THE FRENCH STRONGHOLD IS IMPREGNABLE

GERMANS WITHIN RIFLE SHOT OF OUTER FORTS — FRENCH LINE STILL INTACT

HUNS CONTINUE GRIM STRUGGLE ON WEST FRONT

French Retire in good Order to the Stronghold—Germans are Within Rifle Range of the Outer Forts.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 25.—Continuing their tremendous drive against Verdun, which is one of the greatest battles of the war, the Germans last night penetrated within rifle shot of the outer forts, and within five miles of the great French stronghold. The French line remains unbroken.

An official statement reports that the retirement of the French to defence works which they had previously built at their leisure and had rendered impregnable, was conducted in the most deliberate manner and was carried out in order to avoid unnecessary loss of life and to obtain additional security.

Fresh French Troops.

Critics believe that the Germans will not attempt to storm Verdun itself, which bristles with modern guns and contains hundreds of thousands of fresh French troops.

The German effort with 350,000 men on a nine mile front is declared to have been engineered with the purpose of trying to recover the lost prestige of the German Crown Prince Frederick William.

German Losses.

The French position at Verdun is defended by General Humbert and 200,000 men. The German losses in the attack have been enormous, amounting to not less than 50,000 men. Long trains of enemy wounded are crossing the frontier and there are heaps of dead left on the field.

An order has been discovered, signed by General Von Deimling, urging the fifteenth German corps to renewed acts of bravery in a last offensive against France.

The French losses are insignificant in comparison to those of the enemy. France is confident of the outcome of the terrific struggle.

SKIPPER ENCOUNTERS FAST GERMAN RAIDER

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 25.—The captain of a vessel which had been sunk by a German raider has arrived at Teneriffe. He describes the raider as a vessel of 2,500 tons, carrying six seven-inch guns; two torpedo tubes and mines. She has a speed of seventeen knots and carries a crew of 250 men under the command of a German count.

HALIBUT FISHING METHODS EXPLAINED

The following extract from an article in the Pacific Fisherman Year Book on halibut line trawling should prove interesting to the people of Prince Rupert:

The halibut industry is the second most important upon the coast, a large fleet of the latest type of power vessels being employed in it. All halibut are taken on trawl lines. The quantity of line used to a dory will vary considerably. Formerly from five to seven skates were used, but the sharp competition in the industry has caused the fishermen to increase the quantity of gear to from eight to ten skates. A skate comprises seven lines of 50 fathoms each, and each of these lines will have hooks on gangions, or side lines, which are attached to the main line about eight to ten feet apart. Ordinarily there is an anchor and a buoy at each end of a skate, but for deep-water fishing an extra anchor and buoy are placed about the middle of the skate.

When a good ground has been reached the vessel drops her dories, in each of which are two men. As one man manœuvres the boat the other pays out the baited trawl in a straight string, and this is done by each boat crew, the various lines being usually parallel to each other. The first set is made about daybreak and the fishermen commence to lift about an hour after the line has all been paid out. In the bow of each dory, in a socket, has been set a wooden roller in a frame, and the line comes into the boat over this roller. When a gangion with a fish on the hook comes to the surface, it is passed along the side of the boat until it reaches the second man, who stuns the fish with a club, and

RUSSIANS CHASING TURKS IN PERSIA

Petrograd, Feb. 25.—The Russians have dislodged the Turks at Bidesurk Pass in Persia and the Turks are fleeing towards Kermanshah. The Russians have captured four big guns, machine guns and ammunition.

T. D. PATTULLO ASSISTS MACDONALD IN SOUTH

Exchanges to hand from Vancouver, in dealing with M. A. Macdonald's campaign meetings on Monday night, state that "Mr. Macdonald brought to the hall with him a sturdy northerner, Mr. T. Dufferin Pattullo, former mayor of Prince Rupert, and the Liberal candidate for that district."

Mr. Pattullo addressed two meetings in which he described the state of affairs in the north. He dwelt on the fish, timber, mineral and agricultural resources of this district, pointing out that, in spite of these, thousands of men had been obliged to leave for other parts. For this, he threw the entire blame on the government who had spent the people's money to keep the political machine greased and to keep the gang together. He told of miles and miles of roads where there were no settlers. Those who remained in the country were hanging on by the ragged edge, hoping a miracle would waft them into affluence.

In speaking of Mr. Tisdall, he described him as a man of the same type as Wm. Manson. A man who was content to do as the boss instructed, no matter what the results. What the province wanted was men who had the stamina to oppose that which they knew was wrong. Mr. Pattullo told of the charter Bowser gave them in Prince Rupert. They were not satisfied, but William Manson, the member, said he would voice the objection of the people on the floor of the house. But all he said was that the government in its wisdom had not seen fit to give them what they wanted—he supposed they would have to let it go at that.

Mr. Pattullo said that the only way to develop the country was on the community plan as outlined by Mr. Macdonald. Dealing with fishing, he said that the whole of the salmon industry was in the hands of a monopoly. Miners, like the fishermen, had never received fair treatment from the government, being hampered at every turn in their efforts to develop the mineral wealth of the province. The speaker claimed that if development work were started and continued along sane lines there would be wonderful progress and in the next ten years the province would be prosperous. In the northern districts they were going to return Liberals because the people were disgusted with the government.

At both meetings, Mr. Pattullo's speeches were received with the greatest enthusiasm, the people evidently being greatly interested in the affairs of the north.

LIBERAL OUSTS CONSERVATIVE IN PEEL COUNTY

W. J. Lowe Defeats Fallis—Bowser Holds Big Meeting in the Orpheum—P. G. E. will be Completed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Brampton, Ont., Feb. 25.—W. J. Lowe, Liberal, has been elected member for Peel County over J. R. Fallis by a majority of 305. Mr. Fallis' majority at the last election was 627. He resigned his seat in the house over an exposure regarding his profiting by horse deals in connection with purchasing remounts for service at the front.

The Liberals magnanimously offered to allow a Conservative to be returned by acclamation if the party in power would put up a new candidate, but the offer was treated with contempt by the Conservatives.

Bowser Meeting.

Vancouver, Feb. 25.—Premier Bowser, the Hon. A. C. Flumerfelt and the Hon. C. E. Tisdall held a great meeting in the Orpheum Theatre last night, with an overflow meeting in the banquet hall of the Vancouver Hotel.

The premier announced that it is his intention to carry out the promises of ex-Premier McBride with regard to prohibition and that it is the intention of the government to complete the construction of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

Mr. Flumerfelt announced that he was arranging a loan with which to make a start on the Agricultural Credits Bill, and stated that the Dominion government would be asked to aid in the erection of a smelter and to assist in ship building.

George A. McNicholl is expected to arrive from Winnipeg tonight accompanied by Captain Nicholson.

PAST HISTORY

The Victoria Colonist is making some wonderful admissions these days in order to make the way smoother for A. C. Flumerfelt. It even goes so far as to state that "For some years the department of finance has not been in the hands of a minister familiar with financial matters." This is just in keeping with what has been stated repeatedly in regard to the McBride-Bowser government. So long as Bowser was boss, it did not matter very much who or what filled the other cabinet positions. It is true that Bowser has now nominated a financial man as minister of finance, but Bowser will still remain the boss and Mr. Flumerfelt's cabinet movements will all be clearly defined by the boss.

In dealing with Mr. Flumerfelt's position, the Colonist reiterates that the McBride administration is a matter of history, and that what it did or did not do has no bearing on the present occasion. It is not to be wondered at that the Colonist has a keen desire to forget the past. There are many events in very recent history which the Matsonian organ would dearly like to have the people forget. Doubtless it will consider that, since the McBride administration is now a matter of history, that the Liberals should forget that the Colonist figures on nearly every page of the provincial accounts for some amount, and that when the details of these amounts are gone into and made public, the people will realize where a good deal of the \$18,000,000 has gone.

Mr. Matson doubtless also considers that the Songhees Reserve deal, with its big commission to himself and friends is a matter of history, history

so sacred that it must not be disturbed. The little matter of letting a contract to George Fraser, a druggist, for the excavation work at the parliament buildings is another matter of history which Mr. Matson will hope is forgotten. This deal has a distinctly Manitoban flavor about it, and some day Mr. Fraser may be called upon to explain a few little details in connection with a change in the specifications for the work. The Bowser administration is clearly responsible for the misdeeds of the McBride-Bowser administration, as Bowser was, and is, the boss.

Mr. Macdonald must be keeping the Tories pretty busy in the south since they are even seeking the aid of J. P. McConnell to try and throw mud at him.

The News-Advertiser is hard put to it in an effort to make M. A. Macdonald look as black as the men who passed the Dominion Trust legislation. They evidently think that the Tories will look a little whiter if a few gallons of Tory ink are spilt over the Liberal candidate.

HALIBUT FISHING METHODS

(Continued From Page One.)

then hauls it into the boat with a gaff. In the bottom of the boat a square net, with rings at the corners, is spread and the fish are laid on this. When through fishing, the dory is run alongside the vessel, which lowers its cargo hook, and the corners of the net are gathered together, the hook run through the rings, the winch started, and in a few moments the net load of fish is lying on the deck.

The number of sets made in a day depends upon the weather and the amount of daylight. During the long days of summer there is about twenty hours of daylight and fishing can be carried on longer than in winter.

As in rough weather the dories cannot be used, several devices have been invented for the purpose of setting and hauling trawls from the deck of the vessel. In this method the baited trawls are grouped on a platform at the stern. To the rail of the latter has been affixed a framework with three rollers, one being parallel to the rail and the other two on end at right angles to it. The trawls are paid out through this framework as the vessel moves forward, facilitating their movement and preventing them from fouling the rail.

On the starboard rail, just forward of the pilot-house, a roller is set in a socket. In hauling in the trawls the buoy is picked up and the buoy line is brought to the surface by the winch. After the anchor is aboard the line is run over the roller and the winch reels it in. When a fish comes to the surface on the gangions it is gaffed aboard by the fishermen. In this way fishing can be carried on in weather too rough for a dory to live.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

(6) To provide that securities to be issued under the following bylaws, under none of which any securities have as yet been issued, Annuity Instalment or Serial bonds may be issued and such bonds to be for the term here set forth, namely:

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208: being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund:

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.
QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
