MASSACRE CONTINUES NORTH OF VERDUN

TURKS AND BULGARS ALARMED AT RUSSIAN ADVANCE—SUBMARINE WAR BEGINS

FRENCH FIGHT FEROCIOUSLY IN VERDUN BATTLE

German Prisoners Describe Fighting as Massacre—Germans Repulsed in hand to hand fighting.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Feb. 29.—The bombardment north of Verdun continues with great intensity. In hand to hand fighting near Douaumont, the Germans were repulsed.

Prisoners who have been taken describe the fighting as being simply massacre.

The Germans captured the village of Manhuelles by an intense artillery fire, but, by counter attacks, this position was retaken by the French. The German forces engaged now number 750,000.

Situation Improved.

The situation has improved and the French are re-acting vigorously against the German bludgeon strokes. By impetuous counter attacks the French have thrown the Germans from many positions captured during the past four days, and the action is starting on its second phase.

Premier Briand has issued a statement to the press telling how the Germans were caught between two fires that barred their progress. They were also showered with shrapnel from all sides.

At an unexpected moment fresh divisions of French troops surged upon the field and the Germans saw their offensive stopped short.

"The struggle was a titanic one, and our troops fought frantically," said the premier. "Our light and heavy artillery dug sanguinary furrows through the compact ranks of the advancing Germans as they came on to certain death. Finally, completely exhausted and their ranks decimated, the German armies recoiled."

An attempt by the Germans to shift the centre of battle is taken as a sign that the German general staff now despairs of success.

COURT OF REVISION

The assessment roll for 1916 was brought down at the meeting of the city council last night, and adopted on the motion of Ald. Dybhavn, seconded by Ald. Smith.

It was intimated that the court of revision will be held on April 4th, at 11 a. m., when the following members would sit: Mayor McCaffery and Aldermen Montgomery, Dybhavn, McClymont and Barrie. The mayor intimated that the roll was exactly the same as the last submitted.

All together, boost for that Prince Rupert company.

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TURKS AND BULGARS SHOWING SIGNS OF ALARM

Russian Advance has Scared them into Asking for an Understanding with the Allies.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Feb. 29.—Alarmed at the Russian advance in Asia Minor and at the inability of the Germans to render aid, the Turks and Bulgarians are asking for an understanding with the Entente Allies.

Bulgaria fears that she will lose her capital of Sofia, and both powers are greatly alarmed over the new turn of events. They ask for the observance of territorial integrity.

The Turks are hastily evacuating Trebizond and the neighboring ports on the coast of the Black Sea.

Guests Poisoned.

San Francisco, Feb. 29.—Forty guests at a Methodist Ministerial banquet in Howard Street church have been poisoned. Many were taken ill at the banquet table after partaking of ice cream which had been poisoned.

D. W. MORRISSEY ENQUIRES REGARDING SERIAL BONDS

At the city council last night a letter from D. W. Morrissey was read asking, amongst other things, what the probable discount would be on the thirty year six per cent. serial bonds, and if the city had received any bona fide or probable offer for these bonds which would encourage a change in the financial system of the city, in the present distressful financial condition of the world. He asked that a reply be made through the medium of the press.

Ald. Montgomery moved that a reply be sent to Mr. Morrissey privately and that the letter contain nothing of a nature liable to prejudice the sale of the bonds, such as information regarding offers, etc.

Ald. Dybhavn suggested that Mr. Morrissey be sent a copy of the report drawn up by the city treasurer some time ago, which contained all the information it was possible to give, and which he believed any man would understand. He felt that the mayor was not entitled to give any further information.

Ald. Montgomery said that he thought Mr. Morrissey was entitled to receive all the information that could be given within reason. Ald. Casey seconded the motion which carried.

WOMEN'S FRANCHISE DEFEATED AT OTTAWA

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Feb. 29.—Hon. William Pugsley moved in the House of Commons last night that the franchise be given to the women of all provinces where provincial woman suffrage has been allowed. The motion was defeated.

INCREASED INTEREST RATE ON SERIAL BONDS

In discussing the bylaw covering the increasing of the interest on the serial bonds to not less than six per cent. per annum at the city council last night, Ald. Casey said that there seemed to be some misunderstanding among the citizens as to why this should be done.

The mayor explained that it had been done at the express wish of the government and the bond houses and had been strongly endorsed by the bank. He pointed out that it made no material difference to the city as the bonds bearing six per cent. would naturally sell at a smaller discount than bonds bearing five, while there was a great advantage in that six per cent. would find a much readier market.

ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

Charles Bloomberg, a miner who recently came here from Rocher de Boule, is in hospital suffering from loss of blood resulting from self-inflicted wounds in the neck and wrists. Officer Bailey had the man removed from his shack on Second Avenue on Sunday evening and he is now progressing favorably. He will stand trial for attempted suicide.

FLUMERFELT IS MAKING FRANTIC EFFORTS TO WIN

Millions Promised for Ship Building Guarantee—Measure to be Rushed Through in Ten Days.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, Feb. 29.—The Hon. A. C. Flumerfelt has announced that the government will introduce legislation within ten days to aid ship building and to guarantee their construction to the extent of two millions.

It is proposed to build ten ships, five of these to be built at Victoria and five at other ports in the province. Aid will be given to the amount of fifty per cent. of the value of the vessels. The ships will be built under government supervision and are not to be alienated from the province for five years and only when the loan has been repaid.

The Hon. Lorne A. Campbell is seeking to interest the Federal government in a scheme to assist in the laying down of twenty-five ships.

NANAIMO RESOLUTION REGARDING COMMISSIONERS

A resolution from the city council of Nanaimo calling attention to the growing sentiment in favor of the electors of the various municipalities having a voice in the selection of license commissioners and members of the police commission was brought down at the council last night. The resolution called for the electing of these commissioners in the same way as other representatives of the city are elected.

Ald. Casey, in moving that the resolution be concurred in, said that the Liberal party had promised reform in this direction and, as it looked as if there would soon be a Liberal government in power in the province, the matter would soon be solved.

It was decided to forward a similar petition to the provincial government, Ald. Nelson dissenting.

GERMAN POLICY OF SUBMARINE MURDER BEGINS

New Campaign of Frightfulness Begins at Midnight—Huns Laying Mines off Sweden.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 29.—The new German submarine policy begins at midnight tonight. It is expected that attacks will be made by newer and extended types of submarines, with an enlarged radius of action and increased offensive powers. It is claimed that these new vessels carry one big gun which can be enclosed in the submarine for submersion and that they can cover several thousands of miles without replenishing their stock of oil fuel and supplies.

Germans Laying Mines.

A large German flotilla is reported to be engaged in laying mines south of Falsterbo, outside of Swedish territory, under the protection of twenty German patrol boats.

A RUPERT COMPANY
Colonel Warden, in his speech on Friday night, emphasized the great advantage of having a Prince Rupert company in the 102nd Battalion. There are at present one hundred and forty men in the local contingent and ninety more would bring it up to company strength. It would be a splendid thing if this stalwart battalion could boast of a district Prince Rupert unit, as the boys would enter the trenches together and be able to keep up a comradeship which would be stronger than if they were scattered throughout several companies.
In the last two contingents from here companies were split up and portions attached to various depleted battalions, but we are assured that this would not happen to a full Prince Rupert company in the 102nd Battalion. The chief reason for the breaking up of the previous companies was the lack of commanding officers, but, in Colonel Warden, this battalion possesses a commander who has seen active service in the present war and will lead his men at the front. Now then boys let us have that Prince Rupert company at full strength within the next ten days. It will be distinctive and will represent this city in the trenches and the citizens will follow the career of the battalion with increased interest and pride when it remembers that one company bears the name "Prince Rupert."

SILVER STANDARD WILL INSTALL 100-TON MILL

The Silver Standard Mining Co. is planning to install on their property a mill of 100 tons capacity. It is expected that within the next sixty days full details will be available. The company proposes to install it at the earliest possible moment.

NEW MINERAL BELT BEING DEVELOPED

A new mineral belt was discovered last year in the vicinity of White Sale and Emerald lakes, southwest of Ootsa lake. Benson, a Smithers man, has a large interest in there and also J. M. Lynch, and the probability is that considerable work will be done on the ground.

Up to the present access to the district has been by way of Houston, but to handle ore over that route is impossible. Last season a route was cruised over the district toward the coast and a very economical scheme for transportation which will land the ore at the head of Dean Channel, can be secured.

The Lead Mountain mineral claims consist of five groups and a total of 27 claims. The showings are numerous and strong, and the indications are that another important camp is to be built up in that district.

Assays from a number of samples gave values in gold, silver, lead and copper with total values from \$46 to \$175 a ton.

The White Sale lake property is zinc and more or less work has been done. Further development will be undertaken this year.—Omineca Herald.

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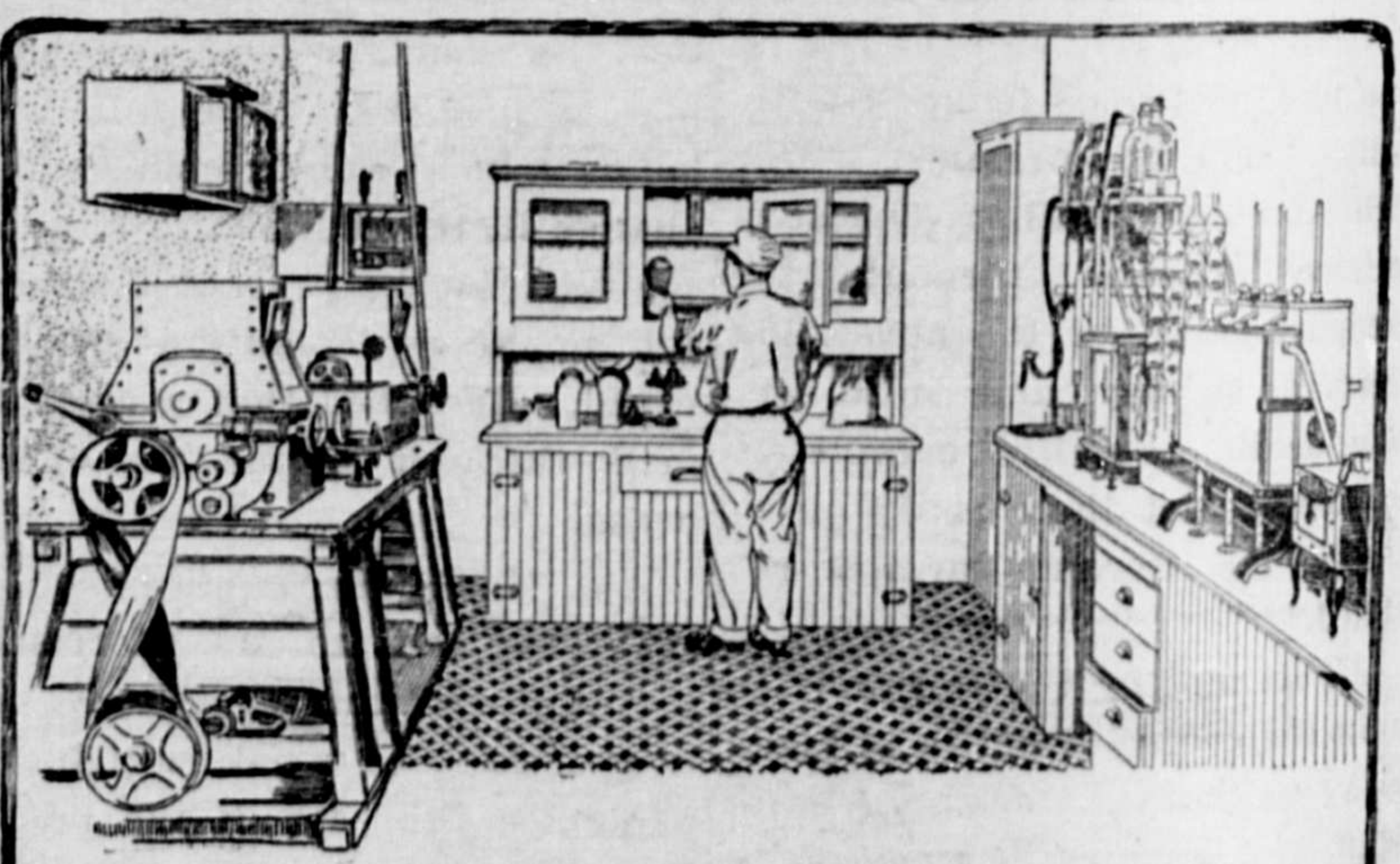

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FIELD COMFORTS WANTED FOR CANADIAN SOLDIERS

Mr. J. G. Colmer, the London secretary of the Canadian War Contingent Association, the great Canadian society that has done so much for the well being of our troops in the field, has informed the National Service Committee in a recent cable that there is a great danger of a shortage of socks.

Mr. Colmer gauges the shortage from the steady increase of requisitions from officers in the field, with whom he is in touch, and in the interests of the soldier's comfort and efficiency, further shipments of socks from Canada are immediately imperative. The women of Canada have shown amazing generosity and energy in supplying socks, but the great and increasing need must urge their knitting needles to fresh efforts.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates, and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

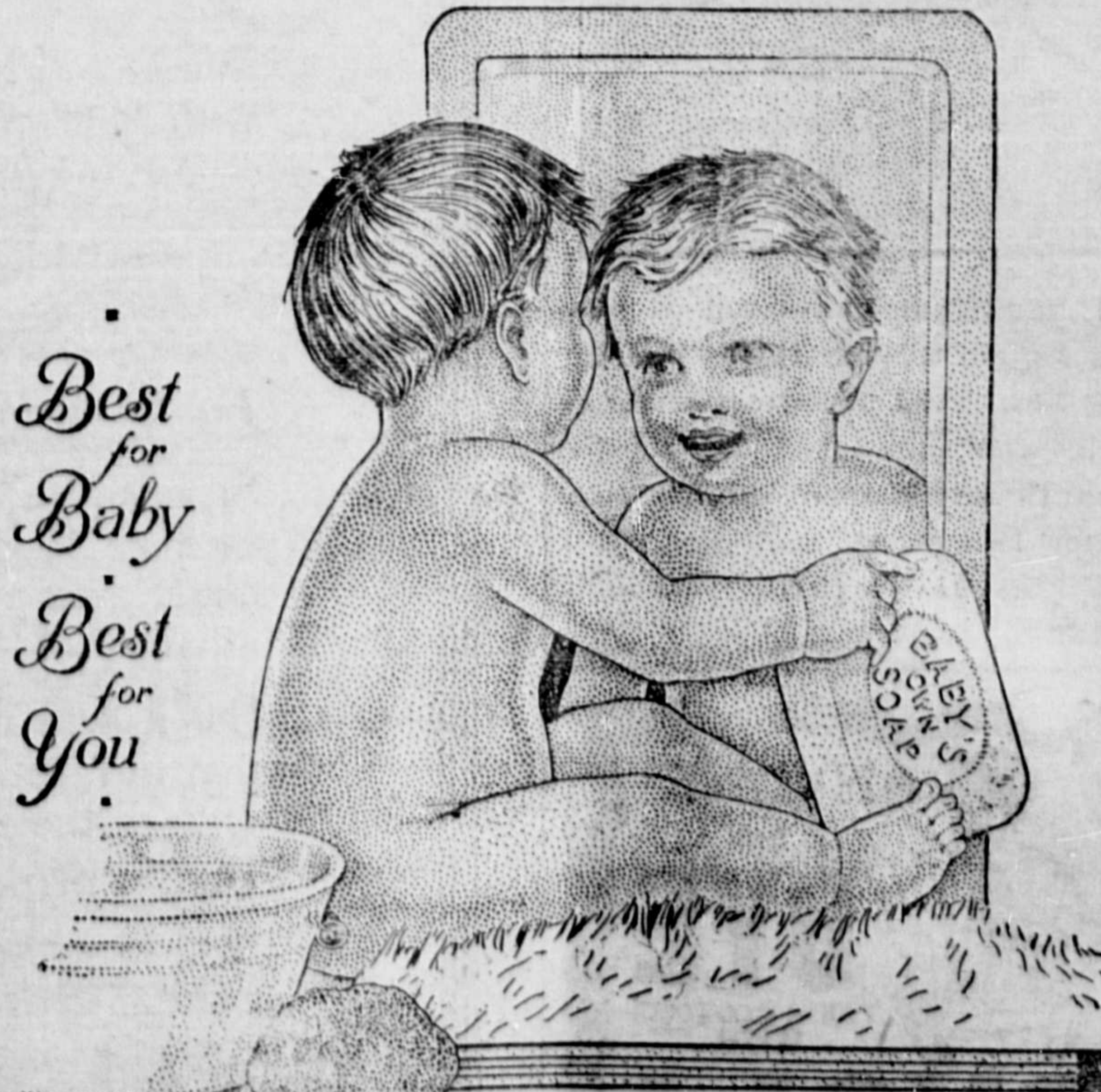

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.
QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

Charles Bloomberg, the man who attempted suicide on Sunday, has had to be placed under guard in the hospital as he is showing signs of insanity.

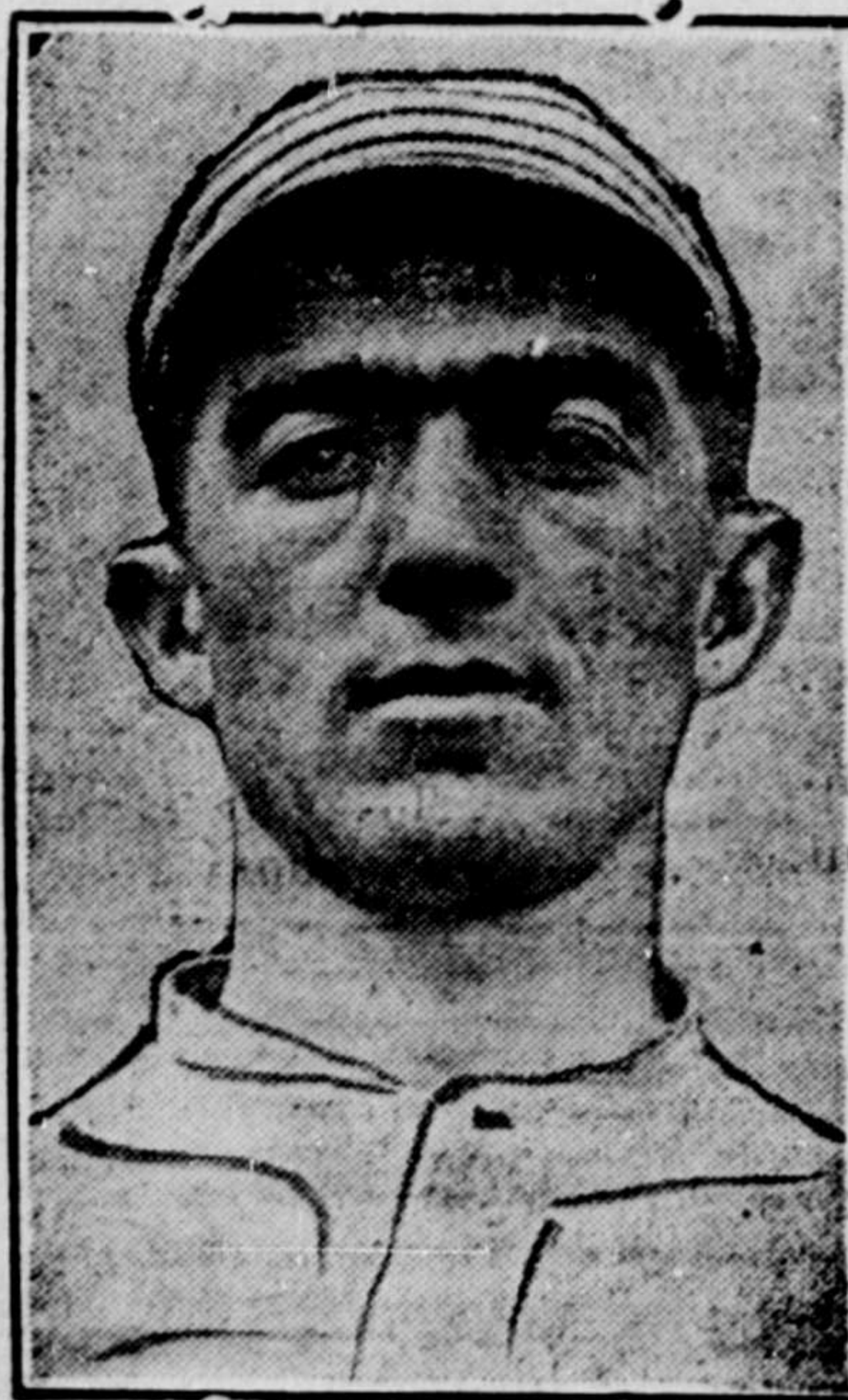
St. Andrew's Society is now installed in its new quarters on Third Avenue and they promise to be just as "homey" and popular as the old rooms on Second.
