## GERMAN WARSHIPS ARRIVE AT ZEEBRUGGE

### RUSSIANS LAND AT ATINA IN BLACK SEA -- RUMORED RAIDER IN THE PACIFIC

#### GERMAN FLEET LEAVES CANAL IN SNOWSTORM

Has Arrived at Zeebrugge and still Keeps Steam up—Russian and British Navies are Preparing.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 7.—Under cover of a snowstorm, the German fleet left Wilhelmshavn, at the entrance to the Kiel Canal, presumably to give battle to the British fleet in the North Sea.

#### Dutch Report.

Amsterdam, March 7.—It is reported that the German fleet has arrived at Zeebrugge from the Kiel Canal and that they are keeping up steam. The Russian and British Admiralties are in continuous communication with each other.

#### Germans Take Hill 265.

Paris, March 7.—The Germans have made progress west of the River Meuse towards Regneville, capturing Hill 265.

#### PROHIBITION DEBATE IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

Ottawa, March 7.—H. H. Stevens' resolution in favor of Dominion-wide prohibition is under debate today. R. B. Bennett will move an amendment to make prohibition effective by stopping the manufacture and the transportation of liquor in all provinces where prohibition carries.

#### Victoria.

Victoria, March 7.—A. H. MacGowan has been named Deputy Speaker of the Legislature. There is no decision in regard to the portfolio of finance, vacated by A. C. Flumerfelt. Hon. William Manson and Hon. W. R. Ross are mentioned in connection with it.

#### CAMOSUN ASHORE OUTSIDE OF DIGBY

While on her way to Massett from Prince Rupert last night, the Camosun, of the Union Steamship Company, went ashore outside of Digby Island in a blizzard during the night. Captain Babington has gone to her assistance with the Kwintsa and, if the sea moderates, will take off the passengers. The Camosun is in no danger and is not damaged, so far as can be learned.

Later reports state that the vessel is high and dry and is lying on an even keel at Lima Point, opposite Holland Rock. Thorough examination of her hull will be made at low water. As she is double-bottomed throughout her entire length no serious damage is anticipated.

#### MAYOR M'CAFFERY TO PROCEED TO VICTORIA

The finance committee recommended to the council last night that the mayor proceed to Victoria without delay to assist in pressing for the passing of the city's private bill through committee.

Ald. Casey said he had no doubt that the mayor was needed in Victoria, but he considered that one official was sufficient and the solicitor was already there. He understood that the bill was now in regular shape.

The mayor assured Ald. Casey that he had no particular desire to make the trip.

Ald. Nelson said that there were many similar bills to come before the private bills committee and all differed in certain details. The inspector of municipalities was satisfied with the bill, but there was a danger of delay in committee. The idea was to get Prince Rupert's bill through first and that required close attention.

Ald. McClymont said that Burnaby had five representatives camped in Victoria, pressing the claims of their private bill. He thought that Mr. Peters required assistance in approaching the members of committee and it was essential that there be no delay in order that the bonds might be placed on the market at the earliest possible moment.

Ald. McRae said it was a case of "If you want something done, do it yourself." He believed that Mr. Manson would do his share, but he had also other matters to attend to.

Ald. Montgomery thought that no opportunity should be missed in assisting the bill through committee. It was a vital matter for the city, and if there was delay we might find ourselves in a similar position to that of last year.

Ald. Casey said he had no objection to the mayor going down but still he did not see what good it would do. The city solicitor had informed the council that the private bills committee approved of the bill. At the same time he realized the necessity of the passing of the bill as soon as possible.

#### EIGHTEEN MEXICANS KILLED AT EL PASO

(Special to The Daily News.)

El Paso, March 7.—Eighteen Mexican prisoners were burned to death and thirty seriously burned by an explosion which occurred in the disinfecting bath of the city jail. The bath, which was used for the destruction of vermin, was composed of gasoline, kerosene and vinegar.

The vapor from the bath became ignited from the flame of a match held by a prisoner and the flames spread throughout the jail. Twelve Americans were injured.

Charles Phelps, a motor man, was shot by a Mexican following upon a rumor that 200 Mexicans had been deliberately burned to death.

#### CITY GRANTS LIGHT FOR ALLIES CARNIVAL

A letter from Judge Young, president of the local branch of the Red Cross Society, was read at the council meeting last night, asking that the city grant free light for the Agricultural Hall during the two evenings of the Carnival of the Allies and also for the evenings when preparations were being made.

The letter also drew attention to the receipt of an account for light for the Red Cross headquarters on Third Avenue for which premises the city had promised free light. The recommendation of the light committee to grant the request and to cancel the charge against the Third Avenue premises was unanimously adopted.

#### CATHOLIC DANCE WAS BIG SUCCESS

The young folks of the Catholic Church held a most delightful whist drive and dance last night in the Catholic Hall, when about a hundred were present, all having a good time. The whist prizes were won by Mrs. Bryant and Mr. Harry Self.

Dancing was kept up until 2:30 this morning, the music being provided by Mr. Charles Balagno. The dance was a huge success and reflected the greatest credit upon the young ladies who worked so hard in making the arrangements.

#### RUSSIAN ARMY LANDS AT ATINA AND GOES SOUTH

Turks Driven from Positions and Prisoners and Guns are Taken—Raider in Pacific.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, March 7.—Under the cover of a supporting gun fire from the Russian warships, a Russian army has landed at Atina, a port in the Black Sea near Trebizond. Advancing to the southward, it forced the Turks to evacuate their positions, taking prisoners and guns.

#### French Air Raid.

Amsterdam, March 7.—French aviators made an attack on three of the forts at Metz. Several ammunition trains carrying supplies to the front were damaged.

#### Raider in Pacific?

Honolulu, March 7.—It is rumored that a German raider has been sighted in the Pacific near the Straits of Magellan. British and Japanese warships are searching for her.

The Australian liner Niagara arrived from Vancouver a day ahead of schedule time.

#### ELECTRIC COOKING TO BE DEMONSTRATED

The light committee recommended to the council last night that a grant of \$150 be made out of light revenue towards a demonstration of electrical cooking appliances.

Ald. McRae suggested that a lower rate be struck for power for cooking, as an added inducement to the use of electricity. He thought the present rate was too high and that a lower rate would bring more revenue.

Ald. Dybhavn said that the present rate makes cooking with electricity cheaper than coal, though heating came higher. The present intention was to encourage the use of power for cooking.

Ald. McClymont said that he had discussed the matter with an electrician and understood that the outlook for the sale of electrical cooking appliances at present was not bright.

Ald. Montgomery felt that the people should be educated along this line and that a demonstration would prove effective. The proposal had been defeated by the last two councils and he wanted to see the scheme tried out. The report was adopted.

**HUN FAILURE**

Reports from the western front are decidedly reassuring and it seems certain that, if the Germans persist in attacking our lines, they will be so badly crushed in three months that the end will be in sight. However, it is hardly likely that they will continue the extravagant tactics followed during the past two weeks and the probability is that matters will settle down into the old groove before long, with the Allies quietly biding their time.

Kitchener said it would take three years and we shall be thoroughly satisfied if the job is completed satisfactorily in that time. One fact is abundantly clear, however—the Germans can never hope to win. They have failed in the Near East, where the Turks are now a burden instead of an asset and the Bulgarians are getting tired of the whole miserable business. Though there is little news from the Galician and Riga fronts, there is no reason to doubt that the Russians have matters well in hand there, while in Asia Minor they are making such rapid progress that they may very soon link up with the British Mesopotamia expeditionary force, if assistance is needed in that direction.

All along the western front, the Allies are content to hold their positions while the Huns batter their heads to pieces against the defences. The French, Belgians and British are no longer stemming the rush of victorious hordes, as they had to do early in the war, but are slowly crushing an army which is now to all intents and purposes defeated.

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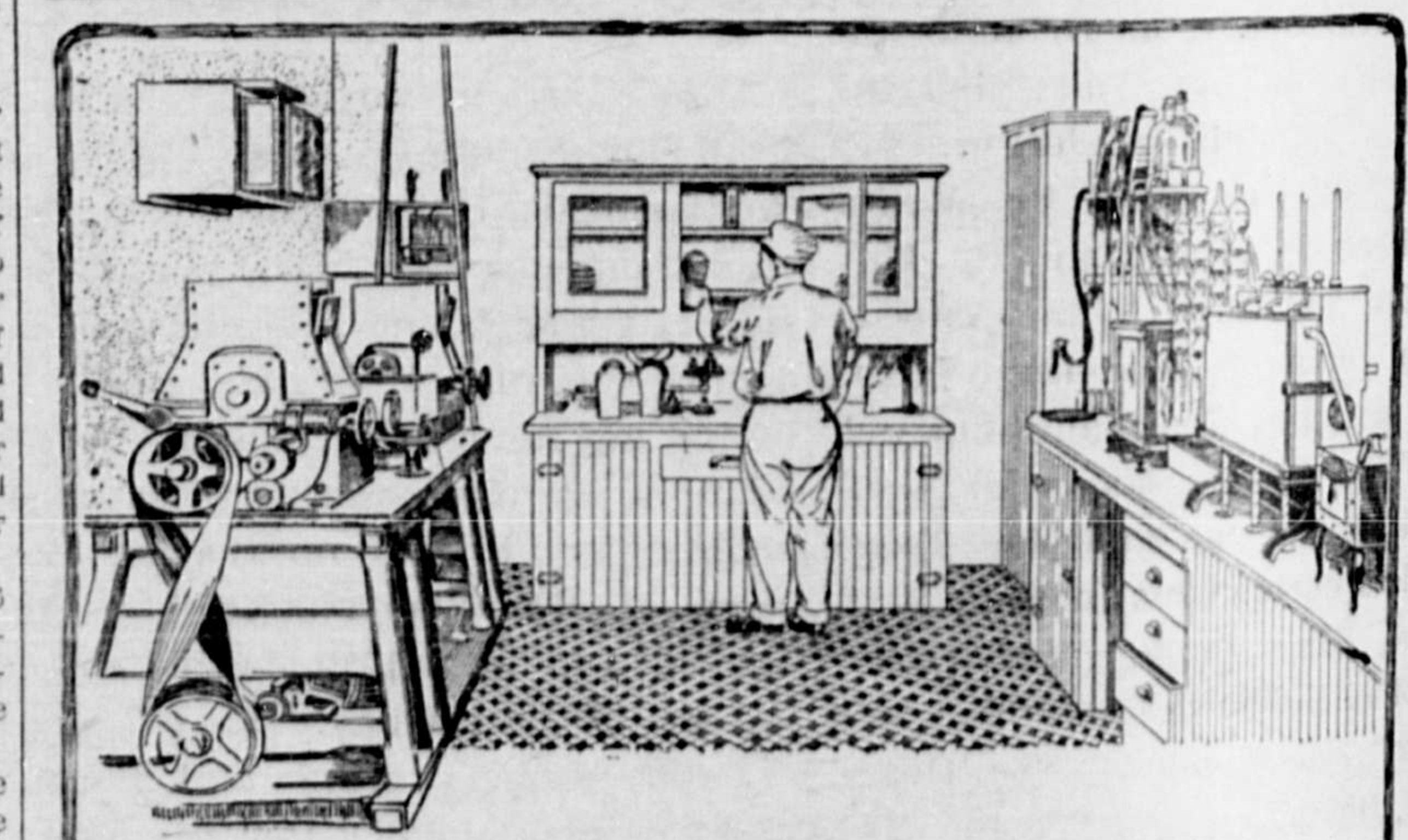

## BELLA COOLA LOGGER WAS FROZEN TO DEATH

The Bella Coola Courier reports that West Hartrem, of Kimsquit, discovered the frozen body of Axel Anderson, a well known coast logger, in a log cabin on the long point in Labouchere Channel on February 25th. It seems that Anderson made the point in an exhausted condition and apparently had been unable to light a fire. He had tried to remove his shoes and socks to thaw out his feet but had failed. Deceased was a man of 55 years of age and well known around Bella Coola.

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for not more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
