## GERMAN LOSSES AT VERDUN WERE TERRIFIC

### REPORTED CAPTURE OF MOEWE -- GERMANS BELIEVE OFFENSIVE HOPELESS

#### GERMAN LOSSES AT VERDUN ARE TERRIFIC

London, March 2.—The German losses at Verdun are terrific. Two hundred and twenty train loads of wounded men have arrived at Aix-La-Chappelle from around Verdun. The French losses are slight.

It is estimated that one third of the Crown Prince's army is gone, and the German general staff believe that the Verdun offensive is useless.

The Crown Prince has been summoned to headquarters for a consultation with the staff.

#### British Hold Muns.

The British along the Somme front are holding the Germans and preventing them from transferring troops to the Verdun front.

#### Moewe Captured.

A British cruiser has captured the German cruiser Moewe. This is the raider which has been playing such havoc with British shipping.

#### Submarines not Feared.

The German submarine policy, which was supposed to bring about a complete blockade of the British coast ending in starvation in two months, is not regarded by the Admiralty as dangerous. The navy have the situation well in hand.

#### LEGISLATURE OPEN THIS AFTERNOON

Victoria, Feb. 29.—Contrary to the general opinion which had prevailed because of the fire at Ottawa, there will be no bar to the admission of the general public at the opening of the House here next Thursday afternoon. Special police will be provided, however, and care will be taken that nothing amiss takes place while the formal function proceeds.

The message from the lieutenant-governor, generally referred to as the speech from the throne, is now in course of preparation. The formal opening will be at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon. The 88th Militia will form the guard of honor.

The address in reply to the speech from the throne will be moved by H. B. Thomson, M. L. A. for Victoria, and will be seconded by John A. Fraser, M. L. A. for Cariboo.

#### BURNABY SELLS SERIAL BONDS AT A FAIR PRICE

Burnaby municipal council on Monday night accepted an offer of 95.677 net for their twenty year six per cent. serial bonds, put forward by Wood, Gundy Company, of Toronto. There were many offers from other Canadian financial houses and from brokers in the United States.

The fact that Burnaby has been able to dispose of a million dollars worth of bonds of a similar type to those being put on the market by Prince Rupert augurs well for the issue of this city. The financial situation of Burnaby is very similar to our own in that they are wiping out the old sinking fund bonds.

**MINING ACTIVITY**

With the war driving the price of minerals up to phenomenal heights, the eyes of the investing public are naturally turned upon mining districts and northern British Columbia is not being neglected. The mineral resources of this large district have scarcely been tapped, but what work has been done has only gone to show that this part of the continent is well worthy of the attention of mining men. Much of the ore to be found in this part of the Dominion is low grade and of course the high prices prevailing make it possible to handle properties which in normal times would not tempt the capitalist. However, with the methods of handling low grade ores steadily improving, it is to be supposed that schemes will be devised for the handling of low grade ores at a profit even in normal times. In the early times of mining, the miner and the capitalist only touched what was highly profitable and easily handled. In recent years, however, mining has undergone a great change and operating costs have been brought down so low that properties which the capitalist would not look at formerly are eagerly sought for today. In South Africa, where so much of the Empire's gold has been mined, companies are today working over the tailings formerly discarded as of no value, and find that they produce dividends. Mines which had been shut down as worked out have produced millions on being reopened and up-to-date methods employed.

In a mining boom, and there is every sign that a boom in this line will set in here before long, there is always "wild-cattling." Every mining country in entering an era of prosperity

comes to a certain extent under the sway of the 'get-rich-quick' fraternity, and it is not to be expected that northern British Columbia will escape. Fortunately, this part of the province has already proven that it has the goods, and the real properties will be able to offset effectively the bad results accruing from the boosting of imaginary mines.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

Premier Bowser has now acceded to the demands of the prohibitionists in order to try and save the situation. The effect of the Vancouver scare is becoming more apparent every day.

The supply of election bait in Victoria seems to be equal to the supposed demand. It is no use, Bill. Something has started which even the Liberals themselves could not stop if they tried.

"Bob" Rogers is trying to show how black the Saskatchewan Liberals are, in order that the Tories in Manitoba and British Columbia may look white in comparison. Hon. Walter Scott will do everything possible to root out any evil-doers whether they happen to be Liberal or Conservative.

"Give it a name, and it's all yours" is the new policy of the Bowser government.

In a farming community they say that "a pound of March dust is worth its weight in gold." There was a good deal of this valuable commodity flying around yesterday.

The Bowser bunch will be kept extremely busy for the next few weeks answering awkward questions put by H. C. Brewster and M. A. Macdonald.

**GERMAN STORIES OF STARVATION DOUBTED**

We advise people to receive with extreme caution the stories sent from Copenhagen and Rotterdam to this country, and printed innocently, we doubt not, in some papers here, representing the gradual starvation of the German nation. We believe, says the Saturday Review, that a considerable percentage of these stories are craftily concocted in Germany itself, and sent through neutrals to Great Britain. Most of the trash printed in this country about Germans eating dog, fighting for vegetable soup tickets and so on, is very artful trash; the idea is to send the British public asleep, and so to cause it to slacken its efforts. It would not be at all a bad plan to make a collection of these stories, starting from the copper kettle and door-handle myths of a year ago almost, reprint them, and distribute them under the heading of "Made in Germany." Let the public beware.

## TRENCH DODGES OF HUNS ON RIGA FRONT

From a statement made by German prisoners whom the Russians have captured, it would appear that the Huns are using some ingenious and complicated trench devices in the fighting about Riga.

The German entanglements in that neighborhood are sometimes 200 yards deep, and are made of a tough wattle which takes as long to break through as it takes to clip through wire. The Germans burn off the leaves and small twigs of trees and plant the bushy pointed branches as "battle forests," an obstruction in the shape of a beam, with points projecting towards the enemy. These plantations are sometimes a mile deep. Russians, in attacking, had to march through them and exploded "tread mines" hidden under a sprinkling of soil.

Another protective machine used by the Germans is called the "devil's wall," a steel or steel-sheeted barrier breast high, mounted on wheels, from ten to fifteen yards long. Sheltered by it from all missiles except hand grenades, the men march to the attack. The latest "devil's walls" have artificial arms with clipping and hacking appliances, which are manipulated by soldiers behind them. The walls are telescopic and can be narrowed to suit the ground over which the attack is made.--Ex.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred, and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208: being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely; \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund:

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

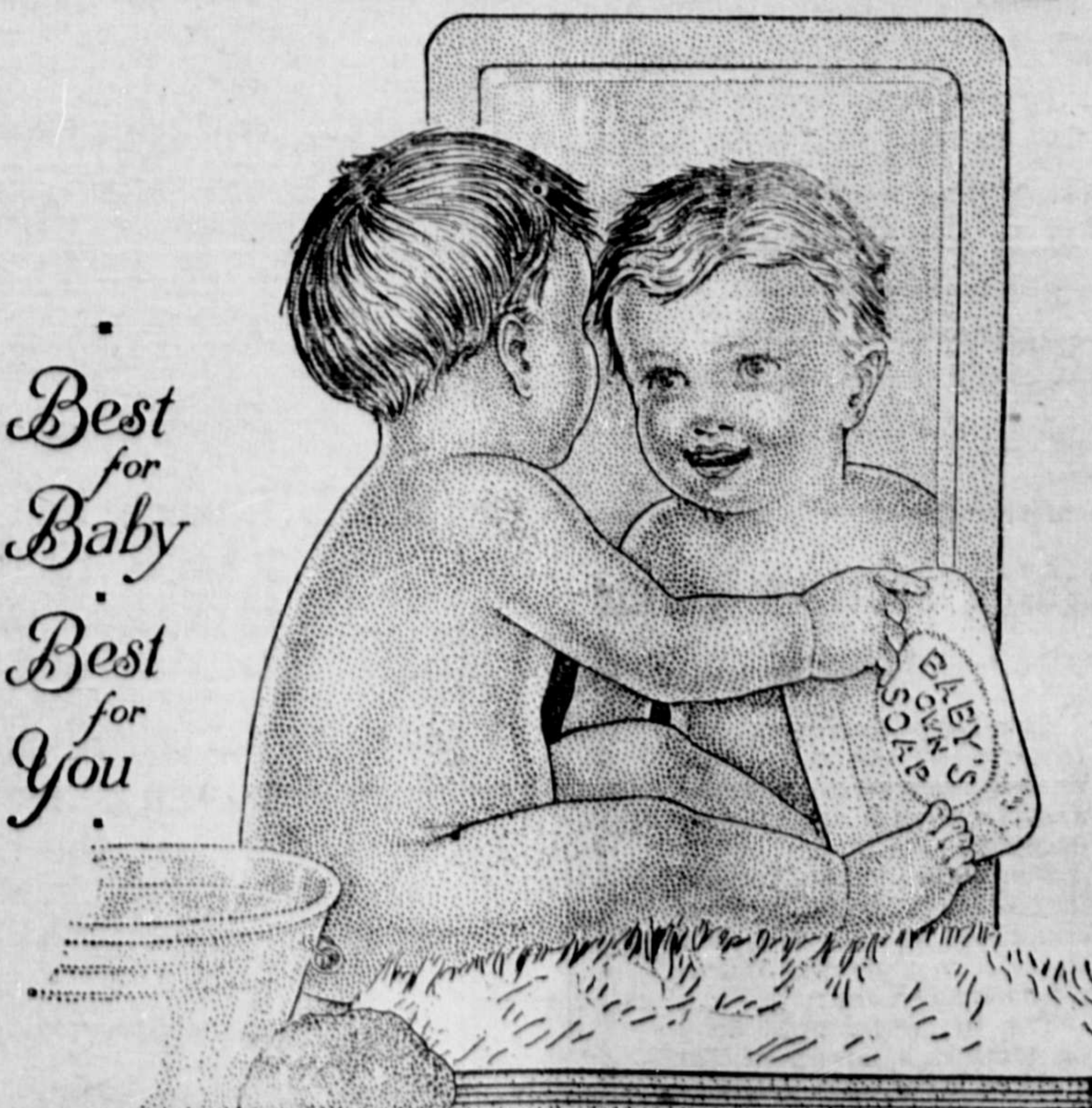

- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

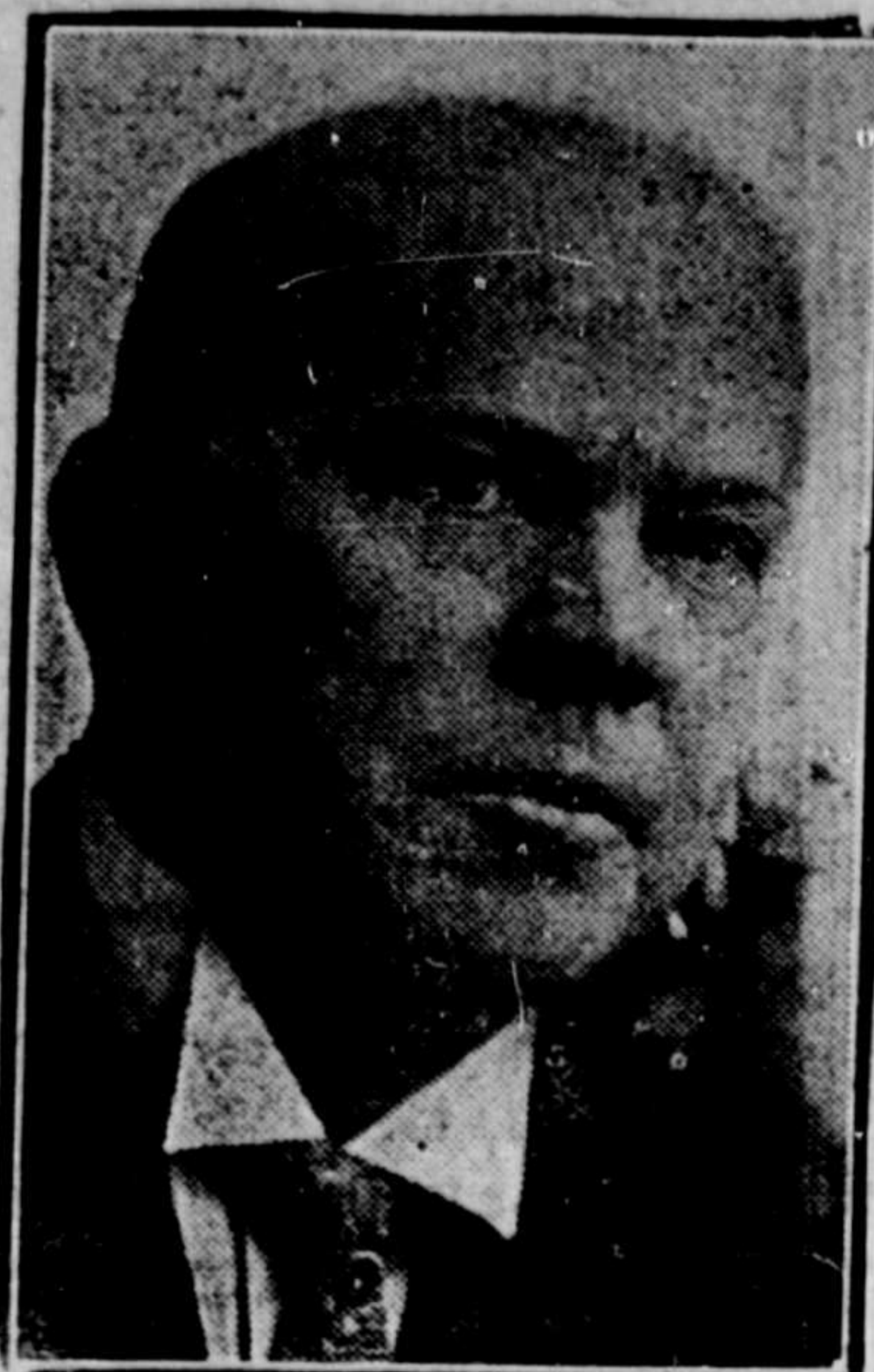
