GERMAN OFFENSIVE RESUMED AT VERDUN

BRITISH GAINS ON THE YPRES FRONT -- BRANDENBURG REGIMENT SURROUNDED

BRITISH STRIKE POWERFUL BLOW ON YPRES FRONT

Trenches and German Salient are Captured—Brandenburgers are Imprisoned—Zep-pelin Wrecked.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 3.—The British have struck a powerful blow against the enemy in the Ypres district, taking 800 yards of trenches.

By means of a bluff the British recaptured the trenches along the Ypres-Commines canal, which were lost on February 14th, and have also captured a small salient in the German lines.

Brandenburgers Help Up.

Paris, March 3.—The remnants of the Brandenburg regiment are still imprisoned in the ruins of the Douaumont fort and are without food, drink or ammunition. The fort is surrounded by French troops and the Germans have made a series of desperate attempts to rescue their comrades, attacking six times last night. All the attacks have been repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy.

Zepelin Gone.

Amsterdam, March 3.—A Zepelin has been destroyed at Zep-pine, in Belgium, while engaged in military work.

Portuguese Busy.

London, March 3.—All German steamers lying at Panjim, a Portuguese colony in India, have been seized and the Portuguese flag hoisted and the crews interned.

SHELL TORNADO PRECEDES NEW HUN OFFENSIVE

Violent Attacks Renewed North of Verdun—French Hold Back Germans with Curtain of Fire.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 3.—After a temporary lull, the Germans have launched a series of violent new attacks on a wide front north and northeast of Verdun, the attacks being preceded by a perfect tornado of shell fire.

Unofficial reports state that Fort Vaux has been abandoned by the French, but that a strong barrier of artillery fire prevents the Germans from occupying the position. The noise of the guns was heard for a distance of 180 miles.

Assaults Repulsed.

Paris, March 3.—The German attacks north of Verdun have been resumed with great violence, both artillery and infantry being active. The French successfully repulsed the furious assaults of the enemy, their fire decimating the ranks of the enemy.

Roumanian Queen Dead.

London, March 3.—Queen Elizabeth of Roumania is dead.

MINING ACTIVITY IN ALICE ARM DISTRICT

R. B. McGinnis, the active head of the syndicate which owns the Dolly Varden property at Alice Arm, left for the north on the Prince Rupert last night, accompanied by Messrs. Littlejohn and Singleton, who are tendering on the construction of the wharf at Alice Arm and also on the eighteen miles of road to the mine. It is expected that the road will be completed in three months, when the milling plant, which will be of the most recent type, will be taken in to the mines.

The mill will handle 400 tons of ore per day. The vein in the older workings is showing up better at depth and good values are assured. Its main values are in silver, with gold and lead supplementary. There is every prospect that Alice Arm district will be one of the busiest spots in the north this summer and many mining and business men are turning their eyes in that direction at present. Construction will shortly be started on an hotel and several stores are likely to open up shortly.

ICE STORAGE

Mitchell & Currie have been awarded the contract for the construction of an ice storage in connection with the plant of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage company, Ltd., this firm being the lowest tenderer. It is expected that the excavation work will be completed in the course of the next three weeks, when the construction work will proceed.

"Rescue" and "Think Mothers," two good dramas, conclude a good bill.

She makes a great hit as Lois Tanner, a girl who has been brought up amongst crooks, helping them in their exploits. One night, she is caught robbing the house of Spurrier, a newspaper editor. Struck by her beauty, the editor gives her a chance to redeem her past. She succeeds and falls in love with Spurrier, but reverts to the old life when Spurrier gets married. She ultimately is shot in an attempt to rob the editor's house. It is a most dramatic story, splendidly told.

M. A. MACDONALD TAKES HIS SEAT IN LEGISLATURE

New Member Introduced by Bowser and Parker Williams—A Busy Session Foreshadowed in Speech.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, March 3.—Lieutenant-Governor Barnard opened the last session of the provincial legislature yesterday. M. A. Macdonald, the new member for Vancouver, entered the house between Premier Bowser and Mr. Parker Williams.

The speech from the throne foreshadowed the granting of a retiring allowance to J. H. Turner, the late agent-general in London; the introduction of the Agricultural Credits Bill; the formation of a new portfolio of Agriculture; the immediate development of the Songhees Reserve; the passing of the Workmen's Compensation Act; the presenting of the Prohibition Referendum and the granting of aid for the completion of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

No Labor Candidates.

Vancouver, March 3.—Vancouver Trades and Labor Council, after a heated session last night, decided to withdraw its six candidates from the forthcoming elections. This leaves the members free to support the regular party candidates.

BRISK BIDDING FOR HALIBUT CATCHES

Three halibut boats came in overnight, the Magnolia with 9,000 pounds, the Murinae with 8,000 and the Viking with 4,000. Bidding for the fish started at six cents per pound and the fish were still unsold at noon with eight cents bid.

FAREWELL TO 102ND.

At the Red Cross dance in the Catholic Hall last night, Mr. Geo. W. Morrow announced that a farewell would be given to the boys of the 102nd Battalion next Thursday evening in the Empress Theatre under the auspices of the ladies who are in charge of the British booth at the Carnival of the Allies. An admission fee will be charged and the proceeds devoted to patriotic work.

CHINESE OPIUM DEN IS RAIDED BY DETECTIVES

Two Detectives and Six Chinese are Injured—Keeper sets Building on Fire—Police Jump to Street.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, March 3.—Detectives Ricci and Sinclair, of the city police force, and six Chinese, were injured last night in a raid on a notorious opium den on Shanghai Alley. Two of the Chinese are seriously injured.

When the detectives reached the upper room, the keeper of the den flung a kerosene lamp with a number of opium pipes in the stove, the flames cutting off the stairway. The detectives cut their way through with axes; forced the iron bars on the windows, and leaped to the street, twenty feet below, after forcing the Chinese occupants of the den to jump for safety. The fire brigade was quickly on the scene and prevented the fire from spreading to the adjoining buildings.

YES OR NO

A. C. Flumerfelt is putting up a strenuous fight for political existence in Victoria and is promising more drastic legislation to be rushed through in the next few weeks than the legislature usually handles in years. Bait of every conceivable description is being used, while Harry Price is the busiest man in the city, carrying on the "submarine" warfare of the government.

Mr. Flumerfelt has introduced novel tactics in sending a cheque for \$500 to the mayor with the request that it be handed over to certain charities if Mr. Brewster will meet him on a platform and will answer twelve questions with a straight "yes" or "no." This reminds one of the attempt of a heckler to corner Sir Edward Carson on one occasion. The heckler stated stoutly that any question could be answered with a straight "yes" or "no," and demanded that all his queries be answered in this manner. Sir Edward at once agreed, provided that the questioner would first prove his assertion regarding a straight "yes" or "no" answer by just answering one himself. The heckler agreed and Sir Edward asked, "Have you stopped beating your wife?" Mr. Heckler suddenly disappeared.

NEW PROGRAM

The Victoria Colonist is taking the only line it possibly can in the by-election, and is seeking to divert public attention from the misdeeds of the McBride-Bowser administration and focus it upon the new program. There is absolutely nothing which the Tories can think of that will not be done just as soon as they get round to it. They won't even appoint a single royal commission to

pave the way. Measure after measure will be rushed through at express speed. To return Liberals to the house will only be to waste time in asking and answering questions. The new legislature will have no time to waste on questions it will be so busy passing bills.

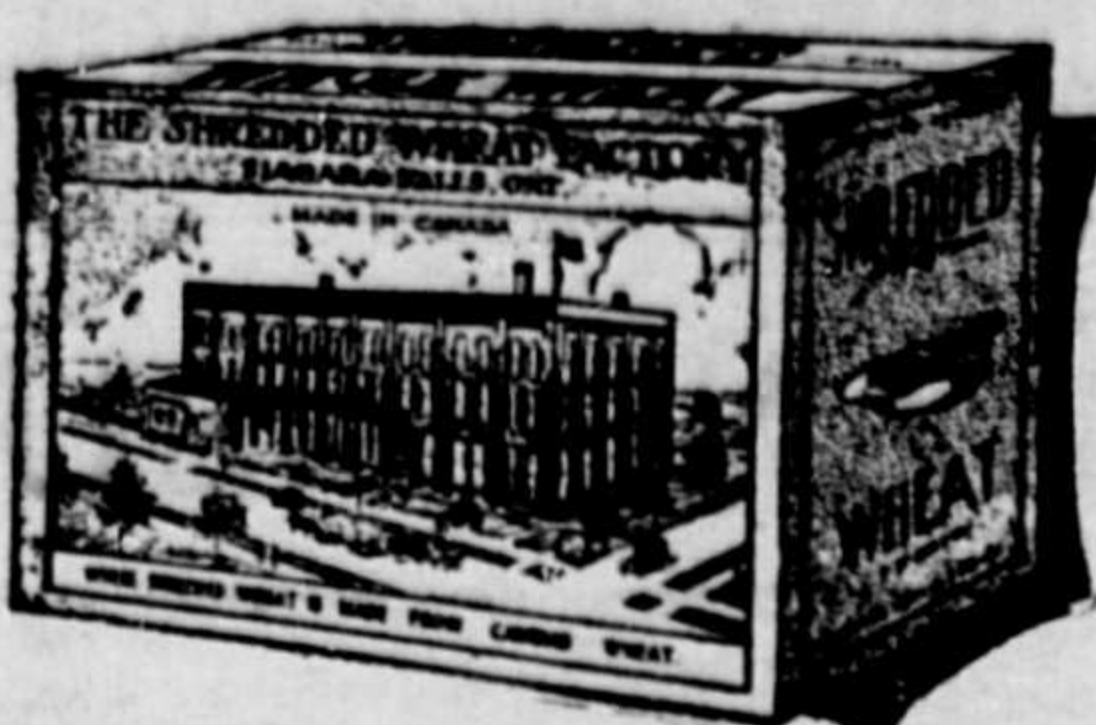
The Tories are not, however, featuring the Workmen's Compensation Act as they might, the obvious reason being that this measure naturally brings up the question as to why Bowser and the whole gang have repeatedly turned down Workmen's Compensation. The great trump card is shipbuilding. The Colonist is trying to narrow the issue down to an endorsement of the shipbuilding program. Nothing else matters. The people of Victoria, like the people of Prince Rupert, want to see shipbuilding, but they will not stand for this or any other important piece of provincial business being dangled before their noses as tempting election bait. Mr. Brewster is just as anxious to see ships in our ports as any man could be, though the Colonist even suggests that if Brewster is elected he will try to hinder this legislation. Scare is written all over the Tory candidate and his party organs. The result in Vancouver rocked the party to its foundations and it is now tottering to its fall into a grave lavishly prepared for the past four years.

front page. It emphasises the guarantee of \$2,000,000, but it omits to remind the people that it is their money which will back the guarantee.

DARING PARACHUTE DESCENT BY OFFICER

Undoubtedly the most daring aeronautical feat on record was that performed by Lieut.-Colonel E. M. Maitland, who commands the Airship Section of the Naval Air Service, and who recently jumped from a balloon flying over London at a height of 10,000 feet, descending by parachute. Hitherto, the record seems to have been held by that intrepid balloonist, Captain Baldwin, who in 1887 claimed to have descended from a height of one mile (5,280 ft.) in just over three minutes.

Colonel Maitland was fifteen minutes coming down, and he confessed that the most trying part of the experience for him was before the parachute opened. He fell several hundred feet dead weight, and the suspense "seemed like eternity," but at last the parachute opened and the descent continued steadily.

The feat was the result of a discussion which took place concerning a certain official project, a question arising as to whether a balloonist could make a safe descent from such a height. "Someone," said Lieut.-Col. Maitland, (Continued on Page 4)

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an application will be made in the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia at its next session on behalf of the City of Prince Rupert for an Act containing provisions which are shortly stated as follows:—

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof.

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

with power to use the sinking funds heretofore accumulated to reduce the debt when incurred; and further, to cease collecting further sinking fund, and to provide for the collection of full instalments for total principal on each said bylaw from the commencement of the work authorised. The application of such instalments to reduce the amount of bonds required to be issued.

(7) To provide that no further sinking fund shall be collected under Bylaw No. 208; being "The Water Main Extension Bylaw" except sufficient to pay off \$20,000 of debentures already sold thereunder, and providing for the issue of Annuity instalment, or Serial bonds, term twenty (20) years, for the balance of the debt, namely: \$130,000, and for the use of the sinking fund already collected under said bylaw, except the part applicable to the \$20,000 already issued; to reduce the said amount of \$130,000 bonds when issued.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

DARING PARACHUTE DESCENT

(Continued from Page two.)

"must make the experiment. I must know what will happen. I will take the jump myself, as there is only one person whom I have the right to ask."

An extremely large parachute was used for the experiment, the descent safely accomplished, and thus the official query was satisfactorily solved. The experiment also demonstrated the fact that a parachute descent in no way interferes with the stability of an airship, so that a man could be landed after a long journey with reports while the airship continued its flight.

This is by no means the first parachute descent which Colonel Maitland has made, for in October, 1913, he made a descent from the airship Delta at a height of 1,800 feet. The airship on this occasion was travelling at twenty miles an hour, and the lieutenant-colonel fell 300 feet before the parachute opened, but he landed safely in the Colne Reservoir at Aldershot.—Exchange.

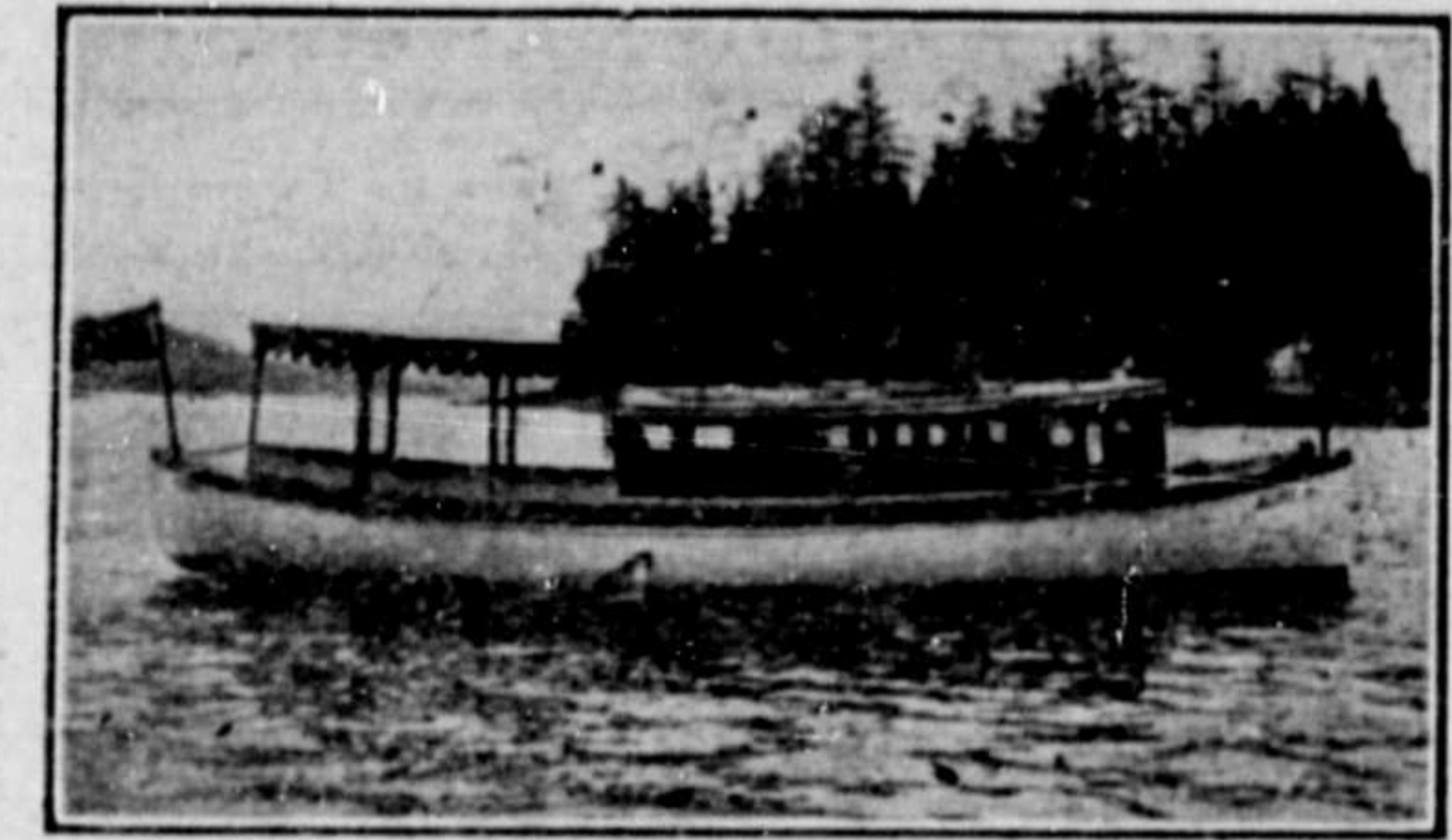
