REVOLUTION BREAKS IN CONSTANTINOPLE

FRENCH AWAIT INFANTRY ATTACK AT VERDUN — NEW OFFENSIVE IN ALSACE

BALFOUR SAYS PERSONNEL OF NAVY DOUBLED

London Public Look for Naval Action in North Sea—Third Canadian Division in France.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 8.—The public is tense with excitement over the disappearance of twenty German dreadnoughts from the Kiel Canal, and it is believed that a clash in the North Sea is imminent.

The Hon. A. J. Balfour, in reply to questions in the House of Commons, said that the personnel of the navy has been doubled since the outbreak of the war and that its tonnage had been increased by a million tons, including auxiliaries.

Churchill Speaks.

The Rupert Hotel bulletin says that Winston Churchill, in a speech in the House of Commons, said that the navy must be revitalized by the bringing back of Lord Fisher to the Admiralty. The speech was strongly disapproved of by the London press.

Third Canadian Land.

The Third Canadian Division has been safely landed in France.

Appam Case.

Germany must defend, in the United States, her claim to the ownership of the Appam. The case will be tried on March 27th.

CHLORATE EXPLODED AT NIAGARA FALLS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Niagara Falls, March 8.—An explosion in the chlorate department of the Niagara Chemical Company was followed by a fire which resulted in damage to the extent of \$150,000. Manager Carveth states that the plant was bombed, and the militia guards have been called out.

Germans Disenfranchised.

Sydney, N. S., March 8.—The cabinet has decided to disenfranchise all German born voters for the duration of the war, following upon the arrest and internment of all hostile aliens.

Arthur Noble will leave on Saturday for Victoria where he will qualify for a commission for overseas service.

GERMANS KILLED IN REVOLUTION IN TURK CAPITAL

Young Turk Leader Wounded—Mobs Fired on by German Soldiers—Turks Retreat in Persia.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, March 8.—Revolution has broken out in Constantinople, and Enver Pasha, the leader of the Young Turks, has been wounded and German officials killed.

The mob pillaged the army stores; barricaded the streets and damaged the railroads. The Germans are trying to repress the rioting by gun-fire.

Turks Retreating.

The Turkish army is not opposing the Russian advance from Erzerum, but is retreating westward, setting fire to all villages and cities as it goes.

Russian Success.

Petrograd, March 8.—The Russians have captured the Persian city of Cola, twenty-seven miles west of Kermanshah. This is part of the Russian plan to drive through Western Persia to Mesopotamia to relieve the British force under General Townshend at Kut-El-Amara.

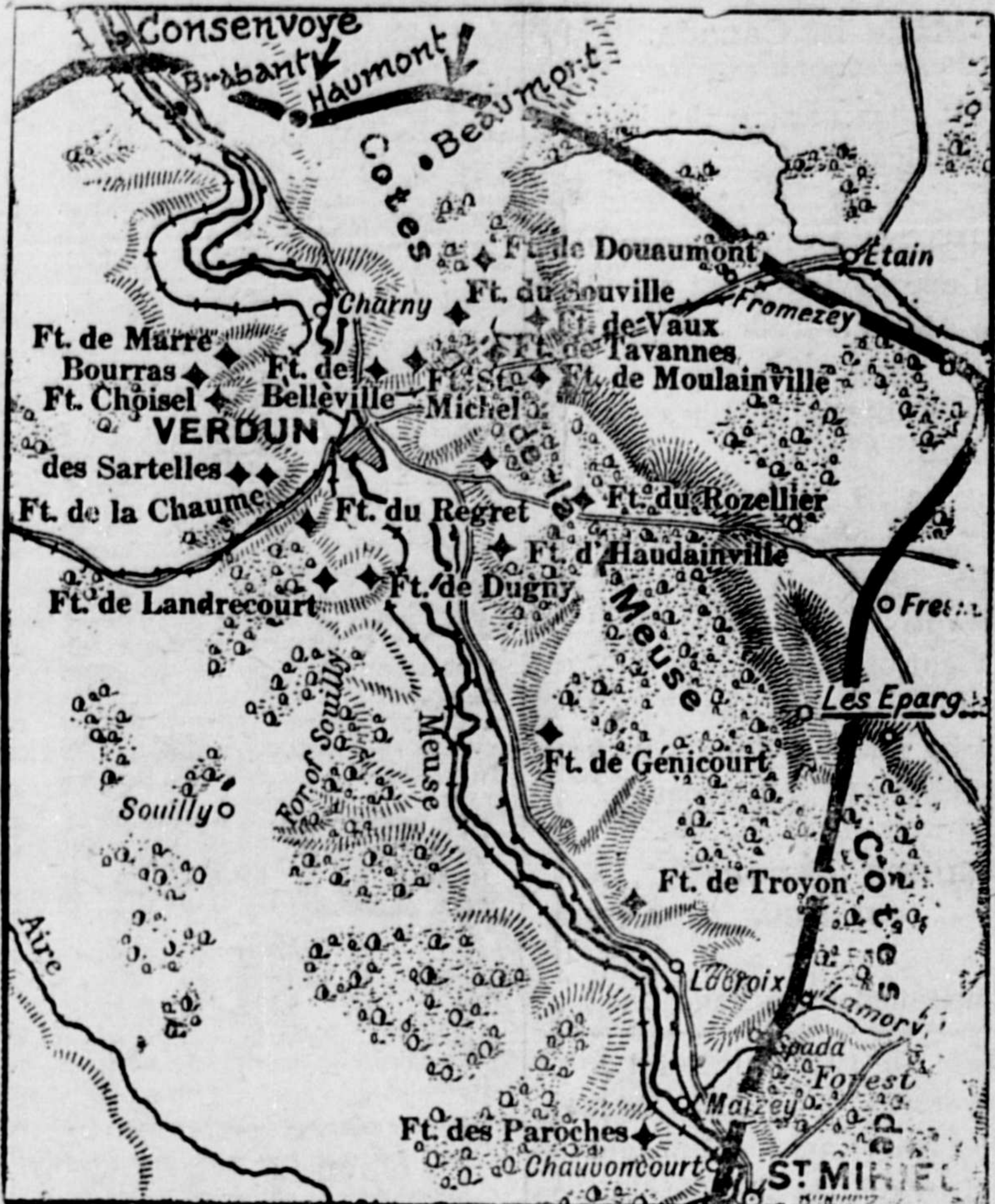
"BOB" ROGERS' SCHEME TO OVERTHROW SCOTT

Regina, Sask., March 4.—The true inwardness of the charges made against the Scott government and the Liberal members became apparent before the select committee of the legislature when H. C. Pierce, Liberal member, told his story. He stated that Brunner, ex-treasurer of the Licensed Victuallers Association, and who is now in the pay of the Conservative Association, came to him and said that Hon. Robert Rogers and the liquor interests of Canada had raised a huge sum, totaling a half million dollars, to defeat the Banish the Bar bill and overthrow the Scott government.

Pierce swore he was offered twenty-five thousand dollars for his vote and influence with other Liberal members and his reelection by acclamation or campaign funds in case Rogers could not control the Tory situation in Pierce's riding. Immediately after being approached Pierce reported the matter to Hon. J. A. Calder, and it was arranged that Pierce should keep in touch with Brunner and carry on negotiations with a view to obtaining all possible information.

Hon. Mr. Calder confirmed Mr. Pierce's statement that he had reported the plot outlined by Brunner to him, and that Pierce's statement, taken in conjunction with other suspicious circumstances, tending to show that a plot was under way to corrupt the legislature and destroy the

THE CAMOSUN IS STILL FAST ON THE ROCKS

The Camosun is still fast on the rocks at Lima Point, and several days may elapse before she can be taken off. Meantime, Mr. Barnsley has arranged with Captain Babington to take off part of her cargo. Captain Babington left this morning with two scows to carry out the lightering operation. The passengers, of whom there were eighteen, were taken off without difficulty yesterday. They were taken over the side of the vessel on to the rocks where they entered small boats and were taken on board the Kwinita.

MANY EXTRA SHIPS FOR ALASKAN TRADE

For the big Alaska rush this year a total of 36 large steamships will be in regular operation. All of these will operate from Seattle, with the exception of three steamships which will make Vancouver, B. C., their home port. In addition there will be two steamships sailing in June from San Francisco and two expected to sail from Panama loaded with equipment for the Government railway. The total of 36 in the regular service does not include the fleet of full-rigged ships and schooners operated by the different salmon canneries, chartered steam schooners, which may be announced later, nor the hundreds of tugs, barges, halibut schooners, whalers and many other small vessels which annually ply Alaskan waters. The merchant fleet which is already provided for represents ten steamships in excess of the best year in the past, with a corresponding increase in tonnage.—Railway and Marine News.

TREASURER REPORTS ON NEW FINANCING

At the council meeting Monday evening a report from the City Treasurer to the Finance Committee was presented, dealing with certain phases of the city's financing, under changes proposed in the bond issue. These reports were as follows, and show how it is proposed to meet various aspects of the case:

Dear Sirs:—This increase will involve an extra annual levy of \$14,745.78 to provide for the additional one per cent. Under the original scheme on five per cent. the total levy to provide for annual instalment to liquidate our total actual indebtedness, spread over the periods mentioned in schedules, namely, \$106,000.00 payable in 10 years; \$74,237.73 payable in 20 years, and \$1,440,000.00 payable in 30 years, it required \$143,358.56 each year. Under the revised scheme, schedules bearing 6 per cent. interest, we require \$128,104.34.

The additional levy of \$14,745.78 will be provided as follows: By tax levy on local improvements and general debentures, \$12,071.26, out of utility revenues, \$2,674.52. It will, therefore, be seen that less than one mill on annual levy will provide for increase in interest. This increase in interest will also reduce our discount correspondingly.

There is every possibility of this additional amount being reduced if a fair price is obtained for the issue. Our Sinking Funds will be sufficient to take up some of our debentures instead of selling them, thereby eliminating levy entirely. Under the original Sinking Fund Bylaw, governing Section 1 grading, the property holders pledged themselves to pay for the improvement in 50 years, in interest and principal \$2,130,387.50. With the increase to six per cent. under the installment plan they pay in 30 years, \$1,612,806.00, thereby saving themselves \$517,581.50.

It will be interesting to note the favorable position the city is in to take care of the extra levy. In doing so I submit that one must look upon it from the view point of the city as a whole, irrespective of local improvement or general levy. From this aspect, therefore, we will take a comparison of 1914 levy and 1916 levy, with additional (Continued on Page Two)

FRENCH AWAIT HUN INFANTRY'S FINAL ATTACK

Germans Surround Two-thirds of Verdun — French Re-gain Lost Trenches—Alsace Offensive.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, March 8.—The German troops today surround two-thirds of Verdun. The French general staff states that the fact is insignificant and that further encirclement is impossible. French artillery reinforcements are offsetting the fire from the German batteries.

French Regain Trenches.

In the Champagne district the French have recaptured the trenches lost to the Germans on March 6th.

The French are now encircled for four miles on the heights outside of Verdun in a line extending from Bethincourt to Cumieres.

The climax to the attack upon Verdun is expected to take place on Thursday or Friday when the German infantry will attempt to cross the hollows to capture the French positions.

The capture of Hill 265 cost the Germans 20,000 men.

Alsace Offensive.

London, March 8.—It is reported that the new offensive by the Crown Prince against Belfort in Upper Alsace, will equal in ferocity the attack upon Verdun.

CITY FINANCES

Appended to the very full report submitted to the city council on Monday night by the city treasurer were the following reasons for not submitting the matter to the ratepayers, further than to ask for their endorsement of the bill, which was done at the general election on January 13th by referendum and carried by 484 votes to 60.

1. The Municipal Act does not require local improvement bylaws submitted for assent of ratepayers.

2. The utility redemption charges are paid out of revenue and not levied by taxation.

3. The government debt forms part of Incorporation Charter and never was submitted.

4. That the change into Serial Bond does not increase, but decreases to a very large amount the liabilities of the ratepayers.

5. That the additional levy required to bring out this saving in interest and reduce the life of the debenture debt means less than one mill per year to accomplish the fact.

6. That it was not desirable to repeal original bylaws and construct entirely new ones, by this act, but simply to amend them as to style of debentures and term of years and levy, but to keep original bylaws alive as regards mode and date of collection and special conditions such as act governing bylaw 59, and conditions in 1911 Local Improvement Act, some of which has been since repealed.

Reserve Fund.

To prevent raising annually in our estimates an amount to safeguard against arrears, seeing that it has been the practice of City to make complete Sinking Fund shortages out of General Fund, there has accumulated in these Sinking Funds, \$37,400.00, which will revert back to General Fund

on maturity of debentures. The change to Serial Bonds will at once release it, and it is proposed to hold this amount as a reserve and supplement it by an additional amount to bring it up to \$50,000.00. This will answer the dual purpose of safeguarding debenture holders and offer additional inducements to purchasers as well as penalizing property holders each year by increasing the taxation to safeguard instalment payments, and possibly raising more than is required, as provision must be made in estimates which, of necessity, must be somewhat vague, inasmuch as these estimates are brought down in June or July and collections take place in October and November, and it is almost an impossibility to say what the arrears are likely to be. Furthermore, seeing that this \$37,400.00 has accumulated during 1913, 1914 and 1915, quite a large number of lots have changed hands and the property holders who paid the taxes are no longer interested. I submit, therefore, that the treatment proposed would be fair and avoid in future extra levies through anticipated arrears.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

At last, the German fleet has ventured out of the canal, but it has not proceeded far to sea, being content meantime to remain at Zeebrugge. Perhaps they may be tempted out to sea, but it is more likely that they will try to lure the British ships close inshore.

debentures still remaining under the Sinking Fund plan, both general and local improvements, we will require a total levy for local improvements of \$74,055.72; for general debentures, \$59,446.17; charges against utilities revenue, \$27,402.00, making gross total to provide for all money by-laws of \$160,903.89, a reduction of \$58,371.91, brought about, in part, by redemption of short term local improvement bylaws, which will make way for the additional levy incurred by instalment plan and increase of interest rate, and still show above reduction on total tax levy of the city.

For the year 1916 special rates will be reduced by \$24,612.48, accumulated Sinking Funds upon the bylaws repealed and cut out of Private Bill, namely, Sewer By-law, \$350,000.00; Water Extension Bylaw, \$100,000.00; Grading City Property Bylaw, \$46,000.00, and Grading City Property, Fulton Street Bylaw estimated, \$5,000.00.

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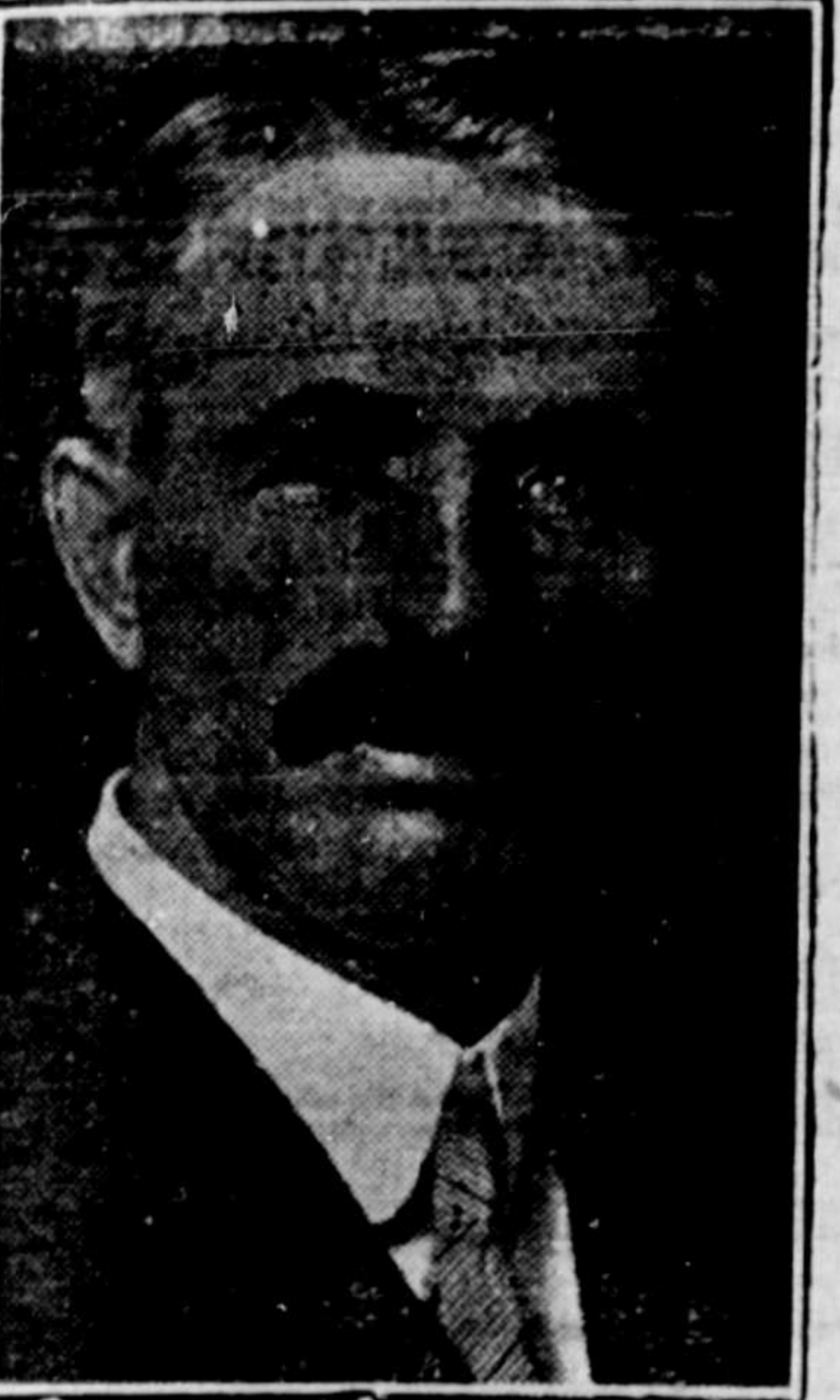

government, resulted in the government employing a detective agency, and the reports of these detectives were in possession of the government and strongly confirmed the suspicions that a huge plot was hatched between Rogers and the liquor interests.

Attorney-General Turgeon, who followed Calder on the witness stand, produced reports of the detectives who shadowed A. Champagne, Liberal M. P. for Battleford, and D. B. Neely, Liberal M. P. for Humboldt, who bolted from the Saskatchewan Liberal party over the Scott government's liquor legislation. The reports told of conferences between Champagne, Robert Rogers and prominent liquor men in Winnipeg and other conferences between Neely and prominent brewers.

The disclosures have created a great sensation in the city, and the receipt of reports that charges similar to those laid against the Scott government had been made against the Sifton government in Alberta, and the royal commission demanded there be provided additional proof of the size of the Rogers liquor conspiracy to destroy the Liberal governments of the western provinces in revenge because these two provinces took the lead in driving the liquor traffic out of business and also to provide an offset to the scandal of the Roblin government in Manitoba.

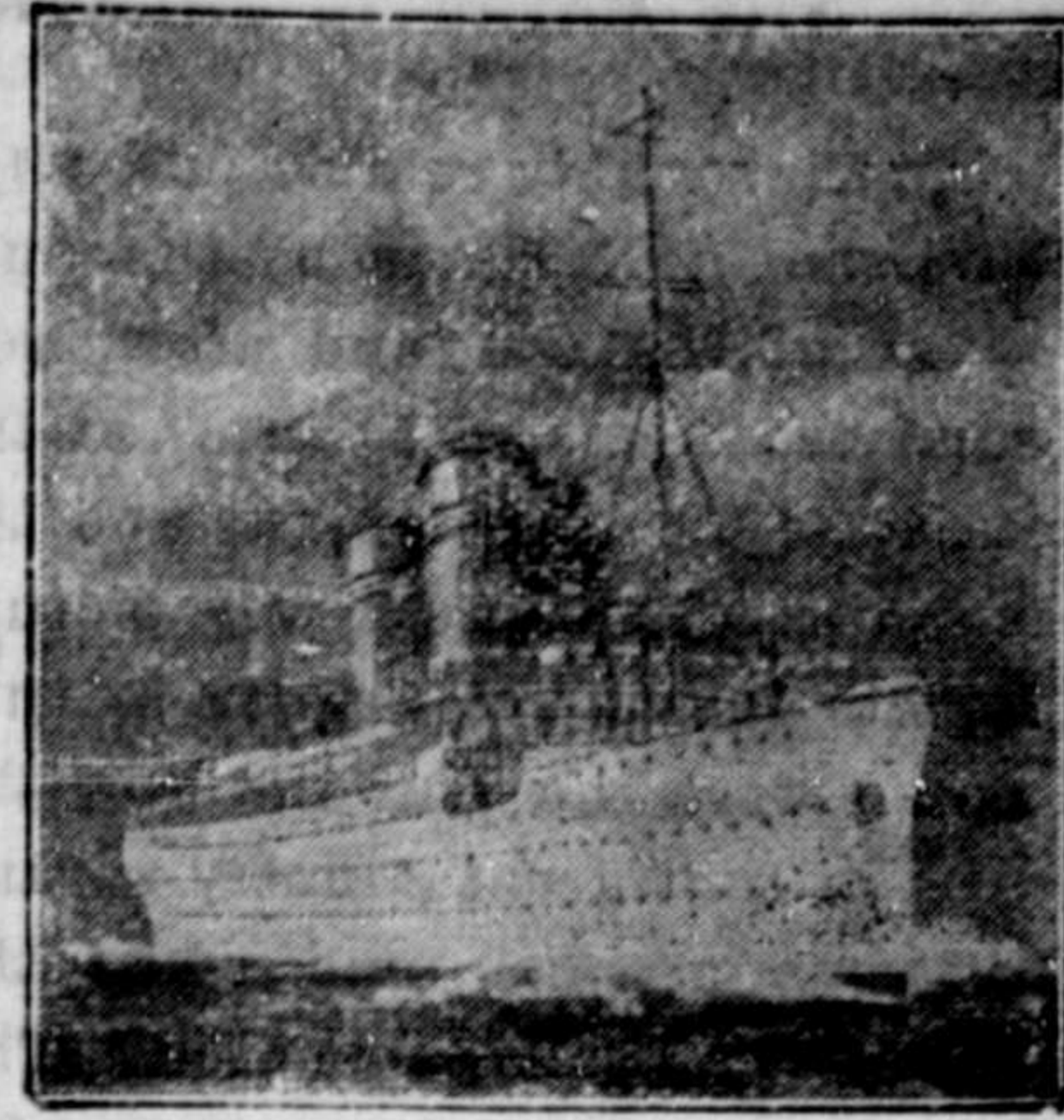

(8) As to Bylaws Nos. 144 and 241 relating to Market Place grading: Power to change the debentures authorised thereby from Sinking fund plan to Annuity Instalment, or Serial bonds at thirty (30) years, and to use the sinking fund already collected to purchase bonds to be issued thereunder, and to cease collection of further sinking fund:

(9) To provide for raising a reserve fund to ensure prompt payment of annual instalments to the amount of \$50,000 for present authorised indebtedness, and \$20,000 for every additional \$1,000,000.

(10) Providing that it shall not be necessary to submit to the ratepayers any bylaw making the change from sinking fund debentures to Annuity instalment or Serial bonds or changing the term of years, or the issue of new bonds to meet loss on sale of bonds or temporary notes.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.
QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

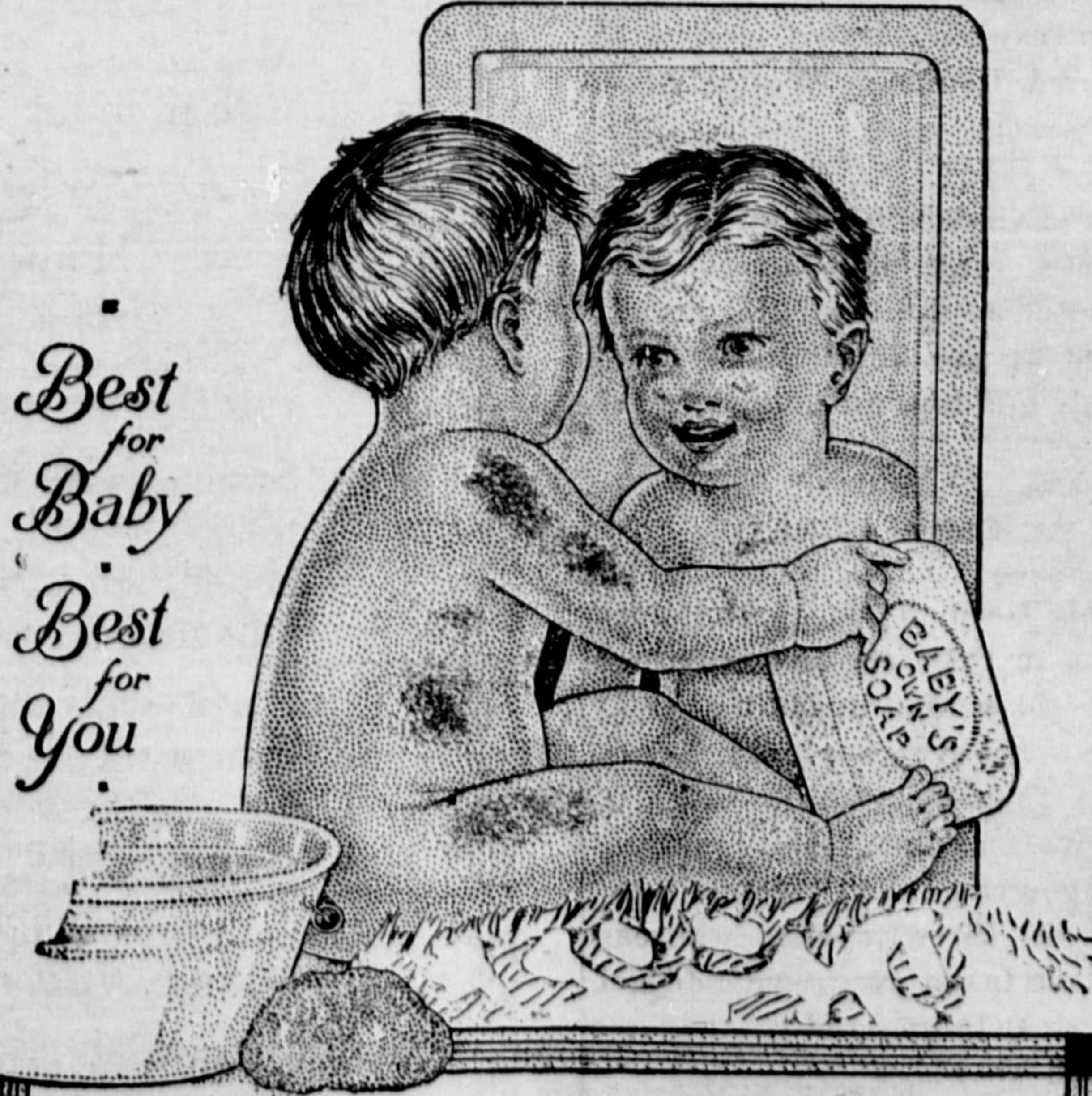
