RUSSIANS EXTERMINATE THIRD TURK ARMY

GERMAN OFFENSIVE DOOMED TO FAILURE—HEAVY FIGHTING IN MESOPOTAMIA

RUSSIANS TAKE TERRIBLE TOLL OF TURK ARMY

Third Ottoman army exterminated in revenge for massacre of Armenians—Fighting in Mesopotamia.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 6.—The Russian soldiers at Bitlis, including fifty thousand Armenians who had enlisted in the Russian ranks, took a terrible revenge on the Turks for the massacre of Armenian women and children by the Ottoman soldiers at Van and Mush.

The Russians refused quarter and exterminated the entire Turkish Third Army.

In Constantinople.

At Constantinople, the Turkish women threw silver in front of the relief trains, imploring that their husbands be not sent to certain death at the hands of the Russians.

Mesopotamia.

There is heavy fighting reported in Mesopotamia, where the British relief column has been heavily reinforced and is advancing against the Turks at Kut-el-Amara.

Turks Revolt.

Revolt has broken out in Smyrna where Turkish soldiers have attacked their German officers.

Air Raid.

Three Zeppelins raided the northeast coast of England last night, when twelve persons were killed and thirty-three injured.

PARKER WILLIAMS AND ANYOX ASSESSMENT

Victoria, March 6.—Continuing the debate on the address from the throne, Mr. Parker Williams attacked the government, alleging that it had favored the large mining corporations in making an assessment for a basis of taxation. Mr. Williams says that the town of Anyox, owned by the Granby Company, of which Mr. Flumerfelt is a director, was assessed at \$7.50 per acre, with a population of 3,000, while the town of McKinnon, adjoining Anyox, was assessed at \$450 per acre, with a population of twelve.

HUN OFFENSIVE IS DOOMED TO END IN FAILURE

Kaiser Intended Verdun as Wedding Gift for Joachim—French General Earned a Great Reputation.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, March 6.—There is no change in the situation at Verdun. Artillery on both sides is engaged but the German infantry attacks have ceased, and the enemy have ceased to advance.

Lost Wedding Gift.

The Kaiser has gone to Berlin to attend the wedding of Prince Joachim, his fifth son. The Kaiser had intended to present Verdun to him as a wedding gift.

German Failure.

The French general staff is convinced that the German efforts at this point are bound to end in utter failure.

The Hun offensive has made a great reputation for the French General Patain, who checked the German advances at Arras and Champagne and drove the enemy back to the limit of their advance within twenty-four hours.

There are fifty thousand German dead facing the French lines in these districts.

Belgian Movement.

London, March 6.—There is a large movement of German troops in Belgium before Ypres. Forty thousand of the Landsturm have arrived within the past twenty-four hours.

H. C. BREWSTER RETURNED WITH AN OVERWHELMING MAJORITY

FLUMERFELT WITHIN SIX VOTES OF LOSING HIS DEPOSIT—DEFEATED MINISTER OF FINANCE RESIGNS HIS SEAT IN THE CABINET

Victoria, March 6.—H. C. Brewster was returned to the legislature with a majority of 2,446 over A. C. Flumerfelt. The vote was: certain that there would be a H. C. Brewster (Liberal) ... 4,972. Liberal government in power in Hon. A. C. Flumerfelt (Con) 2,526.

Majority for Brewster ... 2,446. Following his defeat at the polls, A. C. Flumerfelt resigned his seat in the cabinet. The Conservative was within six votes of losing his deposit.

There was great jubilation in the local Liberal camp on the receipt of the news of H. C. Brewster's sweeping victory. A "musical" parade around the town was held, after which an impromptu meeting took place in the Liberal headquarters, when short speeches were delivered by prominent Liberals, Alex. M. Manson, candidate for Omineca district, presiding.

Atholl Fraser, who has lived in British Columbia for thirty-five years and has had ample opportunity to observe the methods of the McBride-Bowser administration, said that he saw signs of a sweeping Liberal victory in the coming general elections. He described the present government as the most corrupt the province had ever had.

Fred. Stork, Dominion Liberal candidate, said that the victories in Vancouver and Victoria were not party victories. He did not believe that there were any more Liberals in the province than there had been, but a large number of voters of all parties had supported the Liberal candidates in the interests of good government. He thought they might be pardoned for the celebrating which had been done, as they had taken defeat like men for twelve years. He warned his hearers that the Liberal party must not be made up of job-hunters. That had been the curse of the Conservative government. So far as

he was concerned, there would be none of that. George R. Naden said he felt that the government in power in ninety days. He contended that the only course open to the premier was to vote supplies for the next six months and then send in his resignation, as his party no longer represented the people of the province.

He said that if ever the Liberal party became so rotten as the present administration had become, he hoped it would suffer the same fate. He felt that men like Brewster, Macdonald, Parker Williams and John Oliver would give them good government.

W. P. Lynch said that the McBride government was doomed when it laid violent hands on the finances of the province. Four years ago he said that they would "break the province; break the people, and break themselves," and that had been done. He hoped that the Liberal party had profited by the example of the Conservatives. The Liberals faced a big task, with an indebtedness of \$18,000,000 to wipe off, but he did not see why a rich province like British Columbia should not be put in such shape that an honest industrious man could make a living.

A. M. Manson said that the province had at last awakened, and that it threw a great responsibility upon the Liberals. He hoped that long before a Liberal government had sunk to the depths of degradation reached by the present government, they would be brought up sharp by the electorate.

The meeting concluded with the singing of "God Save the King," followed by hearty cheers for Sir Wilfrid Laurier and H. C. Brewster.

SIR THOMAS WHITE'S WAR BUDGET BECOMES CLEARER

ASILY—LARGE CORPORATIONSHELL PROFITEERS GET OFF E WILL PASS ON EXTRA TAXATION TO THE CONSUMER—SHAUGHNESSY'S LITTLE JOKE

Ottawa, March 4.—As time goes by the answer to Sir Thomas White's budget becomes clearer. The answer is that all is not gold that glitters. In other words it is only a pinch-beck imitation of Lloyd George, not being animated by the same spirit of love for the democracy but rather by a judicious desire on the part of a rich man's government to deal delicately with its friends. That is to say they take a little away lest an indignant people demand much more. Their discipline of wealth and privilege, such as it is, is more in sorrow than in anger and is only temporary at that.

"Make 'em be good," says the pressure of the times. "All right," the government answers in substance, "but you'll understand that this is only for the period of the war." There is no danger that these altruistic outbursts will be carried over into the piping times of peace. Of course there is no doubt that Sir Thomas talked matters over very thoroughly with the interests concerned before he sprang his budget and got a mighty definite idea of how much the traffic would bear and how long it would bear it.

One great outstanding fact is that high protection was not interfered with by the Conservative government. High protection as high as it is now, has come to stay as long as they stay. That it was not made higher is due to the fact that the goose that lays the golden eggs has all it can do now. To press it further would be to kill the amiable fowl. A Conservative government will never be guilty of foul play like that.

Sir Thomas' hint that there will be a system of rural credits after the war supplemented by Government assistance for those who want to get on the land, is founded on no particular love toward the farmer whose wheat lies rotting on the ground in the northwest provinces because the government denies him the American market, but on the enlightened selfishness which rich men always display toward themselves. If high protection is not to suffer, or if in Sir Thomas' own words, "Canada's economic strength is not to be impaired" then there must be production for high protection to bleed and to ensure production nothing must be done that will scare the producers away. In short this is another case of considering the golden goose which will be worked to the limit, but not permanently disabled.

Some of the shrewder critics are wondering why Sir Thomas did not raise his extra twenty-five million interest charges by means of a stiff income tax, appropriately graded for all earned and unearned incomes over five

thousand dollars a year, an adaptation of the English idea.

It is Sir Thomas' fine gift to make beautifully clear what he wants to make clear and to leave beautifully clouded what he would rather not mention, as for instance the fact that we have borrowed one hundred and fifty million dollars from England since the war began. There was also his juggling with the fact that the net national debt at the end of 1916 will be \$580,000,000 whereas the real debt is more like a billion. However, as Mr. Kipling would say, that is another story. The point he did make, talking rapidly the while so that the quickness of the hand should deceive the eye, was that the accumulations of wealth in Canada were not such as to warrant a drastic income tax. What he meant no doubt was that the accumulations of wealth were not generally distributed and that the few hands that held them objected to loosening up. If the British North America Act can be amended to give the government another year's life it follows that it can be amended to permit the government to impose a federal income tax.

Another criticism is that unless the government's new born desire for thrift leads them to use the local assessment rolls as the basis of their business tax it will mean the creation of an expensive army of office holders for the collection and assessment of the new taxes. Still this is a minor consideration. The great question is, will the new taxes do the work properly and efficiently? Does the finance minister's budget get at each rich man, corporation or partnership in the exact and just proportions in which he should be got at?

VICTORIA REPLIES

What Vancouver said a week ago, Victoria repeated most emphatically on Saturday, and the Bowser representative saved his deposit by less than a hundred votes, Mr. H. C. Brewster being returned to the legislature by nearly two votes to one. As in Vancouver, it was a triumph for the people rather than a party victory. Mr. Flumerfelt was a strong candidate in that he had earned a big reputation as a business man, and was singularly fortunate in having no political past, but he failed where the strongest man in the province must have failed. He might just as well have tried to divert the course of an avalanche as try to change the trend of public opinion in this province today.

Throughout the campaign, the Conservatives showed very clearly how little they realize the change which has taken place in the public mind in the past two years. When the McBride-Bowser real estate government was at the height of its popularity, all it had to do to remain popular was to spend and promise to spend. At that time everybody was so busy spending that nobody had time to pause and ask where the money was coming from. Recent events have brought forcibly home to the people the simple economic truth that what is spent by a province or state comes out of the pockets of the people, and that when a province is squandering capital instead of using revenue wisely it is on the highway to bankruptcy.

Bowser, with all the blindness of his type, greatly underestimated the intelligence of the electorate in offering in exchange for support just such a bribe as would have sent the

real estate men into ecstasies during the boom period. He utterly failed to see that the people have never been stupid, but were merely suffering from a temporary speculative insanity, from which they have now recovered. They are now calmly counting the cost of the huge, crazy spree and are cutting out all luxuries, and the Bowser government is the most expensive of those luxuries.

All that remains for the premier to do is to vote the necessary supplies and hand his resignation to the Lieutenant-Governor. He no longer represents the people of British Columbia, and every day he holds office is one more offence against the principle of representative government.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Bowser must feel pretty much like the man who, when he had been kicked out of a club for the third time, sat up and rubbed his head and said, "I don't believe they want me in there."

The only gamble left to the Tories is whether there is a safe Tory seat left in the province.

Flumerfelt's fleet of phantom ships failed in their mission.

The Journal evidently finds some consolation in the fact that the Conservatives themselves helped to elect Brewster. We would go further, and say that Bowser had more to do with the electing of Brewster and Macdonald than any other man in the province.

T. D. Pattullo put in a strenuous week in Victoria in support of H. C. Brewster. Along with "Honest" John Oliver, he addressed crowded meetings every evening.

The first answer is that the profiteers, the men who made money out of the Empire's danger, particularly the shell-makers, get off lightly, while the legitimate businesses of long standing are hard hit. It stands to reason that a war profiteer can more easily afford to pay twenty-five per cent. of his enormously swollen gains above seven per cent. than a legitimate business can of its normal gains above seven per cent. or ten per cent. as the case may be. In other words no distinction is made between the sheep and the goats. The man who is satisfied with fair profits on a routine business is put on exactly the same footing as the get-rich-quick shark who has leeches the Empire's life-blood and tried to distract attention from his hogishness by contributions to the Patriotic Fund. The finance minister should have it in his heart to make the rewards for moderation greater than the rewards for ruthless greed. Besides—and here is a disturbing thought—how is the government going to get at

the beneficiaries of the Old Shell Committee and the new Imperial Munitions Board since, all along it has taken the ground that it had no specific knowledge of their operations, their business being a confidential one with the British government whose money it was they were absorbing. If they don't know these people how are they going to tax them? The very fact of their "coughing up" will dispose of the government's hollow sophistry that it knows nothing about them and washes its hands of them. Thus is Sir Wilfrid provided with a new argument for an inquiry into the Shell Committee which the government so far has refused.

The new taxes place a premium on watered stock. Some of the biggest corporations in the country are the most heavily watered—so heavily watered that the water drowns out what would be a considerable dividend over seven per cent. on a legitimate capitalization. Thus it happens that of all the railways in Canada perhaps only the C. P. R. will contribute—its share is said to be two million dollars a year—to this new source of revenue. Although the C. P. R. has made a practice for some years of burying its treasure in subsidiary companies, melons and increased capitalization it is still fat and prosperous and in a position to "come through."

Not so the G. T. P. and the C. N. R. They have no profits to spare. Sir William Mackenzie sat all through Finance Minister White's speech with a brooding air. Perhaps he was brooding over

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

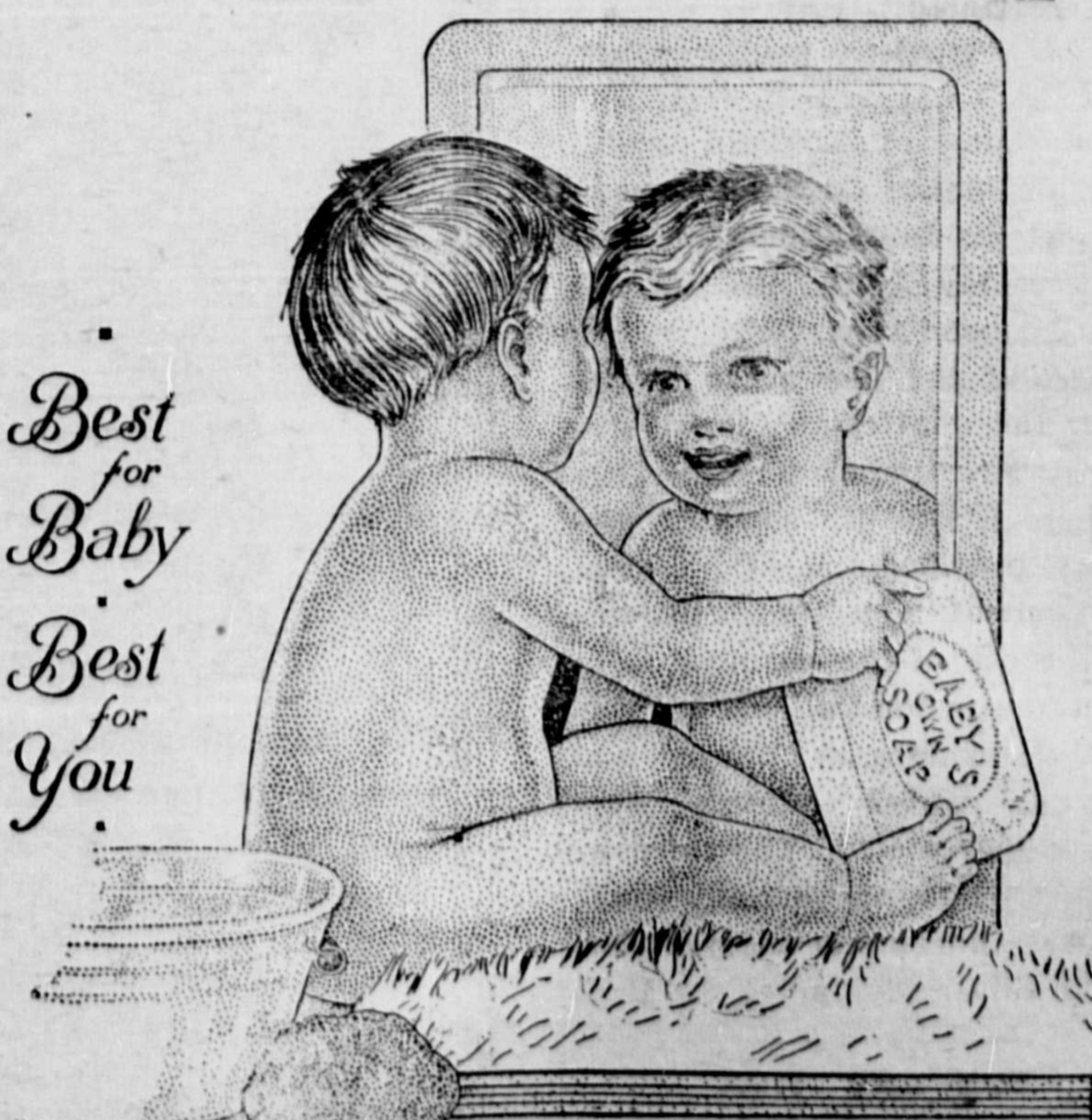
(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund:

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
