on any scheme and it succeeded. The lands of the province were in good hands and everything possible was being done to bring along the settler. In fact, there was nothing whatever that needed improvement. To improve upon the work of Sir Richard would have appeared like an attempt to paint the lily. Today, Sir Richard is mentioned by the Tories more in sorrow than in anger. His administration has been side-tracked and the word has gone forth from the boss that all things are become new, and that the past must be forgotten.

Hon. C. E. Tisdall eulogised the Workmen's Compensation Act, at his opening meeting on Saturday, but he never attempted to explain why Bowser and the rest of the bunch, on two occasions during the past few years deliberately deposited just such an act in the waste-paper basket. His friend Watson also kindly relieved Mr. Tisdall of the responsibility for the fathering of the Dominion Trust legislation. Who introduced the bill is of little importance; the important fact is that it was introduced, and that by its introduction this fraudulent company was enabled to get away with the savings of thousands of the working people of this province. Bowser admitted that Tisdall had been "lined up" by the late Mr. Arnold. Tisdall is like the little boy who dropped the milk bottle, "I didn't do it; it just happened." A lot that should never have been allowed to happen has happened, and every member of the McBride-Bowser government is culpable. Whether it be soon or late, the price will have to be paid, and the sooner the better for the welfare of the province.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

Hon. C. E. Tisdall still sticks to the old term "McBride" government in his speeches in Vancouver. In this at least Mr. Tisdall is perfectly sound, as the Bowser government and the late McBride government are one and the same bunch with the very same little schemes for the perpetuation of a corrupt machine to dominate the province.

The Tories in the south are trotting out all the familiar statistics of increases in all lines of business in the province during the reign of the McBride admin-

**"GLAD" MURPHY DIED FROM FOOTBALL INJURY**

W. E. G. Murphy, known throughout Canada as "Glad" Murphy, famous oarsman, hockeyist and rugby player, died in Toronto on Friday, from injuries sustained on October 9th.

Murphy had been completely paralyzed from the neck down since the accident. A delicate operation was performed on his spine a month ago in an effort to save his life, but it proved unavailing.

Murphy was one of the mainstays of the Argonauts and one of the finest rugby players in the country. He was training for overseas service in the aviation corps and intended to make the Argonauts-Hamilton Tigers match in which he was fatally injured, his last game.

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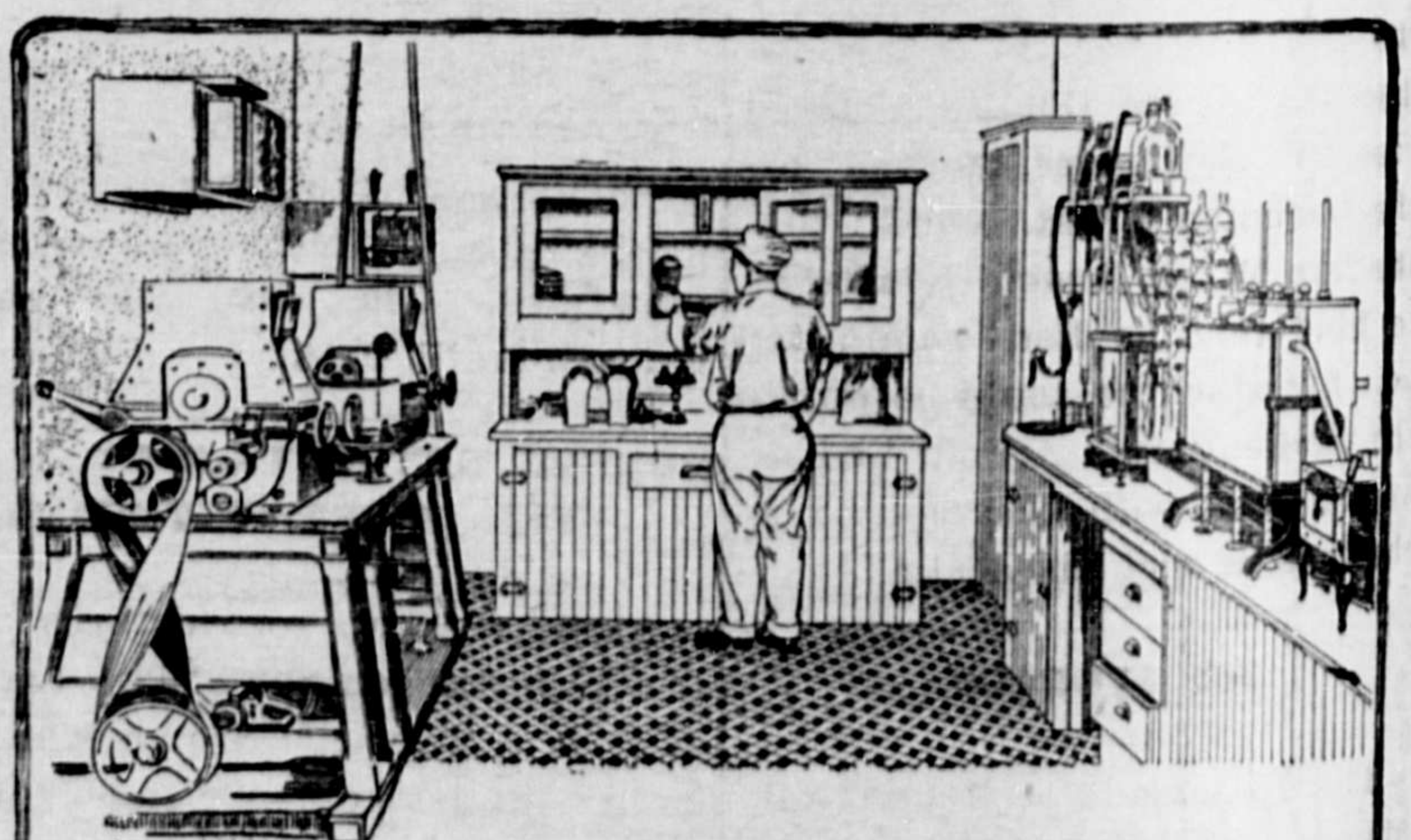

## BELLA COOLA INDIANS AND FISHING DEMANDS

The following from the Bella Coola Courier shows that the Indians down there do not welcome an increase in the number of independent fishing licenses:

The Indians of Bella Coola having learned that there has been a petition sent by white fishermen to the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the granting of an additional number of independent licenses have prepared a counter petition. Now it will be for the authorities to use the wisdom of Solomon and give a righteous decision between the contending parties.

Bella Coola, Feb. 9, 1916.

We, the undersigned, on behalf of the Bella Coola Indians, wish to enter a protest against the granting of more independent fishing licenses at Bella Coola, and base our protest on the following grounds:

1. There are no Japs fishing at Bella Coola, nor has there ever been any working for the cannery.
2. We are more than enough Indians to fill all licenses that are left.
3. We depend upon the salmon fishery for a living: long before any white man was here we fished the Bella Coola river for our food; and when the salmon cannery started we, the Indians, did about all the fishing.

Most of the men who are now seeking licenses are young men who have not been long in the country. We have always lived here; we do not want to beg, but we do ask the right to work and earn our own living as we have always done.

We therefore pray that you will give our case your most serious consideration.

and authorising the collection of instalments under such bonds with power to sell such bonds at a discount, and to use the Sinking Funds already collected towards reducing the debt; and power to raise any deficiency on sale of bonds by the issue of further bonds. Such changes to be made without submission to the ratepayers.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

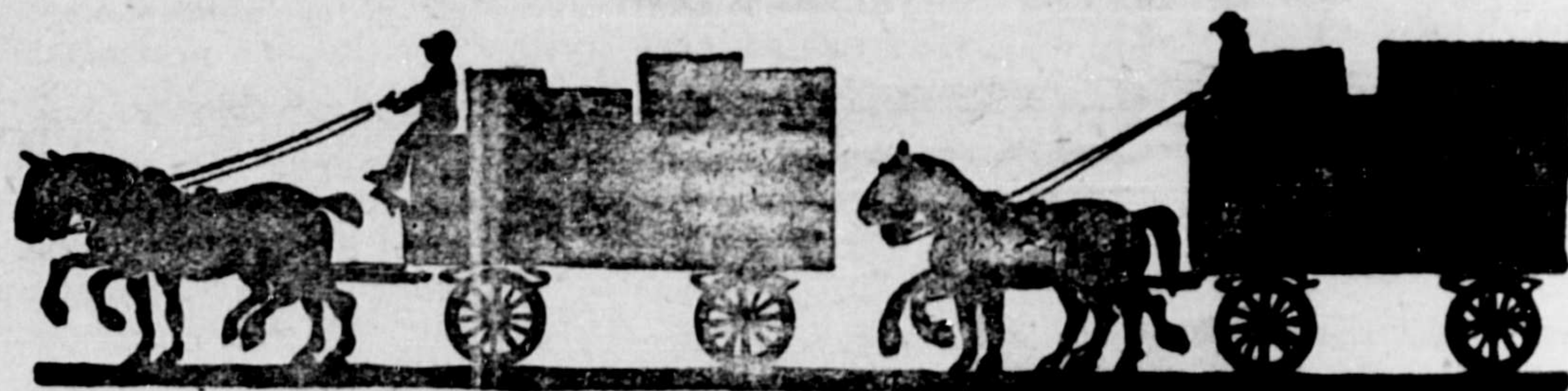

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

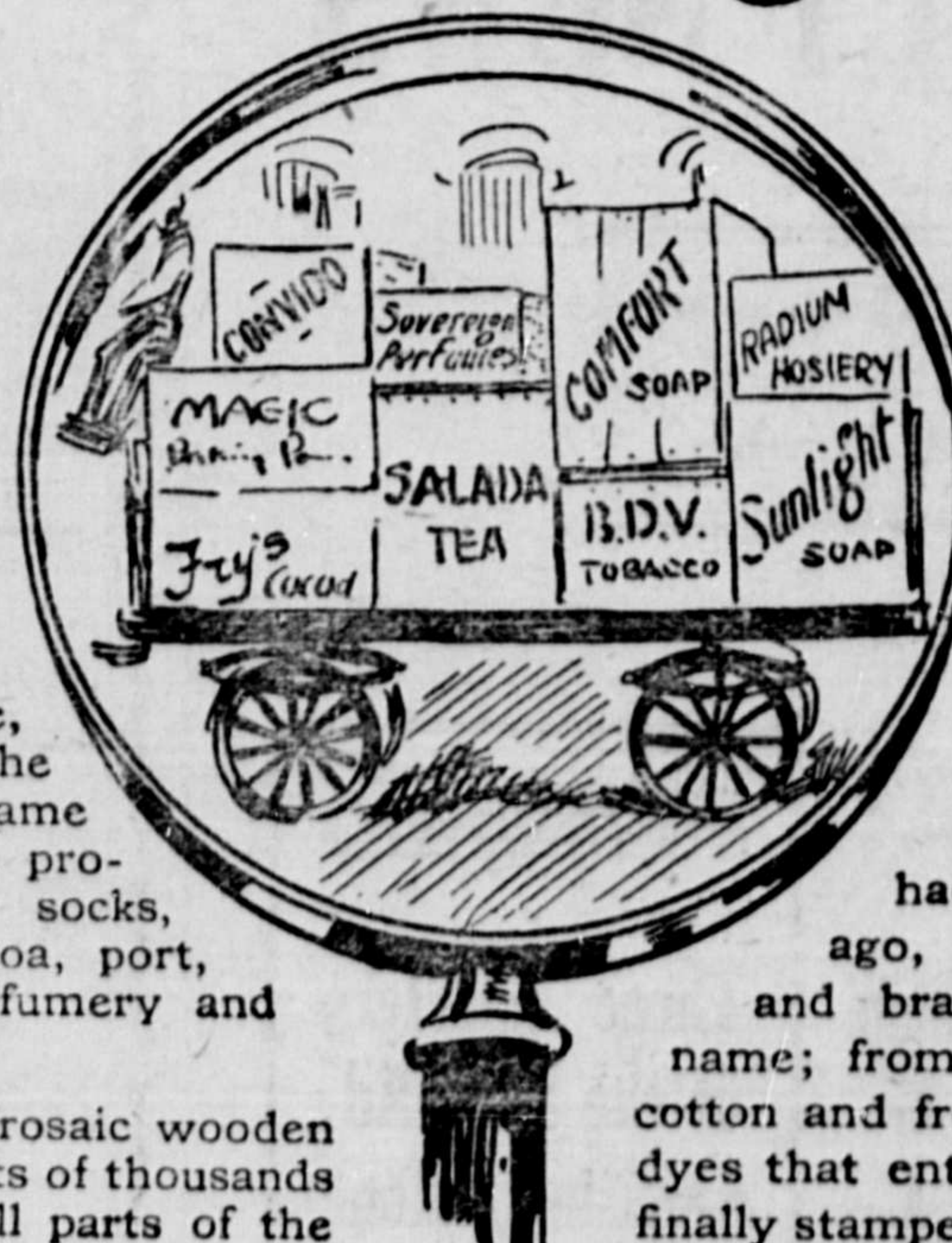
There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
